Arguments Begin This Morning In Lester Trial

Rescue Efforts Redoubled For Sea Tragedy Victims

One Hundred And Eight Lives Are Claimed By Seas

Scores Of Ships Stranded, Sunk Or Badly Damaged By Worst Weather Over Europe In Past Century

Guards Risk Lives

Vessels Rush To Scene Of Disasters In Effort To Aid Floundering Ships; End Of Storm Not Seen

LONDON, Dec. 9.—Relief forces redoubled efforts tonight in a hull in the gales which have subjected western Europe to perhaps the worst weather in a century, to reach waterlogged and crippled derelicts to which helpless men still clung on the high seas.

A check up tonight still incomplete, showed 104 lives had been lost and 60 large ships had been stranded, sunk or seriously damaged. The end of the storm was not yet in sight with gales raging furiously from the mouth of the elbe in the North Sea to Cape Finisterre, the northwestern extremity of Spain. Coast guards risked their lives in many instances in almost hopeless efforts to reach floundering ships. Vessels that escaped damage turned out of their course to speed to the aid of the others.

One instance reported today was that of the British liner Albatross, which arrived at Plymouth from New York. It had stood by the crippled British steamer Tyne-bridge nine hours while that ship tossed helplessly in the high seas. Finding it impossible to transfer the injured men from the Tyne-

Community Chest "Clean Up" Today

Final Drive To Be Started This Morning At Meeting Of Workers In City Hall; \$6,000 Is Sought

The final drive of the Lubbock Community Chest for its first year in an endeavor to raise \$30,000 for charity work in the city will be inaugurated this morning at a meeting of workers of the organization to be held at 9:30 o'clock in the city hall.

The four-day drive last week resulted in a final total of some \$6,000 short though several hundred prospects were skipped in the canvass of the city and these will be given a chance to subscribe to the fund in this last resort.

To Visit Prospects
Nett H. Wright, general chairman of the organization, stated yesterday that approximately 500 prospects will be visited before the drive is over. "We do not want to stop until every one has had a chance to subscribe," Wright said. "Every one feels confident that when these additional persons have been seen the grand total of the Chest fund will be considerably swelled."

Two additional names have been added to the big gifts division since the closing of the drive Friday night. These are Davis and Humphries, \$50, and Sampson Construction company, \$100.

No Motives Are Found In School Teacher Slaying

Dentist Questioned After Woman Is Beaten Fatally

ROCKFORD, Ill., Dec. 9.—Working virtually without a motive for the crime or clues to the slayer, Rockford police tonight sought to determine who killed Miss Cordelia Gammshelmer, 30, Rockford high school teacher, and why.

Found beaten to death in her kitchenette apartment Sunday, authorities had only a short length of gas pipe, used in the slaying, a number of letters and one man known to have been in the vicinity at the time the crime was committed.

Dr. Floyd Leach, eccentric dentist with offices in the building next to the apartment in which the victim lived, admitted he worked late Saturday and had been near his office until 3 o'clock Sunday morning.

Coroner Walter Julian said there was no evidence to connect the dentist with the crime. Police questioned him in an attempt to learn whether he had seen any one enter or leave the apartment building about the time of the slaying.

RETURNED FOR TRIAL

Arrested In New Zealand On 13-Year-Old Charge

TEMPLE, Dec. 9.—A. B. Crouch, former Temple grain dealer who was returned from New Zealand yesterday to face forgery indictments which have been pending against him for approximately 13 years will go on trial on the first indictments in the January term of court, according to District Attorney Henry Taylor.

Crouch was released shortly after his arrival on bonds totaling \$30,000. Officials here tonight said that they were considering the possibility of filing charges involving state and interstate shipments of grain.

Peace Restored By Marines' Arrival

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti, Dec. 9.—Arrival of a detachment of 50 marines at Jacmel and impending arrival of hundreds more has aided marines already here in restoring peace after riots last week.

Complete quiet prevailed today with wire communications open to all points. Threatened demonstrations failed to materialize. The cruiser Galveston arrived at Jacmel with 50 marines.

Jacmel was quiet, but residents there show a manifest relief at arrival of the Americans. All fear of attack was said to have been dispelled. Three opposition papers have voluntarily suspended publication although they were encouraged by Brigade Commander Cutts to continue. The papers said no news could be printed, but the authorities contended the real reason was they were facing bankruptcy.

Mobilization Of Guard Ordered In Strike Of Miners

Infantry And Cavalry Are Ordered Into Service In Connection With Serious Condition In Illinois

600 Men Included

Less Than 400 Miners Answer Call For General Strike, Statistics Of Sub-Officials Reveal

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Dec. 9.—Orders for immediate mobilization of the 130th infantry and 106th cavalry, Illinois National Guard, for service in connection with the mine strike at Taylorville were issued late today by Adjutant General Carlos M. Black.

The two outfits comprise between 600 and 700 men. The infantrymen are from Decatur and Springfield and the cavalry troopers from Springfield and Urbana. Major C. J. MacMachen of Salem will command the infantry.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Dec. 9.—(P)—Sub-district officials of the United Mine Workers of America said tonight that statistics gathered by them indicated that less than 400 miners in Illinois answered the general call of the National Miners' Union today.

Reports reaching the headquarters of the Illinois union indicate that the strike order found very little response. "State President Harry Fishwick said, 'Only one mine has been seriously troubled by the strike and but a few have been picketed by adherents of the National Miners' Union.'"

Decline Is Shown By Cotton Report

Government Estimate For 1929 Places Crop Total At 14,919,000 Bales For Drop From Last Month

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—The estimate of 14,919,000 bales of cotton for the 1929 season contained in the department of agriculture report today was 6-10 of 1 per cent lower than the estimate of a month ago and compared with 14,478,000 bales in the 1928 crop.

At the same time the agriculture department issued its report, the census bureau reported that 12,857,971 running bales counting 473,079 round bales as half bales had been ginned prior to December 1.

Above 1928 Crop.

This compares with 12,560,154 bales in 1928 prior to December 1. The estimated production would be harvested, said the report, from 45,961,000 acres. The abandonment of acreage since July 1 was placed at 3.3 per cent, and the indicated yield of lint cotton per acre was placed at 15.5 pounds.

The report was issued without comment but later in the day W. E. Callender, head of the plant reporting board in a radio speech, said the decline in the December estimate of 90 cents in the estimate is due to the weather. He said the weather was the cause of the decline in the estimate of the maturing of the tail-end of the crop and for picking it.

The mother finally reached into the cage and opened the clenched jaws of the beast and removed the baby's arm.

Absentee Voters May Participate In Bond Election

Ballots Can Be Cast Any Time Before Saturday By Lubbock Citizens; Large Vote Is Urged

Voters who expect to be out of the city or county on election day, Tuesday, Dec. 17, and who desire to vote on the road bonds can do so before leaving, according to Charles F. O'Neill, chairman of the Lubbock County Good Roads association.

"Absentee voters are already casting their ballots, four of them voting Monday," O'Neill stated last night. "And anyone who is qualified to vote in this election, if they are to be away on next Tuesday, can cast their ballots at any time up to next Saturday night."

Qualified voters, O'Neill states, are those who own any property at all, including watches, jewelry, musical instruments, household goods, etc. These are taxable property and, if one has a poll tax receipt of the current year charged in connection with property owned has been assessed or taxes paid on it, the holder thereof is entitled to vote on this road bond issue.

World Court Left To Senate Action

American Adherence Again Hinges On Decision Of Solons; Hoover To Allow Time For Consideration

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—American adherence to the World Court again hinges on the senate, President Hoover, who authorized the affixing of the signature of this nation to the revised Protocol at Geneva today, is expected to give the senate some time for reconsideration.

The president has been informed that another stubborn senate contest is in prospect. He is not expected to reject this question there before the return of Secretary Stimson from the forthcoming London Naval Arms conference.

Group Still Opposed
The senate group which unsuccessfully opposed American adherence to the court when it was voted by 75 to 18 three years ago has given notice the modification of the senate's reservation, which is embodied in the revised Protocol is not acceptable.

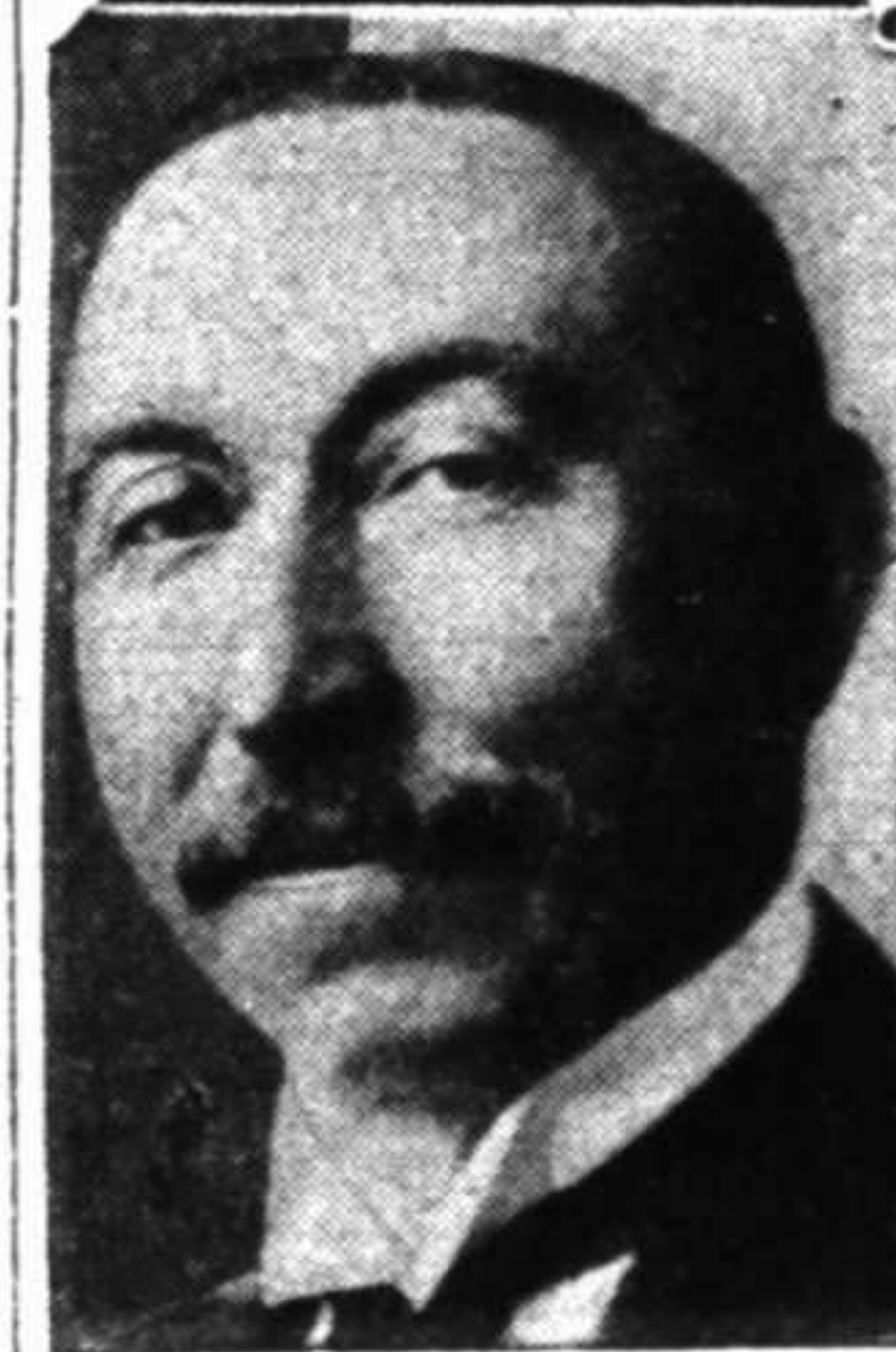
It was held today at the senate that a two-thirds majority would be required for approval of the revised Protocol, as was the case when adherence was first voted.

Approval Voiced

Democratic leaders who have supported the World Court voiced approval today of the modification of the senate reservation which was worked out last spring by Elihu Root with a committee of international jurists. This modified reservation, which in its original form was not accepted by the World Powers, had now been approved by the other nations.

Senator Borah and Senators Johnson, California and Moore, New Hampshire, the ranking republicans on the foreign relations committee, have avowed their opposition to the modification.

Improvement Of Conditions Aid On Round Table Talk Here Monday By Visiting Farm Officials Of State

Monday afternoon's session of the meeting in this city of 24 county agricultural agents, 15 home demonstration agents and five officials of the Texas and U. S. Agricultural Extension services, took the form of a round table discussion in which ways and means for improving conditions were propounded.

The conference in Lubbock will be concluded today and possibly the most important meeting will be held at noon when bankers of the entire district convene jointly with the agents. At that time plans will be outlined whereby banks over the section will cooperate with the extension service in the agricultural matters.

Evans Supervisor

Sterling C. Evans is supervisor for the agents of the district while Miss Myrtle Murray is supervisor for the home demonstration workers. The area under Evans' supervision includes the counties of Lamb, Terry, Lubbock, Dawson, Young, Jones, Fisher, Scurry, Stephens, Archer, Clay, Haskell, Shackelford, Swisher, Gaines, Hale, Baylor, Garza, Stone-wall, Lynn, Dickens, Throckmorton, Knox and Haskell.

Miss Murray's supervision covers the same territory, but there are only 15 counties of the 24 listed above in which a home demonstration agent is employed.

South Plains Men Attend Farm Meet

Cooperative Officers Of Fourteen States Gather To Discuss Plans With Federal Organization

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Dec. 9.—Officials of cotton cooperative organization in fourteen states will meet here tomorrow with members of the Federal Farm Board to discuss plans looking to the coordination of the activities of the various marketing organizations and the establishment of central headquarters along lines acceptable to the Federal Board.

Among participating organizations are the southwestern irrigated cotton growers association, headquartered at El Paso, and Texas farm bureau cotton association.

R. E. Overstreet, of Lubbock; W. H. Hames, Crenshaw; C. A. Barton, Lamesa; and M. S. Hudson, Hale Center, all state directors of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton association, left Lubbock Sunday night for Memphis, Tenn., to attend a meeting of leading cooperative farm organization heads of the south.

The Memphis meeting is to start this morning, every director of every cotton association in the south expected to be in attendance and to meet jointly with the Federal Farm Board.

Fate Of Accused Slayer Likely To Be Decided Today

State Will Demand Death Penalty For Prisoner In Arguments Before Jury Today; Insanity Claimed

Expect Big Crowd

State Closes Case Monday With Testimony Of Local Physician, Others That Defendant Is Sane

BATTERIES of legal oratory will be released this morning in such district court when two able counsels will argue over the fate of Clay Lester, accused of slaying his wife in this city October 24.

The state, led by District Attorney Durwood Bradley, will demand the death penalty, while the defense counsel of Schenck & Triplett will seek an acquittal or mitigation of sentence on an interposed plea of insanity.

State Case Concluded
Rebuttal for the state was concluded yesterday afternoon at 4:40 o'clock, following seven days of proceedings. As the case dropped over examination of witnesses, Judge Clark M. Mulligan conferred with both counsels and immediately announced that he would have his charge ready for the jury by 8 o'clock Tuesday morning, when the arguments are scheduled to start.

C. C. Crenshaw will open argument for the state, followed by George Dupree, and Mr. Bradley will make the final speech. The two former attorneys have been employed as special prosecutors.

Order Not Given
W. F. Schenck and C. C. Triplett, defense attorneys, announced last night that they have not decided upon the order in which they will speak.

Judge Mulligan said late yesterday that he would not specify allotment of time until he confers with both counsels this morning. "I feel certain that the entire day will be used for arguments," said the magistrate.

Expecting an overflow of spectators, the court is making preparations to assure order and proper ventilation of the courtroom. Sheriff Wade Hardy will be aided by about four or five bailiffs in maintaining order. The courtroom section will be reserved for members of the bar or those whose work is associated with court circles, it was announced.

Contradicting the united testimony of three physicians, defense witnesses Dr. W. L. Baugh, Lubbock county health officer, stated on the witness stand yesterday afternoon that, in his opinion, Clay Lester is sane. Dr. Baugh testified in the state's rebuttal.

The doctor stated that he had examined defendant on several occasions since Lester became a prisoner.

"He told me that he is a morphine addict," testified Dr. Baugh. In answer to Mr. Crenshaw's examination, the witness expressed the opinion that Lester is capable of knowing right from wrong.

"Might the use of morphine aggravate the condition of one suffering with paranoia?" asked Mr. Triplett in cross examination.

"No," replied the doctor, "morphine is used in treatment of paranoia."

"Might the sudden withdrawal of

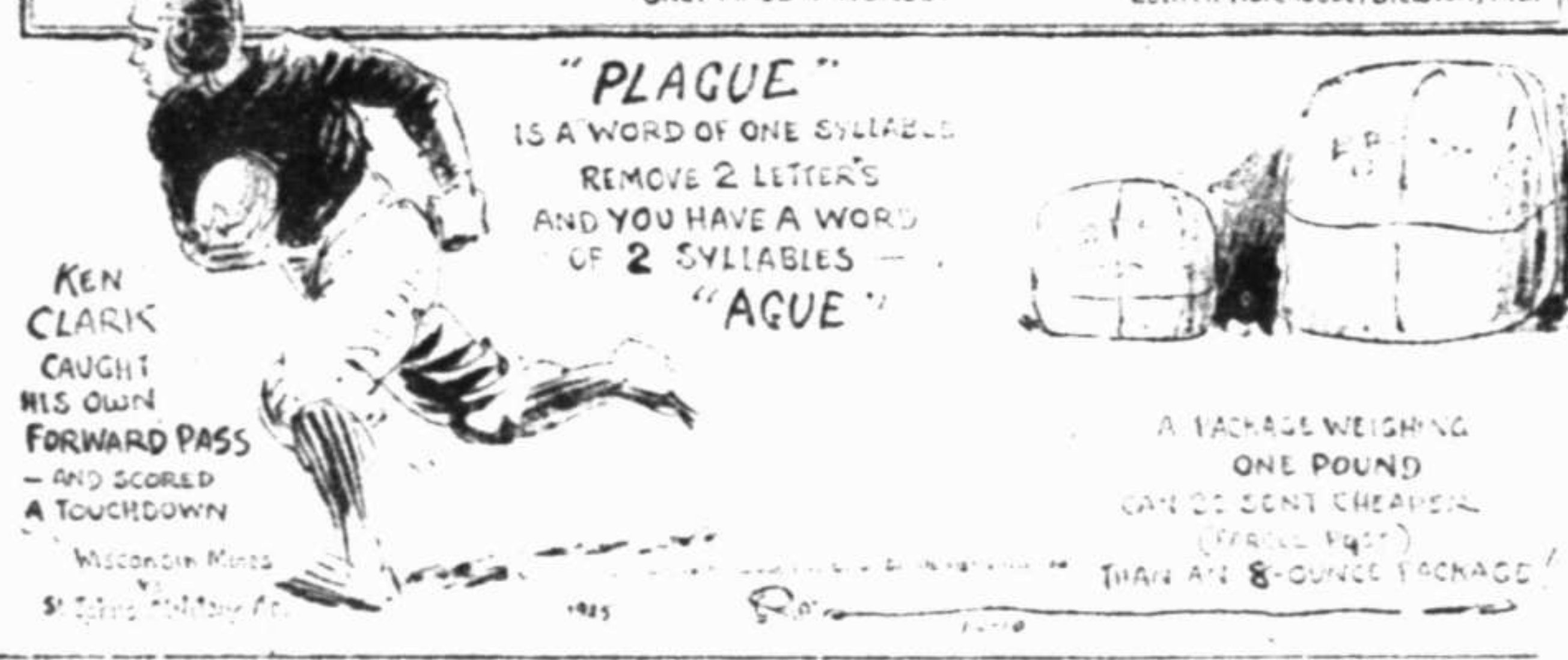

Quiet Prevailing In Haiti Monday

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9. (AP) — Word from Haiti that quiet prevailed throughout the island was received with gratification in Washington today as leaders in congress prepared to expedite organization of the house foreign affairs committee so it might pass upon the Porter resolution to authorize creation of a Haitian commission of inquiry as recommended by President Hoover.

The Avalanche-Journal, eager to

Outstanding Preacher.
"Dr. Lee is an outstanding
preacher among southern Baptists,"
stated J. D. Carroll, educational di-
rector. "It is said that he can
quote more science and literature
from the platform than any other
preacher of the Baptist denomina-
tion."

In addition to being an unusual
speaker, Dr. Lee is an author of
no small note. Two of his most re-
cent books being "Lord, I believe
and yet I doubt" and "Theology". He is
a regular contributor to nearly all of
the Baptist periodicals.

Dr. Lee is former pastor of the
First Baptist church of New Or-
leans, La., and of the First Baptist
church of Charleston, S. C. He
is about 45 years old.

Judge Lindsey Is Disbarred Monday By Supreme Court

Former Juvenile Judge Is Charged With Professional Misconduct For Taking Fees While In Office

DENVER, Colo., Dec. 9. (AP)—Ben
Lindsey, former juvenile court
judge today was disbarred by the
Colorado state supreme court on
charges of professional misconduct,
improper acceptance of fees while
he was judge.

Decision of the court was unani-
mous.

The charge against Lindsey, who
is now in wide fame for his administra-
tion of the Denver juvenile court,
was that he accepted \$37,000 from
Mrs. Hele Stokes, prominent Denver
and New York society woman, who
was attempting to establish the
rights of her two children for a set-
tlement of the late E. D. Stokes' es-
tate. He was charged with taking
\$10,000 from Samuel Untermyer,
New York attorney, in the same
case.

Judge Lindsey was judge of the
Denver juvenile court while the
Stokes case was pending. He said
his connection in the Stokes case
was "disinterested from the work
of the juvenile court" and he acted
merely as arbitrator and mediator.

Body To Dimmitt.
The body of Mrs. Simmons was
sent Sunday to Dimmitt, where ser-
vices were conducted in the after-
noon at 1:30. The two were married
in that city three years ago.

The fatal shooting of the young
husband and wife occurred while
the two were sitting in a car in
front of the Elbe Dining Room at
1302 Avenue N. She died almost in-
stantly and he died before reaching
the operating table at the Lubbock
hospital.

Separated One Week.
The shooting occurred supposedly
while Simmons was trying to get a
reconciliation with his wife, who
left their home just a week previous.

Simmons is survived by his moth-
er and father, Mr. and Mrs. M. E.
Simmons, pioneer residents of Lub-
bock; two brothers, L. D. Simmons,
of Dimmitt; four sisters, Mrs. W. N.
Lynn, of Olney, Mrs. Robert Taylor,
Decatur; Mrs. Barney Wilson, Sla-
ton; and Mrs. G. A. Barnett, Dim-
mitt.

Other than the parents, Mr. and
Mrs. Jim Webb, of Dimmitt, Mrs.
Simmons is survived by a sister,
Pauline, and a brother, Jimmie.

Regulars On Defense
Much of the wide-open maneuvers came with the lengthy practice on Cleburne plays, chief of which is the lateral pass, featuring Messrs. Brandon, Stephens, Langdon and Hopkins. The Lubbock regulars played the defensive role against Yellow Jacket formations with the cannon fodder brigade running off Cleburne plays.

In their own signal drill, the Westerners likewise gave considerable attention to the overhead game. Continued drill on old plays and work on the new ones found the locals going at top speed. The entire squad appears in the pink of condition and indications are that the Westerners will have their full strength when they line up against the cohorts of Howard Parker.

Jackets Are Husky
Although the invaders will outweigh the Westerners considerably, the Lubbock eleven will rely upon its deceptive running attack and its heretofore effective aerial game to turn back the Yellow Jackets. Preliminary practice for the post-season skirmish has indicated that Yancey Price, fleet Westerner end, will take on an additional share of the ball carrying burden in the season's finale Friday. Price has yet to be stopped when he starts around an opponent's flank, and his speed may prove a potent factor in the tussle with the Jackets.

The old standbys in the Lubbock backfield are certain to carry the burden of the Westerner attack. Smith, Lawson and Watkins thru the line and around the ends; Lawson, Smith and Green passing to Watkins, Rice or Price—these are the combinations upon which the Westerner commanders will pin their hope for victory.

Tickets for the game Friday have been placed on sale at the Hotel Drug. A committee will start today on a concentrated drive to sell reserve seats for the contest. Reports from Slaton are to the effect that the entire city will close for the game and large delegations are expected from other points of the South Plains.

John A. Heydler, president of the National league, still thinks his 10-man team idea a good one, but probably will not advocate it again since the clubs thought nine players were enough when it was brought up at the last annual meeting.

The possible trades to be developed at the meetings were only in the conversational stage tonight as the managers and managers talked in hotel lobbies.

Big Ed Morris, the ace of the Boston Red Sox pitching staff, was reported about to move to the New York Yankees, but Bob Quinn, president of the Boston club, declared he had not approved the transfer. Dazzy Vance, who had an unsuccessful season last year and was bothered by ill health just as his \$25,000 contract expired, was mentioned in connection with half a dozen clubs, including the Chicago Cubs, who also were said to be willing to pay a large sum for the release of Burleigh Grimes, by the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Cincinnati was understood to be willing to offer attractive playing talent for Larry Benton, Giant pitcher, who slumped last season after a great campaign in 1928. His home town is in Redland, Cincinnati also made an offer to St. Louis for Frankie Frisch, Washington may be asked about the possibility of a trade for Goslin.

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Cotton Declines; Market In Setback

Early Advance On Cotton Followed By Drops Monday

Publication Of Government Crop Report Is Cause Of Decrease; Estimate In Line With Expectations

NEW YORK, Dec. 9. (P)—An early advance on covering promoted by relatively steady cables and expectations of reduced crop figures were followed by declines after the publication of the government report in cotton today.

The official estimate of 14,919,000 bales was just about in line with average expectations, but the failure of the report to bring in fresh buying led to considerable liquidation. January contracts sold off from 17.04 to 17.07 and closed at 17.09 with the general market closing barely steady at net declines of 8 to 20 points.

The opening was steady at an advance of 3 to 9 points and the active position showed net gains of 10 to 14 points before trading was suspended to receive government report. There was considerable covering on this early advance which evidently eased the technical position of the market, and when the official crop figures failed to stimulate further buying, the market weakened. December, which had advanced to 18.31 during the early trading sold off to 17.00 late in the afternoon while May declined from 17.85 to 17.62.

Closing quotations were within a point or two of the lowest.

Show Girl's Soprano Voice Comes Back As Contralto; Radio Brings Noted Singer Fame She Enjoyed Before

It was 10 years ago that Helen's musical career began. From a vaudeville star she branched into night club entertainment, playing at the Marigold Gardens and the College Inn here. At the latter club, she was introduced to George White. That maestro of pulchritude offered her a contract to play for him in the east.

Helen went east, rose to fame, and then came her downfall.

Testimony Given By Brookhart To Get No Attention

Details Of Alleged "Wall Street Booze Party" Are Ignored By Grand Jury In Investigation

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9. (P)—The grand jury today decided to ignore testimony by Senator Brookhart of Iowa relative to the "Wall Street booze party" given by Walter Pahn, New York broker, to new members of congress in 1926, at which Brookhart said liquor was served.

Brookhart said he sat at the dinner between Otto Kahn, New York financier, and E. E. Loomis, president of the Lehigh Valley railroad, and that the latter poured "some alcoholic stuff" from a glass and drank it.

Loomis Called.

Loomis was also called before the grand jury as was the manager of the new Willard hotel where the dinner took place.

The grand jury in its report said it was "deemed that the lack of evidence together with the extraordinary lapse of time between the alleged violations and the revelations of the facts relating to this affair make it impracticable for the grand jury to consider the matter further."
