Clinic Gets Underway Consultants Talk Development

All day Economic Development Clinic gets underway this morning at 8 o'clock with a town tour for the 12 out-of-town speakers and their Colorado City hosts.

Clinic is being hosted by the Chamber of Commerce, the Colorado City Industrial Team, Inc., and the Chamber's Industrial Committee.

Invited to attend all or part of the day's program are all citizens interested in the town's economic and industrial future.

After the tour, the clinic participants will assemble in the conference room at the Chamber at 8:45 a. m.

Agenda for the day starts at 9 a. m. with Don Benson, Chamber president, making the welcome address.

At 9:05 a. m. James E. Heath, senior industrial consultant to Texas Industrial Commission, will introduce the clinic.

James H. Harwell, executive director for TIC, will speak from 9:10 to 9:30 a. m. on the subject "Introduction to Industrial Development."

From 9:30 until 9:50 a. m. Jerry Heare, industrial development consultant, TIC, will talk on "Improving Colorado City's Community Image."

Phil Davis of the Texas Tourist Development Agency will discuss "An Effective

Tourism Program" from 9:50 until 10:10 a. m. which is coffee break time.

After coffee time, John Franklin is scheduled for a 20-minute lecture of the subject "Evaluating Colorado City's Economic Potential and Manpower."

At 10:50 a. m. Dr. G. K. Eifer, research scientist at University of Texas in Austin will discuss "Current Natural Resources of the Area."

Heath will climax the morning clinic sessions with "Industrial Sites and Buildings."

Adjournment for lunch is set for 11:45 a. m. with the clinic to reassemble at 1:45 p. m. to hear William L. Davis, TIC assistant executive director, explore "Financing Programs for Industrial Expansion."

Three guests who are managers of area development for companies will each address clinic participants.

They are Oscar Castillon of Texas Electric Service Company, John Perryman of Lone Star Gas Company, and Lou Vinet, Texas and Pacific Railroad.

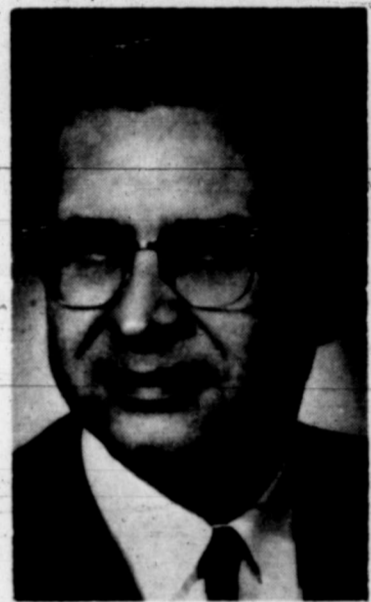
Manager of area development division for TESCO, Castillon holds his bachelor of science degree from Texas Christian University and is a graduate of the Industrial Development

City Approves Budget Hoback Mayor Pro Tem

R. J. Hoback was elected mayor pro tem when City Council met here Monday night, with Mayor John H. Chinn presiding.

Hoback succeeds C. G. Harkins, veteran member of the Council who did not seek re-election to a new term.

Succeeding Harkins as Council member is J. C. Britton who won 104 of the 105 votes cast in the early April city election.

Britton, along with J. C. Brown, Paul Hunter, and C. C. (Mike) Burt, the three incumbents re-elected to office, were sworn in by James E. Jeffrey, city attorney.

City officials had advertised the April meeting as an open hearing meeting for consideration of the new fiscal budget for the city. No citizens with questions to ask appeared at the hearing.

Budget was approved for the May 1 - April 30 fiscal year with the total \$476,573.80 a figure of \$34,232 above the total for last year.

City Council also voted to purchase a crawler loader from Treanor Equipment Co. of Abilene, for \$16,230.

New equipment will be used to meet requirements for State and Federal laws designed to control air pollution.

Effective July 1, all cities with a population of 5,000 or more must bury garbage underground to a minimum final covering of 24 inches.

After July 1, cities not complying with the new regulation will be subject to a penalty of \$1,000 per day, said J. A. Sadler, Jr., city manager.

Burning of trash and garbage in cities of 5,000 people or more is strictly forbidden after the July 1 deadline.

Colorado City will, therefore, bury city refuse on the "wells field," the 160-acre tract owned by the city on the Corley Roger Road, said Sadler.

Tommy Christon, dirt contractor, appeared at the Council meeting with a proposal which offered to do the garbage-covering for the city under a three-year contract.

Christon's proposition offered to furnish the covering equipment, upkeep, and driver. He offered two alternate figures - \$28,600 per year if the equipment should be operated 5 1/2 work days of 8

hours each week, or \$18,720 should the operation be done six days of four work hours each.

Sadler recommended that the city buy its own equipment and provide drivers from its city driver's roster.

Roughly, Sadler estimated that the city would save about \$103,000 over a five-year period by purchasing and operating its own crawler-type loader for the required project.

City fathers voted to keep the city tax rate at \$1.60 per \$100 evaluation based on 45 per cent of market value.

Tax discount of 3 per cent if paid in October, 2 per cent in November, and 1 per cent in December will be a new feature.

An increase in the amount of board paid by the city to Mitchell County for city prisoners in the county jail was approved. Formerly 90¢ per day for the two meals served in jail, the board bill will now cost the city \$1.25 per day for each city prisoner.

'69 First Grade To Visit School

Pre-enrollment sessions for Colorado Independent School District's next crop of first graders have been set for Tuesday and Wednesday, April 22 and April 23, at Primary School building.

Bob O'Day, principal, has announced that all parents or guardians of children to start to school for the first time this coming September are asked to attend with their children.

Time is 2:45 either Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons in the auditorium, depending on the child's sex name.

Tuesday afternoon, all children whose last names start with any letter between A and through M are to go with their parents to the pre-enrollment meeting for new first graders and parents.

Children must be six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1969. Parents are asked to bring birth certificates for each child to the pre-enrollment meetings.

Wednesday afternoon at 2:45, children whose last names begin with any letter between N and

Z will be expected at the school building.

At the meeting in the auditorium the principal, Mr. O'Day, will introduce all first grade teachers to the pre-schoolers and their parents.

The principal will give a summary of the first grade program and explain the special two-month pre-school classes to be held this summer for non-English-speaking children about to start to school.

The principal will then take the children present on a complete tour of Primary School building while parents remain in the auditorium to complete registration forms.

Parents are reminded that birth certificates and smallpox vaccination certificates must be shown before a child can attend classes.

All school patrons who know families with six-year-old children are requested to inform them of the pre-registration plans for next week.

County Talks Plan To 'Fix Up' Truck

County Commissioners in session here Tuesday afternoon decided informally to pay for equipping the city's auxiliary tanker-truck for immediate use in fighting grass fires in rural areas.

Plans are, said County Judge Elmer Martin, to "fix up" the 1965 Chevrolet tanker-truck. Already in service as an auxiliary water supply, the truck has

a 1300 gallon capacity. A high pressure pump is first requirement.

Judge Martin added that the decision by Mitchell County Commissioners was made on the basis of getting the quickest protection against grass fires in the county and as the most economical measure "for now."

A pumper-truck for Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department to use in fighting rural fires became a critical need Monday April 7 when the pumper-truck in use crashed into a dirt embankment at Little Sulphur Creek and was a total loss.

Under contracts between city and county, drawn up in 1962 for a five-year period and renewed Nov. 12, 1966, Colorado City Fire Department answers calls to rural fires for the county. The current contract does not expire until Dec. 1971.

Contract specifies that Mitchell County shall pay the city \$60 for each rural call answered with a guaranteed minimum of \$1,500 per year, and \$60 for each fire thereafter. During the past year the county has paid the city in the neighborhood of \$3,000 for the fire fighting service, according to the city manager here.

County also paid an additional \$1,000 a year for a five-year period on the purchase of the recently wrecked pumper-truck.

Shortly after the loss of the rural fire-fighter, J. A. Sadler, Jr., city manager appeared informally before the County Commissioners Court.

Sadler suggested four alternatives for bringing the rural fire equipment back up to full strength.

The county, he pointed out, could buy a new truck chassis and equip it here with power takeoff and new pump at a cost of approximately \$7,000.

The county could advertise for bids for a brand new pumper-truck from fire equipment dealers at an estimated cost of \$10,000.

Third alternative suggested by the city manager was the buying of power takeoff and pump to the auxiliary water tanker-truck at a cost of about \$1,500. Final suggestion was to add a high pressure pump to the auxiliary tanker, replacing the volume pump, at a cost of about \$500.

At a meeting of Colorado City Council Monday evening Councilman Paul B. Hunter's motion that the county be of-

SCRATCH a constant reader and chances are you'll find a frustrated writer.

Few people in this world are there who wouldn't tell you, given the chance, what a wonderful story could be written of their own life experiences. . . if they only had the time, the educational background, or didn't have to work so hard making a living in other, less interesting ways.

Every once in a while, too, people who write for pay have offers of golden opportunities which begin with "My li- would make a good book. If you'll just write it. I could tell it to you."

WHAT the frustrated writers don't seem to know is that any writer who writes for pay would naturally prefer writing her own fascinating personal history. . . if there were time. . . et cetera, et cetera, and et cetera.

'Cause deep in the average human heart is that feeling, "The story of my life would make a good book."

THING IS, if everybody who secretly thinks that, or openly says that, did have the time to sit and write that good book, there would be nobody left to publish 'em, sell 'em, or even read 'em.

Everybody would be too submerged with putting on paper what happened the night the opera house burned down or the bridge washed away or the groom took pneumonia from being thrown in the stock tank.

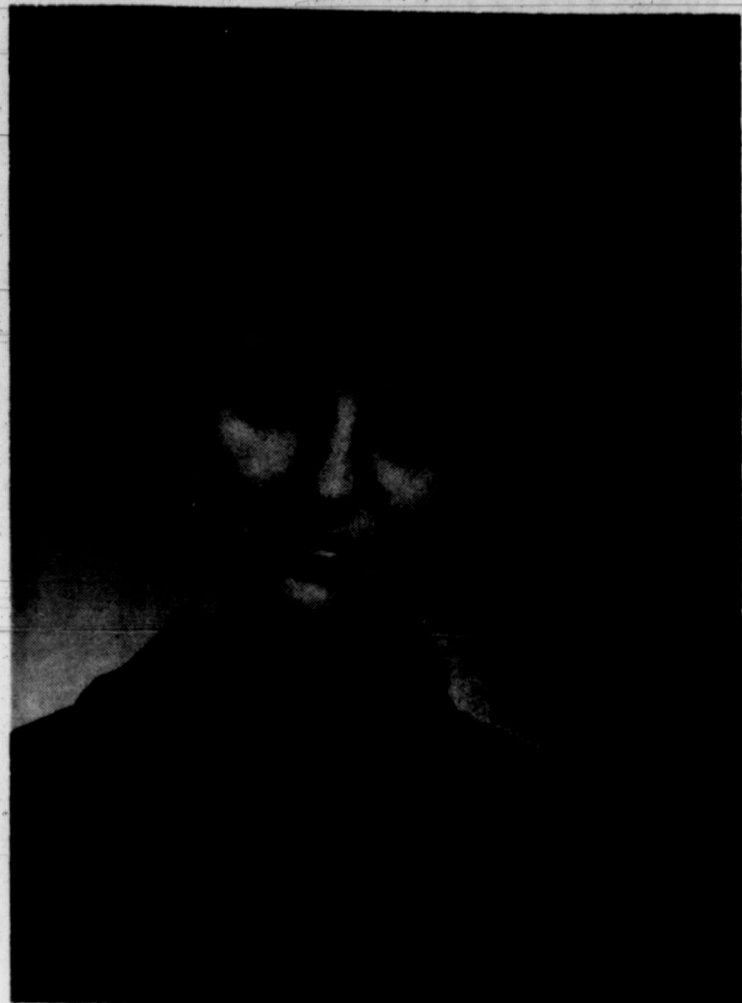

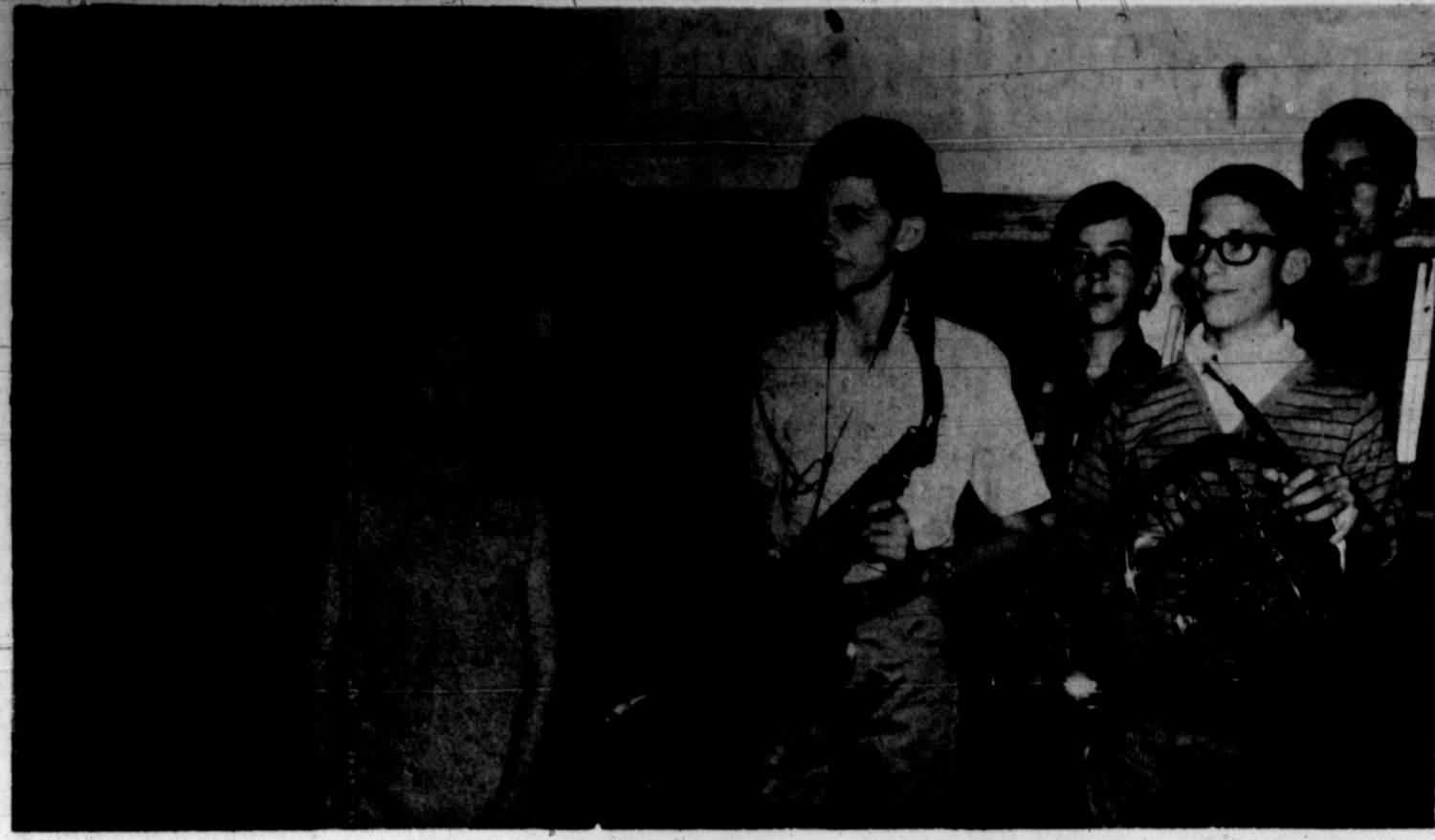

"Of course, you don't have a sequence camera and we can't be sure by just one photo, but it sounds like you shot the start of all the trouble."

"However, under the rules, there could be some contact and still not be a foul in the heat of a strong, fast race," the referee said, "with Estacado not contacting enough for a foul."

"I don't know what happened," Galmey said, "but my boy said the Sweetwater boy ran into him. I didn't know anything about it for several minutes, I just figured at first we had made a bad baton pass, lost... and I was trying to get my boys up for the other races."

Riley, who studied a copy of the Record photo, is convinced that Estacado made the foul. But he is not preparing any formal protest.

"It is like looking at a film after a football game," Riley said. "The ruling has already been made. The other teams already are certified."

"It really hurts though. The top four relay teams in our district have best times in the district... and it looks like our boys (Dan Ramsey, Stanley Bracy, Randy Riley and Dan Steakley) could have gone on to state."

Camera Questions Decision

Wolves Lose-But Should They?

An eyesight decision by District 3-AAA meet officials which knocked Colorado High's 440-yard sprint relay out of regional may be in error.

This is revealed in a news photo by Colorado City Record's Lacy Boles, whose camera caught the final baton pass in the race where judges ruled for a re-run of the event.

In the re-run, minutes after Colorado City had qualified for regional with a No. 2 spot ahead of favorite Lubbock Estacado, the Wolf foursome finished third and lost the opportunity to represent District 3-AAA in Region 1-AAA competition.

The mix-up and unique re-running of a final district meet relay came Saturday night in Snyder.

In addition to eliminating C-City, the re-run knocked Lubbock Dunbar out of first place in the 440 relay and the championship of District 3-AAA.

and handed the district title to Sweetwater, by half point, although eliminating the Ponies from the re-run.

Dunbar, first in the relay in the original race, finished second to Coach Hollis Gainey's Estacado quartet in the re-run and dropped to second in the team totals with 108 to Sweetwater's 108 1/2.

Estacado totaled 85, Snyder 58, Colorado City 45, Littlefield 23, Brownfield, and Levelland 19 each, Slaton 18, Lamesa 8, Lake View 1/2.

Coach Dell Riley of C-City opposed the decision to run the race again with runners having less than 20 minute rest. But Coach Church Smith of Lake View, referee for the meet, ruled for a re-run under specific rule book direction after curve judges reported to him that Sweetwater had hampered Estacado on the curve at the final baton pass.

"I know we were fortunate to

finish second and ahead of Estacado in the first race," Riley said, "because we had the fourth best time going into the district meet.

"But we were interfered with, too, and Dan Steakley had to run around a Sweetwater runner who crossed his lane.

"But I contended that nobody really knows exactly what happened. One person might have seen one thing...one part of it all...but no one person saw it all."

That's where the Record news photo and judges may have different eyes.

Lamesa was in lane 1, Dunbar in lane 2, Snyder in lane 3, Slaton in lane 4, Sweetwater in lane 5, Estacado in lane 6 and Colorado City in lane 7.

Curve judges - there were two on the curve for the final baton change - told the referee that Sweetwater's Benji Kemp, No.

3 man for his team, had moved out of his lane 5, collided with Estacado's Joe Benson in lane 6 and definitely hampered the Estacado No. 3 runner attempting to pass the baton to his anchor man, James Lester.

"I asked the judges if this was true and I emphasized," said Referee Smith, "they had better be doggone sure."

"One said, coach, I saw it. Sweetwater was definitely hampering Estacado."

"They told me," the referee continued, "that Estacado almost fell down because of Sweetwater."

"When that happened, it was cut and dried. There had been a foul and a disqualification. The rules call for another race in a later heat, or if in the finals that the final race be run again."

Sweetwater's Kemp didn't even complete the baton pass,

but darted to the outside and out of the race. Therefore, Sweetwater didn't race in the re-run.

The Record photo may have recorded a different version than what the curve judges claimed they saw.

Estacado's Benson appears to be making the initial intrusion, crossing into Sweetwater's lane and contacting Kemp from the back and side with the Sweetwater runner clearly ahead. Benson's left foot is across the lane stripe, his left hand and arm out of running position, colliding with Kemp's rear right shoulder.

The Record photo indicates that the Estacado runner may have been at fault originally, not Sweetwater's Kemp, and may have caused Sweetwater to veer out of position.

The Record photo was described to both Coach Gainey of Estacado (the former Colorado City Record's CAMERA, Page 7

Carl Devorce, the powerful sophomore who may develop into one of the state's foremost schoolboy shotput specialists, carries the No. 1 banner of District 3-AAA into the meet.

He'll go into action at 10:30 a. m.

A studious senior and all-around athlete, Dan Safford, will be in the discus event as the runner-up in the event in District 3-AAA.

Safford's event begins at 9:30 a. m.

Devorce threw the shot 53 feet 10 3/8 inches Saturday in the cold and rain in Snyder. It was a hectic day and night with the weatherman and the meet judges taking turns to shape the meet into one of the

most unique in the district's athletic history.

Devorce's first place distance was more than three feet ahead of his nearest competitor in Snyder and almost 8 feet ahead of No. 6.

Safford, with 141 feet 2 inches, trailed Lubbock Dunbar's, Atkins, who won the 3-AAA discus with 152 feet 5 1/2 inches, one foot ahead of Dunbar's Mason with 140 feet 2 inches.

Both Devorce and Safford will be facing severe tasks in Region 1 competition.

Devorce, who should be adding to prowess as he moves into his junior and senior high school trials, has the fourth best shot put of the six regional qualifiers.

Wagner of Monahans has 57-3 1/2, Briggs of Seminole has 56-4 and Whisenhunt of Tullia has 54-0 1/2.

However, Devorce was at his best when the chips were down in 3-AAA finals Saturday and may move up to challenge the more experienced leaders. His 53-10 3/8 is better than two other Region 1 participants - Henthorn of Tullia, 52-8 1/2, and Morris of Brownwood, 50-0 3/4.

Safford, in the discus, is No. 6 among the region qualifiers.

Leading his 141-2 toss at Snyder Saturday are Briggs of Seminole, the heavy favorite with a tremendous 181-10 1/2; Clark of Pecos, 171-8 1/4; 3-AAA winner Atkins of Dunbar, 152-5 1/2; Whisenhunt of Tullia, 149-2; Carson of Dumas, 145-1 1/2.

panions, and the guardians of his pastures, fields and vineyards.

There ought to be laws, state and federal, giving the mourning doves back to a kinder, gentle

officially requested by the city to pay for a replacement for the rural fire truck was passed by unanimous vote of the council.

City Manager Sadler is instructed to get in touch with county officials concerning a truck replacement.

Tuesday afternoon, in informal discussion, county officials were in agreement that the adding of a high pressure pump to replace the volume pump on the auxiliary truck would be their best alternative for the present.

"We did not take an official vote," said Marcus Vest, commissioner for precinct one, at noon Wednesday.

"We did agree that fixing up the old tanker-truck in use to fight grass-fires would probably be our first immediate choice," Vest said, adding that another meeting with the city manager is expected before the county decision becomes official.

Both Vest and Judge Martin indicated that county officials will take under consideration other alternatives for a permanent rural truck replacement at a later date.
