The Motley Matadors fell to the McAdoo Eagles in two key tilts at Floydada, Saturday. They had earlier in the week dumped Jayton in two varsity games to remain tied for first place in the District 2-B race with McAdoo.

In the first series, Motley girls overwhelmed Jayton 53-27. They had a big night rebounding, with Debbie Clay pulling in 8, and Pennie Marshall, 7. In the scoring department, Debbie was high point with 18, with Audrey Campbell putting in 17.

In the boys action the Matadors handed the Jaybirds a 74-62 decision. Motley had an excellent night from the field, hitting around 43 per cent. Joe Campbell put in 26 for the Matadors, with Steve Stevens putting in 15, and Charles Giesecke, 12.

Girls Lose District

The Motley girls lost the district championship game 38-34 to McAdoo. Although the girls hustled well, bad shooting overcame them. Debbie Clay led with 14, followed by Audrey Campbell who added 13.

The girls finished the district play 7-2, winning the first half of the double round robin. Overall the girls finished the season with a 12-14 record.

In the boys action Saturday, Motley lost the first half crown to McAdoo in one of the worst night scoring of the season and putting only one man in double figures — Charles Giesecke with 10. Pepper Nichols added 9.

The Motley boys now sport a 15-9 record overall, with a 7-3 district mark.

The Matadors go into the district tournament at Aspermont, Thursday with their first game against Guthrie.

Ecomet Burley, guest speaker for the Father-Son Banquet, will speak on the role of football in shaping body, mind, and character. The banquet is scheduled for Tuesday, Feb. 25, at 7:00 p.m. in the Motley County High School gymnasium.

Burley is a junior at Texas Tech University and is majoring in government. He is interested in a career in law after graduation, but indicates that he will not bypass an opportunity to play professional football. Burley has been contacted by scouts from several professional football teams.

In 1974, Burley was named to the NEA All-America second team and to the Dallas Morning News All-SWC first team. The 5-11, 230 pound defensive tackle was named SWC Sophomore of the Year in 1973 and was chosen Most Valuable Line-man in the Sun Bowl as a freshman.

Burley's sister, Carrye, is homemaker teacher at Motley County High School. They are from Lufkin where their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ecomet Burley Sr., still live.

Eubank later served as Legislator from this district, and entered the Armed Forces during World War II while holding that office. He attained the rank of Lieutenant in the U.S. Navy, and was killed in action in 1944.

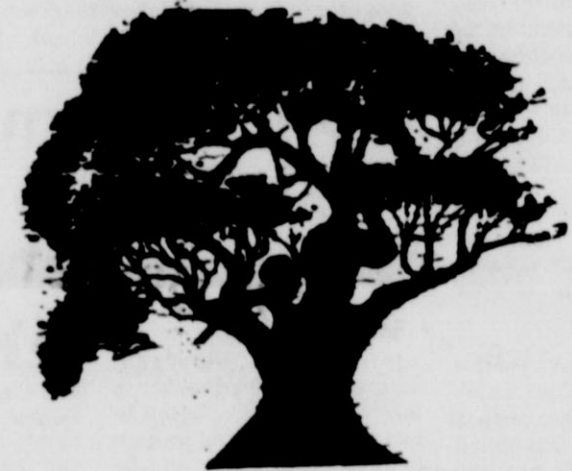

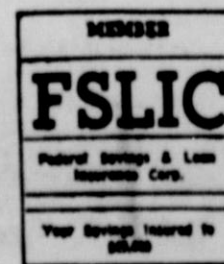

TEXAS TALK

Q: What are some of the characteristics of a good breeding bull not necessarily required for good beef cattle?

A: Most notable characteristics for breeding bulls not necessary in beef cattle include; a masculine appearance, breed markings, constitution and a good weight-to-age ratio.

CONSTITUTION — Usually described as the positive tendency of an animal to perform well and survive during advanced age. Physical characteristics indicative of a good constitution are full development of the forequarters, wide-open and broad nostrils, a strong straight back and good body width and depth.

MASCULINITY — Evidenced by the appearance of the bull. General features to look for are a full neck, strong horns (when this is a breed characteristic), full forehead with good development of chest and shoulders.
