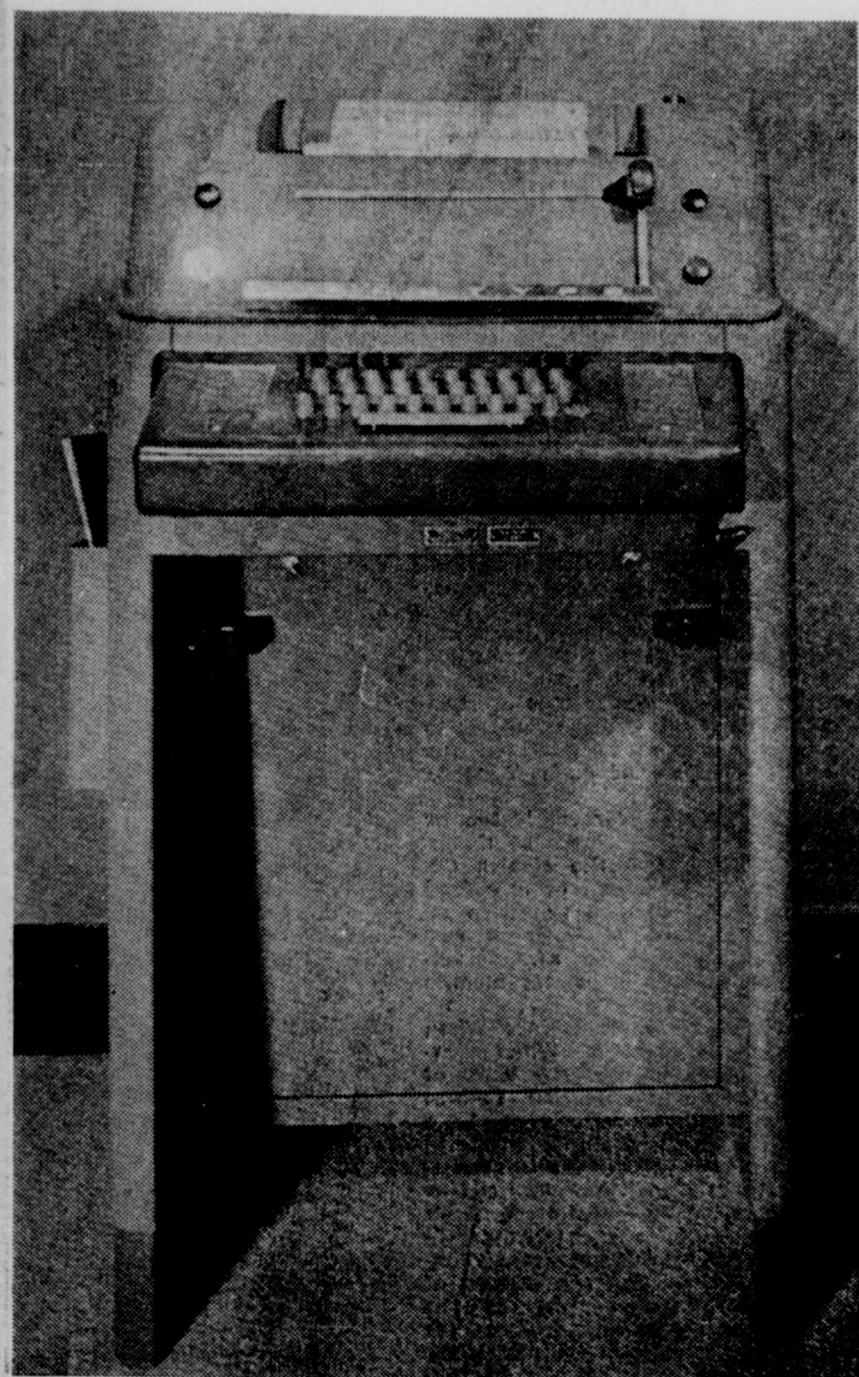

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So that the Abernathy Police Department will have instant communications with area law enforcement officers, the City Council voted to install a teletypewriter machine, above, in the City Hall.

Other cities who will be on the circuit are: Lubbock, Plainview, Post, Snyder, Crosbyton, Slaton, Floydada, Morton, Levelland, Brownfield, and Littlefield.

The teletypewriter will not only aid police work but will prove valuable during the tornado season. For example, as soon as a tornado is spotted in this area, the warning will reach the city hall via the teletype in a matter of seconds.

As far as law enforcement activities are concerned, the teletype has many advantages. Should the local police need more information on a suspect, the message could be sent to Austin and returned in a matter of minutes.

Also, had the machine been in operation last week when a local store was burglarized, the incident would have reached all parts of the state in a very short while.

Each city will be charged \$79.55 a month for usage of the teletype. However, Hale County has agreed to pay \$29.55 a month for the City of Abernathy, making the City's share come to \$50.00 per month for this service.

Approximate date for installation will be in April.

Police Teletype Circuit To Include Abernathy City Unit

The Hale County Commissioners Court last week took steps to link the sheriff's department with other law enforcement agencies in the area via a direct line teletype service.

Planned to begin operation before the spring planting season, the private line teletype service will put the sheriff's department in almost instantaneous contact with some 15 other area law enforcement bodies, including the Department of Public Safety, Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., and the DPS.

Two representatives of the telephone company appeared before the court Monday, accompanied by Sheriff Walter Sanders and Police Chief Bill Wilkinson of Abernathy. They explained that the teletype service will enable the sheriff to converse with any or all of the other offices on the line, resulting in decreased telephone bills, and enabling the sheriff to keep accurate records of all messages.

Proposed cities on the hookup include Plainview, Floydada, Muleshoe, Littlefield, Abernathy, Morton, Levelland, Lubbock, Crosbyton, Dickens, Brownfield, Tahoka, Slaton, Post and Snyder. Lubbock, Slaton, Levelland, Post and the city of Plainview have already approved the plan.

The circuit will enable the offices to obtain information from Austin or Washington via the teletype. Messages of this nature will be sent to Lubbock and forwarded on to the proper office.

Sheriff Sanders endorsed the proposal, explaining that often radio contact with other offices is impossible because of interference. The private line aspect of the teletype service will eliminate any possibility of monitoring the police messages.

Costs to the county for the service will be \$75.85 per month in addition to an initial \$15 installation charge. The county will also pay \$29.55 of Abernathy's \$79.55 charge.

Bonds Issued

The Commissioners ordered the issuance of \$390,000 exhibition bonds to finance the construction of a county agriculture center on the south edge of Plainview.

Hale County State Bank and the Republic National Bank of Dallas were designated as paying agents for the bonds.

County Judge C. L. Abernathy was authorized to notify Mrs. Etta Hamilton and American Grain Company that the county is exercising its options on the land selected for the site of the agriculture center.

Frank Stovall Is A Candidate For District Attorney

Frank Stovall, an attorney-at-law in Plainview, has announced his candidacy for the office of District Attorney, 64th Judicial District. His official announcement follows:

"I have not entered this race to run against any particular person, but rather to seek an office for which I have the greatest respect. Under our system of government, the District Attorney is the most important prosecuting officer in our state. He is charged with the duty of prosecuting accused murderers, robbers, burglars, rapists, and narcotic pushers. In addition, he must effectively enforce our hot-check laws. To discharge these duties, your District Attorney must stand ready, willing and able to go into the courtroom, submit his cases to the jury, and vigorously fight for the principals of his office. We must have the best man available. In this respect, I ask only that the people examine each candidate's qualifications and then vote for the candidate whom they think best qualified.

"My qualifications are open for your judgement. I have received Business Administration and Law Degrees from the University of Texas. In 1959 and 1960, I was employed as an Assistant District Attorney and full-time prosecutor in Houston, Harris County. As an Assistant District Attorney in Houston, I actively participated in over 75 criminal jury trials. In May 1960, I joined my father, Richard F. Stovall, a former District Attorney in Floyd County, in the private practice of law. Under the firm name of Stovall & Stovall, we have maintained an active trial and courtroom practice extending through the South Plains and West Texas.

"On the personal side, I am a resident of Plainview, 29, married, and the father of two daughters. I am a member of the Methodist Church and the Plainview Noon Optimist Club. My wife, Ivy, is the daughter of Judge Max Rodgers, a long-time District Judge in Huntsville, Texas."

FFA and 4-H Club Project Show Set Here For March 10

The sponsors of the Abernathy Annual FFA 4-H Club Project Show met at Graham's Restaurant Tuesday morning to arrange for getting the show under way again this year. Men were selected to head up the various phases of the show handling.

Roy Jones was selected to be General Superintendent. Assistant Supt., E. J. Pope, Jr.; Secretary, Jerry Oswalt; Finance chairman, Lonnie Brownlow; Supt. of Steers, Elton Settle; Swine, Joe Love-lace; Sheep, Jack Barton; Chairman of Barn Committee, Delton Stone; Trophy committee, Arno Struve.

These different superintendents are to select assistants to work with them. March 10, was set as the show date, and starting time will be 5:30 p.m.

Among subjects discussed were the length of time of ownership of stock to be shown. It was agreed that breeding stock in hogs should be owned by the exhibitor on or before January 1. Cattle should be owned on December 1, or before. The three operating superintendents will act as the committee to judge on the acceptability of the stock for the show.

The classing of the show stock will also be done by these same three superintendents. Cross-bred stock will be classed separately if there is enough shown to justify.

There will be an award for showmanship again, and the Chris Benn award will be competed for. Showmanship judge to be a disinterested person. The superintendents will decide who is to receive the Chris Benn award and rules of competition will be the same as last year. The general conduct of the exhibitor throughout the entire show will be considered in this award.

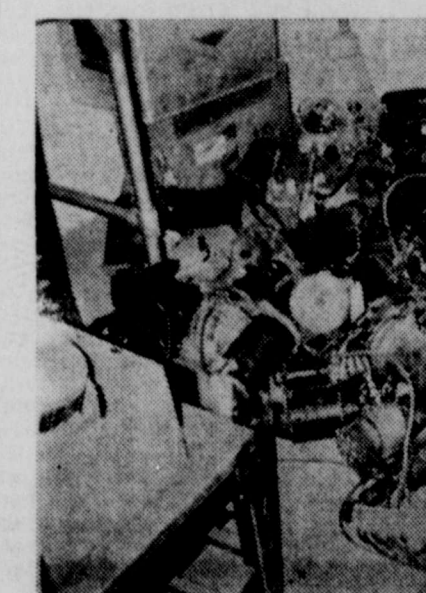

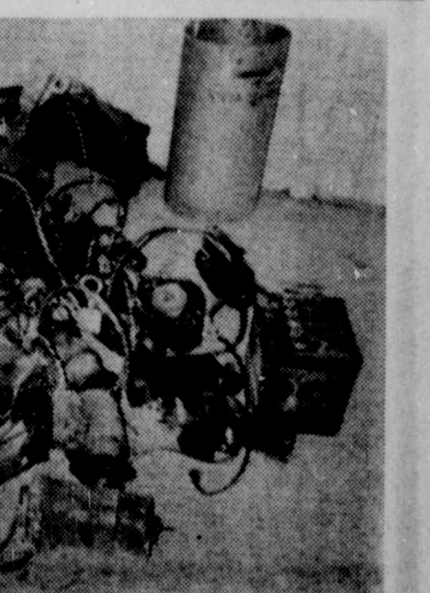

Legal Notice

ORDINANCE NO. 135

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING RESTAURANT, ITINERANT RESTAURANT, EMPLOYEES, UTENSILS, HEALTH OFFICER, ETC., REQUIRING PERMITS FOR THE OPERATION OF SUCH ESTABLISHMENTS, PROHIBITING THE SALE OF ADULTERATED, UNWHOLESOME OR MISBRANDED FOOD OR DRINK REGULATING THE INSPECTION OF SUCH ESTABLISHMENTS, THE ENFORCEMENT OF ORDINANCE, THE FIXING OF PENALTIES, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City of Abernathy has no adequate ordinance regulating eating and drinking establishments and it is deemed essential for the preservation of public health and safety that all such establishments be required to maintain uniform sanitation throughout the City of Abernathy and within its police jurisdiction, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY:

SECTION 1. Definition. The following definitions shall apply in the interpretation and the enforcement of this ordinance:

A. RESTAURANT—The term "restaurant" shall mean restaurant, coffee shop, cafeteria, short order cafe, luncheonette, tavern, sandwich stand, soda fountain, and all other eating and drinking establishments, as well as kitchens or other places in which food and drink is prepared for sale or consumption elsewhere.

B. ITINERANT RESTAURANT—The term "itinerant restaurant" shall mean one operating for a temporary period in connection with a fair, carnival, circus, public exhibition, or other similar gathering.

C. EMPLOYEE—The term "employee" shall mean any person who handles food or drink during preparation or serving, or who comes in contact with any eating or cooking utensils, or who is employed in a room in which food and drink is prepared or served.

D. UTENSILS—"Utensils" shall include any kitchenware, tableware, glass ware, cutlery, utensils, containers, or other equipment with which food or drink come in contact during storage, preparation, or serving.

E. HEALTH OFFICER—The term "health officer" shall mean the City Health Officer of the City of Abernathy or his authorized representative.

F. PERSON—The word "person" shall mean person, firm, corporation or association.

SECTION 2. Permits. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a restaurant in the City of Abernathy or its police jurisdiction who does not possess an unrevoked permit from the health officer. Such permit shall be posted in a conspicuous place. Only persons who comply with the requirements of this ordinance shall be entitled to receive and retain such a permit. A person conducting an itinerant restaurant shall also be required to secure a permit.

Item 1. APPLICATION—Application for permit must be in writing upon forms prescribed and furnished by the City Health Department. The City Health Department shall issue a permit in writing when the applicant has complied with the requirements of this ordinance, rules and regulations of the City Health Department. This permit shall remain in full force and effect for the fiscal year of the City of Abernathy, beginning October 1st, and ending September 30th, unless sooner revoked for violations of any provisions of this ordinance and/or rules and regulations of the City Health Department. Such permit shall be renewed annually in like manner as hereinbefore prescribed, and is valid for one full fiscal year of the City, or a fraction thereof. This permit shall be non-transferable.

Item 2. Any permit granted hereunder shall be subject to

revocation at the direction of the City Health Officer for failure of the grantee named therein or any of his, her or its employees, agents or representatives, or any of them to carry on the business or activities described in such permit in accordance with all food and sanitary laws of the State of Texas, ordinance of the City of Abernathy, and all official orders pursuant thereto, and upon such notice of such revocation, the operation of such business or activities shall immediately be discontinued until the terms and provisions of this ordinance are complied with.

SECTION 3. Examination and condemnation of unwholesome or adulterated food or drink. Samples of food, drink and other substances may be taken and examined by the Health Officer as often as may be necessary for the detection of unwholesomeness or adulteration. The Health Officer may condemn and forbid the sale of, or cause to be removed or destroyed, any food or drink which is unwholesome or adulterated.

SECTION 4. Inspection of restaurants. At least once every six months the Health Officer shall inspect every restaurant located within the City of Abernathy and its police jurisdiction. In case the Health Officer discovers the violation of any item of sanitation, he shall make a second inspection after the lapse of such time he deems necessary for the defect to be remedied, and the second inspection shall be used in determining compliance with the requirements of this ordinance. Any violation of the same item of this ordinance on such second inspection shall call for immediate revocation of permit.

One copy of the inspection report shall be posted by the Health Officer upon an inside wall of the restaurant, and said inspection report shall not be defaced or removed by any person except the Health Officer. Another copy of the inspection report shall be filed with the records of the Health Department.

The person operating the restaurant shall upon request of the Health Officer permit access to all parts of the establishment and shall permit copying of any or all records of food purchased.

SECTION 5. Sanitation requirements for restaurants. All restaurants shall comply with all the following items of sanitation.

Item 1. Floors. The floors of all rooms in which food or drink is stored, prepared, or served, or in which utensils are washed, shall be of such constructions as to be easily cleaned, shall be smooth, and shall be kept clean and in good repair.

Item 2. Walls and Ceilings. Walls and ceilings of all rooms shall be kept clean and in good repair. All walls and ceilings of rooms in which food or drink is stored or prepared shall be finished in light color. The walls of all rooms in which food or drink is prepared or utensils are washed shall have a smooth, washable surface up to the level reached by splash or spray.

Item 3. Doors and Windows. All openings into the outer air shall be effectively screened. Screen doors shall be outward opening and self-closing to prevent the entrance of flies and other insects.

Item 4. Lighting. All rooms in which food or drink is stored, prepared or served, or in which utensils are washed shall be well lighted.

Item 5. Ventilation. All rooms in which food or drink is stored, prepared or served, or in which utensils are washed shall be well ventilated.

Item 6. Toilet Facilities. Every restaurant shall be provided with adequate and conveniently located toilet facilities within or adjacent to the building for its employees, conforming with the ordinance of the City of Abernathy. Toilet rooms shall not open directly into any room in which food, drink, or utensils are handled or stored. The doors of all toilet rooms shall be self-closing. Toilet rooms shall be kept in a clean condition, in good repair, and well lighted and

ventilated. Handwashing signs shall be posted in each toilet room used by employees. In case privies or earth closets are permitted and used, they shall be separate from the restaurant building, and shall be of a sanitary type constructed and operated in conformity with the standards of the State Board of Health.

Item 7. Water Supply. Running water under pressure shall be easily accessible to all rooms in which food is prepared or utensils are washed, and the water supply shall be adequate, and of safe, sanitary quality.

Item 8. Lavatory Facilities. Adequate and convenient handwashing facilities shall be provided, including hot and cold running water, soap, and approved sanitary towels. The use of a common towel is prohibited. No employee shall resume work after using the toilet rooms without first washing his hands.

Item 9. Construction of Utensils and Equipment. All multi-use utensils and all show and display cases or windows, counters, shelves, tables, refrigerating equipment, sinks and other equipment or utensils used in connection with the operation of a restaurant shall be so constructed as to be easily cleaned and shall be kept in good repair. Utensils containing or plated with cadmium or lead shall not be used; provided that solder containing lead may be used for jointing.

Item 10. Cleaning and bactericidal treatment of utensils and equipment. All equipment, including display cases or windows, counters, shelves, tables, refrigerators, stoves, hoods, and sinks, shall be kept clean and free from dust, dirt, insects, and other contaminating material. All clothes used by waiters, chefs, and other employees shall be clean. Single-service containers shall be used only once.

All multi-use eating and drinking utensils shall be thoroughly cleaned and effectively subjected to an approved hot water sterilization process after each usage. All multi-use utensils used in the preparation or serving of food and drink shall be thoroughly cleaned and effectively subjected to an approved bactericidal process immediately following the day's operation. Drying cloths, if used, shall be clean and shall be used for no other purpose.

No article, polish, or other substance containing any cyanide preparation or other poisonous material shall be used for cleaning or polishing of utensils.

Item 11. Storage and handling of utensils and equipment. After bactericidal treatment utensils shall be stored in a clean, dry place protected from flies, dust and other contamination and shall be handled in such a manner as to prevent contamination as far as practicable. Single-service utensils shall be purchased only in sanitary containers, shall be stored therein in a clean, dry place until used, and shall be handled in a sanitary manner.

Item 12. Disposal of Wastes. All wastes shall be properly disposed of, and all garbage and trash shall be kept in suitable closed receptacles, in such manner as not to become a nuisance.

Item 13. Refrigeration. All readily perishable food and drink shall be kept at or below 50 degrees F, except when being prepared or served. Waste water from refrigeration equipment shall be properly disposed of.

Item 14. Wholesomeness of Food and Drink. All food and drink shall be clean, wholesome, free from spoilage, and so prepared as to be safe for human consumption. All milk, fluid milk products, ice cream, and other frozen desserts served shall be from approved sources. Milk and fluid milk products shall be served in the individual, original containers in which they are received from the distributor or from a bulk container equipped with an approved dispensing device; provided, that this requirement shall not apply to cream, which may be served from the original bottle or from a dispenser approved for such service. All oysters, clams, and mussels shall be from approved sources, and if shucked shall be kept until used

in the containers in which they are placed at the shucking plant.

Item 15. Storage, display, and serving of food and drink. All food and drink shall be so stored, displayed, and served as to be protected from dust, flies, vermin, depredation and pollution by rodents, unnecessary handling, droplet infection, overhead leakage, and other contamination. No animals or fowls shall be kept or allowed in any room in which food is prepared or stored. All means necessary for the elimination of flies, roaches, and rodents shall be used.

Item 16. Cleanliness of Employees. All employees shall wear clean outer garments and shall keep their hands clean at all times while engaging in handling food, drink, utensils or equipment. Employees shall not expectorate or use tobacco in any form in rooms in which food is prepared. Employees shall use hair nets, head bands or caps while engaged in handling food, drinks, utensils, and/or equipment.

Item 17. Miscellaneous. The premises of all restaurants shall be kept clean and free of litter or rubbish. None of the operations connected with a restaurant shall be conducted in any room used as living or sleeping quarters. Adequate lockers or dressing rooms shall be provided for employees' clothing and shall be kept clean. Soiled linens, coats, and aprons shall be kept in containers provided for that purpose.

Itinerant Restaurants. Itinerant restaurants shall be constructed and operated in a manner approved by the City Health Officer.

SECTION 6. Restaurants which may operate. From and after three months from the date on which this ordinance takes effect no restaurant shall be operated within the City of Abernathy, or its police jurisdiction, unless it conforms with the requirements of this ordinance; provided, that when a restaurant fails to qualify the Health Officer is authorized to revoke the permit.

SECTION 7. Reinstatement of Permit. Any restaurant, the permit of which has been suspended may at any time make application for the reinstatement of the permit.

Within one week after the receipt of a satisfactory application, accompanied by a statement signed by the applicant to the effect that the violated provision or provisions of this ordinance have been conformed with, the Health Officer shall make a re-inspection, and thereafter as many additional re-inspections as he may deem necessary to assure himself that the applicant is again complying with the requirements, and in case the findings indicate compliance, shall reinstate the permit.

SECTION 8. Disease Control. No person who is affected with any disease in a communicable form or is a carrier of such disease shall work in any restaurant, and no restaurant shall employ any such person or any person suspected of being affected with any disease in a communicable form or of being a carrier of such disease. If the restaurant manager suspects that any employee has contracted any disease in a communicable form or has become a carrier of such disease he shall notify the Health Officer immediately. A sign containing this section shall be posted in all toilet rooms.

SECTION 9. Health Certificate.

Item 1. Every person whose work brings him or her in contact with the production, handling, storage or transportation of food or food products shall hold a certificate from a licensed physician certifying to the fact that, within six months laboratory and other examinations have been made indicating that said person is free of tuberculosis, that said person is not a carrier of typhoid fever and that said person is free of any disease capable of being spread through food or food products.

Item 2. The Health Officer of the City of Abernathy, or his assistant, may cite the holder of any health certificate to a re-

examination, at any time such holder of such certificate is known or suspected to be afflicted with any of the diseases or conditions as set out in the preceding paragraph, such re-examination shall be without cost to the holder, and shall not extend the time of such certificate beyond the date for which it was issued.

Item 3. Proprietors of managers of establishments where food or food products or drinks are prepared, handled, served or dispensed, will be held responsible for the health certificates of their employees and will be subject to similar fines as imposed on the actual handlers of such foods or drinks.

Item 4. The owner, lessee or operator of any food establishment shall notify the Health Officer within 24 hours of any food handler upon whose premises or in whose place of business any case of sickness or any infectious, contagious or communicable disease occurs.

SECTION 10. Procedure When Infection Suspected. When suspicion arises to the possibility of transmission of infection from any restaurant employee the Health Officer is authorized to require any or all the following measures: (1) the immediate exclusion of the employee from all restaurants; (2) the immediate closing of the restaurant concerned until no further danger of disease outbreak exists. In the opinion of the Health Officer, (3) adequate medical examinations of the employees and of his associates, with such laboratory examinations as may be indicated.

SECTION 11. Enforcement Interpretation. This ordinance shall be enforced by the Health Officer in accordance with the interpretations thereof contained in the 1943 edition of the U. S. Public Health Service Code Regulating Eating and Drinking Establishments, a certified copy of which shall be on file at the City Secretary's office.

SECTION 12. Penalties. Any person who violates any provision of ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined not more than TWO HUNDRED (\$200.00) DOLLARS at the discretion of the court having jurisdiction. Each and every violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 13. The operation or maintenance of any restaurant, or the preparation for sale or the sale of any food or drink for human consumption with any restaurant during any time when provisions of this ordinance are not being reasonably complied with shall constitute and such acts are declared to be nuisances subject to abatement by injunction when conditions in any restaurant constitute a menace to public health, and this provision is cumulative of all other enforcement remedies.

SECTION 14. Repeal and Date of Effect. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its adoption and its publication as provided by law.

SECTION 15. Unconstitutionality Clause. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of said ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 16. That the public importance of this measure constitutes and creates an emergency and an urgent public necessity, requiring that any rule providing for Ordinances to be read at more than one meeting be suspended and requiring that this ordinance be passed and take effect as an emergency measure, and such rule and provision is accordingly suspended, and this Ordinance is passed as an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

Rural Accident Report Given

"Old man 1963" has quietly slipped away into the past forever. His evident scenes, however, will remain with us till the end of time. Due to the scars left beside the roadway, and the hospitals, at the morgue and in the cemeteries the year 1963 will be remembered as the worst year in traffic history.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 31 accidents on rural highways in Hale County during the month of December, according to Sergeant D. S. Lawson, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county for the calendar year 1963 shows a total of 222 crashes resulting in 9 persons killed, 131 injured and an estimated property damage of \$146,399.00.

"When the final reports are tabulated we will find that more people were killed in Texas traffic accidents during 1963 than in any previous year," the Sergeant stated. The final count is expected to be about ten per cent more than the 2,421 traffic deaths of 1962.

The Patrol Supervisor reminded all motorists to think about the more than 5,000 people that have been killed in Texas traffic accidents in the last 2 years and to join the drive to reverse this alarming trend of death by strict observance of the traffic laws and rules of safe driving.

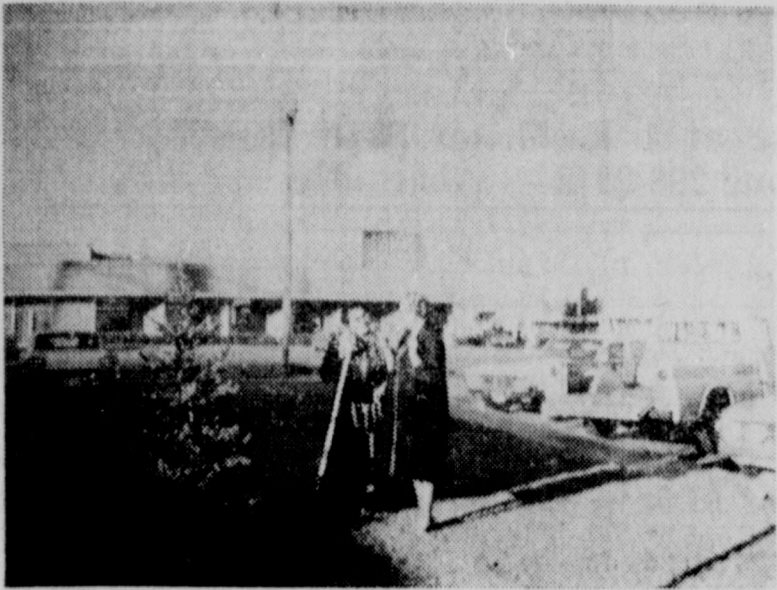

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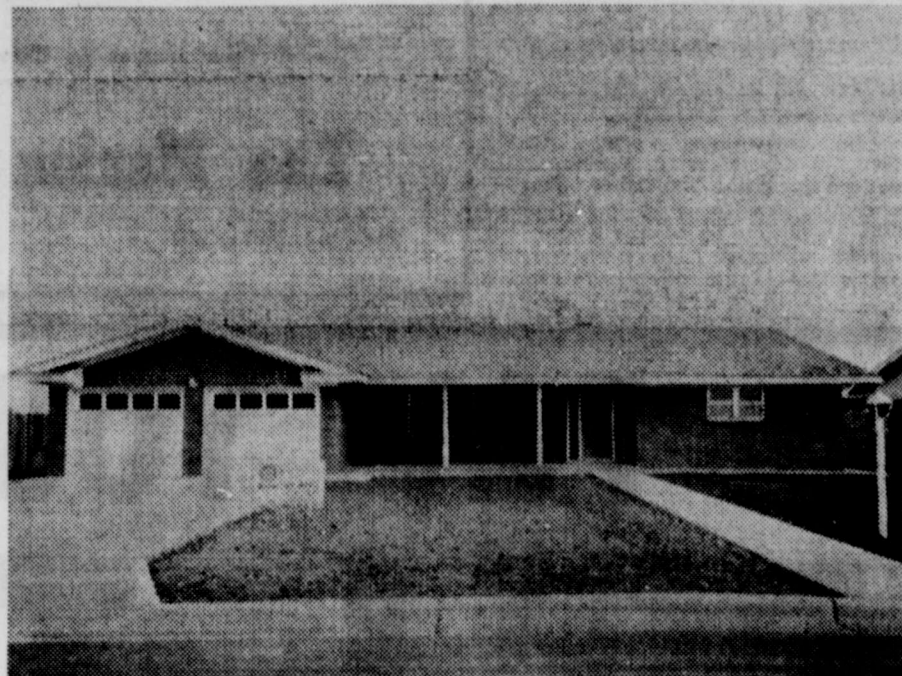
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CAPITAL HI LIGHTS — R. AUSTIN, Tex. — Although the Christmas Spirit is settling soothingly over the political scene in the State Capital this week, one political topic—the 1964 U. S. Senate race—got a steady workout.

Big question is: Will Sen. Ralph Yarborough, in spite of his recent pledge to back new Pres. Lyndon B. Johnson all the way, get a tough opponent?

Best guess is: He will... although President Johnson will assume no active role in the campaign.

Leaders of the liberal Texas Democratic Coalition—a combination of labor, Negro groups, the Political Association of Spanish-Speaking Organizations, and independent liberals—recently endorsed President Johnson for election in 1964. But they linked that support to backing of Yarborough also.

These names have been at the center of speculation as possible opponents for Yarborough: former Congressman Lloyd Bentsen Jr. of Houston; Congressman Jim Wright of Fort Worth; Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr of Lubbock; and former Gov. Allan Shivers of Austin.

Carr has said he won't run against Yarborough but will seek re-election and look toward the governor's race in 1966 instead. However, some think he still might change his mind.

Bentsen, once regarded as the most-likely contender, cooled toward the Senate race after early opinion checks. Now, with a new political climate in the making, observers say he has reassessed the situation and decided to run. He won't talk until after the December 22 political moratorium, however.

Wright has kept the door open. Both he and Bentsen conceivably could be candidates.

Only announced Democratic candidate for the U. S. Senate Post is John Van Cronkhite of Dallas. Regardless of who emerges as the Democratic nominee, he will have to meet Republican opposition in November. Republicans who already have announced are George Bush of Houston and Dr. Milton V. Davis of Dallas.

REDISTRICTING — Attorney General Carr asked the U. S. Supreme Court to accept the appeal of the State of Texas against a three-judge Federal court's decision that all 23 Texas Congressmen should be elected statewide. Carr's appeal says that the high court should recognize the unfairness of such an order. Furthermore, that it should agree to accept briefs and hear oral arguments on the legal questions involved.

UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS — A record \$83,300,000 in unemployment compensation benefits was paid by the Texas Employment Commission during the year ending August 31, 1963. This was revealed in a TEC report to Governor Connally, which said the record payment represented a 28 percent increase over 1962.

During the report period, the number of persons paid state unemployment benefits rose six percent to 271,800, while 79,000 Texas employers covered by the Act contributed two percent more than during the preceding year.

On the bright side of the job picture, the Commission said it found jobs for 900,000 persons during 1963.

CONTEMPT HEARING SET — A January trial date has been set in the Travis County court on contempt charges growing out of refusal of four to testify before legislative committees.

M. D. Mallard of Bryan, M. C. Parson of Austin and E. D. Dickson of Dallas were cited for balking at House General Investigative Committee questions in the Southwest Conference basketball point-fixing probe.

Judge Earl Sharp of Longview failed to appear before a House committee investigating slant-hole oil well drilling.

Short Snorts — Governor Connally named Mrs. Neatha Frame of Fort Worth to the State Board of Cosmetology to succeed Mrs. Edna Moore of San Marcos.

Application for a permit to establish the Granbury State Bank at Granbury in Hood County has been filed with the State Department of Banking.

A Legislative Internship Advisory Committee is negotiating for a Ford Foundation grant to supplement state funds in a program aimed at interesting young Texans in governmental careers.

Texas public school administrators will hold their annual advisory conference on education here on January 8-10.

First meeting of the statewide Citizens Committee for Comprehensive State and Community Mental Health Planning was held here on December 14 to map a county-by-county study of mental health problems.

The State is back in the red, State Treasurer Jesse James reports. The shaky general revenue fund showed a \$12,400,000 deficit on December 12.

John Arthur Hill of Midland, Eileen Marie Nelson of Fort Worth, Linda Jo Rumbel of San Antonio and William Dean Ledbetter of Bryan are Texas Education Agency nominees for 1964 Fulbright-Hays scholarship awards.

AUSTIN, Tex. — Gov. John Connally is "back home" in Austin, after a 13-day stay in Parkland Hospital in Dallas. He has had what he termed "amazing" recovery from critical wounds inflicted by President John Kennedy's assassin.

SMITH PRAISES JOHNSON — In commenting on Governor Connally's return to Austin Lt. Gov. Preston Smith said "in our grief, we can be thankful for two things: The life of our own governor was spared, and our new president is probably the one man in the country who could have taken hold of the reins of our national government so quickly and firmly."

Smith said he had been assured that President Johnson "will respect the rights and responsibilities of state and local government." He added, "This is a favorable situation in Texas and other states where state's rights are still valued."

WATER-FUN HEARINGS SET — Governor Connally's Study Committee on Water Recreation has set public hearings in four parts of the state.

They will be held in Abilene on February 3; Dallas, February 4; Houston, February 10; and San Antonio, February 11.

Vice-Chairman John Babcock, research and development supervisor for the Lower Colorado River Authority, said "Nine men sitting around a table can't really know what the people want, so we want to hear from the people of Texas." He said sportsmen's groups, as well as private citizens, are invited to testify.

At present about 100 local water authorities—municipalities, water districts and river authorities—have jurisdiction over reservoirs in Texas of 5,000 acre feet or more, but lack legal authority to prescribe water recreation facilities.

Nine state agencies and nine federal agencies play some part in water recreation programming, but there is no central plan. Many have policies which conflict with those of cooperating agencies.

Babcock said, "The Governor's committee will endeavor to pull all efforts into the uniform state plan which can be operated by state agencies." Minnesota has incorporated all efforts under one agency and the U. S. Congress is making a move in this direction on the federal level.

SULPHUR RIVER APPOINTMENTS — At the suggestion of the Texas Water Commission, Governor Connally reappointed Lynn Chapman of Sulphur Springs to the Sulphur River Conservation and Reclamation District.

They are Dr. Gaze James of Cooper, Finnell Johnson of Cooper, Triett Peek of Commerce, Jack

Coker of Naples and R. J. Miesch of Clarksville.

GAS-RATE HEARING POSTPONED — Five cities near Port Arthur, which have turned down Southern Union Gas Company's request for a rate hike, won a postponement of the hearing of the gas firm's appeal to the Railroad Commission.

Hearing ran for three days. Then attorneys for the cities of Port Neches, Groves, Lakeview, Nederland and Pear Ridge complained they had not received copies of Southern Union's appeal exhibits in time to question witnesses about them.

Hearings will resume on January 7.

All five cities refused the request to raise gas rates approximately 10 percent. When the request was made last year, Port Arthur and Grifing Park agreed. They instituted a monthly hike of about 19 cents per minimum bill. If the Railroad Commission instructs the other five to approve an increase, the cities may have to absorb the cost of the appeal. Then gas customers will pay about 29 cents more per monthly minimum.

HISTORICAL NOTE — When the State School Land Board looked over the list of goodfaith claimants at its meeting this week, it noted that one man who claimed 9.59 acres of mesquite dotted rangeland in Zavala County is the grandson of the man who served as Land Commissioner more than a century ago.

He is Murray G. Smyth Jr., whose grandfather, George William Smyth, was Land Commissioner from 1848 to 1852.

Board also noted that their assessors set the value of the Zavala County land, and other land in that area, at about \$30 an acre, whereas goodfaith claims on land in rich-soil Houston County was set at \$69.50 an acre.

PADRE ISLAND DEED — The red-leather-and-velvet-bound parchment deed which conveyed

title from Texas to the United States on 90,000 acres of state-owned, submerged land surrounding Padre Island National Seashore Park is on display in the Texas State Library building in Austin.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler presented this copy to the State Library and an identical copy to the National Archives in Washington, D. C.

NEWS CENTER — Austin will become a world news center now that a Central Texas has become president.

When the Lyndon Johnsons come home to the LBJ Ranch near Stonewall, Austin will be the news center for the White House correspondents who accompany the President wherever he goes.

Telephone company workmen are beefing up lines to the Johnson Ranch to handle the crush of communications which follows the President.

WATER POLLUTION STUDIED — A congressional sub-committee conducted a two-day hearing on Texas water pollution problems.

Governor Connally, in a written statement, told the sub-committee the state has an active pollution control program in which it has help of all units of government, industry and public groups. There is ample room for federal research on the problem "so that we may be helped to help ourselves," Connally said.

Texas Manufacturers Association and Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association spokesmen emphasized existing industry programs to protect streams and water supplies against pollution.

BANK APPLICATIONS — State Bank Board has agreed to rule January 9 on applications for two Midland bank charters. Texas Bank and Trust and First State Bank.

A charter was granted for Howe State Bank in Grayson County.

Applications were denied for Security Bank and Trust Company of Canyon, City Bank and Trust Company and Pan American Bank and Trust Company, both of San Antonio.

SHORT SNORTS — Texas business activity increased four percent for October on the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research index.

The Attorney General advised the Texas Water Commission that all its proposed rules and regulations must be published in a newspaper of general circulation in each of the three water divisions defined by state law.

Nearly 1500 telephones in state agencies have been switched over to a new "Centrex" system consolidating 31 separate switchboards and permitting direct dialing among the agencies.

NEWS from the High Plains
Research Foundation

Will soybeans become a major crop in the Panhandle of Texas and Oklahoma? Leland Wilson of Farnsworth and the High Plains Research Foundation worked together this year to find out.

Members of the Board of Trustees of the Foundation, Drew Ellis of Perryton, and Ralph Blodgett of Spearman, invited Leland Wilson to conduct the test as a part of the Foundation's Farm Centered Research work. Barry Love, Assistant Agronomist, and Paul Belcher, Technician, of the Foundation staff, worked with Wilson in the testing program.

Dr. Earl Collister, Director of the Foundation, stated, "Results of the test indicate that farmers in the area will be interested in soybean production in the future."

There were three released varieties and seven experimental strains selected from the breeding program at the Foundation in this test.

The new HINN variety produced by the High Plains Research Foundation, which will be available for general use in 1965, produced the highest yield of 39.5 bushels. Yields of the other released varieties were: Lee-35.5 bushels and Hill-35.2 bushels.

The 1963 honey crop should hit a new high with a total of more than 291 million pounds. Bees increased their production per colony by six percent to 52.4 pounds and the number of colonies increased slightly to about 5.5 million, according to the USDA.

A modest pat on the back develops character, if given young enough, often enough, and low enough.

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The yields of the seven experimental strains, from the Foundation's breeding program, varied from 35.5 to 18.4 bushels per acre.

All bean plantings had adequate irrigation. They were thoroughly inoculated with nitrogen fixing bacteria before planting. All soybeans were planted May 22, and were harvested November 13. Mr. Wilson kept the soybean field free of weeds and protected from rabbit damage throughout the season.

Farmer Leland Wilson and Barry Love of the Foundation staff are seriously contemplating a larger acreage planting of the HINN variety and an early maturing strain in 1964.

This short season strain is believed to offer a very good possibility for a crop in the area with 105 to 115 days between planting and maturity. The HINN variety is 130-135 days in maturing.

Soybeans drop their leaves in early fall. There is no storage problem for the beans dry out rapidly. Bean growth usually stops when temperatures drop below 30 degrees. There is an interest in the short season bean for the High Plains.

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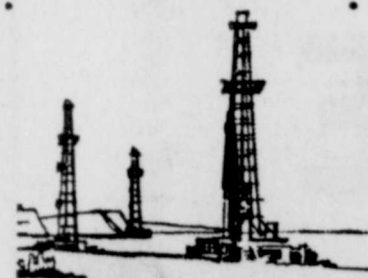

He is the author of over 20 books and several tracts and articles in European and American magazines, several of these are about religious freedom in the country and the schools. 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Hale County Officials To Get Increase In Salaries

Twelve county officials and employees in all departments of the courthouse were given salary increases totalling \$9,500 annually last week.

The Hale County Commissioners Court, meeting in special session, granted the pay hikes after several days of discussion and consultation with the county's financial adviser, the First Southwest Company.

Officials receiving salary increases of \$420 annually were commissioners, county judge, county clerk, county treasurer, county tax assessor-collector, county auditor, sheriff, county attorney and district clerk. All are elected officials except the county auditor.

The increase raises to \$7,102.50 the pay of the commissioners, county clerk, treasurer, sheriff, district clerk and county attorney.

With the increase the county judge now receives \$8,602.50, county auditor, \$7,462.50 and the tax assessor-collector \$7,762.50 including \$300 travel allowance.

The raises will be advertised and a public hearing held on Jan. 27, next regular meeting day of the court.

Salary adjustments were made in all departments at the courthouse in addition to the salary boosts for the officials. Most employees received pay hikes, excluding those on state schedules and others who have received recent increases.

The increases will amount to some \$9,500 or approximately 3 1/2 percent of the current salary outlay, according to County Judge C. L. Abernethy.

Continued study will be conducted to determine the feasibility of placing county employees under a job classification and salary schedule arrangement with future increases based on length of service.
