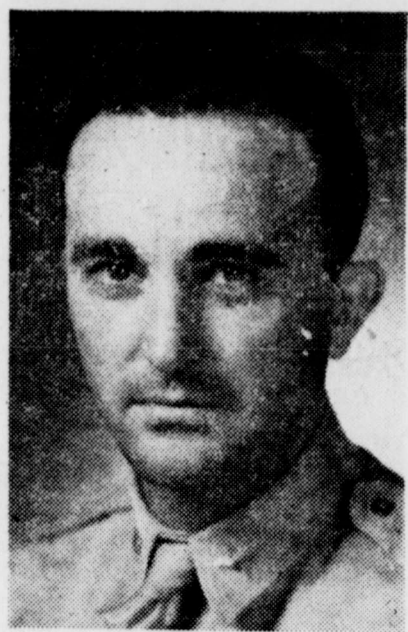


BOMBER PILOT



FT. WORTH, Tex., Aug. 4.—First Lt. J. D. Webb, Jr., above, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jno. D. Webb of Abernathy, was a member today of a record breaking class of Liberator B-24 bomber pilots from the AAF pilot school at Ft. Worth Army Air field.

Today's class, the largest yet to finish the difficult but thorough training in every phase of Liberator operation and maintenance, lists flying officers from 41 states, the District of Columbia and Canada. In a streamlined ceremony in tempo with the accelerated AAF pilot training program, Col. Carlisle I. Ferris, the commanding officer of the local pilot school, distributed B-24 pilot certificates to the big class of potential Axis-busters.

Lt. Webb, 27, won his wings at Lubbock after completing preliminary flight training at Tulsa, Okla., and Goodfellow Field, San Angelo.

While assigned to Ft. Worth Air field, Lt. Webb and his classmates worked a round-the-clock schedule learning every operational detail of the 28-ton giants. Airplane identification, meteorology, radio communication and mechanics were combined with night and formation flying, as well as altitude missions using oxygen and super-charger equipment. A brisk athletic program is also included in the comprehensive course.

Today's graduates will either become B-24 instructors, or receive final tactical training preparatory to duty in one of the theatres of war.

Lt. Webb is to remain in Ft. Worth with the Army Air field as an instructor, his father reported.

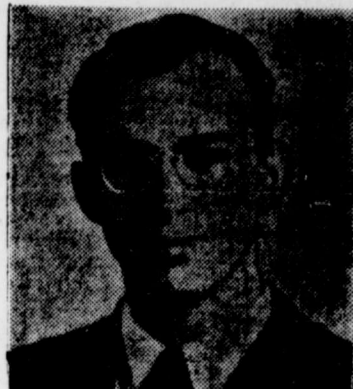

Rationing Calendar

Gasoline—A book coupons. 7 good for 4 gals. each thru Sept. 21.

Tire Inspection—"A" book holders should have tires inspected by Sept. 30; "B" bookholders, third inspection by Oct. 31; "C" book holders, third tire inspection by Aug. 31. "T" bookholders should have tire inspection every 60 days, or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first.

Sugar—Coupon No. 13 became valid June 1, good for 5 lbs. through Aug. 15. Coupons 15 & 16 good for 5 lbs. each for home canning purposes. Housewives may apply to their local boards for additional rations if necessary.

Shoes—Stamp No. 18, (1 pair), good thru Oct. 31.

Stoves—Purchase certificates now issued and normally valid for 30 days from date of issuance, will be invalid after Aug. 23, by which time it is expected the new nation-wide stove rationing program will be in effect.

Processed Foods—Blue Stamps R, S, T became valid Aug. 1 and remain valid thru Sept. 30.

Meats, Etc.—Red Stamps T, U, V, now valid, expires Aug. 31; W is valid Aug. 15, expires Aug. 31.

Cotton farmers of Lubbock county are lagging in their work of reporting the number of acres they have planted in cotton this year, according to Walter Y. Wells, administrative officer for the AAA.

Measurements no longer are required, Wells said, and all the office now wants is the acreage in cotton each farmer has planted, if he has not already reported for 1943. Conservation checks next fall and winter depend on this little chore by the farmer.

Wells said of the 2,550 farmers in Lubbock county, all but about 16% have complied. The other acreage reports are needed at once, he said.

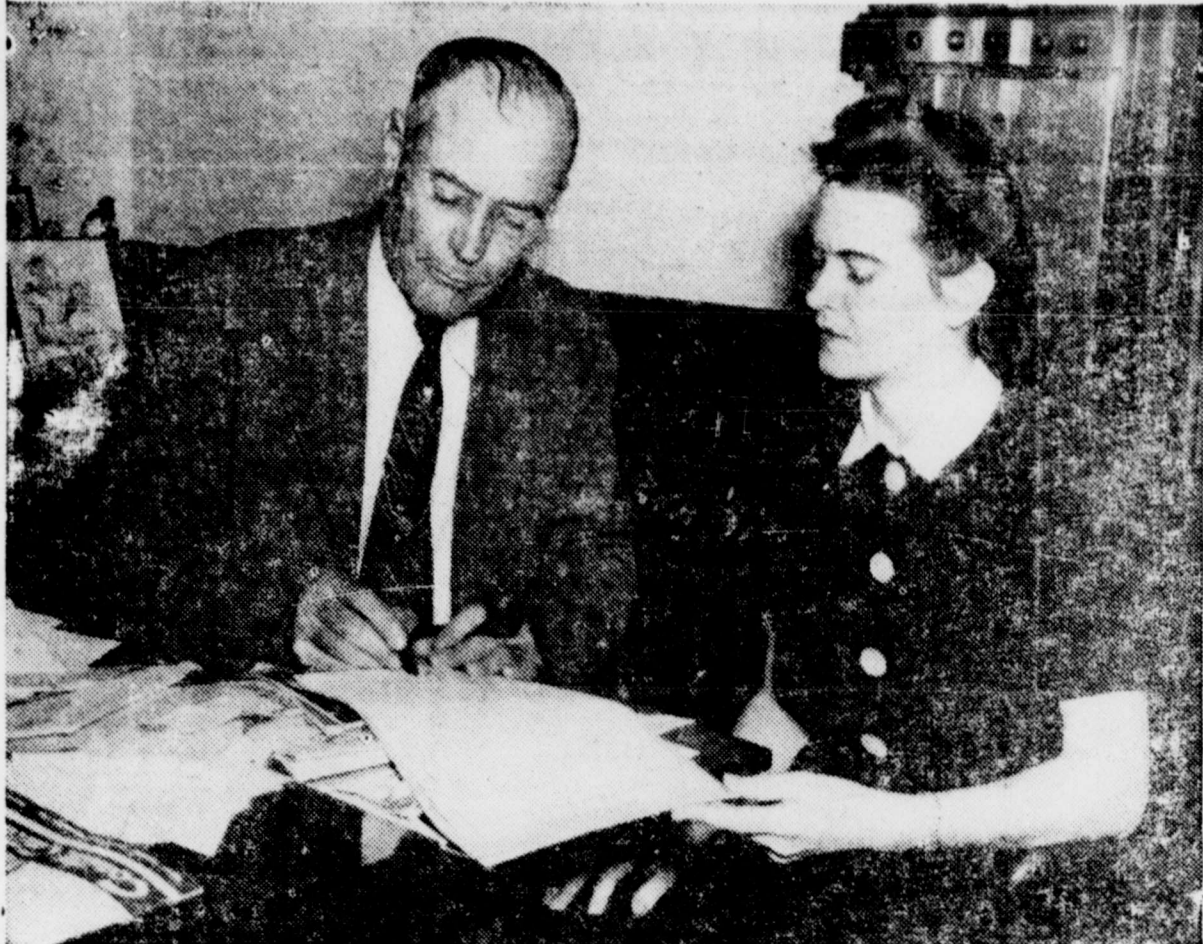

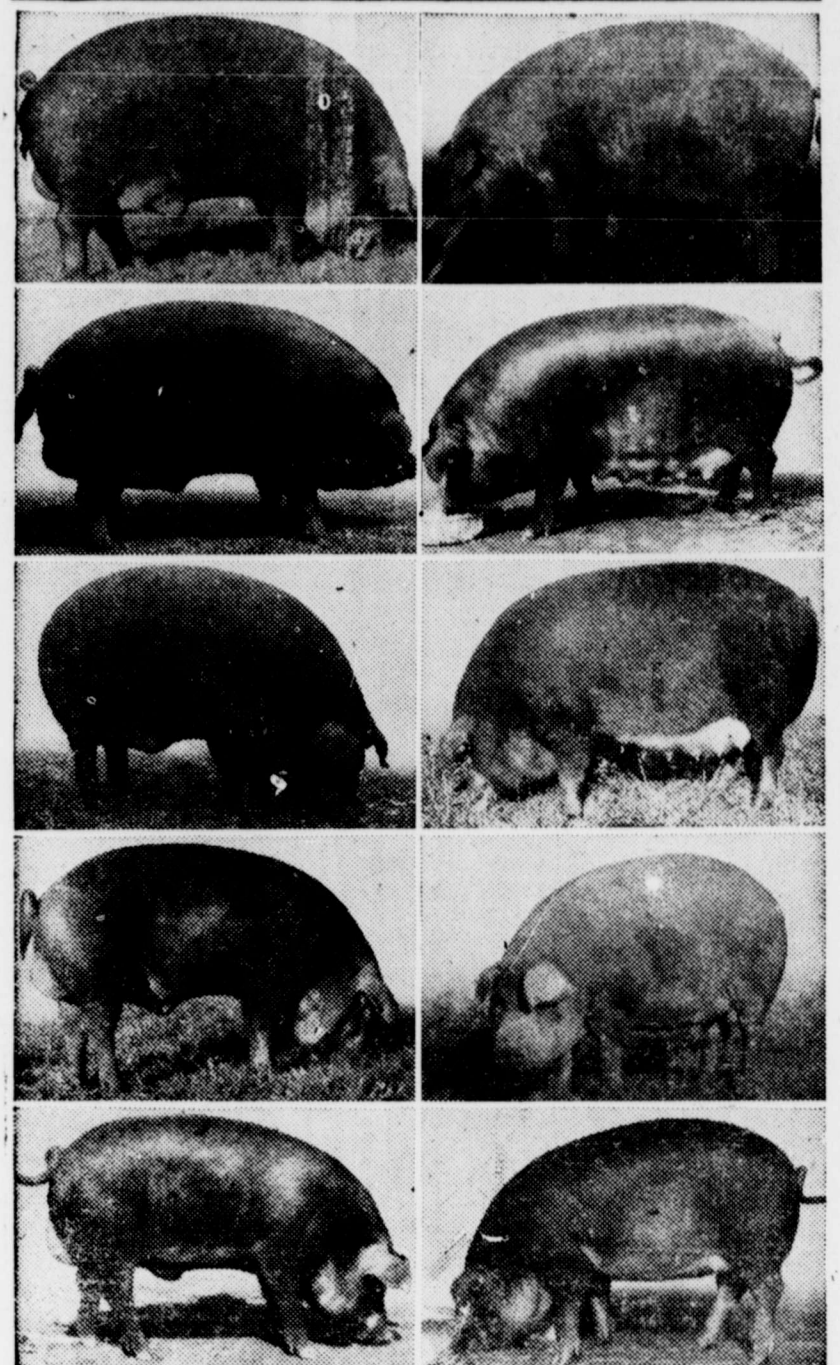

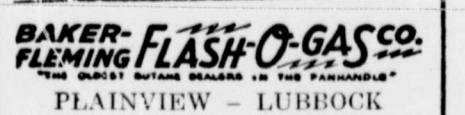
