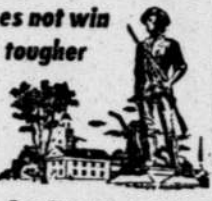

Join the Drive Here to Help Stamp Out Infantile Paralysis

Dan Davis, county chairman for the Infantile Paralysis Drive, reports that over \$400.00 has been raised thus far on the fund with which to fight this most crippling of all diseases. Half the money contributed goes to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, and the other half remains here for use in the county.

It is urgent that we have a fund in our county, so that when the disease strikes, one moment will not be lost in providing hospitalization benefits to kill the disease. Since this plan was first inaugurated, seven local cases have benefited from it.

Donations for this Infantile Paralysis fund can be made at most of the local business houses.

The culminating event for the annual campaign to raise funds for war on the disease will be, as in years past, a president's birthday ball, to be held at the Williams Hotel, Plaza Hotel, Municipal Building at City Park, Country Club, and Dal-Paso Hotel. This event will take place Monday evening, January 31.

Tickets for the ball can be purchased at Piggly Wiggly Grocery, Lamesa News Stand, and Green Hut Cafe. Earl Goen also has a supply of tickets for sale.

Persons who do not buy tickets prior to the celebration, can obtain them at the door of the different establishments where the entertainments are to be held.

New Ration Token Plan to Go Into Effect Feb. 27, Says OPA

The nation's retail grocers will begin the use of the new ration tokens on February 27, when housewives will begin to receive them as change in the purchase of rationed food for points.

The new token plan will enable the housewife to buy about the same amount of rationed processed foods and meats-fats as she now buys, according to J. Doyle Settle, district OPA rationing executive.

The present 16 points for meats and fats becoming valid at the beginning of each week roughly total 64 points a month. Under the token plan 30 points, (three stamps) will become valid at the beginning of each two weeks period, a total of approximately 60 points each month. For processed foods, 48 points become valid each month. Under the token plan 50 points will become valid the first of each month.

The tokens are red and blue in color. The red ones will be used for meats-fats and the blues will be used for processed foods. They are about the size of a dime and have a point value of one each.

Under the token plan each stamp for meat or processed foods, regardless of the printed designation, will have a point value of 10. Sugar is not affected. Tokens will be issued only as change in bona fide

Members of the War Price and Rationing Board wish to remind citizens of Dawson County that their number 10 gasoline stamps in their "A" rationing books became good Saturday, January 22.

These stamps will be good for a 2 months period.

Gas To Be Issued To Some Soldiers

To aid servicemen in recuperating from illness or wounds received while on active duty, the Office of Price Administration today announced that they may be issued special gasoline rations for use in traveling to and from their homes or their places of convalescence.

The action was taken at the request of the War and Navy Departments which said that the use of an automobile may, in some cases, aid greatly in a serviceman's recovery to health.

Today's amendment provides that this special ration covering the needed gasoline is to be issued upon presentation of leave papers to a local board, together with a letter from the attending medical officer certifying that transportation by automobile, rather than by any other means, will materially assist in the recovery of the serviceman's health.

For approximately 17 weeks, Pvt. Garrett will be trained at this field, learning the intricate details that go into the huge B-24.

An unofficial check on bond sales to be counted on the Fourth War Loan Drive, reveals that up to Saturday night, \$131,350.00 bonds have been sold, which will be counted on the \$792,000 quota.

Team workers and community chairmen from all but one section of the county were present at the Thursday meeting and heard W. B. Collins, chairman of the Fourth War Loan Campaign, outline plans to battle with the quota assessed Dawson County. There was much enthusiasm and determination on the part of all present. Each committeemen present accepted the quota assigned his district and was of the opinion that with cooperation and effort Dawson County would go over the top in this January 18 to February 15 campaign.

"We are urging everyone to purchase bonds during the week beginning January 24th (this week)," says Chairman Collins, "in order to be able to tell how much work must be done. It is our intention to have all committeemen contact, if possible, every prospect in this county during this week and to raise a sizeable amount of the \$792,000 quota assessed this county. Because of the scarcity of gasoline and tires, we are depending on each school district to stand on its own."

He continues, "If you have not already subscribed, please see some one in your district who is on the bond push committee, and subscribe at once. I believe with all sincerity that the Fourth War Loan Drive will 'go over the top.' Dawson County has made an excellent record by winning the agricultural 'A' award—let's not drag the 'A' banner in the dust this early in the game."

The Fourth War Loan gives every one an opportunity to back up the boys. Every war bond you buy becomes a direct fighter against Japan and Germany. Don't let the boys down on the home front—buy all the bonds you possibly can and as quickly as you can. OPA Stresses Endorsement Of All Gasoline Coupons

A special notice to be inserted in newly-issued gasoline ration books tells the holder that "Endorsement protects you and helps lick the black markets," the Office of Price Administration announced today.

The insert will be issued by OPA Local War Price and Rationing Boards on or about February 1. It is intended to tell every holder of basic, supplemental or transport gasoline ration books of the important part he can play in stopping the criminal traffic in gasoline sales.

This notice in every 'A,' 'B,' 'C,' and 'T' ration book issued says—Important. Immediately write in ink or indelible pencil your car number and state of registration on the face of each coupon. Otherwise these coupons are invalid and may be revoked. Endorsement protects you and helps lick the Black Market."

The insert for 'T' ration carries an additional message — "All unused 'T' coupons must be returned to your Office of Defense Transportation District Office within five days after the expiration date shown on the coupons folder.

In case of interchangeable ration books with serially numbered coupons for fleet or official vehicles the coupons will be endorsed with the official or fleet designation and the state and city in which the principal office of the fleet operator is located. Class 'E' and 'R' coupons must be endorsed.

"OPA is trying to leave no loose ends in its drive to round up thieves, petty chiselers and counterfeiters who are guilty of making the gasoline black market a thriving racket," Howard R. Gholson, District Director of OPA, said.

Coupon endorsement by motor car drivers has been extremely valuable in combatting black market and in tracing stolen and counterfeit coupons. It has also proved effective in halting the transfer of over issued coupons. "Because of the importance of endorsement to enforcement in stamping out the black market, failure to endorse coupons is a ground for revoking rations," he added. It was also pointed out that dealers who accept unendorsed or loose coupons will not be permitted to replenish their inventory with such irregular coupons.

Dr. Cox Says ...

Commenting on the fact that there were approximately 25,000 cases of flu reported in Texas last week, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said today that there is no way to estimate the number of additional cases not attended by a physician, therefore not reported.

Dr. Cox urged every Texan to do his utmost to protect himself and his family from the dangers of influenza and its possible complications and stressed the fact that it is not a disease to be regarded lightly.

"It is a serious mistake to try to fight flu, on your feet. Complete bed rest, lots of liquids, a light diet, and treatment prescribed by a competent physician are the steps most necessary to early recovery," Dr. Cox said.

"Pneumonia is a frequent complication of influenza, and with vitality low from the effects of flu, pneumonia can be an unusually serious menace," Dr. Cox said.

The State Health Officer said that undue exposure to cold, wet weather, maintaining good ventilation, obtaining sufficient sleep and eating a nourishing, well-balanced diet will aid in building up physical resistance and may help to ward off influenza. If, in spite of these precautions, fever, bone-ache, and other flu symptoms appear, the patient should go to bed immediately and consult his family physician.

Latest News From COUNTY AGENT

By LEE R. POOL

Through a few observations I can see that farmers of Dawson County are surely stuck on D. & P. L. cotton. By questioning many of the farmers, I find that they have facts and figures to back up their enthusiasm. I have heard several of them state that the turn-out of D. & P. L. was better than that of the Half and Half, and that very little if any had been turned down by the government loan program. Other statements were to the effect that it matured right along with Half and Half. One farmer stated that it only took one bale of cotton to convince him that this was the right type of cotton for planting in this county.

There have also been some good experiments run on the various types of grain sorghums, namely Plainsman, Wheatland, and Martin's Milo. The general opinion of the farmers of this county is that Plainsman meets with their approval more so than the other two. Then their next choice is Martin's Milos have become very popular in this county. The past year or so, farmers have recognized the fact that they are good for combining, being easy to harvest and production being on the average of about 1500 pounds per acre.

They have also found that the Martin's type Milo matures just a little sooner than either of the other two. But they like the big bright reddish-orange colored grain of the Plainsman variety and the production of it will far surpass other varieties in this county.

The Lubbock Experiment Station has established a new variety of sudan known as Sweet Sudan. Very little of this seed is on hand at the present, but I have been advised by the Lubbock Station that they will let three farmers of Dawson County have a few ounces each. So if some farmer is interested, if he will call at my office, I will try to make

arrangements for him to secure a few ounces of these seed. Of course, this is an experiment, but it is the opinion of those who have propagated this variety that it soon will be the leading sudan.

It still isn't too late to order those fruit trees that you have been intending to plant around your farm. So hurry and secure you some trees and in only a year or so you will be proud of them. Don't forget this is a good time to give your orchard a little pruning. Some of them which may be well shaped with a thick, heavy growth in the center, certainly need to be thinned to let the sunshine in and mature the fruit. This gives a better fruit crop.

Garden Is Good Investment

January is a good time to begin the preparation of garden soil. Weeds and grass may be removed at this time, looking ahead to February and March planting. A good gardener can expect a yield of one-half to one pound of vegetables per foot of row. That means extra space in the back yard devoted to a Victory garden will yield good returns, says the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

It is also possible to increase vegetable yields by the addition of fertilizer to the soil. In sandy areas, three to five pound of commercial fertilizer per 100 feet of row is recommended. It should be chopped into the soil 10 days before planting time. But in heavy soil, or where

moisture is limited, commercial fertilizer is not desirable. You can use barnlot fertilizer or compost, using 25 to 50 pounds of well-rotted manure to each 100 feet of row space.

TOWN AND FARM IN WARTIME

SELECTIVE SERVICE CHANGES

Occupational deferments generally will be denied 18 to 22-year-old registrants, other than those in agriculture, fathers and non-fathers alike, unless they are engaged in activities in which deferment is specially authorized, according to Selective Service. Furthermore, all registrants will be given pre-induction physical examination at least 21 days before being inducted. Therefore, the period of three weeks in the enlisted reserve now granted by the army and the one-week period granted by the navy will be eliminated. These changes become effective February 1.

SOCIAL SECURITY FOR FARMERS

Social insurance for farm operators, farm workers, business and professional men, household workers, and employees of governmental and non-profit organizations was recommended by the Social Security Board in its eighth annual report. The Board urged inclusion of these groups in an expanded social security program which would include insurance against costs of medical and hospital care without disturbing the present principle of free choice in selection of physicians or hospitals. The Board recommended that a comprehensive social insurance system should be set up now while earnings are "at record levels" in order to have it in full operation for the postwar period.

TO STABILIZE RATION BUYING POWER

Under the new ration token plan effective February 27, the housewife

will be able to buy about the same amount of rationed processed foods and meats-fats as she can now. Point values will be adjusted so the individual's allotment of 60 points for buying meats and fats will buy the same amount as the present allotment of approximately 64 points. Similarly, under the token plan the 50-point allotment for processed foods will buy an amount equal to the present 48-point allotment.

PRE-WAR BABY CARRIAGES BACK

Pre-war baby carriages, strollers, walkers, and pushcarts will reappear on the market in about six weeks, according to WPB. Greater availability of steel makes possible the production of these pre-war models.

ASKS FARMERS' HELP IN WOODS

To mobilize farmers on farm woodlands and for work in forest industries, the War Production Board, War Food Administration, and War Manpower Commission have combined forces. Farmers and farm workers are asked to devote their spare time, particularly during the slack winter-spring period, to work in the woods and wood industries. Production of 14 million cords of domestic pulpwood will be necessary in 1944 to supply the needs of our armed forces overseas and meet essential home front war requirements, according to WPB's paper division. Farmers have nearly 139 million acres of farm woods which annually produce about one-third of all forest products and 38 per cent of the country's pulpwood.

MORE FOOD FOR SCHOOL LUNCHES

America's school children have been assured by the Office of Price Administration more generous amounts of food for lunchroom and cafeteria meals under a new plan for providing rationed food to schools. The new allotments were worked out by OPA in close cooperation with school lunch and nutrition experts of the Food Distribution Administration. The Government's school lunch program, which went into effect one year ago, as a wartime measure to make sure that school children will have a well-planned and nutritionally appropriate noon meal.

ADVICE FOR SOLDIERS OVERSEAS

When writing to soldiers overseas,

particularly those in the tropics, home folks may help contribute to their health, says the War Department, by reminding those overseas men of the necessity of following the advice of their medical officers.

TRACTOR PRODUCTION UP

Production of wheeled tractors in December was the largest for any month in two years—in excess of 20,000 as compared with 4,200 in December, 1942. However according to the WPB, the current rate of production must be maintained in order to meet the tractor quota of 209,000 for the 12 months that will end June 30. This will not be easy because many of the parts needed for tractor production are also used in landing craft, now in urgent demand by the armed services.

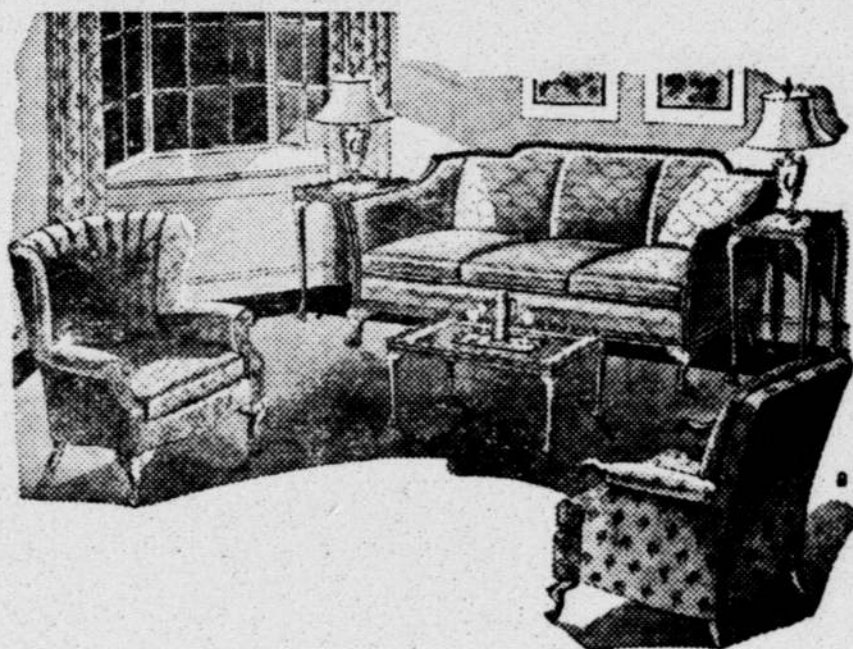
