NORTHWEST DAMAGED BY INSECTS, HEAT

HEAVY LOSSES
ARE REPORTED
IN 18 STATES(Copyright 1936 by United Press)
CHICAGO, June 29 — (U.P.) — \$100,000,000 worth of crops lay ravaged by insects and withered by a scorching sun today in the nation's agricultural northwest.

The United Press survey disclosed plague and drought damage in 18 states which agricultural officials estimated has cost farmers at least \$100,000,000.

Rain fell in scattered sections over the weekend, and more is promised this week, but in most sections it was feared the rains came too late to save dried up crops or kill hordes of insects which have stripped leaves from stalks and left fields of barren stubble.

The double-edged menace spread across the agricultural section in the shape of a triangle bordered by Ohio and Missouri rivers and Canadian borders United Press survey showed today.

It reached Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kentucky, Mississippi and west to the Rockies.

Heavy losses resulted from drought in southeast; however, recent rains have replenished the parched soil there and the prolonged drought greatly reduced the insect pest menace. Central part of Canada's wheat belt likewise suffered from drought which has been alleviated recently.

It remained for the northwest to fight off grasshoppers and crickets, scorpions and literally pray for rain.

The insect menace, mostly grasshoppers, was most serious in Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska, Colorado, Wyoming and Oklahoma. Drought sections in region from Ohio to Rockies.

The fight took place at midnight Saturday after an argument between Ditta and a group of customers including Conrad Prell, brother of the man killed in the fight. Conrad Prell was shot through abdomen and Ditta in the back; both died soon after the shooting.

DECLARE WAR
AGAINST UNION
NEW YORK, June 29. — (U.P.) — Steel companies, employing 500,000 men and capitalized at \$5,000,000,000, declared war today upon a task to unionize their workers.

Through the American Iron and Steel company corporations announced today they were prepared to withstand strikes and riots and to use all resources to "protect" employees from "intimidation, coercion and violence, and to aid them in maintaining collective bargaining free from interference from any source."

The proclamation directly challenged new committees for industrial organizations composed of ten of the largest unions of the American federation of labor, headed by John Lewis of the powerful United Mine Workers of America.

Lewis' organization has raised half a million dollars more to make the first attempt in fifty years to unionize steel.

Fugitive Convicts Being Sought in W. Texas

ABANDON CAR
NEAR S'WATER
AFTER BATTLE

SWEETWATER, Texas, June 29. — (U.P.) — Luke Trammell and Forest Gibson, fugitive convict killers, fled south into the rugged "brakes" of the south plains caprock region today after escaping under a barrage of officers' bullets in the country north of Sweetwater near Marador. The men abandoned an automobile stolen in Sweetwater when they were surprised by the officers. The posse pursuing the men included officers from Abilene, Big Spring, Pecos and state patrolmen. A 1934 model coach was found abandoned last night on a Sweetwater street. Shortly afterwards a car was stolen.

Officers here identified the abandoned machine as the one used by Trammell, who escaped with Gibson from retrieve prison farm on June 19 after they had killed a guard. The two fugitives were last seen near Oletha, Limestone county, last Thursday.

Case Workers Talk
On Relief Problem

The county's increasing responsibility in relief work was discussed Saturday afternoon at Eastland by case workers of the Eastland County Welfare association with members of commissioners' court.

Henry V. Davenport, president of the commissioners' court, presided at the absence of Judge Clyde L. Garrett, stated discussion revolved around individuals who will not be eligible for old-age assistance and emergency relief cases.

It was brought out that Texas Relief commission aid expires July 1. Checks for June have already been received.

The county welfare association was formed recently by cooperation of Ranger, Cisco and Eastland city commissions with the county for distribution of federal surplus commodities and clothing.

Passage of the deficiency relief appropriation by congress recently will be an aid to local agencies in the relief problem. It was indicated by commissioners.

Commodities will be distributed from a truck which will make the towns in the district and distribute to individual relief clients, said Miss Elsie Glenn, case worker for Cisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29 — (U.P.) — Col. James B. Handcock, 102, claiming to be the oldest if not the last of the oldtime profession of itinerant printers, has just reached San Francisco after a jump from his last working place at Salt Lake City.

When he has worked all he wants to at San Francisco, he says he will move on to Seattle or Yountville an dthen to Seattle, where, true to the old-time ethics of the profession he is always assured of temporary work as a "tramp" printer. Colonel Handcock's title is as genuine as the bullet in his leg which he has carried ever since Gettysburg.

The ever-amazing congressman evidently made tracks immediately for his congressional headquarters after vaulting a 7-foot fence at the hospital. He was sleeping there at dawn today when a chore woman interrupted his slumber.

Sitting upright in the chair in which he had been slumped, the congressman pointed a finger at the chore woman and shouted: "Get out!"

She did.

It was possible Maryland authorities would seek to return him to the hospital from which he made his daring escape, but for the time being none seemed interested in dislodging the playboy from his quarters.

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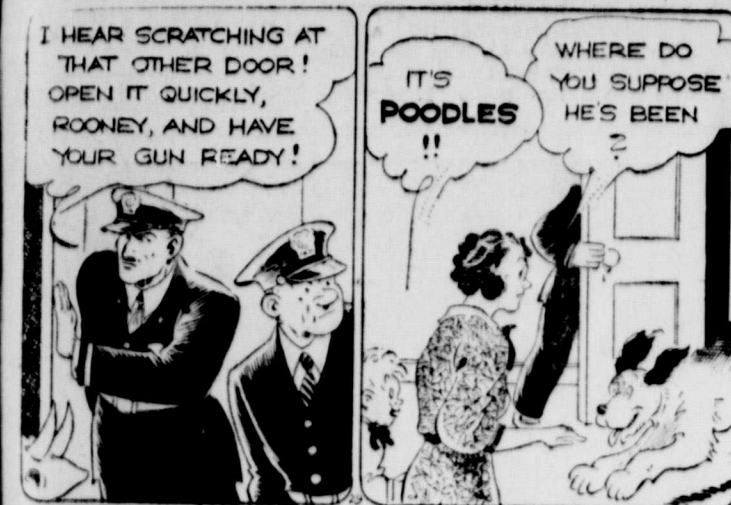

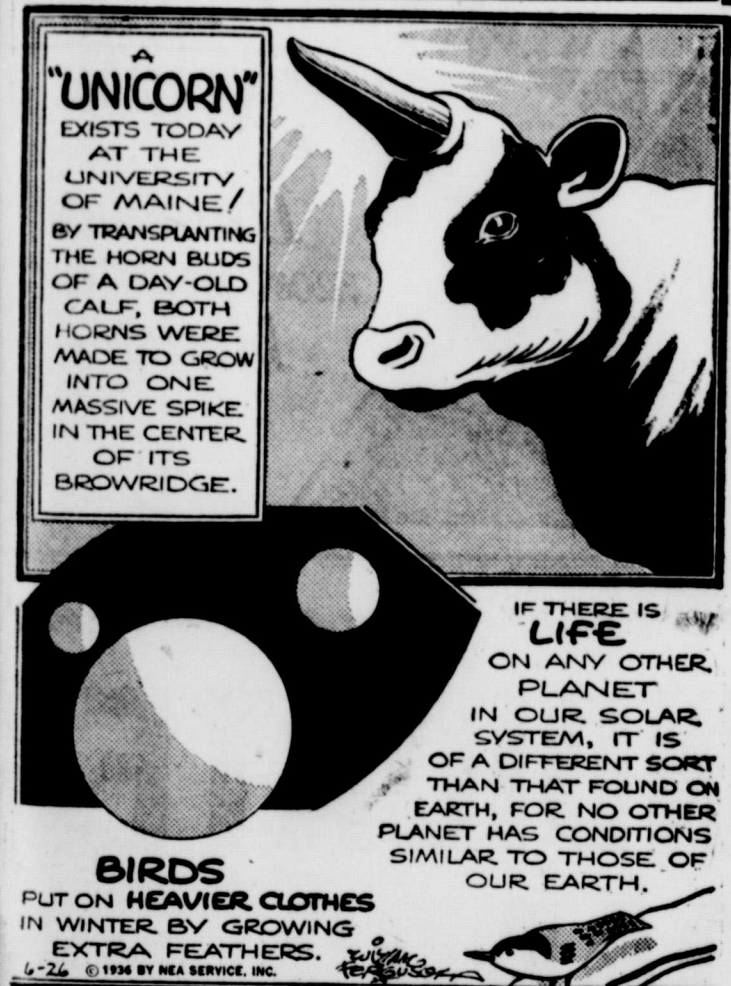

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Give Child Chance To Enjoy Summer

The State Health Department, headed by Dr. John W. Brown, state health officer, which department will participate in the program at Lake Cisco July 4, will speak along the line of Giving the Child a Chance to Enjoy Summer, which is the time of greatest growth because of sunshine and exercise. His department will emphasize the importance of the swimming pool and water events.

"The civic, moral, and educational value of developing the natural talents of each child," Dr. Brown said, "has a far-reaching influence on the health, knowledge, and character of the future men and women of this state. The child need not be directed in each little act that he performs. Let the summer vacation season be the time when the child has a chance to develop his own individuality. Many an artist, statesman, or competent executive has come from humble

surroundings. But looking back of this, we probably will find that this outstanding individual had a chance to develop his natural talent.

"It has been observed that children grow faster during the summer months than at any other time. This is explainable, perhaps, because it is then that they are out in the sunshine and fresh air. Good health is essential to physical and mental growth. The prime factors of good health are care of the body, nourishing food of the right kind, regular habits, sufficient sleep, rest and play, and a happy state of mind.

"Of course, where the child lives and under what condition, means a great deal as to the type of recreation he will find during the summer. The city child will look forward to trips to the country or hours spent in the play ground and swimming pools. The child living in the country will have many things to do that will keep him in the sunshine most of the time.

"Let us all work toward the end that each child may feel at the end of summer that he has worked out

some of his own ideas and dreams, and still developed his physical and mental capacities during these few months of play."

Screw Worm Control Shown Here July 14

Six demonstrations in the control of screw worms in livestock will be held in Eastland county, July 14 to 16th by Otis Lerner, District Supervisor of Screw-worm Control in cooperation with the county agent. Latest and most economical methods of controlling screw worms by treating with benzol and singtar oil will be demonstrated. The work is being sponsored by the U. S. Department of Agriculture under an appropriation made for the purpose.

The meetings will be held in six sections of Eastland county according to the following schedule:

Cisco—10 a. m. Tuesday, July 14th.
