Child Killed In Two Car Crash

Mark Orin, 5 months old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Sloan, was killed Sunday night in a two car collision about two miles west of Hineston, La. Mrs. Sloan, driver of one of the cars, suffered a fractured leg and pelvis and both arms were broken. She was reported to be in satisfactory condition at the Post hospital Tuesday.

It was reported that Wendall R. Miculka, also 5 months old, who was riding in the Sloan car, suffered a possible skull fracture. Others in the car were less seriously hurt. Lt. Palmer Potet of Mt. Pleasant, who was in the other car, suffered multiple lacerations.

Mrs. Sloan and Mark were enroute to take a train to visit her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Smith in Winters while Pfc. Sloan, who is stationed with the 49th Armored Division at Fort Polk, was on field training.

Funeral services for Mark Sloan, who was born August 25, 1961, were held at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon at the Talco Methodist Church, with Rev. H. O. Scott officiating. Burial was in Talco Cemetery.

He is survived by his parents, Jimmy and Nila (Smith) Sloan; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Sloan, Talco, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Smith of Winters; great-grandparents, Mrs. Hazel Bowen, Ponca City, Ok., and Mr. Sloan, Hennessey, Okla.

The Times was established by the late Sam C. Holloway on Feb. 14, 1936, one week after discovery of oil at Talco, with Holloway publisher and Frank Dan-nelly editor. The Times has been published continuously since the first issue.

way in May 1960, the Talco Times has continued publication by the Sam C. Holloway Estate with George Grant as editor. Mrs. S. A. Tidwell is the present reporter.

Austin. — Candidates flooded this capital city as the filing deadline arrived. Politicians came to town to pay filing fees for state offices at both the state democratic headquarters and the Republican camp.

Thousand dollar fees were paid in many ways: One thousand one-dollar bills, one hundred ten-dollar bills, and varied contributions from friends of the candidates.

A former athlete brought a handful of ex-football stars along to show that he had a sporting chance.

There were very few surprises at the State Democratic Executive Committee: Gubernatorial candidates John Connolly, Marshall Formby, Will Wilson and Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker had paid before the deadline; Don Yarborough was expected, and everyone knew Gov. Price Daniel would show up after his TV announcement.

Austin Attorney Bob Looney arrived at the last minute to join Tom James, Tom Reavley, Waggoner Carr, W. T. McDonald and Les Proctor in the attorney general's race.

Keith Wheatley, 27-year-old Stamford oil operator, decided to oppose Railroad Commissioner Ben Ramsey in the May primary.

Both Looney and Wheatley filed without paying, but plunked down their \$1,000 fees by the Feb. 8 deadline.

Joe R. Pool, Dallas attorney, Charles H. Stevenson Jr. of Neufes County and rancher Phil Willis of Kaufman County, made the same sort of financial transaction as candidates for congressman-at-large.

Indicative of the expected turnover in both House and Senate is the democratic line-up for lieutenant governor: Speaker of the House James A. Turman, Senators Preston Smith, Jarrard Secrest and Robert Baker, all are abandoning present posts to seek the state's second highest posi-

tion. Gene Smith of Fort Worth is the only non-legislative candidate for lieutenant governor.

REPUBLICANS RALLY — "Re-birth of the republican party in Texas" has been widely discussed. It was evident when filing time was over that considerable progress had been made. If the party wasn't reborn; it certainly was revitalized.

Breckenridge oilman Jack Cox — former democratic candidate for governor who announced for the GOP months ago — got two opponents at the countdown. One was Amarillo rancher - publisher Roy Whittenburg, who polled 185,926 votes when he opposed Ralph Yarborough for the U. S. Senate in 1958. The other was Harry Diehl, Houston factory representative, who was one of the 71 who ran for Lyndon Johnson's senate seat last year.

Republican line-up for house and senate seats is improving. Fourteen republicans are campaigning for 10 of the 31 senate seats. And 74 republicans have filed for 70 of the 150 representative offices. Two already are members of the House. They are George Kirkmas of Texas City and Kenneth Kohler of Amarillo. They seek re-election to offices they won in recent special elections.

VALLEY FREEZE CREATES FOOD SHORTAGE — Agriculture workers "frozen" from jobs by the recent freeze in the Valley caused a stir of activity in the commodity distribution division of the State Department of Public Welfare.

Division Director W. M. Herndon has just returned from two trips to the Valley to talk to county commissioners in Cameron, Zavala, Willacy and Hidalgo counties. There, the need for emergency distribution of government surplus foods is desperate.

DPW is distributing food for 5,000 in Caernron County, 4,000 in Willacy County, and 2,500 in Za-

vala County. Also it is adding 20,000 people to the program at Hidalgo County, which provides food for 600 needy people on a regular basis.

Most commissioners look for the emergency to end within 30 days, when business in that area is expected to recover.

SALES TAX RULINGS KEEP COMING — Governor Daniel's announcement that he hopes to amend the sales tax structure probably caused groans in the Comptroller of the Public Accounts' office, where they're constantly busy interpreting the two per cent sales tax as it now stands.

Most recent interpretation involves advertising agencies which finance their operation on a 15 per cent commission basis, rather than by charges.

Comptroller ruled that the tax does not apply to intangible services and therefore excludes the commission from taxation.

But clients must pay tax on drawings, paintings, lettering and printed matter, and with the fantastic volume of this type of production involved in a campaign year, the state ought to net a fair-sized income from advertising agencies.

Governor Daniel has received a total of \$187,071 from the people of West Berlin for the relief of Hurricane Carla victims.

Dr. Joseph Tropper, chairman of the insurance department at Southern Methodist University, was sworn in as a new member of the State Board of Insurance.

Austin attorney Robert G. Flowers is new Assistant Attorney General with the highway division.

The Rev. Clinton Kersey, former representative and House Chaplain for two sessions, was appointed director of parole supervision by Dr. James A. Turman, director of the Texas Youth Council.

National P.T.A. Reaches 65th Birthday With Glance Back, Plans for Future

An organization that devotes itself to children and their welfare reaches senior citizen status this February, with a schedule full of further projects in behalf of children for the years ahead.

The National Congress of Parents and Teachers celebrates its 65th birthday on February 17, the anniversary of the "National Congress of Mothers" held in Washington, D. C., in 1897. This session marked the beginning of the P.T.A. Its founding, by Alice McLellan Birney and Phoebe Apperson Hearst, will be observed this year by more than 47,500 parent-teacher associations throughout the U.S. and in communities of Americans living overseas.

Mrs. Clifford N. Jenkins, of Roslyn Heights, L.I., N.Y., president of the National Congress, calls the P.T.A. "a great social invention." Like other inventions, she notes in her Founders Day anniversary message, "it was created out of need—the need of parents for more knowledge about children's health, growth, and development; the need for child labor laws and juvenile courts; the need for health and recreation facilities; the need to build broad highways of educational and vocational opportunities that might be traveled by all children and youth, not just the fortunate few."

Historic-minded P.T.A.'s across the country may mark the Founders Day observance with a glance back to the time of the first Congress. In the words of one historian for the National Congress, those were days "bustling with progress and growth . . ." but with educators "calling for increased appropriations to the public schools, more attention to teacher training, more practical curriculum, and greater consideration for handicapped children . . ." The time was ripe for reform — "especially for launching a movement directed toward the welfare of children."

Young Mrs. Birney and the philanthropic Mrs. Hearst sparked what was soon to become a nation-wide organization of which they are memorialized as Founders.

Since that time, P.T.A.'s have continually directed their efforts toward:

- Establishing and supporting public kindergartens;
- Pioneering hot school lunch programs and supporting adequate appropriations for them;
- Conducting parent-education workshops in all parts of the nation;
- Sponsoring safety legislation

and programs of home and traffic safety education; —Urging regular physical examinations for millions of children from birth through high school; —Raising the standards of treatment for youthful offenders and helping establish juvenile courts for minors; —Donating millions of dollars in scholarships for prospective teachers. —Backing bond issues directed toward improving facilities for children's education and recreation. Large as such achievements may seem, Mrs. Jenkins points out that "much remains to be done for children, in this changing world of 1962."
