Institution of Keathley Post No. 4950, Veterans of Foreign Wars, was the highlight of a meeting of overseas veterans at the Lamesa Country Club Thursday night. The local organization was formed with approximately 50 members as part of a wide VFW expansion program in West Texas.

Formal installation of officers and institution of the post were conducted by Commander P. T. West of the Lubbock VFW, who is deputy chief of staff for the VFW Department of Texas.

The local post was named in memory of S-Sgt. George D. Keathley, posthumous Congressional Medal of Honor winner, whose widow and two daughters still live in Lamesa.

## AAA Elections To Take Place In December

Dawson County farmers will take time out from seasonal work in the next four weeks to elect AAA community and county committee members for the coming year.

Three community committeemen and two alternates, as well as a delegate to the county-convention, will be chosen in each of the county's 12 farming communities. The delegates will later elect the three-man committee which will administer AAA activities within the county.

Chairman Joe M. Peterson of the AAA committee, said today that dates, hours, and places for holding the annual election are now being determined. Announcements will be made within the next few days.

In Dawson County, Peterson said, approximately 1,800 farmers are eligible to vote on committeemen this year. "Eligible" farmers are those who participate in the 1945 agricultural conservation, flaxseed payment, sugar, or crop insurance program.

The county AAA chairman, in reminding Dawson County farmers of the forthcoming ballot, appealed for full participation.

"Solution of the postwar problems ahead of us is the vital concern of every farmer. Consequently, it is his own best interest to vote in the coming elections—to make sure that the men administering AAA programs in the county are the ones he wants to represent him."

## Christmas Seal Campaign Now In High Gear, Leaders Report, As Second Week of Drive Ends

Chairman Urges Early Checks, Relating Seal's Fascinating Background

Payments for TB Christmas Seals have slowed down since last week, Chairman C. E. Tarter said Saturday. "We are well pleased with the response so far, however," he added.

"Don't lay up those tuberculosis seals and forget them," he urged. Send or bring your checks to the AAA office, 520 North First Street, and use the stamps. Delay in payment for the Christmas Seals only slows work in the local office, he said.

Quota for the 1945 Christmas Seal sale has been set at \$2,000 by the Dawson County Tuberculosis Association, president of which is C. C. Terry. Eighty per cent of the total seal funds remains within the county for use in examination and treatment.

Idea of tuberculosis Christmas Seal sales originated back in 1903 in Copenhagen, Denmark, and the 38 annual sales in America have resulted in saving of many lives. The story is an interesting one, Tarter said, as he related:

"It was a busy afternoon just before Christmas in 1903. Piles and piles of Christmas letters and packages were pouring into and out of the post office in Copenhagen. Einar Holboell, a postal clerk, was an expert in handling the holiday mail, and as he worked he mused on an idea that now has saved hundreds of lives.

"This Holboell idea was to add a one-cent stamp on each letter and package to finance a Danish war against tuberculosis—a war in which human lives were saved.

"By 1907, Jacob Riis had published an article in America called 'The Christmas Stamp,' setting American people to thinking just what they could do about it.

"That same year, Emily Bissell, a young public health worker in Wilmington, Del., had the first TB Christmas Seal stamps printed—50,000 of them. People in Delaware had begun to hear about the Christmas Seals, and from there the idea spread like wildfire all over the United States.

"Local associations are now set up throughout the country, not only to handle the Christmas Seal sale, but to plan and carry out fights for prevention and treatment for tuberculosis.

"Thus was marked up the origin of the TB Christmas Seal, one of the biggest saviors of lives in the world. Won't you and you and you send in your checks today?" the seal chairman concluded.

## Study of 'Assumed' Name Filing Provides Informational Data

Sometimes state laws are strange things. Much of the time, the average person has little or no idea of the meaning of such laws after they are read.

Such is the case with a little state statute concerning carrying on business under an "assumed" name. In this case, however, there's no penal offense attached to the alias.

In the office of County Clerk Howard Humphrey there is a book wherein Lamesa business people are required to register a new business, providing it is carried on under this so-called "assumed" name. Since 1941, there have been 28 names registered, and six such have been registered this year.

Meaning of the law is a bit difficult to understand, unless reader of the statute is familiar with interpretation of law, Humphrey admitted.

It seems that a business may be established and operated without registration if the firm title carries the full name or full names of the owner or owners. To be specific, Humphrey explained, John Doe and James Smith may carry on their laundry business without registering it in the little book if the firm name is listed John Doe and James Smith Laundry. However, if the business name is Doe-Smith Laundry, then registration is required.

The same certificate is required if the laundry is named Lamesa Laundry or Keep Clean Laundry or any other similar title.

Change of ownership for business under "assumed" names likewise requires registration, he said.

Only exemptions from the registration are "domestic or foreign corporations lawfully doing business in this state."

## Tornadoes Play Midland 6-6 Tie In Grid Finale

Lamesa high school's Golden Tornadoes and the Midland Bulldogs struggled listlessly to a 6-6 tie on the Midland Field Thanksgiving afternoon in fine football weather before a relatively small crowd.

This was the season finale for the tornadoes, and the Bulldogs have only a game with Odessa's ram-paging Bronchos left on their schedule for the 1945 season.

Midland scored in the first quarter, the Bulldogs marching 40 yards to tally with Bobby Drake covering the last 6 yards. The Midlanders set up their scoring chance on the toe of their quarterback, Bobby Coe, who booted the ball out on the Lamesa 5, then the 3, and finally the 1-yard line. Lamesa kicked out fairly far every time, but on the third Lamesa punt Midland went all the way.

The balance of the first half was clearly Midland's ball game as the Bulldogs out-fought the Tornadoes. Then in the third period the Tornadoes rallied, marching 65 yards to tie the count on the kick off. Orvill Nieman, Lamesa halfback, ran his scoring total for the season to 37 points as he rambled over from the 6 yard line.

Both clubs launched futile and desperate aerial attacks the rest of the way as they tried to unknot the count. Lamesa's air game clicked very well during parts of the game and the local lads rolled up lots of yardage by that route. Frequent fumbles cut down on the Tornadoes scoring chances. Several of the Lamesa regulars were not up to par physically either. Ends, big guard, was able to play only a little. Patterson, halfback, played most of the game with a fractured hand, and Matlock, tackle, wore a brace for his injured shoulder. Nieman was slowed with a bad knee and ankle.

HASH BROWN POTATOES

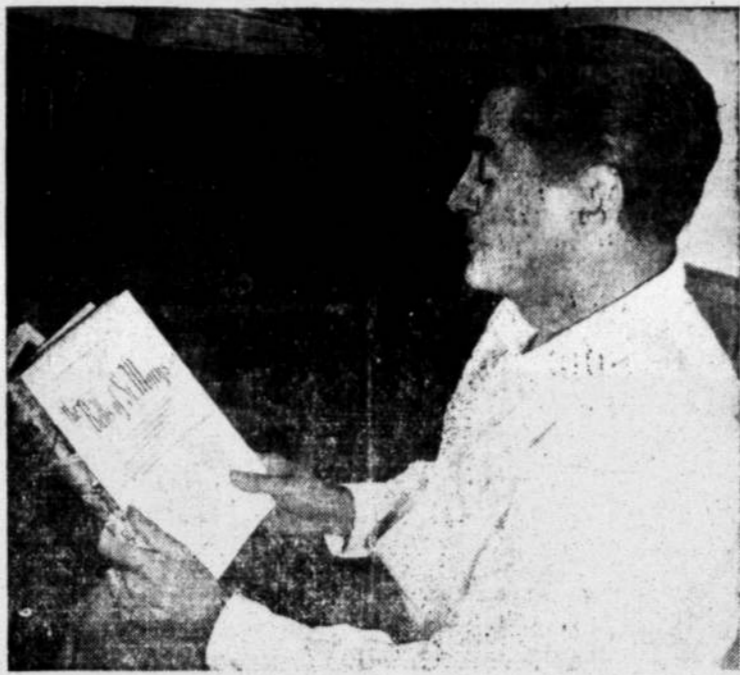
A woman who used to do a lot of club work in the office the other day. She said, "Why don't you give a demonstration on hash browning? My hash browned potatoes or hash browned hash never looks just like the ones you get in good hotels or cafes." Maybe a recipe in this column will reach more people than a demonstration would.

Patience, low heat, and no stirring are the tricks to good hash browning. Here is the recipe: Melt 1-2 to 1 level tablespoon of fat in a frying pan. Add chopped cooked potatoes. Season with salt and pepper and chopped onion or a little garlic if you like it. Mix with a little water (about 1-4 cup to 4 cups potatoes). Then cook over low heat until brown and crusty on the bottom. Do not stir the potatoes. It is sometimes possible to fold in half and serve like an omelet. Cold mashed potatoes are just as good. Corned beef hash, turkey or chicken hash, or liver hash can be hash browned this way, and are especially good ways to fix that hot supper for school children who have had a cold lunch.

**Whipping Temperatures**  
Do you know this? Egg whites whip best when they are at room temperature, that is about 70 degrees F., and cream whips best when cold (about 40 degrees F.). Practical application is to take your eggs from the refrigerator an hour or two before using them if they are to be whipped, and place the whipping cream in the coldest part of the ice box and take out just before it is to be used.

And here are some fine points about whipping cream. The best type of beater has flat blades which revolve at the bottom of the bowl. Next best is a rotary egg beater. The best bowl is a deep one with straight sides. Use a bowl large enough to allow the cream to double in volume and still have space in top for splashing. Some whipping bowls come equipped with covers to prevent splashing, but many housewives simply use a sheet of paper with a slit in the middle to fit down over the egg beater. If you have an ordinary hand egg beater, you will probably save time if you whip no more than a half pint at a time. If larger quantities are needed, it may be better to whip in successive

batches. Cream whips best if the whipping is rapid. A cup of double cream should be whipped fast enough to double its volume in two or three minutes. Remember that whipping is the first stage of turning. If you whip it one minute too long, you may get butter. It takes less sugar to sweeten cream if it is added just before the whipping is finished. Two level teaspoons may be added to a pint of cream without affecting its stiffness. Flavoring extracts do not affect stiffness or whippability of the cream. Freshly separated cream does not whip well. Four hours is about the minimum time of chilling, while its whipping qualities will probably improve up to 24 hours. If cream is to be kept after whipping, keep it in the coldest part of the refrigerator.

**Suet Pudding For Your Xmas Dinner**

- 1-8 cup nuts.
- 1-8 cup citron.

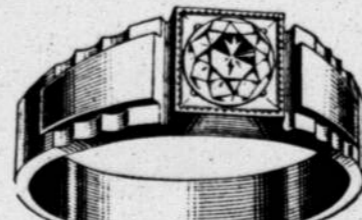

### The Army ANSWERS Your Personal War Problems

Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters, Eighth Service Command, Dallas, 2, Texas.

Q. Is it true that officers are now being released from the Army regardless of the number of points they have, if they have been in the service a certain length of time?

A. Yes. Except for Medical Department officers who are being released under a different set of requirements, male officers with four years and three months service will become eligible for separation on December 1.

Q. My husband is at an Army camp which is supposed to close in about a month. Will he be automatically discharged when it closes?

A. No. Soldiers who are not eligible for discharge when their camps close are reassigned to other Army installations.

Q. I am a veteran. How can I go about buying some surplus Army property?

A. Discharged soldiers have preference to buy surplus Army property to establish or maintain their own small business, professional or agricultural enterprise, or if they are required by their employment to have their own tools and equip-

ment. You should apply for what you want at an office of the Smaller War Plants Corporation, which must pass on all veterans' applications. There you will be acquainted with the full procedure for purchasing surplus Government property.

Q. My husband has been in the service 19 months. He is over 35, has 55 points and we have three children. He is still in the states. Is he eligible for discharge?

A. He will be eligible for discharge December 1.

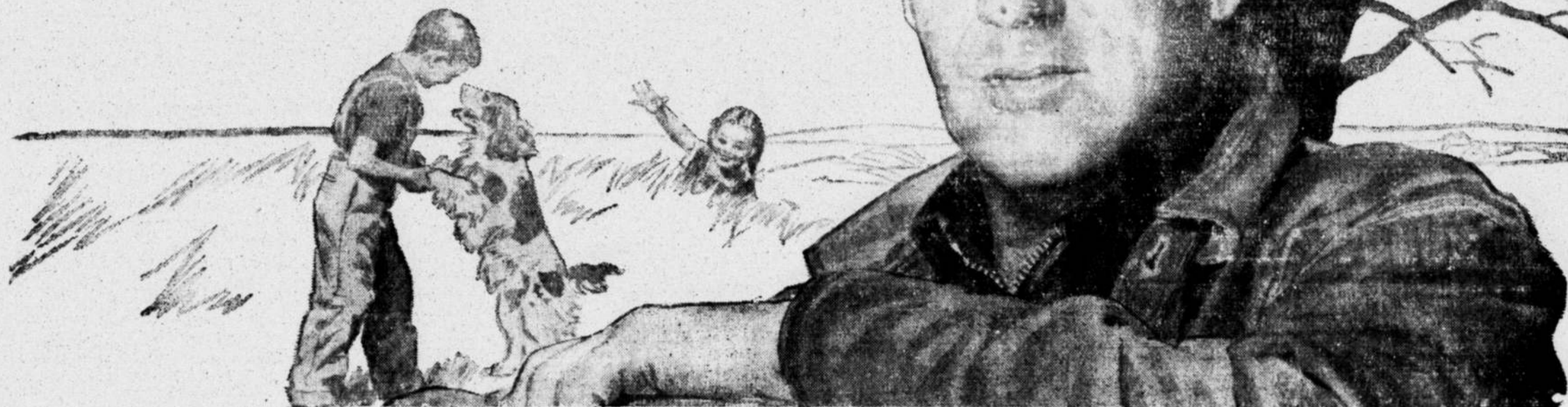

## Language Chasm Stalls Nations Peacemakers

BERLIN—Variations in the English and Russian texts of the Potsdam agreement—caused by different interpretations of language—have caused considerable difficulties and lost time for officials charged with carrying out terms of the pact.

Because of these variations, President Truman and Prime Minister Attlee did not interpret the agreement in exactly the same light as did Marshal Stalin, when the Big Three signed the document last August.

A third shade of meaning was given the agreement when it was translated into German and published in newspapers here.

And still a fourth interpretation was introduced by its translation into French. France was not represented at the Potsdam conference, but shares the responsibility for carrying out terms of the agreement.

Consequently, as American members of the Allied Control Council point out, misunderstandings frequently occur when that body considers matters of policy.

An American officer who speaks Russian fluently said:

"When things come to a standstill, it is often wrongly assumed that the Russians are trying to throw a monkey wrench into the machinery."

"The real cause for breakdowns is usually because the Russians have one conception, based on their authorized text, while we have another, based on our authorized English text."

For instance, the word "policy," he explained, connotes to the Americans and British a definite guiding principle; to the Russians, the word "politiki" means general theory of action.

The English text says that "15 per cent of such usable and complete industrial capital equipment, in the first place from the metallurgical, chemical and machine-manufacturing industries, as is unnecessary for the German peace economy" shall be awarded Russia as reparations from the western occupation zones.

To the Americans and English, this means that if and when the essential needs of the Germans have been satisfied, the Russians will get their reparations from the metallurgical, chemical and machine-manufacturing industries, before any other industries are touched.

In the Russian text, "in the first place" means that Russian reparations will receive priority over essential German needs.

When a German translation of the agreement was published, many Germans seemed bewildered at certain inconsistencies, until Judge Karl Von Lwinski, former consul general in New York and an authority on inter-

national law, compared the German and English versions.

He found, for instance, that the meaning of Article III, Section A, had been changed.

This article says in the English version that "certain essential central German administrative departments, headed by state secretaries, shall be established, particularly in the fields of finance, transport, communications, foreign trade and industry."

In the German translation, the word "particularly" was changed to the German equivalent of "name-

ly." The Germans naturally thought this meant that the only departments which could be established were in the "fields of finance, transport, communications, foreign trade and industry."

Actually, such departments as labor, agriculture, education, justice and public health were not meant to be excluded.

New rules give employes a regular scale of days off for family events: 12 days to get married, two days for the birth of a child (the mother gets six weeks), two days for a son's wedding, eight days for the death of a wife or parent and three days for the death of a grandparent. These are in addition to annual vacations.

**Truck With Wings**

Earl Coxhill, another flying rancher, used a plane during the summer in scouting for blue grass meadows.

He was purchasing and harvesting the blue grass seed.

Thirty-five miles southwest of Atkinson he spotted a promising meadow, landed at the rancher's house, purchased the crop and ordered in his strippers the next day for the harvest.

It's true enough that the plane simplifies chores, saves time, manpower and even money.

But there's another reason for the rancher's love for the airplane.

As one said:  
"The sky's big out here and it's fun to fly, especially after riding range horseback or driving a car or truck over trails and roads that are none too good."

### Auto Deaths Show September Increase

The end of gasoline rationing was a signal to motor-loving Americans. Despite rickety cars and ancient tires, they swarmed out on the highways. Immediately, the traffic death roll rose.

The National Safety Council, Chicago, last week reported that traffic fatalities in September, first full month of unrestricted gasoline buying, jumped to 2,830 or 40 percent more than a year ago.

But it can get worse, warned the council, urging drivers to check their cars' condition, be more careful in traveling in the dark, slippery winter months.

### VITAMIN C DOSES END SULFA DRUG ILLNESS

NEW YORK—Use of vitamin C to relieve the illness that sulfa drugs cause in some persons is reported in the Ohio State Medical Journal by Dr. Harry N. Holmes, head of the chemistry department, Oberlin College.

He quotes several physicians who said large doses of vitamin C relieved the sulfa illness and enabled their patients to take the drug.

**Sensitization Cases**  
Dr. Holmes says that probably this vitamin will remedy the cases of sensitization to sulfas that worry the medical profession. Sensitization means that after a small dose of a sulfa drug a person becomes sensitive so that afterward not enough sulfa can be given even to save their lives.

Because of this risk, druggists in some places have been forbidden to sell any sulfa preparation to the public without a physician's prescription. This includes the sulfa drops used for colds and adhesive bandages containing sulfa preparations.

**Weakness Cited**  
Weakness that lasts a long time is one discouraging after effect of sulfas. Dr. Holmes reports a medical experiment with 10 college students which indicates this weakness is not due to the sulfa but to loss of vitamin C. The experiment showed that while the sulfas were being given to the healthy young men their excretion of vitamin C was doubled. The loss of the vitamin, Dr. Holmes said, made them weak. Giving massive doses of this vitamin while sulfas are being taken is the remedy.

Dr. Holmes reported that cases of skin trouble in workmen had been mostly cleared up in industrial plants by daily doses of vitamin C. These skin troubles were due to poisonous substances and the vitamin acted as a purifier in the body.

### Russians Exhibits To Tour Country

NEW YORK—(AP)—Panels and enlarged texts explaining the governmental make-up of the Soviet Union's 16 republics and the part they played in the war on exhibit at Manhattan's American Museum of Natural History later will go on a nation-wide tour.

The National Council of American-Soviet Friendship compiled the display. It includes more than 100 integrated panels. Charts show how the separate republics are fused into one nation.

### WARMER THAN WOOL

New overcoats, using rayon, will be much lighter but warmer than 100 percent wool ones. Clothing men say rayon is the coming textile. It blends with almost any other type of goods.

### Survey Shows Trio of Reasons For Non-Voting

The devices which keep the majority of southern citizens away from the polls are uncovered by the South's leading editors and writers in a pamphlet, "Voting Restrictions in the 13 Southern States," with state-by-state surveys on election practices and regulations.

Reports show that in the 13 Southern states, 27.9 percent of the potential voters cast their ballots, compared to 61.9 percent in the other 35 states. The three most general limitations brought to the light of day in the pamphlet are:

1. Arbitrary interpretation of complicated registration laws which allowed the exclusion of great numbers of the population.

2. The fact that in many states the election is actually decided by the Democratic primary election, in which negroes are often not allowed to participate.

3. The poll tax, which by its financial burden and the nuisance which it involves keeps many people from the polls.

Other difficulties in the way of voting include unreasonable location of voting places and limited hours of voting, making it impossible for workers to get to the polls.
