## Buy Bonds-Stamps On All-American Heroes Day 17th

This coming Friday, July 17, has been set aside as All-American Heroes Day, and all Lamesa Retailers will honor our heroes by offering for sale War Stamps, and Bonds.

Every retail store in Lamesa is asked to have on hand a good supply of War Stamps for this day, and Bonds may be purchased at the banks, post office and Lamesa Federal Building and Loan Association.

Two of Lamesa's stores, the J. C. Penney Company and G. F. Wacker Store, have special booths set aside for the sale of War Stamps, these booths will remain in these stores for the duration. The J. C. Penney Company will also buy Bonds for their customers.

This All-American Heroes Day is a special day in which we may honor our boys who are fighting now on the battle front to protect our freedom. We can do our part here at home by furnishing these boys in the fighting forces with adequate implements of war. We can do this by purchasing War Bonds and Stamps.

Dawson County is behind on its June War Bond and Stamp quota set by the Treasury Department, and have a quota of \$53,500, to be met for the month of July. Let's all co-operate and make this a real Heroes Day by buying all the Stamps and Bonds we can.

## July 20-21 Last Days to Apply for Canning Sugar

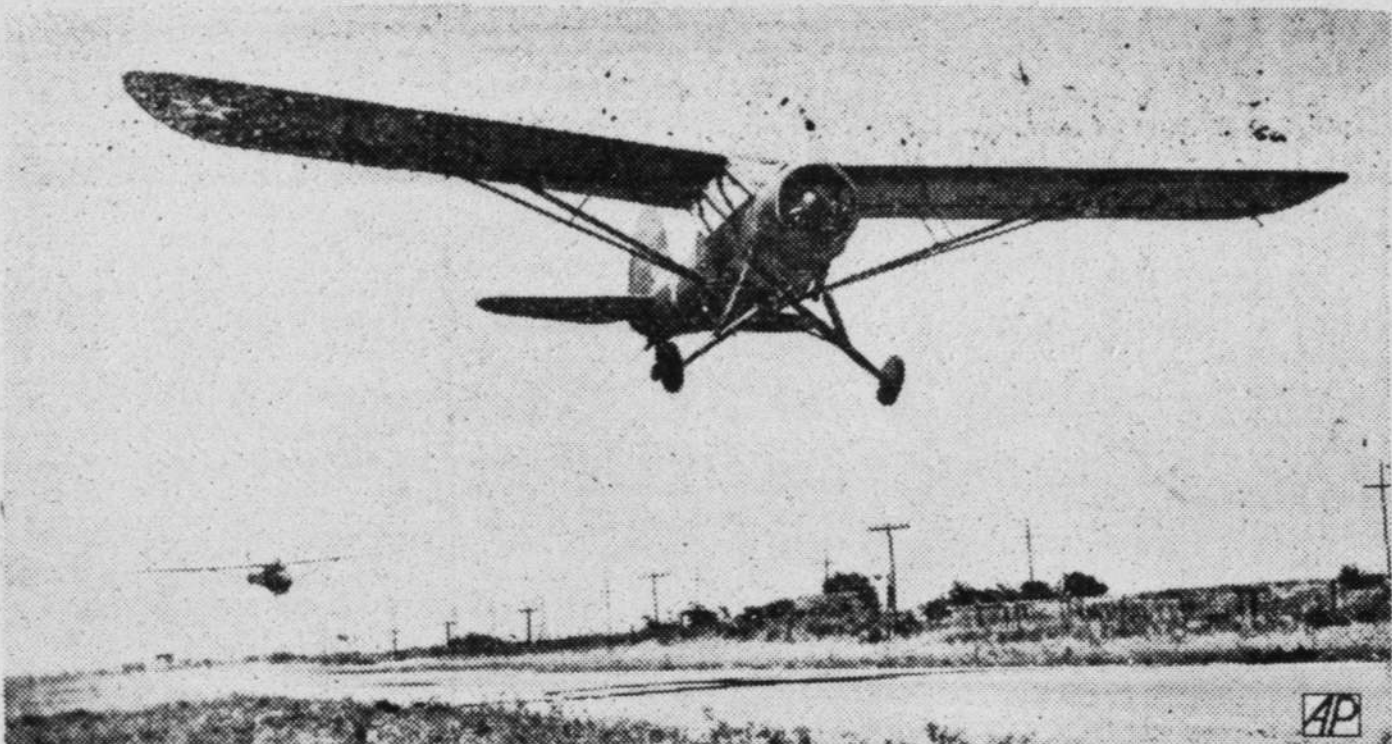
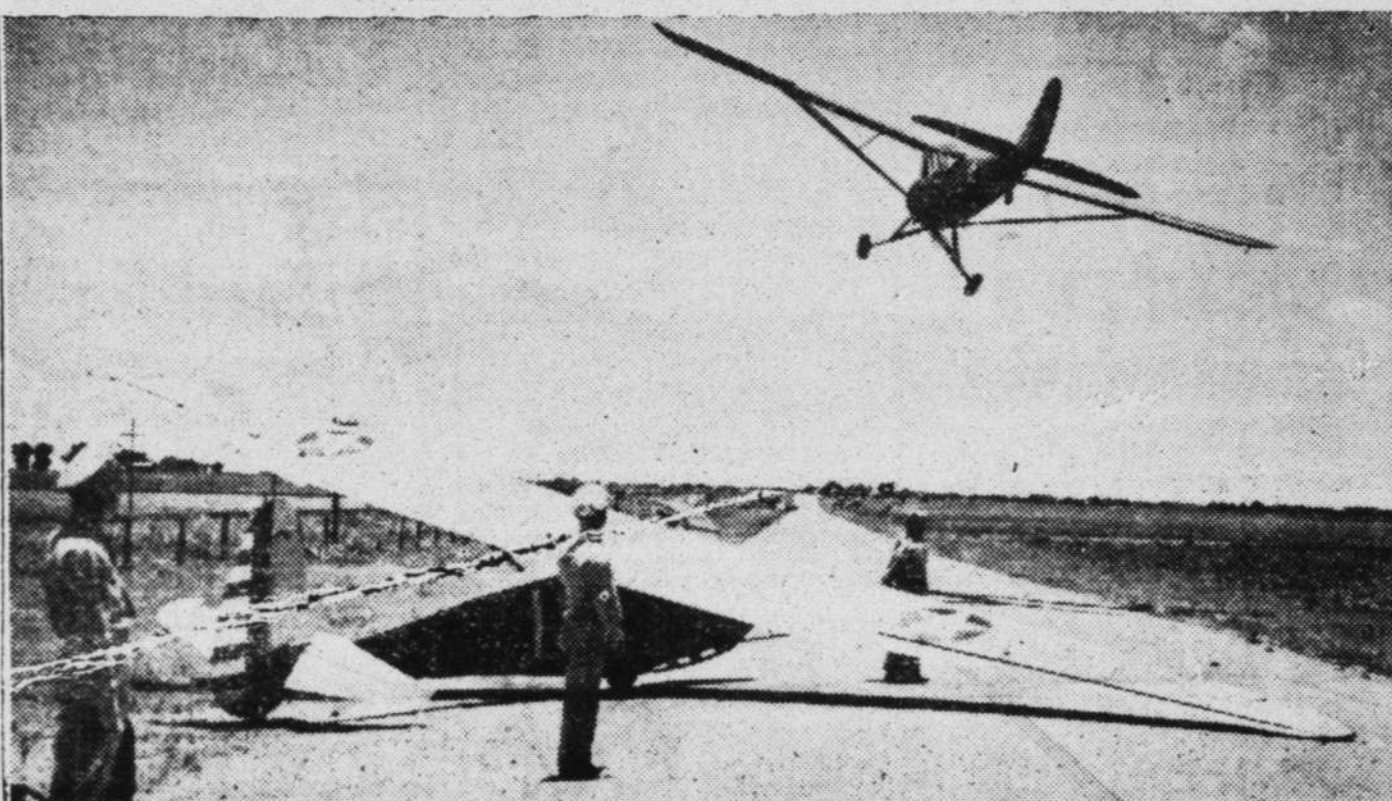
### PIGGLY WIGGLY STORE TO MAKE NO DELIVERIES

## Glider And Plane Use A Texas Highway



Having cut loose from his tow plane 2000 feet over the Lamesa, Texas, Advanced Air Force Glider School, Staff Sergeant Don D. Fritz piloted his motorless glider for 30 miles and (top) chose a spot on highway 87 for a landing, as motorists gave him the right-of-way. The tow plane had followed him and (center) comes in for a landing to retrieve both pilot and craft. ## Sam Richardson Talks Over Radio For Jimmie Allred

Editor's note: The following is an address made by Sam Richardson over Radio Station KFYO on last Wednesday evening for James V. Allred, candidate for United States Senator.

Neighbors, I am sincere tonight when I say that this is the greatest country in the world and that the greatest people live right here on the South Plains. The things I say to you tonight are sincere and come from the heart. I know that I am speaking to an intelligent group,

who believe in the principles of better government and the ideals our forefathers have fought and died for. I feel it a great honor to discuss with you the qualifications of our friend.

Allred A True Democrat and West Texan.

Judge Allred served you four years as your Attorney General, and his record in that office merited your electing him as your governor for two terms. He was appointed Federal District Judge of Texas by our President. His tenure as Governor was one of constructive accomplishments, a man of decision and action in administrative positions. He has capably filled the place on the Federal Bench as indicated by the record of a single reversal in the higher courts. His record will bear the closest investigation. Neighbors of the South

Plains, he is our kind of folk. His sincerity and integrity cannot be questioned. He is a west Texan, a true Democrat, and he knows and understands our problems.

Isolationist Responsible for Present War

Neighbors, we are engaged in the greatest and most cruel war in the history of mankind. I do not hesitate to make this statement and am no stranger to war. I served in the United States Army during the World War. I was overseas for fourteen months. You mothers who have sons in the Army and Navy, and there are many from this great South Plains who were with General Wainwright on Bataan and Corregidor and many with the lost Battalion in Java. You mothers, who are interested in the War, are very anxious that everything possible be done to win the war.

sible be done to end this war of destruction which is no fault of yours or your sons who are dying on the battle front. Let me tell you tonight whose fault it is. It is the fault of a group of isolationist Senators who have blocked everything the American Legion and other worthy groups and individuals have tried to do to bring about proper defense. What did they say when Congress wanted to fortify Guam? They said we must not do this, we would be pointing the guns at Japan. What did they say four months before Pearl Harbor, regarding the Selective Draft Law? They said we must not continue this army, we are in no danger of War. Your Junior United States Senator, now running for re-election, voted to repeal this law. What would have happened if we had discharged our army? I hesitate to say, but what did happen was bad enough. This same Senator recently said that winning the war was Mr. Roosevelt's job and, quote, "I am not worrying about that" unquote and he added, quote, "The question doesn't belong in the Senate Race," unquote.

You are interested in the war and you are interested in the man that you elect to be your next senator. We boys who served thru World War 1 were told we were fighting to save the world for democracy. But what happened? A group of isolationist in the United States Congress would not cooperate with our great President, Woodrow Wilson, and his fourteen point program, and they would not let him participate in the League of Nations and that is why I say that they must assume the responsibility for this war. There is no man who will say this war is not an aftermath of World War 1. When peace comes this time we must be united and we must see that it is a just peace. We must carry the torch thrown to us by the men who died in the first World War and the many thousands who will die in this war. We need men like our friend, Jimmie Allred in the United States Congress, men who have convictions and the abilities to carry them out. This war is the worry of every American, God pity us if we are not worrying.

**Judge Allred Resigned the Federal Judgeship Because He Felt It a Patriotic Duty to Make the Race For U. S. Senator.**

**Judge Allred Resigned the Federal Judgeship** because he was worried and felt it a patriotic duty to enter the race for the United States Senate. He knew nothing is secure if we lose this war. The Junior Senator seems to think the only issue in this race is quote, "Preserving our system of Government," unquote. Not against the Japs and Germans, whom our soldiers are fighting, but against the Americans at home who he would picture as engaged in sinister conspiracy to win the war only in order to subvert the liberties for which they are working and sacrificing. The only question to be settled by the election, says Senator O'Daniel is whether, quote, "W. Lee O'Daniel shall be re-elected," unquote. Mr. South Plains Citizen, Mr. O'Daniel would make you believe winning the war is a far-away matter. We want to assume our full responsibility. The citizenship of this great section do not want to wait and let George do the fighting, but are willing to make whatever sacrifice is necessary, and we want men in the United States Senate who are not afraid to do likewise.

We cannot question Mr. O'Daniel's ability as a showman. He is one of the best in the country. He spent many years in the show and entertainment field you know. I remember when he would come out here with the Dough Boys from one of the leading flour mills here in Texas. Later we heard him, with his band, advertising his own brand of flour which he sold here in Texas. But that does not qualify him to represent Texas in the United States Senate. We do not question him being a good man, or that he is sincere in his statements regarding religion. I say to

you, if we do not win this war, and the peace following, we will not be permitted to worship as we choose. Surely our religious ideals must be preserved and to do that we must win this war. Let no man tell you that War is not an issue in this campaign and that we must not worry and that everything will be alright and the war will soon be over.

**We Hear Much About Mud-Slinging**

We hear much in this campaign about "Mud-slinging" and about candidates having the backing of the oil interests and candidates being referred to as the "Gold Dust Twins." Let me say to you, Neighbors of the South Plains, there is no understanding between Judge Allred and any candidate. He has the same regard for the problems of the South Plains farmer as he has for the biggest oil corporations operating in the State of Texas. When you hear these statements made, investigate

the records, and see whether or not they are true. Judge Allred, while Attorney General of our state, secured for the school children of Texas many thousands of dollars from the major oil companies operating in our state. As I said in the beginning, the things I say to you tonight are sincere and because I am interested in the problems of the people of the South Plains.

We hear much about labor racketeering in our country and our Junior Senator from Texas tries to take credit for stopping this. Let me tell you who should have the credit for bringing this to the attention of the United States Congress. It is the communities on the South Plains, Brownfield, Lamesa and others, who should have the credit. You held mass meetings, passed resolutions, and sent them to our Congressmen and Senators in Washington, demanding that something be done. This is no time to

stir up class hatred of any kind. **South Plains Citizens Willing to Make Any Sacrifice to Win War**

The President and everyone studying our valuable rubber supply, is calling on every citizen of our country to conserve rubber, yet the Senator and his friend, who is running for Governor, are touring the state with a caravan of sound trucks and cars and saying, quote, "There ain't going to be any gasoline rationing" unquote. We people here on the South Plains are willing to give up all our tires and every gallon of gasoline in order that our way of life may be preserved. We are tired of this foolishness, lots of talking and nothing being done. We want to win this war and talk later. That is the spirit of we people as expressed by the citizenship of the South Plains.

In closing, friends let me say, I knew Jimmie Allred when he shined shoes as a small boy in a barber

shop in Bowie. He did his work well then. I have observed that thru the years he has continued to work and fight hard and assume the full responsibility of the many high offices he has so well filled. Elect him your next Senator and bring back to Texas proper representation, I thank you.

DENVER (AP) — A Denver dairy, returning to horse-drawn wagon deliveries, decided to install a 40-horse barn in the warehouse district. # THE PENSION RECORD

## ALLRED

- (1) Ran for Governor on platform of old age pensions in 1934. The first candidate for Governor in Texas to include such a plank.
- (2) Submitted an old age pension Constitutional amendment to the Legislature in 1935.
- (3) Made speeches asking the people to vote for it during summer of 1935.
- (4) After people had voted the amendment, he called special session of the Legislature to put the amendment into effect.
- (5) Signed first old age pension bill in Texas history November 19, 1935.
- (6) Called three special sessions of the Legislature in efforts to raise sufficient funds.
- (7) Was always opposed by the same special interests who are now supporting O'Daniel in this race.
- (8) Additional funds finally provided, effective November 1, 1936.
- (9) 114,500 on pension rolls as his term ended.

## O'DANIEL

- (1) Made no speeches for adoption of the amendment in 1934.
- (2) Did not vote for it (had no poll tax).
- (3) Never appeared before any of the special sessions of the Legislature asking them to raise funds for pensions.
- (4) Ran for Governor in 1938 glibly promising \$30 per month.
- (5) Got in fight with the Legislature in 1939 over transaction tax and SJR 12, a pet sales tax measure and hence, did not raise any money.
- (6) Told the Legislature to submit a better plan; they did; he went on the radio against it.
- (7) Lowered pension payments \$6.00 per person per month in 1939 to every person in Texas on the rolls so that the big banks could be paid off.
- (8) Refused to call a special session to raise money to make it up.
- (9) Was re-elected, still promising \$30.
- (10) In 1941, opposed the omnibus tax bill to raise taxes. He said "the law stinks" (The Legislature passed it anyhow).
- (11) He signed the bill, but said that he had to hold his nose while he did it.

**NOTE:** All the pension money ever paid to the old folks in Texas was raised by laws passed during Governor Allred's administration; or by laws passed by the Legislature during O'Daniel's administration, but in spite of his **opposition** to them.

## Col. Thompson Speaks Before Clubs Friday

Col. Ernest O. Thompson, State Railroad Commissioner, spoke before members of the Lamesa Rotary Club and Lions Club here last Friday at noon at the Plaza Hotel.

W. D. Arnett, had charge of the program. Carl Rountree introduced Col. Thompson who gave his audience many interesting points on the present oil situation and the war.

Col. Thompson talked on the oil resources and what it meant in war. He said in the last ten years Texas had doubled its oil output and has twice as much in storage and ten times as many independent operators, and that 22 per cent of the world's oil supply was in Texas. According to Col. Thompson the Caucasus that Russia and Germany are now fighting over is the size of the Conroe oil field in East Texas, and that Texas has one-hundred more oil fields like it.

Col. Thompson discussed the war in general. He has been in both World War 1 and the present war. He served over a year at Camp Bowie, Brownwood, since the present war started.

Some interesting points he brought out about the present day soldier were that the soldiers today are one-half inch taller than the soldier in World War 1, and that he is 4 pounds heavier and 4 grades high in education.

A large crowd of Rotary and Lions Club members attended the Friday meet.

## Lt. Joe McAllister Flies Fast P-38

Lieut. Joe E. McAllister of the Army Air Force, who is receiving training as a pilot for the P-38, fastest aircraft in the world, has been here the past week visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. B. McAllister, who live three miles west of Petty.

Lieut. McAllister was an interesting visitor at The News office Tuesday and told us many facts about life in the Army Air Service and its equipment. The P-38 is said to travel at the greatest speed of anything that ever carried a human being. At level flying, McAllister says the ship he is assigned to will make 400 miles per hour. At such a rate of speed, one could fly from Tahoka to Lubbock in less than five minutes. In a dive, the plane reaches the almost

unbelievable speed of 700 miles per hour.

Needless to say, McAllister is very proud of the Army Air Service in particular, and the whole United States fighting forces in general. He said he would be tickled to death to be able to make this headline possible in The Lynn County News: "Tahoka Bombs Tokyo." He's impatient for the chance.

Joe was raised in Dawson County, graduated from Lamesa High School in 1935, and attended Texas Tech two years. He enlisted in the Army about three years and four months ago, and has been in almost every branch of the Army during that period. He has been in the Air Service nine months.

Leaving here Thursday, McAllister will report to the new Army Air Base at Colorado Spring, Colo., where he will be a member of the 14th Photo Reconnaissance Squad, which uses

the P-38 pursuit plane. He has been at Mather Field, Calif., near San Francisco, the past few months.—Lynn County News.

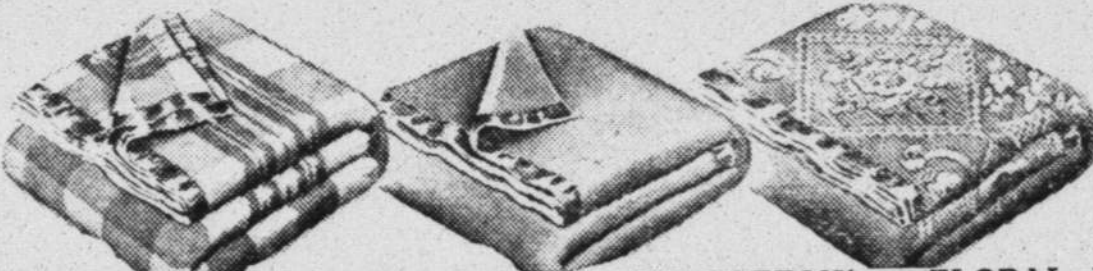

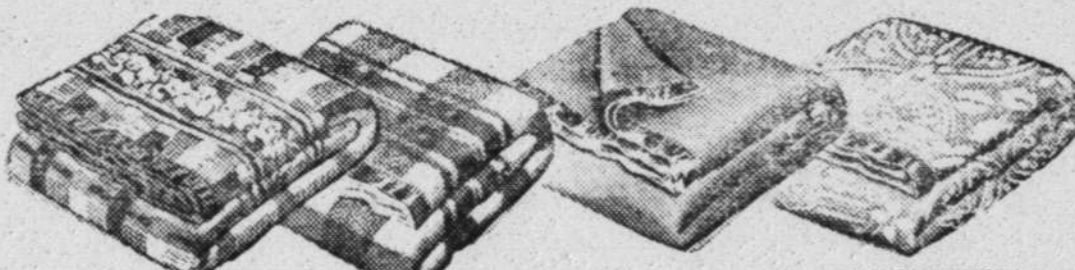
