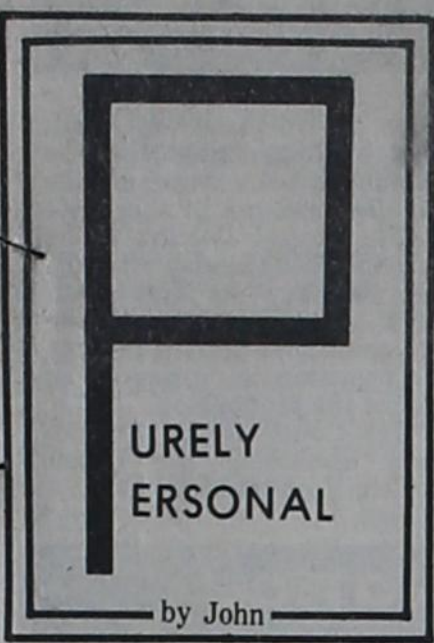

A note from "It's tuff on the People Dept." Within the last two weeks a total of seven people have been summarily executed by thugs. Four members of a family were coldbloodedly killed in an Illinois suburb, and in Oklahoma City three more were wantonly slain. Even children were included in the slaughter. Apparently these slayings were done in a calculated effort to cover up a criminal act that was being committed. This ghastly extension of crime, we feel, will continue to increase as long as the people in this country withhold the death penalty from being applied to those who have taken life.

We feel that the abolition of the death penalty does not meet with the approval of the majority of our citizens. It is only the outgrowth of the cry raised by the lunatic liberals and their syncretic press. The real cloud on the horizon is not only the escalation of murderous crime but the very real possibility that the citizenry in an effort to protect itself will resort to mob justice and the lynch law.

Admittedly, in the past, the administration of justice has not always been evenhanded or in many instances fair. We as a country have traveled a long road toward national maturity and have eventually passed legislation along the way that improved on our past systems.

The present liberal trend is a step backward on this path to a government of laws. Truly we cannot stand a continuation of this type of regression in our national thinking. This fall, we will be provided with an answer to the question of the direction of our national thought.

We say this because "poverty" is a relative term. That is, it connotes a difference in economic status within a society. Poverty in the United States is a great deal different from poverty in, say India or Nigeria.

On the other hand, "starvation" is the same in any country. You can see starvation at work. Pinched faces, gaunt ribs, distended abdomens are all visible signs of starvation's hand.

Find any person classified as being in "poverty" in this country with stamp of starvation on them and it will almost be one for Ripley's cartoons. Yes, we have eliminated starvation in this country, or we certainly have the machinery in motion that will eliminate it.

The removal of poverty as an economic fact is another ball of wax. We believe that poverty is also a state of mind as well as economics. Some people will not ever exert the effort to remove themselves from a poverty status. To them they are completely and wholeheartedly satisfied with their way of living.

Some people, as long as they are given the necessities of food, clothing and some shelter, minimum as they may be, will be happy. The thought of doing a day's work to improve their condition sends them back to bed with the ague.

In spite of the best bleating of the liberal left, human nature will prevail. It has since recorded history and will go on into the indefinite future. Our outpouring of billions of borrowed dollars will not eliminate "poverty." It will only increase the possibility of us all living in a depressed condition.

We feel that a national endorsement this fall of the liberal philosophy will lead to a state where, "it is taken from each according to his ability and given to each according to his need."

Two Killed - -

Weekend Accidents Involve Cars, Plane, Truck, Train

Accidents in the Texico-Farwell area over the weekend brought death to two Clovis men and resulted in injuries to an Amarillo couple.

Saturday around 10 a.m., Parmer County sheriff's officers were notified by W. T. Meeks of Farwell of the wreckage of a light plane in a pasture owned by Mitz Walling, three miles east of Farwell and about one and a half miles north of Highway 84.

Zeno Charles Crosswhite, 39, pilot, and Donald Hampton, 49, both of Clovis, had obtained the plane two days previously from High Plains Airmotive, an aircraft renting firm at Clovis Municipal Airport. They were both apparently killed on impact, according to Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace.

Although Federal Aviation Administration officials from Lubbock investigated the accident, there has been no official word on the cause of the crash. Larry Barnhouse, one of the owners of High Plains Airmotive, said the pair probably left around sun-up Saturday on a business trip to Fort Worth-Dallas area. At least three crop dusting planes were reported in the area, but the pilots said it was foggy early Saturday morning, and they failed to spot the aircraft.

Justice of the Peace R. E. Mears of Farwell pronounced the pair dead at the scene. The plane, a Cessna 127, did not burn after impact. Debris from the wreckage was scattered over a wide area several yards from where the airplane hit the ground.

Services for Crosswhite, a long time Curry County farmer and rancher and active worker with Curry County 4-H clubs, were Tuesday morning in Steed Chapel with Rev. A. Corbin Kiser, pastor of Advent Christian Church, Clovis, officiating. Burial was in Lawn Haven Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Naomi; two sons, Toppie of Clovis, and Tobbie, a May graduate of Clovis High School presently serving in the U. S. Marine Corps; one daughter, Ozena of the home; and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Crosswhite of Clovis.

Hampton's services were Tuesday morning with Rev. Jack Moore, Highland Baptist Church, Clovis, officiating. The graveside services were at Mission Garden of Memories in Clovis. He was a car inspector for Santa Fe Railroad.

Survivors include his wife, Faye, of the home; three daughters, Mrs. Diana Turpin of Clovis, Mrs. Donna Rippetoe of Albuquerque and Mrs. Gloria Rhoads of Clovis; six brothers, Gus of Melrose, J. L., Gilbert and Charles of Pampa, Grover of Lubbock and J. C. of Delaware; and two sisters, Mrs. Vera Brickey of Wheeler and Mrs. Opal Plemmons of Phoenix, Ariz.

Sunday afternoon, two persons were injured in an accident five miles west of Bovina on Highway 60. Ronnie Joe Morgan and his wife, Juanita, of Amarillo started to

pass a 1969 Chevrolet driven by Craig Riha of Amarillo when Riha allegedly turned left down a country road. The Morgan car, a 1969 Oldsmobile, swerved to the left and ran over a cement embankment. Morgan received facial lacerations and his wife received a cracked collar bone.

Riha was given a citation for turning when unsafe by Highway Patrolman Jimmy Bishop, investigating officer.

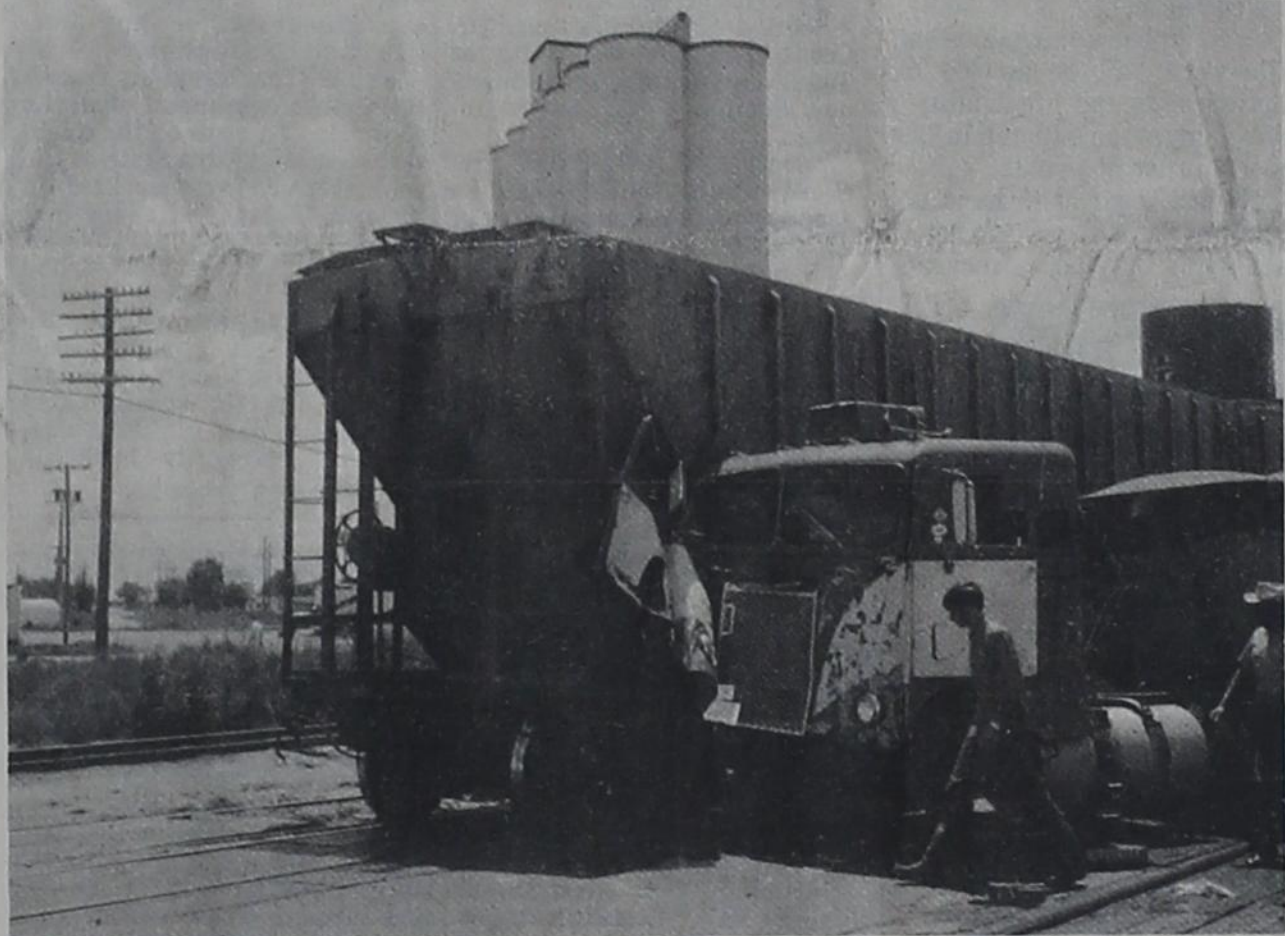
Two other accidents, one involving two cars and another involving a train and truck, occurred last week in the Twin Cities.

Thursday, a 1966 Ford Galaxie, driven by Dee Owen, was hit by a 1965 Mercury, driven by Vickie Coburn.

Owen was traveling east on Avenue D in Farwell and he allegedly turned right on Farm Road 292. The Coburn vehicle,

which was traveling on the farm road, reportedly hit the Owen vehicle in the rear. Glenn Fant, investigating officer, cited Owen for failure to yield right-of-way.

Saturday afternoon a wheat truck traveling through the Twin Cities on the way to San Antonio was hit by a train at the railroad crossing between Texico and Farwell. Raymond Lee Moore, Rt. 1, Loving, N.M., driver of the truck, reportedly failed to see the oncoming train and was on the tracks before he could stop the truck. The driver jumped from the cab after the train hit the truck and was unhurt. Willie Ronquillo, Texico marshal, said he estimated damage to the cab to be total. Moore had picked up a load of wheat from Bovina and was traveling east when the accident occurred.

Small Boy Found Tuesday

Special FBI agent W. T. Whaley and Lt. Melvin West of the New Mexico state police, acting on a tip, found Herman Sammy Vallejos, four-year-old apparent kidnap victim who had been missing from his front yard in Belen, N. M., since Aug. 7, in a shack just east of Farwell Tuesday. The boy was unharmed, according to Curry County Sheriff's Department.

Apparently the boy and Joe Ray Baca, 45, of Las Vegas, N. M., who was arrested by Whaley and West, had occupied the shack for at least two days.

According to reports, the boy appeared in good health and was examined in a Clovis Hospital late Tuesday before his parents arrived to take him home. He returned with his parents to his home Wednesday morning.

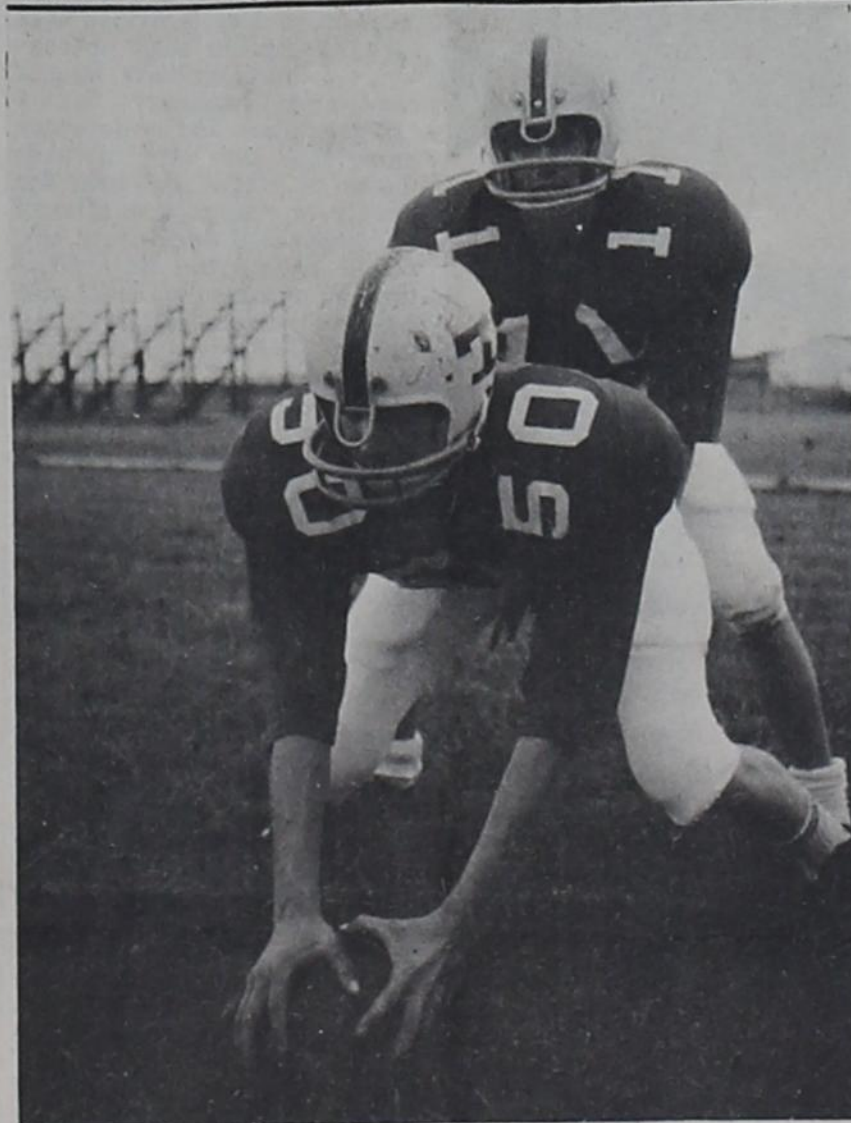
Baca was charged with kidnapping by Belen authorities and had been sought by the FBI for unlawful flight to avoid prosecution for kidnapping.

TWO MEN KILLED - Two Clovis men, Zeno Charles Crosswhite, 39, and Donald Hampton, 49, were apparently killed instantly Saturday morning around sun-up as their rented Cessna 127 plunged to the ground in a field owned by Mitz Walling three miles east of Farwell and one and a half miles north of Highway 84. According to Larry Barnhouse, one of the owners of High Plains Airmotive, the firm which rented the men the plane two days earlier, they probably left the Clovis Airport around sun-up Saturday morning for a trip to the Fort Worth-Dallas area. Parmer County Sheriff's office was notified of the crash by W. T. Meeks, who spotted the wreckage around 10 a.m.

Teachers Work This Week, Farwell School To Start

Farwell school children will attend their first full day of school Monday, Aug. 21, according to Farwell School Superintendent W. M. Roberts. Registration for junior high and elementary school children was to begin Thursday and continue today (Friday). High school students, who had pre-registered were checking out lockers and books Thursday and Friday.

Farwell faculty members have been busy this week with meetings and in-service workshops. Monday there was a general faculty meeting and a teacher evaluation workshop. Tuesday a Drug Abuse workshop and faculty meetings were on the agenda. Wednesday and Thursday there were to be in-service workshops planned by Regional Education Service Center in Amarillo. Elementary and junior high in-service programs were to continue Thursday.

Texico and Lazbuddie Schools are to register next week for classes. Both schools will begin Monday, Aug. 28.

Texico High School students will register Tuesday and Wednesday, Aug. 22 and 23. Registration for Texico seniors is 9 a.m. to 12 noon on Tuesday and 1 to 4 p.m. for juniors. Wednesday, sophomores register from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and freshmen register from 1 to 4 p.m.

At Farwell - - Supplies Needed By Students

Before Farwell Elementary School third, fourth and fifth graders report to school Monday morning, they are asked to bring specified supplies.

Third, fourth and fifth graders should bring No. 16 Crayolas, scissors with point, small zipper bag to hold crayons, etc., No. 2 pencils, eraser, clipboard, notebook paper, package of 3 by 5 cards, theme binder and large box of facial tissues.

Fourth and fifth graders are asked to bring map pencils and a small container of Elmer's glue in addition to the other supplies.

Students are not to have at any time, a ball point pen, magic markers nor ring binder notebook.

Garza entered a plea of guilty on a charge of aggravated assault and received a two-year probated sentence.

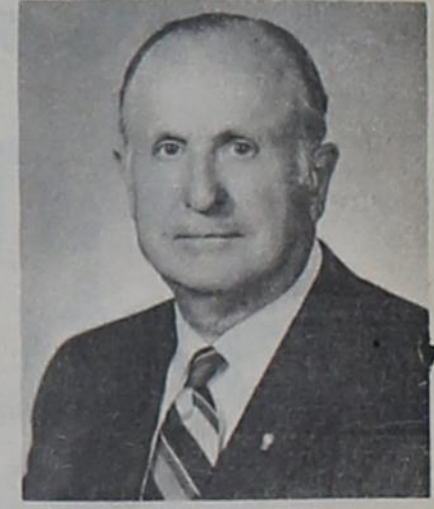
Coltharp, an engineer by profession, now is associated with the University of Texas at El Paso. He is an Associate Member of the Graduate Faculty.

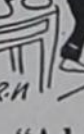

"No one is going to hand up a project on a silver platter," said Bill Clayton, executive

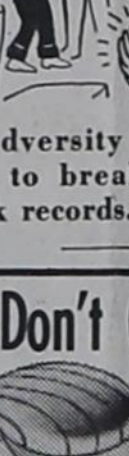

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

NUMBER 2 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 31)

General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE
LEGISLATURE OF THE
STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 6 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby, amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 6. On the effective date of this Amendment, the Lamar County Hospital District is abolished. The Commissioners Court of Lamar County may provide for the transfer or for the disposition of the assets of the Lamar County Hospital District."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election all ballots have been printed thereon the provision for voting for or against the proposition:

"The Constitutional Amendment abolishing the Lamar County Hospital District."

PUBLIC NOTICE
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 14 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 57)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 6b, to read as follows: "Section 6b. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 6, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, any county, acting through the commissioners court, may reduce the county permanent school fund of that county and may distribute the amount of the reduction to the independent and common school districts of the county on a per scholastic basis to be used solely for the purpose of reducing bonded indebtedness of those districts or for making permanent improvements. The commissioners court shall, however, retain a sufficient amount of the cor-

pus of the county permanent school fund to pay ad valorem taxes on school lands the royalty interests owned at the time of the distribution. Nothing in this Section affects financial aid to any school district by the state."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to allow a county to reduce its county permanent school fund and distribute the money to independent and common school districts on a per scholastic basis."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 3 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 41)

General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

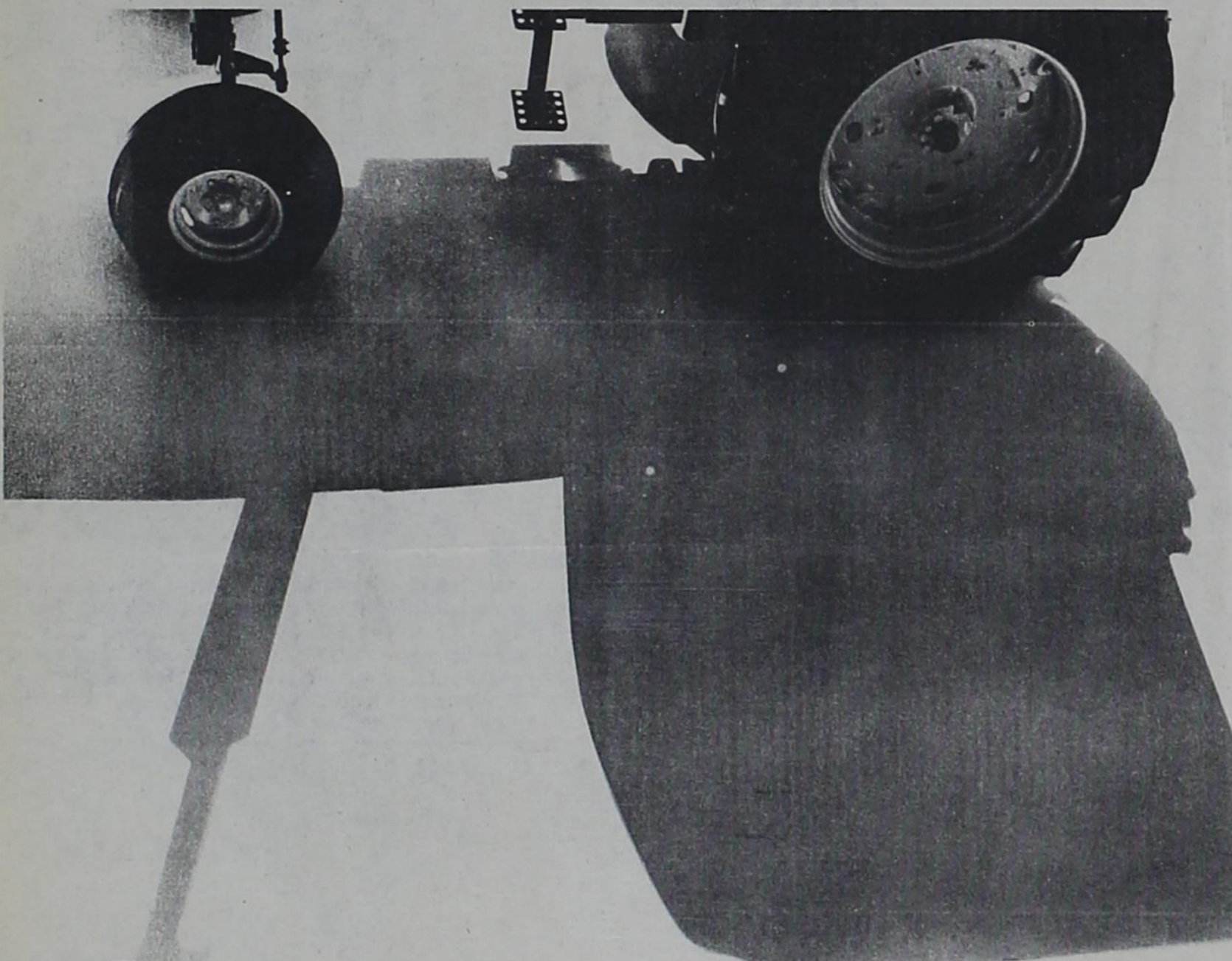
"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all justices of the peace, constables, deputy constables and peace law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers in-

cluding sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.

"All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to require the commissioners court in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis."

PUBLIC NOTICE PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 29) General Election November 7, 1972	
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40." Sec. 2. That Article XVI, Section 40, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and officers of the	State soil and water conservation districts, from holding at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any election, general, special or primary in this State when otherwise qualified. State employees or other individuals who receive all or part of their compensation either directly or indirectly from funds of the State of Texas and who are not State officers, shall not be barred from serving as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts; provided, however, that such State employees or other individuals shall receive no salary for serving as members of such governing bodies. It is further provided that a nonemployee State officer may hold other nonemployee offices under the State or the United States, if the other office is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by the State or Federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States, except as a notary public if qualified by law." Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State funds for compensation to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

Stay In Germany Is Memorable Experience

Three years ago, Kim Snider, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Snider, Jr., of Farwell, was on a student tour of the Mediterranean aboard the Liner Regina. There she met a German boy, Peter Kuhn, and his family.

Kuhn came to the United States last fall with the German Pentathlon team for the World Competition which was in San Antonio. The Sniders were in San Antonio for the event. At that time, he invited Miss Snider and her family to Germany.

Mrs. Snider and Kim departed the Lubbock airport on July 5 for a three-week tour and visit with the Kuhn family, who resides in Duisburg and Marbeck, West Germany. Dr. and Mrs. G. Kuhn, their sons, Peter and Gunther, and Mrs. Loyn Vesteeg were their hosts.

The first days of their trip were spent in northern Germany, Haselunna, where the German Championship Meet and International Pentathlon Competition was in progress.

The Kuhn boys, Peter, age 20, and Gunther, 16, won the German Championship. Peter won first in German Junior Championship and Gunther won first in Youth Championship. They won second and first, respectively, in International Competition.

"This was very thrilling to watch. The total population turns out to watch this sport which has football as its equivalent in the United States," said the Sniders.

After a few days rest in Marbeck, the Sniders and their hosts began a tour by automobile through Germany, Austria and Switzerland. Training Programs Offered Veterans

Veterans Administration experts, continuing an intensive effort to produce on-job training opportunities for veterans, established 4,607 new training programs capable of handling 9,185 trainees during May, Jack Coker, VA Regional Office Director, said recently.

This brings to about 40,000 the number of programs established since the drive began nearly a year ago. The programs can accommodate about 75,000 veterans.

The training is conducted under the GI Bill in business, industry, public agencies and other organizations where trained personnel are needed and where facilities for training are available.

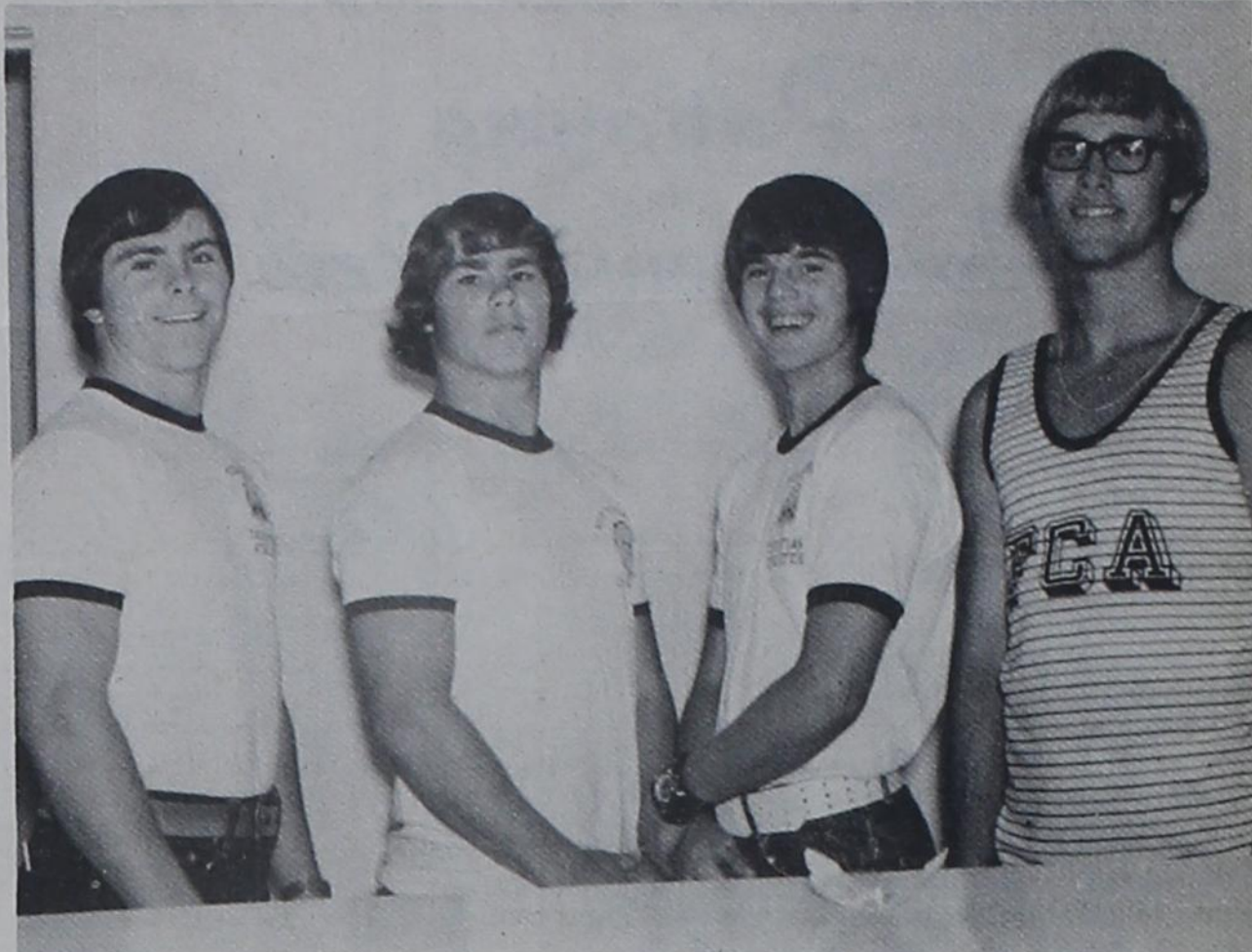
The programs have been developed as a result of VA specialists canvassing employers and suggesting GI Bill training as a way to meet their needs for skilled personnel and

to put veterans on the payroll.

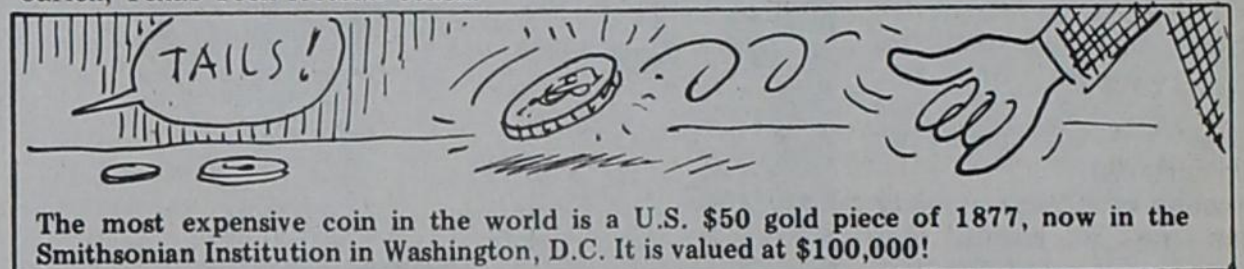
Job-training under the GI Bill must lead to specific goals. It must be full time by the veteran and designed to assure him a job as a trained worker at the end of the training period. This is usually limited to two years except for some apprenticeship programs.

Trainees are paid by VA and the employer. The employer's contribution increases and VA's decreases as the trainee progresses. At the end of training the veteran must be paid full wages by his employer for the job he has trained for.

Starting pay for a single veteran is \$108 a month from VA plus the employer's contribution, which must be at least half the wage of the job the man is training for. Married veterans get a larger check from VA, based on the number of their dependents.

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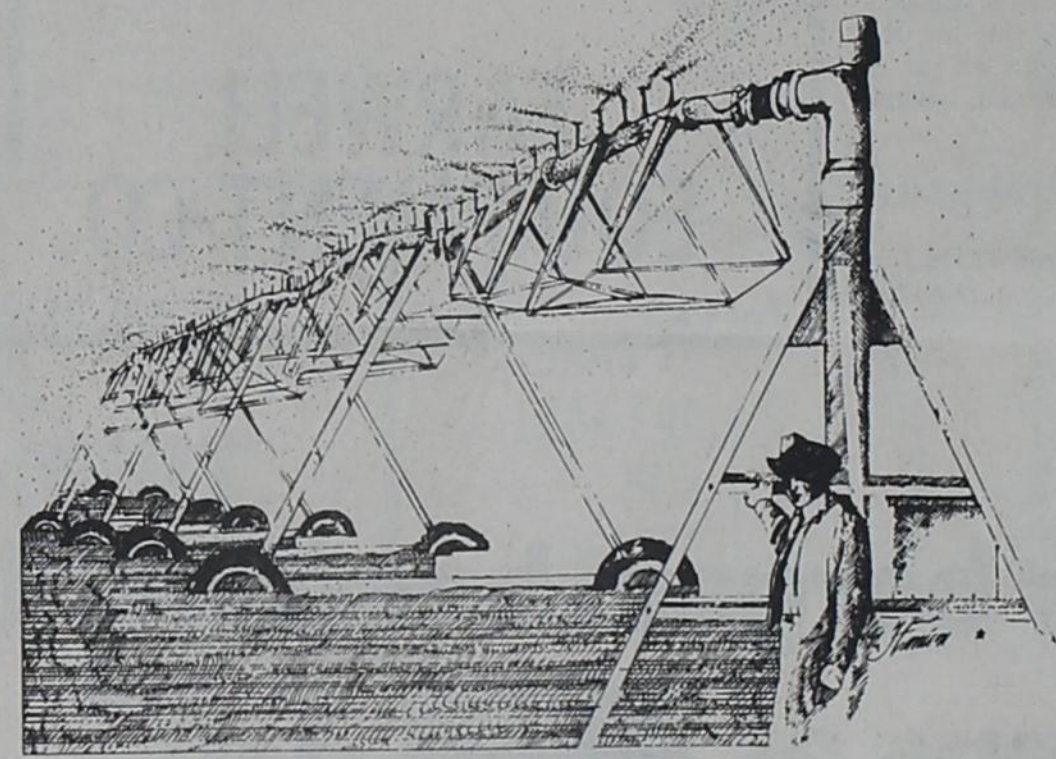
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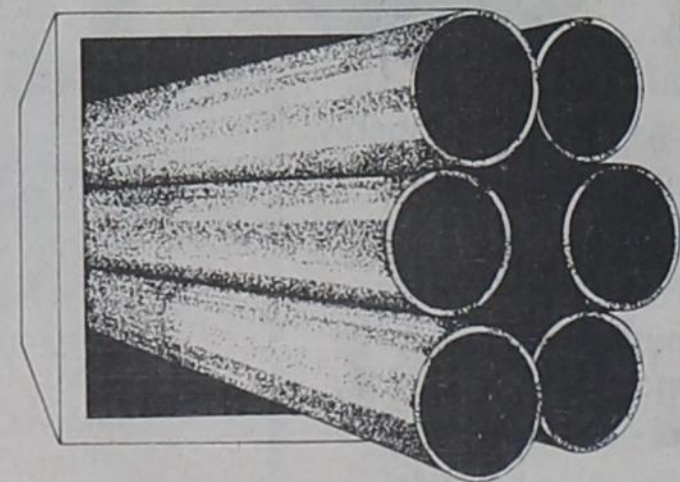


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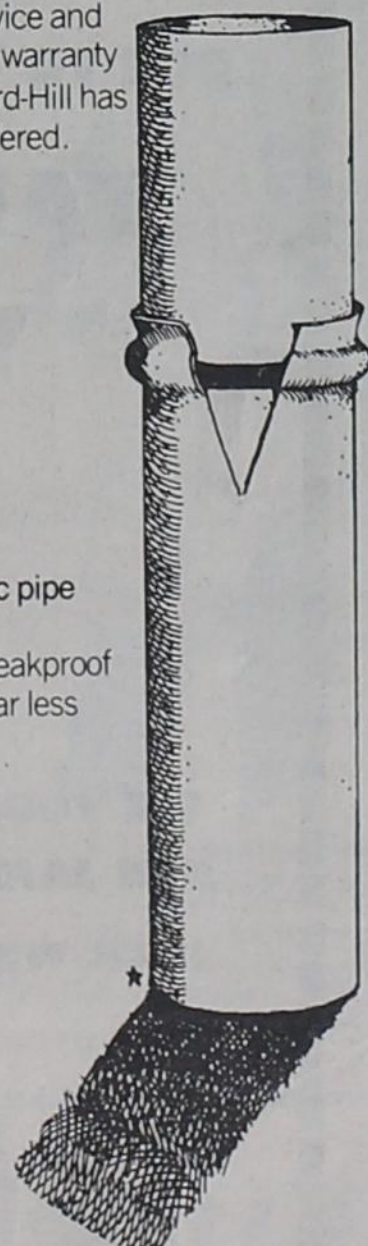

At Home In Farmer County

Are convenience foods worth high price tags? Or do they really cost that much?

A study has revealed that some convenience foods cost as much as three times the price of ingredients needed to prepare similar foods at home.

But the study also showed that some cost less than their homemade counterparts.

Homemakers generally pay a higher price for convenience.

In the study, each of four commercially prepared frozen, ready-to-heat dinners of meat loaf, beef, fried chicken and turkey cost more than if prepared at home. Costs for fried chicken dinners averaged 25 per cent higher.

Costs were based on home-prepared dinners that had the same amount of food (meat, potatoes, and a second vegetable) as commercial dinners. Cost relationships might have differed substantially if home-prepared dinners had used another cut of meat or poultry.

For example, the home-prepared fried chicken dinner used a whole ready-to-cook frying chicken (cut up) costing 42 cents a pound.

If the meal had served chicken parts — breasts with ribs and legs — at 65 cents a pound, the dinner would have totaled 35 cents instead of 25 cents. The commercial fried chicken dinner, then, would have cost only 50 per cent more than the home meal rather than 110 per cent higher.

Some brands of frozen ready-to-heat main dishes cost much more than other brands, partly because they contain more meat or poultry.

One brand of beef pie, for instance, costs twice as much while another cost about the same as beef pie made from a

home recipe. The less expensive frozen pie contained only three-fourths as much meat as the homemade pie. Similarly, one brand of chicken pie cost 150 per cent more while another brand was only 20 per cent higher.

Cheese pizza made from a packaged mix cost only slightly more than pizza made from scratch. But frozen pizza, ready for the oven, cost 60 per cent more.

Apple pie, pound cake, brownies, sugar cookies, waffles and baking powder biscuits made from mixes ranged in cost from slightly less to one-third more than similar foods made at home. Frozen waffles, heated in the toaster, cost three times as much as homemade waffles, but canned chilled biscuits, ready-to-bake, cost only one-third more.

Apple pie bought ready-to-eat cost about 80 per cent more, but ready-to-eat brownies and sugar cookies cost about the same as homemade brownies and cookies.

Paying these higher prices for convenience may be a saving for persons living alone. Preparing some dishes at home can require too many ingredients and yield too many servings to be practical. Or a homemaker may simply prefer to use her time for activities other than cooking.

When shopping for convenience foods, compare costs of equal-sized servings of home-prepared and commercially prepared foods. This will prevent paying more for convenience than you had intended.

Calculating precise costs for mixed dishes isn't easy. Before attempting the calculations, try the convenience item first to check if it's acceptable.

Nutrition Notes

Vitamin E is not always mentioned in a general list of vitamins, but it is an essential fat-soluble vitamin discovered in 1922. Requirements range from about 5 IU in an infant to 30 IU per day for an adult man. In the normal American diet the best food sources of Vitamin E are the seed oils, soybean oil, cottonseed oil, and wheat germ oil. Some margarines and mayonnaise are also good sources. Some Vitamin E is lost in food processing, freezing, and storage. However, the apparent absence of Vitamin E deficiency in the general population suggests that the amount of Vitamin E in the American diet is adequate.

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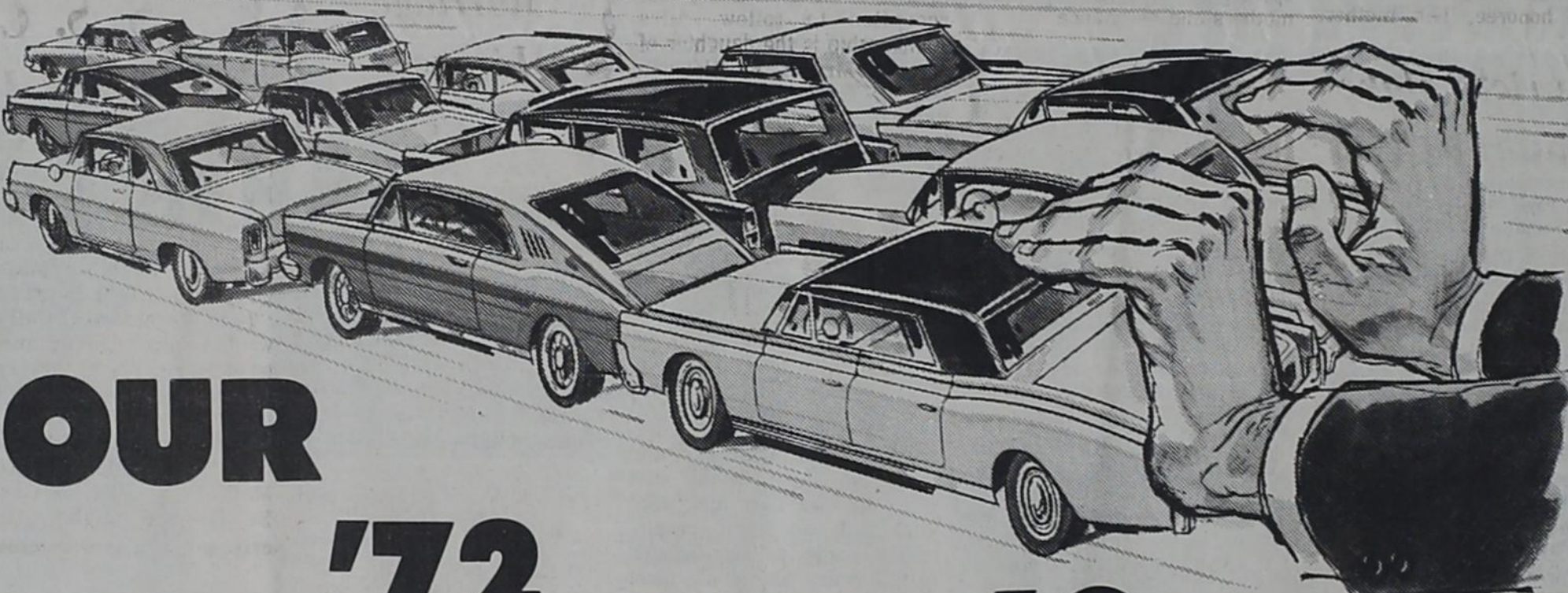

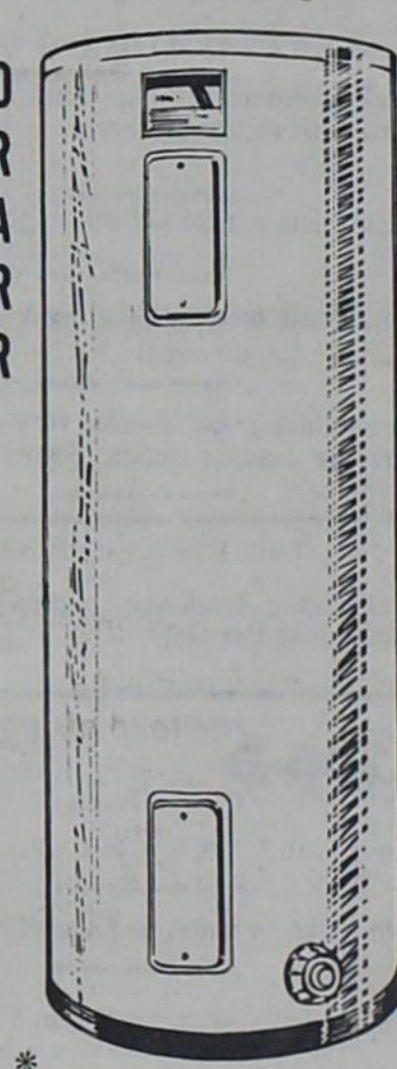


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On The Farm In Parmer County

Banning the use of the growth hormone, diethylstilbestrol (DES), would be a tremendous blow to the beef cattle industry. DES brings animals to a market weight of 1,000 pounds 35 days sooner and on 500 pounds less feed than otherwise. DES also increases the protein to fat ratio, thus resulting in more nutritious meat.

A ban of DES, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, would cost the beef industry millions of dollars annually and the U. S. consumer would have to pay more per pound for beef. In essence, no one would benefit.

What is ridiculous is the fact that a human would have to eat more than 5,500 pounds of contaminated beef livers per day to consume enough of the feed additive to approach the danger level.

Proper management of irrigation water now will certainly mean extra cotton profits this fall. Cotton has made good progress during recent hot weather. We must make every effort not to hamper this progress by improper timing of irrigations. The lateness and varying stages of growth due to earlier adverse weather and subsequent disease attack requires that special attention be given to irrigation.

Irrigation should be timed to the fruiting stage. A good rule of thumb is to wait until the first white blooms appear before applying that first irrigation. Water requirements by the plant are relatively low until the bloom stage is reached and then continues to be high during the critical boll development period. Additional moisture will especially be needed on light soils that store limited water or in areas which did not receive ample rainfall.

Some early planted cotton was delayed as much as two to three weeks by adverse weather and wet-weather blight. This cotton will have only a short time to produce a crop and can be further delayed by irrigation if stimulated to grow vegetatively. This cotton has used little moisture until recent growth; therefore, soil moisture conditions should be good. Only in situations where cotton is fruiting rapidly and not growing vegetatively is an irrigation profitable.

June planted cotton will require almost ideal growing conditions to reach maturity by frost and in most cases will not require irrigation - this is

especially true of cotton planted the middle of June or later. Yield potential for this cotton is less and, therefore, water requirements will not be as great as early cotton. Since late cotton is more easily shifted into vegetative growth, irrigation is more likely to delay fiber maturity rather than increase yields.

Verticillium wilt has appeared early on the South Plains this year. Excessive amounts or poor timing of irrigation water can increase the wilt disease problem and reduce yields. The presence of wilt does not necessarily mean not watering as irrigation will likely be required to maintain normal fruiting and growth and produce an acceptable yield. A producer may need to apply lighter irrigations or use alternate row irrigation to avoid excessive cooling of soil to reduce wilt and maintain this fruiting-vegetative balance.

When discussing cotton irrigation, proper cut-off time is most critical to profitable cotton production. In all cases irrigation should cut-off by August 15 to 20.

Says Mrs. McGuire - -

Early Okla. Lane Settlers Found It Rough But Stayed

Imagine flat land, spotted by high grass and loco weed, swept by ferocious duststorms, and you, come pretty close to being able to see what several families from Vera, Tex., saw when they arrived in what was later to be called the Oklahoma Lane community.

The families of Edd McGuire, John Scribner, Tom Hooser, Jim Johnson and Joe Johnson, from Vera, Tex., came to this area on March 6, 1916. The John and Ben Bates families of Crowell, Tex., arrived later on that year.

They arrived during one of New Mexico's and West Texas' worst sandstorms. Clifford McGuire of Elk Creek, Mo., formerly of Farwell, the late McGuire's son, says he can still feel the grit that battered him that day. He was six years old at the time. McGuire and his wife moved to Missouri this week.

The menfolk had previously come to look over the land with Mr. Hartsham. Mrs. Cora McGuire, who still resides in the Oklahoma Lane community, says they all came home making preparations to move out.

"We left Benjamin, Tex., the last days of February. Everything was loaded on an immigrant car; one end was filled with household goods and the other with stock, chickens, turkeys, etc.," she said.

"We stopped in Sweetwater a few days. Edd's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. McGuire, who were also Mrs. John Scribner's parents, went with us. Mrs. McGuire stopped in Sweetwater to take treatments from a doctor," she added.

Mrs. McGuire said the families lived in town until their houses could be built. She remembers that an old German carpenter named Mr. Worth built the houses. Prior to moving into their original home in the Oklahoma Lane community eight miles east of Farwell, the McGuire family lived in a tent for a time. There were four beds in the tent and Mrs. McGuire cooked in a wash house that was open in the front, she recalls.

She reminisces that while living in the tent, their chicken coop which housed 250 baby chicks caught fire and only 100 were saved. That incident brings to her mind the hardships involved in moving to this, as yet, untamed area.

Mrs. McGuire said their stock got locoed at first, before they had a chance to clear out the loco weed which covered the area. "I remember having to take bundles of feed to our cows during those early days. I had to ride a loco pony," she says.

Sometimes it took both she and Edd to lead and drive their locoed horses to water. "They

don't ever get over being loco," she said sadly. She remembers how fond her husband was of some mules he lost to loco weed.

Before the families could start on their houses they had to order a carload of lumber from south Texas. Dr. John M. McCuan, Dale McCuan's grandfather, and McGuire and Scribner went together to order the lumber.

The Scribner home was built first since a new arrival was expected. On May 11, 1916, Naomi Scribner, first new baby in the Oklahoma Lane community, was born.

Another incident that happened the first year the families came here sticks in Mrs. McGuire's mind. She said Tom Hooser, who had bought land south of them, took the Johnson boys, McGuire and Scribner back to Vera in the new car he had just purchased. Hooser, his wife, Alice, and son and daughter, Pauline and Elmer, were close friends of the McGuire family.

While living in the Oklahoma Lane community, the McGuires had three more children. They are Nova Robertson of El Paso, Rev. Jimmy McGuire of Lubbock and Lois Billingsley of the Oklahoma Lane community.

The late Edd McGuire began farming 80 acres. He had an option to buy more and at one time owned close to a section.

He passed away on June 29, 1964, five years after he had quit farming. The land was purchased from the Capitol Freehold Land and Investment Co.

It was part of over 3,000,000 acres which had been set aside by the Texas legislature to build a Capitol building. The Farwell brothers of Chicago took over the land and started the famed XIT Ranch. For several reasons, the ranch had to be parceled out and agricultural land sales became popular in this area.

Prior to his death, McGuire served two two-year terms as Farmer County Commissioner. He served from Jan. 1, 1937 to Dec. 31, 1938 and from Jan. 1, 1941 to Dec. 31, 1942.

Children in the area where the McGuires lived went to Knox School, one of three schools in the district. Everette Christian, Grace Christian Jones, both of Farwell, and Rose Christian nix of California were students along with the McGuire children.

The first teacher at the school was Matilda Tidenburg from Bovina. The McGuires had built for the teacher a lean-to onto their home, but she resigned one month later to marry. She was replaced by Mrs. Gillian F. Parker of Hereford.

Second teacher at Knox School was Lula Sullivan. The Knox School had two more

teachers, Mattie Lee Richardson of Vera and Mrs. Dude White of Coleman, before the three schools consolidated.

Oklahoma Lane School, the resulting consolidation, was located where Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church now stands. Mrs. McGuire remembers that Clarence Christian and a Mr. Hammonds moved the Knox School to the new location with the only tractors in the area at that time. The late George Magness walked alongside the building to keep it from falling in a prairie dog hole.

Clyde Perkins' father, James "Jim," donated part of the land for the school. The consensus is that the late Perkins placed a condition that it be called "Oklahoma."

"Lane" was added later as a result of Oklahoma Lane being a familiar road on which several families lived who had migrated from Oklahoma.

When the McGuires settled here, hailstorms and drouth wreaked havoc with crops. Mrs. McGuire remembers one year that \$159 worth of maize had been sold when a hailstorm completely wiped them out. From that time on,

Conservation Education Of Interest To SWCD

Farmer County Soil and Water Conservation District is very much interested in conservation education, say conservation officials.

Leon Grissom, chairman of the board of directors, states that a scholarship was offered to grade school teachers in Friona this past summer. The scholarship was to attend the Environmental Workshop at West Texas State University. This workshop covered all phases of environmental concerns from wildlife management to soil erosion (pollution) and water pollution.

Another phase of conservation education in which the district is interested is developing an outdoor classroom with the help of the Friona school system. Several sites are being considered for development into an outdoor classroom.

Soil being a part of the district's name, the district has developed a soils display to be given to each FFA Chapter in the county on September 5 at the Final Acre Ceremony which will be at Parmerton.

Grissom stated that the district is always interested in other ways to improve the conservation education in the county.

the McGuires insured their crops.

Another year, a hailstorm created a 75 percent loss for the McGuires. It was a pretty hard go, but they made a comeback. "Even the bad years, looking back, can be called happy days—at least we were all together," she says.

Despite all their troubles those first few years, the McGuires and other early Oklahoma Lane settlers found time for worship and fellowship. When they first built Knox School, visiting preachers came on Sunday afternoons for worship services. Soon the settlers managed to get an organ and they expanded their Sunday afternoon worship to include box suppers and other get-togethers.

In 1916, their first year in Oklahoma Lane, the settlers got together at McGuire's for Christmas dinner. The occasion was the forerunner of the annual Christmas get-together at Oklahoma Lane Community Center.

Each year, Oklahoma Lane residents are reminded by the activity that a group of hardy, energetic individuals settled the land while working and playing together.

The Farwell Independent School District today announced the free and reduced price lunch policy for Farwell school children unable to pay the full price.

Local School Officials have adopted the following family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple and easy to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardship which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

Under the provisions of the policy the principal of each school will review the applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local school official he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. W. M. Roberts, superintendent of schools, whose address is Box F, Farwell, Texas, has been designated as the Hearing Official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

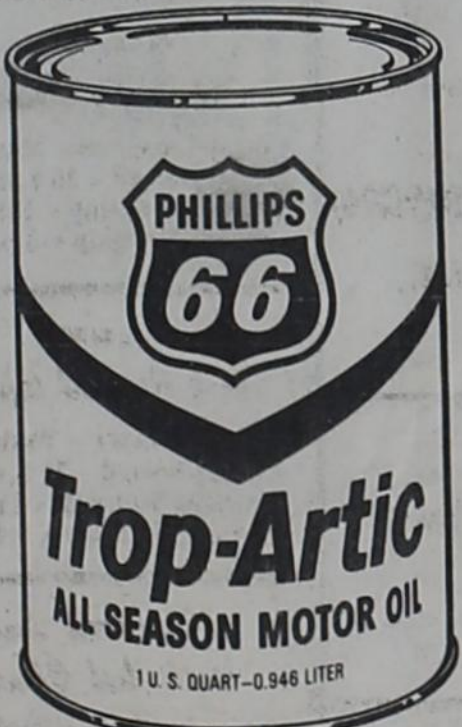
The policy also provides that there will be no identification of or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

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For Summer Fun - -

College Credit And Ocean, What More Can You Ask?

For two months this summer, I was fortunate enough to participate on the summer cruise offered by the Texas Maritime Academy aboard the ship, the Texas Clipper. The Clipper is a 15,000 ton cargo-passenger liner leased to the Academy, which is a branch of Texas A & M, by the Federal government, and she is really a beautiful ship.

When we got to Galveston on June 5, I found that there were guys on the cruise from all over the United States. The purposes of the cruise were to see different places and meet new people, to take two college courses on board ship, and to possibly develop an interest in the maritime profession.

Four days after we departed from Galveston, on June 7, we pulled into Jacksonville, Fla., to finish preparing the ship for the long voyage ahead of us.

The Clipper was lifted into dry dock, and her hull was completely cleaned and repainted.

When we left Jacksonville, we surged ahead at 17 knots (nautical miles), which may not sound too impressive, but you must remember that a ship never sleeps; she travels 24 hours a day. Once we were on the Atlantic, life settled down to an at-sea schedule. Every weekday, the preps had three hours of galley duty, four hours of classes, and the rest of your time was spent studying, sleeping, or in a variety of other activities.

Scuba diving and sailing clubs were being organized to provide a little extra fun in port. Movies were shown every night. You might also be granted a watch. I stood a deck watch, and there you could learn the basics of navigation and how to run a ship. On weekends, you had

inspection and the Prep Olympics. This was a contest between companies, and it included tug-of-wars, relays and a lot of other competitions.

The trip across the Atlantic went pretty smoothly, but the Atlantic was a little rougher than the Gulf of Mexico had been. One day in algebra class, the ship dropped deeply to port, and about half the class slid to the other side of the room, desks and all. That really perked up an otherwise drab class.

But we finally reached the Straits of Gibraltar late one night, and cruised into the Mediterranean Sea. Late the next day, we landed in Valencia, Spain, our first foreign port. In port, the schedule was changed to give us all the shore leave we could get. Tours were arranged for us, and they were really interesting, but the most fun was just walking around with a bunch of friends to see what you could see.

A bunch of cadets went to the bullfights, but I remembered that I'd nearly passed out over a clam in biology at good old FHS, so I sure didn't go to any bullfights. I did, however, meet an ex-bullfighter named Angel Zapata who in his career had personally knocked off 295 bulls, and it was a lot of fun talking to him.

We left Valencia the last day in June, and arrived in Split, Yugoslavia, on the 4th of July (which, by coincidence, is Yugoslavian independence day). They went to a lot of trouble to get permission for us to land in Yugoslavia, which is a communist country, but I'm glad they did. Split, in my opinion, was the most interesting port we saw.

There are many buildings which are of Roman construction (over 2,000 years old) which are still in use. Since we were the first American training vessel to land in Yugoslavia, I think that a lot of Yugoslavians were as curious about us as we were about them, and they were very friendly.

The local food was pretty good, and the tours were very interesting. There was some

kind of music festival in town, so our sojourn in Split had a little bit of everything.

We left Split on the 8th, and arrived in Palma de Mallorca (on the Balearic Islands) three days later. Palma is a beautiful port, with all sorts of restaurants and ships. We were docked by two American destroyers and out in the bay, you could see the carrier, the John F. Kennedy. They took us on a tour of the JFK, and I was really impressed. I spent a lot of my time in Palma just loafing and swimming in the Mediterranean.

We left Palma on the 14th and sailed past Gibraltar once again, this time in the daylight. We arrived at our last foreign port, Las Palmas, Canary Islands, on the 18th. Las Palmas is a duty-free port, so we spent a lot of time shopping and eating. We were docked just down from a huge Soviet missile tracker, and a few cadets off the Clipper went for a tour on that. They said that the Russians were very friendly and that they enjoyed the tour they had given them very much. One of the favorite places in Las Palmas was Uncle Louie's Bar, because Uncle Louie was an Aggie.

On July 20, we began the long voyage back to the States. We went under the tip of Florida, and on the night of the

30th, we arrived at the mouth of the Mississippi River. Nine hours later, we were in New Orleans. New Orleans was one of the most intriguing ports we saw. While there, I developed an undying love for Dixieland bands.

My connection with the Texas Clipper ended there, because I flew home from New Orleans, but I'll always be grateful to her for the things she gave me. Of course, I'll always remember the ports, and the things we did and the people we met over there, but I'm particularly grateful for all the little things that made life aboard ship funny and for some really good friends.

Also being bound over for Grand Jury action and held in Parmer County Jail is Harvey Neal. He is under \$1,500 bond on a charge of theft.

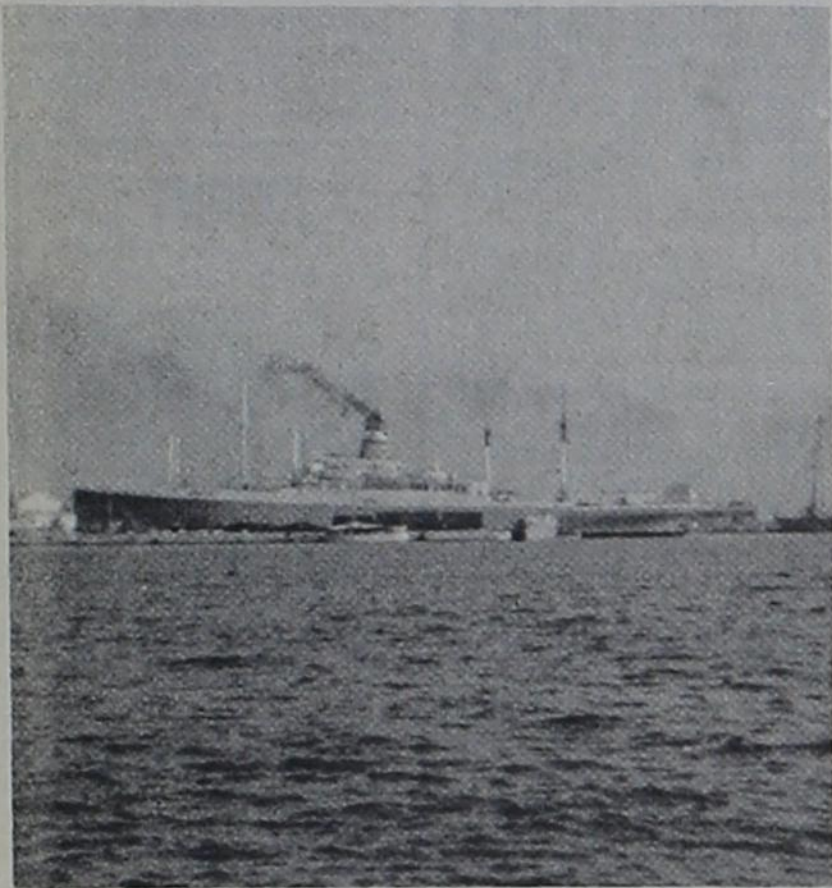
