STANTON RIFLE & PISTOL CLUB GRANTED CHARTER

C., Dec. 13.—The Stanton (Texas) Rifle & Pistol club has been granted a charter by the National Rifle Association, the national governing body of the sport target shooting, according to an announcement made today at the headquarters of the Association here. The club has a charter membership of sixty-nine.

The officers are: Dr. J. Leslie Hall, president; J. N. Woody, executive officer; and Robert Anglin, secretary.

This club is one of 3,300 active rifle and pistol shooting clubs affiliated with the National Rifle Association.

O. B. HOLT, PROMINENT MIDLAND RANCHER DIES IN ODESSA

O. B. Holt, 37, member of a prominent West Texas ranching family, was found dead at 4:30 a. m. Friday of last week, in an Odessa hotel. Physicians said he died of a heart ailment.

The body was found in bed by a negro porter.

Prominent in oil circles and in ranching, Holt had properties in north and west Midland County and in Ector and Martin counties.

Survivors are his widow; two children Dorothy Faye Holt and Bobby Holt; and two sisters, Mrs. George Glass and Mrs. Frank Cowden, all of Midland.

Holt's father was the late O. B. Holt, Sr., once president of the First National Bank at Midland and pioneer rancher.

CATTLE THIEVING IN GLASSCOCK COUNTY

Is it possible we will have to go back to the vigilante days when many a cow thief was found dangling from a tree?

"Oh, Bill, I Sha'n't Forget Yer"

The above is the heading to an article in last week's West Texas Today, by Gilbert Smith, writing on the Cowboys' Christmas Ball, and printing the verses of this famous poem by Larry Chittenden with comments. "Oh, Bill, I sha'n't Forget Yer" alludes to Stanton's own Uncle Bill Wilkinson, who, Mr. Chittenden speaks of in his poem as "Windy Bill, the caller for the Cowboys' Christmas Ball, back in 1885."

To keep the memory of that eventful occasion alive, enterprising citizens of Anson, Jones county have built an \$8,000 building in which to hold this annual Christmas ball.

In his Western Enterprise, Anson, last week, Editor L. P. Hensley, carried the picture of Uncle Bill Wilkinson, and had this to say:

"Perhaps the most famous character in The Cowboys' Christmas Ball, whose picture is given prominent position in Chittenden's Ranch Verses, and a caricature of whom appears in illustrations used in The Western in its June 19, 1890 issue when the poem was first printed is W. M. Wilkinson of Stanton, who is nearly 85 years of age and who was a special guest of the CCB in 1938."

The verse in Chittenden's poem referring to Uncle Bill Wilkinson, follows:

"The leader was a feller that came from Swenson's ranch
They called him "Windy Bill," from little Deadman's Branch.
His rig was "kinder keerless," big spurs and high-heeled boots;
He had the reputation that comes when "fellers shoots."
His voice was like a bugle upon the mountain's height;
His feet were animated, an' a mighty movin' sight.
When he commenced to holler, "Neow fellers, stake yer pen!
Lock all horns tel all them heifers, an' rattle 'em like men.
Saloot yer lovely critters; neow swing an' let 'em go,
Climb the grapevine 'round 'em-all hands do-ce-do!
You mavericks, jine the round-up—just skip her waterfall,
Hah! hit was gettiny happy, "The Cowboys' Ball!"

In closing his article appearing in West Texas Today, Mr. Smith inserted this verse:

"Oh, Bill, I sha'n't forget yer,
And I'll oftentimes recall,
That lively gaited sworray—
"The Cowboys' Christmas Ball!"

HOME OWNERS FORUM

By ABNER GORDON

PAINT may seldom be used as a decorative coating for leather, but faded or misfit pieces may be restyled with straight color finishes or paste white lead tinted with the appropriate colors-in-oil. A rigid application procedure must be followed to assure freedom from flexing cracks.

After cleaning the leather thoroughly, seal the surfaces with a very thin coating of shellac, so thin that practically no gloss is evident upon drying.

For dark colored finishes, brush over the shellac pure paste color-in-oil or a color-in-oil mixture reduced considerably with turpentine to which has been added a small amount of the best hard drying varnish to act as a firm binder.

To produce the lighter colors, substitute tinted soft paste white lead for the straight color pigments.

When the thin paint film has set up, finish off by applying a coating of good long oil varnish, preferably tinted lightly to the base coat color.

Be certain to brush all coats on well to produce a smooth, even surface.

Q—Suggest method for removing from portland-cement stucco the green stains resulting from the wash of copper leaders and gutters.

A—To the stained area apply a mixture composed of 1 part sal ammoniac to 4 parts of whitening, moistened well with household ammonia. Several applications may be required for the removal of old, deep-rooted stains.

Q—What treatment do you suggest for cleaning brick?

A—A strong solution of washing soda and scouring powder is easily prepared and most effective when scrubbed well into the brick. Finish off with a clear water rinse.

On the horizon of the flat West Texas range in the northern part of Martin County and 12 miles northwest of Stanton, looms the beautiful ranch home of E. B. Dickenson, pioneer Martin County rancher. The home, modernly equipped with electric lights, telephone, and all the conveniences of a modern city home, located amidst a cluster of large shade trees, is on the eastern edge of the Dickenson 21,700 acre ranch, the winning, pure blood white face cattle, to which Mr. Dickenson raises and breeds. Mr. Dickenson moved to Martin County from a ranch near Lubbock 38 years ago. He came to Lubbock County in 1890 when, he said, "Wild horses, (or Texas Mustangs) were as thick as blackbirds on the open range, and the bleached bones of buffalo and antelope dotted the prairies. I didn't get there in time to see any live buffalo or antelope."

When asked how long he had lived in Martin County, Mr. Dickenson said, "Well, counting the drouth years and everything I think it was a hundred years yesterday."

Helps Boys With Their Calves
Mr. Dickenson has made it his life's work raising and breeding pure-bred registered Hereford cattle. He has 800 head of pure registered white face mother cows, and around 30 head of herd bulls.

Each year he gives away approximately seventeen calves from his pure-bred, registered herd to boys who are interested in ranching. When asked why he gave the calves away, Mr. Dickenson said, "If I sell one of the calves, the boy who buys it will give around \$35 for it. I could keep the calf, raise it as a bull with no trouble at all, and sell it for \$125 to \$150. If I sell it for \$35, I feel that I have lost it, and the boy who buys the calf feels that he has paid for it. So I had rather feel that I have done some good by giving it to the boy, who will probably take bet-

ter care of it than he would if he had bought it."

The Grand Champion calf at the March, 1940, Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth, owned and fed by Kenneth Lewis, 17 year old Sweetwater boy, was bred and presented to Lewis by Dickenson. The calf weighed 930 pounds and brought \$2.00 per pound. According to Dickenson, the calf brought, counting all prizes won, around \$2250. Lewis is now enrolled at Texas Tech and plans to finish his education on the money earned from the calf.

Another of Mr. Dickenson's calves, presented to Russell Saddle, won the second title in the senior division at the same time. Russell and Billy Saddle, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Saddle, who live on the Dickenson ranch, feed baby beef steers for stock shows. They won first place at Odessa and Lubbock in 1938, with calves Mr. Dickenson gave them, and won second place in the Amarillo stock show in 1939. They now have fine calves, which they hope will be winners in next year's shows. Eleven of their calves were given them by Mr. Dickenson. They are now from six to nine months old and weigh from 600 to 925 pounds. In the Saddle barn, each calf has an individual feeder, with the calf's name, and feeding statistics on a card above each feeder. The calves are kept up and fed three times a day.

Sam, the Old Saddle Horse
Walking through the large

barnyards, which cover around ten acres, I came upon a very touching scene. In a specially built stable, near the barn and sheltered from the cold winter winds, stood an old horse. "That's Sam," said Mr. Dickenson, "my old favorite saddle-horse. He was born here on my ranch twenty-eight years ago, and he has stuck right with me through thick and thin. Old Sam was always up and ready to go. I haven't had a saddle on him in five years now, for he has served his time on the range. But he served me well, and now I'll keep him like a king until he dies."

Sam shows his age. He holds his head not so high as he once did. His life, which has been filled to the brim with exciting moments on the range, which has felt the terror of many stampedes, is slowly drawing to a close. But he is contented, and the last years of his life will be spent in peace and quiet.

Commodious Barn
The large barn on the Dickenson place is 200 feet long and 70 feet wide. It is equipped with platform scales, electric lights, and bath room. One room has been furnished in the barn for the convenience of truck drivers who, when hauling feed to the ranch, or cattle to and from the place, have a place to stay during the night. It has everything the truckers need to make themselves comfortable, including showers, sofa, chairs, electric lights and bed.

Many tons of feed are stored

in the barn for winter feeding. The attic is used for storing lumber and anything else there is no room for in the main part of the barn. At one end are the scales, with gates specially made for weighing his cattle.

Heavy plank lots 6 feet high with nail-heads driven out of sight through the planks into posts, are attached to the barn.

A large self-feeder is located at the very back of the barn. It holds 40 tons of feed and serves to feed the cattle. The feeder make the cattle little trouble to feed, and Mr. Dickenson says it only has to be filled up about once a month.

50,000 U. S. Cows Now Enrolled In Artificial Breeding Groups

Test Tube Breeding Adopted by 5,000 Farmers Within the Last 2½ Years

ARTIFICIAL breeding of dairy cattle may ultimately become as common in the United States as artificial incubation of chickens.

Not so many years ago chickens were hatched after a hen sat patiently for three weeks on as many eggs as her feathered body could cover. Science, through incubators, virtually put the setting hen out of business and revolutionized chicken-raising by putting it on a mass production basis.

Unregulated mass production is not the purpose of artificial dairy cattle breeding. Increase in the number of offspring an outstanding proven bull can sire, thus materially improving the general quality of the nation's dairy herds, is the chief goal. Supplemental advantages include eliminating most of the bother and work in breeding without increasing cost, curtailing spread of disease and assistance in maintaining, through periodic examination of cows by trained veterinarians, herds that breed regularly.

Introduced 2½ Years Ago
Introduced in the U. S. only about 2½ years ago after widespread use in Russia, Denmark and other European countries, artificial breeding has grown by leaps and bounds. Today around 5,000 farmers own and direct more than 50 artificial breeding cooperatives in which about

50,000 cows are enrolled, according to a survey just completed by National Dairy Products Corporation, which provides research fellowships for further study of the subject at State Agricultural Colleges in New Jersey and Vermont.

Cites Benefits
Thos. H. McInerney, president of the corporation, regards encouragement of artificial breeding programs as most conducive to the "general benefit and profit of dairying in any region."

"The cost of securing the service of a proven bull—which is one capable of transmitting high milk productivity—heretofore has been beyond the means of many farmers," Mr. McInerney states, "and yet the widespread use of proven sires is essential for improved efficiency and increased profit in dairy herds. Artificial breeding makes these proven sires available at no higher costs than those incurred in keeping a mediocre bull. In place of a poor bull a producer can add a cow to his herd, a cow that will return enough over feed cost to offset the expense of his membership in an artificial breeding association."
