By the provisions of this ordinance all dogs must have a city license tag and bear a vaccination tag showing that they have been vaccinated by some veterinarian for rabies.

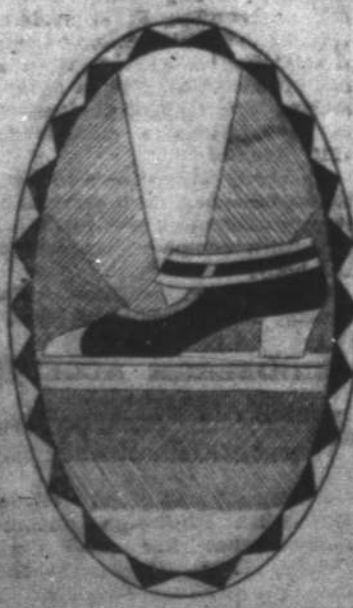
All dogs running at large and not licensed with these tags will be shot, it was stated.

Kitchen Clocks Real Essentials

Perhaps one of the hardest problems for the new and inexperienced cook is the gauging of time for cooking a whole meal.

To this end many time tables for roasting and baking and boiling have been worked out. Although they will prove invaluable to the beginner, time tables do not stop to consider the varying age and ripeness of vegetables.

Green or string beans are supposed to cook in thirty minutes. If the beans are small, that is, young, and freshly picked, they will cook and be deliciously tender in thirty minutes. But all beans can not be fresh from the garden and as vegetables will get tougher, so when we cook string beans we must allow at least an hour for them. It will take them longer than it does potatoes, so put the beans on to cook before even peeling the spuds.

On the other hand, if asparagus is the extra vegetable, the potatoes should be put on to cook before the asparagus because thirty minutes is the longest asparagus requires. If you like to serve asparagus cut in short lengths do not add the heads until the rest of the stalks have cooked fifteen minutes.

New potatoes will cook in thirty minutes, while at this time of year old potatoes need an hour.

If a dessert is wanted, hot and the meal is simple, twenty minutes can be calculated for baking after the family sits down to the table. So if shortcake is planned, the cake can be baked while the meat and vegetables finish cooking an hour into the oven to bake, just as the dinner is ready to serve. The cake will bake while the family is at the table and be perfectly hot and light when wanted.

New beans should cook in thirty to forty-five minutes. If they are smooth without lumps, they are just what you need. They will cook in just that length of time.

New carrots cook tender in fifteen to twenty minutes, while old ones need from thirty to sixty minutes.

Cauliflower needs from thirty to forty-five minutes. Care should be taken not to over-cook this vegetable. Nor should it wait long after cooking.

All these things must be reckoned with and each article of food that is to be served must be prepared or cooked with regard to the other dishes.

The Morning Avalanche Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST — Stewed fish, cereal, cream, baked French toast, maple syrup, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Baked spinach, cheese, muffins, radishes and green onions, rice soufflé, milk, tea.

DINNER — Cream of asparagus soup, veal timbales, creamed potatoes, orange-strawberry and banana salad, pineapple Bavarian, sponge drops, milk, coffee.

Pineapple Bavarian

One pineapple, 1½ cups sugar, 1½ tablespoons granulated gelatin, ¼ cup cold water, ½ cup boiling water, whites 2 eggs.

Pare pineapple and remove eyes. Cut four thin evenly shaped slices to use to garnish mold. Cook slices in a thin syrup for twenty minutes. Remove from syrup, chill and arrange around the sides of mold. Chop remaining pineapple. There should be about 2 cups. Add boiling water and sugar and bring to the boiling point. Boil gently for twenty minutes. Soften gelatin in cold water for five minutes. Add to hot pineapple and stir away from the fire until dissolved. Let stand until stiff. Turn into mold and let stand three hours or longer to become thoroughly chilled and firm. Serve with whipped cream sweetened and flavored with vanilla. (Copyright 1927, NEA Service, Inc.)

POPPIES TO BE ON SALE HERE TODAY

CAMP FIRE GIRLS TO AID LEGION AND AUXILIARY IN DAY'S CAMPAIGN

All forces are marshaled and in readiness for the annual Memorial Day poppy sale of the American Legion and Auxiliary in Lubbock and surrounding towns, and the campaign will start this morning simultaneously at Lubbock and other towns nearby. Legion officials said Friday night.

Led by officials and other members of the Auxiliary, the Camp Fire girls will take the field in the campaign that is designed this year to provide for orphan children of war veterans, and will continue throughout the day.

Funds Go to Orphans. All proceeds derived from the campaign devoted to the Legion Endowment fund, by which the organization is raising in the United States \$400,000, the interest from which amount is to be used in care of orphans.

The poppies that will be on sale were made by disabled war veterans in various hospitals over the state and nation, and no set price will be charged for them. Camp Fire girls are to be divided into groups, with each group assigned a certain territory in the city to work and every individual who visits the city during the day will have an opportunity to purchase one.

SLATON IS PAVING. South 10th From Square to High School Being Paved

SLATON, May 27.—Street paving has been started on South Tenth street, leading from the public square to the high school building, a distance of ten blocks. It will be paved the whole distance. Sunday-School Lesson

BY DR. J. E. NUNN

General Topic: Peter Undaunted by Persecution.
Scripture Lesson: Acts 5:27-35.
Golden Text: "We must obey God rather than men." Acts 5:29.

Place:—Some prison in Jerusalem, the courts at the temple, the council chamber of the Sanhedrin.
Golden Text:—We must obey God rather than men. Acts 5:29.

Introduction

The community of goods practiced by the Christians led to the loss of Ananias and his wife Sapphira, which were punished by their miraculous death. The people in general held the church in high honor, it was enlarged by numerous accessions, many sick folk were miraculously healed, and the new religion seemed likely to sweep all before it. This popularity of the Christians aroused the jealousy and bitter antagonism of the Jewish rulers, led by the high priest and his family and other influential Sadducees. They were highly indignant that the apostles should charge them with having crucified the Messiah and they were alarmed at the prospect of losing their influence and power. Therefore they arrested the apostles and threw them into prison for the night, intending to bring them to trial the next day.

The Apostles and the Sanhedrin.
We are told that an angel opened the prison doors, led the apostles forth, and bade them go to the temple and continue preaching Christ and the resurrection from the dead.
As the morning advanced, the high priest went to the council chamber, and the seventy other members of the council, the Sanhedrin, came in hastily, for they had been summoned on what was regarded as an urgent matter. So they sent to the prison after the apostles, that they might put them under a strict examination and extort damaging admissions from them. But to their dismay, the officers returned from the prison and reported another marvel. They had found all the prison doors shut, and the guards standing before the doors totally unconscious, but they found the dungeons entirely empty. While the Sanhedrin was debating this strange news, it was promptly followed by the additional information that the apostles so mysteriously released were back in the temple, boldly teaching the people as before. There was nothing for the Sanhedrin to do but to summon the apostles before them.

The Effect of the Apostles' Teaching.
v. 28
"Ye have filled Jerusalem with your teaching." The high priest himself gives a testimonial to the apostles' teaching, which was remarkably efficient. Wherever he might have asked himself, had these unlettered peasants such oratorical power? And intend to bring this man's blood upon us? Doubtless the members of the Sanhedrin remembered clearly that horrible cry of the people when they insisted upon the crucifixion of Jesus, though Pilate had pronounced him innocent. "His blood be on us, and on our children." (Matt. 27:25).

The Sure Penalty of Sin.
"Know ye not the ancient tradition that the earth refuses to drink in the blood of the innocent? that there it lies eternally like a ghastly stain upon its shuddering breast, forever crying for vengeance?" Judas dies in the horror of an unavailing remorse, a loathsome suicide. Calanias is stripped of his titles, deposed from his office, made an outcast where he had ruled. Herod Antipas, his privileges torn from him, goes into exile and a beggar's death. "Pharaoh's end comes in degradation, banishment, and suicide. The princely house of Annas is razed by a mob, his son scourged and beaten through the streets to the place of his murder."

"Obey God Rather Than Men."
v. 29
"We must obey God rather than men." Peter and John, when first brought before the rulers, had said substantially the same thing (Acts 4:19). Whenever human officers and laws conflict with God and his laws, we have no choice in the matter, human laws are to be defied, human government is to be resisted.

"The God of Our Fathers."
v. 30
"The God of our fathers raised up Jesus." In this sentence the apostles sought to assure the Sanhedrin that they had not departed from the ancient religion of their race. It was the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob who had sent Jesus Christ, his Son, worked wonders through him, taught through him, and finally raised him from the grave.

Jesus "A Prince and a Saviour."
v. 31
"Him did God exalt with his right hand to be a Prince and a Saviour." The right hand, with most men, is the strong and skillful hand, so that the expression, "with his right hand," means "with his power." Christ was to be the world's Ruler as well as the world's Deliverer, Ruler by right of being Deliverer, Deliverer in order that he may the more effectively deliver men from their sins, and miseries.

Repentance and Remission of Sins.
v. 31
"To give repentance to Israel and remission of sins." Repentance is a gift from Christ. It is not born of our own sinful hearts. "Remission" means "sending away." Christ sends away from us the penalty of sin, as is best for us and for the world. God in Christ forgives the sins of the penitent believer, and so far as he is concerned it is as if they had never been committed. Only God could do this, and to say that Christ could do it was tantamount to asserting his deity.

Christian Witness-Bearing.
"The agents employed for spreading the gospel are men, and not angels. Surely the angel who brought the apostles out of prison was quite able to go and proclaim the gospel; but no, it must not be. Those redeemed by the blood of Christ are men, and their redemption from sin is power to be instrumentally accomplished by men. What a vocation is ours! What can be more honorable? What more responsible?"

Gamaliel vs. 34-36
"But there stood up one in the council, a Pharisee, named Gamaliel, the Gamaliel here mentioned was the teacher of Paul and Paul was proud to name himself as his pupil. He was famous for his learning and for the purity of his character, and was one of the seven Jewish doctors honored with the supreme title of Rabbah. Though a Pharisee, he was liberal, allowing his pupils to study Greek literature, an abiding them on the feast days give a holiday greeting even to pagans. Refrain from these men, and let them alone," Gamaliel, as a Pharisee, would be inclined to favor the Christians more than the Sadducees, who were the most prominent Jewish office-holders, because, while the Sadducees denied human immortality, the Pharisees believed in a resurrection from the dead, the teaching which the Christians so stoutly emphasized. "For if this counsel or this work be of men, it will be overthrown." Gamaliel does not mean that all human enterprise will be overthrown, but that unless God approves what is said and done it will come to naught.

The Apostles' Reaction.
v. 40
"And when they had called the apostles unto them, they beat them." It was a cruel beating, as may be sure, taking them as near death as the councilors dared. It was the penalty for venturing to disobey and defy the Sanhedrin. "And they charged them not to speak in the name of Jesus." They knew perfectly well by this time that the charge would have no effect, even with the beating to reinforce it; but their outraged dignity required this reassertion of their authority.

The Apostles Triumphant.
v. 41
"They therefore departed from the presence of the council, rejoicing that they were counted worthy to suffer dishonor for the Name." That Name which they were forbidden to utter before the people, declaring that it was the Messiah's, and that it was Peter, had emphatically said (Acts 4:12), was the only name bringing salvation to men.
