Briefing On Wedding Customs Of Interest to Many June Brides

Centuries ago in France the bride threw her garter and the girl who caught it was believed to be the next bride. Today the bride is somewhat more subdued and throws her bouquet — but the bridesmaids still scramble to make the catch. In ancient times, according to Compton's the date of the wedding was often chosen at some phase of the moon when the gods were presumed to be favorable. This practice, with the custom of eating honey at the marriage feast, may be the origin of the word honeymoon.

Sometimes the marriage ceremony involved guarantees. The veil over the bride's face may have indicated that she had been secluded from men, and her white robe was a warrant of her purity. Even now it is thought bad luck for the groom to see the bride before the ceremony on their wedding day. Another widespread custom is for the bride to wear "something old, something new, something borrowed, and something blue." In ancient Israel, the bride's robe had a blue border signifying purity, fidelity and love.

High-caste Brahmins in India believe a girl should marry at puberty. Usually the child bride remains with her family until she is 15 or 16. Marriage celebrations in India are so elaborate, Compton's points out that "the expense of the affair and of the bride's dowry frequently drives the father to the moneylender." Many American fathers can testify that this turn of events is not exclusive with India. Japanese tradition requires the bride to wear a veil over her elaborate hairdo called a "horn coverer." Jealousy is thought to vanish when it is removed.

The 208 swimmers on opening day were an expression of appreciation for the recreation facility of a swimming pool in our community.

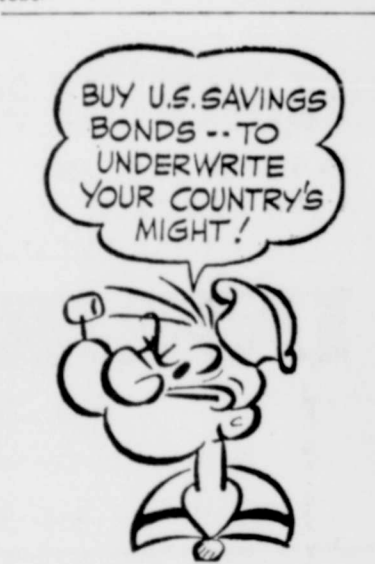
Janlee Baptist Church Planning Fall Kindergarten

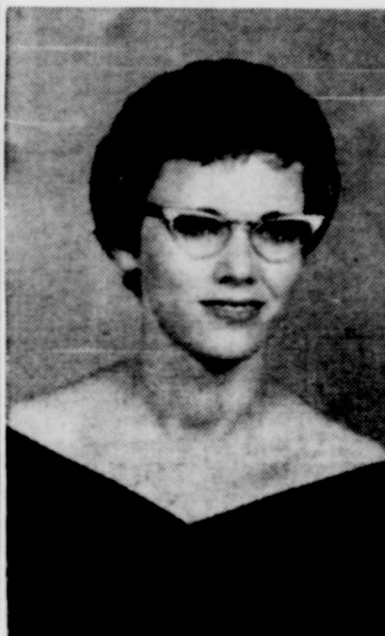

DEAR DONOR:
As you well know, the mobile blood bank has been coming to Burkburnett for about the last five years and we have managed to collect an average of forty to sixty pints of blood each time. We would like to emphasize that this blood is for the use of the citizens of Burkburnett that require it. Within the past three months we have been able to furnish blood for five people from this town. Of course the blood would not have been denied to them but it is nice to know that at the time you are sick you do not want the immediate worry of returning the blood that is used. These people have been very grateful for the blood program.

An important fact that should be stressed is that this blood is never wasted. If it is not used within the time limit, then it is processed and the various blood components are extracted, which can be used in the treatment of many and varied diseases. We would also like to bring to your attention, that under existing plans the Red Cross has set up, if you have a credit set up at the local bank this blood can be transferred to any point in the United States from coast to coast. In case you should need blood for a relative in a far off place the blood bank can furnish it at the time it is needed. This has been set up by the local Red Cross unit.

The next visit of the Mobile BLOOD UNIT will be WEDNESDAY, JUNE 5th and we are very anxious to exceed our previous donations. For a town the size of Burkburnett we feel that 100 pints would not really be enough. I know that you have given before and will give again but please mark down the date JUNE 5th and come in yourself and bring at least one new donor. 100 pints is not too much and to say that we do not have enough eligible donors in Burkburnett is false.

COME TO THE LEGION HALL, WEDNESDAY, JUNE 5th AND BRING A FRIEND. You might even need a pint of your own blood some day.

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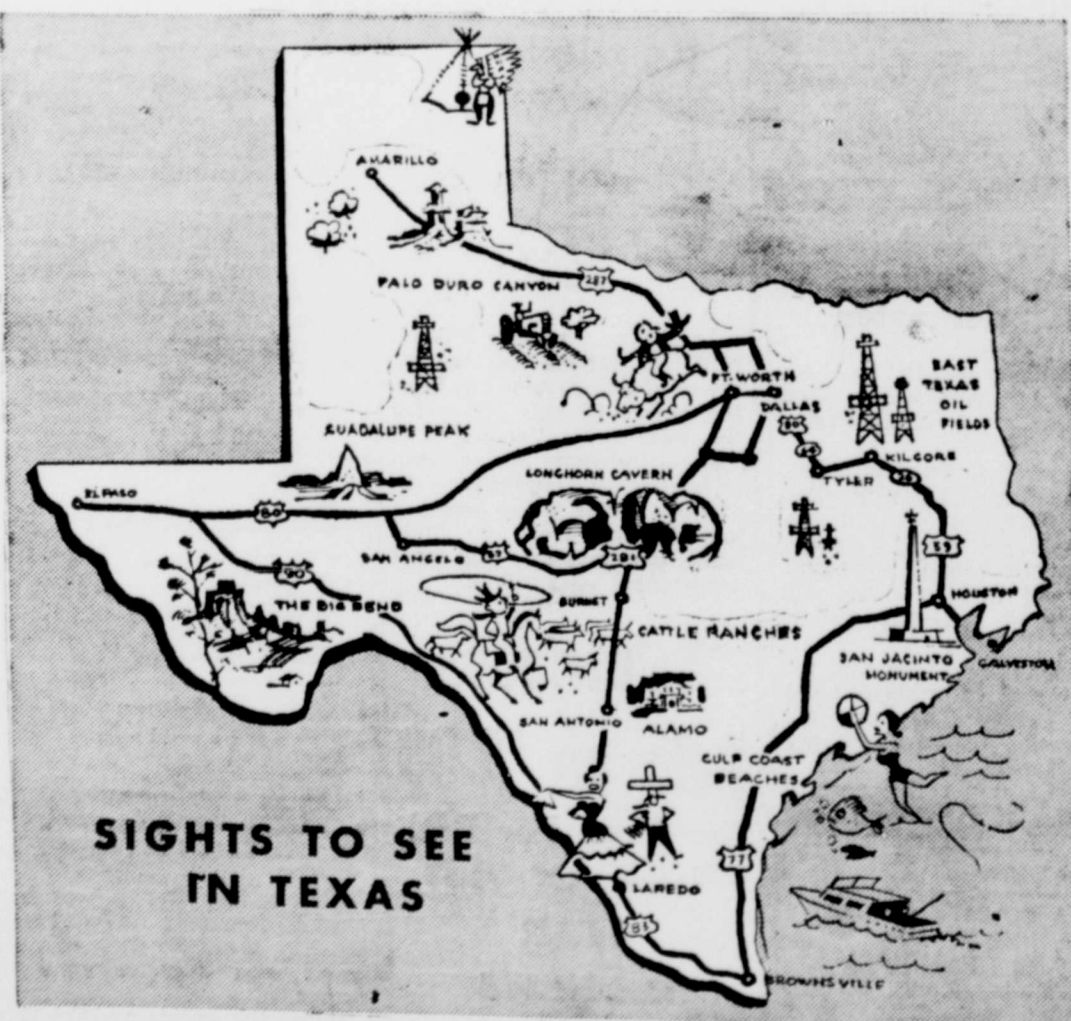

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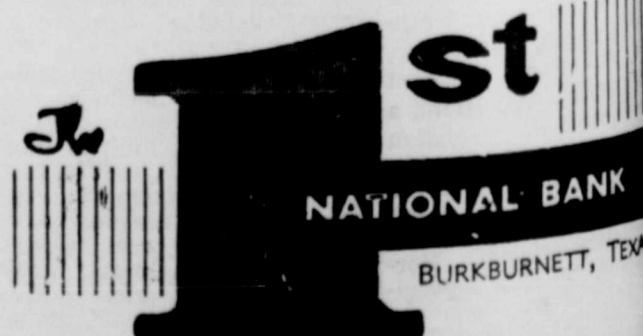

Babson Discusses Looking Ahead Fifty Years

I am thinking today of the changes which have taken place in merely one area of activity since I was a boy—namely, transportation.

Starting with Oxen

My grandfather cut cord wood and hauled it into Gloucester on an ox sled. I felt very smart when I could drive the oxen, guiding them with a stick. This was my first experience in transportation.

My father later started a dry-goods store and had a couple of horses to get goods to his customers. Often he took me on these short trips and I learned to drive horses. Ultimately I drove them in races on the ice. This was my second lesson in transportation.

Finally, when I got married, I bought a new automobile which Henry Ford was just putting on the market for \$398 cash. I later knew Mr. Ford very well; and he told me it took him ten years to raise \$100,000 to start the Ford Motor Company in 1900. Later he had me as his guest when he manufactured his fifteen-millionth automobile. He surely was a wonderful man and remade

America. During more recent years I traveled continually in the trains with steam locomotives that are now curiosities. My trip tomorrow will be from Orlando, Florida, to Boston in four hours by jet, compared with the day and a half it used to take me by train. Or, I am able to cross the ocean in a few hours by jet, against a few days by boat.

Reduction of Travel

Gradually, travel will decline as our imagination is developed. In fact, as the population increases, this will be necessary. Experiments are now being made in connection with Christian Science, parapsychology, telepathy, etc., which should be encouraged. We will soon be content to IMAGINE the places and persons we want to visit or talk with. This will be commonplace fifty years from now. Our imagination will become stronger, aided by TV and photography, and we will travel less but use the telephone much more.

Clothing and Eyesight

We know the billions of radio waves which are in the air and in the rooms where this column is being read. Yet our clothing partly insulates them from our bodies. Perhaps our clothing should contain minute wires serving as millions of "antennas." This might free us from ailments such as arthritis, weak heart, and blood troubles. Many of our physical illnesses may be due to lack of radio waves.

Another field in which I believe great developments will take place is the use of magnifying glasses. I am having one made now three feet in diameter. Our eyes are a wonderful possession, and something really revolutionary could be developed in the way of magnification to help ease the strain which all of us place on our overworked eyes. As I have said in previous columns, however, the greatest changes will come about through some form of television. Before long, TV will give out sunshine and also transmit sunshine. By pressing a button we will be able to get heat, or light, or air conditioning via

The Power of the Brain

en by striking a hard object and hurled through the air. Wire can be cut in short pieces and hurled at bullet speed. Be sure, warns Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent, that the area being mowed is free of such objects and that the mower is constructed so as to prevent objects being hurled toward the operator.

The agent suggests safety measures which, if followed, could prevent many accidents involving lawn mowers and other power tools. Never, they say, try to make adjustments to a mower while the engine is running. It could cost you a finger or hand. It's good business to remove the wire from the spark plug before attempting to repair or adjust the cutting blade or remove accumulations of grass or weeds from under the mower.

Children should never be allowed to operate a mower nor should a person who is barefooted or wearing open toed shoes. The engine should be cool before refueling and if an electric mower is used be sure the extension cord is in perfect condition.

The folks who make lawn and trimming equipment are concerned about the user's safety and have made recommen-

dations to insure a long and useful life for the machine and operator. They put this information in an operator's manual. The agent strongly recommends that all power tool operators become familiar with their manual.

The success you have with your lawn depends largely on the care you give it during the growing season, according to Thelma Wirges. Some of the most important considerations are fertilization, watering, mowing and weed control.

One of the most important and often neglected good lawn practices is the proper feeding of the grass plants on fertilization. If you have not started your fertilizer program, Miss Wirges suggests you do so. She says about half the home owners use some fertilizer each year, but many of them do not use enough to get and keep a healthy, attractive lawn.

Your best indication of the amount of fertilizer needed is to have a soil test made. Or, you can apply enough complete fertilizer to supply two pounds of nitrogen for each 1000 square feet of lawn.

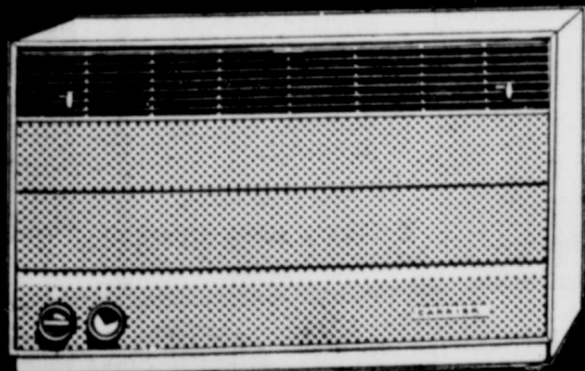

News From The County Agent

Farmers are urged to make weekly cotton insect checks in their cotton fields. Some thrip is showing up on cotton. You may pick up your 1963 Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects at the County Agent's office.

To control bagworms on arbor vitas, you may use a dust or spray. Sprays of lead arsenate, malathion, sevin or toxaphene may be used. If you dust use 4% malathion, 5% sevin or 10% toxaphene.

Texas cotton producers received \$809 million for their 1962 crop. The total income for both lint and seed, as well as total production, fell below the 1961 totals by five and one percent, respectively, but the crop was still the second largest since 1949 when the all-time high of 6 million bales was established.

The Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation has reported the successful completion of its drive to collect \$3 million for screwworm eradication. Tabulations made early this month showed contributions from Texas totaling more than \$2.9 million. Oklahoma reported \$24,000; New Mexico, \$33,500; and Louisiana, \$38,700. A group of California livestock producers donated \$500. Scruggs said quite a few Texas counties have not yet turned in all of the funds that had been collected and workers in other southwestern states indicated additional money was forthcoming.

Farmers in the county are urged to send samples of screw worms to the county agent's office when found in livestock. The sample will be sent to the laboratory at Mission, Texas. One sample was sent last week.

Eggs have their highest quality when first laid and from this point on, explains B. T. Haws, county agent, every quality factor begins to decline.

How fast or slow egg quality declines depends to a large extent on handling and storage practices, says the county agent. The most important is to provide a holding temperature of not more than 55 degrees with a relative humidity of about 80 percent.

If such conditions are maintained, they will materially aid in keeping the original egg quality high for two to two and a half weeks.

Eggs quality can be easily and accurately checked by breaking out a sample, one or two percent from each group, and measuring their Haugh Unit score. This, explains the agent, is the ratio of the albumen height and the egg weight. A score of 72 or better equals grade AA, 55 to 72 is grade A and 31 to 55 is grade B.

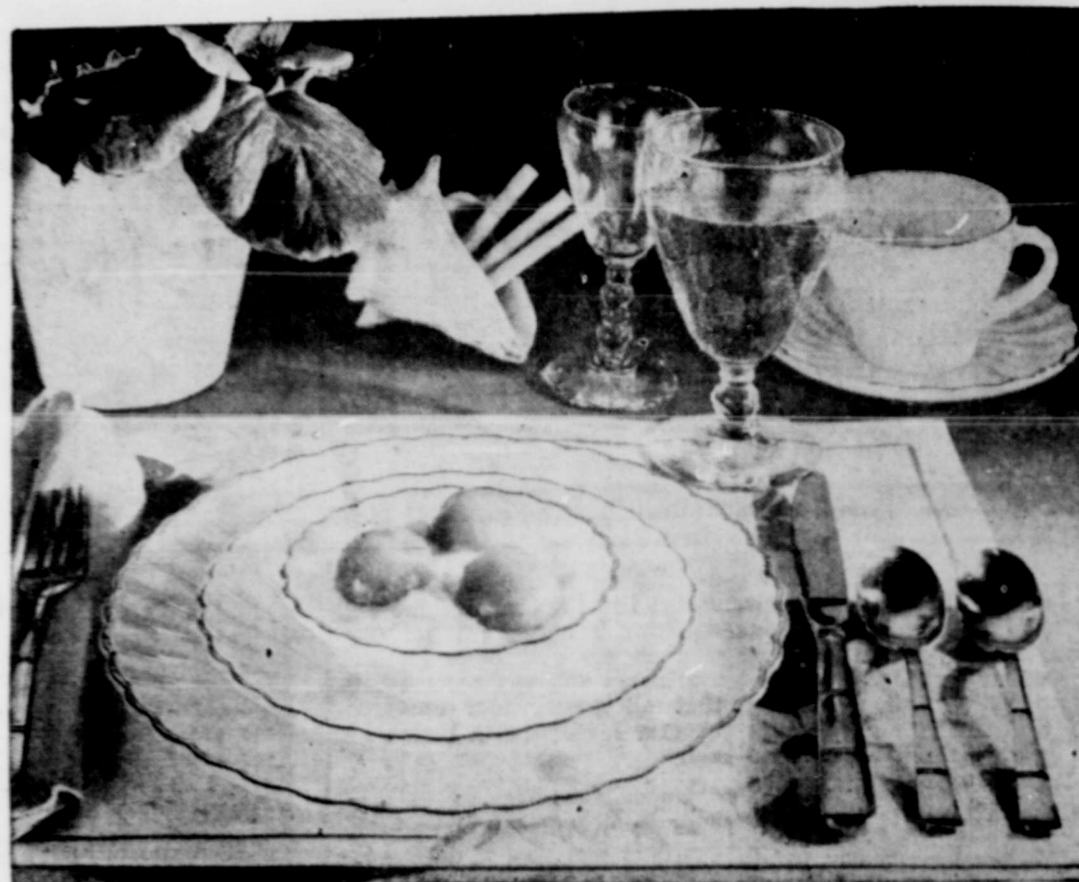
The 1963 Poultry Conference will be held June 19-20 at the Memorial Student Center on the Texas A&M College Campus.

Breeding, health, feeding, environment and management factors that influence bird performance will be the topics of discussion, selected on the basis of current interest and information. Speakers for the conference are from the Poultry Science Department, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Veterinary Microbiology, the Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology, and the Agricultural Engineering Department.
