Income Tax Discussed By Farmers

"Paying Income Tax is a responsibility to your country as a citizen must be accepted," Alvin Webb, local accountant, told the Littlefield Young Farmers Association at their meeting Monday night.

Webb spoke on all aspects of income tax as it applies to farmers explaining the necessity of keeping a good set of books. "The best method of accounting is to run all business through the bank, depositing all income and paying all bills by check," he said.

"It is also wise to smooth out your income from year to year by rough estimation," Webb continued, "so you can tell how much to carry over."

"One item you should pay close attention to is if you pay a hand over \$150 in any year, the law requires you to withhold three per cent and to match that amount," Webb explained.

He pointed out that all stocks and bonds dividends must be reported and the tax paid in the same year. "Be sure and charge off all major repairs as an operating expense because they cannot be counted as depreciations," he stated.

Poor Health Is Reason

District Judge E. A. (Andy) Bills announced this week that he will not be a candidate for re-election to the post he has held the past 12 years. In making the announcement Bills gave his health as the reason he will not run.

Bills said, "I think it is in the best interest of the entire District if the people select a new judge by election and because of my health, which most of the people know about, I think it best that I not be a candidate."

Judge Bills was appointed to the post of District Judge on January 1, 1950 by the governor in the old 64th Judicial District. The 64th District included Lamb, Bailey, Parmer, Swisher, Hale and Castro Counties. He was subsequently elected to the post in the elections of 1950.

On September 1, 1957, the District was divided by an act of the legislature and Bills was again appointed by the governor as District Judge of the new 154th Judicial District which includes Lamb, Bailey and Parmer Counties.

Judge Bills was re-elected to the post in 1958 without an opponent and is presently serving the final year of that term. He has practiced law in Lamb County since moving here in 1924 from Eastland, Tex. He served as Assistant District Attorney in Eastland prior to moving to Littlefield.

Bills received a Permanent Teaching Certificate from Denton Normal College and taught both in the college and in the Eastland School District. He became the superintendent of schools at Eastland before becoming a lawyer.

"I had planned to go to law school," Bills said, "but I never could afford it." He read and studied law during his spare time and passed the state bar examination.

The announcement is the first from any of the present office holders concerning the upcoming elections.

Draft Quota For January Is Decreased

The state draft quota for January calls for 440 men, 121 less than for December. Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective director, said Wednesday.

The December call, previously announced, was 561, compared to November, October and September quotas

of 923, 911 and 1,112, respectively.

Colonel Schwartz also announced that approximately 4,000 men would be given pre-induction examinations in January, compared to 6,155 in December.

Local board quotas for induction and pre-induction examination in January are scheduled to be mailed by state Selective Service headquarters Wednesday, December 13.

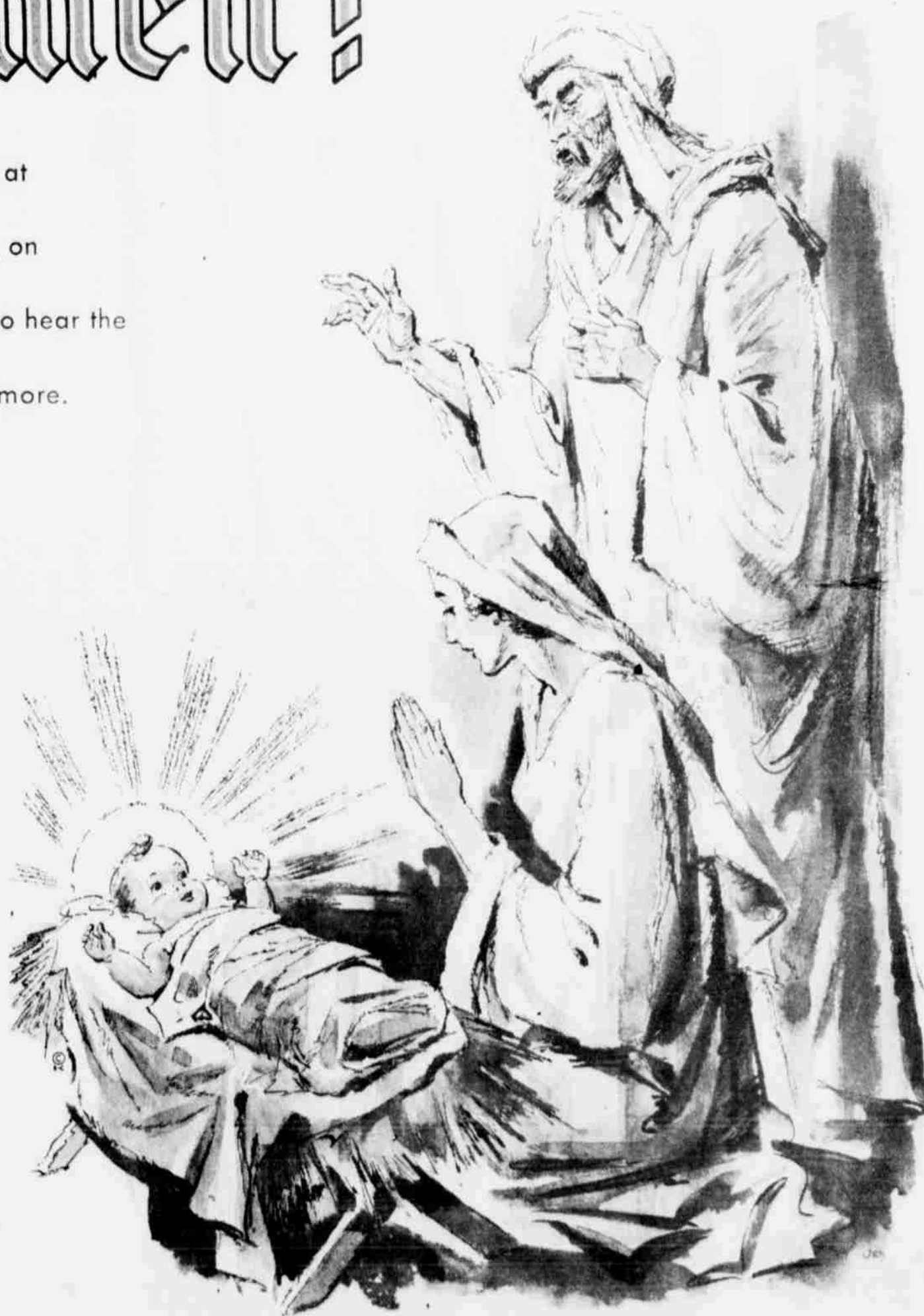

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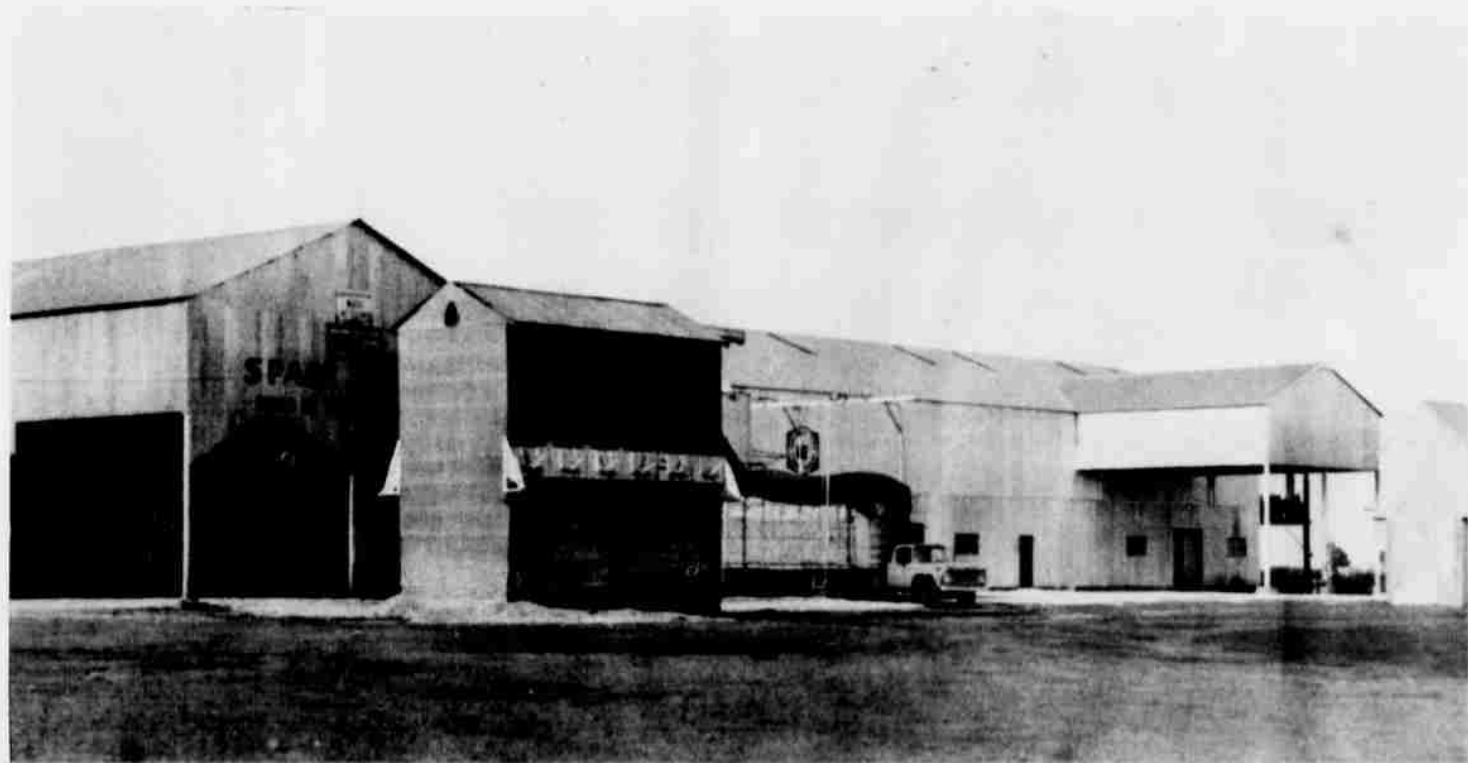

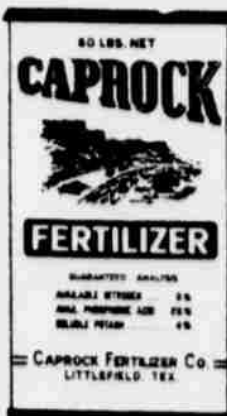

Turkey Is 'National Bird' at Christmastime

Next to the eagle, the turkey comes closest to being the national bird of Americans! At Thanksgiving and Christmas time, roast turkey traditionally occupies the No. 1 spot on the holiday menu.

A cold roast turkey platter

is a favorite buffet attraction with hostesses who like to prepare the party dish a day ahead. Thus they can enjoy the company without the interruption of kitchen duties.

A top professional, Frank Forster, distinguished member of the American Culinary Federation, American Academy of Chefs, tells how he prepares his holiday cold turkey platter. Home cooks who follow his method should score a culinary hit with family and friends.

Here's how to do it —

Wash the dressed turkey thoroughly; season with salt and pepper, inside and out. Rub the whole bird with butter. Place turkey ON ITS SIDE in uncovered roaster and put in 350-degree oven. (Chef Forster notes that by roasting the turkey on its side, rather than on its back or face down, the juices are better able to run to the breast bone, keeping the breast meat from drying out).

As soon as the one side is browned, the turkey should be turned over and cooked on the other side.

Chef Forster favors 15 minutes per pound as cooking time. For the final quarter of an hour, turn the breast up in order to brown it a little more. Baste every 15 minutes during the roasting.

When done, place turkey on platter, slice as desired and store in refrigerator.

So as not to waste succulent pan juices from the roasting, Chef Forster suggests a zesty gravy to be used with the leftovers (if any) at a later date.

This is his recipe — About an hour before the turkey is done, add one coarsely diced carrot and a large diced onion. When turkey is removed from roaster, place the pan, containing the juices, on top of the stove over an open flame. Reduce the juices, stirring until the fat is cleared. Pour off all the fat. Stir in two tablespoons of flour. Add two cups of broth or water. Simmer for a few minutes and strain.

Have your holiday cold turkey platter, and gravy, too — both delicious.

Cops are found everywhere - on land, on the sea, in the air on horses, in cars, and sometimes in your hair, in spite of the fact that you "can't find one when you want one" they are usually there when it counts most. The best way to get one is to pick up a phone.

He works "around the clock" split shifts, Sundays and holidays and it always kills him when a joker says, "Hey, tomorrow is Election Day, I'm off, let's go fishing." (That's the day he works 20 hours).

A cop is like the little girl, who, when she was good, was very very good, but when she was bad she was horrid. When a cop is good "he's getting paid for it." When he makes a mistake "he's a grafter and that goes for the rest of them, too."

When he shoots a stick-up man he's a hero, except when the stick-up man is "only a kid, anybody coulda seen that". Lots of them have homes, some of them covered with ivy, but most of them covered with mortgages. Cops raise lots of kids; most of them other peoples.

Mahon Reports

LUBBOCK — Representative George Mahon reports that he is closing his Lubbock office and preparing to return to Washington for the new session of Congress. He visited extensively over the District, but expressed regret that he was unable to cover all the counties.

Mahon stated that he was much encouraged over the upsurge of interest in government which was evident on every hand. "A strong country does not go to the dogs when the people are concerned and alert," he said. He advocated an attitude of cautious optimism toward the future.

Mahon made the following comments on subject which appeared to him to be uppermost in the minds of the people: WAR — A war between the United States and Russia would be an Atomic war. In over-all strength, the U. S. is stronger than Russia. Soviet leaders know they could not win. Their country would be set back by decades.

In order to lessen the likelihood of war by miscalculation on the part of Russia, the U. S. has more firmly defined its position and is increasing its nuclear and conventional war capability. Prospects of avoiding war are excellent. A continuation of disturbing developments in many areas of the world seems inevitable.

FALLOUT SHELTERS — If the Cold War continues, we must have a shelter program in which the Federal, State and local governments and individuals participate. Requirements are not yet sufficiently well defined and people should not rush into a program of shelter construction. Russia does not have a large stockpile of operational intercontinental ballistic missiles as yet, and this is not the time of greatest danger. There is time for deliberate planning as the greater danger period approaches. Much better information will be available in the near future.

FARM LABOR — A crisis in farm labor is upon us as a result of the new bracero law which restricts tractor driving by braceros. In the House we were able to pass a simple extension of the law, but crippling amendments added in the Senate and which could not be wholly eliminated have made the new law intolerable. A further threat is posed by the unsympathetic administration of the law by officials of the Labor Department.

The prospect of inadequate farm help poses a serious threat not only to individual farmers, but to the economy of many farm areas. I shall continue to work aggressively with organizations and farmers in an effort to prevent disaster to farmers who have been forced to rely on braceros for tractor drivers.

SPENDING — Non-defense spending continues too high. To discourage spending and inflationary trends, and for other reasons, I voted in the last session against the depressed areas bill, the big housing bill, backdoor spending proposals, Federal aid to education, minimum wage legislation.

The authoritative Congressional Quarterly rates me as having voted with the Administration 59% of the time in the recent Congress. I am a loyal Democrat, but the National Interests require that Democrats and Republicans put the welfare of the country above party consideration. This is in the long range best interest of our country and our two-party system.

CONSERVATIVES vs. LIBERALS — The trend among the people toward conservatism in government continues, I am encouraged by this trend. Both political parties, in my judgment, lean too far to the left. This is reflected in national platforms adopted last year which are significantly similar. There are large blocs of conservatives and liberals in both the Democratic and Republican parties.

Citizens can best serve by working actively within the party of their choice for the goals in which they believe. They have the responsibility and duty of trying to influence the party to follow a course which they regard as best for the country.

RECIPROCAL TRADE — The extension of the present reciprocal trade program or substitute legislation will be high on the list of legislation to be considered by the next Congress. I have always supported the reciprocal trade program despite the fact that some industries are adversely affected. This area has a big part in

the exportation of about five million bales of cotton per year and much is at stake.

American industrial and farm commodities are being priced out of world markets. Unless labor and industry and government can do more than is now being done to make this country more competitive we are in deep trouble. My vote against the minimum wage increase was based in part upon my concern about this basic problem.

OIL IMPORTS — Excessive oil imports continue to contribute to the slump in the domestic oil industry. Admittedly, trade is a two way street, but I favor an aggressive program — not to eliminate all oil imports, but to bring the import program within the bounds of reason and prevent stagnation in the domestic oil industry.

SUGAR BEETS — Present sugar laws will expire during the next Congress and a new sugar law will be passed. I shall continue to be an active and vocal participant in the crusade to get a sufficient sugar beet quota to warrant at least one

sugar mill in the Plains — Panhandle area. I expect some progress to be made which would enable us to share in the national growth factor. However, it is mandatory that U. S. growers of beets and cane be authorized to produce a larger percentage of American consumption. U. S. growers now produce 55% of American consumption. An additional allocation of growers now produce 55% of American consumption. An additional allocation of only 5% would be a great boon to domestic growers.

FARM LEGISLATION — Trends in farm legislation are unpredictable. However, I do not anticipate any drastic change in farm laws during the next session of Congress.

TAXES — I expect the next Congress to pass legislation tightening up revenue laws in some fields, but a significant increase or decrease in taxes generally is not likely.

DEFENSE — I estimate that the next Congress will appropriate \$50 billion to continue the defense program. We are the world's most powerful nation and we will remain so.

We need not take a back seat to anybody and we can win the Cold War if we have sufficient strength of purpose and if we think we can. I think we can and will. Communism has its basic weaknesses; Freedom has its basic strengths. Democracy and freedom will prevail.

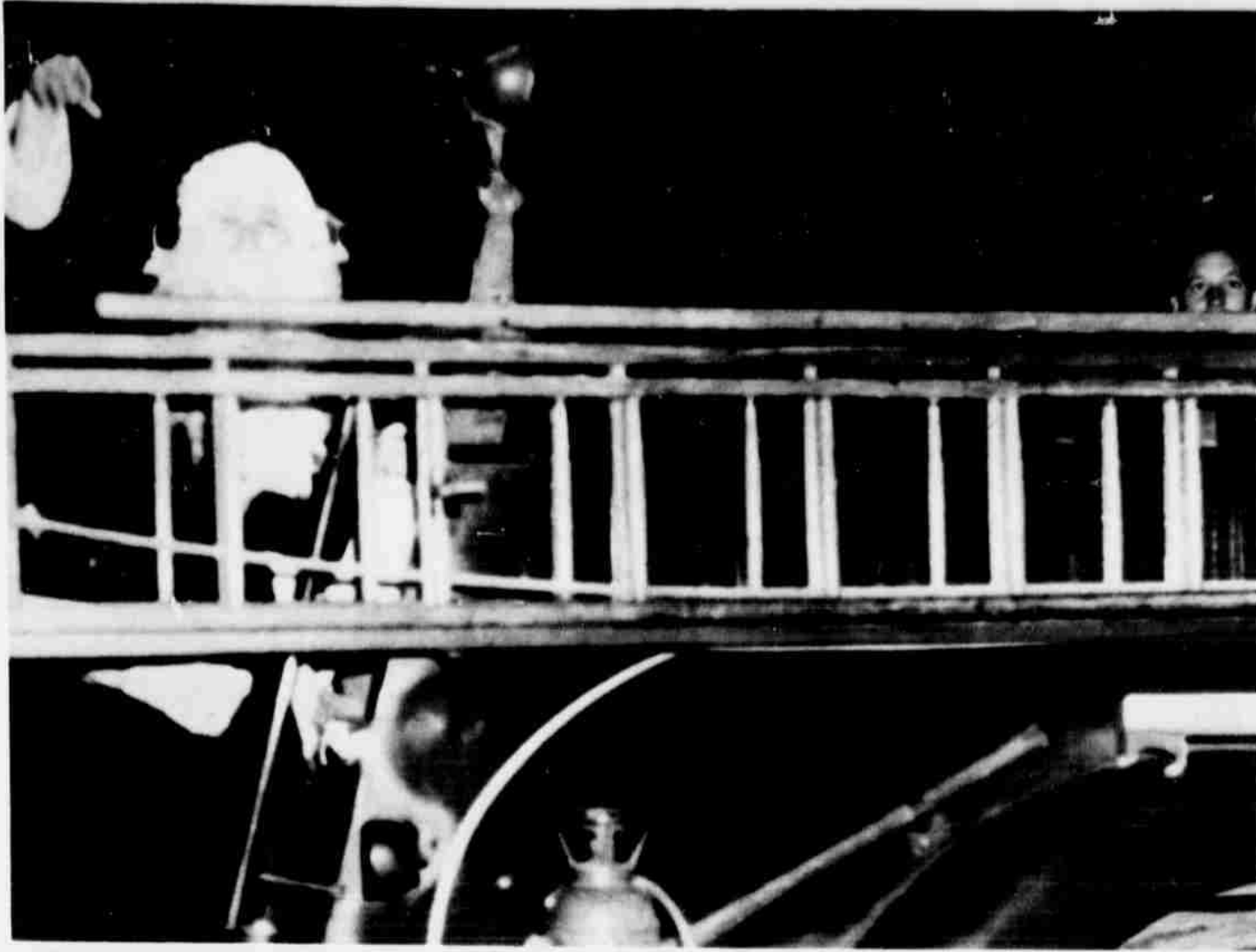

Abilene Newspaper Cancels Subscriptions To Commies

The Abilene Reporter News Saturday announced it has cancelled the subscriptions of three foreign Communist officials in Washington and has taken their names off the mailing list.

The three who will no longer be receiving copies of the West Texas daily newspaper are August A. Yashin of the Soviet Embassy, K. Petrov of the Bulgarian Legation, and Capt. Imre Mozsik, assistant military and air attaché for the Legation of Hungary.

The newspaper, suspicious that the three diplomats are more interested in Dyess Air Force Base than the social goings-on of Abilene, is making cash refunds for the unexpired portion of the subscriptions.

In a Page One memo addressed to the three men the newspaper said today:

"This, gentlemen, is the last copy of The Abilene Reporter-News you will receive.

"Your subscriptions are cancelled as of this date. Checks for refunds of the unexpired terms are being put in the mail to you today. They should arrive in time for Christmas.

"The management discovered your names among our readers in a routine perusal of our out of town subscription list. They had escaped attention in the customary handling of circulation mail, as you no doubt expected.

"Ordinarily we cherish each paid subscriber. We work hard to get them and keep them as readers.

"But it seemed odd to us that you would want to read The Abilene Reporter - News, though we feel with modest pride it is a good newspaper.

"Obviously you are not interested in our social items, or the agricultural economy of West Texas, or the football fortunes of our three colleges, or the sometimes lively sessions of our city commission.

"Could it be, then, that you are willing to spend your Communist money on our subscription so that you may read about Dyess Air Force Base at the edge of our city?

"As we say, this is your last copy.

"We hope other newspapers will follow suit if you are on their lists.

"You might find further interest in our editorial in this subject in this same edition."

When the three Communist diplomats turn to the editorial page of today's Reporter-News here is the editorial they will find:

"You will note on this morning's front page that the Abilene Reporter - News found on

its subscription lists the names of people in three different Communist embassies in Washington.

"No sooner did we discover this than we cancelled their papers. They will learn of it the first time when they read this edition.

"One subscriber was in the Hungarian legation, one in the Bulgarian legation, and the third in the Russian embassy.

"Obviously they are Communist spies whose duties include the close reading of the Abilene Reporter - News for whatever it carries about Dyess Air Force Base.

"We don't knowingly carry any news of Dyess that involves its security. We guard it as jealously as does the base command itself. So we doubt if

the Communists have profited much from their subscriptions.

"But we are not willing for them to read even such news as we do carry about Dyess, its people and its activities.

"The incident brings home to us and we call it to the attention of the public, that precautions must be taken even on the local level throughout the United States to safeguard any information the Communists may want.

"It is especially true in a community which has a vital military base such as Dyess. 'Loose talk for military matters, for instance, can be harmful.

"The Communists are ruthless conspirators in our midst. We should make their work as difficult as possible."

Do you think an international police force is advisable?

Do you think we've made any headway in international cooperation?

Following are some activities which are world wide:

Delivery of mail. Allocation of radio frequencies.

The Iceberg Patrol. How are these handled?

By each nation. Any international agreement?

If you knew FOR SURE that there would be a nuclear war, would you just sit there waiting?

Would you raise a family?

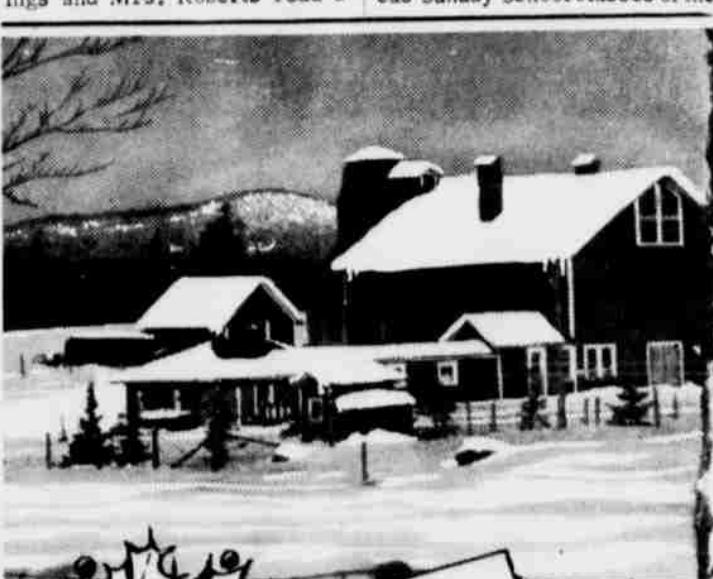

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN, Tex. -- Announcement that John B. Connally was resigning his post as U. S. Secretary of the Navy to run for governor caused a bit of confusion and conjecture in the Capital City.

Attorney General Will Wilson also announced contender, referred to Connally's candidacy as "a Washington fairy tale." He recalled his October 9 prediction that Connally would run with Governor Price. Daniel's blessing. Wilson doesn't believe Daniel will now bid for a fourth term.

Governor Daniel says he appreciates Connally's courtesy in advising him of his decision before making it public. He told Connally he would extend the same courtesy, "when my decision is made," Daniel says. "He (Connally) is an able man and my high regard for him will continue even though we end up as candidates for the same office."

Senator Ralph Yarborough, also mentioned as a possible candidate, says he won't make a decision "until after Congress convenes January 10."

Houstonian Don Yarborough has a lot of liberal encouragement to run for governor, but may run as lieutenant governor. Already in the Governor's race is Marshall Formby of Plainview.

Nearly 600 paid \$12.50 each to hear Republican gubernatorial candidate Jack Cox and Republican Senator John Tower at a dinner in Austin's Municipal Auditorium.

TOURIST COUNCIL READY - The 22-member executive committee of the proposed Texas Tourist Council has drafted a bill for advertising funds.

Chairman W. Price, Jr., says the bill will be introduced at the January 3 special session of the Texas Legislature... providing Governor Daniel enlarges the scope of the session to encompass more than each legislative session.

Tourist bill calls for \$300,000 in state money from the General Revenue Fund. Council will

attempt to raise \$200,000 in contributions to complement the program.

Harold Robbins of San Antonio was named chairman of the constitution and by-laws committee. Others on the committee include Rep. Joe Ratcliff of Dallas; Callan Graham and H. C. Pittman of Austin and J. W. Burton of Decatur.

Sieve Matthews of Austin will head an organization and nominations committee which includes Scott Hardy of San Antonio, John Ben Sheppard of Odessa, J. A. Jameson and Charles Simons of Dallas, Ed St. John of Austin, and Bob Conwell of Corpus Christi.

Price and Tom Taylor, Highway Department Travel Director, will serve as consultants to both committees.

LEGISLATIVE LIST GROWS -- Texas Legislative Council is considering the report of its Small Loan Study Committee, and Will Wilson still insists "Loan Shark" legislation should be on special session agenda.

Other groups are pushing for consideration of farm - to - market road appropriation in January.

Texas Youth Council has a few matters it would like the Legislature to consider. They are: the problem of extending the state juvenile parole program; a discretionary bill for revision of court procedure on juvenile offenders; and an interstate compact regarding parolee exchange.

Rep. Charles Ballman of Borger says he plans to move for immediate adjournment of the special session. "Unless I am fully convinced that there is a need for a special session, I plan to introduce a resolution the first day of the session, calling for an adjournment on the second day," chairman of the House Revenue and Taxation committee says.

EMPLOYMENT UP - Total employment in Texas hit an all - time high in October, according to the Texas Employment Commission. By mid-

month, 3,494,100 Texans were employed.

Increase was largely due to heavy agricultural activity.

Seasonal farm employment rose to an estimated 280,600 workers, with cotton activities accounting for 66 per cent of this total.

Although 4.4 per cent of the total labor force was jobless, the unemployment situation was more favorable than at any time since April, 1960.

People having most job troubles continue to be those who are unskilled.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE RULING -- In answer to an inquiry from Lubbock County Attorney, Alton R. Griffin, the Attorney General ruled that while a child over 16 years of age is not required to attend school whether he has completed 9th grade or not, a child under 16 who has completed the 9th grade is subject to the compulsory school attendance law, even if his services are needed for the support of his parents.

POPULATION CHANGES - Population estimates prepared by the Population Research Center at the University of Texas reveal that 94 of the 143 counties which lost population between 1950 and 1960 registered an increase during 1960-61.

Forty - nine counties continue to lose population.

Research Center figures only 66 counties lost population between 1960 and 1961, as compared with the 143 during the previous decade.

A geographical pattern indicates that counties which have grown in the past 11 years are concentrated in the Gulf Coast region, the Northwest and in a belt running from Cooke and Grayson counties on the North Central Texas border to Travis and then curving southwest toward Maverick.

Counties with an 11 - year loss are scattered, but tend to be concentrated in a wide belt running from southeast to northwest in the center of the state.

HEALTH, WELFARE, CONSULTANTS - Governor Daniel named six appointees to an advisory committee on a study of state health and welfare services to be conducted by the Legislative Council.

Appointees are Dr. W. C. Smith of Carthage; Dr. C. M. Phillips of Levelland; Eldred Thomas of Dallas, president of the Texas Nursing Home Association; Mrs. Louise Evans Bruce, editorial page editor of the Amarillo Globe-News; Roderic M. Bell, administrator of Presbyterian Hospital in Dallas; and V. H. Hackney, president of the Marshall National Bank.

Dr. J. B. Copeland of San Antonio was reelected chairman of the State Board of Health. Dr. Hampton Robinson of Corpus Christi and Joe B. Winston of Mercedes, were reelected to respective posts of vice - chairman and secretary of the health board.

Many Texans are urging that the National Legislative Conference hold its 1964 meeting in Texas. Executive committee members including Speaker James A. Turman met this week to discuss 1962 agenda for Phoenix, Arizona meeting. Hawaii will be site of 1963 session.

Everett J. Grindstaff of Balingier has been appointed to the board of the Upper Colorado River Authority.

Malcom L. Quick of Austin, Irwin R. Salmanson of El Paso, and Felix Salazar, Jr., of Houston have been named Assistant Attorneys General.

Acting District Attorney Gail Walley of Beaumont has asked the Attorney General's office to hold a court of inquiry concerning the empaneling of a grand jury by Criminal District Judge Owen Lord.



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
