Highway Wreck Takes One Life

A traffic accident on Highway 271 on the outskirts of Bogata Sunday afternoon claimed the life of Victor Lyman Wilson, eight year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn C. Wilson of Oklahoma City. The child's father was in Red River County Hospital Monday in an undetermined condition with back injuries.

Wilson, accompanied by his wife, the son and a daughter had driven to Shreveport, La., Saturday night to visit Mrs. Wilson's parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Hagan. Wilson and his son were returning to Oklahoma (Mrs. Wilson and the daughter having remained in Shreveport) when the man apparently fell asleep at the wheel. The car struck a culvert in front of the Mrs. Luther White residence.

Besides his parents, the boy is survived by two brothers, a sister and paternal grandparents, all of Oklahoma City, and his maternal grandparents. Mrs. Wilson, Mr. and Mrs. Hagan arrived in Bogata late Sunday, where the body lay in state at Bogata Funeral Home until it was carried to Oklahoma City Tuesday for burial.

Will Drill Offset To Discovery Well East Mt. Vernon

Latest try at confirming production in the Mount Vernon field area is to be put down soon by R. L. Peveto, Tyler.

It will be No. 1 W. F. Alexander, 500 from the north and 330 from the west lines of an 80-acre tract in the Anna Willis survey, A-518. Location is two miles east of Mount Vernon on acreage acquired on a farmout from Atlantic Refining Company. The field discovery well, F. R. Jackson and S. H. Killingsworth No. 1 L. C. Moore, finished in April, is about 1,300 feet southeast.

Murder Charge Filed at Paris

A complaint charging Turner Carter with murder has been filed in Justice Court at Paris before Judge Joe Hammack.

The charge grew out of the fatal shooting Sunday of Gordon Burks, 49-year-old Blossom resident.

Carter, 46, remains in Lamar County jail without bond. His attorney must institute court action before bond could be set.

The complaint, charging Carter with murder with malice, will be considered by the next session of the Sixth District Court Grand Jury for possible indictment.

Burks was fatally wounded by two shots in the chest early Sunday afternoon. The shooting occurred at Carter's home on Highway 82 between Paris and Reno. Officers identified the two men as brothers-in-law.

9 Day Deer Season For Titus County Is Announced

A nine-day deer season in Titus County this year has been approved by the State Wildlife Commission, W. F. Holcomb, chairman of the Mt. Pleasant Chamber of Commerce said Monday.

The new season will run from Nov. 16-24. Bag limit is one buck.

Chairman Holcomb added that his group's request for a May 1-31 Spring squirrel season was not approved by the commission. The Commission denied this request, Holcomb said, on the basis of a census last year. According to the census, there are only 1.8 squirrels to the acre in Titus compared to 5.8 squirrels per acre in an adjoining county which did not have a spring season.

Fall squirrel season as approved by the Commission will run from Oct. 1 to Dec. 31, both days inclusive.

L. F. Benson Loses Race in Galveston

Galveston.—District Attorney Louis Benson, former Mount Pleasant attorney and Deputy school superintendent, has lost his chance for a second term in office.

He was defeated by former district attorney, Marsene Johnson who polled 5569 votes and Johnson's former first assistant Jules Damiani who tallied the largest number of votes in the three-way Saturday Democratic Primary race, 8918.

Benson who swept to victory over Johnson two years ago on a campaign of "Let's make murder a crime in Galveston County" polled 5275 votes.

His victory was called amazing by political observers two years ago, primarily because he was a newcomer.

OFFICIAL TITUS CO. ELECTION FIGURES, TALCO, MAPLE SPRINGS

Over 4500 cast their votes in Titus County last Saturday for the candidates of their choice. There will be a runoff in the County Superintendent race between Morris (Buddie) Davis and Weldon Nelson; for Commissioner in Precinct 2 between B. B. Hunnicutt and J. Q. Roper, and a runoff between Jim Ponder and Dan Bynum for Commissioner in Precinct 4.

James V. Adams, seeking his first term as a member of the House of Representatives, defeated J. J. Womack.

The totals showed Adams with 6,308 votes to 3,399 for Womack. Adams polled 3,435 votes in Titus County, 1,115 in Camp County, and 1,758 in Red River County. Womack's vote was 873 in Titus, 763 in Camp, and 1,763 in Red River.

County Judge Harry Taylor, incumbent, led the three-man field in his campaign for re-election, receiving 3002. Carl Pittman polled 1057, as second high man, Clyde Holcomb running third with 459.

One of the closest votes was that between the top men for county superintendent, Morris Buddie Davis receiving 1595 to Paul Blackard's 1431, Weldon Nelson's total being 1458. Davis and Nelson will enter the run-off.

For commissioner, Precinct 2, R. P. (Cap) Hunnicutt topped J. Q. Roper, the incumbent by eight votes, 169 to 161, Bert P. Parr being a close third with 150, and Allen (Dock) Redearn trailing with 69.

In Precinct 4, a bare 18 votes separated J. M. Ponder and Dan Bynum, who received 274 and 256, respectively, Morris Stevens receiving 40.

Allen LaPrade topped Hugh Cross for district clerk, with 2771 votes, Cross receiving 1531, while Cecil Franklin, incumbent county treasurer, won out over Clarence Clark, 2344 to 2134.

Titus County returns in state races will be found in the tabulated figures.

Talco voters had two boxes to use this year — the North in charge of J. L. Cato at the City Hall and the South at Calvary Baptist Church, whose election judge is Mrs. L. R. Miller. Talco voted less than half its strength last Saturday, about 276 votes being polled in both boxes.

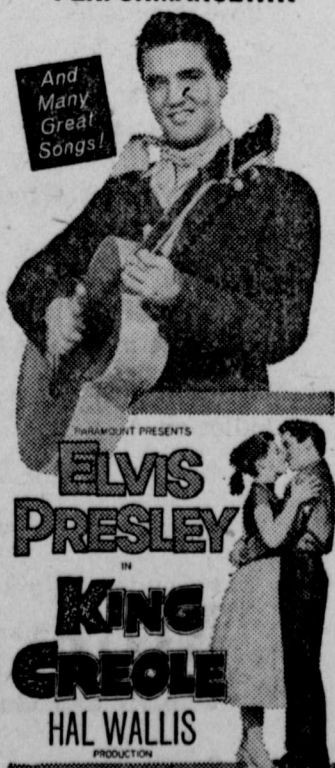

THE FIRST OPINION POLL

From now until next November it is going to become increasingly difficult for you to keep your thoughts to yourself. Thousands of opinion poll takers will be roaming the country and your mail will be peppered with questionnaires.

Washington, in particular, will want to know what you think about almost everything under the sun. The reason, of course, is that this is an election year for 32 U. S. Senators and 435 Representatives.

One enterprising Congressman who is convinced the early bird gets the vote already has conducted a poll of his constituents on what he lists as the 20 most important questions facing the nation. He is up-state New York Rep. Harold C. Ostertag.

He received 7,232 replies to questions calling for "yes," "no," or "undecided" answers. The questions, and the percentages of "yes" and "no" answers give him a pretty good idea of what his voters are thinking.

Do you favor increased Federal aid for science education? Yes, 67.6%; no, 28.5%.

Should Congress enact a Presidential disability law? Yes, 76%; no, 17.4%.

Do you favor pay television? Yes, 8.3%; no, 87.7%.

Two More States?

Do you favor statehood for Hawaii (yes, 81.7%; no, 12.5%) and Alaska (yes, 85.3%; no, 9%)?

Do you favor increased postage rates? Yes, 70.1%; no, 26.3%.

Do you favor increased pay for postal workers? Yes, 70.1%; no, 26.3%.

Should Congress enact legislation to place union welfare and pension funds under federal control? Yes, 66.2%; no, 24.1%.

Should the minimum wage be

increased above \$1 an hour? Yes and no each 46.8%.

Should the Social Security law be amended to raise the \$1,200 earnings ceiling? Yes, 60.1%; no, 22.5%.

Do you favor increasing the \$4,200 social security tax base if benefits are also raised? Yes, 53.1%; no, 38.4%.

Do you favor reducing non-military Federal spending to permit a tax cut? Yes, 62.1%; no, 30.8%.

Do you favor 60% to 90% farm price supports, with increased acreage allotments, instead of the present 75% to 90% supports? Yes, 27.6%; no, 52.1%.

Should the soil bank conservation reserve be continued? Yes, 41.6%; no, 34.1%. The acreage reserve? Yes, 25.2%; no, 48.1%.

Should atomic energy for peaceful purposes be developed by the federal government (11.1%); by private enterprise (27.3%) or a partnership of both (57.3%)?

Civil Defense Shelters?

Do you favor a multi-billion dollar building of defense shelters? Yes, 26.3%; no, 64.9%.

Should we continue our foreign aid program: Military assistance? Yes, 56.3%; no, 33.1%. Economic assistance? Yes, 60.6%; no, 30.3%.

Should we exchange atomic weapons information with our allies? Yes, 58.2%; no, 32.8%.

Do you favor closer cooperation with NATO countries? Yes, 80.1%; no, 13.8%.

Do you favor increased cultural and commercial relations with Russia? Yes, 52.6%; no, 39.1%.

Do you believe we should negotiate with Russia on disarmament and world political problems? Yes, 57.9%; no, 34.2%.

Doctor Urges Use Salk Vaccine

Towns in North Texas and Oklahoma have recently reported their first case of polio occurring within more than a year. We are definitely in the polio season and no one can foretell when cases will occur in Paris, says Lane B. Cooke, M. D., director of Lamar County Health Department.

Everyone from six months to 40 years of age needs the protection conferred by Salk vaccine. This was stressed by Surgeon General Burney in a radio interview on "Youth Wants to Know" Sunday afternoon. Doctor Burney also said that children who have had three doses of Salk vaccine over a year ago should have a fourth or booster dose now.

More cases of paralytic polio are occurring in persons over 20 years of age than in those under 20. Vaccination of all persons from six months to 40 years of age is now being urged by all doctors from the Surgeon General of the U. S. Public Health Service to your own family physician. Salk vaccine was never in such unlimited supply as at this time. Call your family doctor or the Health Department now, says Cooke.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #48—Number Five on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by Charter Provision and a general law city operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby; providing for an election, a form of ballot and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section II of Article XI and to read as follows:

"Section II. A Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby."

"Provided, however, if any of such officers, elective or appointive, shall announce their candidacy, or shall in fact become a candidate in any general, special or primary election, for any office of profit or trust under the laws of this State or the United States other than the office then held, at any time when the unexpired term of the office then held shall exceed one (1) year, such announcement or such candidacy shall constitute an automatic resignation of the office then held, and the vacancy thereby created shall be filled pursuant to law in the same manner as other vacancies for such office are filled."

"A municipality so providing a term exceeding two (2) years but not exceeding four (4) years for any of its non-civil service officers must elect all of the members of its governing body

by majority vote of the qualified voters in such municipality, and any vacancy or vacancies occurring on such governing body shall not be filled by appointment but must be filled by majority vote of the qualified voters at a special election called for such purpose within one hundred and twenty (120) days after such vacancy or vacancies occur."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
