

Burkett Marijuana Crop Is Destroyed

Probably the best "hay crop" ever to be harvested in the Burkett Community was burned in a small paddock behind the house of Coleman County Sheriff Corky Chapman, just north of Coleman, Thursday of last week.

While the "crop" weighed only a ton and a half or a little less, it was valued at \$275,000 by narcotics agent of the Texas Department of Public Safety who helped Sheriff Chapman with the burning chores after being granted permission by

35th District Court Judge Joe Dibrell. Agents said that the burned crop, if refined and rolled, would have been worth about \$1 million. It covered an area of three-fourths of an acre.

The "hay crop" was found on the ranch of E. B. (Sweetie) Webb, which is just over the line from Callahan County in Coleman County. The marijuana plants, ranging in height from six to 10 feet, were cut down and hauled away from the site into two large vans.

James Clifford Moore, 32, of Balmorhea, was indicted Wednesday of last week by Coleman County Grand Jury for possession of marijuana in connection with the find. Moore was employed as a cowboy on the ranch where the marijuana was found.

What is believed to be one of the biggest marijuana finds in the state was brought about when agents were given a tip on the field. Five agents out of Dallas acting on the information had the field under surveillance since Monday.

Chapman said he did not know whether the marijuana was ready for harvesting, although he said, "I noticed on one row, the leaves had been picked and just the stalks were left standing."

Burkett Post Office Hit By Burglars

Post office at Burkett was burglarized sometime late Friday night or early Saturday morning, Mrs. Jack Strickland, assistant postmaster who was in charge while Mrs. Merrel Burkett, postmaster, was with her husband at a Temple hospital, said that only a "very little" petty cash was taken. Entrance was gained to the building by breaking glass in front doors. Mrs. Strickland said that nothing else was bothered. She locked the lobby about 10 p.m. Friday and nothing was amiss at that time, but she discovered the break-in upon opening Saturday morning.

Both postal department investigators and the Coleman County Sheriff's Department are working on the case. Deputy Sheriff H. F. Fenton made a preliminary investigation Saturday morning.

TAXPAYER GIVES SCHOOL NEW AIR-CONDITIONER

A Cross Plains taxpayer who wishes to remain anonymous has donated an air-conditioner to Cross Plains schools, according to an announcement this week by Wayne Ford, superintendent of schools.

The unit brings to nine the number now installed in the local elementary building, leaving only three classrooms in that building without air-conditioning. Parent Teachers Organization has bought six of the window, evaporative units. Woodmen of the World Lodge donated one and one other has been traded for by the school. The PTO recently had the elementary school wired for installation of 12 air-conditioners.

The one donated by the anonymous person has been installed. It was purchased from the local Higginbotham store which discounted the retail price considerably, according to Ford.

Kindergarten Possible For Some 4-Year-Olds

Cross Plains School Board has authorized admittance of four-year-old students to the kindergarten program at the local school under a four-step qualifying condition.

Wayne Ford, superintendent, revealed the conditions this week. They follow.

Each student will be assessed a tuition cost of \$524, an amount based in actual cost per pupil.

The student must remain in the kindergarten program during both his fourth and fifth year.

Conferences and readiness tests will be conducted on each application to determine the child's "readiness" for learning.

Final step in the new admittance program is the pupil's continuance in the kindergarten.

ASCS Office Has Recent Information On Freeze

Tommy Harris, chairman of the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) announced here last week that all residents of Callahan County may obtain answers to questions regarding operation and interpretation of the Presidential Order of Aug. 15, on prices, rents, wages and salaries.

County ASCS offices through-

out the nation have been chosen as information centers to answer queries from all citizens on President Nixon's Executive Order which is said to be designed to stem inflation and strengthen the national economy.

The Callahan County ASCS Office is receiving official answers to questions concerning the action and any person in the county who wants or needs

precise information should get in touch with the local office, Harris said.

"Ours and all ASCS offices throughout the nation, will function as information centers in all locations outside of highly urbanized areas," he said. Local office is located at the courthouse in Baird and mailing address is Box 909. J. C. Earp, Jr., County Executive Director, is in charge of the office, and his office assistant is Mrs. Leroy Gibson. Phone of the office is 854-1049.

County ASCS offices will not handle complaints or appeals, but will serve only to provide official information. Persons with complaints should register them with the nearest district office of the Internal Revenue Service.

"Neither will interpretations or guesses be made by ASCS county office people. They will answer only those questions for which they have been supplied answers. If they don't know the answer to a specific question they will say so. If a member of the public wants the county office to obtain an answer, the question will go to the nearest IRS office," Harris said.

Harris said that normal function of the local ASCS to administer farm action programs of the U. S. Department of Agriculture on the local level will continue to local farmers without interruption.

"Our county office people welcome the opportunity to serve their country and are happy to make the extra effort in this crucial period," he said.

6-Year-Old California Boy Dies In Crash Here

Rickey Zamparelli, 6, of Van Nuys, Calif., was dead on arrival at Brownwood Community Hospital Monday afternoon after a three-vehicle crash about eight miles east of here on State Highway 36. The

accident occurred about 1 p.m. just west of "Hickman Hill", where a country road intersects with north side of Highway 36. Four other persons were not apparently seriously injured.

The dead boy was a passenger in a 1968 Ford driven by Margaret K. Lane of California. There was also another passenger reported to be in the Lane auto.

Other two vehicles involved were 1964 Chevrolet pick-up driven by Alvie F. Folkner, 82, of the area in which the mishap occurred, and a 1966 Ford pick-up driven by Claye Daniel of Route 1, Gustine.

H. D. Welch, Department of Public Safety Patrolman who is stationed in Cross Plains, investigated the accident.

The body was taken to a Brownwood funeral home.

LEMOINE PANCAKE KILLS GIANT RATTLER SUNDAY

Lemoine Pancake killed what could be the "granddaddy" of all rattlesnakes in this area Sunday one mile south of Cross Plains.

Lemoine is tending farm animals at the place owned by his brother, Ralph Pancake, at junction of Highways 279 and 206, immediately south of town, while Ralph is on grain harvest.

While feeding chickens Lemoine heard a rattlesnake "buzz". He grabbed a weapon and killed the reptile. While showing it in town, it was measured 5½ feet long and 9½ inches in circumference at broadest point.

This one, however, did not sport legs as did one killed several weeks ago east of Coleman.

Bond Sales Lag In Callahan County

Howard E. Farmer, Chairman of the Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee, reported today that sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in the county totaled \$3,958 during July. Sales for the first seven months were \$61,732 for 47 per cent of the 1971 sales goal of \$130,000.

July sales in Texas amounted to \$16,810,210 compared to \$15,454,922 during the same period of 1970 - an increase of 8.7 per cent. Year-to-date sales were \$188,726,731, while 1970 sales totalled \$106,206,174 for an increase of 11.7 per cent.

National sales during the month were \$458 million - 16.3 per cent above 1970 July sales. Sales for the seven-month period totalled \$3,243 million - 17.4 per cent above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds amounting to \$151 million were reported for the first seven months of 1971 compared to \$146 million exchanged in 1970.

9 D.W.I. CASES FILED IN COUNTY COURT

Highway Patrolman H. D. Welch has filed 9 D.W.I. cases in county court. Of these 9 cases only one was an in-county resident.

Court Costs Upped To Help W.T.C.O.G.

Court costs in Callahan County have been upped to help finance activities of the West Texas Council of Governments. State legislature has assessed the increases.

In a meeting Friday of all four Justices of the Peace and James Paul Shanks, county attorney, agreement was reached to raise court costs as follows. Misdemeanor cases in county court were upped \$5, from \$47 to \$52, and felony cases, district court, were increased from \$47 to \$57, an increase of \$10. Costs of all cases filed in justice courts in Callahan were raised \$2.50.

A. E. Dyer, Jr. county judge, points out that payment of increased funds would be made to state, and in turn the state would fund the councils of government to operate and maintain law enforcement and traffic schools and other such undertakings originated by the councils.

HINTS

FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

SEVERE BURNS AND BLEMISHES:

The deeper the damage on wood finishes, the more difficult the treatment. The following method requires care and patience, but it may save complete refinishing by a professional.

Step 1 — Clean: Scrape the blemish clean with a sharp knife or razor blade (taped for safe handling). Remove all loose dirt or charred wood, and clean with naphtha on a cotton-tipped toothpick.

Step 2 — Prepare: Smooth damaged area with 3/0 steel wool wrapped around the point of a wooden skewer or orange stick. Clean as before. Then rub with the grain of the wood, using 6/0 or 7/0 sandpaper or fine emeryboard.

Step 3 — Stain: Follow directions in Step 1 under Medium Scratches and Blemishes.

Step 4 — Fill: Fill damaged area with stick shellac to match wood finish. (This is preferred

to plastic wood, which may damage lacquer.) Heat spatula with alcohol flame or electric burner. Do not use gas or candle; soot may discolor shellac. Have the blade just hot enough to melt shellac. Scrape off a bit and press into the blemish with the edge of the blade. Repeat until filled.

Step 5 — Level: Heat blade of spatula, wipe it clean, and scrape across patch to level. Shave off excess shellac with razor blade.

Steps 6 and 7 — Sand and Rub Down: Follow Steps 3 and 4 under Medium Scratches and Blemishes.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Facts Concerning Re-Recording Of Brands In Texas

All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be re-recorded with County Clerks after August 30, 1971, according to a new law passed during the last session of the Texas Legislature. Producers will be given a six-month period (August 30, 1971, through February 29, 1972) in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using, after which time any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "first-come" basis.

The law further states that all such brands and marks must be re-recorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations are extensive.

The owner shall have the right during this six-month period to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such marks and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the number and/or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and re-recording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or re-recorded as provided by the new law. 21 5tc
