LOCAL HIGH DEFEATS SCHREINER INST. HIGH.

In a game, witnessed by a large crowd, last Wednesday, local team came out victorious over what is, or rather was considered a most formidable foe, in the foot ball arena of this part of the State. The Schreiner Institute Academy boys had defeated some of the largest high school teams in this district, and came here determined to uphold their record, but before the end of the first quarter it was evident that unless something unexpected happened to the home boys, they were going to win over the Institute boys.

The score was 13 to 1.

This was the eleventh game the local boys have played. They have won two games from London, one each from Rocksprings, Menard, El Dorado, and the Institute; tied one with each Menard and Mason, and lost to Rocksprings, Fredericksburg and San Angelo.

The boys hope to get one or more games between now and Christmas, but the one last Wednesday was the last one on the schedule under the Inter-scholastic League playing.

"HIGHWAY ROBBERY"

If reports are true, all records for "highway robbery" in Texas have been broken. If Attorney General Moody's investigations and allegations set out in the suits he has recently filed against highway contractors; and if all references to State officials having connived with said contractors in the frauds recently perpetrated upon the State Government are true, or partly true, then we have a record of "highway robbery" the lack of which has never even been halfway approached in the annals of our State.

We have a court procedure now under way at Austin which also is unprecedented in Texas. The Attorney General is suing certain highway contractors for damage and forfeiture of right to continue business in Texas and is bringing the local talent of his department, with his own knowledge and eminent qualifications, into play to defend the State Government against fraud when at the same time we have the remarkable situation of seeing the governor of the State, together with the members of the Highway Commission, who are appointees of the present governor, lining up as a solid phalanx against the Attorney General and against the State of Texas, whose interests and good name they are sworn and obligated to defend. —San Marcos Record.

A. J. McKean, a member of the Texas Legislature, was here on business the first of the week. Mr. McKean was at Austin a few days ago, when members of the Legislature met to discuss the proposition of calling a special session of the law-making body, in the event the Governor does not issue the call herself. Mr. McKean stated that there was no question but that a special session would convene within the next few weeks, even if Gov. Ferguson refuses to issue a call. He thinks public sentiment is such that it is imperative that the Legislature meet and take some action on the recent disclosures of the condition of the State Highway affairs, as well as other matters requiring attention.

Both gentlemen were looking forward to a great roads meeting in San Angelo Thursday and Friday of this week.

They are of course hoping that the present organization of the Highway Department in this part of the State will continue unimpaired. This section of the State has nothing more to ask for, either in proper maintenance on the funds allowed, or the amount of funds apportioned, than is now being received.

UNUSUAL DISPLAY OF MEXICAN CURIOS ARRIVE

Shell work baskets, feather pictures of birds of the Mexican country, made of genuine feathers in natural colors, Aztec Lanolas, Indian heads, wall plaques, or banks, gay colored fiber coin purse for little girls, toy baskets of horsehair, hand carved walking canes, in colors, showing the Mexican coat of arms and depicting the National sport, the bull fight, are among the articles received by the Hardware Company.

We would like to know if any pecan growers of this part of the country made larger yields than the Oliver and Nethery orchards produced this year?

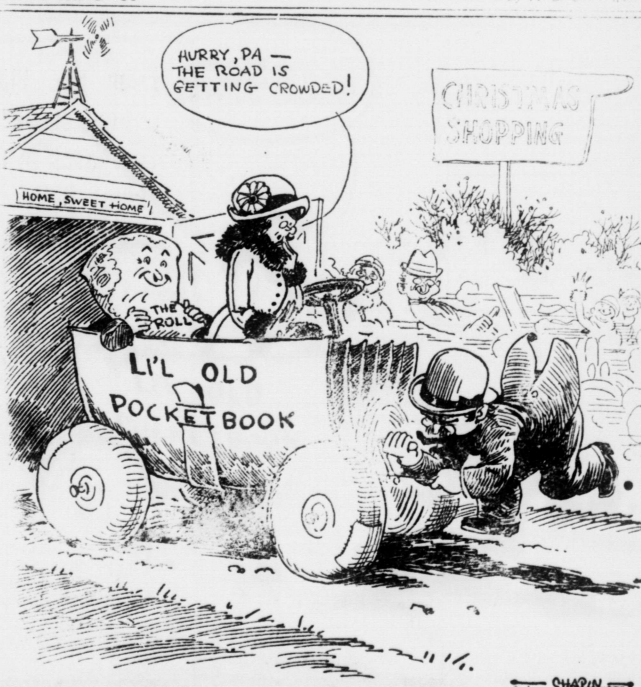
The Oliver place produced a little more than 60,000 pounds, and the Nethery place a little more than 42,000. One tree in the Nethery bottoms produced 600 pounds of a quality that sold on the local market for 35 cents. While this is not a record for the number of pounds produced, it is doubtless a record for the amount of money that any one tree netted its owner.

They are making it very uncomfortable for him who undertakes to carry on business by "ways that are dark and tricks that are vain." The business pirate soon finds himself an undesirable entity in the business community.

Look about you and note the great business institutions that have succeeded and become permanent, and they will be found to be those which deserve to succeed. They rest upon the solid foundation of honesty and fair dealing.

BRAINS, AND NOT MERE JOB HOLDERS, NEEDED.

Advocates of public ownership of private industry often use as an argument the fact that private companies pay enormous salaries which, if the property were publicly owned, could be eliminated. No stronger argument could be advanced against public ownership than the foregoing statement.

The government may conscript labor and material and put it to work in time of war, but it cannot conscript energy, ambition and brains for a business undertaking in peace time. The men who make the best soldiers, the best engineers, the best army officers and the best doctors during a war, give their services without thought to pay, as a duty to their country; but in time of peace the motive which moves them to greater endeavor and greater accomplishments is the reward which follows personal achievement.

A man commanding a salary of \$25,000, \$50,000, \$100,000 or \$150,000 a year, who can give the nation a universal telephone service, an unlimited supply of gasoline, the cheapest automobile in the world, electric motors, incandescent lamps, modern insurance safeguards, a perfect railroad system, electric washing and ironing machines, electric refrigerators, the marvelous radio, or numerous other conveniences which are commonplace to the American home and luxuries in European countries where government ownership and control has been the practice in many lines of industrial development, is cheap at ten times his salary.

The greatest corporations pay the largest salaries, because by so doing they secure the brains which enable them to furnish their products to the masses at the lowest possible price.—The Manufacturer.

UNCLE SAM'S A SPENDER.

The American public wants what it wants when it wants it

and insists on having it regardless of expense. The heavy imports of materials for manufacturers prove this.

With a great variety of climatic conditions and with an enormous area for production, this country has vast quantities of raw materials but nevertheless it draws large supplies from other lands. Rubber advanced in price, yet the United States insisted on increasing its purchases in the fiscal year of 1925 to eight hundred and two million pounds from six hundred and seventeen million pounds in the previous year and the cost mounted from one hundred and fifty-five million dollars to two hundred and thirty-five million dollars. Though raw silk now costs about double what it did in the pre-war period, the buying public must be satisfied, so the manufacturers continue to increase the quantity imported. Perhaps the development of the cigarette habit by women accounts for the fact that we brought into this country in the fiscal year of 1925 over forty-six million pounds of cigarette leaf tobacco as compared with only twenty-one million pounds the preceding year.

In the Encyclopedia Britannica you will read that "beads have long been used for purposes of barter with savage tribes," yet the official statistics prove that the past year Americans have spent more than fifty million dollars for beads sent from Europe and Asia. They have not been used for barter, either.—November Sunset.

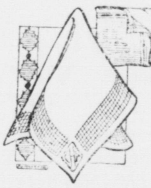

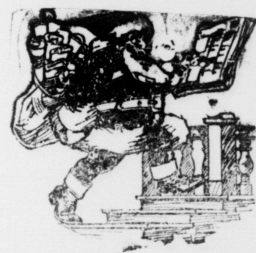

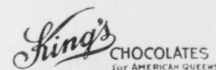

TERRIBLE TRAGEDY AT CASTELL SATURDAY.

(This Article was crowded out Last Week.)
A terrible tragedy, costing the life of Lee Nobles, aged 16, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Julius Nobles of Llano, occurred last Saturday night about 8:30 o'clock, between Mason and Castell, when the unfortunate youth was struck and fatally wounded by an automobile driven by Tommy Erickson, a Brady boy, and son of Mr. and Mrs. F. S. Erickson. That the accident was entirely unavoidable is proven by the testimony of three Mason boys in the car with young Erickson, and also by the circumstances attending the accident.

From all evidence, young Nobles was enroute toward Llano with a truck load of empty oil cans, one of which was lost off the truck. In turning around to recover the barrel, he killed his engine, leaving the truck standing crossways on the road. It is presumed the youth got out of the truck to crank the same at the time he was struck.

Erickson, accompanied by Wallace, Perry and Karl Wartenbach, all three of Mason, was driving along towards Castell, when they suddenly came upon the stalled truck, without lights, and standing across the right-hand side of the road. Erickson swerved to the left to pass the truck, thinking it abandoned, when suddenly the Nobles youth jumped up almost directly in front of the car, and started to run across in front of it to his truck. Erickson swerved aside, but in spite of all he could do, his left bumper struck the lad. In his desperate move, Erickson crashed into the truck, wrecking his own car, and damaging the truck as well.

Erickson, accompanied by Perry, Wartenbach, started on a run of some two or three miles to Castell for aid, while the other boys remained with the injured lad, building a bonfire and doing whatever they could to alleviate his suffering. After considerable difficulty, the first two succeeded in flagging a car driven by a Mr. Clark of London, who returned with them to the scene of the accident and carried the injured boy to Castell, where a doctor from Llano was summoned to attend him. The boy lingered until Sunday morning, conscious at intervals, until he passed away at 1:00 p. m.—Brady Standard.

U. S. WILL GET FACTS IN TEXAS ROAD MIX-UP

Washington, Nov. 23.—Senator Earle B. Mayfield of Texas, probably will lay before the Department of Justice to matter of the Texas road situation which has been before the State courts there, it was learned Monday. The department it is thought, would be interested in knowing whether the alleged mismanagement of the Texas highway fund involved any Federal money.

The arrival of Attorney General Dan Moody here Monday afternoon, following the District Court judgment obtained at Austin Friday, gave rise to the belief that the State's law officer was to consult with Federal officials concerning the situation. On the contrary, Attorney Moody said Monday night he is not in Washington in connection with the road suit at all, but is to appear for the State in the Supreme Court in a suit involving the 100th meridian marking the boundary between Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle. Moody declined to discuss the road suit, saying he had left that in the courthouse.

Officials of the Federal Bureau of Roads, Department of Agriculture, which certifies the payment of the Federal road funds to the States, declared Monday that the bureau was not concerned in the Texas matter up to this time. It is uncertain here whether the transaction on which the State secured its judgment involved Federal money, or only that of

the State. There is no discussion here at this time of withdrawing Federal aid from Texas, although there is a pronounced view in administration circles that mismanagement on the part of the local authorities would tend to hasten action by the Federal Government. Federal aid was withdrawn from Arkansas at one time on account of mismanagement and irregularities, but was restored.

But we fail to see how the home merchant, how any citizen, in fact, can not realize the value of the home paper to the extent that he or she should be more than willing to contribute a fair share to its welfare. Surely you might be able to exist today without automobiles, you might get along without the home newspaper; but you would not dare invite any newcomers into your community. We give a hang whether you agree with these lines or not, but we want it plainly understood that we know we are rendering a service and that we expect monetary returns for this service just as well as each and every other one expects and gets monetary returns for services he renders.

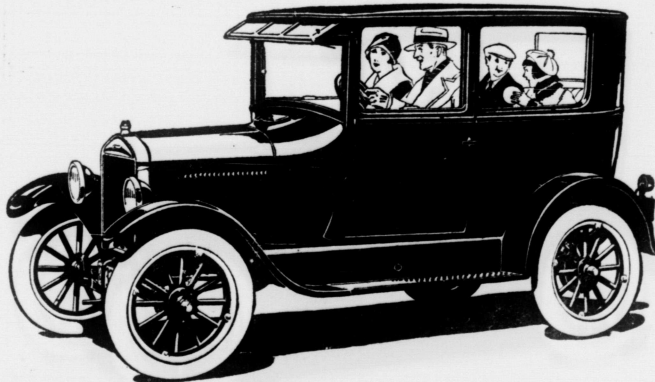

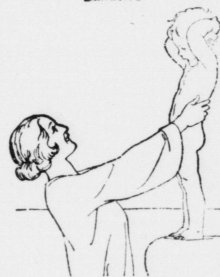
