Turner, Byrds receive 18-months

Roberts receives 5-months

Neva C. Turner, Katy Byrd, Roy Byrd and Marilyn Roberts were sentenced by Judge Sidney A. Fitzwater in the Northern District Federal Court Friday afternoon in Dallas.

Neva Turner and Roy and Katy Byrd received 18 months confinement, without parole, with a period of 3 years supervised release on count one. Turner and Katy Byrd received 5 years probation on count two. Marilyn Roberts received 5 months confinement followed by 5 months at a community treatment center with a period of 3 years supervised release. All are jointly and severally ordered to pay restitution in the amount of \$282,986.83.

Turner, former chief executive officer and executive vice president of First Western Savings and Loan here in Colorado City, plead guilty on Sept. 27, 1991 to a two-count

information charging her with conspiracy to commit bank fraud and bank fraud. First Western employees, Roy and Katy Byrd and Marilyn Roberts pleaded guilty to related offenses.

Turner and the others initiated a scheme to use First Western funds to make personal investments in the stock market and concealed the scheme through the use of internal check kiting and false journal entries. The loss to First Western was in excess of \$500,000.

In May 1991, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, pursuant to a warrant sought by the Dallas Bank Fraud Task Force, seized over \$102,000 as proceeds forfeitable to the United States Government as a result of the bank fraud.

As part of a plea bargain, the defendants agreed to forfeit their homes as well as make restitution to the FDIC for losses incurred.

No short list compiled...

A subcommittee on Site Selection of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice met in Austin this past Wednesday and reviewed the proposals sent in to them by firms wishing to construct one of at least four private prisons in Texas.

Susan McHenry of the TDCJ said no "short list" was compiled and the committee will meet again on March 17 to make recommendations to the TDCJ board meeting scheduled for March 19 in Houston.

She said some of the proposals submitted had not supplied all the information asked for or the board was needing more information that what was submitted.

Among those submitting proposals to the TDCJ was Private Prisons of America/Technical Approach to Secure Confinement (TASC) of Midland.

The TDCJ had previously asked TASC to submit additional information other than what was in their original packet and it was forwarded to Huntsville about two weeks ago.

Two new members of the TDCJ board have been appointed and they are John Ward of Gatesville who took the place of Steve Stephens of San Angelo and Judge Gilberto

Hinojosa of Corpus Christi. He is taking the place of Mamie Proctor of Houston whose term had expired also.

Carol Vance was re-appointed to a new term and all three appointee's terms will expire on February 1, 1993.

While they have been appointed to the TDCJ board, they still must be confirmed by the Senate on March 11.

...thank goodness

While no official "short list" came from Wednesday's meeting of the site selection committee of the Texas Department of Justice - had there been one chosen, Colorado City's hopes for TASC's landing one of the bids would have been over.

Snyder and Sweetwater would have been left out also since all three firms bid over the recommended \$35 per day cost per male inmate.

The recommendation came from board member Clarence Stevenson of Victoria who also recommended that costs for female inmates be less than \$38.

TASC's bid was \$35.24 for male

The question of whether the Colorado ISD's boundary has been right for the past 40-plus years has been challenged by the Westbrook ISD and one step in settling the dispute is scheduled to take place on March 15.

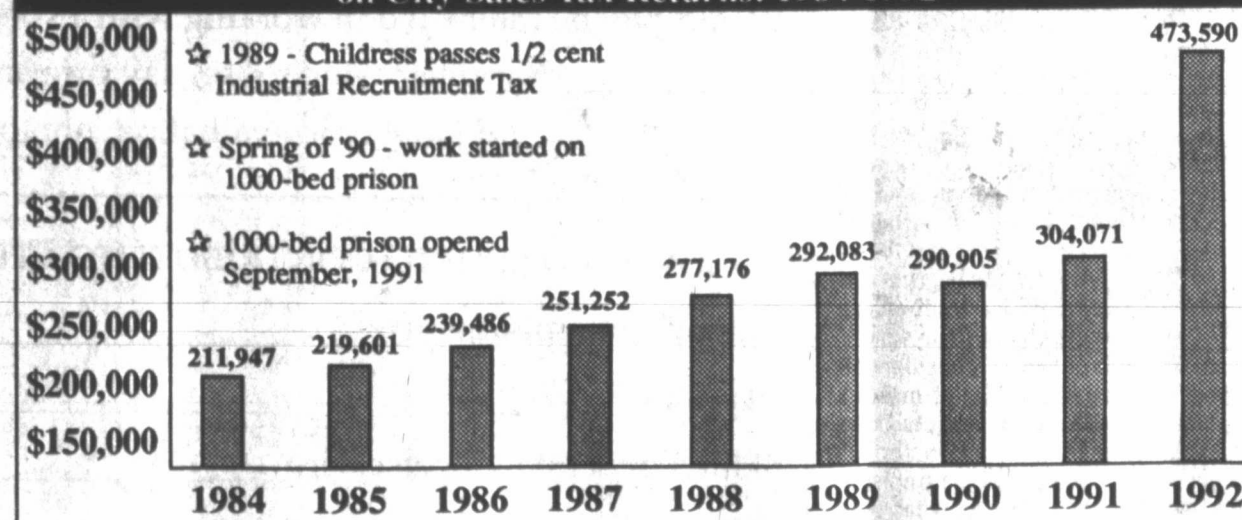
Karen Crumbly, a hearings and appeals officer for the Texas Education Agency said a telephone conference has been set up for that date between representatives of the Westbrook ISD, the Colorado ISD and the Texas Education Agency.

The area in question is located around the Lake Colorado City area and includes TU Electric's Morgan Creek Power Plant - a major source of tax revenue for the Colorado City school system.

Special week to be observed

Governor Ann Richards has declared March 8, 1993 as kick-off day for a nine week promotion effort to focus attention on the value of eating breakfast and the opportunity of purchasing an affordable and nutritious meal at school. Activities will culminate during the week of May 3-7, which Richards has declared as Texas School Breakfast Week, also being the week that the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills tests are administered statewide.

More than 3.4 million Texas school children have access to

nutritious, economically priced meals under the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs. However, every school day fewer than one-fifth of those students eat

breakfast at Texas schools. A recent study of third to sixth graders who ate breakfast at school showed that they had improve test scores.

Incumbents Larry Blassingame and Jesse Munoz have filed for re-election to the Colorado ISD school board. The term of Billy Bridgford is also up for election.

Three incumbents have filed in Westbrook for positions on the

Westbrook ISD. They are Clyde Gregory, Elton Carlisle and Walter E. Smith, Jr.

No one has filed for the school board in Loraine where the terms of Mike Gage, Mary Helen Gomez and Linton Ray Webb expire.

The city of Loraine has three positions up and they include the posts held by mayor Catarino Martinez and council members Bessie Vaughan and Chrystene Hall.

Four places are up in the Mitchell County Hospital District and they include the spots held by Marion Bassham, Jay Craddock, Walter E. Smith, Jr., and Sybil Stevens.

As of Friday, only Craddock had filed for re-election.

School board items may attract a crowd

Two items on the agenda for the regular meeting of the Colorado ISD school board Monday will draw an audience as the board is scheduled to hear from citizens concerning the board's decision last month to designate some classes as

honors classes and hear from at least two teachers on the contract of CHS principal James McSwain.

Five CHS students addressed the trustees last month and requested that a Biology II class be designated

inmates in their original proposal sent to Huntsville in January. The original cut-off was thought to have been \$35.25.

If the recommendation by Stevenson had been acted on - and it was not, due to counsel advice that only the full board could draw up a short list of contractors - then five vendors would have been left in the running.

Those would have included Wackenhut, Corplan, Concept, Inc., U. S. Corrections, Inc. and Group Management of Texas (GMTX).

Some of the towns these companies represent include Sweetwater, Brownfield, Littlefield, Kyle, Bridgeport, Dayton, Karnes City and Diboll.

David Standlee, chief of planning, development and procedures for the TDCJ said while contractors will be picked in the March 19 meeting, sites will be selected later.

In the case of Colorado City, however, the selection of TASC as the contractor automatically would put one of the 500-bed facilities here since they are only bidding on a site located south of here on the Powell Ranch.

Concept, Inc. has proposed to build a facility in as many as six different communities in Texas, however.

Following the meeting Wednesday, TASC forwarded additional information to the TDCJ site selection committee with which includes the following points:

* \$33.80 is TASC's three-year base per diem rate to be charged to the state.

*TASC has provided for a concrete pre-cast plant where all inmates will be awarded the opportunity to volunteer to participate in a comprehensive inmate education, training, experience and paid employment program where they will manufacture concrete and steel, modular, state-of-the-art tuberculosis resistant jail/prison cells.

* TASC has provided for a guaranteed job for all inmates, at an hourly rate of up to \$5.85 per hour with 60% of weekly wages paid to TDCJ-Industrial Division as room and board and 40% of wages to be paid to court ordered restitution, family and dependent support, contribution to the Compensation

to Victims of Crime Fund, savings for release day and inmate commissary.

* TASC has provided \$500,000 in inmate wage reserves to get the project started.

* TASC has provided \$17.4

million for 500 single cells with a Clean Air Design to give TDCJ a 500-bed emergency reserve facility in case TB or any other airborne disease reaches epidemic proportions as it has in some other state's prison systems.

and reduced rates of tardiness and absenteeism.

"All children deserve to have their basic needs met and to reach their full potential," Richards said. "A hungry child cannot concentrate and will not learn effectively. The people of Texas recognize the importance of ensuring that all Texas children are encouraged to begin each day with a nutritious breakfast."

Many parents have the misconception that school breakfast is available only to those students who qualify for a free or reduced-price meal. In reality, breakfast served at school is available to all students and a bargain even for those students who pay the full price.

In Colorado City schools,

breakfast may be purchased for 60 cents. Popular breakfast selections are biscuits and sausage, breakfast pizza, cold cereal or muffins. A variety of fruit or fruit juices and milk are also included in the price.

CISD schools will be having a special emphasis on breakfast

during the week of May 3-7, with stickers, prizes and promotional materials to those students that eat breakfast at school that week. Since we have spring break and will not be in school on March 8, we will be introducing a new menu item on March 19 that the children will be excited about. We encourage all children to eat breakfast at school and get a good start on the day.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

We the undersigned have heard various stories involving the renewal of the contract of High School principal James McSwain. We feel he has made vast improvement on both academic and extra-curricular areas. For instance, TAAS scores, student freedom, scheduling, extra-curricular activities, and student-principal relations.

It is our belief that Colorado High has improved academically and this is proven by the TAAS results which this year Juniors have taken, compared to their results three years ago. In the Writing category of the TAAS test the Juniors raised the percentage of passing students from 50% to 81%. The Reading category raised from 48% to 77%, and the Mathematics from 33% to 66%. These results show that the Junior class alone increased the percentage of passing students a little above 30%.

Another area in which C.H.S. has improved in that now the students have more of a voice than they have ever had. There are not any decisions made about the way classes are structured without input from the student body. When the block scheduling was just an idea, Mr. McSwain asked us (the students) how we felt about the idea. That really made us feel good, because we had a say in what went on.

A third area in which Colorado High School has changed is how the students have much more freedom than they have ever had in the past. Now the rules are not so strict, we are allowed to have snacks in most of our classes. It has been proven that students are able to learn better in a more relaxed environment. All of this is possible because of Mr. McSwain's ability to understand and work with teenagers. He exceeds the classic stereotype "Principal". By doing this it makes school more fun and enjoyable for the students and the faculty.

Next is the subject of extra-curricular activities. Mr. McSwain has never shown favoritism to just one sport or activity. He gives each activity equal attention and support. For example, he attended the majority of all sports, and all other activities that have pertained to C.H.S.

Finally, if a student goes into Mr. McSwain's office to discuss a problem, he listens to their side of the story and then he considers all that has been said before he makes a decision. If our ideas clash he explains to us his reasons for his decision. Even before he punishes a student he listens to what they have to say. It must be considered that not many people are willing to be calm and rational towards someone if they are angry.

As it is evident, James McSwain is a very good asset to Colorado High School. He has done many good things for our school to make it a better, more fun environment for the students.

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an "honors class." The board voted that night to make that class plus Chemistry II, Advanced Social Science Problems and Humanities classes receive a "honors" designation.

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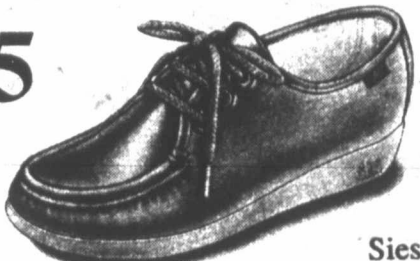
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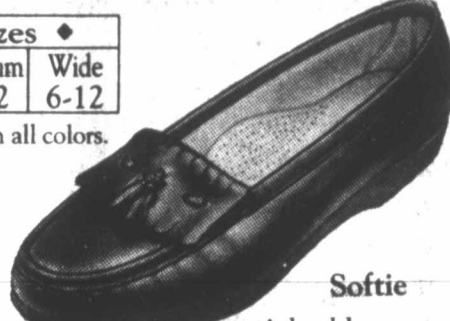

This document was accompanied by some five legal size pages listing the metes and bounds of all the districts involved.

All the information found in the records of the County Superintendent have been forwarded to Austin to the Texas Education Agency.

The actual minutes of the County School Board meeting that indicated the vote on district boundaries were never found despite hours of searching in the basement of the Mitchell County Courthouse by representatives of Westbrook ISD and Colorado ISD.

Up until mid-1949, this area was in the Dorn Consolidated School District #8. On this date it was dissolved along with some twelve other school districts which were dormant at that time in the county. A part of the Dorn district went to the Westbrook Rural High School District and part of it was placed in the Colorado Independent District.

A document signed January 10, 1950 by County School Superintendent Roy Davis Coles shows these thirteen school districts were consolidated into the Colorado Independent School District.

The document stated "(1) that the County Board of School Trustees of Mitchell County, pursuant to the provisions of the Gilmer-Aiken Act consolidated the following adjoining school districts with Colorado Independent School District on the following dates: Dorn CSD #8-July 18, 1949."

Twelve other districts were also listed including Longfellow, Shepherd, Valley View, Looney, Spade, Payne, Lowe, Hyman, McKenzie, Horn's Chapel, Fairview and Cuthbert.

It also stated that (2) that each order consolidating said school districts defined the boundaries of the Colorado Independent School District as same was enlarged by each such consolidation."
