New Industry to Locate Here With Plans to Employ 20-25

United Sewing Agency, Inc., an Oklahoma based company headed by Jim Vinyard and Dennis Hall, with a current area operation in Spur, is now finalizing plans with the Post Chamber of Commerce

and the Post Economic Development Corporation for a branch of the company to locate in Post.

As head of the Texas operation, Vinyard is negotiating with the PEDC and the Post Chamber. Hall is head of the Oklahoma division.

The company, now sewing mainly for Units - a retail outlet with a store in Lubbock's South Plains Mall - has ordered 45 machines for their Post branch and would initially employ 20 to 25 people.

Future plans call for increasing the number of machines to 60 and also increasing the number of employees as the business grows.

The Spur operation is now up to 61 machines and is currently putting around three and one-half million dollars back into the community yearly, according to United Sewing spokesman Jim Vinyard.

"A great deal of credit for this industry locating here goes to Jeff Pollard, Curtis Hudman, Jim Neff and Mike Vyas - members of an informal industrial development team who put in a lot of time and work on this project," said Lewis Earl, speaking for the Chamber of Commerce.

On Tuesday of this week, Vinyard was still in the process of selecting a building site for the sewing operation and had inspected several Post buildings for consideration.

No definite date has been set for employee interviews, but pre-screening will probably be done in Post by the Texas Employment Commission.

Serving as announcer for the week will be Johnny Kemp. Auctioneer will be Bobby Fletcher of Wolforth.

Making award presentations at the show will be this year's FFA Sweetheart and 4-H Sweetheart.

Pre-show activities will include steer weigh-in and heifer check-in on Tuesday, January 26 from 3:30 p.m. to 5:30 p.m.

or four animals in each division.

GMH Board Buys Used Analyzer Unit

The Garza Memorial Hospital Board of Directors approved the purchase of an electrolyte analyzer for the hospital at a price of \$2,000 at their regular meeting Thursday, January 14.

The analyzer is two years old and being purchased from a Lubbock physician who is closing his lab.

The purchase will replace a flame photometer that is approximately 12 years old and has had problems over the last two years.

A new analyzer is listed for \$7,912.

In other business the directors reviewed the contract services for the Physical Therapy personnel coming out of Lubbock.

Thomas Collier, Roque Shaw and Tommy Goff come down a total of three times a week to conduct the therapy.

The audit presented last month was approved.

The directors approved the request of Jackie Gonzales for a \$400 scholarship in order for her to take a Special Skills course with the exception that her hospital bill is current.

Attorney Ron Pearson was authorized by the directors to rewrite the Board and Medical Staff By-Laws at a cost not to exceed \$3,000.

In another item the directors approved a Swing Bed Policies and Procedure Manual that had been previously approved by the medical staff.

Present at the meeting were directors Jack Alexander, David Tyler, David Nichols, Norma Baumann and Zoe Kirkpatrick along with hospital administrator Maritta Reed.

The Post ISD Board of Trustees meet in regular session Tuesday, January 12 and heard from the Caprock Cultural Association concerning a grant they were awarded for artists to work with school children in the Post and Southland ISD.

Jo Ann Mock and James Rice explained the program to the trustees in which Rice is presently working with Post fourth grade students.

The program is expected to expand in the future.

In other business the trustees had to reject all bids for the resurfacing of the track because of a legal flaw found in the bidding.

This makes the second time that bids had to be refused on this project.

Superintendent Bill Shiver presented the Annual Performance Report to the trustees.

In his conclusion of his commentary Shiver states:

"The statistical data on regression predictions (Section K) shows that we had a much better year than was predicted for the 1986-1987 school year, based on prior year's achievement data.

"Since we had higher achievement than predicted last year, 1988 is predicted to be quite high when compared to past years, and it will be interesting to see if the prediction is accurate.

"We had to begin our predictions at grade six because of the lack of an accurate data base prior to that

time. As we move ahead from year to year, we increase a year at a time downward.

"The idea is to have a substantial data base from which to apply the statistical formulas. As it stands, it looks as if our predictions correlate with the state data.

"It is my opinion that the teaching of Reading and Writing should be inseparable, and should be taught concurrently.

"The failure rate in the First Grade concerns me. Since about twelve students were held back in Kindergarten, the eighteen who were retained in the First Grade makes the total failure rate appear to be about thirty per cent of the class.

"When I think of the twenty-five per cent of the eleventh graders who did not pass the Exit test, I wonder if we are not, looking at the identical type of student.

"Research indicates that failure ranks third on the stress scale of children, death of a parent being first and divorce being second.

Silver Haired Legislature Voting

South Plains senior citizens interested in running for the second Texas Silver Haired Legislature can pick up candidacy forms, petitions, and guidelines at the South Plains Association of Governments offices, 1323 58th Street, Lubbock.

The Texas Silver Haired Legislature, established by the 69th Texas Legislature, is an elected representative, non-partisan body of senior citizens elected by senior citizens.

The first Texas Silver Haired Legislature convened in Austin September 29 through October 2, 1986.

The second Silver Haired Legislature will be elected May 24 and will convene in Austin this fall, for the purpose of considering and voting on legislation that concerns the needs of older Texans.

The mock legislative session will closely resemble that of the Texas Legislature.

At the close of the session, the Silver Haired Legislature will select several issues which it feels are priority issues, to be presented to Texas Legislators.

Four representatives to the second Silver Haired Legislature will be elected from the South Plains.

Cotton Talks...

Tighter regulations governing application of the limit on government payments under the 1985 farm act will be in effect beginning with the 1989 crop. Payments in 1988 will not be affected.

Changes were made as a part of the Budget Reconciliation Act passed by Congress in the final days of 1987. Together with other farm act amendments, including one that lowers target prices on all program commodities, the alterations are aimed at reducing overall farm program costs by \$1.064 billion in 1988 and \$1.21 billion in 1989.

The budget measure decrees the basic standards by which payment eligibility is to be determined and gives the Secretary of Agriculture until August 1, 1988 to issue detailed regulations. An advance rule-making proposal can be expected well in advance of August, according to Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, giving affected parties time to comment before final decisions are made.

The payment limit per person is \$50,000, and the cost savings envisioned by lawmakers, generally, are to come from permitting payments only to persons "actively engaged" in farming. Moreover, eligibility for multiple payments may not be achieved by a person holding a beneficial interest (more than 10 percent) in more than three entities. A producer can qualify for \$50,000 as a separate actively engaged person, but may qualify for no more than \$25,000 each by holding a substantial interest in two other entities.

To be eligible as a separate person, an individual must make a significant contribution of (1) capital, equipment or land and (2) personal labor or active personal management. In addition his share of profits must be commensurate with contributions and must be "at risk."

However, the actively engaged restriction is modified for some landlords, adult family members and sharecroppers. Landlords who con-

Mountain Trails of Texas was the program for Amity Study Club when they met on January 12 in the home of Ida Wilks, with Anne Leake as co-hostess.

Other members in attendance were Joyce Strubhart, Thelma Clark, Barbara Babb, Louella Bilberry, Ginger Carlisle, Janie Davis, Joy Dickson, Naomi Matsler, Martha McLendon, Helen Miller, Joy Pool, Carolyn Sawyers and Boo Olson.

Roll call was answered with members giving a brief description of towns along the trail.

Southwest of Guadalupe Mountains National Park on Highway 62/180 is Salt Flat, where battles fought over salt led to the law that mineral rights belong to the property owner.

On Highway 90, northwest of Marfa, is the little town of Valentine where the post office does a booming business each year when people send their greeting cards to

be postmarked for Valentine's Day.

Marfa, a small town of approximately 2000 people is well known for the mysterious Marfa Lights, first seen in 1883, and for the movie "Giant" which was filmed there. The town boasts the highest golf course in Texas, in altitude, that is, and is the site for glider and sailplane conventions each year.

Down from Marfa on Highway 67 are the ruins of Shafter, once a busy silver-mining town, now a ghost town with a cemetery containing over 2000 unmarked graves.

Just east of Presidio, 25 rooms of the 45 room Fort Leaton have been restored by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Originally established as a Spanish mission in 1759, portions of the present fort were built on the mission site in 1846.

Ben Leaton, the first Anglo-American colonist, made the mission a private fort and trading post in 1848.

With his first attempt to establish friendly relations with the area Indians, he invited a large group to a feast.

All went well at the feast, but when he awoke the next morning, he found his guests gone and with them all of his livestock.

He made no complaint, but invited them to another feast. At the close of that meal, he uncovered a small cannon, touched it off and

killed the entire group of Indians present. Fact? Legend?

He and the Indians must have come to an understanding, because he was later accused of encouraging Indian raids by trading guns and ammunition for stolen livestock.

Ft. Leaton was abandoned when the Civil War began. The Indians seized the opportunity to renew their attacks, and many settlements were abandoned.

El Camino del Rio, Spanish for "the river road" - local name for farm-to-market 170 - goes from Presidio to Lajitas and on east.

An excellent paved road, it is one of the most spectacular drives in the nation, plunging over mountains and canyons along the sun-drenched Rio Grande.

Lajitas is on the western tip of Big Bend National Park, where the mountains are up to 7,835 feet high.

Visiting Big Bend isn't just sight seeing, it's nature in awesome dimensions. The huge park spans 1,100 square miles of sun-baked desert, shadowy canyons, cool highlands and stony mountain towers.

It is high, wide and lonesome and not to be taken lightly. Camping facilities, which are scarce, are available if you make your reservations far ahead, but campers should always check with the park rangers before striking out on their own.

Up Highway 118 is Alpine, home of Sul Ross University which has one of the best geology departments in the nation.

Nineteen miles from Alpine is the Woodward Agate Ranch, open year-round, where, for a fee, you can search over 4000 acres of land for Texas red plume and pom-pom agates, jasper, feldspar and even opals. Ranch experts will help you grade your finds.

Texas 118 takes you on north through the beautiful Ft. Davis mountain scenery.

Post 4-H Club News

The Post 4-H met on January 13, 1988 at the home of Wendell and Cindy Johnson.

The meeting was called to order by club president Jimmy Holleman. After reviewing the old and new business, Syd Conner was introduced.

Syd reviewed the rule changes for the upcoming Garza County Stock Show.

Ft. Davis was established in 1854 at the crossroads of the old Chihuahuan Trail and the Butterfield Overland Mail route to protect the settlers, mail, California Gold Rush wagon trains and the precious waters of Limpia Creek.

Abandoned during the Civil War and destroyed by Indians, the fort was rebuilt stronger after the war and was active until 1891. The National Park Service now operates the restored fort.

North of Ft. Davis, at the foot of Mt. Locke, is the visitor center of the University of Texas McDonald Observatory, built in 1932 after a bequest from amateur astronomer William J. McDonald.

This 6,791 foot peak was chosen because of its distance from the night lights of cities and towns, the clean, clear air and the high ratio of cloudless nights.

The large dome with the newer 107 inch reflector is open to the public, but only professionals may use the large telescope.

Candace McConnell, high school faculty member, was introduced by Marian Wheatley. Miss McConnell is a native of El Paso and she spoke to the group about this international city.

In 1827, El Paso was made up of four earlier settlements. The missions in the area predate these settlements by one hundred and fifty years.

The city, which covers 149 square miles, is built around Franklin Mountain-nearly 8,000 feet high. A scenic drive winds around and over the mountain; an aerial tramway has been added and recently a 22 mile tunnel through the mountain was completed.

The highway and the tramway afford spectacular views of the city, Old Mexico and New Mexico.

Farm Credit Legislation

Texas farmers and ranchers should begin immediately to feel the positive effects of new legislation now in place for the Farm Credit System.

According to Donald R. Rogge, chairman of the Farm Credit Banks of Texas Presidents Committee and president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas, the most immediate result would be up to \$4 billion in assistance from the federal government to aid weaker Farm Credit districts.

The legislation also reverses \$138 million in assessments against the Texas district.

Rogge explained that since the Texas Farm Credit District remains one of the strongest of the 12 Farm Credit districts nationwide, it would not need financial aid from the government. However, it would benefit indirectly.

In addition to Rogge, other members of the FCB Presidents

Committee are Vice Chairman Paul S. Day, president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Texas, and Jack P. Hughes, president of the Texas Bank for Cooperatives.
