RUSSIAN REDS BACK OF WORLD-WIDE REVOLUTION, UNIVERSITY MAN SAYS IN HOUSE PROBE; EXPLAINS BELIEF

WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—An assertion that officials of the Soviet government had in official documents "declared war against all humanity" was made today by the Rev. Edmund Walsh, of Georgetown university, at the opening hearing on Communist activities in this country before a special House investigating committee.

Walsh, a student of Communism was with the Hoover-Famine Relief Mission in Russia in 1921. He said the Russian government was at the front of a world wide revolutionary movement.

The revolution he said was directed without regard to geographical locations adding the Soviet policy was to divide the world into two phases—capitalism and socialism. Walsh said a million dollar fund was set up in 1917 for foreign Communist propaganda.

Thirteen Killed, 21 Trapped By Blasts

WORKERS ARE LABORING TO CHEAT DEATH

EXPLOSIONS ARE FATAL IN OAKLAND, CAL., AND DETROIT TUNNELS

Thirteen men are dead, a dozen other injured, and 21 others are trapped as a result of two dynamite explosions in widely separated tunnels. Associated Press dispatches to The Journal further stated that several of the injured may die.

The blast occurred in Detroit and near Oakland, California, as construction projects were being pushed forward.

SEVEN ARE KILLED IN CALIFORNIA MISHAP

OAKLAND, Calif., June 9 (AP)—Seven men are dead and one is a hospital at Livermore, as the result of an explosion in the Hetch-Hetchy tunnel near Calaveras dam in the Alameda county hills.

A shot of dynamite in the tunnel some time Sunday opened up a stream of water and evidently blew into a pocket of gas. The gas was not ignited at the time, but apparently seeped into the long passage and accumulated there.

Spark Is Blamed

Investigators believed a spark last night from an electric tram or a pick set off the gas.

The dead: G. J. Plazes, 36, single, San Francisco; Fred Plader, 28, single, Colorado; P. J. Reck, 41, single, San Francisco; C. Brodd, 39, single, Oakland; H. P. Hampton, 32, married, Los Angeles; C. D. Klot, 43, single, San Francisco; Richard LaMont is in the hospital.

RIVER FLOWS ACROSS ENTOMBED WORKERS

DETROIT, June 9 (AP)—Six laborers were killed, six injured and 21 were trapped in a waterworks tunnel, 27 feet below the surface of the Detroit river by the explosion of a dynamite charge today.

Four of the laborers were killed instantly. The two others died shortly after reaching the hospital.

Fifteen other men in the tunnel were rescued. Twenty-one were trapped behind a wall of sand and rock. The six injured suffered cuts, bruises and shock.

Names Are Listed

The known dead are: Elias Tolson, C. Zukowski and A. Massey. A partial list of the injured included: Ellis Howe, probably fatally injured; Samuel Reabolt, probably fatally injured; William White, T. Craig, John Burup, Frank Balty, John Alley and Claude Winkle.

All the injured were severely cut and bruised. Some of them were suffering from shock as a result of the explosion.

HOBBS WAITS AS DRILLERS HIT PAY TOP

NEW MEXICO OIL CITY IS READY FOR BIG BOOM TO START

HOBBS, N. M., June 9.—Hobbs is waiting today for the "blow off" that is bound to come with the bringing in of the half down or so wells now on top of the pay and just awaiting the deepening or continuation of drilling.

Last week's big development, the Shell state No. 1 which blew in with a roar of millions of feet of gas that shot the oil up over the derrick and for two miles around, is expected by many to fade into second place when the Prairie tests on the Crump lease are brought in.

Just now Hobbs itself is way ahead of drilling operations in the field. The town is well advanced along all lines—in fact there is said by many to be too much business here for the amount of new development.

Hotel room is just a little easier, because there are probably 20 to 25 hotels of some sort in the Greater Hobbs area, compared to ten or so a month and less ago. There are also numerous ones to be finished including the big 200 room hotel sponsored by the Harden interests of Oklahoma City.

Streets Are Crowded

Streets are as crowded as ever and there is apparently as much real activity in the city as ever. In fact, according to L. A. Daniel, townsite company manager and J. A. Harley, of the Gusher agency, business is showing a "substantial

TWELVE IN CHICKASHA ARRESTED TODAY ON FEDERAL COUNT

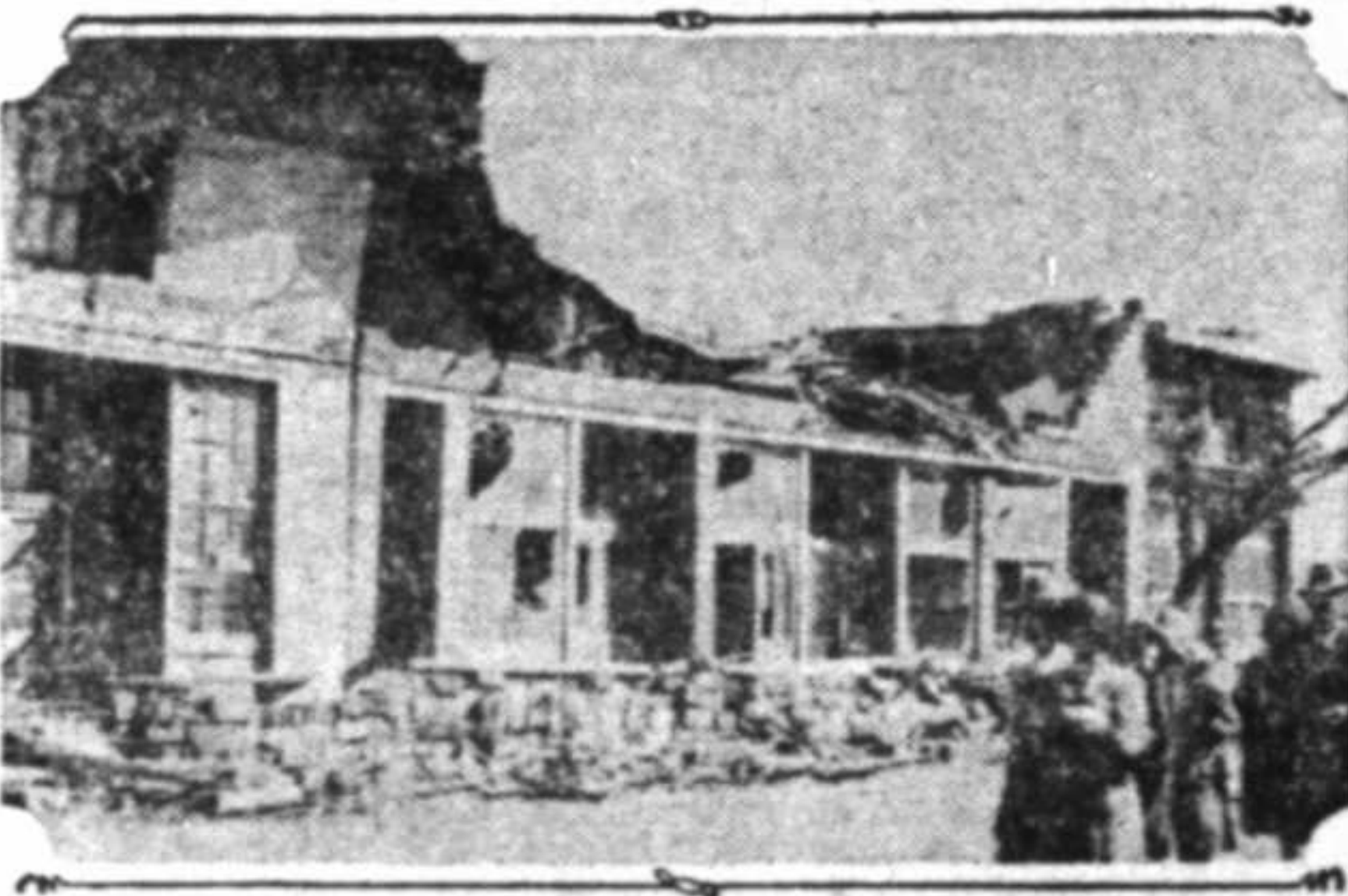

PANHANDLE PLAINS WHEAT CROP HURT BADLY AS RESULT OF HAIL SATURDAY; STORMS REPORTED OVER BROAD AREAS

AMARILLO, June 9.—The Amarillo Globe-News said today that losses would amount to nearly \$250,000 from the wheat crop destroyed by hail Saturday, on 25,000 acres in the Panhandle-Plains area.

Storms were reported at Plainview, Haney, St. Francis, Tyrone, Okla., and Bushland, as well as at Amarillo. Hail fell to a depth of eight inches between Amarillo, and Bushland and piled up six inches deep at Tyrone, Okla. Fruit trees were battered by the hail stones, but row crops not yet up were not damaged.

Olton, Texas, was entirely cut off from communication after the hail storm there, telephone lines being down between Littlefield and Olton and Plainview and Olton. No information was obtained as to losses there.

The Fort Worth & Denver City railway here reported that a hail storm over a two-mile strip west of Plainview had reduced the estimated wheat crop from 500 cars to 200 cars.

REPUBLICANS PEACEFUL IN TEXAS MEET

SELECT TICKET, THEN TELL DEMOCRATS TO 'WATCH OUT'

(By Associated Press)

HOUSTON, June 9.—In a brief and harmonious session today the State Republican Executive committee selected San Angelo as the site for the state party convention on September 9 and prepared the machinery for setting republican candidates off in the state campaign.

San Angelo won over Houston and Galveston, whose projects, upon being defeated, joined in an unanimous acceptance of the West Texas invitation.

Speakers Cheered

T. M. Ketterling, Houston lawyer, who advised the party but is not member of the committee, was applauded when, speaking informally, he declared the democrats in Texas might well look to their fences.

"In 1928," he said, "we carried Texas for Hoover, and that's just a start. I believe Texas will repeat in 1932, and it's not altogether certain that we won't elect a Governor in 1936."

In Texas we're just starting forward.

BROWNSVILLE, June 9 (AP)—Falling to his death before a crowd at the Municipal airport here, E. J. Snyder, 33, division superintendent of the Mexican Aviation corporation with headquarters here, was dashed to the ground from a glider plane, yesterday.

He had just released the towing cord with which an automobile had aided the small craft in the take-off when the glider was shaken violently by wind currents. Apparently, Snyder's safety belt burst and he fell from a height of 200 feet to the ground. The glider crashed nearby.

GALVESTON GETS NEXT SESSION AS PARTY LEADERS GATHER

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, June 9.—Senator Thomas B. Love, of Dallas, today told the State Democratic Executive committee, meeting to certify candidates in the July 26 primary, that he would not support Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, of Austin, or John Putnam of Houston, candidates for Governor, or R. L. Henry of Houston, candidate for United States Senator, in the event they obtained the nominations to the respective offices they sought.

Love made his declaration before the committee after it had considered a resolution which would have required candidates for state offices to pledge themselves to "vote for and support" all of the nominees of the primary elections.

Pledge Move Beaten

J. C. Marshall, of Quanah, who proposed the test for candidates, withdrew the proposed pledge after D. W. Wilson, of Georgetown, chairman of the committee, had said he believed it would be "impracticable and impossible" for the proposed fealty declaration to be submitted to the various candidates in time to comply with the law directing certification of names of candidates to county chairmen. He said also he "doubted the authority" of the chairman and secretary, under the Supreme Court holding in the Love case to withhold any candidates name from the ballots where he had complied with the law.

Ignore Wet Suggestion

The committee failed to take any action of the proposals of R. L. Henry, candidate for United States senator, and John Putnam, candidate for governor, to hold a statewide referendum on the 18th amendment. Both men are from Houston.

When the proposals of the two candidates were submitted to the committee, no action of any kind was recommended by any of the members and the issue was passed over. Whether the question would be taken up later could not be determined.

Negroes Are Barred

Under the terms of a resolution adopted by the committee, negroes were barred from participating in the democratic primary. The resolution stated that any white male or female would be permitted to cast

OIL NOTES

BROWNFIELD, June 9.—(Special)—Work was scheduled to start this week on the drilling with a standard rig of the Permian well in section 58, twelve miles northwest of Brownfield. This well was shut down at 3,320 feet several months ago to await arrival of a standard rig from New Mexico. Contract drilling is to be done to 5,000 feet if it is expected.

A good showing of oil is reported from the Morton test on the H. Fields ranch at Brownfield, Texas, on the Texas-New Mexico line in Yoakum county.

The hole has reached a total depth of 5,300 feet and is in the Permian. There is also a good showing of gas reported.

Plans are under way for the drilling of a test well to be known as the "Lehman test" in Cochran county, near the Yoakum county line, reports here indicate.

Cochran and Yoakum counties are well leaved for oil and gas. There is considerable interest in drilling activities in these counties.

WEWOKA, Okla., June 9.—(Special)—Wilson and others Number 1 Douglas Cromwell sand discovery well in 36-8-8 has been drilled about a foot and a half deeper into the pay sand and shows a fair increase in production it was reported today.

This morning's gauge showed it making 152 barrels. This is an increase of 38 barrels since the previous gauge registered 114 barrels for the 24 hours. The well is flowing naturally. The well is near the city limits on the south side and has started an increased flow just outside and inside the city line. Four direct efforts have been made and two are drilling now.

LONDON, June 9.—(Special)—Nurse, the famous flying Finn who holds more track records than any other man, smashed the world's mark for the six-mile run in a race at Stamford Bridge today.

The great Finn covered the distance in 20 minutes, 38.3 seconds as compared to the record of 39.2 seconds set by Alfred Schuler of England which stood since 1904.

REVIEW OF THE WEEK'S FOREIGN NEWS

No drama of seething India or of China's warring rivals in last week's news could equal the spectacular coup of a Prince who returned to take the throne he had renounced five years ago for love of a woman.

In the days that are gone thrones were regained by military force, but Prince Carol of Rumania reclaimed his birthright in the modern manner. He used an airplane, flying from Germany with a French pilot, and when he landed in Bucharest in the uniform of a Rumanian general his path to the crown was cleared with rapidity.

Was Wanted
Political parties, except the liberals, desired the return of the Prince, as did likewise the army officers, and it seemed the population in general. As soon as he arrived, the cabinet went into all-night session and, failing to agree on the course to pursue, resigned.

M. Mironescu, foreign minister thereupon was commissioned to succeed Julio Manu as premier, and within a short time had assembled a ministry.

That was on Friday night, and Saturday morning the Chamber of Deputies and the Senate, meanwhile, were clamoring for the proclamation of Prince Carol as king. They were unable to obtain a sitting Saturday, but yesterday they met in special session and restored Carol to his birthright. The new

cabinet then resigned, and another will be formed.

Youngster Steps Back
Thus Carol's son, the former boy king Michael, stepped backward to the position of Crown Prince, again just a happy boy of nine years.

While the salt raiding activities of India's nationalists lessened because of the coming of the monsoon, ushering in the rainy season, the British forces turned to the fierce hill tribes which for several months have been menacing the strategic city of Peshawar on the northwestern frontier.

These tribesmen were quartered in caves of the wild and hilly territory and were extremely difficult to find by ordinary military operations. But the British sent 80 airplanes over the area southwest of Peshawar, loaded with 5,000 bombs, and the indications afterward were the hill men had gone elsewhere.

China Is Troubled
The Chinese Nationalist government, headed by General Chiang Kai-Shek, was troubled by many things besides the onward sweep of a hard-fighting northern coalition. Forces which they could be spared from the battle lines were compelled to attempt a check on the spread of bandit and communistic depredations, while economic distress was caused by depreciated silver, crop failures and paralyzed business.

In addition to the northern forces which have made heavy onslaughts against the government in Honan province and have crossed the Yellow river toward Tsunan, 50,000 Kwangsi rebels and bandit battalions have begun an attack from the south. The cities of Hankow, Wuchang and Harbin are threatened.

Dirigible Triumphs
The German dirigible Graf Zeppelin added another accomplishment to its record flying 18,000 miles in a 19-day trip that took it from Friedrichshafen to Seattle, Seattle to Pernambuco and Rio Janeiro, Rio Janeiro to Lakehurst and Lakehurst back to Seattle and Friedrichshafen.

Another change occurred in Sweden, where Gustaf, former king, formed a ministry to succeed that of Arvid Lindman resigned.

Shriners' Meeting Opens In Toronto
One hundred and fifty Shriners and their wives are expected to attend the chicken barbecue to be sponsored by the Lubbock Shrine club June 20 at the local country club. It was announced today.

I am not sure I do not prefer the simple life. I mean the kind of life your great pioneers in this valley lived." He was speaking at a church centennial.

The Rent's Paid
MANHEIM, Pa.—Having given a rose to a descendant of Baron Henry Stiegel, a glass maker of colonial days, the Lutheran church will see no more ground rent for a year. The rose came from a bush on the lawn. The founder of the town stipulated the flower as the annual payment.

GANG LEADER STRUCK DOWN

CHICAGO POLICE HUNT CAUSE FOR NEWEST WAR OF THUGS

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, June 9.—Russell, alias Frank Thompson, often called "The Armorer of Gangland," drove into a New Milford filling station last night, weak from a bullet wound near the heart.

He would not talk, although physicians said the wound might cause his death. When Sheriff Harry Baldwin of Winnebago county, asked who had shot him, Thompson's only answer was, "I won't talk. You ought to be smart enough to know I won't talk."

Others Missing
The attack upon Thompson, discovery of the body of Eugene (Red) McLaughlin—one of gangland's toughest characters—and the statement of officers that George (Bugs) Moran and several other important names in the gang world are missing and presumably slain, were week-end developments in the gang war revival.

Thompson was questioned at length during the early investigation of the Moran gang massacre of Valentine's day, 1929. Police said he supplied the machine guns used in the massacre as well as other gang attacks.

Calls For Doctor
Driving into the filling station last night, Thompson stumbled out of the car and collapsed after telling the station attendant, "I am dying. Get a doctor."

The discovery of Eugene (Red) McLaughlin's body in the drainage canal Saturday was another instance of the effort gangster killers are making to dispose of the bodies of their victims. McLaughlin's body had been weighed with iron.

The story was told here today for the first time. Johnson was leading the huge bull from pasture to barn late Tuesday when he stumbled. In a flash, the animal was mauling him.

Mrs. Farrington, nearby, seized the pitchfork and dodging the enraged bull, stabbed and

punched while Johnson, battered and bleeding, crawled to safety. The battle seemed won, and Mrs. Farrington relaxed a moment, but the bull charged. She sidestepped just in time and drove the sharp tines into the brute's nose, followed her employer to a place of refuge and collapsed.

BETTING ODDS SWING 2-1, FAVORING JACK SHARKEY



Lubbock golfers proved themselves almost unbeatable on their home links yesterday in their first inter-city engagement of the season with Plainview. The country club-sharks came within two single matches of sweeping the day's contests with the Hale county invaders, winning twelve of the fourteen matches. Clinton Bussey returned to his winning ways by beating out the ranking player of the Plainview squad, Frank Kimbrough, in the feature match of the day. The Wayland college mentor is a consistent golfer with a long and accurate tee shot.

As the time nears for the annual city open tournament the interest in golf in Lubbock appears to have reached its season's peak. The usual number of dark horses will be out to win their share of the honors this year and a new champion will be crowned. Last year's tournament found Clinton Bussey way off on his game. Bob Peck, who defeated Grady Higginbotham in the finals, has moved away but there are plenty of able shoguns left to fight it out for the cup.

Country Club officials have not set the date for the city open but the tournament will likely be held during the latter part of this month or early July.

An extensive program of reconstruction will begin on the country club links when definite word comes that the 1931 West Texas Association tournament will be held in Lubbock. While this city has not been assured that the tournament will be staged here, the consensus of opinion among the West Texas golfers at Brownwood was that the Hub City was practically certain to be named by the committee.

This program will include several radical changes in the 18-hole layout—moving several tee boxes and installing a number of new traps. For well-kept fairways and natural hazards Lubbock is willing to put its country club course alongside any other in West Texas.

The rampaging Wichita Falls Spudders continued on their merry way yesterday by sweeping both ends of a double bill with the Waco Cubs. The double triumph put the leaders six full games ahead of the second-place Houston Buffaloes. In the first half championship is concerned, the Oilers appear to have the title sewed up in the well-known bag. This fact, incidentally will have considerable weight on the rival squads when the time comes for a decision on a split season. Jackie Atz and his luckless Dallas Steers are lagging behind just a mere 2-1-2 games and we'd be so bold as to venture that the Herd management is certain to vote for a split for more reasons than one.

And so this is the work for the climax of a current avalanche of ballyhoo centering around the Sharkey-Schemmel fight at the Yankee stadium Thursday night the same Jack Sharkey that has been struggling for heavyweight recognition for the past several years will climb into the ring with the German Dempsey in a match billed to decide the world's championship. Sidney Sutherland, of the Chicago Tribune, belongs to the minority group, which is picking Schemmel as the winner. Sutherland says the German should put Sharkey on the canvas for the count in the fifth round.

BOSTON LITH AT TOP FORM FOR BIG MIX

SCHMELING IS NOT AT ALL WORRIED; MANY TO SEE BATTLE

BY EDWARD J. NEIL, Associated Press Sports Writer. NEW YORK, June 9 (AP)—The rank and file of fistiana, from the high powered experts down to the two-dollar seat boys who will perch in the bleachers at the Yankee stadium, Thursday night, are hailing Jack Sharkey today as the next heavyweight champion of the world. And Max Schmeling, the German challenger, would not have it otherwise.

Three days before the fifteen-round battle in the big American league ball park, where possibly 70,000 of the faithful will gather to yell for their favorite and pay homage to the new king of the prize ring, the odds are climbing steadily in Sharkey's favor. He was "even money" when the match was made, then a 7 to 5 favorite, 5 to 3, and now he is becoming a 2 to 1 odds to beat back the big of the hard-hitting young Teuton.

Schmeling is Confident. But strangely enough the underdog in a heavyweight title tilt always feels surest of victory. The under the earlier championship struggles of modern times, when few instances where the favorite came through to victory. John L. Sullivan, Jim Corbett, Bob Fitzsimmons, Jim Jeffries, Jack Johnson, Jess Willard, and Jack Dempsey all were in doubt in which they were pitted.

Sharkey has gained the betting edge, although wagering has been light, because of his trained left hand, sharp right, boxing skill and experience. He punches well to the body, and is clearly a fighter to take it. It is unknown if he is the larger, stronger, more polished of the two.

Sharkey in Shape. Any question of condition must seem to be answered in the Boston Salter's favor. He has trained hard and evenly and is clearly approaching the 196 pounds he hopes to weigh Thursday night. He has lost weight himself, but he has gained both as his business and his practice.

Schmeling has been enough hampered by going down twice, and the necessity of keeping a fine edge, reached too early. The German puncher, too, seems to have gone slightly off kilter and one day when he should have been resting and eating and is clearly a fighter to take it. It is unknown if he is the larger, stronger, more polished of the two.

Yet Sharkey has always had trouble with rushing punchers. He has fought Schmeling's tough but also displayed marked ability to absorb punishment. Johnnie Rosen and Tom Heene, charged the Boston native out of one chance at the championship and the most aggressive warrior of them all, Jack Dempsey, knocked him out.

The fear of the Sharkey wagers rest on the general opinion that Jack has the "nose" the boys rate so highly, but he also has the discouraging habit of tossing aside his boxing ability to fight the other fellow's fight in the best of a close hard war.

German Is Cool. Schmeling is cool and calm, of typically even German temperament. He has hard enough to take full and lasting advantage of one Sharkey's mistake. He has everything to win and nothing to lose.

A former lightweight champion watched Sharkey lose his temper and swing wildly at a sparring partner in training the other day. He nodded wisely and made this sage remark: "He'll do that just once with Schmeling and they'll be telling him in the dressing room what happened."

Youth And Age Lead Big Leaguers To Victory In Combats On Sunday

A perusal of the current major league records seems to indicate that a player must be very young or very old, as baseball ages go, to get a full share of this season's glory. Picking a few names from the records of those who have done something worth while in pitching or hitting, we find such ancient as Harry Seibold, Adolfo Luque, "Sad Sam" Jones, Ted Lyons, Harry Heilmann, and Harry Rice, and the younger, Mel Harder, Bob Osborn, Earl Colard, Roy Mahaffey, Wally Berger, Joe Stripp, Smead Jolley, and Tom Oliver.

Luque, Heilmann Lead. Of these, Luque and Heilmann are basking in the brightest rays of the sunlight today. The veteran Cuban hurler, who has been in the major leagues for nearly a dozen seasons, is at the top of the National league's pitchers with a record of six straight victories. He was amply proof yesterday that he has earned this post by turning back the Chicago Cubs with four hits while Brooklyn scored a 6 to 0 victory and increased its margin of leadership to three full games.

Heilmann, for whom the American league clubs could find no use last season when Detroit decided to let him go after 15 successive seasons, is close to the top of the batters in the National league. In two games against the Phillies, yesterday, he improved his latest official average of .402 to several points, hitting five hits in nine times at bat and giving Cincinnati a 5 to 4 victory in the first contest with a home run. Heilmann, who had been hitting .300 in the Philadelphia slugging in the second game and the Phillies won it, 9 to 2.

Seibold also did well after a couple of bad games. He pitched his tenth complete game in a seven-inning effort, giving the Pirates a 10 to 6 victory over the Braves. Seibold had one bad inning, the seventh, when the Pirates scored all their runs on six of his seven hits, but the Braves had failed eight times in the second. The faithful Berger contributed to the "home run" of this reason to the fans.

Wally Berger, another veteran, who seemed to be about through with the New York Yankees, made his first start for Detroit and won out in a six-inning game. He pitched four hits, while his opponent, Mel Morris, held the Tigers to two but lost out through an error in the first inning.

Lyons Is Beaten. Ted Lyons, one of the season's consistent winners, gave the Philadelphia Athletics four extra base hits in an inning. This was just enough to give the World's champions a 6 to 3 victory over Chicago, producing a four-run inning. Lyons, in the number of games won by holding Washington in check and finally driving in a run in the ninth inning to win his own game 3 to 2.

Ferris's victory, however, Cleveland's position in the American league standings, considerably as the St. Louis Browns subdued the threat of the New York Yankees with a 5 to 4 triumph. The Browns hammered George Thomas from the mound in the eighth inning to score all their runs.

The New York Giants provided the leading exception to the youth and age rule as they defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 4 to 1, for their eighth consecutive victory and the 12th Cardinal defeat in 13 games. Bill Walker and Bill Terry, a pair of the middle aged players, had the leading roles. Walker held the Cards to two hits and one unearned run while Terry drove in two runs with a home run.

What Makes Us See?



Very often perhaps the question of "How" we see comes to the mind of many people, just how we are able to see great distances and almost and almost at the same instant see a very near object, or clearly define the smallest of printed words

'GOD AS OUR FATHER', IS THEME

REGULAR WEEKLY SERMON, CONTRIBUTED BY
REV. C. J. McCARTY, CALVARY BAPTIST

Theme: God As Our Father.
Text is the words "Our Father" taken from Matt. 6:9.

Those are the first two words of what is commonly called The Lord's Prayer. This model prayer was given to disciples and was intended for disciples only. The unregenerate can not call God his father for he would have two fathers. There is not a single petition in this prayer that the unregenerate man can really pray.

Many Blessings Received

If God is our Father then we are his sons and daughters. If we are children then we receive the many blessings a Good Heavenly Father has for his own children. The greatest of these blessings is his love. All his dealings with us come through his love. He provides food and raiment for us and all the other things we so much need. He comforts us in our sorrows, directs us in our labors, and encourages us in our trials. He gives his children grace and strength for their every task. He assures them that "as thy days so shall thy strength be."

If God is our Father then we ought to be obedient children. The Father is respected and honored through our obedience, we are blessed by having obedient hearts. Even when our Father chastens us he chastens them for his love. "Like as a father pitieth his children, so the Lord pitieth them that fear him."

We Grieve Father
Our children grieve us when they are wilful and disobedient. Even so do we grieve our Heavenly Father. He does not afflict us willingly, but for our good. We may be disobedient children and yet be children of our parents. Our family relationships are always the sweetest when the children are obedient. Even so "There is no other way to be happy in Jesus, but to trust and obey."

The little babe in the arms of the mother that can not do one thing, but must have everything done for it, is just as much the child of its parents as the older children who help with the housework or assist in making the living. You may be just a babe in Christ, but you are one of God's children and have his love and watch care just the same as your strong and influential brothers. Sometimes we have children that are sorely afflicted either mentally or physically, yet they are our children and still have our love, and many times have more of our attention than the other children not thus afflicted. Some of us are so terribly afflicted that we must give our Heavenly Father much concern. The afflicted child may never show any love toward its parents or any appreciation for their care, yet they pity it and minister to its needs. Perhaps they love it more because of its helplessness. What a task our Father must have with his feeble children.

Should Love Father
If we are children and have our Father's love then we certainly

ought to love our Father. He says, "Son give me thy heart." Does he really have your heart? The Prodigal Son was loved by his father during all his wanderings, but he evidently did not love his parents as he ought, or he would not have broken their hearts and brought disgrace upon their good name. Shakespeare left the thought that the hurt from a thankless child was worse than the wound from a serpent's tooth. God desires our love and worship far more than he does our service. If our service does not grow out of hearts of love then it becomes mockery and an abomination in the sight of God. The first and great commandment is that we shall love God with all our hearts.

If God is our Father then we are brothers and sisters in Christ Jesus. We shall our brothers and sisters well when they may be. They may do wrong, but we love them still. We sympathize with them in their sorrows and rejoice with them in their successes. We miss many of life's best blessings by not being real brothers and sisters in the Lord. If they are God's children, then they are our brothers and sisters whether they are members of our local congregation or not. If they are born of the Spirit they are our brothers and sisters regardless of whether they are with us in either doctrine or practice. We are blessed in giving our best love to our brothers and sisters and they are blessed in receiving it. We will not

FURNIFOLD SIMMONS, VETERAN NORTH CAROLINA SENATOR, IS PUNISHED BY SMITH DEMOS; BAILEY IS NOMINATED

(By Associated Press)

CHARLOTTE, N. C., June 9.—The colors of the North Carolina democratic party in the race for the United States senate will be carried in this fall's general election by Josiah W. Bailey, 56-year-old Raleigh attorney.

Bailey defeated Senator Furnifold M. Simmons, who has served his state in the senate for twenty-nine years since he defeated Marion Butler, the last republican senator from North Carolina, in Saturday's democratic primary.

With 1514 of the state's 1,799 precincts reported, Bailey had a lead of 61,905 votes. The tabulation showed: Bailey, 183,390; Simmons, 121,465; and Thomas L. Estep, wet, 1,073.

Senator Simmons, who for 30 years was virtual dictator of the

WASHINGTON, June 9. (AP)—The defeat of Senator Furnifold M. Simmons for re-nomination in the North Carolina democratic primary was the subject of much discussion in Washington today with many citing his opposition to the presidential candidacy of Alfred E. Smith as the principal cause of his downfall.

They point out that Simmons' victorious opponent, Josiah W. Bailey, entered the contest with the avowed purpose of "punishing" the senator for deserting the party in 1928 and that this formed a major issue in the campaign.

Six Drowned When Skiff Turns Over

LONGVIEW, Wash., June 9. (AP)—Search was in progress today for the bodies of six men, drowned last night after the light skiff in which they were crossing the Columbia river was overturned.

RUMANIA HAS A NEW KING

CAROL TAKES THRONE OF FATHERS; SON TO NURSERY AGAIN

(By Associated Press)

BUCHAREST, Rumania, June 9.—Proclaimed King of Rumania after five years of exile, King Carol II today was busy consulting political leaders and in picking up the threads of life once more in the capital of his fathers.

The most vital of Carol's problems was the relationship between him and his former wife, Princess Helen, mother of nine-year-old Michael, former king and now back in the nursery.

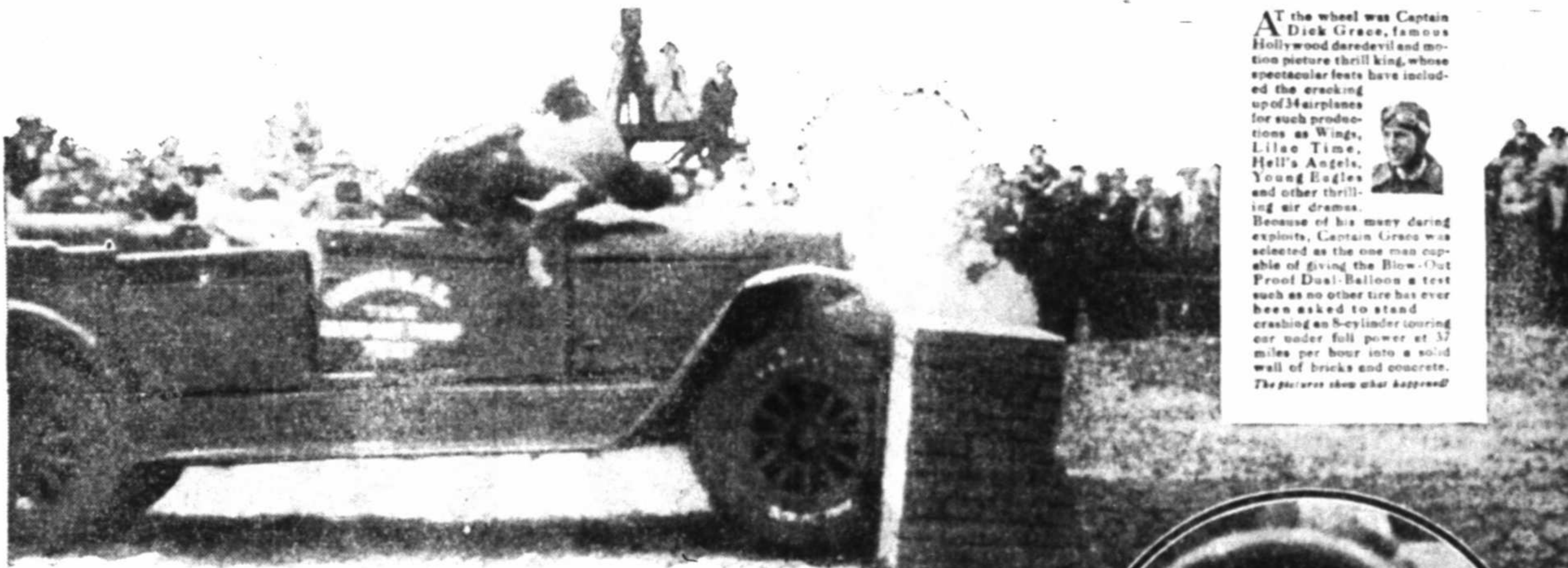
