marketing specialist Kathy Harmon about the Howard County United Way. "Their contributions have been astounding and so generous, but we serve a lot of kids in Howard County so we certainly need it."

CASA, or Court Appointed Special Advocates, is a volunteer-based organization that advocates for children who are in the foster care system. Volunteers

are appointed to specific cases by a judge to ensure the child's needs are met while in foster care.

"We are different from other non-profits in that we have a staff and administrative staff and that their whole job is to support volunteers," said Harmon. "So the volunteers are essential to our whole organization. Our goal is to support them. We wouldn't be here without them."

CASA of West Texas operates in seven counties including Midland, Howard, Martin, Daw-

son, Gaines, Andrews, and Glasscock.

"We are able to use it (funds from United Way) for operating which enables us to have an office in Big Spring," said Harmon. "We have an office on Gregg Street. We have five employees in Big Spring. They serve Howard County and they usually do Dawson and Gaines County."

And while Big Spring has around 20 or so volunteers, according to Harmon, they are always on the lookout for more.

"There are 136 children in foster care just from Howard County, and that was in 2015," said Harmon. "In Midland we have 185 and Big Spring has 136. Comparing the population, its a very high number."

"Our goal is that every child has a CASA advocate," continued Harmon. "There has been research that they have better outcomes, especially their educational outcomes, and they get out of foster care sooner."

According to Harmon, on the average a volunteer spends anywhere from 5-7 hours a month volunteering for CASA.

"A lot of time, it can be done over the phone or email," said Harmon. "But they do visit the child regularly and develop a relationship with a child. They're the one constant person in the case."

Building a life in Germany, a Syrian watches war at home

SAARBRUECKEN, Germany (AP) — At the intersection, Mohammed al-Haj waited patiently for the “green man.” It seemed a bit silly: No cars were coming, no policemen watching. Back home in Syria, he wouldn’t hesitate.

But here in Germany, it’s the law, you only cross when the walk light is green.

“I don’t want to get into the habit of not waiting for him,” said the 27-year-old Mohammed. “We must all respect German customs and traditions.”

This is one world Mohammed lives in, one guided by rules, where he says he knows his rights and his responsibilities. It’s a world where he can be ambitious and plan for the future, even as he tries to negotiate his place in a country where he arrived a year ago among hundreds of thousands of refugees fleeing to Western Europe.

“I felt from the first day, that this is a country of law and order,” he said.

Mall shooting suspect: ‘Creepy,’ multiple arrests, disputes

OAK HARBOR, Wash. (AP) — The 20-year-old man suspected of killing five people with a rifle at a Macy’s makeup counter had a string of run-ins with the law in recent years, including charges he assaulted his stepfather, and was described by a neighbor as so “creepy, rude and obnoxious” that she kept a Taser by her front door.

As investigators tried to piece together information on Arcan Cetin, who was arrested Saturday evening after a nearly 24-hour manhunt, a picture emerged of a troubled young man. Court records show more than a half-dozen criminal cases in Island County alone since 2013.

Authorities said the gunman in the attack at the Cascade Mall in Burlington opened fire in the department store’s cosmetics department Friday night, killing a man and four females ranging from a teenager to a senior citizen. The killer then fled.

Cetin said nothing and appeared “zombie-like” when he was taken into custody on a sidewalk outside his apartment complex some 30 miles away in Oak Harbor by a sheriff’s officer who recognized him as the suspect in the rampage, authorities said.

Cetin immigrated to the U.S. from Turkey and is a legal permanent resident, officials said.

Charlotte ends curfew imposed after man shot by police

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Charlotte lifted its midnight curfew, signaling movement toward normalcy after a state of emergency was imposed after the shooting death of a black man by police last week that brought National Guard troops and armored vehicles to downtown street corners.

A weekend without street violence was highlighted Sunday as the city hosted the NFL game between the Carolina Panthers and the Minnesota Vikings without interruption.

Still, protests continued for a sixth day since 43-year-old Keith Lamont Scott was shot and killed Tuesday after a confrontation with Charlotte police. The first two nights of protests were violent, with demonstrators smashing windows, blocking part of an interstate through downtown, and burning the contents of a tractor-trailer. More than a dozen police officers were injured.

Protesters clambered onto Interstate 277 through the city’s downtown Sunday night and tried to block traffic until police arrived. The protesters ran, but one fell in front of an all-terrain vehicle operated by a Greensboro police officer helping the Charlotte force, Charlotte-Mecklenburg police said. The protester, 26-year-old Donnell Jones of Missouri, was not hurt and was charged with disorderly conduct and resisting arrest, police said.

Earlier Sunday, about 100 demonstrators gathered across the street from Bank of America Stadium before the football game to protest the Scott shooting. They were surrounded by at least two dozen police officers on bicycles.

Bomb case is latest hardship for NJ’s large Muslim community

PATERSON, N.J. (AP) — At the Islamic Center of Passaic County, which draws about 2,000 people each Friday for communal prayers, the talk is about how this year is different.

After the Sept. 11, 2001, terror attacks, people of other faiths in the surrounding community were generally able to see the difference between the radical perpetrators and American Muslims, said Omar Awad, president of the center. But he suggested that distinction seems to be blurring in the public mind amid the anti-Muslim rhetoric of the presidential campaign and growing anger over terrorist strikes in Europe and the United States, the latest allegedly plotted by a New Jersey Muslim.

“They’re trying to strike

fear between neighbors, between the very fabric of society that we spent so much time trying to make sure that we knitted,” said Awad, a New Jersey native, sitting in the offices of the 27-year-old Pater-son mosque.

Like Muslims around the country, New Jersey’s have been slogging through a particularly painful year.

On the campaign trail, the Republican presidential nominee, Donald Trump, falsely claimed that Muslims in Jersey City celebrated when the World Trade Center fell, as he sought to promote a proposed national database for Muslims.

Donald who? Most N. Koreans don’t know, care about US polls

PYONGYANG, North Korea (AP) — With a tightly controlled state media, little access to outside information and a deeply instilled belief that whoever runs the White House is bound to be their sworn enemy, North Koreans aren’t expecting much from the U.S. presidential elections — if they know about them at all.

Say the name Donald Trump to most North Koreans and you will get a blank stare. Same goes for Hillary, though some remember the name Clinton. Some remember that Bill Clinton was, as U.S. presidents go, a little more willing to engage with their country than most, though that was long, long ago and didn’t last very long. President George W. Bush quickly rolled that back and declared North Korea part of the “axis of evil.”

“I don’t know about the U.S. elections and I don’t care,” said Kim Un Byol, a 27-year-old office worker in Pyongyang. “As long as we have Marshall Kim Jong Un and nuclear weapons, we have nothing to worry about.”

The outcome of the U.S. elections in November could have major ramifications for North Korea — or maybe bring more of the same. It’s far from clear how either presidential candidate intends to deal with Pyongyang, or how Pyongyang will deal with a new administration in Washington.

For the most part, the state-run media has been quiet on the topic.

Colombia to sign historic peace deal on ending long conflict

CARTAGENA, Colombia (AP) — Colombia will take a big step toward emerging from its long nightmare of bloody violence Monday when the government and the country’s largest rebel movement sign a peace accord that emerged from four

hard years of negotiations.

The significance of the deal can’t be overstated: Colombia’s five-decade conflict, partly fueled by the nation’s cocaine trade, has killed more than 220,000 people and driven 8 million from their homes.

Underlining the importance of the day, the pact is being signed by Colombian President Juan Manuel Santos and by the top commander of the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia, a rebel fighter known by the alias Timochenko.

Prescott solid as Dallas rolls

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Maybe the Cowboys will be OK without quarterback Tony Romo this time. The future of the Dallas running game with Ezekiel Elliott looks pretty good, too.

Dak Prescott led scoring drives on all four Dallas possessions in the first half before throwing his first career touchdown pass in fellow rookie Elliott's first 100-yard game, and the Cowboys beat the Chicago Bears 31-17 on Sunday night to snap an eight-game home losing streak.

With his second straight win, Prescott doubled the number of

victories the Cowboys (2-1) had in 14 games without the injured Romo over three seasons before the fourth-round pick showed up.

Prescott's first TD pass was a 17-yarder to Dez Bryant for a 31-10 lead in the fourth quarter, and he's up to 99 throws without an interception to start his career. Philadelphia's Carson Wentz has 102, and those are the two highest career opening totals for a rookie in NFL history.

"Dak's handled every opportunity he's had right from the start really, really well," coach

Golf loses a legend, baseball a rising star

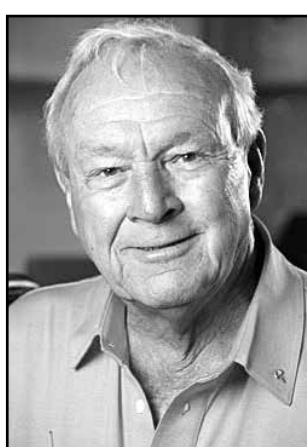
Arnold Palmer, 87, was one of the most important figures in golf

Arnold Palmer brought a country club sport to the masses with a hard-charging style, charisma and a commoner's touch. At ease with both presidents and the golfing public, and on a first-name basis with both, "The King" died Sunday in Pittsburgh. He was 87.

Alastair Johnson, CEO of Arnold Palmer Enterprises, confirmed that Palmer died Sunday afternoon of complications from heart problems. Johnson said Palmer was admitted to the hospital Thursday for some cardiovascular work and weakened over the last few days.

Palmer ranked among the most important figures in golf history, and it went well beyond his seven major championships and 62 PGA Tour wins. His good looks, devilish grin and go-for-broke manner made the elite sport appealing

to one and all. And it helped that he arrived about the same time as television moved into most households, a perfect fit that sent golf to unprecedented popularity.

"If it wasn't for Arnold, golf wouldn't be as popular as it is now," Tiger Woods said in 2004 when Palmer played in his last Masters. "He's the one who basically brought it to the forefront on TV. If it wasn't for him and his excitement, his flair, the way he played, golf probably

would not have had that type of excitement. "And that's why he's the king."

Beyond his golf, Palmer was a pioneer in sports marketing, paving the way for scores of other athletes to reap in millions from endorsements. Some four decades after his last PGA Tour win, he ranked among the highest-earners in golf.

"Thanks Arnold for your friendship, counsel and a lot of laughs," Woods tweeted Sunday night. "Your philanthropy and humility are part of your legend. It's hard to imagine golf without you or anyone more important to the game than the King."

On the golf course, Palmer was an icon not for how often he won, but the way he did it.

He would hitch up his pants, drop a cigarette and attack the flags. With powerful hands wrapped around the

Miami Marlins ace Jose Fernandez dies in boating accident Sunday

MIAMI (AP) — Jose Fernandez escaped from Cuba by boat on his fourth try as a teenager, and when his mother fell into the Yucatan Channel during the journey, he jumped in and pulled her out.

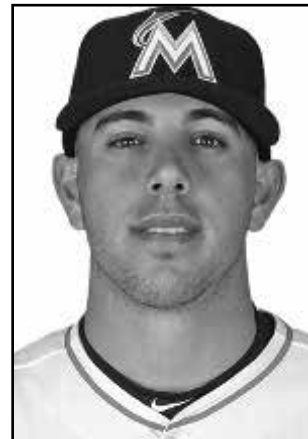
Fernandez's heroic backstory made his death early Sunday that much more heart-wrenching. The charismatic Miami Marlins ace was killed in a boating accident at age 24.

Fernandez and two other people died when their 32-foot vessel slammed into a jetty off Miami Beach, authorities said.

Authorities didn't know the time of the crash. The capsized boat was found shortly after 3 a.m.

"All I can do is scream in disbelief," said Hall of Famer Tony Perez, a Marlins executive and native of Cuba. "Jose won the love of all. I feel as if I had lost a son."

Major League Baseball released a state-

ment saying it was "stunned and devastated."

"He was one of our game's great young stars who made a dramatic impact on and off the field since his debut in 2013," Commissioner Rob Manfred said. "Our thoughts and prayers are with his family, the Miami Marlins organization and all of the people he touched in his life."

The Marlins' game Sunday at home against the Atlanta Braves was canceled. The Braves, along with several oth-

er teams, quickly offered condolences.

"Hands down one of my favorite guys to watch pitch! He brought nothing but intensity and passion," Boston Red Sox pitcher David Price tweeted.

Within hours after the news broke, Marlins players gathered at the ballpark to grieve together.

"A lot of words were said — meaningful words and emotion and prayer," team president David Samson said. "Jose is a member of this family for all time."

Samson spoke at a news conference while surrounded by every player on the Marlins, except their ace. The players wore team jerseys — black ones. Pitcher David Phelps stared at the floor and shook his head, while outfielder Christian Yelich took a deep breath and exhaled slowly. Their eyes were

A's break out of slump, beat Rangers 7-1 to avoid sweep

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — The Rangers' impressive stretch of scoreless innings by the pitching staff ended with an emphatic thud Sunday.

More importantly, manager Jeff Banister's ballclub missed a chance to hang onto its lead in the race for home-field advantage in the playoffs.

Not that there's much concern in Texas' clubhouse.

With their final six games at Globe Life Park — where they own the second-best home record in the AL — the Rangers are still confident heading into the final stretch of the regular season.

"It's crucial," Banister said after Oakland rookie Jharel Cotton pitched seven crisp innings to beat Rangers 7-1. "We need to go home and

play clean baseball. We were able to get some guys rest, get some guys off their legs today, so they should be fresh going into tomorrow."

The Rangers, who clinched the AL West on Friday, fell into a tie with the Boston Red Sox for home-field advantage in the playoffs. Texas (92-64) holds a slight tiebreaking advantage based on division record and will close out the regular season with a pair of three-game series against Milwaukee and Tampa Bay.

Things might not have been so tight had the Rangers been able to do anything against Cotton.

Adrian Beltre drove in the only run for Texas with his team-leading 32nd home run in the seventh. It was his 445th career home run.

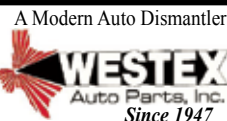

The scene was the 1979 world team championship in Rio de Janeiro, and the contestants in the final round — as had happened so many times before — were Italy and the United States. The U.S. won the match by a very slender margin (253 International Match Points to 248), and this is one of the deals that contributed to the American victory.

The Italian South (Giorgio Belladonna, playing with Vito Pittala) wound up at four diamonds doubled as shown. West (Billy Eisenberg,

playing with Edwin Kantar) led the king of clubs and shifted to the K-Q and another heart. East took the ace and returned a club to partner's ace, and Belladonna ruffed the next club lead.

Declarer now led the spade nine to the queen and played a low trump from dummy. Kantar went up with the ace and returned a fourth round of clubs, creating a trump trick for Eisenberg that put the contract down four — 700 points (800 in today's scoring).

This should have resulted in only a small loss for Italy — Kantar would have scored 600 or 630 points at three notrump but the Italian East-West pair at the second table wound up in only a partscore when the bidding went:

West's opening one-spade bid with such a terribly weak suit — shocking by American standards — was an integral part of the Italian bidding system. On this occasion, though, it caused them to miss a very good three-notrump contract.

West finished with eight tricks to score 110 points, but Italy suffered a net loss of 590 on the deal. This cost them 11 IMPs, which was more than the margin by which the U.S. won the championship.

golf club, Palmer would slash at the ball with all of his might, then twist that muscular neck and squint to see where it went.

"When he hits the ball, the earth shakes," Gene Littler once said.

Palmer rallied from seven shots behind to win a U.S. Open. He blew a seven-shot lead on the back nine to lose a U.S. Open. He was never dull.

"I'm pleased that I was able to do what I did from a golfing standpoint," Palmer said in 2008, two years after he played in his last official tournament. "I would like to think that I left them more than just that."

He left behind a gallery known as "Arnie's Army," which began at Augusta National with a small

Fernandez was on a vessel that hit a jetty near a harbor entrance, said Lorenzo Veloz of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. The overturned boat remained in the water for several hours, its engines partially submerged as its nose pointed skyward, and debris from the crash was scattered over some of the large jagged rocks.

Veloz described the condition of the boat as "horrible."

City of Miami Fire-Rescue workers were seen carrying bodies, draped and on stretchers, at the Coast Guard station after sunrise. They were taken to the medical examiner's office. Two bodies were found under the vessel and a third was found on the

group of soldiers from nearby Fort Hood, and grew to include a legion of fans from every corner of the globe.

Jason Garrett said. "No different tonight."

Brian Hoyer had trouble moving the Chicago offense early with Jay Cutler sidelined by a sprained right thumb as the Bears fell behind 24-3 at halftime and dropped to 0-3 for the second time in two seasons under coach John Fox.

Making his 27th career start for his fourth different team, Hoyer was 30 of 49 for 317 yards — a good portion of that with the game out of each late in the fourth quarter — and threw for two scores to Zach Miller.

"We haven't played a complete game," Fox said. "This week was

the reverse of what we've had. We played very poorly in the first half."

Elliott finished with 140 yards on 30 carries, including a 14-yard run when he hurdled safety Chris Prosinski. The Cowboys kept giving him the ball while trying to work the clock with a two-touchdown lead in the fourth quarter a week after he was benched because of two fumbles in a win over Washington.

"Made a lot of good runs tonight, a lot tough runs, a lot of NFL runs," Garrett said. "He's physically tough. He's mentally tough."

It didn't even bother Prescott that Pro Bowl left tackle Tyron Smith missed just the second game of his six-year career after his back tightened up during the

week.

Prescott was 19 of 24 for 248 yards in Dallas' first home win since last year's opener, which was a week before the first of two broken left collarbones that kept Romo out of 12 games last season.

Romo is expected to miss about another month after breaking a bone in his back in the preseason.

Prescott had one of three rushing touchdowns for the Cowboys, who have seven this season after getting eight all of last year, when they finished 4-12.

Because the Bears fell behind again, they couldn't do much with the running game. They had just 15 carries for 73 yards and lost leading rusher Jeremy Langford to an ankle injury in the second half.

BRYANT'S STATUS

Owner Jerry Jones said Bryant likely has a sprained right knee after his leg bent awkwardly when the 2014 All-Pro he was tackled on his first catch early in the game. An MRI was planned this week. Bryant wasn't in the locker room when it was open to reporters after the game.

MISSING PIECES

It was Chicago's first game without linebackers Danny Trevathan (sprain thumb) and Lamarr Houston (season-ending left ACL year). And the Bears struggled to slow the Cowboys, getting outgained 274-114 in the first half. Dallas had a 19-4 edge in first downs before halftime and finished with 447 yards, including 199 on the ground.

STAYING ALIVE

The Cowboys were on their way to a score on a fifth straight possession when Terrance Williams fumbled at the end of a 47-yard catch on the opening drive of the second half. The Bears turned that into the first of Hoyer's two TDs to Miller, a 2-yarder on fourth down to cut it to 24-10.

QUOTABLE

Prescott on finally getting his first touchdown pass: "I had a couple of close moments there

earlier in the game. And then to get Dez in there, it took a lot of attempts, but it happened."
