Final Rites Are Held For Walter Bevers

Final rites were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday from the First Methodist Church, Munday, for Walter Claude Bevers, 77, long-time Knox County farmer and business man, who passed away at 3:30 p. m. Monday, in the Knox County Hospital, following a week's illness. Rev. Mauldin, pastor, officiated and was assisted by Rev. Marvin Burgess, Gillespie, Baptist Church pastor. Interment was made in Gillespie Cemetery.

Born February 5, 1882 in Palo Pinto, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Spence Bevers, who moved to Haskell in 1887 from Young County. His father had ranch holdings in Knox and Haskell counties.

Mr. Bevers entered college at Palo Pinto in 1898, but returned to ranching with his father in Knox County in 1903. That same year he married the former Jodie Thompson at Munday.

The couple lived in a ranch home at the Thorpe community, five miles southwest of Munday, until 1922 when they moved into town. Mr. Bevers was in the grocery business at Munday for several years but later ran a hatchery. He was also a former Munday city official.

The one-time rancher attended every annual Cowboy Reunion at Stamford except this year, when he was ill. At one time he served as an official at the reunion.

Survivors include his wife; three daughters, Mrs. Thelma Lewis of Houston, Mrs. Allene Koenig of Oklahoma City, Okla., and Mrs. Maurine D. Oran of Odessa; two sons, Joe L. Dallas and Jasper of Munday; three sisters, Mrs. J. A. Frazier of Haskell, Mrs. Frank Moore of Houston and Mrs. Lena Colard of Fort Worth; and three grandchildren.

FARMERS ARE VOTING TODAY (THURS.) ON WHEAT QUOTA

Wheat growers of Knox County are joining wheat farmers in 38 states, today, (Thursday) July 23, in a referendum to decide the type of marketing control program they will have for the 1960 crop of wheat.

The referendum is held at this time so that farmers will know at winter wheat planting time whether marketing restrictions will be in effect at harvest time in 1960.

The wheat program on which farmers will vote, is the same as that which has been in effect for the last several years, Chairman Gaylon C. Scott of the Knox County Agricultural Stabilization Committee said.

Voting places for the referendum were released to Knox County farmers in last week's issue of the Herald.

If at least two-thirds of the growers who vote in the referendum approve the quotas, they will remain in effect for 1960-crop wheat and price support will be available to farmers who comply with their farm wheat allotments at least 75 per cent of parity. Farmers who exceed the larger of the farm allotment or 15 acres will be subject to a marketing penalty of 45 per cent of the wheat parity price on their "excess" wheat.

If the quotas are not approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting, the quotas and penalties will not be in effect, and price support will be available to farmers who comply with

Last Rites Are Held For Brother Of Truscott Man

John William Brown, 68, prominent Cottle County cattle buyer, brother of Jack Brown, of Truscott, passed away in his sleep at his home in Paducah, last Thursday morning. The late Mr. Brown at one time resided at Truscott.

His wife discovered he was dead when she went to awaken him about 5:30 a. m.

He had been in ill health for the past three years, but was still partially active in cattle buying, and trading until his death.

Born Sept. 27, 1890, he was married to the former Mable Stewart Guthrie in Quanah, December 23, 1925. Brown had been a resident of Cottle County since 1921.

Survivors include his wife, Paducah; one son, John Kenan Brown, Falls Church, N. C.; three daughters, Mrs. Gene Estes, Abilene, Mrs. B. E. Pollock, Denver, Colorado, and Mrs. Charlotte Pearson, Paducah; two brothers, Jack Brown, Truscott, and Frank Brown, Abilene; 12 grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Final rites were held Saturday from the First Baptist Church, Paducah, and interment was made in the Garden of Memories Cemetery, Paducah.

New Strawn Pay Opened In Knox County

A new pay in the Strawn series has been opened in Knox County with completion by Great Lakes Carbon Corp. at the No. 1 Lee Smith, five miles west of Knox City.

Expansion Program Underway At Cities Service Oil Company's Plant

An expansion program is underway at Cities Service Oil Company's gasoline plant near Knox City in northeastern Stonewall county. This is part of a continuing program that started last year when Cities Service acquired the plant.

The summer phase of the program includes extension of the gas gathering system to include wells in other producing areas and unconnected wells in areas presently served by the pipeline system. The outreach program to provide for gas for the Stonewall plant includes ad-

ditional compressor capacity at field points. This gas gathering system now includes five automatic booster stations and extends approximately 30 miles from the plant into the southern part of the county.

Plant facilities are being revamped and expanded to handle the additional gas and to improve product recovery. The plant construction program involves additional compressor capacity and process efficiencies and additions.

A new propane fractionator has just been erected and is now

being tied into existing processing facilities. This 60-foot high vessel is the first major piece of equipment to be installed.

Delivery of an 80-foot processing vessel is scheduled for late July or early August delivery at the plant.

The O'Brien loading rack across the line in Haskell county is being expanded to enable faster handling of the additional products manufacture at the Stonewall plant. Storage capacity at the loading rack will be increased with the installation of three 1,000-barrel, high pressure tanks.

The contractor, R. L. Frailey, Inc., will have approximately 65 men working at the plant during the peak construction period this summer.

GAME LAWS SET IN KNOX AND OTHER TEXAS COUNTIES

Regulatory authority of the Game and Fish Commission has been extended to cover 104 counties in Texas for the coming season according to W. J. Cutbirth, Jr., assistant secretary of the Commission.

All of the upper Panhandle counties now are under the regulatory authority, as well as the counties of the Trans-Pecos area. There is an unbroken chain of counties extending from the Panhandle southeast to include Jefferson County on the south-east corner.

Much of the North Central Texas area is included in the list.

Hearings are now being held in each of these counties to set up hunting and fishing regulations for the coming season. At these meetings information is given concerning availability of game and range conditions.

Following these meetings recommendations will be made to the Commission at its regular meeting in Austin July 24. At that time the final regulations will be set.

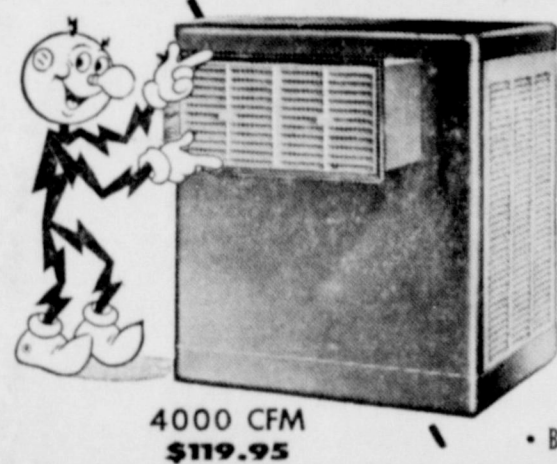

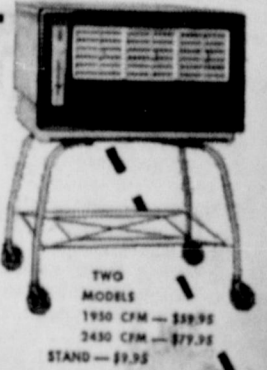

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Texas — Texas' 56th Legislature fizzled to the end of its third session and 180th day with its main job—providing money to run state government—still undone.

Gov. Price Daniel called a fourth session to begin just hours after the last one ended.

House members repeatedly voted down tax bills presented by joint conference committees of senators and representatives. Senate voted favorably each time.

First House rejection was by a vote of 81-to-64. This was on a bill to tax tobacco, natural gas production, corporation franchise, utilities, motor vehicles, liquor, wine, boats, motors, airplanes, radios, T.V.'s phonographs, cameras and liquor by the drink in private clubs.

Speaker Waggoner Carr named a new House conference group composed of members who had

voted against the bill. They met with the same Senate conferees that had worked twice before.

Only change in the new report was that the private club tax was cut out and the radio and TV tax slightly increased.

House rejected it again, 83-to-66.

More conferences and more votes followed in the final frantic hours. All futile! None made any apparent progress toward compromising the basic bone of contention, whether to tax gas pipelines. House favors this "severance beneficiary" tax by a narrow margin. Senate is flatly against.

Along with his new call, Governor Daniel issued a sober warning. Unless a tax bill is passed and effective (requiring a two-thirds favorable vote) by August 15, there won't be time or money to get Sept. 1 checks to 225,000 old age pensioners.

STUDENT FEE BILL OKAY. — A bill to require state college students to pay an activity fee passed both houses by a very narrow margin.

Measure would allow the colleges to charge students up to \$30 a semester to support health services, book rentals, cultural and athletic events, campus publications, parking, etc.

Any college may exempt from the fee up to 10 per cent of its enrollment in cases where the charge would cause "undue financial hardship."

Bill was hard-fought. Opponents declared it would make "free public education" available only to the rich. Backers said the colleges had to have more money. It was estimated the bill could bring in as much as an extra \$1,000,000 a year.

BEACH BILL PASSED.—Both houses passed and sent to the governor a bill guaranteeing public access to state-owned beaches.

It took a conference committee to work out the differences be-

As finally passed, the bill says the public shall have the right to come and go from public beaches. No one, it says, shall erect a fence or barrier to prevent this.

Beaches that cannot be reached by public road or ferry are exempt.

WAIT, YOUNG LOVERS. — Governor Daniel's expected signature on a newly passed bill will put a damper on the elopement plans of Texas teenagers.

It will require boys under 21 and girls under 18 to wait three days after obtaining a license to get married. Also, to get the license, the youngsters must be accompanied by parents or guardians.

Some lawmakers said it would mean more running across the state line to marry. However, Oklahoma recently passed a similar law.

NEED MONEY FIRST. — Amid the legislative tax deadlock, the Commission on Higher Education decided to stop studying new money programs until there's money to spend.

Commission's job is to determine needs of the state's colleges and universities and make recommendations to the Legislature. Expanded programs and new degrees are being sought by many schools. But when the Commission met, there was no money in sight even to open the schools next fall, let alone expand them.

Commission resolved to "approve no programs which entail additional expenditures until such time as monies are provided for the programs and offerings already in existence."

OIL QUOTA KEPT DOWN. — Texas oil allowable will be held down to nine producing days again for August.

Railroad Commission ordered the same production as for July—2,700,164 barrels a day on a nine-day schedule.

Major oil purchasing companies and independent producers were virtually agreed that production must be kept low to reduce excessive stocks.

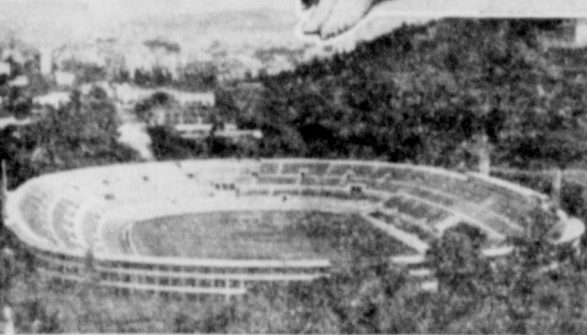

Soil Conservation Commemorative Postage Stamp To Be Issued Soon

A 4-cent postage stamp saluting progress in soil conservation in the United States will be issued August 26 by the Post Office Department, said Lynn Pittard, asst. extension soil and water conservation specialist.

The Nation's first soil conservation stamp will be formally released at the annual meeting of the Soil Conservation Society of America at Rapid City, South Dakota, August 26. It will go on sale the following day at post offices throughout the country.

The stamp, which was developed in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, portrays a modern farmland setting signifying that conservation farming brings beauty as well as bounty to rural living. Soil conservation practices portrayed include contour stripcropping, terracing, pasture improvement,

tree planting, and a farm pond. In addition, the silhouette of a city in the background symbolizes that urban as well as rural people are highly dependent upon the care and wise use of land as a principal source of food, water, shelter and clothing. The stamp will be printed in three colors, yellow, green and blue.

Issuance of the stamp, Pittard said, is a tribute to farmers and ranchers, their local soil conservation districts and to the professional agricultural workers who have helped make the United States a world leader in soil conservation.

First day "covers" containing the stamp are available through the Postmaster at Rapid City, S. D. Upon request and receipt of addressed envelopes and remittance to cover the cost of the stamps, the post office at Rapid City will place the new stamp on the envelopes, cancel them with a special cancellation mark used only on that day and at that place, and mail the envelopes on the first day of issue.

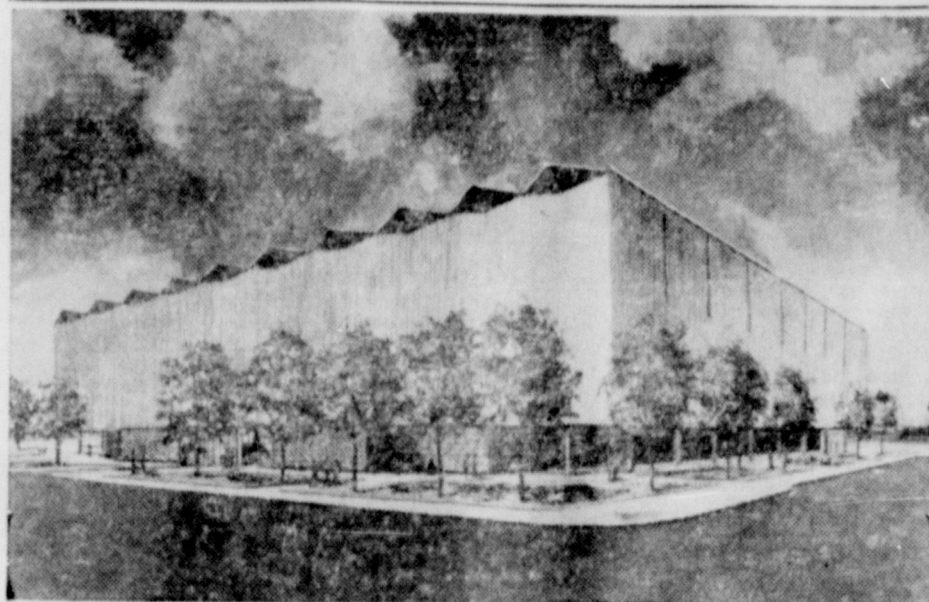

Corner on Cotton

BY BOB COLLINS

Cotton acreage for the '59-'60 season is estimated at a little more than 15.8 million . . . that's about 28 per cent over this year's figure . . . just what kind of production will come from the increase will be forecast by the Department of Agriculture on August 10 . . . with a production figure of 466 pounds per acre (that's what happened this season) or a little more—and some people think it may be more—a crop of better than 14 million bales would be in the offing . . . what would we do with this cotton? . . . some long range projections by some pretty smart cotton people indicate that none of it will go into the surplus we now have on hand.

Mill Use Up
The projections offer this food for thought: Consumption in domestic mills next season may reach nine million bales . . . that's 300,000 bales more than expected consumption during the current season . . . exports may top five million (they are running less than three million this season) as a result of the lower price . . . so, if these projections prove accurate, none of the new crop cotton will add to

From the Bank

Much of the 28 percent estimated increase in acreage comes from what was the soil bank . . . this program kept out of production about five million cotton acres . . . but despite the increase there is apparently considerable underplanting since the total allotment for the country is 17.3 million acres.

It's not too surprising to find that the states with the largest percentage of increase over last year's planting are in the Southeast . . . for instance, South Carolina has an increase of 143 per cent for the new crop . . . the following table shows the percentage of increase over the '58-'59 crop:

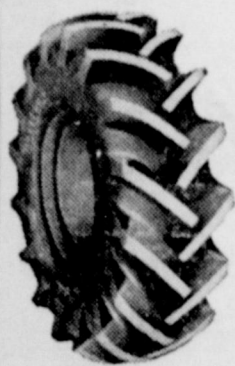

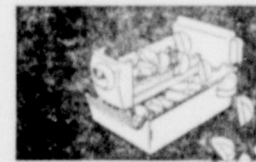

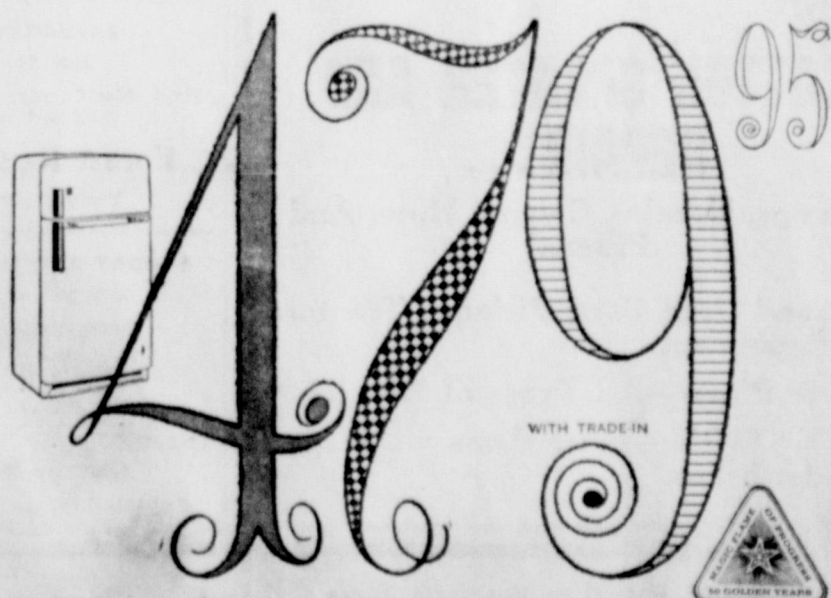
