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\$2,180 Has Been Donated To USO Fund In Dawson County In Past Week

Lamesa and Dawson County citizens have contributed \$2,180.00 to the USO Fund, stated W. D. Arnett, County chairman.

The campaign is continuing. Mr. Arnett said until Dawson County's quota of \$3,073.40 is raised, and urged all who have not donated to do so to either him or the Banks. A chairman has been appointed in each community of the county to take contributions, and it is hoped that each citizen will make some-kind of donation the next few days.

The USO funds will go toward furnishing and maintaining nationwide recreation facilities for the men in our armed forces. These drives are being carried on all over the United States. Texas quota is \$1,100,000.

Harry C. Wiess, chairman for the state of Texas reports today that only 24 days are left to raise Texas' quota.

Only one of the 18 regions into which Texas is divided has reached its goal, while the others range from 8 to 95 per cent, the state chairman declared.

"This situation calls for action—the kind of action for which Texas men in the armed services are justly famous," Mr. Wiess asserted. "We at home must take through our sons and brothers are on the world's fighting fronts."

"The announcement by General George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, that the army will reach 4,500,000 by the end of the year, instead of 3,600,000, means that the USO must go far above its quotas," Mr. Wiess continued. "Just 100 per cent contributions won't do for any part of Texas, because our goals were based on the figures which have been surpassed by American productiveness which makes possible this 20 per cent increase in expected strength."

"USO is the American's pledge to provide recreation and extras for its fighting men. It must not fall down because we at home are sluggish and disinterested."

Fifty counties have completed their campaigns with over a third of the quota, and one, Chambers County, has already doubled its quota and is campaigning for a triple contribution.

James V. Allred Speaks Here Thurs. Morning

James V. Allred, former governor and former United States district judge, presented his campaign platform as candidate for the position of junior United States Senator to a group of friends on the courthouse lawn here Thursday morning. Judge Allred was introduced by Sam Richardson of Lamesa. Following his talk here, he left for appearance in Tahoka and Lubbock.

"Now like never before in the history of Texas we need a competent man in the Senate, a man who will not bring ridicule to his state," Allred said in referring to the present junior senator.

"We must win this war, and to win it President Roosevelt needs 1,000 percent backing of every man in Congress," the speaker declared. "It's the kind of support I want to program that loyal Texans want him to have, and I want to help you see that he gets it."

Hitting hard at the obstructionists in Congress, Allred said: "I want to help the President win this war, write the peace and intelligently meet the problems of readjustment and rehabilitation."

Army Men Here In Interest Of Housing Problem

Major W. E. Hotchkiss and Lt. T. A. Krauel of Randolph Field were in Lamesa Tuesday in the interest of the housing situation existing here.

A report of the housing survey conducted here on Monday was given to these government representatives. Major Hotchkiss requested the local Chamber of Commerce to contact Preston L. Wright of the National Housing Agency of Dallas, and ask that he come to Lamesa and make a government survey of the city. At present no reply has been received from Mr. Wright.

In the housing survey conducted, Lamesa was found to have 8 vacant houses, 13 apartments and 30 bedrooms now available.

Earlier in this week the Chamber of Commerce received a communication from the U. S. Engineers office at Ft. Sam Houston, asking that a survey of the housing facilities be made here. If the government sends representatives here to make another survey and find it not adequate, Lamesa will probably be declared a military area, and will be given priorities for the building of FHA houses here.

Due to the military activities here the housing situation has been a problem, but at present every new family has been taken care of and whether Lamesa will need a number of new houses, is not known at the present.

Bombs Dropped At Midland Flying School Travel 1200 Feet Each Second

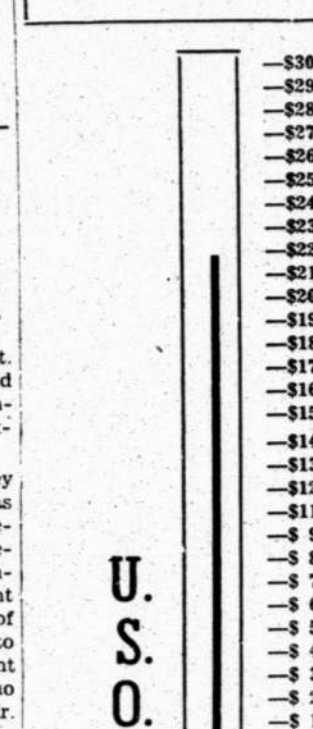
The bombs dropped on target ranges surrounding Midland Army Flying School may be traveling as fast as 1200 feet a second.

Auto Use Tax Stamps Now On Sale

The five-dollar federal automobile tax stamps are now on sale at the local post office, states Owen C. Taylor, postmaster.

The new stamp will cover the fiscal year, beginning July 1, and will replace the existing stamps issued on February 1 and for which owners paid \$2.09. It will be serially numbered and have spaces on the back for recording the make, model, serial and state license number of the vehicle.

The new stamp is gummed on the face, and it is the desire of the bureau of internal revenue that the tax stamp shall be placed on the windshield in a location that will not be in conflict with state highway stickers.

The new stamp will be necessary in order to get gasoline in areas where rationing is in effect.

Young Men Ages 18-19 To Register On June 30

All young men ages 18-19 will register on Tuesday, June 30, local draft officials state. The local registration will be held at the draft board offices. All young men born on or after January 1, 1922 and on or before June 30, 1924 will register between the hours of 7 a. m. and 9 p. m.

It is estimated that approximately 200 young men will register in this county on June 30. This is the fifth registration conducted since the Selective Service was created, and with the registering of this age group approximately 3,000,000 young men will be added to the nation's "manpower pool."

Four previous registrations have taken care of men from 20 through 64 years of age, a manpower pool numbering almost 40,000,000.

According to latest reports from Washington there will be no immediate move to draft youths of 18 and 19. President Roosevelt disclosed. He indicated that if any such step is taken, it will not be for several months.

Young men in this age bracket are not now subject to compulsory military service and legislation would be required to remove the exemption. Asked at a press conference whether he had reached a decision on drafting such youths Mr. Roosevelt responded in the negative.

A Young County boy who already has won two Silver Star citations for gallantry in action, the second represented by the Oak Leaf Cluster is Carl C. Richardson, son of Mrs. W. C. Richardson of Boggy Valley community, west of Newcastle, and a brother of Mrs. S. P. Reynolds of Lamesa.

Richardson, chief machinist's mate in the navy, was one of four Texans in the boat squadrons in the Philippines who received the Army Silver Star decoration for taking Gen. Douglas MacArthur, his family and staff from Corregidor Island to a rendezvous with an army bomber which delivered them to Australia.

He was awarded the Oak Leaf Cluster, equivalent of a second Silver Star, for his part in damaging a Japanese cruiser in the Mindanao Sea on April 8.

Richardson was born in Young County, near where his mother now resides, and attended school at Elbert in Throckmorton County, where he played basketball. He enlisted in the navy Dec. 13, 1934, and has spent much of his time in service in Far Eastern waters. A younger brother, Walter S. Richardson, is in the army at Camp Bowie.

Two Army Gliders Arrive: Training Gets Underway Wednesday Afternoon

With the arriving of two U. S. Army Gliders this week, actual Glider training got underway Wednesday afternoon at the Glider field north of Lamesa. Twelve student pilots have been receiving ground training for the past week, and the present class will be graduated on schedule Peter K. Wilson states.

Two more Army Gliders are expected here next week. These Gliders are the Cinema, two passenger type. The two here now were assembled at the Ford Garage and hauled to the field on trailers. Winches were used to get the Gliders into the air. Planes will be used to tow the Gliders later, a number of orders from the Lamesa school. Mr. Wilson stated that the field was now in fair shape for flying.

Victor J. Nelson Contracting firm of Senora, California, now has the building contract, and will be moving into Lamesa this week. Actual building will get underway within a few days and will be completed in about 60 days.

Lt. Garrison, public relations officer for the Army, states that, Sgt. Leonard Simmons had arrived in Lamesa from the Lubbock Flying School, and would be Supply Sergeant for the Lamesa School. Sgt. Simmons has spent two years in the army, his home being in Springfield, Mo. He is residing here at 506 N. 3rd Street.

The present class of twelve students will remain here for one month, but when the school gets in full operation approximately sixty students will be in each class, and will get two weeks training at the school. Each week a class will graduate and each week a new group will enter.

Raise Herbs In Garden to Be Used In Cooking

With imports restricted by wartime conditions, most Texans may profitably include a few herbs in their Victory gardens, says Jennie Camp, specialist in home production for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

Many herbs are well adapted to Texas conditions and a few might be grown commercially in Texas, the specialist says, calling attention to a recent report prepared by S. H. Yarnell, chief of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station's division of horticulture. Among the herbs and spices which might be grown with garden care in the state are basil, dill, mint, sage, parsley, anise, bergamot, catnip, chives, dill, fennel, hyssop, marjoram, mustard, rosemary, savory, tarragon, and

Less Coffee and Tea In Prospect For Future

WASHINGTON — Less coffee and much less tea than usual are in prospect for the duration.

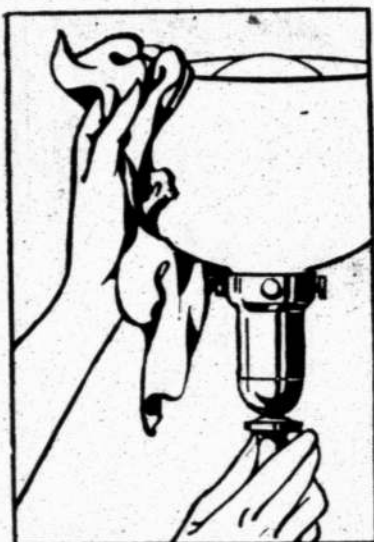
Whether (or when) we'll have to get along with one cup of coffee and "half cup" of tea daily, or

lemon verbena. Using herbs in cooking is an art, Miss Camp says—an art which is practiced too little. They give stimulating flavors to drinks and distinctive flavors to warmed-over dishes "and in many other ways can aid the homemaker in making cooking an adventure rather than a daily chore."

Here are some rules for cooking with herbs: Use them sparingly. Blend them judiciously. Don't use herbs in every dish.

Parsley and fennel are good with poultry, veal, venison and fish. Thyme, marjoram, and savory also combine well with these meats, while lamb or mutton may have mint sauce or mint jelly. A dish of mint or tarragon will make fruit salads more delightful. Chives, mint, parsley, pepper grass, watercress, and sorrel will give other salads new and unknown tangs, the specialist says. Poppy and caraway seeds add interest to breads, rolls and pickles. Woodruff, mint, lemon, verbena, balm, rose geranium, and anise are good beverages.

How to Get More Light from Your Lamps



Good light that permits faster and better work is important these days, both in the factories and in homes. Dust and grime absorb much of the light that is needed for eyesight protection and better work.

To get all the light from bulbs and fixtures, wipe them with a damp cloth regularly and dust shades. Glass shades and diffusing bowls should be washed periodically, especially those in ceiling fixtures that cannot be wiped frequently.

Floor and table lamps that are out of order usually can be repaired by an electrician. By adding a new, white-lined shade you can have an attractive and useful lamp.

Under Nourished Children Offered New Plan

Plans are now under way in many Texas communities for setting up summer feeding programs to carry on the war-time job of combating malnutrition among underprivileged children. B. F. Vance, chairman of the Texas USDA War Board, said today.

This work has been carried on with marked success through the community school lunch program during the past school year, he said, when over 369,000 children in some 5,150 schools in the state received wholesome noon-day lunches under the program during the peak months of the school year. On a nationwide basis the community school lunch program reached 6.2 million of the 9 million American school children health authorities say are undernourished.

Summer feeding program operate in much the same way as community school lunch programs with local sponsors furnishing basic foods and the Agriculture Marketing Administration supplying supplementary foods—purchased by the AMA to help stabilize farm prices—for use in rounding out the lunches. These supplementary foods are distributed by the AMA through the State Department of Public Welfare to local sponsors of summer feeding programs.

Parent-Teacher associations or other groups will sponsor the pro-

perhaps even smaller rations, will depend upon the progress of the war and the availability of ships for carrying the two commodities.

The near-future outlook remains fairly comfortable, although Uncle Sam has ordered "tea consumption cut in half and coffee distribution reduced one-fourth."

On the bright side for coffee is the fact that substantial reduction of our customary supplies can be made without causing great hardship to drinkers of the No. 1 breakfast beverage.

80,000,000 DRINKERS

We normally consume about 1,680,000,000 pounds of roasted coffee in a year. Experts roughly estimate the number of regular coffee drinkers in this country (those who drink at least one cup daily) at 80,000,000. That would be 21 pounds per person annually, or 735 cups at 35 cups to the pound. It's a trifle more than two cups per drinker per day.

On that basis, the 25 per cent curtailment leaves the coffee drinker a little more than one and a half cups a day. Figuring 40 cups to the pound (which many do) he would have one and seven-tenths cups a day. Even a 50 per cent cut on the 35 cups to the pound ratio would allow him one mug daily.

TEA LOVERS MAY BE HIT

The long-range outlook for tea, almost all of which comes from the Japanese war zone, is distinctly on the dark side. Prior to the curtailment order, the industry estimated there was enough tea in this country owing to heavy 1941 imports to meet demands until next November. With sales out 50 per cent, it is now figured that stocks can be stretched out well into the spring of 1943.

For coffee, the great bulk of which comes from Brazil, Colombia and other relatively nearby Latin-American countries, the import problem is not so serious. Imports, however, have been reduced considerably, owing to the need for ships to transport military supplies and to enemy submarine operations.

COFFEE A CRITICAL MATERIAL
Coffee has the distinction of being the only imported food product listed by defense authorities as a critical material. "The lack of which would create serious hardship." Many also rate tea highly as a pick-up drink. The national consumption of tea in recent years has been about seven-tenths of a pound per capita.

Most promising substitute for oriental tea is mate, pronounced "mah-tay," with the accent on the "mah," a product of the eastern and southern countries of South America. Brazil is the biggest producer.

Washington News Activities

WASHINGTON — The capital in wartime:

A young girl burst into the United Service Organizations headquarters the other day and asked to be registered as a dance partner for men in the service. After taking her name, the USO representative asked her address. The sweet young thing answered breathlessly: "Oh, I don't have any address yet. I just arrived in town. I came here first."

If any of these athletes think they are doing something hot off the 1942 griddle as athletic instructors for the Army, Navy and Marines, they have another thought coming. Jack O'Leary, who has been around these parts for a good many years, has a letter dated April 14, 1917. In effect, it expresses appreciation for O'Leary's interest in establishing contacts which might lead to setting up an athletic program sponsored by the League for Universal Military Training—in other words, putting athletics into the Army, Navy and Marine Corps. The letter is signed: "John L. Sullivan."

Incidentally, it was that same 1917-18 athletic program in the World War which brought forward one Gene Tunney, later to become world's heavyweight boxing champion and this much later, Lieut.-Commander Gene Tunney, director of the navy physical fitness program.

The prize question of the week at the U. S. Bureau of Information came from a middle aged little man with a deeply furrowed brow. "Where," he asked, "can I buy a used toothpaste tube to turn in on a new one?"

As it is, that's a major wartime job, but already observers are predicting that Douglas soon may be No. 1 man in solving our shipping problems.

PUBLICITY STORM

Of all the constant blasts that have blown on government agencies, the most constant has undoubtedly been against press agents, press relations, public relations and information services. In name they are one and the same. In performance, they are as varied as colors in the rainbow.

Even within their own structures, they are as different as fingerprints.

The truth of it is that some are excellent, doing a real service for the government and the people; some are simply incompetents, grinding axes for petty officials or agencies.

Still, within these structural extremes are men and printed matter who aren't tarred with the same stick as their bureaus. That is why, no matter how good or may they are, they are constantly open to criticism of a very damaging sort.

And I think I can explain by citing one example (which is not an isolated exception) why the government publicity bureaus are so vulnerable.

Out of the Office of Emergency Management public relations section the other day came this little blurb, with a heading: "The following is a short fable for the use of feature editors. It is on inflation."

"Once upon a time," it started, "there were two island countries. The names of these countries were Infla and Contro and their citizens were strong and fearless."

"Life was fairly simple in each country. There were plenty of breadfruit, bananas, plantains and coconuts and the sea abounded in fish. The people of both countries were democratic and ruled themselves through councils. They established many cities and they carried on much trade. Their medium of exchange was pearls. One hundred seed pearls were reckoned to be worth a pea pearl and twenty pea pearls were reckoned to be worth a butternut pearl."

"One day Infla was attacked by the Jaxis. The Jaxis are a nasty little people, from across the turbulent sea. They have slant eyes, protruding teeth, straight narrow moustaches and an unpleasant way of saying 'Hell' on every occasion, even when they belch. If you haven't had enough, I have. That went on for three and a half pages of single-space mimeographed

grams and will be responsible for preparing and serving the lunches."

Grasses, Legumes Make Good Silage

It is imperative that dairy cows should maintain production, and during a dry summer and fall an abundance of grass or legume silage will do the trick.

According to E. R. Eudaly, dairyman of the A. and M. College Extension Service, there are three methods of preparing it:

(1)—Put green grass or legumes into the silo immediately after cutting, using six to eight gallons of molasses per ton. Mix the molasses with from 18 to 24 gallons of water and sprinkle the mixture on each ton as it is distributed in the silo.

(2)—After cutting, let the grass or legumes wilt or dry sufficiently to reduce the water content to about 35 to 40 percent. In effect, it should be about one-half dry enough to bale for hay, but should

Cake Recipes Using Sugar Substitutes Given By County H. D. Agent, Miss Phenix

The following recipes are given by Miss Mattie Phenix, County Home Demonstration Agent, for the use of Sugar substitutes in cakes:

Plain Standard Cake With Honey
1-2 cup medium thick honey
2 eggs
1 teaspoon baking powder
1-2 cups cake flour
4 tablespoons butter
1-4 tablespoon salt
4 tablespoons sugar
6 tablespoons milk
Cream the butter. Add sugar gradually while creaming. Beat in the egg yolks one at a time. Add the honey to the milk and stir well. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Add about 3 tablespoons of flour mixture to the creamed mixture, beat well, then add the milk and honey mixture alternately with the remaining dry ingredients, beating well after each addition. Lastly fold in the beaten egg whites. Bake in a sheet pan 11 inches by 7 inches, which has been lined with greased waxed paper. Bake at 350 degrees F. Extracts may be omitted as honey gives a distinct flavor to cakes. Let stand in pan 15 minutes before removing.

To substitute all honey in the above recipe: Omit the sugar and use 3-4 cup of honey and reduce the milk to 1-4 cup. To mix: cream butter, add egg yolks one at a time and beat well. Mix with milk and add alternately with the sifted flour and baking powder as noted above.

Standard Cake With Corn Syrup
2-1-4 cups cake flour
1-2 cup fat
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
2 eggs
1-4 teaspoon salt
1-1-2 teaspoon baking powder
1-3 cup plus 1 tablespoon milk
1 teaspoon lemon extract
3-4 cup corn syrup
Sift dry ingredients three times. Cream fat, beat in syrup gradually until fluffy, an electric mixer, dover beater or spoon may be used for this. Add 1-4 of flour mixture and beat until blended, add eggs, one at a time, and beat in after each addition. Add flavoring. Bake in two layer pans lined with greased waxed paper. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 25-30 minutes or until done. Use orange or chocolate filling between layers and mountain high icing on top and sides. Use when freshly baked as it dries out speedily.

Variations:
Spice Cake—Add 1-4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, and

1-4 teaspoon cloves sifted with the flour. Omit vanilla and lemon extract.

Up-Side-Down Cake—In a heavy skillet melt 2 tablespoons butter and 4 tablespoons brown sugar. Place well drained pineapple or peaches over this. Pour on cake batter and bake at 350 degrees F. When done, turn on a platter with fruit side up.

Devil's Food Cake With Syrup
2-1-4 cups cake flour
4 egg yolks
1 teaspoon almond flavoring
3 squares chocolate
1 teaspoon soda
4 tablespoons fat
1-2 cup milk
3-4 cup plus 2 tablespoons boiling water
6 tablespoons sugar
1-2 cup corn syrup
1 teaspoon salt
Heat chocolate in boiling water. Watch carefully that it does not scorch. Sift flour, soda, salt together. Cream sugar and fat and beat in corn syrup until mixture is fluffy. Beat in egg yolks one at a time, add a small amount of flour, then chocolate and milk alternately with rest of flour mixture. Add flavoring to batter. Bake in two 9-1-2 inch layer pans. Use chocolate filling between layers and mile high frosting on top layer and sides.

Mile High Frosting With Syrup or Honey
Add salt to egg whites and beat until fluffy on No. 8 speed or beat with dover egg beater. Add corn syrup or honey gradually. Add flavoring. Whip until icing holds peak. Spread on cake. Use when fresh. Not so good after standing for some time. Frosting is quite soft and cake must be eaten with fork. Syrup icing is less sticky than honey icing.

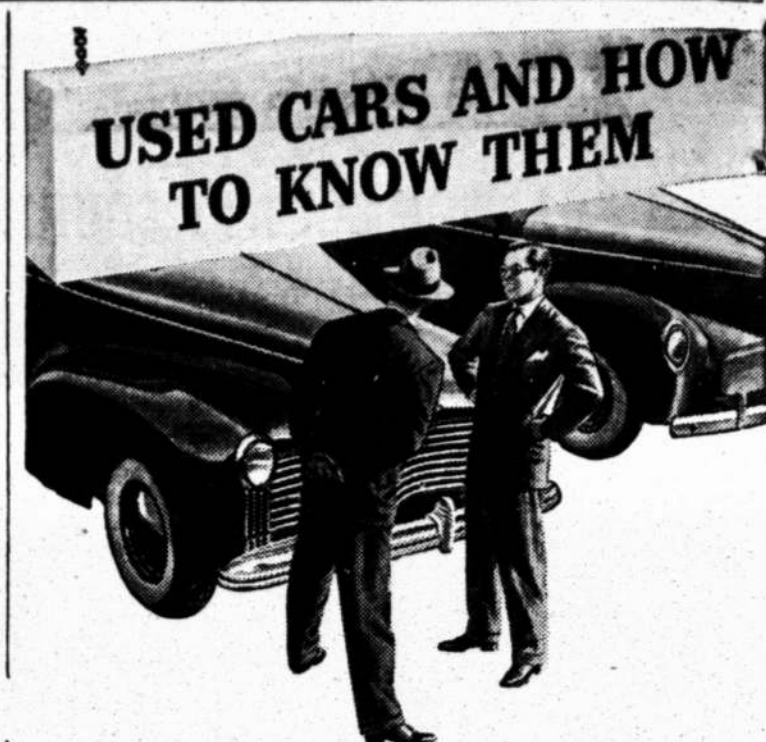

Navy Makes History In Safe Convoying

By JOHN A. MOROSO, 3RD Associated Press Staff Writer

WITH THE ATLANTIC FLEET—Our Naval task force has put into an eastern port after one of the most successful convoying jobs in history—a nose-thumbing thrust through U-boat-infested waters with ships carrying thousands of mechanized men and supplies to Britain.

We sailed serenely through "submarine alley" last night and this dawn, despite a brilliant moon to help the enemy on this last lap of our trip.

Six Minutes Off Time—The captain put the bow of our hard hitting flag ship right on the channel buoy he had aimed at 3,000 miles away. We were just six minutes off the time he said he would hit the buoy.

The official record will list us as arriving safely. It will not tell of the skill and cunning exerted to bring us home without a single contact with enemy submarines skulking along our coast.

It will not tell of tortuous zig-zagging in six days of fog, of sleepless red-eyed officers who plotted and schemed how to outwit Axis submarines.

Made 11 Attacks—Using thunderous depth charges, we made 11 attacks enroute to the British Isles. We may have sunk three subs—an excellent record for one trip.

We lost not a ship in the 5,700-mile round trip.

I have sailed 10,000 miles with this unit and our record is still perfect. We have "pushed periscopes down" in every section of the Atlantic. We have bested fog and escaped German planes—an amazing record to a landlubber like me, but just an every day job to the men of the Navy.

Spirit Was Infectious

The skipper of our ship typifies this task force. Living in a cubby hole on the navigation bridge he averaged less than two hours sleep in 24. His driving energy and fighting spirit was infectious to this Yankee crew.

Our record may sound strange to the civilian who reads of ship sinkings along our coast. He may ask how you get through when so many others fail. One answer is that submarines dodge strength. They prefer lonely ships without guns or convoy protection. The other answer is skill in avoiding them.

Travelin' Down That Long Lonely Highway

PITTSBURGH—Driving from the gasoline rationing area to the unrestricted region on this side of the Allegheny mountains takes one from the horse and buggy age to the modern in three hours.

The six-lane Pennsylvania Turnpike, stretching from Harrisburg to Pittsburgh, was like a deserted country lane when I passed over it the other day.

Not once did I travel more than 58 miles an hour, yet in 185 miles not more than three cars passed me going in the same direction. The signs posting speed limits of 70 m. p. h. are quite unnecessary. I traveled miles on end before cars passed in the other direction. It was a little ghostly. There are no towns to pass through and the only signs of habitation are the allotted number of filling stations spaced every 35 miles or so.

The line of demarcation between the rationing and non-rationing areas is startling. In Pittsburgh, many filling stations are open 24 hours a day. West-bound motorists coming off the Turnpike rush to the pumps with all the enthusiasm of a parched castaway stumbling upon a refreshing spring. East-bound drivers, heading into the rationing area, pull up to the pumps, with the grimace of a forty-niner loading up at the last water hole.

An Oklahoman from the oil country growls in disgust as he shakes his car vigorously, making sure no air bubbles prevent him from getting that last ounce of gas.

The station attendant grins. "This ain't funny," snaps the Oklahoman.

S. S. Amendments Asks Protection for Men In Service

This may be accomplished according to the Board's idea by the 'freezing' of a worker's insurance benefits as of the date of his entry into the armed service. Another plan would be to extend the coverage of old-age and survivors insurance to include employment by the armed forces."

The second proposal which is considered of vital importance to workers applies to civilian workers in the employ of the Government. "While it is true these workers are receiving Civil Service rights, their rights under the old-age and survivors insurance system are jeopardized since, under the present law, employment by the Federal Government is not covered. The Board has recommended to Congress that the law be amended to protect the rights of such workers while employed on Government projects."

It was emphasized by Adams that neither of the above proposals has been acted on by Congress and it is not known when amendments to the Social Security Act will be taken up. "It is our hope," Adams concluded, "that something will be done regarding these two proposals at an early date since many people are constantly making inquiries regarding them, especially the one affecting the worker who has joined the Army, Navy, or Marine Corps."

Texas Farmers More Than Meet Peanut Goal

Tokyo is in for a lot of blasting from Texas farmers if all the peanuts they raise this year are converted into oils for explosives.

Texas USDA War Board announced this week that Texas farmers already have planted 96,000 acres more than the 1,056,000 acres Uncle Sam asked them to raise in 1942. State totals indicate that approximately 95,000 producers in 198 counties have seeded 1,152,154 acres to peanuts. Producers in 149 counties exceeded goals originally set up for them.

Counties planting 45,000 acres or more are Atascosa with 60,000 acres; Comanche with 55,000 acres; Eastland with 50,000 acres; Frio with 50,000 acres; and Erath and Wilson with 45,000 acres each.

Primary objectives of increased production are to offset the loss of imports of fats and oils from the Pacific area, and to provide cooking fats, oleomargarine and other products needed by allied fighting forces and civilian workers. Peanut oil can be substituted also for other oils in manufacture of explosives, antifreeze and medicine.

THERE ARE NO PROVISIONS IN SOCIAL SECURITY ACT FOR "SICK" BENEFITS

As the result of numerous inquiries being received by his office concerning the payment of "sick" insurance to individuals who are ill and unable to work, Elliott W. Adams, manager of the Big Spring field office of the Social Security Board issued a statement today to the effect that there are no provisions in the Social Security Act for such payments.

"Claims for benefits under the Federal old-age and survivors insurance program are not accepted by the Social Security Board until the wage-earner attains the age of 65, or unless the wage earner dies before reaching that age," Adams stated.

It was also pointed out by Adams that one of the qualifications for benefits under the unemployment compensation law is that the applicant for such benefits must be able to work and available for employment if a job is offered him.

"According to recommendations for social security amendments recently submitted by the Social Security Board, provision would be made for 'health insurance,'" Adams explained. "Under the present law an individual who is ill is not covered by either the Federal old-age and survivors insurance law or the State unemployment compensation law."

Adams stated that many of the inquiries referred to had been in the form of letters while others came in by telephone.

Live Calf Shows How to Save Milk For Defense
