they contained and carried away
merchandise.

heaviest loser where \$125 in cash
and clothes were taken. All of
the change was taken and in ad-
dition two suits of clothing, several
pairs of shoes and other merchan-
dise.

Entrance was made by breaking
out one of the windows in the rear,
the robbers leaving through the back
door.

The thieves gained entrance in
a like manner at the Wilson-Daley

tained about \$10.00 in change. Noth-

scared away or afraid to operate

GAS LINE COM- PLETE FRIDAY

CANADIAN RIVER CROSSING
WAS FINISHED THURS-
DAY MORNING; TO
TEST MONDAY

According to Tom Cook of the
Public Service Corporation of Tex-
as, the gas line from Canadian to
Perryton will be completed some-
time Friday or Saturday and will
be ready for the test by the first
of the week. The Canadian river
crossing was finished early
Thursday morning and the crews
will finish welding the line Thurs-
day and Friday it is expected.

The testing of the line will per-
haps take two or three days accord-
ing to Mr. Cook at the end of which
time gas will be turned into the
city mains for testing. Service will
be started as soon as the testing
has been completed satisfactorily.

An entire carload of gas meters
has been received and unloaded and
as soon as the test is made they will
be installed and Perryton homes and
business houses will be connected
with gas.

Selling Dairy Stock

Fine Dairy Herd of F. C. Spencer
To Be Sold At Public Auction
Next Thursday

A public auction sale and will no
doubt attract dairy breeders and op-
erators over this section of the
southwest will be held at the F. C.
Spencer place, six miles south and
one mile east of Perryton next
Thursday, October 31, the sale start-
ing at 10:00 o'clock.

Mr. Spencer's entire herd of reg-
istered and high grade Holstein and
Jersey stock will be disposed of at
auction. The sale was forced by
the big fire at the Spencer place a
short time ago, when the big dairy
barn was burned, all their feed lost
and their milking equipment de-
stroyed.

Included in the sale are forty head
of dairy stock of Butterby King
and Pontiac breeding, thirty-three
head of horses, many of them regis-
tered Percheron stock and some im-
plements and household goods.

WALKS HOLD UP MAIL DELIVERY

LARGE PORTION OF CITY IS
INCLUDED IN AREA TO
GET FREE MAIL
DELIVERY

Lack of sidewalks is the one draw-
back that is holding up the establish-
ing of free city mail delivery in
Perryton, it is reported, following
the inspection of the city by post-
al officials recently. A large por-
tion of the city was included in the
first temporary plans to receive the
service if it is approved.

Whether or not Perryton gets free
delivery will depend largely on the
action of property owners within
the next few weeks in regard to the
putting in of sidewalks.

According to a map prepared for
the inspection, a large portion of
the city is included in the survey,
including all of the business district
and most of the residential section
of the city. The route is bounded
as follows: Brillhart street east to
Wilson street, both sides of Wilson
to Wilsey avenue and extended on
to North avenue on the west side
of Wilson street only.

On North avenue, west to Main
and then south to Rhodes avenue,
west one block on Rhodes then one
block south on McLarty serving
both sides of the street, west to
Wyman and north to Rhodes. On
West to Cox, then south to Missouri,
west on Missouri to Texas, north to
Rhodes, west to Canadian, north
on Canadian serving both sides to
North avenue, east to Cox street and
north to Brillhart and east on Brill-
hart to the beginning.

All of this area surrounded is
included in the survey. The tempo-
rary plans call for two deliveries
in the business district and one de-
livery in the residential districts.

While this route has not yet been
approved, it is practically assured
providing property owners put in
the required walks. The city coun-
cil has promised to put up the street
markers which is also required. J.
C. Beever is chairman of a commit-
tee to make an effort to get
property owners to put in side-
walks.

LAUNDRY TO BE RUNNING SOON

EXPECT TO BE READY FOR
OPENING WITHIN NEXT
THREE OR FOUR
WEEKS

Failure of machinery houses to
ship equipment has been the cause
of the delay in the opening of the
Perryton Laundry, according to B. M.
Mabon, formerly of Dalhart, who is
in charge of the new concern but
it is expected to have the laundry
in operation sometime between No-
vember 15 and December 1.

Mr. Mabon states that they wired
for the machinery several weeks
ago but that only recently a letter
was received stating that the equip-
ment would be shipped from the fac-
tory on Thursday of this week. Prac-
tically everything in the laundry is
new and of the latest type.

The new building is practically
finished with the exception of some
stucco work on the outside. Two
new Dodge trucks have been pur-
chased, one to be used for city de-
livery and the other for out-of-town
routes.

Mr. Mabon states that with the
new equipment the laundry will be
able to offer all kinds of service, in-
cluding cleaning and pressing, and
will be ample size to take care of
Perryton and the surrounding ter-
ritory.

Rangers Tie Fifty-One Knots in Panther's T

HEAVY FIELD NO DRAWBACK

FOLLETT HOPELESSLY OUT-CLASSED AND UNABLE TO SCORE AGAINST RANGERS

A heavy, slick sod field that had been soaked with the intermittent showers throughout the day, proved no drawback to the flashy Ranger squad who raced down the field for eight touchdowns and a total of 31 points against the Pollett Panthers, Friday afternoon, winning the right to play the winner of the south half of this section for the championship.

Pollett not only remained scoreless throughout the game, but gained as well, losing more yards from scrimmage than was gained and making but one first down while the Rangers rolled up twenty-three. The Rangers made a total of 364 yards, losing 7 yards, showing a net gain of 357 yards from 88 offensive plays. The Panthers were able to gain but 20 yards, losing 47, showing a net loss of 27 yards from 30 offensive plays.

Russell kicked off for the Panthers to Shearer on the 30 yard line, who lugged the ball to the 49 yard line. The Rangers took the Panthers off their guard when Witt heaved a long pass that was snagged by Coffee who raced down the field only to slip and fall on the 15 yard stripe, making a 36 yard gain and a first down. M. Tucker tore through right guard for a 2 yard gain. A short pass to L. Tucker was completed for a 4 yard gain. Another pass from the hand of Shearer, bounced off of M. Tucker's fingers and hit over the goal line, the ball going to the Panthers on the 30 yard line.

Panthers Cannot Gain.
Pollett tries a pass but it is broken up, and they call time out. Elmore hits a solid wall of men at right guard and does not gain. He tries it again but loses a yard in the attempt. Russell punts outside on the Panther 39 yard mark.

The Panthers are on the look-out for a pass but if they cannot break up the long one Marion tosses to Shearer which is good for 27 yards and a first down. Witt pounds through right tackle for six good yards. Marion hits the same spot for 3 more. Shearer makes a small gain through the left side of the line, but it falls short by a few inches. Marion slips through the hole opened up at right tackle for the remaining 3 yards and the first Ranger touchdown without letting a man touch him, the Rangers scoring in the first 5 minutes of play. Lee Tucker fails to lift the heavy, wet ball over the cross bars in the try for point.

Rangers Play Flashy Game.
Bruner makes a 45 yard kickoff to the Panther quarter who is downed after a brilliant 19 yard return. Russell fails to gain through the right side of the line. Teter tries the left tackle but is thrown for a 4 yard loss. Elmore likewise fails to gain through right tackle, but the referee calls both lines offside, the down remaining the same. Elmore flips the ball to Harris for a completed pass and a 6 yard gain. Russell punts to Shearer on the Rangers 36 yard stripe, who returns to the 43 yard line.

Marion races around right end for 14 yard run and a first down. Shearer slips through right tackle for 3 yards. A pass, Shearer to Marion is incomplete. Witt fights his way through right tackle for 6 yards. Shearer punts over the goal line for a touchback, the ball going to play on the 20 yard mark.

Quarter Ends 6 to 0.
Harrelson shows a foot gain through left guard. The Panthers lose a yard on a fake end run with Elmore carrying the ball. Russell tried the line but cannot gain and then punts to Shearer on the Panther 46 yard line, who slips and falls on the wet field.

Witt's pass is incomplete for the first down. Marion breaks through right tackle for 3 yards. Witt plunges through left tackle for 3 more as the quarter ends with the score still 6 to 0.

Touchdown In 3 Minutes.
Play is resumed when Shearer punts outside on the Panther 19 yard line. Teter fumbles when he tries to go through the left side of the line and Brewer recovers. Marion hits around right end for a 10 yard gain and a first down. Shearer fumbles but picks up the ball and gains 3 yards through left

tackle. Witt drives through right tackle for 3 yards. Shearer loses a couple around left end. Marion takes the ball from a fake pass formation and lugs it around right end for the second Ranger touchdown, just three minutes after the start of the second period. Lee fails to kick goal.

Pollett substitutes Hicks for Russell in the backfield. Bruner's kickoff goes to Teter on the 20 yard stripe who makes a pretty 17 yard return, but they are penalized 15 yards when Hicks failed to report. Elmore made a yard through right tackle. Another play through the line showed no gain. Teter added another yard around left end.

Makes Touchdown From Punt.
On the last down the Panthers punted to Shearer on the 45 yard line who ran behind perfect interference down the field and across the goal line for the Ranger's third touchdown. Lee added a point by kicking goal.

Bruner kicked off to Elmore who made a 17 yard return after receiving the ball on the 30 yard stripe. Elmore passed on the first down and Lee went up in the air after it, snagging it by the finger tips, and was downed on the 46 yard line.

Can't Stop Rangers.
Witt lugged the first one through right tackle for a 5 yard advance. Lee hits off left tackle for 3 more. Marion's pass to Shearer is incomplete. Marion rips through center for 5 yards and a first down. A pass, Shearer to Lee is incomplete. It takes the entire Panther backfield to stop Witt's 12 yard charge around right end for a first down.

The Rangers call time out for Bruner who is injured. Pollett substitutes Courtney for Hicks. Shearer plunges through left tackle for a yard gain. Witt pounds through the right side for 5 more. Marion's plunge through right guard lacks few inches of making a first down but Shearer fixes that by slipping through center for 3 yards on the next down.

Witt Lugs Ball Over.
With 9 yards to go, Witt grabs the oval and lugs it around left end for the required yards and the fourth Ranger counter. Lee fails to boot the ball between the posts for the added point.

The Rangers substitute Schollenberger for Bruner at tackle. While Lee is preparing the kickoff, Dean, Garrison and Sultor are run in for Coffee, Christopher and Skeen in the Ranger lineup. The kickoff is caught on the Panther 25 yard line and the runner downed on the 33 yard line. On the first down, Pollett fumbles in a line play, Brewer gathering in the elusive pigskin.

Shearer hits left tackle for a 3 yard play. Witt makes another yard through the same place. Lee tears through right tackle for 5 more as the half ended with the ball on the 25 yard mark the score 25 to 0 in the Ranger's favor.

Aerial Attack Fails.
After the half Bruner, Coffee and Christopher go in for Dean, Garrison and Sultor. Bruner's kickoff to the 24 yard line is nabbed by Elmore who makes a 7 yard return. After changing signals and going into a huddle for the second time, the referee penalizes the Panthers 5 yards for delay. Pollett attempts an aerial attack, but two straight passes are incomplete and they get another 5 yard penalty. Elmore makes a 3 yard gain around left end. Pollett punts to the center tape where Shearer grabs it, running out of bounds on the 44 yard line.

Marion makes 5 yards and Witt 3 yards in two successive plays through right tackle. Witt makes 2 more through left tackle and Shearer makes it a first down with his 3 yard advance around right end. Witt makes a path around left end, pushing the ball 6 yards further along. A backfield pass, Marion to Lee shows a small gain. Marion clips around right end for 11 yards and a first down.

Lee Tucker Makes T. D.
It takes three downs for the Rangers to make the remaining 14 yards. Lee lugging the oval around left end for 4 of them. Witt hammering through right tackle for 5 more and Lee slipping through the same hole for the other 5 and the Ranger's fifth counter. Bruner's kick fails but he is allowed to kick again when both lines are offside, the second boot likewise failing.

Bruner makes a 34 yard kickoff to Elmore who returns 9 yards. On three successive plays the Panthers are pushed back, Courtney losing 3 yards on an attempt at right tackle. Elmore losing 2 more on a like play while Harrelson was thrown for a 3 yard loss around right end. The Panthers are forced to punt, Shearer taking the boot on his 46 yard mark and returning to the Panther's 34. Pollett was penalized 15 yards for slugging.

Marion Gets His Third.
Marion charged around right end for a 15 yard advance, downed on the 4 yard stripe. For the first time the Panthers defense to hold the Rangers for downs. Witt's drive through right tackle was good for 3

yards but it took 3 downs to make the other yard. Witt gained two feet in two tries at right guard. Marion finally breaking through for the other foot on the last down, making his third touchdown and the Ranger's sixth. Lee boots the ball squarely between the posts for the added point.

Pollett chooses to kickoff, booting the ball to the 26 yard mark, the Rangers getting a 5 yard return. Marion cuts through left tackle for 3 yards, just as the whistle sounded. Score, Rangers 38, Panthers 0.

Makes Long Gains.
The whistle for the start of the final period blows but the Rangers call timeout until a player's hand can be taped. Play is resumed and Marion makes a first down with a 13 yard run around right end. Witt pounds through right tackle for 3 yards. Shearer trots around left end for 5 more and Lee's 3 yard plunge through right tackle make another first down.

Marion again races around right end for a first down, showing a 12 yard advance. Shearer hooks Marion's long forward pass for a 17 yard gain, falling out of bounds when he is tackled. Witt pounds the right side of the line for 7 yards. Shearer adds a yard through right guard. Lee slips on the wet grass when he attempts to circle left end and loses 5 yards. A long pass from Marion is grabbed by Shearer across the goal for the seventh Ranger touchdown. Bruner's toe adds a point as the pigskin goes between the uprights.

Follett Gets First Down.
Bruner makes a 30 yard kick to A. E. Frazier to the 37 yard mark. Teter fails to gain through line. Elmore loses 2 yards around right end. The Rangers substitute Schockley for Brewer. The Rangers are penalized 15 yards for talking. Dean is substituted for Schockley before a play is made.

On the next down a 10 yard forward pass is completed for the only Pollett first down of the game, and the first time they had the ball in Ranger territory, advancing to the 40 yard line.

Panthers Lose 30 Yards.
On the next four downs, the Rangers charged through the line throwing the Panther backfield for nearly 30 yards loss. Courtney lost 3 yards on the first attempt through the line. Elmore lost a yard around left end. Elmore tries to pass, but

it downed for a 12 yard loss before he can get the ball out of his hands. On the final down, Pollett attempts to punt but the Rangers are on him before he can boot the ball and he is downed for a 13 yard loss. In four plays the Panthers were driven back from the Ranger 40 yard line to their own 31 yard stripe, losing the ball on downs.

Shearer fumbles but Marion grabs the pigskin and passes to Witt but it is incomplete. Witt makes a couple of yards around right end. Timeout is called by the Panthers for Miller, who is injured. Lee races around right end for 8 yards and a first down. Witt tears through right tackle for 2 yards, falling outside.

Pass Over Goal Line.
From the 19 yard line, Marion passes to Shearer over the goal line for the eighth Ranger counter a long perfect pass that Shearer grabbed with his fingertips. Bruner place kicks, but the oval hits one of the uprights and bounces back.

Before the kickoff the Rangers substitute Withers, Hamker and Sultor for Coffee, Skeen and Christopher. Pollett kickoff to Lee on the 28 yard line. Lee making a beautiful run to the 45 yard stripe where he was dumped. Shearer hit the line for a long yard. The Rangers substitute Schockley for Shearer. A pass, Witt to Withers is incomplete. Lee pounds through right tackle for a 9 yard advance and a first down just as the final whistle blows and the game ends with the score 51 to 0 in favor of the Rangers.

THE GAME FROM THE SIDELINES.
There's no use denying, the result of the Ranger-Panther game was quite a surprise. Of course Perryton expected the Rangers to win, but not by such a margin. Pollett was also expecting to win and their cheering section was back of them until the final whistle sounded.

The rain Friday, and the heavy field was expected to slow down the Rangers' speed, but it wasn't so noticeable. The teams were well matched for weight, Coach J. L. Hill stating before the game began that his starting lineup would average 140 pounds.

About all that can be said is that the Panthers were hopelessly out-classed. They may have looked mighty good against Shattuck when they beat them by a 7 to 6 score the week before, but the Rangers showed them up.

There was only one time when they were able to get in Ranger territory, that was in the last quarter when a 15 yard Ranger penalty and a 10 yard pass gave them a first down advancing to our 40 yard line. However on the following

four plays they were driven back for 29 yards in losses. During the rest of the game the Panthers never crossed their own 37 yard line with the ball in their possession. Marion Tucker and Ralph Shearer toted the pigskin across the Panther goal three times each, Lee Tucker and Witt getting one each. Lee kicked two of the goals and Bruner one.

The surprise the fans got at the result of the game was nothing compared with surprise written on Marion's face when he went through the middle of the Ranger line for the first touchdown, without hitting a man.

And right here we want to say something about the Ranger line. Coffee, Brewer and Skeen must have been opening up some real holes through the right side of the line, judging from the long gain made off-tackle and around end.

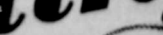

FARM GASOLINE TAX IS EXEMPT FROM TAX IN STATE OF OKLAHOMA

On and after October 3, Oklahoma farmers who burn gasoline in their tractors and stationary engines and who use such engines "exclusively for agricultural purposes," will be exempt from the payment of the 4-cent tax.

Some taxpayers have said that it is going to be easy to use farm fuel in automobiles. It won't be so easy according to an explanation of the law and the way it is to operate, appearing in the October 1 issue of the Oklahoma Farmer-Slackman. The corporation commission will soon have a check on the consumption of different makes of tractors, depending on their horsepower. Already such figures have been acquired from manufacturers. By a comparison of gallons used in a certain tractor of a certain horsepower with the number of acres plowed, drilled or harvested, it will bring to light unreasonable consumption of gasoline, considering the work done.

The farmer who buys tax exempt gasoline will be required to make affidavit that such gasoline will be used only for agricultural purposes as defined by the law.

The dealer must also make an affidavit concerning the use of tax exempt fuel. He is subject to fines and jail sentences if he knowingly makes a false affidavit. His knowledge of a farmers usual fuel consumption and acreage handled will place him in a position of responsibility and liability when it comes to joining with farmers in making the affidavit to be submitted to the corporation commission.

Here are a few questions that are certain to come up: Is gasoline used

in a truck for hauling wheat or cotton to be exempt? It is not because exempt gasoline must be used in tractors or stationary engines, not in trucks.

Is gasoline used in the operation of a country grain elevator exempt? It is not, says the attorney general. Elevators are operated for commercial purposes and not as an agricultural machine.

Administrative officers say that engines used on the farm for pumping water, running light plants, hay-balers, ensilage cutters, home threshing machines, corn shellers and similar machinery may use exempt fuel. When any of those machines are used for hire in connection with another man's crop or farming, they become commercial machines operated for revenue and not a farm machine and must pay the tax on fuel they burn, according to officials. Farmers operating their own co-op threshing machine may use

exempt fuel as long as it is for themselves. When it is for someone else, the exemption does not apply. A co-operative run by a gasoline engine does not use exempt fuel, say
