ALL SHOULD HELP

Good Roads Benefit Everybody and Advance the Value of Property.

There is no one class, profession or occupation more interested in good roads than any other class. Everybody has an equal interest in the matter of road improvement and everybody should have a share in improving the conditions of the roads. Most people realize that good roads are necessary and that road improvement in this county is badly needed and the question is being put squarely to them as to their willingness to help in making the needed improvements.

It is useless to discuss the reasons for the condition of the roads, but it is very pertinent to discuss the necessity for road improvement and ways and means for securing such improvement. The Commercial club has done some work recently and has frequently contributed to the improvement of the roads, but the club is not able to do all of the work needed. That only way the roads will ever be bettered is by co-operation of the people. The two days work or two dollars in money plan would be hard to improve upon and the Eagle is still a strong believer in that plan. If every man in the county would co-operate with the Commercial club and give two days of his time in working the roads or pay \$2 in money to have the work done, our roads would soon be greatly improved.

Good rains have fallen in several of the communities the past week and oat sowing will be in order as soon as the ground dries.

Considering the political conditions and the vital issues of the present campaign, the lack of anything like intense political excitement anywhere in the United States is remarkable. The election is only three weeks ahead of us. We are face to face with the culmination of one of the most important of our presidential campaigns, yet there is comparatively little excitement. Entirely too little interest is manifested even in the close States. Since the local contests have been practically settled at primary elections the voters in many of the States have relaxed their efforts and dropped back into an indifference that the campaigners and the press have not been able to dissipate. The weather has been fine and the country is prosperous; but even that is not a sufficient reason why so many of the people should be indifferent concerning the highly important issues of the campaign.—Dallas News.

REASONS FOR SOWING GRAIN

Those who have given the matter careful thought believe that it will be consistent with good farming to plant grains this fall and next spring. The excellent prices now being available for wheat and oats certainly give encouragement.

The fact that wheat is a great staple for bread both in this country and Europe, and the fact that a large per cent of farmers in Europe are withdrawn from production would indicate that prices are not likely to be low soon. Oats are also an important crop for the army as well as for work stock on farms and there are good reasons for planting at least for the feed supply on the farm.

Under our system of growing such crops as cotton, corn and sorghums it is highly desirable that a crop be planted in the fall to provide a winter cover and utilize the available nitrates that might be leached from the soil in winter. Fall sown grains do this and thus serve a purpose in the rotation.

It should be remembered that the wheat crop and the crop of the Southwest are ready for market before the crop in other grain growing localities, consequently our growers may have such advantages as early marketing bring.

Sowing grain in the fall permits farm work to be distributed and helps crop diversification. In the event that the season is so unfavorable that the fall sown crops are unpromising there will be time for spring sowing of oats or other crops suitable for the rotation.—Farm and Ranch

Only Civil Cases Tried—Court Term Over.

The fall term of district court will end today and Judge Spann will return to his home at Temple to await the opening of district court at Belton. The term has been of very little interest, as no cases of public importance have been tried and there has been very little to interest others than litigants about the court room. A number of non-jury civil cases have been disposed of at this term, however.

The jury summoned for this week was only held one day and was then dismissed for the week, while the special venire was not used at all, the Hill case having been continued until next term.

The proceedings today will be only hearing of motions and closing the records of the term of the court.

FIRE IN BROWNWOOD

A fire of unknown origin broke out Thursday night at 11:15 in the B. E. Bell building next door to Albright's grocery store on East Broadway. In less than five minutes it had gained such headway that the Albright store and the restaurant next door was in flames. The volunteer fire department reached the scene at once and after a few minutes efficient and telling work with several lines of hose had the fire under control. The Seitz building on the corner adjoining the Graham Hotel was damaged considerably but after a line of hose was taken inside the building the flames that had started there were extinguished. The second floor of this building is occupied by a rooming house, and many of the guests made their exit in scanty attire as it seemed as if the building was sure doomed to go up in flames. —Mercury Herald.

ACCIDENTAL SHOOTING

A Young Man Badly Injured While Hunting.

Willie Thompson, eldest son of E. P. Thompson, was accidentally shot by a companion while hunting rabbits Wednesday evening. More than 100 shot struck him in the arm and side, inflicting a very painful and dangerous injury. The accident occurred in the Gartman pasture, in the western suburbs, about 6 o'clock in the evening and but for prompt attention given the young man his injuries might have proved far more serious. He was hurried to a physician and as soon as his wounds were dressed he was placed aboard the 6:46 train and carried to Brownwood for an X-ray examination. The examination revealed that the shot had not penetrated any vital parts and but few were embedded where it would be necessary to extract them. He was able to be brought home Thursday morning and is getting along well, altho necessarily suffers considerably from soreness.

No blame is attached to anyone for the unfortunate accident. The boys were in pursuit of a rabbit, both carrying their guns in readiness to fire. In some way, either accidentally or prematurely, the gun was discharged and almost the entire charge struck young Thompson. The boys were so close together that the "wad" from the discharged gun struck the young man, making a large blister, and he was also powder burned. Fortunately the gun was loaded with small shot, which accounts for the accident not being more serious.

An effort was made by the attorneys for T. R. Watson of Teague, charged with the murder of Bank Commissioner Patterson, to have the case moved from McLennan to some other county, but the trial judge refused to allow the change.

The federal trade commission at Washington has issued a letter to all publishers of daily papers urging the reduction of the large Sunday issues as a means of conserving the paper supply and preventing the suspension of smaller papers.

The committee from the Texas Good roads association met in Austin and drafted a bill to be submitted to the next session of the legislature creating a state highway commission and making such changes in the road laws as will be required to secure national aid in road building in the state.

The attendance at the Dallas fair has been beyond all former records, notwithstanding the labor unions of Dallas "boycotted" the fair because the management refused to discriminate against unorganized labor in the matter of the distribution of such patronage as the fair management had to give to workmen. That the management was right there can be no doubt and that the public approves of the stand is amply attested by the liberal patronage being given the fair.

The court of appeals reversed the decision of the Tarrant county district court in the case of Gilmore against the State Democratic Executive committee and dissolved the injunction preventing the committee placing the name of Chas. Hurdston upon the official ballot for railroad commissioner. Gilmore gave no notice of appeal, but the ballots will doubtless all be printed and delivered to the election officers before his appeal can be heard by the supreme court.

That the country in general is in a more prosperous condition than it has been for many years, if in fact such universal prosperity was ever experienced on this continent, will hardly be denied by anybody who has investigated to any extent. The people get good prices for everything they have to sell and there is a ready market. Money is more plentiful among the people than for many years. The banks all over the country are reporting an overabundance of cash, with few demands for loans. In Goldthwaite this condition is especially noticeable, there being more than half a million dollars on deposit by the people and doubtless the deposits in the other banks of the county are as large in comparison as those in Goldthwaite.

Iceland is far from being a dreary waste, for it exports large quantities of the finest grade of wool in the world, besides quantities of hides, sheepskins, feathers, oil fish and fish products, and, curiously enough, many horses. The island has several natural resources that have never been developed, among them great sulphur deposits, says the Argonaut. One of them contains not less than 25,000 tons of practically pure sulphur. There are extensive deposits of copper ore. This while of a low grade, could be worked at a huge profit since the water power is unlimited and always at hand wherever the copper is found. There are also large deposits of geyserite, which are equal to the best Arkansas homestone. In addition there are several sections rich in agates and chalcedony, which are widely used in making jewels for the bearings of watches and electrical instruments. None of them have ever been worked.—Siftings.

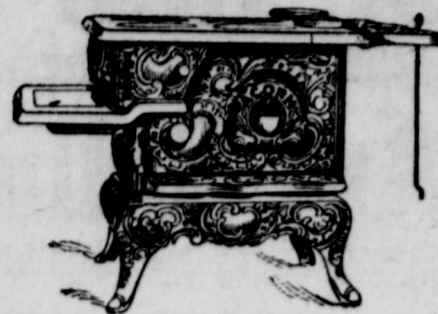

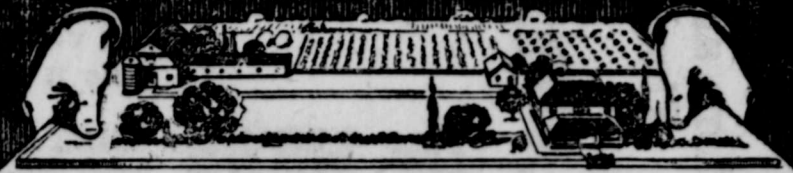
