The Leham Brothers were formerly engaged in the general mercantile business at LaKemp, Oklahoma. MAN ARRESTED HERE GETS TENTH REPRIEVE

According to recent reports from Oklahoma City, William Tait, one of the men who was arrested here in Perryton about two years ago by Sheriff Talley, has been granted a reprieve until March 26th, by Governor Walton, following filing of an appeal in the criminal court of appeals in the case of Cleo Goblen. The two men were convicted in connection with the killing of Russell Sprague, a taxi driver in Lawton. Goblen was once given a new trial which occasioned the first reprieve for Tait as he was used as a witness in the Goblen case. Now an appeal has been filed for another new trial for Goblen, which is yet with the criminal court of appeals, and on the assumption that Tait may again be used as a witness, further reprieve is necessary. January 26 had been set as the date for the execution. He has been reprieved ten times.

PERMANENT SCHOOL BUILDING NEEDED

This is an extract from the official report of one of the State School Supervisors who visited Spearman schools this year. It is recommended: "That the people of Spearman be urged to furnish a school plant for their children which will be comfortable, attractive, and in keeping with the buildings furnished by other neighborhood towns.

The plant here consists of four or five temporary wooden buildings which are not only uncomfortable and unattractive but advertise the town to strangers in a most complimentary way.

The stranger who has seen the Pollett, the Perryton, the Farnsworth, and the Booker school buildings can hardly reconcile himself to the nondescript collection of shacks at Spearman.—Spearman Reporter.

CITY COUNCIL REDUCES LIGHT AND WATER RATES

The following is taken from the "Texline Enterprise," Texline, Texas, published December 29, 1922.

The Light and Water Plant at Texline was constructed by the Gantt-Baker Company, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma who are in charge of the installation of our new water and light plant.

At the regular meeting of the City Council last Friday W. L. Brown presiding in the absence of Mayor Tate, all other members being present, in the matter of electric service it was moved by Warrenburg, seconded by Collins, that the following rates for lighting and general service be inaugurated and that the reduction in charge be made effective on and after the present month's billing.

Amending that part of the electric rate ordinance and causing the same to read as follows:

"After minimum usage of 10 K. W. the rate in effect shall be 10 cents per K. W. for all additional current up to including 100 K. W. used in any one month, former rates for all amounts in excess of 100 K. W. remaining as now in effect.

"Establishing an electric heating rate for a minimum additional charge of \$2.00 for 40 K. W. or less per month with a flat rate of 5 cents per K. W. for all current usage of this service over stated amount.

"That the new heating service be effected and meter set for such use upon application from any regular consumer, without extra deposit or charge, when by the possession of electric heating device or equipment announcement is made of consumer's desire to make use of this service." The Council has shown by this action their desire to make of the Water and Light Department a continued live branch of the city's utilities. The rates proclaimed mean a saving for all users during the remaining winter months and the expression of an additional revision downward of rates both as to water and lights, as soon as safety of operation permits, met with general approval.

The above desired condition can become a fact if all citizens become patrons. Have you city water and city lights in your home and place of business? If not, for your own convenience and for the good of your neighbors let this department serve you.

The service is good. It is the intention of the city administration to maintain and improve this condition.

BLOCKING OIL ACREAGE NEAR CANADIAN

Drilling activities promise to open in Hemphill County this year in a way that indicates that the oil world is looking considerably to the field in this section, which is really the Canadian River field.

P. R. Engler of the Herman-Engler Oil Company of Tulsa, Oklahoma has been in Canadian this week to block leases, and has been looking over several propositions. It is rumored that he is closing a lease on 30,000 acres of land near Canadian, and will start drilling as soon as he secures a favorable report from a geologist representing his company. He will have the geologist on the field at once, as soon as the lease is closed. He will drill a well to a depth of 4,100 feet, if gas or oil is not found in paying quantities at a lesser depth, and the well is to be completed inside of twelve months. His company uses a standard rig.

The Herman-Engler Company has several producing wells at Tulsa and has the funds to finance some wild-cattling in the oil game, so they selected the Canadian field. They ask no money consideration nor help—merely the lease on a block of land.

It is reported that T. S. Jones has closed a lease with the Marland Oil and Refining Company of Ponca City for a test on his ranch along the Canadian River.—Canadian Record.

SHEARER SHIPES CAR OF POULTRY

The Shearer Produce Co. of this city shipped out another car of live poultry on Thursday of this week to San Francisco. In addition to this shipment the hog men have loaded six cars of hogs during the past week and four cars of small grain has gone out from the elevators.

A BIG BOXING CARD FOR SATURDAY NIGHT

One of the best boxing cards that has been given in Perryton for many a day will be offered the fans on next Saturday February 3rd, when "Kid" Penny of this city meets Otto Vohuska of Iowa in the main event of a twenty round program. Vohuska is the boy who gave Penny the battle of his life when they went ten rounds to a draw at Follett several weeks ago. While the Iowa boy is not as heavy as Penny he is there with the stuff. He made a believer of all those who witnessed his previous bout with Penny. Vohuska guarantees to stay at least five rounds with Penny and if he does not he will not receive any pay for his services. We believe that this will be a good fight and if it is not then Perryton will be a blighter as far as fights are concerned for the fans are tee totally fed up on coughing up with this hard earned coin of the realm to go and see these one and two round fiascos. WATER AND LIGHT SYS- TEM NEARING COMPLETION

The big 75,000 gallon elevated water reservoir now being erected on the city's property on West First Street, is nearing completion. The oval cap or top will be placed on the reservoir this week, and the large underground reservoir is being gradually daily filled by Marshall Ainsworth, preparatory to having sufficient water in storage to fill all the big mains now being laid over the city and testing them out before covering the ditches in which they are laid.

The concrete foundations made for the purpose of receiving the large machinery, engines, etc., to be used in the light plant, is now sufficiently cured, stated the City's engineer this week, to begin placing this machinery and getting ready to "tune up" our electric light system. The council has under consideration a plan or proposition made by a large reliable electric concern whereby Panhandle people will be able to secure their house wiring at a very nominal cost, and possibly on an installment plan. The concern dealing with the council will establish a supply house in Panhandle for this purpose.—Panhandle Herald.

During the past week many of our representative farmers have signed at the Farmers & Stockmens State Bank pledging themselves to put out so many acres of cotton. It is estimated that approximately 2000 acres has to be signed before it would be profitable to build a gin. During the past few days we have talked to a number of our farmers who have lived in the cotton country and they are all strong in the opinion that cotton can be raised here and that good money can be made. Some of them think that it will be the making of the country. We have had entirely too much of this one crop business. What we need is more diversified farming. The man that raises several crops is the man that is ahead today. Some wheat, more kaffir, maize and kindred crops are what we need and if we add cotton to this list it will be that much better. There is no crop raised that will advance the price of our land as fast as cotton. Let's get behind this movement and put it over. If there is good money in it, why let's make it here. STANDARD RULES FOR FEEDING DAIRY CATTLE

By C. M. Evans, Livestock and
Dairy specialist, Extension Service
A. and M. College.

The dairy cow is a high geared
machine, and will not run in low
gear profitably. As a general propo-
sition, every dairy animal should
have all of the feed of some kind,
that it will consume each day. How
much of the animal's time you can
afford to have it spend in gathering
this food from scant pastures, de-
pends partly on the value of the pro-
ducts produced, and partly on the
cost of feeds from the barn.

Dairy cows should receive rough-
age in proportion to their live weight.
An ideal roughage ration should con-
sist of one pound of hay and three
pounds of good silage per day, for
each 100 lbs live weight. Mixed hay
s but at least a part of it should be
some kind of Legum, either alfalfa,
cowpeas, peanuts or clover. Good
green pastures can take the place of
part of the silage. Where neither is
available, increase the hay to two or
three pounds per day per 100 lbs
live weight.

Cows should have grain feed or
concentrates in production to the
amount of milk and butter produced.
They should have grain feed to the
extent of one pound of grain to each
two to three pounds of milk produc-
ed per day, depending on the stage
of lactation and richness of milk, giv-
ing each milking cow a minimum of
8 lbs. per day regardless of produc-
tion. Feed dry cows 4 lbs day in ad-
dition to roughage. As a general rule
100 lbs of feed fed to a cow before
she freshens will produce as much
milk as 150 lbs fed after she fresh-
ens when in thin condition. Not
every cow in good flesh at freshening
time, will greatly increase her daily
flow, but she will generally produce
a longer period of time. Cows that
will not respond profitably to this
feeding formula, should go to the
butcher as beef. Rock or block salt
should be kept in the feed manger,
or else fine salt mixed with the
feed, in which case there should be
one pound of salt for each 100 lbs.
of feed.

As a general rule the wider the
variety of feed in the grain mixture
the better the result in the long run.
In Texas most of the protein for the
ration, should be secured from cot-
tonseed meal. Since cottonseed meal
is nearly one half protein, however,
only one lb of cottonseed meal to (4
to 6 lbs.) of other common concen-
trates, is necessary to furnish suf-
ficient protein to balance the ration.
Beyond the amount necessary to bal-
ance the ration, a pound of cotton-
seed meal is worth no more than a
pound of any other concentrate.
Cottonseed meal is usually more ex-
pensive so that any amount fed be-
yond this proportion, causes a loss
of the difference in the price of a
pound of cottonseed meal and some-
thing else cheaper. A most satisfac-
tory dairy ration, at the present time
from the standpoint of economy, is
corn, fed meal (one part by weight)
rice bran, two parts, wheat bran
two parts, cottonseed meal, one part.
In case the animals receive no le-
gume hay in the roughage, 50 lbs.
of ground alfalfa should be added to
this ration to keep up the bone and
the mineral salts in the blood. A bet-
ter ration, thought in most local-
ities, more expensive, is two parts

of corn, two parts ground oats, two
parts of wheat bran, and one part
cottonseed meal. If cheaper ground
barley may be used to substitute
part, or all of either the corn, oats
or bran.

Keep in mind that a dairy cow's
ration, should be ample balanced,
succulent, bulky and as cheap a mix-
ture as can be furnished and still
maintain the balance of necessary
nutrients.

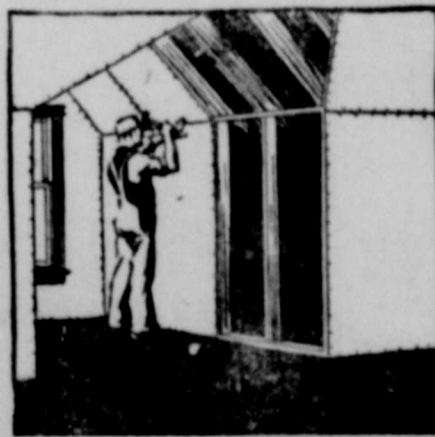

COMMISSIONER TERRELL TAKES OATH OF OFFICE

Geo. B. Terrell took the Oath of Office for his second term as Commissioner of Agriculture today—the oath being administered by Associate Justice Thomas B. Greenwood of the Supreme Court. The commissioner briefly reviewed his administration and made some pointed suggestions for the future. His statement follows:

"In assuming the duties of this office for a second term I am profoundly grateful to the people of Texas for the confidence imposed in me as shown by electing me to a second term without opposition. I hope to show my appreciation by rendering honest, faithful, and economical public service.

"During my first term the office has been administered in accordance with the provisions of the law, and I believe efficiently and economically, and fairly satisfactory to the people. The office has been conducted for \$61,370.95 less during the last fiscal year than was expended the previous year and \$73,473.81 less than was expended the year before I became Commissioner. The most of this saving was made upon my recommendations to the Board of Control and the Legislature, and some through economy of administration.

"The administration of government. Agriculture is the biggest business in Texas, and the administration of agricultural affairs should be simplified by unifying the agricultural work—confining all purely educational agricultural work to the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, and all administrative agricultural work carrying police powers, to the State Department of Agriculture, and not divide this work among a number of boards and commissions, as is now being done, causing unnecessary duplication, rivalries and jealousies and unnecessary expense to the tax payers. Many other states have done this and have reduced expenses and increased efficiency, and Texas should profit by their example.

"We are beginning a new year and a new administration and should profit by the mistakes of the past. Tax burdens should be lightened upon the average tax payer, and wealth and privilege should be made to pay adequately for the protection enjoyed.

"Agriculture, the basis of our wealth and education, the pride and hope of the State, must be adequately supported. The State and Nation cannot survive unless education is generally diffused and agriculture is made profitable. The business interests should realize these conditions, and give moral and financial support to sustain agriculture on a paying basis.

"Cotton is the basis of the wealth of Texas and of the South and should have brought not less than 30 cents per pound during the past season, with a cotton famine swaring the world in the face, and all the wealth of the South should be freely used to make cotton bring the cost of production and a reasonable profit in the future.

"A campaign to make Texas feed herself, save the soil, kill the weevil, and make farming pay should be the slogan of every loyal Texan."

FROM HOG TO HAM

How many farmers are eating bacon the product of their own feed lots and smoke houses? Some are and many more could.

Lowe and the Cannedy boys were bound over to await the action of the federal grand jury. They were returned to Spearman on orders of the district attorney for a preliminary hearing on a state charge. This hearing was conducted by Judge Townsend, sitting as magistrate in county court. Lowe had given bond on the whiskey charge but was arrested on a complaint sworn to by Ike Record, foreman for Lee Bivens, on a cattle stealing charge. We understand he has given bond on this charge.

The entire community is in sympathy with Sheriff Richardson in this annoying incident, and everyone is growing stronger in the belief that Hansford county needs a jail.—Spearman Reporter.

It is the general hypocrisy of the situation that makes the enforcement of prohibition doubly difficult and not the fault of the law. Around all legislative bodies more than fifty-per cent of the members will drink bootleg liquor, buying it generally from nigger porters and bell hops, and sometimes when getting the stuff will make the nigger drink first, and if it has no ill effects on him, they'll then be willing to drink what he brings them. The prohibition law is one act passed by a majority of the people; violated now by seventy-five percent of them, yet it is a law that will not be repealed or modified. Prohibition has come to stay in so far as legislative enactment is concerned, besides bootlegging has become so profitable and reduced to such a system that perhaps many of that fraternity would be against any change in the present law.—Guymon Tribune.

HELPING TO GET SERVICE

After you remove the telephone receiver from the hook and ask Central for a number you will notice that she repeats the number in a questioning voice.

Her repetition of the number in such a tone calls for an acknowledgment from you that she has correctly heard the number.

It is to avoid the possibility of calling the wrong number that Central repeats the number give into her as she hears it.

The subscriber is expected to confirm the operator when she repeats the number if she has the correct number. If not, the caller is expected to repeat the number desired. In this way the percentage of wrong number calls will be reduced to a minimum.

So when Central correctly repeats the number you ask for just say "yes" or "please" or make some similar acknowledgment of its correctness. By adherence to this rule, the service will be made surer and swifter.
