By 'Texas Football'

Longhorns Picked Tenth

Hart High School's maroon and white Longhorns have been picked by Dave Campbell's "Texas Football" magazine as tenth in the State Class A pre-season favorites.

Head Coach Bill Taylor said the selection "puts us on the spot" but cites his team's "super attitude" as an aid in achieving an outstanding 1976 record.

"The kids have a super attitude" Taylor says and indicates his team has set high goals.

"Even though they've picked us as district favorites, we realize there certainly are other teams capable of having a good season and winning the district title. Vega, Springlake-Earth and Farwell all look good," he says.

"Top-o-Texas Football" magazine also picked the Horns for the Class 3-A championship but did not name the maroon squad to the top ten. They picked Farwell, Vega, Springlake-Earth, Kress and Bovina to follow the Horns in the district standings.

"The Longhorns will have a

new head coach, promoted assistant Bill Taylor," the magazine reads, "but they'll likely have the same look about them that's become so familiar the last few seasons - it'll be the look of the look of a title contender."

Editor Sam Mayo continues, "The Longhorns, coming off a 9-2 campaign, boast 12 letter winners, many of them at the skilled position, enviable quickness and that taste for winning so admired elsewhere."

"If Taylor, who moved up when head coach Lonnie Phillips moved to Friona to take the head job there, can overcome some inexperience in his line and overall lack of depth, the Longhorns could be eyeing playoff competition again."

"The top returnee is Bryan Irons, a 6-3, 185-pound tight end and linebacker, who was accorded all-district laurels at both positions. He has great hands for catching and unusual tackling sense which makes him an all-state caliber athlete this fall.

"Kerry George, a 5-10,

160-pound senior with 4.5 quickness in the 40, gained all-district honorable-mention notice at quarterback and is expected to be even better this year. His quickness makes him a home-run threat at all times.

"Glenn Black, a 165-pound fullback-linebacker, is expected to be one of the top players at each position in the district.

"Eliazar Castillo, a 145-pound safety, possesses 4.5 quickness, too, and he's been known to make things happen, most of them good.

"Gary Jackson, a 160-pound tackle, was an All South Plains defensive tackle pick last year. Larry Marble, a 6-2, 178-pound tackle, was an honorable-mention all-district pick on offense, while Berto Minjarez, a 150-pound noseguard, gained all-district honors, too.

"Taylor must come up with a center, a guard and an end to be polished on offense. His defense, particularly at linebacker and backfield positions, appears in good shape.

"Watch the Longhorns this fall, they'll be tough to beat."

Miss Terri Beth Sikes was employed as a science teacher for junior high and high school. Miss Sikes is a recent graduate of West Texas State University.

Hired as a Co-op Counselor for Hart and Nazareth schools was Mrs. Mary Brooks. She has taught in Dimmitt Junior High for the past 10 years.

Bus drivers given approval by the board were Joe Cariker, David Knox, Leonard Griswold, Lonnie Howell, Johnnie Sullivan and Rita Cole.

A bid of \$660 was accepted by the board from Ed Truelock for the installation of a hot water storage unit in the field house.

The board set the salary for certified teachers who substitute at \$25 per day. Uncertified teachers pay for substitute teaching was set at \$20 and teacher aide substitutes at \$17.50.

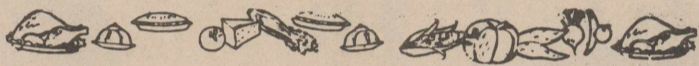

Cindy CHERRY BERRIES ON A CLOUD

3 egg whites ($\frac{1}{3}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ c)
 $\frac{1}{4}$ t Cream of Tarter
 $\frac{3}{4}$ c sugar
 1 pkg. (3 oz.) Cream Cheese softened
 $\frac{1}{2}$ c sugar
 $\frac{1}{2}$ t vanilla
 1 c miniature marshmallows

Heat oven to 275 degrees. Cover baking sheets with heavy brown paper; draw outline of heart, 9 inches across greatest width, on paper. Beat egg whites and cream of tarter until foamy. Beat in $\frac{3}{4}$ c sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, continue beating until stiff and glossy. Do not underbeat. Spoon meringue into outline on paper, building up side. Bake $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours. Turn oven off; leave meringue in oven with door closed for one hour. Remove from oven, finish cooling away from draft. Blend cream cheese, $\frac{1}{2}$ c sugar and the vanilla. In

chilled bowl beat cream until stiff. Gently fold whipped cream and marshmallows into cream cheese mixture. Pile into meringue shell. Cover; chill at least 12 hours. Just before serving, top with cherry berry topping. Cut into wedges.

CHERRY BERRY TOPPING

Stir together 1 can (21 oz.) Cherry Pie Filling, 1 t lemon juice and if desired, 2 c sliced

strawberries or 1 pkg. (16 oz.) frozen strawberries thawed.

ITALIAN SPAGHETTI WITH MEAT SAUCE

2 lb. ground beef
 1 med. onion finely chopped
 1 green pepper finely chopped
 2 cans (15 oz. each) tomato paste

1 can (7½ oz. each) pitted ripe olives drained and sliced
 2 envelopes (1½ oz. each) Italian Style Spaghetti Sauce
 Mix with mushrooms
 3 c water
 1 T sugar
 1 t Oregano leaves
 2 cloves garlic, crushed
 1 bay leaf crumbled
 16 oz. Italian Style Spaghetti
 Grated Parmesan Cheese

Cook and stir meat, onion and pepper until meat is brown and onion is tender. Stir in remaining ingredients except Spaghetti and Parmesan Cheese. Cover, simmer 1½ hours stirring occasionally. Cook Spaghetti as directed on package. Serve meat sauce over hot Spaghetti topped with Parmesan Cheese.

STRAWBERRY MINUTE PIE
 1 stick or ½ packet of Betty Crocker Pie Crust Mix

1 c boiling water
 1 pkg. (3 oz.) strawberry flavored gelatin
 1 pkg. (16 oz.) frozen sliced strawberries

Prepare 8-inch baked pie shell as directed on package. Pour boiling water over gelatin; stir to dissolve. Add frozen strawberries; stir to break berries apart. When mixture is partially set, pour into baked pie shell. Chill until set. If you wish, serve with sweetened whip cream.

LOLLIPOPS

18 lollipop sticks
 ¼ c butter or margarine
 ½ c light corn syrup
 ¾ c sugar
 few drops food coloring

Arrange lollipop sticks on lightly buttered baking sheet. In one-quart saucepan, combine butter, corn syrup and sugar. Heat boiling over medium heat, stirring occasionally. Reduce heat to medium. Continue cooking, stirring frequently to 270 degrees on candy thermom-

eter or until a few drops of syrup dropped into very cold water separate into threads that are hard, but not brittle. Remove from heat. Stir in food coloring.

Drop mixture by tablespoons over end of each lollipop stick. If desired, while lollipops are hot, press on candy decorations. Cool lollipops thoroughly before removing from baking sheet. Makes 18 two-inch lollipops.

Especially we appreciated Pearl Harbor, viewing the memorial markers of those servicemen who lost their lives there. It is a quiet and peaceful scene today.



done 14.8 in the high hurdles, 55.1 in the intermediates and 13-0 in the pole vault.

Home & Hobby

School is starting soon and we'll all be ready to get into our school routines again. The summer has been busy for everyone. I hope you've done most of the things you had planned to do.

I'd like to share a few interesting recipes and hints from the past with you this week.

BAKING POWDER

To make baking powder, combine one pound cream of tartar, one-half pound baking soda and two tablespoons flour. Sift above five times to mix thoroughly. Store in dry can and use whenever baking powder is needed.

OLD-FASHIONED MINCE-MEAT

- (makes two 9" pies)
- 1 lb. cooked very lean meat
- 2 c brown sugar
- 1 c suet
- 1 lb. raisins
- 1 lb. currants
- 2 c cider
- 1 lb. tart apples
- 1/2 t cinnamon
- 1/2 t nutmeg
- 1/2 t mace
- 1/2 t cloves
- 1 t salt
- 2 c grape or canned cherry juice

Meat broth from meat
Cook the meat until almost tender. Cool. Chop (do not grind) apples, suet and beef. Add remaining ingredients allowing just enough meat broth to cover the rest of the ingredients. Other fruit juices such as those drained from canned pineapple, peaches, apricots or pears give additional delicious flavors to the mincemeat. Bits of tart fruit jelly may also be added. Simmer all ingredients until the apples are tender. This may be stored in the refrigerator for a week.

Students May Be Exempt

Hart schools have elected to return to test exemptions, according to a notice received from the school this week.

In order for a student to be eligible to be exempt, HE MUST ENROLL THE FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL AND HAVE A PERFECT ATTENDANCE.

No exemptions will be given from six-weeks' tests. However, if a student has not been absent during the quarter from a particular subject, he will be exempt from the second six-weeks' test in that subject provided he has an average of 75 or above.

A student with a 90 or above grade in a particular subject, although he has been absent, will be exempt from the second six-weeks' test.

If a student is absent because he is ill, because of a death in the family or to attend a funeral, the absence will be "excused".

If a student is absent for ANY OTHER REASON, it will be "unexcused".

All days missed MUST be made up....excused, unexcused or school trips. Students will be counted absent regardless of the reason for the absenteeism, except school trips.

When a student returns to school after being absent, his

parent or guardian must come with the student or telephone the principal and explain the reason for the absence of the student. No written excuses will be accepted. Failure to comply with this rule will result in an unexcused absence.

Students will be permitted five days per year unexcused absence without the three point penalty. All unexcused absences over the five days per year will cause three points to be taken from the six weeks' grade.
