That's the news that Allan Johnson brought to Big Spring Area Chamber board Wednesday. Johnson is the DRA pres-

ident and the chamber's vice president for business development.

"Funtastic Fourth Festival is coming along in an amazing way," Johnson said. "We have close to 100 total booths."

There are still a few spots left for the Battle of the Bands.

"We have a few openings in our Tejano category. We need some Tejano bands. If they'll call me, I'll fit them in there," he said. "We also have two openings I think in our country category and we have one opening in our rock category. First come, first serve on all of them. But we do have a few

spots left on each of them."

During the meeting, the chamber board voted to sponsor the Battle of the Bands, pledging a \$1,000 donation to the DRA.

"We're greatly appreciative of that," Johnson said. "That's really going to help going toward our prize fund. We're giving out right at \$5,000 in prizes in our Battle of the Bands. We're using

Johnson added that the prizes for each of the three categories are \$1,000 for first place, \$500 for second and \$250 for third.

"This would be a great opportunity for somebody to showcase their talent," he said.

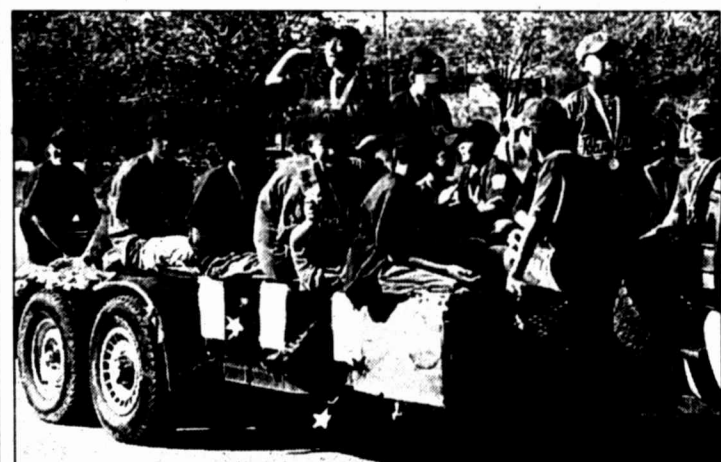

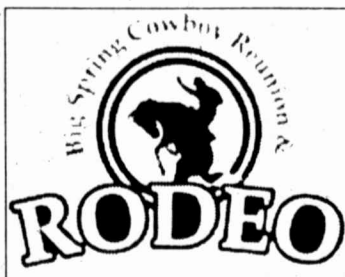

"She really enjoyed the rodeo parade," said her grandmother, Joy

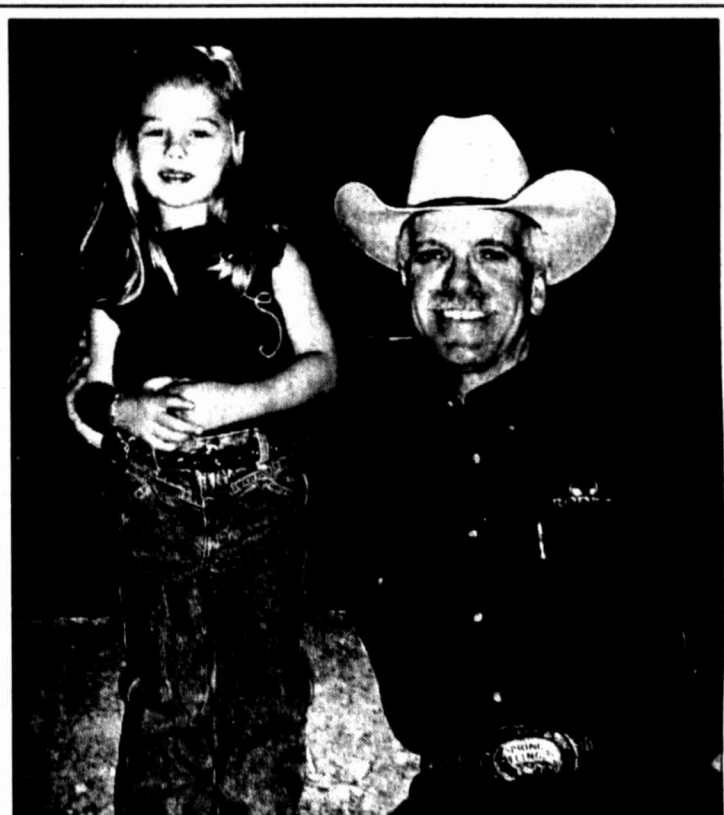
Armstrong of Big Spring. "Living in Austin, she doesn't get to see too many parades like that."

Lakeview served as the city's black high school during segregation years.

"Its going to be focusing on integration, 1961-1964," said Clarence Hartfield Jr., reunion committee member and a 1961 Lakeview High School graduate.

years, the Big Spring school district began integrating

Lakeview students into Big Spring High School. By 1964, the

district had fully integrated all the classes.

Hartfield said he learned from conversations with students that the change proved to be difficult.

By 1964, the attitude of the school began to change, he said.

"They said the teachers started changing they way

they thought about them and they really wanted to start helping them," Hartfield said.

Hartfield believes the Civil Rights movement played a large part of the shift in attitude.

"The Civil Rights movement was in full bloom at that

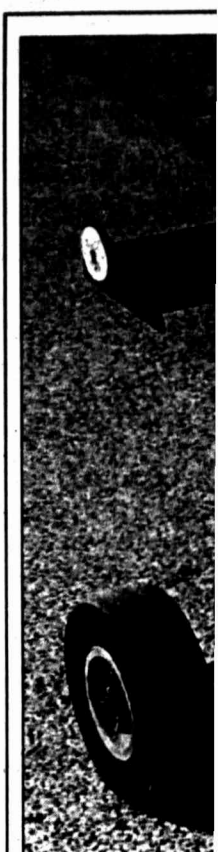

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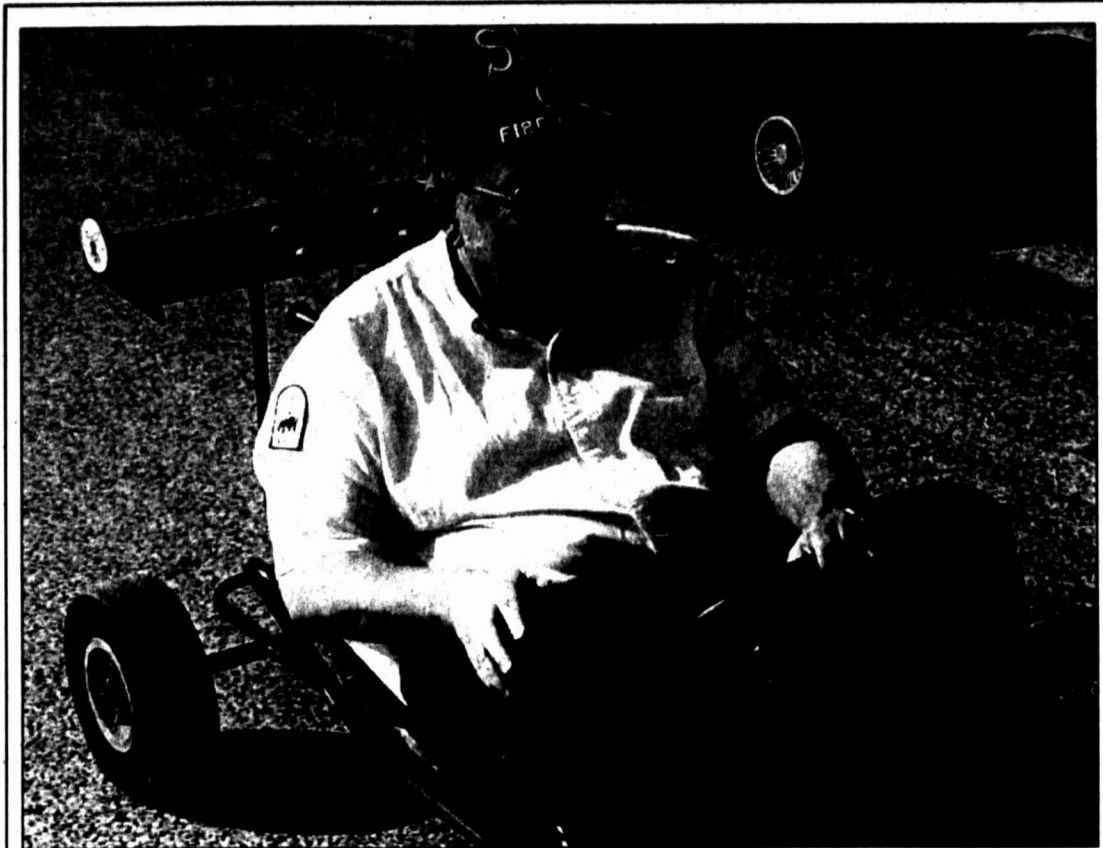

Bitter redistricting fight resurfaces

AUSTIN (AP) — Round two in Texas' bitter congressional redistricting match has been set and both sides have their gloves on, ready to fight.

Angry House Democrats — who KO'd the redistricting push in round one when they fled the state — stand in one corner looking to repeat the victory.

But, across the ring, they face a throng of Republicans determined to redraw the state's congressional lines.

Republican Gov. Rick Perry ended weeks of speculation Wednesday by calling a special session beginning June 30 to address the divisive issue.

In a letter to Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and House Speaker Tom Craddick, Perry said the Legislature, not the federal courts, should be responsible for drawing voting districts. The current congressional district map was drafted by the courts after lawmakers failed to approve a plan in 2001.

"When we put it off to

the courts, we are just passing the buck. That's not right," said Rep. Phil King, R-Weatherford, who drew the proposed map. "People elect us to do all we are required to do and redistricting's part of that. It's a crummy job and nobody enjoys it but we need to do it."

Backed by U.S. House Majority Leader Tom DeLay, the bill could shift the balance of power in the Texas delegation to the GOP. The delegation now has 17 Democrats and 15 Republicans.

The governor also said the session could be expanded to include other "important matters." In the letter, Perry named a Texas Tech medical school and regional academic health center as possible issues to take up.

Republicans, the majority party, would appear to be the favorite. But the so-called "Killer D's" proved they were a force to be reckoned with when they dealt a painful blow in May by busting quorum. Though most wouldn't discuss their game plan this time around,

they were poised to put up a fight.

"(Republicans) should have followed the rules. Had they done that they wouldn't be in the mess they're about to get into. And they're about to get into a mess," said Rep. Richard Raymond, D-Laredo. "They're making their bed and they're going to sleep in it."

Rep. Jim Dunnam, a Waco Democrat who emerged as the ringleader of the Killer D's when they fled the state, said the House Democratic Caucus would be meeting in the next few days to develop a plan.

"We don't even have a certified budget and we're fixing to spend \$2 million on a special session just so Tom DeLay can get his map?" Dunnam questioned.

Rep. Joe Deshotel, D-Beaumont, said he doubted the group would try to bust quorum a second time.

"I'm hoping we can convince the senators to stand up and fight what we perceive as an injustice," Deshotel said.

The arrest was made by sheriff's deputies on charges of improper photography or visual recording to arouse or gratify.

"A person commits an offense if the person photographs, or by videotape or other electronic means visually records another without the person's consent and with the intent to arouse or gratify the sexual desire of any person," explained Gary Pritchett, chief deputy.

Additional evidence was obtained from the search, Pritchett said.

"At this time there is no

additional charges pending," he said. "We believe this is probably an isolated incident. We are investigating additional evidence to confirm or deny this but right now there seems to be only one victim."

Wayne Rotan, superintendent of Forsan schools, said Perez has not been placed on administrative leave.

"Standard procedure is to place the person on administrative leave pending the investigation," Rotan explained in a telephone interview this morning. "At this point in the year, he has no contact with the students. There is no need to place him on administrative

leave immediately. We have some time to conduct an investigation.

"The incident is under investigation and appropriate action will be taken at the conclusion of the investigation," Rotan said.

Pritchett declined further comment.

"In order to protect the victim, the only thing I'll really tell you is it's a adult female."

In Texas, an adult is anyone 17 or older.

Suits dismissed

LUBBOCK (AP) — Families who gave deceased relatives' DNA to Texas Tech University and wanted the samples to follow a former Tech researcher to her next post are dropping their lawsuits against the school, their attorney said Wednesday.

Floyd Holder, who represented the families, said a moving van carrying about 1,700 DNA samples from Alzheimer's victims left Lubbock on Wednesday morning. The samples are headed to the Medical College of Georgia's Institute of Molecular Medicine and Genetics in Augusta, Ga., where Tech's DNA bank's

founder, Shirley E. Poduslo, now works.

"I think it's just wonderful the way it's turned out," Holder said. "A lot of people will benefit."

Holder said he planned to file motions to dismiss his clients' cases against the university and officials there by Friday.

Energy heads irate

MIDLAND (AP) — Small oil and gas producers in Texas find it increasingly difficult to

operate as the state legislature becomes more focused on urban issues, interest groups say.

"The oil and gas industry has been such a bread-and-butter tax deal for the state for so long, if they want to keep that stream of income coming into the state, they need to not make it real hard on us," Bob Thompson, president of the Society of Independent Professional Earth Scientists, said at the group's meeting Wednesday.

Like O.J., defense publicity may free Scott

My beef isn't, as some journalism-school types sniff, that the Laci Peterson story has received too much coverage. My complaint is that cable networks might help get a guilty man off.

The preliminary hearing for Scott Peterson — who has pleaded not guilty to charges that he murdered his wife, Laci, and unborn son, Conner — hasn't begun. So it's the boring season of the story, the factual doldrums.

Still, CNN, Fox News and MSNBC air hours of talking-head debates, whether there's news or not. This is when TV news is at its most dangerous, as standards become dispensable and prosecutors tend to obey orders sealing evidence, while defense teams generally aren't so scrupulous.

This week, "defense sources" told NBC's Dan Abrams that they had produced a list of "four (or) possibly five people," who may be you'll remember this from the O.J. trial — The Real Killers.

The satanic cult theory on the fact that Laci's whole body didn't wash up on the bay shore. A series of supporting news stories, some based on one anonymous source, followed.

Fox News' Geraldo Rivera reported "exclusively" that a "defense source" told him that Laci's body

had been "carved up" and "there were internal parts missing." (The dissection twist, expert TV panelists argued, supported the Satanic Cult Real Killers theory.)

Then came leaks of the autopsy. MSNBC reported that "plastic tape" was found around the neck of Laci's unborn son. "Finding in Peterson case could be used to bolster defense theory on killings," read the MSNBC website's sub-headline. The story continued, "The finding could be used by the defense team for Scott Peterson, Laci's husband, who is accused in her death, to bolster its theory that Laci and the fetus were killed in a satanic ritual."

Stop the presses — there may be litter in the bay. In fact, what NBC called "plastic tape" a reporter who read the leaked autopsy described as "nylon and twine."

Claudia Cowan of Fox News argued that networks are covering both sides. "We're hearing from the victims now in the autopsy reports," she argued — and when the reporting is solid, she's right.

But when other reporters repeat defense spin as if it is revelatory, well, they blur the line between reporting and shilling.

You have to wonder if some reporters talk up the defense, because it makes for a more interesting story. Besides, defense teams usually leak more than district attorneys.

The dynamics end up co-opting some reporters.

I spent one day at the O.J. Simpson trial in 1995. Prosecutors spent what seemed like hours in an attempt to stipulate that an

indentation in Nicole Simpson's back came from a bra hook.

I asked some of the big names and print grunts covering the trial why prosecutors were wasting so much time on a bra hook. My peers argued, breathlessly, how necessary it was to explain the little dent. Last defense attorney Johnny Cochran later used the dent to support a scenario involving The Real Killers.

To my undying shame, I figured they must know what they were talking about. Baloney. They were so infatuated with the celebrity of the trial that they couldn't see guilty when it stared them in the face. Their attitude had to rub off on jurors.

We don't know if Scott Peterson killed Laci and Conner. If he did, the burden of proof lies with the prosecution.

But a burden also lies with the media — the obligation to not be in awe of every gimmicky bit of "evidence," to not marvel at forensic gymnastics while ignoring bread-and-butter evidence.

There was a time when cooler heads warned against the media trying a man in public, not in a court of law.

In the age of 24-hour news, there is a danger of the media acquitting a man in public, and then in a court of law.

McDowell opens annual Big Spring Rodeo with a dose of home cookin'

Hollywood scriptwriters couldn't have written a more perfect beginning for the 70th annual Big Spring Cowboy Reunion and Rodeo. After all, it wouldn't be Texas if there wasn't a little home-cookin'.

Howard College phenom Danny McDowell dazzled the largest opening night crowd in the rodeo's history Wednesday night by vaulting to the top of the leaderboards in the sports most popular event — bull riding.

One of the top-rated bullriders on the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association circuit, McDowell put on a bull riding clinic in his first ride of the four-day professional rodeo event. He finished with a score of 84 and takes a 3-point lead over defending National Finals Rodeo average winner Adriano Moraes of Brazil.

McDowell's ride comes on the heels of a stellar effort at the recent College National Finals Rodeo in Casper, Wyoming. McDowell and Howard College teammate Seth Swearingen helped the Hawks' mens' rodeo team finish fifth in the nation.

McDowell, the top-rated college bullrider in the southwestern United States for much of the year, finished fifth in the final

Bellville cowboy David Smith and Tony Hecksher both turned in solid performances in the bareback riding division. Both registered scores of 79 and head into tonight's second round tied atop the standings.

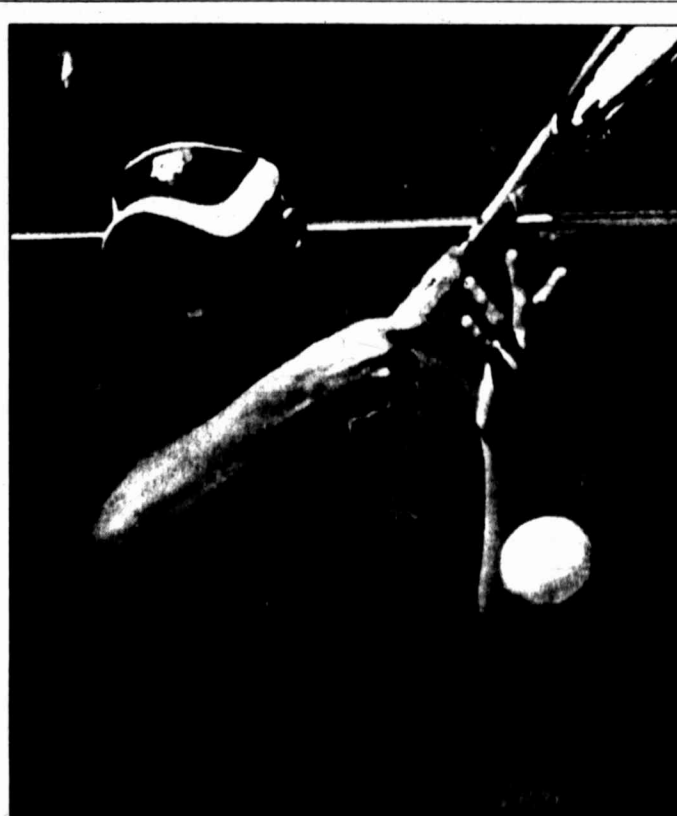
Stephenville's Austin Griffin, despite a hard fall at the end of his ride, finished third.

Bryan Hammons was the only cowboy left standing after the first round of saddle bronc riding. He registered a mark of 82 to take the lead — coincidentally by riding a horse named "Crossroads."

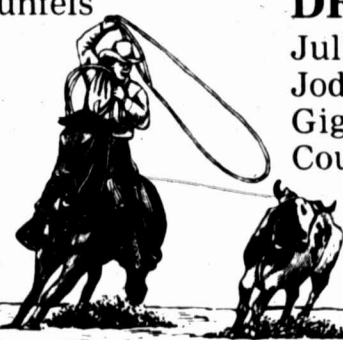

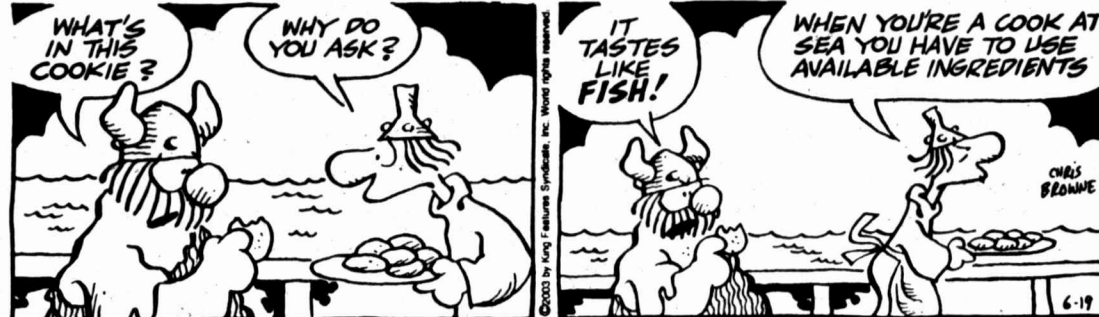
