

THREE FAMILIES BELIEVED VICTIMS OF FLOODS

REBELS SLAUGHTER PASSENGERS ON CAPTURED MEXICAN TRAIN

GUARD WIPED OUT BY ATTACKERS AS COACHES BURNED

REPORT PRIESTS AND A

MEXICO CITY, April 20.—Between 50 and 100 helpless passengers were slaughtered by a great force of revolutionaries, or bandits, who held up a Guadalupe Mexico City train last night, after killing the train's entire escort of fifty soldiers. The bandits drenched the coaches with gasoline and kerosene and set them afire, and as the terrified passengers tried frantically to climb out of the windows to escape incineration they were shot down. The slaughter took place near Leon, state of Jalisco.

Of recent outrages, this is declared to have been the worst in Mexican territory. The attack came almost without warning. Suddenly the train was halted while passing through a desolate territory, and the attack reports have it was begun by from 500 to 1,000 armed men. They looted, shot work of the military guard, then locked the doors of the coaches, applied the torch to the oil-soaked wood, and by the light of the flames that instantly shot up, poured savage fusillades into the bodies of the passengers as they hung half out the windows in an attempt to reach the ground.

Half Are Killed
First reports reaching Mexico City said that all the passengers had been killed, but President Calles later received information that about half of them had escaped. The president's office also reported reports that three or four Catholic priests had led the attacking party, characterized by the government as "rebels" numbering a little more than two hundred.

The railroad authorities were of the belief that the train carried from 100 to 200 passengers and their estimates were that between 100 and 150 persons were killed or injured.

Former President Obregon's daughter, Cecilia, who is the wife of an army officer, Colonel Ponce de Leon, is reported among the dead or injured. No Americans are known to have been on the train.

Revolutionist Work
There is a belief current in Mexico City that the outrages were the work of revolutionists, as was the case in the recent attack on a Laredo-Mexico City train to discredit the Calles administration as much as possible, both at home and abroad, and focusing foreign attention on the revolutionary conditions in Mexico.

Relief trains and troops have been rushed to the scene of the killing and the survivors have been taken to Irapuato.

The reports also said that half of the passengers on the train, which was hurled by the outbreak, escaped alive. This would place the number of dead at between fifty and one hundred instead of the 150 previously reported.

The presidential reports also said that Cecilia, daughter of former President Obregon and the wife of an army officer, Colonel Ponce de Leon, was among the dead.

American Gobs Rout Alleged "Red" Army

MANAGUA, N.C., April 20. (AP)—American blue jackets came into armed conflict this afternoon with a band of fifty men wearing red hats and carrying a red flag. After a brief engagement the "Reds" retreated leaving three dead.

There were no casualties among the soldiers.

Defying the orders of the United States prohibiting fighting within 2,000 yards of a railroad, the band attempted to take the village of Posoltega. The attacking force were opposed by twenty-four blue jackets. Posoltega is near Chichigua, where fighting was engaged in last night. One liberal was killed in the fighting at Nangate.

Conservative forces are entraining along the railroad in the hope of clearing out the liberal bands.

EXAMINE DOCUMENTS IN TRIAL OF RUBY

MASS OF EVIDENCE PRESENTED
BY PROSECUTION IN
HEARING

A great quantity of documentary evidence, by which prosecution counsel say they will show shortages in city funds other than the case now on trial, was introduced in evidence on the cross-examination of Martin R. Ruby, former city manager of Lubbock, Wednesday afternoon Judge Clark M. Mullican held, held earlier in the day that such testimony was admissible.

Sixteen cancelled city warrants, all made payable to Mr. Ruby, and the most of them endorsed by him, according to his testimony, together with attached bills for which the warrants were issued, were introduced during the afternoon session, but state counsel said still others are to be introduced Thursday, when Mr. Ruby's cross-examination will continue.

Court officials, hopeful early in the week that the case might be finished by Thursday, are now of the opinion that possibly the entire week may be consumed in trial of the case. Eight witnesses, most of them city employees or former employees, were sworn in by the court for the defense late Wednesday, but counsel did not say whether all of them will be used. One or two in addition to these also are in attendance on the court.

Those sworn in, Wednesday were: Joe F. Turner, Wylie Metcalf, Frank Warkick, H. F. Egan, Tom Watson, Duane Manner, Tom Simard and J. H. McCullies. Miss Alma Granger, formerly an employee of the city offices here, now of Midland, also is here subpoenaed by the defense.

The morning session of Wednesday was consumed by argument of counsel as to admissibility of the testimony which was introduced in part by prosecution at the afternoon session after Judge Mullican ruled that direct testimony in evidence, which, in direct testimony on the case would be admissible under cross-examination, when given through the defendant.

The prosecution is endeavoring to show by the documentary evidence that shortage of funds is not confined to the three charges now pending, one of which is in process of trial. Counsel for the state introduced the cancelled warrants in evidence, which, in direct testimony on the case would be admissible under cross-examination, when given through the defendant.

Mr. Ruby will continue under the grueling cross-examination, beginning at 8 o'clock this morning.

COOK CASE IS ARGUED

Right of Federal Judge to Grant a
Parole After Sentence is
Brought Questioned

NEW ORLEANS, La., April 20. (AP)—The question of a federal judge's right to release Dr. Frederick A. Cook from federal prison was argued here today in the United States circuit court of appeals.

Dr. Cook had served three years of a 14 year sentence when he was ordered released on probation. The present litigation grew out of a writ of error sent up from Fort Worth, Texas.

United States Attorney Henry Sweet of Fort Worth argued that Judge James C. Wilson lacked the power to sign the probation order because the sentence had been begun.

H. C. Wade and Sam H. Sayers, attorneys for Dr. Cook, contended that congress had placed no limitation on courts with respect to the act, under which the judge orders this release.

A decision is expected in a few days.

FARMERS GATHER IN LUBBOCK FOR BUREAU MEETING

AFFILIATIONS WITH THE
COMMUNITIES ARE
MADE

FORTY LEADERS HERE

METHODS FOR COMING
YEAR ARE TALKED
BY EXPERTS

Observing the first affiliation meeting of Lubbock county group leaders with the Lubbock County Farm Bureau, more than 40 group leaders of Hale, Terry, Lynn, Lamb, Rockley, Dawson, Garza and Crosby counties met in an all-day meeting at the Lubbock county park yesterday. Approximately 150 farmers and their wives were in attendance. The Lubbock bureau completed the affiliation of the group leaders of the various communities and the visiting leaders were here to get an idea of how the work was carried on.

The meeting opened yesterday morning shortly after 9 o'clock in which the outline of a work for the year was presented. Douglas Pounds of Stillwater, president of the Lubbock County Farm Bureau, made the welcoming address to the visiting leaders after which Don L. Jones, manager of the Experiment station, gave a discussion of pure seeds and their importance in production. He was followed by N. H. Payne, field man of the Texas Farm Bureau, who spoke briefly concerning the work of the organization during the coming season.

Luncheon Served
Luncheon was served to the visitors by the Lubbock county bureau after which the session was continued into the afternoon. "Co-op and Dumb," a clever little dialogue was presented by the two small children of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Rivers as a feature of a short program preceding the afternoon meeting.

A round table discussion followed, was marked by excellent talks from the various leaders of the South Plains on the various problems of the farm. Chief among this discussion was the matter of starting new circles among the various communities and it was agreed that efforts would be made to start them.

"Loyalty and Organization" was the subject of R. E. Overstreet, local director who gave an interesting talk on the cotton association and what it has and can do for a section. He was followed by J. D. Coghlan, state man, who spoke on "Education and Co-operation," his subject stressing the importance of marketing through the co-operative system. John B. Jones, finance man, also made a short talk, emphasizing the importance of close business in marketing.

It is the plan of officials of the bureau of this section to hold more meetings of the kind held yesterday. D. F. Patton, county agent and N. H. Payne, local field man, stated last night that they were well pleased with the showing made yesterday. Efforts will be made to hold more of them.

SNYDER CASE BOASTS THREE JURYMEN NOW

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, April 20.—Three talesmen became Jurymen in the Snyder trial today, joining foreman William H. Young, selected yesterday. The first Jurymen of the day, Charles Melzer, a landscape gardener of Springfield, was married on early in the day. He is married and has one child. Harry Arnold and Albert L. Krone were approved later in the day.

The increase in the Jurymen to try Henry Judd Gray and Mrs. Ruth Snyder, charged with the murder of Albert Snyder, the woman defendant's husband, was made after 14 talesmen named in review. All records for three days at the trial in Queens county were broken. Both in number of Jurymen accepted and talesmen examined. The first day saw 50 examined

and none accepted. Yesterday only three of 24 were found acceptable.

Justice Townsend Souder, presiding again carried the court session into the night and after filling and emptying the jury box six times filled it again just before adjournment. The last twelve will be questioned tomorrow.

The total of talesmen who have filed in and out of the box reached 113 as the examination of the sixth group was completed.

More than a third of the talesmen disqualified for cause today were turned aside because of conscientious scruples against inflicting the death penalty. Ten in one group of twelve held up their hands signifying lack of accord with the law decreeing the death penalty for first degree murder.

Mistrial Is Predicted In Ford Libel Case

DETROIT, April 20. (AP)—Declarations of a mistrial tomorrow morning were the inevitable ending for Aaron Sapiro's \$100,000 libel suit, against Henry Ford was foreseen tonight when Sapiro and his chief of counsel, William Henry Gallagher, agreed that they could not oppose the part of the four-point defense motion alleging a woman juror had granted a newspaper interview.

The other three points, that the juror, Mrs. Clara Hoffman, misstated her husband's business, and that she had stated falsely she had no interest in the case, and that Mrs. Hoffman conversed with "Kid" Miller, who was alleged to have engaged in conversation with an attorney to have been on friendly terms with Sapiro, were termed by Sapiro and Gallagher a "perfect trap." The defense motion of a mistrial, supported by fifteen affidavits, thirteen of them by Ford organization detectives, one by a Ford Motor company employee, and one by a Ford attorney, was filed in court late today and a half hour later copies of the motion and the affidavits were delivered to Sapiro and Gallagher.

EAST TEXAS C. OF C. DRAWS ENTHUSIASM

PROGRESS OF SECTION SHOWN
IN REPORTS AT THE
CONVENTION

(By Associated Press)

TYLER, Tex., April 20.—The throes of a new life throughout East Texas beat high through every session of the first annual convention of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce opening here Wednesday.

The rebirth of a territory larger than some states was emphasized and the new cooperative spirit in which seventy counties are seeking progress was reflecting in the addresses of legislators, industrial leaders, and the chief executive of the state, in the enthusiasm of ten thousand visitors, and in a great parade which was a panorama of the March of progress in this section.

Tyler, which terms itself "the heart of East Texas" met its greatest challenge as a host by devoting its last bit of energy and skill in an orderly reception of its guests.

The new ideals of the section were enunciated in speeches by Governor Dan Moody, United States Senator Earl B. Mayfield, former representative Eugene Elliott, of Kenedeloch, Come Johnson, of Tyler, R. W. Morrison, of San Antonio, president of the South Texas Chamber of Commerce, Ike Asburn, manager of the Houston Chamber of Commerce and A. P. Duggan, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The specific plans through which these ideals are to be materialized were outlined by R. M. Kelly of Longview, president of the organization. The national government lent its voice to the gathering through a telegram from Herbert Hoover, secretary of the department of commerce, who sent regrets at his inability to attend and expressed a hope for the ultimate successful development of this territory.

He favored Washington for the 1928 democratic gathering, and his second choice is Cleveland.

First Degree Murder Charge Faces Kelly

(By the Associated Press)

LOS ANGELES, April 20.—Paul Kelly, film juvenile, was indicted for first degree murder following a grand jury investigation here today of the death of Ray Raymond, musical comedy actor who died yesterday after a beating admittedly administered by the seven player.

The indictment was voted within a few minutes after Raymond's widow, Dorothy MacKay, stage actress had collapsed in the grand jury room. She crumpled in the witness chair after admitting that she had been with Kelly a short time before the fatal thrashing. The actress was carried from the room and medical aid was summoned.

Physicians had scarcely revived her when the actress learned of the grand jury's action and collapsed outside the jury room. She struck her head on the tile floor of the corridor and was temporarily unconscious.

COLLEGE MEETING HERE

Dean Gordon Leaves for Fort Worth
To Further Plans for Bringing
Convention to City

As a result of a state-wide approval of the newest educational institution in Texas, Dean James M. Gordon leaves today for Fort Worth where he will enter Tech's bid for the 1928 meeting of the Texas Association of colleges at the meeting which will be in session Friday and Saturday of this week. Officials of the association have assured Dean Gordon and other Tech administrative officers that they are favoring the selection of Lubbock as the meeting place for 1928.

Dean Gordon appears on the program at the meet this week, his lecture subject being "Do Colleges exert undue influence on the high school curriculum?" The meeting will be attended by more than 150 of the leading college men of the various institutions of the state, their purpose in meeting is to discuss and determine new policies of their system.

Tech has a good chance to get the 1928 meeting, Dean Gordon says, although it has been held in cities of the central part in past years.

Storm Dead Mourned Floods Slow Relief

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 20. (AP)—Turning from the task of searching the trail of yesterday's wind storm for further victims, and taking relief to the homeless, stricken communities of 22 persons struck down by the wind in yesterday's storm.

Death waited outside hospital doors tonight where by a dozen or more of seriously injured. Many of them maimed by flying debris or crushed under collapsing buildings are expected to die.

Flood waters from storm and augmented heavy rainfall which accompanied the blow, hampered the work of relief parties and representatives of state agencies which sought to ascertain the extent of property damage. It is expected the damage will reach \$1,000,000.

Graphic Story

Recovering from their harrowing experiences of yesterday, survivors today were able to recount graphically what happened in the storm belt. O. W. Hughes, general merchandise proprietor of Cornland, sitting on the front porch of his store saw a cloud that looked like a yellow sheet approaching. As he remarked that it looked like it contained hell, a shrieking noise filled the air.

Just as I stepped inside and started to close the door, the front porch was "challenged" down the street. Hughes related, "I couldn't move and was a good thing I couldn't as the south wall, caved in and then the north wall, the roof toppling on them. The door frame saved me."

Anna Masterson, of Laoni was standing beside a large stove when the walls and roof of her home tumbled in. The stove held up heavy beams and for woman escaped injury. M. B. Drake, cashier, and M. E. Holly, teller, of the bank at Cornland were in the vault when the storm struck. They did not hear the noise of destruction and emerged to find the town in ruins.

TORNADO STRIKES CADDO

One Man Seriously Hurt But Sight of
Approaching Twister Sends
Citizens to Safety

CADDO, Okla., April 20. (AP)—A tornado took one life and wrecked fifteen homes here today.

J. W. Overstreet was reported to have been seriously hurt. G. A. Crickell, who lives here, said the funnel-shaped cloud was seen approaching for fifteen minutes before it struck. Nearly all of the inhabitants rushed to storerooms where they remained until after the danger had passed.

A torrential rain came after the twister and was reported to have been general throughout the county.

MIGHTY RIVER MENACES
VAST AREAS OF
LOWLANDS

FURTHER RISES SEEN

PROPERTY DAMAGE IS
GROWING INTO
MILLIONS

(By the Associated Press)

LITTLE ROCK, April 20.—Three families were believed tonight to have drowned on the Flynn plantation in Pulaski county, 12 miles east of Little Rock. They were warned to flee but were said to have remained in their homes. Neighbors heard screams later in the night as the water crept into the homes.

Nearly ten inches of rain fell within a few hours today at Benton, 20 miles south of here. A Missouri Pacific railroad bridge near there was washed out, street paving was torn up and the Hot Springs pike washed out for a distance of 200 feet. Water had crept into many stores.

Memphis Increases

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 20. (AP)—The menace of flood waters in the lower Mississippi valley grew tonight as Arkansas felt under the grip of the swelling water and guardians of defense in another state along the river doubled their efforts to save lives and property.

Harding the levee at Clarendon, Ark. The White river early today surged through that town of 2,000 inhabitants and changed its streets into foaming whirlpools where boats, men, animals and anything houses were tossed about in disorder. Reports of loss of life to tardy residents of the lower sections went unconfirmed until relief agencies could explore the stricken town.

Flood Widens

Driven by a break in the Arkansas river northwest of Little Rock, the flood charged down in a diminishing wall upon the town of Lark and moved on to widen the inundated area in north Little Rock, across the stream from the capital.

The Little Rock municipal water plant was abandoned late today. Three or four days' supply of water remained in the reservoirs.

Later a refreshed crew of workmen was reemployed and rushed back to occupy the plant in a continuing battle to hold it.

Along the hundred mile St. Francis river basin, between New Madrid, Mo., and Helena, Ark., inhabitants of a score of towns and of farms were making preparations for the advancing waters which moved southward through a crevice in the St. John's bayou levee. From New Madrid, an unhappy Venice of the overflow, moving toward the valley of the Little river, Big Lake and drainage ditch toward the St. Francis proper at Marked Tree.

Prepare for Danger

Preparations were announced in towns of the St. Francis valley to night. Local communities were providing shelter and food for refugees, who brought in their livestock and movable goods from the bottom lands. Authorities believed that the damage had been exaggerated and that ample means were available to meet the situation. Several days will elapse, they pointed out, before the waters will be materially to the present stages on the St. Francis.

The levees of the Mississippi were reported holding tonight from Cairo south to Vicksburg. Raising and strengthening the wall were being at Hickman, Ky. in the Helena area and along the western flank of Bolivar county, Miss. at Hickman and southward along the Red foot levee into

THIS WOMAN'S MOVEMENT

(By Allene Sumner)

For a long time the tired business man has realized as he read his evening paper that something was lacking.

The other night it came to him. He reached into the kitchen, paper in hand, and demanded of "the little woman" busily drawing the steak in the pan:

"Why are you doing wrong to the tired business man's grammar, but not at all to his mind? Both the tired business man and the tired woman are weary, and as well, have begun realizing of late that the expression 'woman movement' has practically vanished, and that no longer do we see our sisters pictured with marching women, banners across their bosoms, fair arms upholding venomous placards demanding the right and that right."

She looked at him, her headlines proclaiming the forcible feeding of Mrs. So-and-So, jailed for picketing the White House and yelling that she'd pull the president's nose if he didn't do right by our Nells.

Doesn't satisfy. Even the girl answer that women achieved that for which they picketed, woman suffrage, does not quite satisfy. For everyone knows that even since 1920 and the victory of the woman suffrage movement with the 19th amendment, one has heard rumblings and mutterings of "the woman movement."

But whether you "see it in the papers" or not, whether it's said in yowlers and banners or otherwise, there is a woman movement today.

If you doubt it, just send a card to the National Woman's Party, doing business on Capitol Hill, right where it can watch out the front windows who goes in and out of congress.

You know, of course, that this party is despoiling its energies to a 20th amendment, which is known as the National Equal Rights amendment—a simple little amendment reading "men and women shall have equal rights throughout the United States and every place subject to its jurisdiction."

Equal Rights? Maybe you think that they have "equal rights" now. Listen!

The party has been delving in the law library of the Supreme Court for months. Here are some of the startling discoveries just disclosed:

Pages of Georgia and Maryland can legally will away the custody of their children from the mothers—

In three states, Michigan, New York and Massachusetts, the minor child need give its earnings to its father only—

In Florida a father at Florida may collect damages for the "mental pain and suffering" of a mother whose child has been injured or killed.

In many states married women may not legally sign certain papers.

A Texas husband may divorce his wife for one infidelity, but she may not divorce him unless she can prove that he is living "in a state of infidelity."

In many states a woman can not legally own the clothes which her husband buys her, but is entitled to only "the use of them."

Recent Findings

The law of Georgia says that a wife's earnings belong to her husband. Four pages of legal size paper, typed single space, are filled with similar recent findings of the legal research department of the National Woman's Party.

The findings are put forth merely as reasons why the proposed 20th amendment is necessary.

The party points with shame to equal rights provisions in the constitutions of other countries. Austria, Czechoslovakia, Free and Hanseatic City of Danzig, Estonia, Germany, Lithuania and Prussia have equal rights constitutional provisions, all adopted since 1919.

Night Work

The party is especially riled at 14 states, and their laws which forbid women, but not men, to engage in certain occupations at night. This is what today's "woman's movement" means—no discrimination between women and men, not even discrimination which is shown for woman's supposed "own good."

"I don't want a chair to sit on, yella the woman of today's 'woman movement'—unless you make him sit on too!"

NEW YORK, April 20.—Flowers and Easter just naturally go together. Flowers are blossoming in window boxes and will soon dot the fields. Materials, not to be outdone, are blossoming out in all the beauty of dainty flowered patterns, shimmering silks and lovely colors, in imitation.

The embodiment of this gay spirit of the new season is the frock of dainty red and white figured crepe shown today.

Novelty ruffles of accordion pleated material run around the hem of the blouse and give a tiered effect to the silhouette. Accordion pleated is the skirt and its white top forms the collarless vest that by its immense lace adds its bit to the crisp freshness of the model. A tie of white bears a single bar of red and red pipes the cuffs. A narrow belt of the material just misses the normal waistline.

Red Black Insets

To top such a youthful frock a wide-brimmed novelty hat with a wide brim chosen. Insets of several shades of

red and black straw cut into its crown intricately, and a band of the same goes under the brim. The floppy brim is edged with a red matching the background of the frock's material. Youth, grace and charm has the costume.

Suggesting flowers in springtime comes the ensemble illustrated today. It is navy blue crepe and white crepe de chine with an all-over flowered pattern in navy blue. The coat has unusual treatment of narrow self-binding stitched around it in circular effect. Sleeves bear the same tiered treatment.

The flowered silk lines the coat and extends outside, forming small cuffs, collar and a shaped binding down the front.

The coat is shown closed. But the frock underneath is well worth the opening. It is of the printed silk, and sports an accordion pleated front panel that is tied at the waistline with a flat bow of navy blue. The Vionnet neckline has another blue bow at the left corner and the little cuffs tie with blue bows.

Most Charming

Nothing could be more charming with this frock than the beret hat of purple navy satin. Daggers of pearls

and brilliants catch the draping at both sides. A silk flat purse in navy shade with center banding and tricky corners of brilliants and a pearl necklace carry out the blue-white ensemble idea. Of course, her gloves of white glaze kid have blue stitching. If one could only see them, cuffs or blue in flowered pattern.

Suits are not made of flowered materials, though the blouses often are. But what brings spring freshness more than checked materials? Also shown is a smart interpretation of the black and white vogue.

Double Breasted

Black flat crepe fashions the trim coat, which gets its chic from its perfect fit and its smart double-breasted front. Black and white checked crepe de chine, box-pleated all around, forms the skirt. Its material is one of the latest on the market. A white overblouse has the new tight, low neckline.

Flowers, however, cannot be entirely eliminated, even from a checked tulle. The black bengaline hat with its pleated crown lets its turned-up brim suddenly drop on the right side and support a cluster of waxy white flowers. Their leaves, instead of being the ordinary green, are gleaming black and startlingly stunning.

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Rhubarb Is Particularly Adaptable To The Table Now; Here Are Four Good Recipes

Rhubarb sauce and rhubarb pie seem to be about as far as most of us go in our use of this vegetable fruit which is really so delicious and worth while.

As a "stretch" and peck in medium in the making of jellies and jams its invaluable, and as a fruit for desserts it tides over a hard time of year. Rhubarb comes early in the season when fresh fruits are scarce in most sections of the country and stays all through the summer ready to fill in any gaps in the fruit season.

The first rhubarb usually has a very tender skin and if well washed need not be peeled. When cooked with the skin on it has a most delightful pinky color. As the season advances the skin grows tougher and should be removed before cooking.

The following recipes are not extravagant and range from family to real company desserts:

Rhubarb Sherbet

Two pounds rhubarb, 1 cup water, 2 cups sugar, 2 tablespoons gelatin (granulated), 6 tablespoons cold water. Wash rhubarb and cut in small pieces. Put into a baking dish with sugar and water, cover and bake in slow oven until tender. Strain through cheesecloth. Let gelatin stand in cold water for twenty minutes. Add 1/4 cup boiling water to dissolve and stir into rhubarb. Stir well and turn into mold. Freeze with stirring or pack in four parts ice to one part rock salt and let stand two hours.

Rhubarb Tapioca Pudding

Three cups cut rhubarb, 4 tablespoons minute tapioca 2-4 cup sugar, 2 cups hot water, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Put rhubarb, tapioca, sugar and salt and water in top of double-boiler. Cook over hot water until tapioca is transparent. It will take about thirty minutes. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla and turn into individual molds or one large one. Chill and serve with plain or whipped cream.

Rhubarb Betty

Three cups rhubarb, 3-4 cup sugar, 4 tablespoons butter, stale coarse bread crumbs, hot water. Put a layer of rhubarb into a well buttered baking dish, with butter and sprinkle with sugar. Use about 1-3 of the ingredients. Cover with a layer of crumbs. Continue layer by layer until all is used. The last layer should be of crumbs. Add 2 or 3 tablespoons of boiling water, cover and bake twenty minutes in a hot oven. Remove cover and bake ten minutes longer to brown top. Serve with cream.

Rhubarb Whip

One cup sweetened cooked rhubarb, whites 3 eggs, 1-2 teaspoon salt. The rhubarb must be quite sweet and thick. Beat whites of eggs until stiff and dry and fold into the rhubarb which must be hot. Pour into a buttered baking dish, place in a pan of hot water and bake about fifty minutes in a moderately hot oven. Serve cold with a boiled custard sauce made with the yolks of the eggs. These are all simple desserts that can be served to children as well as adults. The rules are planned for six persons.

Thirty Mound Wins In Year Is Difficult Task Because of Short Fences and Lively Ball



BY BILLY EVANS

A pitcher able to win 30 ball games in the major leagues these days is considered an outstanding star. Putting over 30 victories in one season is regarded as a seemingly impossible task because of the lively ball and short fences.

There is no longer considered anything less than four runs a comfortable working margin. That being the case it is apparent why recording 30 victories is such a difficult task.

Just to emphasize the fact that it is an extraordinary performance to win that many ball games, it is pointed out that not since 1917 has any pitcher in the major league turned in 30 victories.

Alexander the Great, remarkable veteran, the hero of the 1926 world series, was the last pitcher to show 30 ball games in the won column at the close of the season. In 1917 he just did reach that mark.

Since that time, a matter of 10 campaigns, not a pitcher in the big show has been able to break into that select circle. Several have threatened but all have fallen short.

George Uhle, away to a great start last season, felt confident that he would turn the trick but some bad breaks late in the year left him three short of the desired number when the curtain was rung down on the season.

In the National League not a single pitcher was able to win more than 29 ball games. Four of them, Kremer, Donohue, Rhen and Meadows, reached that figure.

Winning 30 ball games against keen competition is a life-man's task. If you doubt it, just peruse the record of one, Walter Johnson, quite a pitcher, and you will find that only twice has he turned the trick.

Johnson's best performance was in 1913, when he won 36 games while losing only seven. The year previous he copied 32 wins.

In this respect, the late Christy Mathewson and Grover Cleveland Alexander enjoy a unique distinction. They are the only two pitchers to win 30 or more ball games three times since 1900, the year the American league came into the field to compete with the National.

It is an interesting coincidence that both put over the trio of sensational performances in successive years.

Mathewson was at the top of his game in 1915-16-17, when he won 30, 31 and 31 victories, respectively. Alexander was going his last year in the World War, which for a time threatened to end his career as well as that of many other players. He won 31 games in 1918, 30 in 1919 and 30 in 1920.

It would seem that Mathewson and Alexander have left something for the pitcher to shoot at that looms up as a tougher proposition than asking some batsman to make more than 50 home runs to smash Babe Ruth's record.

Will any of these six stars of the two major leagues break the jinx of the last 10 years and win 30 ball games? George Uhle, who had a big year last season, hopes to repeat. Lefty Grove, with the rejuvenated Athletics, may turn the trick.

was among the dead or injured. Confirmation of this, however, was lacking. A relief train and troops to pursue the outlaws were being rushed to the scene of the holdup near Limon, in the state of Jalisco today. The survivors were being transported to Tepic.

The attack on the train was evidently well planned, for the rebels or bandits tore up the tracks between the stations of Limon and Tepic. The engine was derailed, but the coaches remained on the tracks. The soldier guards were taken by surprise and greatly outnumbered, and work the first to be butchered. Those passengers who descended from the train when it had come to a halt, were forced back into the coaches at the point of rifles. They watched with horror the preparations of the savages to burn them alive.

Their frantic efforts to escape were in some cases successful, but most of them were shot in cold blood or fell victims to the flames.

A statement was issued from the office of President Calles this afternoon that the leaders of the band were a lawyer named Lora and three Catholic priests named Vega, Pedrona and Angulo, all described as prominent Jalisco rebels, and by a rebel chief, name identified only by the nickname of "Number 14."

METHODS TO FINANCE TOWN TEAM AGREED UPON AT BALL MEET

"Lubbock will have baseball" was the slogan adopted by the interested ball fans that gathered in the 99th Judicial court room last evening. The meeting was called by F. G. Sheppard, president of the Lubbock baseball association, for the purpose of discussing plans for a team to represent Lubbock on the field this summer.

After a very interesting talk made by Col. Clark M. Mulliken, district judge of the 99th Judicial District, and one of Lubbock's foremost baseball fans, plans were entered into and discussed in detail. Several good ideas and schemes were submitted.

Scheme Agreed

One scheme was finally agreed on and will be worked out in detail. It is this: To sell season tickets for all games played in Lubbock this summer at a very low and reasonable price, \$5.00. This ticket will admit purchasers to all city league games, and Hubber games. Estimating thirty games played by the Hubbers here this season ticket price would amount to only 16 2-3 cents, while last season every person paid fifty cents for each game. Further than that—since there are eight city league teams in the recently organized loop they will play four days a week which will figure some where in the games throughout the season in addition to the probable thirty games to be played at Lubbock by the Hubbers. With both the Hubber games and the City League games applied to the season ticket it would make the average price on each game less than three cents. The money taken in from these tickets will be applied to the running expenses for a real club to carry on the work of the Hubbers.

By carrying through this plan, the financing will be more effective, efficient and very economical and will burden no few fans or any one individual. Should 1000 season tickets be sold it will allow the association to get real ball players and give Lubbock the same publicity she has received in the past few years throughout the Southwest.

"Lubbock has a population of 15,000 people and surely one of this number is a ball fan and are willing to pay less than 3 cents a game to see the Hubbers have another championship team," one of Lubbock's best fans declared at the meeting.

Another meeting will be called to perfect plans already discussed at an early date.

Boys And Girls Of 4-H Clubs Are To Have Their National Camp In Capital.

WASHINGTON, April 20 (AP)—One of the unique meetings to be held in the National Capital will be the encampment here June 1-23 of the First National Farm Boys' and Girls' 4-H Club Camp.

There are now more than 40,000 local 4-H clubs in the country, with nearly 600,000 members. Their symbol is the four leaf clover, the four H's stand for "Head, Heart, Hands and Health."

The camp will be pitched on the Mall, near the Bureau of Plant Industry, and in addition to the various camp activities, arrangements have been made for many educational tours for the farm boys and girls who will be lucky enough to attend.

Two boys and two girls will be selected by each state to represent its 4-H clubs. These will be accompanied by two state club leaders, a man and woman from each state, and all will be chosen for their exceptional work in connection with farm stock, home economics and leadership activities.

Conferences will be held for the leaders and club members in the auditorium of the National Museum and many of the old timers in the agricultural extension movement will be present for "Pioneers' Day," on June 20.

A motto of the Federal Co-operative Extension Service, one of whose functions is to carry on club work among the younger farm folk with state agricultural colleges, is:

"There are about 11,000,000 rural boys and girls in the United States between the ages of 10 and 18. About one out of twenty is in a 4-H. Let's get the other 19."

Tuberculosis Among Cattle Is Reduced

The battle being waged by the government with the states to eradicate tuberculosis among cattle is having such marked success, according to Dr. J. A. Kierman, of the Federal Bureau of Animal Industry, that it is hoped to have the disease among bovine animals practically controlled by 1934.

"The disease," says Dr. Kierman, "is under good control now because livestock owners are familiar with the work of the tuberculosis test, and when they buy cattle they make sure that they go to a territory where the disease has been cleaned up, and in that way they protect their interests."

More than 1,500 veterinarians, including 225 employed by the government, are now carrying on the war in 300 counties, 200 of which have been virtually freed of the malady and declared "modified accredited counties," or those where the infection has been controlled to less than one-half of one per cent.

Compared with an original appropriation of \$14,500 in 1917 for the work, the government will have available next fiscal year approximately \$5,000,000. The states are spending about \$14,000,000 annually themselves.

Since 1917, more than \$1,200,000 of tubercular cattle have been killed. Replacement of these with higher capacity and healthier producers has increased the production and consumption of milk. In addition to getting the salvaged carcasses used for food, the grower is indemnified by the government on an average of \$14 for each infected animal slaughtered, in addition to about \$20 a head by the states.

A recent survey shows that tuberculosis among cattle has declined from more than four per cent in 1923 to 2.4 per cent in 1926. More than 9,000,000 head were tested last year.
