

Anti-Polio Fight Must Begin Now With Precautions

AUSTIN, May 14 (AP)—State Health Officer George W. Cox today charged that unsanitary conditions at San Antonio and Corpus Christi are very likely responsible for the outbreak of a so-called mystery malady reported spreading in the two cities.

He warned that the two cities already affected and all other Texas communities must go to work in earnest to clean up filthy conditions if the disease is to be halted.

Dr. Cox disclaimed that there is any mystery connected with the disease and warned against citizens becoming excited and panicky. "If a mad dog comes into a community, it won't do a bit of good for everybody to climb a telephone pole," he said. "The only solution is to kill the mad dog. This disease is no exception."

The disease spreading in San Antonio and Corpus Christi is one of two maladies, either poliomyelitis or encephalitis, Dr. Cox said. He has just returned from San Antonio where he said he found at least one case to be encephalitis, which is transmitted by flies and mosquitoes and is a direct result of unsanitary conditions.

Fourteen state health department employees are working with city health officials in San Antonio and two are in Corpus Christi. The laboratories at the department today began examining specimens brought here from San Antonio in connection with the case.

"Until recently it was generally believed that polio is transmitted by means of discharges from the respiratory tract," Dr. Cox said. "It is now believed that poliomyelitis is primarily another of the several gastrointestinal infections. Therefore, control measures must emphasize clean-up campaigns and improvements in sanitation."

He said the cases reported in San Antonio are widely separated and there is little if any evidence that there has been any physical contact among the victims. He pointed out that flies and mosquitoes might easily have been the common carriers.

"Strict sanitary measures must be observed in all communities. Stringent efforts should be made to eliminate the house fly and to destroy its breeding places. All mosquitoes and mosquito breeding places must be eliminated at once. Every effort should be made to institute approved garbage collection systems immediately. Suitable garbage containers should be kept covered. Where adequate municipal sewage disposal systems are not in operation, it is vitally important to promote and maintain sanitary, septic tanks and outdoor privies," Dr. Cox urged for all communities.

The clean up is not only a responsibility of the individual community but especially the responsibility of the individual citizen, he said.

"Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, drowsiness, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. When suspicious symptoms appear, a physician should be called immediately," Dr. Cox said.

He explained that in the early stages it is almost impossible to differentiate between polio and encephalitis. Both diseases, however, are now believed to result from similar causes.

Laboratory analysis of the San Antonio specimens will require at least two days for completion, Dr. J. V. Irons, acting director of the laboratory, estimated. He said he felt the tests will classify the disease in one of the two categories.

Dr. Cox listed the following safety suggestions for the home and for individuals:

1. Avoid sudden chilling.
2. Wash hands thoroughly before eating.
3. If possible, avoid tonsil and adenoid operations during epidemics.
4. Observe scrupulous cleanliness of the person; frequent bathing is advocated.
5. Immaculate clean clothes are important.
6. Oral hygiene with thorough brushing of the teeth and the use of a mild antiseptic mouth wash are recommended.
7. The nasal passage should be kept clean.
8. Dental defects should be corrected.
9. All raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly before using.
10. All the foods should be protected from flies, filth and insects.
11. In the home, dishes should be washed in hot soapy water and rinsed in very hot clear water.
12. Sinks, bath tubs and other plumbing fixtures should be secured clean and rinsed with an antiseptic solution.
13. Bedding should be sunned and aired frequently.
14. Ridding the home of flies, rats and roaches.

The following community sanitation measures were emphasized:

1. Eliminate the house fly and destroy its breeding places.
2. All mosquitoes and mosquito breeding places should be eliminated.
3. Approved garbage collection systems should be instituted.
4. All garbage containers should be kept covered.
5. Only safe water supplies should be used.
6. When sewage disposal systems are not available, sanitary septic tanks and outdoor privies should be in use.
7. Swimming pools under rigid supervision must maintain those standards approved by the Texas state department of health. (This necessarily includes maintenance of proper chlorine level.)
8. All eating and food-handling establishments should adhere strictly to the state law concerning the sterilization of dishes and utensils.
9. Milk should be used from approved sources only.
10. Exterminating rats and mice from their harborage.
11. Excreta from poliomyelitis cases should be handled and disinfected with scrupulous care before disposal.
12. Employees of food-handling establishments should be particularly instructed in personal hygiene.
13. When any suspicious symptoms appear, a physician should be consulted at once so that if poliomyelitis is present, the patient can be isolated and placed under immediate treatment.

Meeting in regular session at the court house Monday, the county commissioners' court approved the Howard county financial statement presented by Auditor Chester O'Brien, which showed a general fund balance of \$27,747 as of April 30.

'Not Good Suspect,' Davis Calls Latest

TEXARKANA, May 14 (AP)—A man arrested in Magnolia, Ark., is being questioned here today in connection with the recent slayings of five persons.

He was arrested by City Marshal Steve Dennis yesterday while boarding a bus because of what Dennis called his "suspicious actions."

He denied any connection with the Texarkana murders, saying he had never been in Texarkana and had never heard of the killings.

He was brought here by Arkansas state officer Harley Quinn. He was described as about 50 years old. He carried a money belt with \$300 in it, and a diary which he said he bought at Houston, Tex. He said he was from Michigan, and was visiting the Southwest.

Sheriff W. E. Davis of Miller county, Ark., said the man was "not a good suspect."

Meanwhile, Texarkana was gradually regaining its composure.

Two Welding Units Due To Start Work

Welding units were due today from Taylor Electric company and Couden Petroleum corporation, to make possible work on equipment to go into the West Side recreation area at Fifth and San Antonio streets.

Assessor On Trial For Secreting Funds

BROWNWOOD, May 14 (AP)—Selection of jurors was to continue today in the trial of Grady Volvin, Brown county tax assessor and collector, indicted on a charge of misapplication and retention of \$535 in county funds, here in 35th district court.

Dr. E. J. Arendt, acting city health officer, said the number of city and county polio and sleeping sickness cases here tallied 17. Seven out-of-county cases were reported at the Robert B. Green hospital.

Two adults, one 25 and the other 47, were listed among the polio cases on report here.

Jean W. Delcher, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Delcher, died Monday night at the Robert B. Green hospital. Her death was attributed to poliomyelitis. Others dead of polio were Carroll Harris, who died May 4, and Martin Murphy, who died May 7. Death of Allene Miller, May 8, was attributed to sleeping sickness.

Polio-Like Disease Strikes From Panhandle To The Gulf

Guardsmen Block Roads As Corpus Quarantines City

CORPUS CHRISTI, May 14 (AP)—Three hundred Texas state guardsmen lined up today on a voluntary basis to block roads and keep non-resident children and youths out of the city and Nueces county, while Texas' polio-like sickness leaped nearly 500 miles from South Texas to the Panhandle to strike three more victims, one fatally.

Rockport, 30 miles from Corpus Christi along the Gulf of Mexico, also declared a quarantine, as did Kleberg county, which is a part of the gigantic King ranch. Kleberg and Nueces counties adjoin.

San Antonio, where the illness first reached epidemic proportions, had not ordered a quarantine but public gatherings were banned and amusement places closed.

The many, sprawling military installations in and near San Antonio closed theaters and chapels and halted social gatherings, as did the Corpus Christi naval air station.

San Antonio revised its figures on the number of cases to 12, including three deaths. Amarillo reported one death: Two Berger victims, one in "poor condition," were brought to Dallas. Corpus Christi's victim roster listed five.

Rockport authorities ordered all incoming buses and trains sprayed with DDT and non residents under 21 were not permitted entry. Residents were admitted only if they agreed to quarantine themselves two weeks. Nueces county ordered the same regulations.

Schools were closed early for summer vacation in Kleberg county and Rockport, while Texas A. & I. college in Kingsville, Kleberg county, also dismissed its 800 students for the summer. None of the schools will hold commencement exercises.

Corpus Christi and San Antonio began extensive clean-up programs after Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, said the malady "very likely" could be blamed on insanitary conditions. The Navy helped in the Corpus Christi clean-up.

Four San Antonio Youngsters Dead

SAN ANTONIO, May 14 (AP)—Four 16-year-olds—two boys and two girls—were dead today as San Antonio girded itself to fight further spread here of poliomyelitis and encephalitis (sleeping sickness).

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Lewis Demands Union Administration Of Fund

Iran Prepares For War, Hopes For Settlement

TEHRAN, May 14 (AP)—The Iranian army hastened preparations for war today although the central government appeared determined to pursue its announced policy of a peaceful settlement of the Azerbaijan problem.

Persian sources expressed belief that the military and the local northern tribes were swerving from government control to back the young Shah, their commander in chief.

Premier Ahmed Qavam, in a public statement on the "postponement" of the Azerbaijan negotiations, said he was attempting "with the best intention and peaceful attitude to solve the problem."

Azerbaijan is the northern province bordering Russia in which a semi-autonomous regime was established during the Russian occupation.

Qavam said recent negotiations between the central government and a delegation from Azerbaijan had foundered on three major differences.

These differences, which included an Azerbaijan demand for redistribution of large estates and public lands, were announced in a communique as:

1. The government claimed the right to appoint a provincial governor general of Azerbaijan.
2. The Iranian government likewise claimed the right to appoint army and gendarmerie officers.
3. The Azerbaijan premier proposed the redistribution of estates of land owners and the division of public lands among peasants.

Lewis' outline of the specific form he wants the welfare fund to take marked the first time since the talks began two months ago that he has laid down a concrete formula.

Anderson Proposes Program For Wheat

WASHINGTON, May 14 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Anderson laid down today a program continuing limitations on the domestic use of wheat until the middle of 1947 in order to help hungry areas abroad.

It continues restrictions on the milling of wheat into flour for domestic consumption and prohibitions against using wheat to make beer and whiskey.

The program continues the 80 per cent flour extraction rate and limits domestic distribution of flour and wheat products.

Beginning July 1 the quantity of flour and wheat products which may be distributed by millers and manufacturers will be limited to 85 per cent of the amount they distributed in the corresponding month of 1945. At present distribution is limited to 75 per cent.

Johnson And Leamon Processed For Army

Arthur B. Johnson, Veslmoor route, and Joe Lane Leamon, Big Spring, have been dispatched to El Paso for further processing after enlisting in the U. S. army through the local recruiting office.

Johnson asked for service in the Caribbean Defense Command after volunteering for three years in the AAF. Leamon goes into the Army unassigned for 18 months.

Reds Will Leave Bulgaria, Molotov Says, If Allies Will Leave Italy

PARIS, May 14 (AP)—American sources said today that Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov proposed withdrawal of Russian troops from Bulgaria on the condition that Allied troops leave Italy, but U. S. Secretary of State Byrnes and British Foreign Secretary Bevin disapproved the suggestion.

Both Byrnes and Bevin objected when Molotov proposed the bargain of withdrawing from Bulgarian lines of communication to Austria, the informants said. Bevin declared a comparable arrangement would be for the Russians to leave Romania if the Allies left Italy. He said Britain was ready to withdraw from Italy if the Soviets left Romania.

The British foreign secretary further was reported to have declared that the Russians agreed at the foreign ministers council in London last September to a decision that they would withdraw from Bulgaria while leaving troops in Romania to protect their lines of communication to Austria.

An informant said Byrnes and Bevin then proposed the establishment of a commission of military experts to decide whether the Allied lines of communication through Italy to Austria were physically necessary.

Molotov was said to have agreed to formation of the commission, but nothing was finally decided.

During the interchange Byrnes again tried unsuccessfully to persuade his three colleagues to study the Austrian situation by proposing that the deputy foreign ministers begin preparation of a treaty with that country.

No Welfare, No Contract, No Workers

WASHINGTON, May 14 (AP)—John L. Lewis today demanded exclusive union administration of a \$70,000,000 miners' welfare fund which he proposes to raise through a seven per cent levy on pay-rolls.

The United Mine Workers' president declared the fund, to be paid exclusively by the operators, would have to be granted before the miners would negotiate "any contract, now or later."

Lewis told reporters at a news conference, after leaving contract negotiating sessions, that the seven per cent levy was "ultra-conservative" and its receipts would be used for these six purposes only:

1. Adequate and modern medical service; properly standardized hospitalization; life and health insurance at reasonable rates; rehabilitation and training of disabled men; financial aid in case of distress and hardship; and—if any money is left—for "cultural and educational work" among the mine workers.

Lewis said he had explained the demands so thoroughly that the operators said they desired no further explanation of that issue.

Hospital attendants reported the 26-year-old mother both saddened and relieved at the news. "She dreaded to have it happen," an attendant said, "although she felt that it would probably be the best thing."

The babies were born joined at the base of the spine, rather as if two infants were lying cross-wise of each other in the shape of an "X." They would never have been able to walk.

PANAMA, Panama, May 14 (AP)—Arnulfo Arias, former president of Panama who has been under arrest since last December in connection with an armed uprising in Colon, last night ended a hunger strike he began May 2 to protest an alleged delay in bringing his case to trial.

Arias, who has denied all connection with the uprising, was removed from his jail cell to a hospital on May 7.

Only 33 Dog Tags In City Up-to-Date

With dogs currently causing a perplexing problem for city officials, a check in the tax office this morning showed only 33 up-to-date licenses now in effect in the city.

The department experienced a rush on dog tag sales last fall, workers said, and evidently many of those purchasing licenses then were under the impression that they were valid for one year from date of issuance. However, it was pointed out that all dog licenses expire on Dec. 31 each year and must be renewed on that date in order to be good for a full year.

A current certificate of vaccination for rabies is the only major requirement for obtaining a license. When submitted, the city tax department records the vaccination, along with description of the animal and other pertinent data, and issues the tag.

Three Jails Welcome Kemper In One Week

Don Kemper, who has seen the inside of three county jails within the past week, completed a sort of cycle Monday afternoon.

Last week, Kemper was taken to Sterling City from New Braunfels to face a check forgery charge. Local authorities went down a couple of days ago and gained his custody. Interment probably will be here. Bredemus was born Nov. 1, 1889 at Flint, Mich. He designed the Big Spring Country Club links as well as those at Midland, Odessa and many other Texas points. During the war he was a pro at Brackenridge course in San Antonio and more recently had been mapping courses in Mexico. About the time the great Jim Thorpe faded from the scene, Bredemus was one of the outstanding athletes of the nation.

The material for the dresses is, of course, furnished by the ARC. The local chapter must bear the expense of shipping the finished products to the port of embarkation.

Mrs. Sawtelle had a word of praise for those women who had volunteered their services.

"Once they do accept the work, they respond with the finished product within a few days," she said.

Deadline for meeting the local quota is July 1. The director said she hoped to "go over the top" long before that time, however.

The local chapter is in receipt of a laudatory certificate sent by the Women's Volunteer Service of Civil Defense in recognition of local contributions made to the English people and nation during the war years.

It read in part:

"On behalf of the war-distressed people of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the Women's Volunteer Services tender thanks to you for your generous help given during the long years of battle against Nazi tyranny."

The inscription was signed by Lady Reading, WVS chairman.

Commandos Called Criminals At Trial

NUERNBERG, May 14 (AP)—Adm. Gerhard Wagner contended before the international military tribunal today that it was "perfectly proper" for the Germans to shoot uniformed British commandos without trial because "they were saboteurs and criminals and couldn't be considered soldiers."

Col. H. J. Phillimore, assistant British prosecutor, cited to the former German naval operations chief, now on the stand as a defense witness, three instances in which he said captured commandos were turned over to German security police who shot them without trial, wired the bodies with demolition charges and sank them in Norwegian waters.

"Do you say that wasn't murder?" Phillimore shouted.

"These people were captured as saboteurs," the witness replied. "They were not soldiers but were criminals. Men who have orders to carry out crimes I cannot consider as soldiers. In total it was perfectly proper."

How Long Shall We Pretend?

It begins to appear that the summer scourge of poliomyelitis is getting an early start in Texas. Thus far, we have been spared, and we hope that our good fortune continues.

We cannot afford to stand on that hope, however, and no other Texas community can afford to rely in hope alone.

Dr. George Cox, the state health officer, has used a home-spun illustration which strikes us as one clearly to the point. Dr. Cox in talking about the early outbreak of poliomyelitis:

"If a mad dog comes into a community, it won't do a bit of good for everybody to climb a telephone pole. The only solution is to kill the mad dog."

Because infantile paralysis and its companion, encephalitis, are shrouded in somewhat of an air of mystery, there are certain difficulties in getting at the problem. But to use his illustration again, we suspect that if there were doubt as to the source of rabies in dogs, there would be a general precaution to bring the entire dog population under study and control.

So it is with poliomyelitis. In short, these boil down to sound personal and public health measures. The first rule is to

observe basic rules of personal hygiene. The second is to maintain a clean community.

There is a strong suspicion that flies or mosquitoes may figure in the spread of polio. Whether they do, it is doubtful that anyone can say definitely, but the fact that they are suspected gives sufficient reason for combating them.

Big Spring has and is making good strides toward rodent elimination. Some progress, though far from enough, has been made in garbage disposal. Certain progress is being made in milk and food handling fields.

Our biggest problem, as we see it, is in whipping the fly situation.

Frankly, we see little hope of solving or even approaching control on this matter until the livestock and poultry problem is brought into realistic focus. There has been talk of subjecting livestock and poultry to rigid sanitation requirements, plus a regular inspection to back it up. This idea seems to have contracted a slow death.

A lot of people don't like to talk about this subject. If everybody feels this way, then let's pretend that flies only breed in garbage cans, weeds, rubbish heaps but never, never in manure piles. If that gives us satisfaction, then perhaps we can pretend there is no poliomyelitis.

Turnabout Rare Play

NEW YORK — The seemingly new method of having fun at a Manhattan party is to have some famous person do something a little out of line. I went to a shindig tossed a while back for Jimmy Durante, and at one juncture Concert Pianist Jose Iturbi accompanied Lauritz Melchior as the Met's prize Wagnerian baritone rendered — and I mean rendered — the Schizma's no doubt dignified composition, "Umbrago."

This sort of temporary turnabout was the rule at a party given in Steinway Hall in honor of the return to civility of a couple of young concert pianists, Arthur Whittmore and Jack Lowe, who had been taking their classical and modern two-piano stuff to the boys overseas during the war.

Thirty guests were invited, every last one a pianist, either classical or swing. You might imagine the cacophony, resulting when two such established longhaired boys as Gyorgy Sandor and Emil Baume took a lesson from Phil Moore, leader of the Phil Moore Four, in jazz piano technique. Or the somewhat strange musical result when Whittmore and Lowe were joined on one bench by the superb jazz pianist, Mary Lou Williams.

The fun continued with Yvette, usually known as a singer, sitting at the piano with Monica Lewis, a dainty danseuse, as Concert Pianist Solveig Lund and Hilde Sommer were hoisted to the piano-top by a dozen pianos, grand and upright, were provided for the occasion, and the 1,056 keys were given a talented banding about by such other guests as Morton Gould, Eugene Istomin, Bernardo Segall, Liberace, Miklos Schwalb, Rose Murphy, Jacques Abrams and a host of others whose names I didn't get.

At one point jazz and classical

piano pounders turned in a remarkable, if not exactly dainty, bit of collaboration—a wild and furious jam session, with compositions of Chopin, Ellington, Mozart and Basie being executed, and the latter description may be closer to the truth than I originally intended. Walter Hendi, young assistant conductor of the New York Philharmonic Symphony, and Robert Zeller, another longhair bantoner, undertook jointly to conduct this musical mayhem, a thankless job by any musical standards.

The party broke up after a lengthy time with the only casualties reported one ruby earring gone, several eardrums shattered and two tired right paws on the part of Whittmore and Lowe, from shaking hands.

Pianists, you see, have notoriously strong grips. And they used them — all 30 — on Buck and Jack.

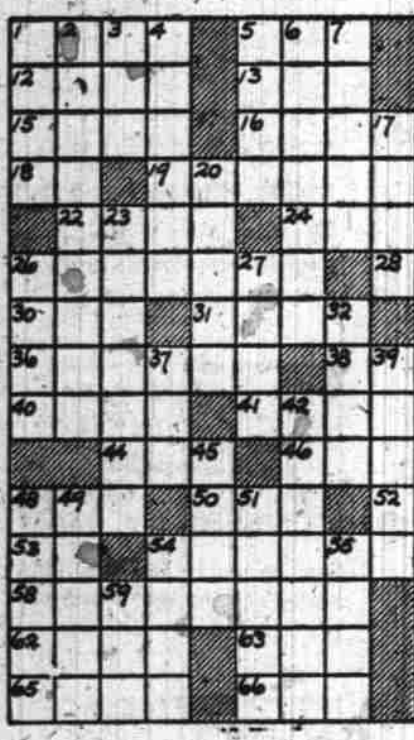
Albino Crab Caught

Lewis Mrs. McLean's Dinner Guest

WASHINGTON. — John L. Lewis was being entertained at dinner not long ago by Mrs. Evelyn Walsh McLean of Hope diamond fame, who had seated the big miner between Mrs. Leon Henderson, wife of the former OPA administrator, and Mrs. A. M. Mitchell Palmer, widow of Woodrow Wilson's attorney general.

Neither lady was especially enthusiastic about Lewis, but found him about as difficult to ignore as the rest of the nation does today. For a time, however, they managed to carry on a conversation between themselves, with John L. sitting mutely between.

Finally, a male guest across the table called across to Lewis: "How are you getting on, John?" "Oh, I'm all right so far," was the reply.

Then Mrs. Henderson, feeling that she could not altogether ignore Lewis and wanting to make conversation, said to him:

"You know Mrs. Palmer's husband was?"

"Am I apt to forget a man who threatened me with jail if I didn't call off a strike in 24 hours?" boomed Lewis.

There was an embarrassed silence. To break it, the vivacious widow of Woodrow Wilson's attorney general, remarked:

"What would Emily Post have me say to that?"

"Who in hell," responded Lewis, "is Emily Post?"

NOTE—In referring to A. Mitchell Palmer's threat to send him to jail, Lewis doubtless had in mind the coal strike he led shortly after World War I which resulted in riots and killings in bloody Minnogo county, W. Va.

A Cabot Talks to Dictator

Among Boston blue-bloods there is an old saying that the "Lodges speak only to Cabots and the Cabots speak only to God." However, John Cabot, descendant of the John Cabot who discovered Canada in 1497, and who is now US Charge d'Affaires in Argentina, confederated to speak with Dictator Juan Peron of Argentina last week.

The meeting was a most secret one, and not a word leaked out to the papers. The Argentine President took the initiative in asking for the conference. In order that no one would know about it, the two men met not at the presidential palace, but in the apartment of a mutual friend.

Among other things, Peron told Cabot that he had no anti-democratic philosophy, was a firm advocate of democracy, and would not use his electoral victory for any aggression at the expense of Latin American neighbors. Cabot immediately asked why then Peron was putting the diplomatic heat on neighboring Uruguay, whose democratic leaders are now quaking in their boots at the thought of Argentine aggression. Peron replied that his government had the friendliest intentions toward Uruguay, and that this was merely a side issue.

The main issue, Peron said, was that the United States and Argentina must stand firmly together in face of the impending war when both would be allied with the British. This seemed to amaze the US envoy, who asked what war Peron referred to.

"Why, the war by the US and

Great Britain against Russia," Peron replied.

Peron explained that all his diplomatic information indicated such a war was imminent, and that it would be wise for all anti-Bolshevik countries to unite and strengthen their friendship.

Mr. Cabot, however, denied the possibility of any such war. He told Peron that the only basis of friendship between the United States and Argentina rested in Argentina's supporting the Chapultepec agreement and the other inter-American agreements guaranteeing the autonomy and sovereignty of the democracies of the Western Hemisphere.

The meeting ended inconclusively.

NOTE—A Russian trade mission has been in Buenos Aires for some time playing cozy with Colonel Peron.

Lewis Reverses Congress

John L. Lewis' dictatorial conduct in prolonging the coal strike might have been a headache to the general population, but it had a two-way reaction with two groups in Washington. For many Congressmen it has proved a blessing in disguise; while to other labor leaders, Lewis may undermine most of their 12-year gains under Roosevelt.

A few weeks ago, the drastic Case anti-strike bill was the No. 1 worry of Capitol Hill Republicans. They had witnessed the near-defeat of Representative Bob Chipchfield in the Illinois primary on this issue and they had grave misgivings.

This reaction was partly behind the Senate's change of heart on the drastic House bill emasculating the OPA. Senate Republicans figured the party already had collected enough stigma because of the Case anti-strike bill without adding another liability—opposition to OPA—to their campaign banners.

However, Lewis' strike tactics look the boys off the spot, simultaneously making the heads of other labor unions curse Lewis. Senate GOP-ers now feel they can pass up the Case bill with no fear of a vote boomerang next November. At the same time, their brethren in the House who supported the anti-strike legislation can point to Lewis in the coming election and tell the voters:

"See—I told you so."

Clothing Boycott

The big clothing makers received a blunt warning the other day that veterans would wear their GI uniforms this summer as a protest against inability to purchase civilian clothes.

The warning was given at an off-the-record meeting of OPA and Civilian Production Administration officials with representatives of the clothing industry. OPA has been urging that CPA force the manufacturers to make more men's fabrics instead of women's despite the fact that there is a greater profit on women's. Finally, former Army Maj. F. K. Guibin of the Labor Department's re-

employment administration warned clothing industry spokesmen that veterans were planning to wear uniforms this summer.

"They can't do that!" Harry H. Cobrin, secretary of the Clothing Manufacturers' Association, expostulated.

"Maybe they can't," replied Guibin. "But if you want to prevent it, I suggest that you gentlemen get on the ball and see to it that more men's suits and shirts are made available to discharged vets. They are in desperate straits for clothes."

NOTE—There is no regulation preventing ex-servicemen from wearing their uniforms if chevrons, overstrips, officers' bars, etc., are taken off.

Marine Corps Saved

The controversial question of the Army-Navy merger crops up at all sorts of strange places, even including a White House session, when President Truman met with War, Navy and post office officials to receive the first sheet of the new "Honorable Discharge" service stamp.

Gen. A. A. Vandegrift, commandant of the Marine Corps, was present, and Truman went to great pains to assure him that the merger would not mean abolition of the Marine Corps.

"If I have anything to say about it, the Marine Corps will never be abolished," General assured the President.

Vandegrift replied that he was certainly glad to hear this. Whereupon, Postmaster General Bob Hannegan, noting the absence of Navy Secretary Jim Forrestal, a vigorous merger foe, shyly commented:

"It's too bad Jim Forrestal can't be here. His presence would make this group unanimous for the merger."

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"Nelson, Jones, Hagen Or Hogan? All Good," Says Atlanta Scribe

DALLAS, May 14 (AP)—O. B. Keeler, dean of American golf writers, is cagey about comparisons. He won't say whether Bobby Jones or Byron Nelson or Walter Hagen or Ben Hogan is the greatest—then he turns right around and by figures shows you he really lays the palm at the feet of the mighty Bobby.

The 64-year-old Keeler, who complains of being old but doesn't act it or talk it, puts it like this: "You can't compare Jones with Nelson in golf any more than you can say Jack Dempsey was a better fighter than Joe Louis. And when you're talking about the greatest golfer that ever lived you shouldn't overlook Walter Hagen."

And he also says Ben Hogan must receive consideration for the title of "Mr. Golf."

Open in 1926. He had 33 putts and 33 other shots—six threes and twelve fours—on a tremendously tough 7,000-yard lay-out. He added a 68 later for 134—which is still the record in England for the Open.

Then Keeler lauded Nelson's 259 for 72 holes last year as an example of what one of history's greatest linksmen can do on a course designed for lower scores and with improved clubs.

"But don't forget Walter Hagen," he cautioned. "He won 11 major championships: The British Open four times, the United States PGA five times in six years and the US Open twice. In my opinion, Hagen was the toughest match player of them all."

At the same time Keeler reiterated that Nelson and Hogan needn't take a back seat to anyone. "They are the greatest of this era, just as Jones and Hagen were the best in their day," Keeler declared.

Major Leagues Expect To Zoom Past Three Million Gate Today

The great golf writer from Atlanta was in Dallas for the Women's Southern, watching particularly the play of Dorothy Kirby, a fellow citizen, and Louise Suggs, the Lithia Springs, Ga., star.

He sat down and observed: "The only fair comparison of Jones and Nelson is in their showing in the US Open, for Jones never played the pro 'circuit'."

Then he pointed out: Jones won the Open four times, was runner-up four times, went through 44 rounds with an average of 74 strokes, never finished lower than eleventh and his crowning glory was the grand slam of gold—all four major US and British golf tournaments in one year.

Nelson, he cited, played 24 rounds in the National Open, averaged 74 the same as Jones, and had a best round of 68—the same as Jones—and his highest rank was 32nd.

Big league attendance will zoom over the 3,000,000 mark on the way to an all-time high today as the sizzling Boston Red Sox open their first western tour and the puzzling St. Louis Cardinals come east to wrestle with the first-place Brooklyn Dodgers.

The Yanks, with \$78,940 as a starter, are regarded as a cinch to smash the major league standard the Chicago Cubs hung up in 1929 when they played before 1,488,766 at Wrigley Field.

Detroit is beginning to catch fire as the Tigers flash the form that led them to a pennant and world series triumph last fall. Although the Bengals have been away from home most of the season, their Briggs stadium turnstile counts are marching along with 1945 figures.

Steve O'Neill's champs, who rolled to their eighth straight, yesterday, greet Washington, Philadelphia, Boston and New York.

In order on their first protracted home stand. Although all eastern teams of the American league will be west of the Alleghenies and all western teams of the National will be on the Atlantic seaboard, the spotlight will be centered on the Red Sox and Cardinals.

As Boston rocketed through the east to win 22 of its 26 starts, the experts delayed final judgment on the team pending its first western tour. The Sox open in Chicago today and won't be back in Fenway park until May 25. So far they haven't lost a game to a western team.

Detroit, only a game back of the second-place Yankees, expects to close in on the Red Sox during its long home stay.

Although Hal Newhouser was knocked from the box for the first time this season, the Tigers picked up six easy runs in a wild second inning yesterday to gain a 6-5 edge over Chicago.

While the Yanks were flying to St. Louis on the first of a series of plane hops, the Browns were splitting a doubleheader at Cleveland. Red Embree turned back St. Louis with five blows in the opener, knocking in three runs of the Tribe's 9-2 margin. Al Miller, making his first start, shut out Cleveland, 3-0, with six hits in the second tilt, although the losers pulled a triple play in the second inning.

All the eastern teams in the American and the four western clubs in the National were idle, jumping across country for the second inter-sectional series.

Brooklyn warmed up for the Cardinals by handing another one on the Phillies' hip, 4-3, coming from behind to do it.

Boston spurred with four in the ninth to shade the New York Giants, 7-6.

Britain Tightening Up On Driver's Licenses

LONDON, (UP) — More than 1,000,000 British automobile drivers probably will lose their licenses in stringent new tests the government is instituting now that heavy peacetime traffic has returned.

During the war, when road traffic was light, 3,000,000 "provisional" licenses were granted and these are the drivers who will be tested, probably in the autumn when motoring will be reaching peacetime levels. The decision to tighten up on careless and unskilled driving in preparation for fulltime peacetime motoring prompts the tests.

Although many provisional licensees have some experience, the stringent test probably will hold the level of licensing to that of March, 1939, when 37.5 per cent of those tested failed to qualify. Those who fail will be given an opportunity to take the test again, but they probably will have to wait. There is already a backlog of applications for provisional licenses accumulated during the six war years.

Staple items are attractively arranged within easy reach on shelves, fresh fruits and vegetables are displayed on water cooled counters and the meat is laid out in glassed-in refrigerator cases — where the housewife can see what she is buying.

Philadelphia Police Probe Second Slaying On Street In 3 Days

PHILADELPHIA, May 14 (AP)—Detectives of the city homicide squad today probed the second mysterious slaying on Philadelphia streets in three days—with virtually no clues, no witnesses and no descriptions of the killers.

Martin Proctor, 20-year-old former Merchant Marine, was stabbed to death yesterday as he walked to work.

While blood gushed, from a deep wound over his heart, Proctor staggered to the street and hailed a car.

"I've just been stabbed," he gasped as Sgt. Philip Lavanda, attached to the Philadelphia Army Recruiting Office, stopped his machine. Lavanda drove Proctor to the Philadelphia General hospital where he died 10 minutes after arriving—before police could question him.

Francis K. Erhard, Jr., 24-year-old ex-GI, was beaten to death with an iron pipe and robbed early Saturday a few steps from his home. The only clue—Erhard's wallet—was found empty in the washroom of a restaurant Sunday.

Eisenhower Says Army Efficiency Improves

KYOTO, Japan, May 14 (AP)—Winding up a busy three-day inspection tour of Eighth Army occupation forces in Japan, General Eisenhower told a press conference today "there is no question but that the Army is on the upgrade in efficiency."

The chief of staff said he had found the Eighth Army under Lt. Gen. Robert L. Eichelberger "so far above what I could possibly expect I feel real warm inside."

He said he had found very little griping, and what there was was only natural among drafted men who feel they are entitled to go home as soon as possible.

Eisenhower toured the dark areas of the ports of Kobe and Osaka today, driving down streets lined with Japanese.

He made unscheduled stops to ask soldiers about their affairs.

Railway Head Dies

ST. LOUIS, May 14 (AP)—Lewis W. Baldwin, 71, for 23 years head of the Missouri Pacific lines, died at his home here today after an illness of several weeks.

Marine Sentenced For Bilking Japanese

TOKYO, May 14 (AP)—Marine Pfc. Earl L. Brown, who bilked a Japanese bank manager of 500,000 yen, today was sentenced to 15 years imprisonment.

The Navy announced that a courtmartial on May 3 had convicted Brown, of Clarksburg, W. Va., of the bank hoax and of discipline infractions. He was ordered to serve the sentence in the Naval disciplinary barracks at San Pedro, Calif. His rank was reduced to private and he was ordered dishonorably discharged after completing the sentence.

Masquerading as an Army bank examiner, Brown talked the manager of a small bank near Yokohama out of the half million yen (\$33,333). He was arrested a few days later at a resort hotel where he had been staying with a Japanese girl.

Irishman Nearly Dead From Hunger Strike

BELFAST, May 14 (AP)—David Fleming, a former leader of the outlawed Irish Republican army, was reported near death today in Belfast prison, where he embarked on a hunger strike 52 days ago.

Fleming's lawyer, Desmond Harman, said the prison chaplain administered extreme unction to Fleming early this morning.

Fleming began his strike March 20, but after 25 days broke his fast for four days. He resumed the strike April 18 and since then has eaten only a few vitamin C pills and occasionally has rinsed his mouth out with orange juice.

Harman said Fleming's purpose was to try to obtain improved conditions for 76 fellow IRA members imprisoned in Belfast, 43 in Eire and 47 in England.

Trial Postponed

ROME, May 14 (AP)—The trial of Marshal Rodolfo Graziani, fascist minister of war accused of collaboration, has been postponed from May 24 to a later session of the assize court. Defense counsel said delay in bringing Graziani from Procida, where he is imprisoned, had hampered preparation of his defense.
