Colorado City may possibly have a new motel and truck stop by the first of the year.

This news was brought out during the regular monthly meeting of the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce Monday evening. Visa Ehergy Inc. recently purchased the Cattleman's Restaurant and Morgan Creek Truck Plaza along with twenty acres of property directly behind the plaza.

The company, which is based in Conroe, just outside Houston, is contemplating constructing a 45 unit motel, according to Board Member Brad Rose who was reportedly contacted in regard to construction of a swimming pool for the motel.

4:30 p.m., until 6 p.m. and advanced tickets will be sold. Only persons with a ticket will receive a cookbook at the tea.

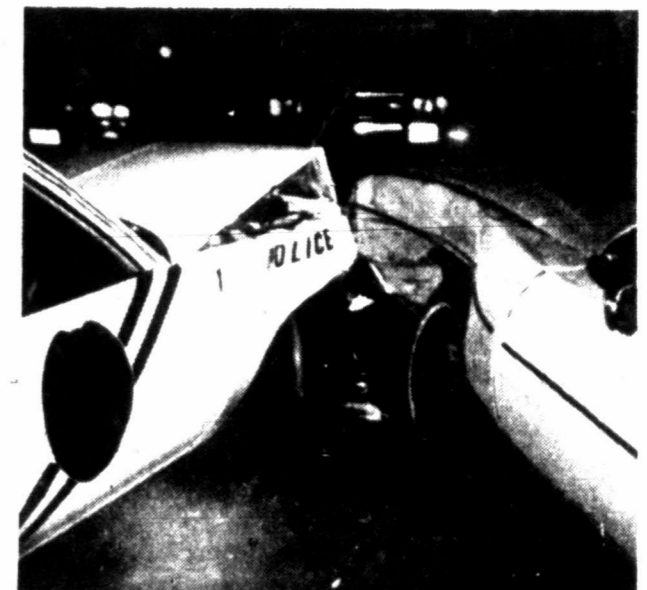

## Freak Accident Results In Extensive Damage

Sergeant Johnny Slough of the Colorado City Police Department narrowly escaped serious injury when he managed to maneuver his patrol car between a telephone pole and a stop sign when he lost control of the vehicle Saturday.

Slough was responding to a call to offer assistance to Chief of Police Jimmy Roundtree who was in pursuit of a speeding vehicle in the eastern portion of the city, according to Roundtree.

The patrol car failed to negotiate a curve due to wet road conditions in the 900 block of East Highway 80. The car ran through a small flower garden in the median at the curve and rammed into a 1973 Chevrolet which was parked in the South parking lot of Dockrey Motors, Roundtree commented.

A chain of collisions resulted as the Chevrolet was knocked into a parked 1970 Dodge pickup, which crashed into a 1970 Buick.

All three vehicles belonged to Dockrey Motors.

Slough radioed Chief Roundtree, notifying him of the accident. At this point, the chase was reportedly discontinued

and Roundtree went to the aid of the sergeant.

Slough was taken by Mitchell County Ambulance to Root Memorial Hospital where he was treated for bruises to the left leg.

Dossey Wrecker Service was called to remove the wrecked patrol car.

Thomas reportedly lost control of his vehicle when its brakes failed as he attempted to exit the interstate. The truck overturned and came to rest on its side.

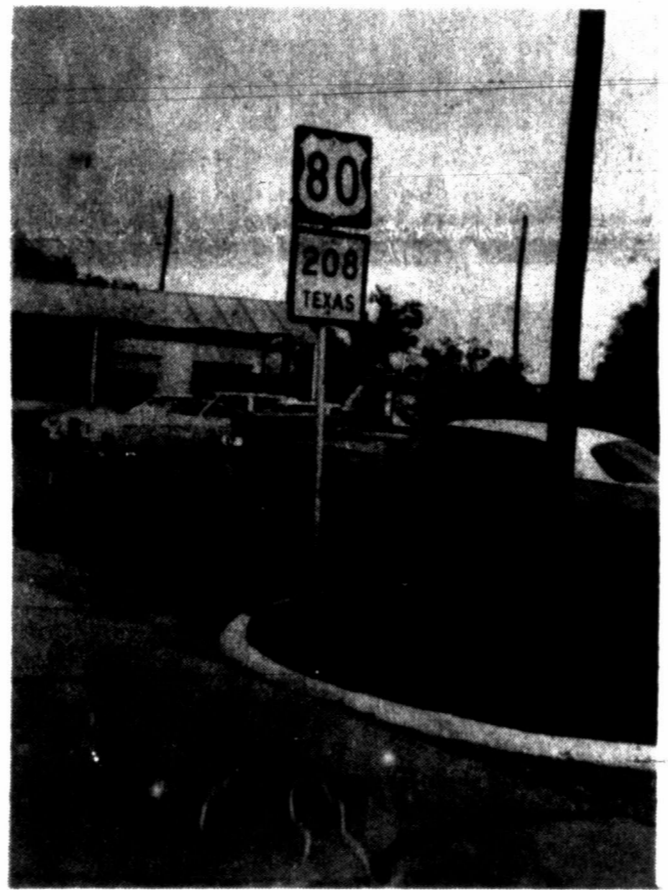
Thomas contacted police and Officer Elias Franco responded to the call, assisted by other members of the department.

Houston based company. He said the asphalt in the old refinery tanks has been committed and company will possibly move the material within 60 to 90 days. Piland also commented that a company had looked into this area for possible construction of a drilling rig company. Most of the inquiries were in regard to availability of existing buildings in which to house businesses, Piland noted. Board Member Mildred Free reported she has been contacted by the owner of a spanish food restaurant who would like to locate in Colorado City. She said she was asked what suitable space would be available here but she didn't know of any off-hand. She suggested the

company be contacted with the information. Chamber Manager Jack Hollis reported that Chamber Secretary Gretchen Ramsey has resigned from her position to accept another job. He is currently taking applications and interviewing for that position. Hollis also noted sales for the rodeo program are going well and distributed 25 names for board members to contact in regard to the purchase of advertisement space in the program. Board members decided to distribute the programs free of charge this year. Hollis also reported four signs marking entrances to the city have been painted. Construction at the arena is nearing completion.

The concession stand and new bleachers will require paint in the near future. Board Member Barbara Gray is in charge of this part of the project. Hollis noted there has been a delay in connecting water in the arena and concession stand areas to the main line. He said they have located several water lines, but have not been able to locate the city water line. Arrangements have been made for judges, stock, timers and a secretary for the rodeo, Rose reported. In other reports, Hollis noted the chamber has accepted the Centennial Headquarters as an honorary member of the chamber for the remainder of this year. Chamber President Joe Kirschbaum reported

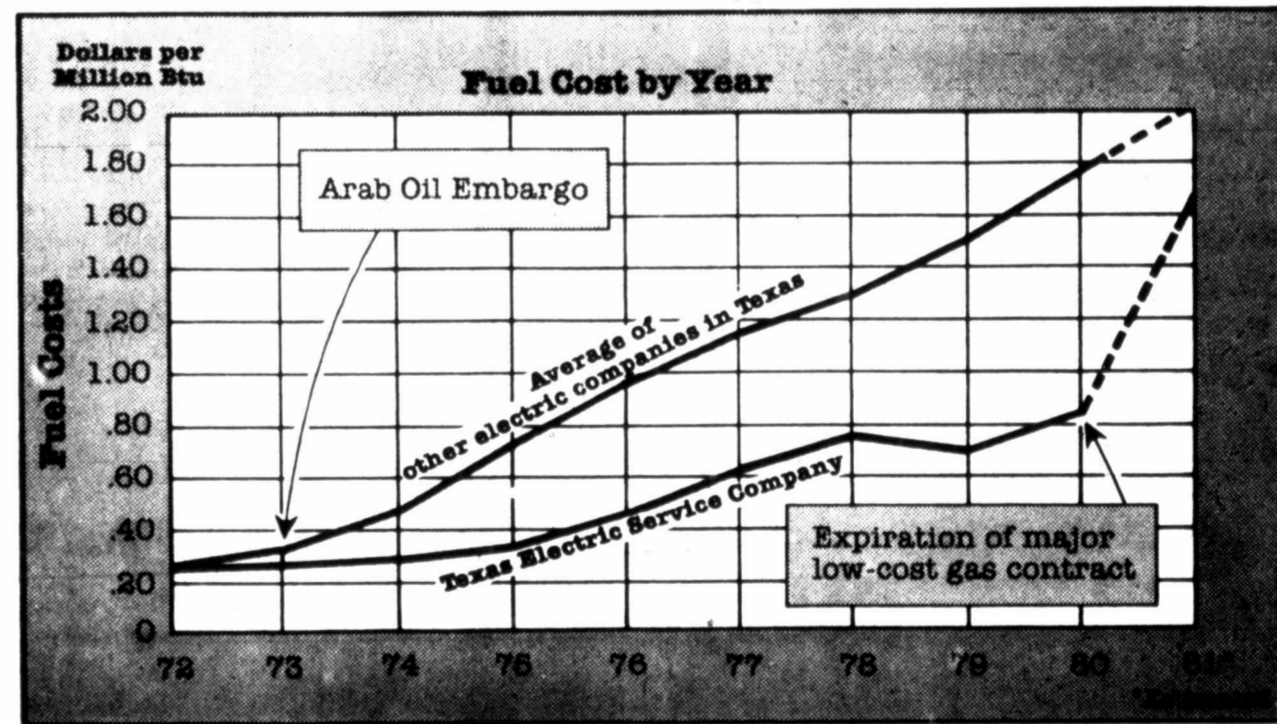
