Soaked shingles

United States to play subdued role with Asia

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — In a sharp reversal from the Vietnam War era, the United States is stepping back and letting Asian nations take the lead in trying to loosen Communist control of Cambodia.

Secretary of State George P. Shultz entered a second day of talks today with the five foreign ministers of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) determined to play a supporting but subdued role.

He pledged U.S. backing for whatever steps ASEAN takes to promote a negotiated withdrawal of more than 150,000 Vietnamese troops from Cambodia, which Vietnam invaded in 1978.

But Shultz intends to spend most of his time listening, confident that the ASEAN countries are on the right course, according to U.S. officials traveling with him.

Already ASEAN has called for the Vietnamese to pull their troops back 48 miles from the border with Thailand to set the stage for talks between Thai Foreign Minister Siddhi Savetsila and Vietnam.

The United States is endorsing the move, although Shultz is stressing that it would be "at best, a step in the right direction" and that the U.S. goal is to restore Cambodian control of the country.

The Cambodian problem is dominating the two-day meeting, attended also by the foreign ministers of West Germany, Canada, Australia, Japan and New Zealand.

ASEAN's members are Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia, Singapore and the Philippines.

The United States prefers to follow the ASEAN line on Cambodia rather than confront Hanoi directly as it did during the Vietnam War.

U.S. officials say. The ASEAN members share the U.S. concern with the expansion of Soviet influence in Asia through what Shultz refers to as "Vietnamese proxies."

Next weekend in Pakistan he will explore efforts to reduce Soviet influence in another Asian country, Afghanistan.

The Bangkok Post newspaper reported today that Shultz will be urged to provide "non-lethal military aid" to the rebel coalition, which includes the Khmer Rouge forces of Pol Pot. His repressive communist regime was overthrown by the Vietnamese and he now receives support from Peking.

The coalition fighting against the pro-Hanoi government in Cambodia also includes two non-communist factions, less powerful than the Khmer Rouge.

Shultz and other U.S. officials have refused to discuss the controversial issue of American military aid. They also are reluctant to predict who might emerge on top if the Vietnamese are ousted from Cambodia.

The main objective, Shultz told reporters, is to clear the way for Cambodians to take charge of their country.

The presence here of West German Foreign Minister Hans Dietrich Genscher, representing the European Community, makes it convenient for Shultz to touch base with him before Chancellor Helmut Kohl sees Soviet President Yuri V. Andropov.

Kohl, who will be in Moscow on July 4, is taking the middleman role between the two superpowers in an effort to improve their relations and break the deadlock in nuclear weapons negotiations in Geneva.

Midlanders severely burned in explosion

Two Midland men were transferred to Lubbock General Hospital with severe burns following an explosion Sunday at Midland Mobile Home Ranch Estates, about a half mile south of Interstate 20 on State Highway 349.

Howard Travis Brunson, 54, was listed in critical condition with third-degree burns to 90 percent of his body, according to a spokeswoman at Lubbock General this morning. Tim Penny, 32, was in serious condition with second-degree burns to 30 percent and third-degree burns to 14 percent of his body. Both men were residents of the mobile home park.

According to a Midland Fire

Department official, the explosion occurred at 12:07 p.m., when the two men were in a cellar at the park.

"I think they must have lit a cigarette or something," said a fire department spokesman. "It just blew them out of there."

He added the incident was under investigation.

According to a spokeswoman at Midland Memorial Hospital, Brunson was brought in with second- and third-degree burns over 95 percent of his body, while Penny had first- and second-degree burns to his upper body and face. The men, brought in about 1 p.m., were transferred by air ambulance to Lubbock shortly before 3 p.m.

Girl may hear name for first time

Fund-raisers make surgery possible

CLEVELAND, Texas (AP) — Patti McLelland has seen her name but never heard it.

The five-year-old girl was born with profound nerve deafness. But her mother hopes that in 10 days, an experimental procedure will bring her daughter out of silence.

Linda McLelland is a divorcee raising Patti and her 9-year-old brother, Preston, alone. For years, Mrs. McLelland feared Patti would never be able to hear, because she did not have the \$12,000 necessary for the new surgical procedure.

Thanks to friends and relatives who sponsored a fund-raising drive for Patti, she will receive a cochlear implant — a dime-sized, experimental device in the bone behind her ear, which will be hooked up to a small box that contains a tiny microphone and signal processor.

"She writes and signs her name, but she has never heard it," said

Mrs. McLelland, in an interview published in Sunday's Houston Chronicle. "She has never even heard her own voice, her own laughter."

"I want her to hear all that. But most of all, I want her to hear — not see — me say, 'I love you.'"

The sounds will not be distinct, but will resemble the sound of a radio that is not properly tuned. But it will be sound, something Patti never has experienced. She is the third Texas child to undergo the experimental procedure.

Mrs. McLelland said she tried to get funds for the operations, but her efforts were rejected by insurance carriers, banks and three major charities — the United Way, Easter Seals and the March of Dimes.

"I was told they just didn't have a program that would fit her. I was at a dead end," she said.

She finally turned to friends and family here in her hometown, and got a hearing from the Veterans of Foreign Wars, where her father, Denman Wilson, belongs.

He was the first person to discover Patti's illness, when she was 15 months old, and says he is thrilled that his VFW post can now help Patti hear.

Once the VFW post began to sponsor Patti's cause, Mrs. McLelland said, other civic groups and town members became aware of the problem and began chipping in, holding turkey shoots, barbecues, dances, auctions and a rodeo.

In less than four months, more than \$16,000 was raised for Patti's operation.

"The town of Cleveland has worked together and pulled together for Patti," said VFW com-

mander George E. Hughes, whose post won a national VFW award for its efforts.

And after the initial surgery, one of Mrs. McLelland's insurance companies also unexpectedly sent a check to cover part of the cost, she said.

If any funds remain, Mrs. McLelland said she will start a fund to help other children with her daughter's problem.

"I don't want anybody else to go through the agony that I went through," she said.

Dr. H. Edward Maddox III of Houston is the only surgeon in Texas who does the implant surgery, said Mrs. McLelland. The implants were first tried on adults five years ago and only used on children within the past year.

Volunteers work to fend off river

GRAND JUNCTION, Colo. (AP) — Volunteers worked overnight in darkness and rain to build up two sagging dikes and fend off the rising Colorado River, which forced more than 1,200 people to evacuate as storms and spring runoff pushed it to a record crest.

Meanwhile, hundreds of miles downstream, federal officials were considering whether to release more water today from Parker Dam. It is one of three dams between Arizona, Nevada and California on which floodgates were opened last week because of brimful reservoirs that store water and control floods from the Colorado River.

One man died and 15 were injured in a weekend rafting accident in the river's rapids in Grand Canyon National Park, while two men died in the swollen river in Mexico, officials said.

Weekend rains and mountain snowmelt sent the river nearly 2 1/2 feet above its 11-foot flood stage at Grand Junction on Sunday, its high-

est level since record-keeping began in 1908. National Weather Service officials said. The old record crest of 13 feet came in 1917.

But Gary Chancy, a National Weather Service forecaster in Grand Junction, said the river could rise by as much as another foot later today, and stay near that level several days before receding.

"We're talking about three to four days before it recedes enough not to worry about it," Tom Gancarz, a police spokesman, said Sunday night.

The rising waters inundated part of one Grand Junction neighborhood, Rosevale, causing the evacuation of about 50 of its 250 residents, and threatened a dike protecting the Riverside area, forcing authorities to order its 1,200 residents from their homes.

Meanwhile, 300 residents of the Connected Lakes area began their sixth day away from their homes today after a leaking dike prompted Mesa County Sheriff Dick Williams

to impose a mandatory evacuation last week.

Although crews have worked since Wednesday to reinforce the Connected Lakes dike, it was saturated and seeping badly early today and the river was lapping at its top.

Williams and Gancarz said they didn't believe the dike would withstand the river's crest, and that about 75 homes could be flooded if it failed. Williams was so concerned about the dike that he allowed only a few people to work in the area Sunday.

"We feel it is such a potential danger that we don't want anybody in there," said sheriff's Capt. Bob Silva.

Officials concentrated their efforts Sunday on the dike between the Colorado and the Riverside neighborhoods, the largest one in danger.

The roar of heavy machinery echoed across the river as volunteers using donated construction equipment added two feet of dirt to

the top of the dike.

Below, 600 volunteers stacked sandbags in an effort to build a 4-foot wall parallel to the quarter-mile long dike in case the river sloshed over the top of the earthen barrier.

The rising river also closed Interstate 70 about 15 miles west of Grand Junction between Fruita and Loma, while rain triggered mudslides on the Grand Mesa, east of Grand Junction, sending boulders crashing onto Colorado Route 65.

In Boulder City, Nev., officials of the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation said they were considering speeding the flow over Parker Dam because of increased snowmelt, but that an increase today probably would catch many homeowners off guard.

Rangers in the Grand Canyon ordered commercial river raft passengers to walk around Crystal Rapids after several rafts capsized Saturday. The injured were flown out of the canyon by helicopter.

KKK won't hold city hostage again this year, mayor says

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — San Antonio plans to fight any attempt by the Ku Klux Klan to "hold the entire city hostage" for a third time this year, a disgusted Mayor Henry Cisneros said after the group's second rally in two months.

About 40 heavily guarded Klansmen marched four downtown blocks in stifling 100-degree heat Sunday to protest "illegal aliens and communists."

"I think there's no question we have allowed them their constitutional rights," Cisneros said. "Any court would agree to that. These are people who abuse the notion of free speech."

KKK members said they returned because the city had not allowed the Klan's "white power" message to be heard by San Antonians during a May 1 march.

Officials estimated Sunday afternoon's one-hour visit cost the city \$40,000.

"We have spent about \$100,000 to allow the Klan to be able to exercise their whim, to hold the entire city hostage," Cisneros said, referring to both marches.

"The good news is that the Ku Klux Klan came to San Antonio and they are gone," he said.

About 650 good-natured spectators gathered behind police barricades to heckle the Klan as members of the white supremacist group leisurely proceeded to the steps of City Hall.

Acting Police Chief Frank Hoyack said his 450 officers, most of them called in on overtime, reported no incidents.

"I checked the crowd on every block," Hoyack said. "I didn't sense any real out-of-control emotion. I think it was a real condemnation of the Klan that most people stayed home."

Special session ends after four days

AUSTIN (AP) — Legislators departed over the weekend after spending four days in special session and quickly dispatching the handful of issues they were authorized to deal with.

Now they have gone home to await another special session which Gov. Mark White has said he will likely call after he receives a special committee's recommendations on funding for public education.

Before adjourning Saturday night, lawmakers approved measures ordering hotels and motels to install smoke alarms in every bedroom, and they appropriated \$120,000 for a state ethics commission.

Lawmakers did not, however, act on White's request to extend workers compensation benefits to farmworkers.

The issues were added by White to the session agenda after lawmakers acted on two emergency measures — extension of the Texas Employment Commission, and establishment of a testing program for the cattle disease brucellosis that conforms with federal regulations.

White has said chances are "very good" for a second special session to address his pet project — more pay for schoolteachers. Speaking in McAllen on Sunday, the governor reiterated to about 6,000 concerned Rio Grande Valley residents his commitment to education, but would not announce a date for the session.

He said, as he has before, that he first must receive a report from the Select Committee on Public Education.

That panel, created by the Legislature to study all aspects of public education in Texas, was reestablished after lawmakers failed during the regular session to give teachers the 24 per-

cent pay raise White had sought.

Lawmakers on Saturday passed a human rights bill creating a special commission to investigate and decide job discrimination complaints and a measure requiring fire detection equipment in all hotels, motels and public boarding houses.

The smoke alarm vote was in response to a recent hotel fire in Fort Worth that killed five people. The House and Senate approved the bill on voice vote late Saturday and sent it to White to be signed into law.

Fort Worth Fire Marshal Donald Peacock told a Senate committee Saturday the Ramada Inn Central fire on June 14 "very easily" could have killed 50 people instead of five.

He was the only witness before the State Affairs Committee on the bill, which would require hotel operators to maintain smoke detectors "in good working order in every room of the hotel that is regularly used for sleeping."

The detector would include an alarm that could be heard throughout the room to alert the occupants of a fire.

Minority leaders had lobbied for the human rights commission in each of the past seven regular legislative sessions and it passed the House by only one vote, 61-60.

The bill creates a six-member Human Rights Commission to do investigations currently performed by the federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

Attachment of the job discrimination program to the TEC "sunset" bill caused lawmakers to reject the TEC measure during the regular session. Without the TEC measure, the agency would have gone out of existence before lawmakers met in their next regular session in 1985.

Writer's disappearance mystifies police

EL PASO (AP) — In "It's a Long Way on Route 66," Dan Courtney wrote a short story about his ordeal on the highway when his estranged family shuttled him from home to home.

When the aspiring writer disappeared from El Paso Jan. 17, his car was found abandoned two days later near La Joya, N.M., about 50 miles south of old Route 66. The only thing left in the car was his typewriter.

Now, five months after Courtney's disappearance, police have no clues and no reason to suspect foul play.

"People drop out of sight all over the country," El Paso police Lt. John Lanahan said.

But those who know him have their doubts. "I don't believe Dan is alive," girlfriend Sandra Kuhn said from Miami. "He wouldn't have walked off and left everything (on his own free will)."

Courtney, a martial arts expert who served as a demolitions

Courtney, 29, has "simply disappeared off the face of the Earth," said David Schwalm, a professor at the University of Texas at El Paso.

Schwalm, who befriended Courtney last fall, added: "I think he was done in by someone he tried to help."

Courtney was halfway through UTEP's creative writing program when he disappeared. His tuition was paid, he had money in the bank and his apartment was neatly stacked with his papers, police said.

Courtney's case has mystified investigators.

Police checked into a report that two men in a neighboring apartment had threatened to kill him because he curtly ordered them to turn down their stereo. The two men were named as suspects, but subsequently were cleared of any suspicions in the disappearance, Lanahan said.

Testimony in murder trial begins

ODESSA (AP) — A state district judge set today for the beginning of testimony in John C. Skelton's capital murder trial in the 1982 death of an Odessa man killed when a bomb exploded in his pickup truck.

Lawyers questioned 70 prospective jurors during lengthy selection proceedings that finally resulted Wednesday in the seating of a panel.

Attorneys said jury selection took so long because of many potential jurors' attitudes toward the death penalty.

Skelton, 53, is accused in the death of 46-year-old Joe Lee Neal, who had worked as a salesman for Skelton's oil field business from 1979 to 1980.

Investigators said a dynamite bomb apparently was rigged to the ignition system of Neal's truck, which exploded in a shopping center parking lot across from Neal's house after Neal started it.

Skelton has been free on \$150,000 bond since he was arrested on June 10, 1982, after surrendering to Odessa police. Skelton had sold his business and moved to Arkansas.

Neal's widow, Peggy, filed a \$12 million lawsuit against Skelton in April. Police said Neal's 15-year-old daughter, Becky Lyn, narrowly escaped injury when she walked toward the truck just before it blew up.

Lubbock mayor dies

LUBBOCK (AP) — Bill McAlister, 42, mayor of Lubbock and a longtime broadcast and television owner and personality, died of a heart attack late Sunday, a spokesman at Lubbock's Methodist Hospital said early this morning.

Brent Magers, the hospital's vice president of public relations, said McAlister was pronounced dead on arrival at Methodist Hospital at 12:54 a.m.

Life-support measures were applied at the scene and en route to the hospital, and additional measures were applied by physicians at the hospital, but McAlister responded to none of them, Magers added.

"Cause of death was declared as cardiopulmonary arrest," the hospital spokesman said.

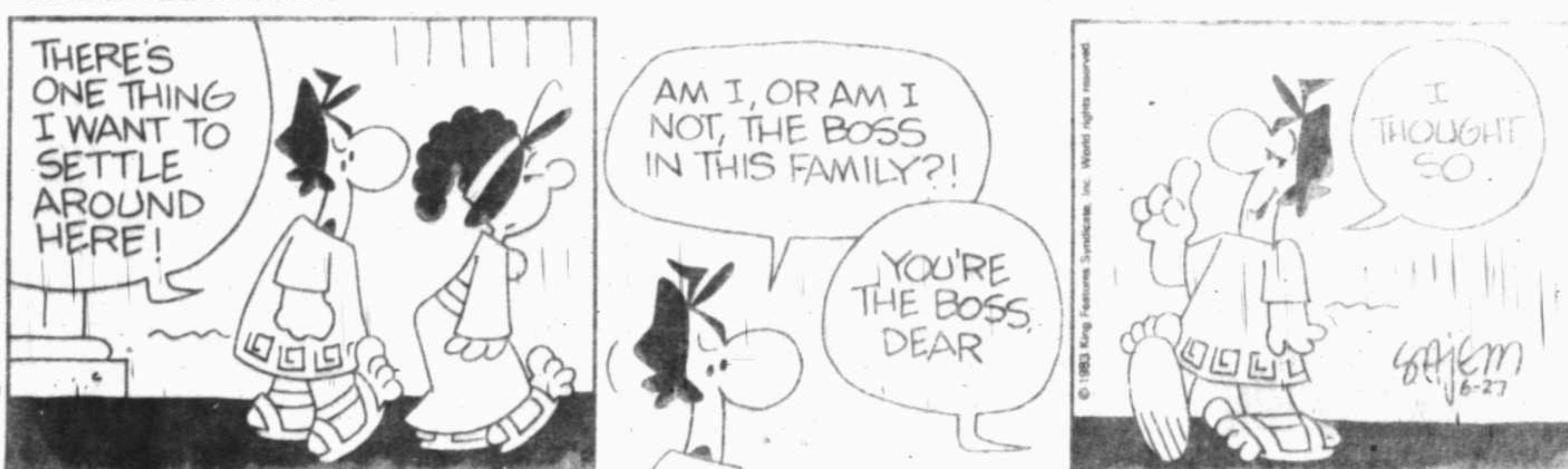

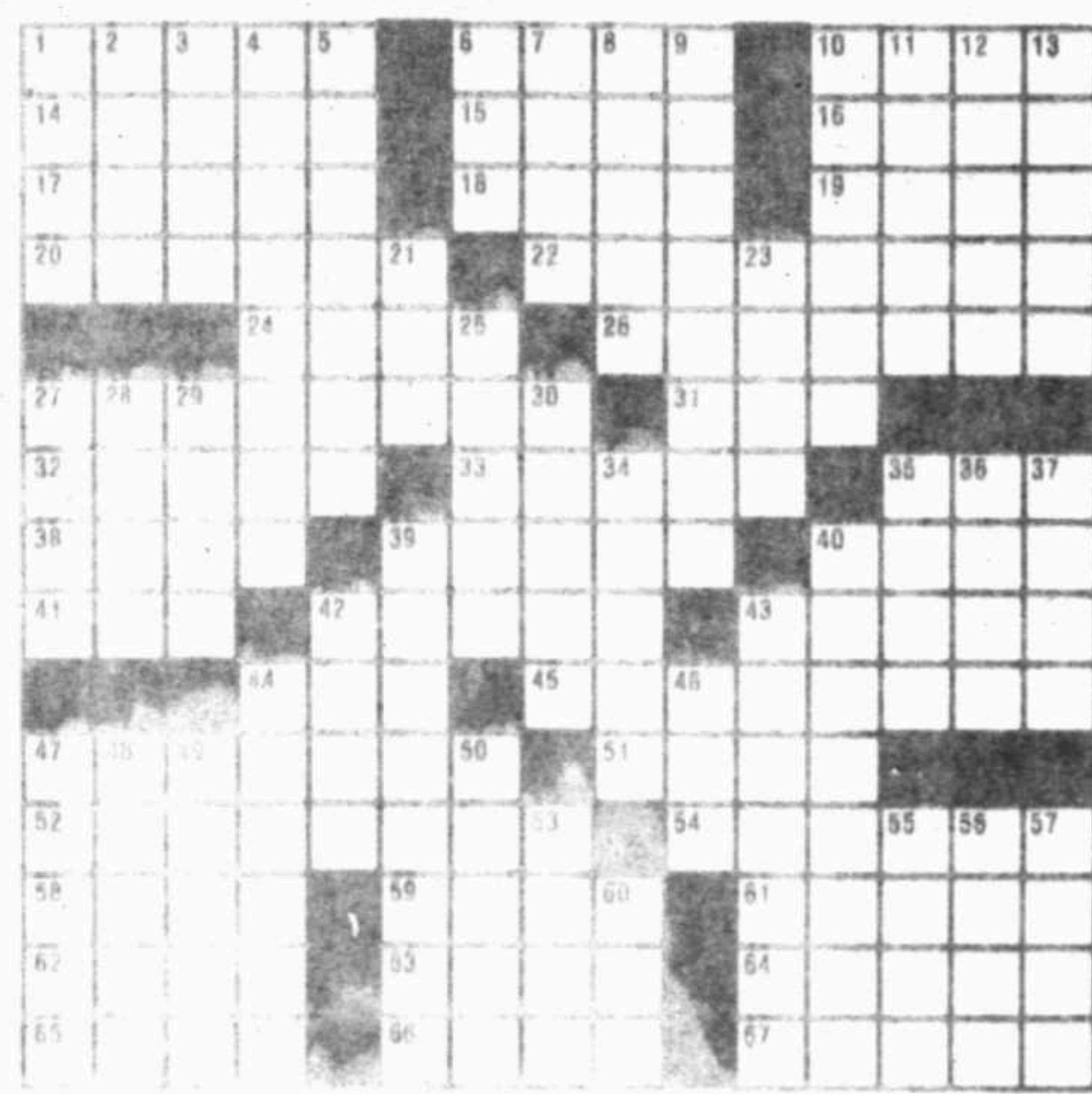

Senate nearing vote on anti-abortion amendment

WASHINGTON (AP) — After years of debate, a proposed constitutional amendment to allow states to ban abortion is headed for a Senate floor showdown, but sponsors concede chances for approval seem slim.

Senators were to debate the measure today, setting up a vote Tuesday. Yet in advance of that vote, opponents of the proposal were already claiming victory.

"We have the votes to defeat the amendment. (Backers) are quite short of the two-thirds margin needed for Senate approval, said Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore.

Packwood characterized the vote as something of a last stand for the anti-abortion movement. However, these groups are divided among themselves on the best way to try to restrict abortions, with some favoring strong, new federal laws instead of the constitutional route favored by Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah.

Despite the early optimism of New Right conservative groups, little social legislation has made it through the Senate in the 2½ years since it went Republican.

"For the first time in the history of this country, we'll have a debate on the merits of abortion," Hatch, the prime sponsor, has said.

Every other time the abortion issue has been before Congress, it has taken the form of an attempted amendment to nonrelated legislation.

Because the Hatch proposal would amend the Constitution, it requires a vote by two-thirds of the Senate — 67 senators if all 100 vote — for approval.

"If we get more than 51 votes, it will be a victory. Hatch isn't fooling himself that we have the votes to pass it," said Hatch aide Paul Smith.

The proposal, if passed by both houses of Congress and ratified by 38 states, would empower states to enact new bans or restrictions on abortions. "A right to abortion is not secured by this Constitution," the amendment would read.

Hatch failed in 1981 and 1982 to win a floor vote on similar proposals. Last April, the Senate Judiciary Committee deadlocked 9-9 on the measure, sending it to the Senate floor without a recommendation.

Although the proposal was expected to be defeated, anti-abortion activists were expected to renew their efforts later in the year with other pieces of legislation.

In other major congressional action, the Senate was expected to take up on Tuesday a bill approved last week by the Democratic House that would limit next month's personal income tax cut to a maximum \$720.

Senate Republican leaders said they had the votes to crush the Democratic move.

Meanwhile, the House was to debate later today a measure to extend daylight-saving time by changing the starting date from the last Sunday of April — where it is now — to the first Sunday of March.

Rep. Richard L. Ottinger, D-N.Y., and other proponents claim that more daylight hours could save energy, reduce crime, and give tennis and softball players additional time in the evening to play outdoors.

Fatal bear attack still puzzles authorities

WEST YELLOWSTONE, Mont. (AP) — Although a large grizzly that killed a Wisconsin man has been put to death, officials still hope to learn why the bear attacked the camper and dragged him screaming from his tent, still in a sleeping bag.

State and federal wildlife officials killed the 600-pound male grizzly Sunday with a lethal injection at a ranger station in the Gallatin National Forest, said information officer Ross MacPherson.

The bear was caught in a leg trap Saturday, about 20 feet from where the partly eaten body of William May, 23, of Sturgeon Bay, Wis., had been discovered.

The bear, identified as the animal that pulled May screaming from his tent at a Hebgen Lake campground early Saturday, was taken to a wildlife laboratory in Bozeman for a routine autopsy.

Officials will be looking for diseased organs, parasites, or anything unusual that might have irritated the huge animal, MacPherson said, adding that it appeared healthy when captured.

May was the first person killed by a bear in the Gallatin National Forest since officials began keeping records there in 1900, MacPherson said. There have been four fatal bear attacks in adjacent Yellowstone National Park, he said.

After being caught in one of

the snares set around the campground, the bear was tranquilized with a dart gun and placed in a cage.

Samples of its droppings were checked for human traces, MacPherson said.

Investigators at the Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks laboratory in Bozeman and the Montana Crime Lab in Missoula verified that the bear had killed May, MacPherson said.

"Both labs found hair in the scat (droppings) collected from the bear," he said. "The hair in the scat matched that of the victim. They also found pieces of human flesh."

May's body was returned Sunday to Wisconsin. His companion, Ted Moore, 32, also of Sturgeon Bay, was questioned by authorities Saturday, but MacPherson said he didn't know Moore's whereabouts Sunday afternoon.

The men were camping at Rainbow Point when the bear attacked. Between 160 and 200 people from that campground and nearby Bakers Point were evacuated after the attack, MacPherson said.

The campgrounds will be closed for several days as officials collect the traps and dead animal bait used to catch the grizzly, and cleanse the area of the bait odor so other bears won't be attracted, he said.

Workers return after strike

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Union employees began filtering back into Wilson Foods Corp. plants across the country today, signaling an end to their three-week strike. But labor spokesmen said they were not finished protesting the company's handling of its contract with them.

"We are going to have to have some time to examine our feelings," said Bob Adams, vice president of the Oklahoma City local of the United Food and Commercial Workers Union. "To say we are pleased with the contract is premature."

Union international vice president Lewie Anderson announced Sunday that striking employees had voted to ratify a proposal by Wilson calling for a reduction in wages. The company had cited excessive union wage scales as the main reason it filed for reorganization under Chapter 11 of the federal bankruptcy code in April.

About 55 percent of those participating in the vote were in favor of the contract, although exact figures were not available.

Union spokesmen said Sunday that although the contract was approved, they had not dropped their request that federal bankruptcy court judges dismiss Wilson's Chapter 11 filing.

The UCFW claims the company misused the code to force the union to accept a lower wage.

A spokesman for Wilson, the nation's largest processor of fresh pork, said from the company's Oklahoma City headquarters that some of the union workers would be back on the job this afternoon, with the others returning in the next few days.

The approval came after officials from the union and the company met five days last week in Washington and Chicago, announcing Friday they had reached tentative agreement on a contract.

Wage terms of the new pact were not disclosed, but officials said it is somewhere between the \$10.69 an hour union workers were paid before Wilson filed for reorganization and the \$6.50 an hour they were paid afterward.

Union members said the figure probably is close to the \$8.20 an hour scale that the union recently granted to the Oscar Mayer Co.

"Tell them it's a bunch of bull," said one striker after voting at the local plant in Oklahoma City. "People had no choice. You have no job, and bills."

Oklahoma City union members voted to ratify the contract, as did UCFW voters at five of the other six Wilson plants affected by the June 4 strike. But some said the approval was given only because the strikers feared they would lose their jobs otherwise.

The company had told union officials the Albert Lea and Cedar Rapids, Iowa, plants would close if the contract offer was rejected by the workers, said Don Nielsen, president of Albert Lea local.

Harlan Johnson, president of union local at Monmouth, Ill., said the proposal "narrowly passed here." Cedar Rapids, Cherokee and Clarinda, Iowa, plant workers also approved the contract.

At Logansport, Ind., Local 280 rejected the contract "almost 2 to 1," said Ted Blevins, the local's financial secretary-treasurer. Blevins declined to reveal how many of the local's 900 members voted.

Nearly 90 percent of the company's work force at the seven plants walked off the job to protest the 40 percent cut in wages and benefits imposed by the company when it repudiated its labor contract.

The new proposal represents "a substantial rollback" from the \$10.69 paid before the Chapter 11 filing, said Jay Foreman, executive assistant to the union's president, from UFCW headquarters in Washington.

Fringe benefits and the basic language of the previous contract would remain intact under the new agreement, he said.

Wilson spokesman David Thompson said the ratification meant workers could be back on the job today's second shift, which begins in the afternoon.

"We'll be returning people to work as soon as we can, of course," he said. "We hope some can be back on the job by the second shift, but if not, then surely we'll have everybody back in the next few days."

Independence movement in key test

ROME (AP) — The outcome of a handful of parliamentary races today could determine whether a mostly German-speaking area in northernmost Italy remains Italian or seeks to become part of Austria at the urging of radical separatists.

The mountainous Alto Adige area surrounding the city of Bolzano — where 66 percent of the inhabitants speak German — was ceded to Italy from Austria by the 1919 Treaty of Saint-Germain.

The two-day general election which ends today pits the locally dominant Suedtiroler Volkspartei (South Tyrol People's Party), which is urging a cautious stand on the separation issue, against more radical break-away groups.

"I am convinced that if there were a referendum, the great majority of people would vote for a separation from Italy," says Volkspartei chief and Bolzano province president Silvius Magnago.

The Volkspartei's stance has caused a heavily publicized split with the Heimatbund (Homeland League), which for the first time ever is fielding its own general election candidates calling for either independence or a reuniting with Austria.

However, the Volkspartei says now is not the time for such a drastic change in the province, where 280,000 residents are native German speakers. Thirty percent of the population in Bolzano province are native Italian speakers.

Italy agreed in 1969 to grant the area extensive autonomy. Parliament approved the autonomy measures in 1971, but details remain under negotiation. Bombings by suspected separatists have occurred as recently as last October.

Magnago calls the Heimatbund move "a declaration of war."

The Heimatbund counts among its members people who were jailed for independence-oriented terrorist acts in the early 1960s. Its candidates, who have the support of other separatist groups, are running under the name Wahlverband (Electoral Union).

Separatist leader Hans Stieler predicts, "It is inevitable that in the long run, 300,000 Germans will be crushed by 60 million Italians."

The Rome newspaper La Repubblica says the controversy could cost the Volkspartei one of its four seats in the Chamber of Deputies and one of its three Senate seats. However, political observers say the separatist movement's main effect could be as a "spoiler," rather than a ballot box voter.

"The June elections have caused a series of local political 'bombs' to explode — situations which had been developing on a low fire," says Milan's newspaper Corriere Della Sera of the separatist movement.

The bilingual question has led to frequent disputes.

In May, for example, the leadership of a major labor federation protested that civil servants were not receiving legally mandated training in whichever was to be their second language.

Habib in Israel, PLO leader meets Assad

New diplomatic efforts are expected within the next few days to resolve both the rebellion splitting the Palestine Liberation Organization and the deadlock preventing a withdrawal of foreign troops from Lebanon.

In Tel Aviv, Israel Radio reported that special U.S. envoy Philip C. Habib has arrived for talks with Israeli leaders on American efforts to persuade Syria to withdraw its troops from Lebanon.

The Jerusalem Post said Habib would meet today with

Prime Minister Menachem Begin and that the two men would discuss Israel's proposals for redeploying its troops in Lebanon.

In Damascus, Syrian sources said the government has invited former Lebanese Prime Minister Saed Salam for an official visit within the next few days, which could be an indication Syria is willing to discuss the U.S.-mediated troop withdrawal agreement between Israel and Lebanon.

Salam is one of Lebanon's most influential Moslem leaders and is closely involved in government policy-making.

Doctors end hunger strike

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — The doctors' union today declared an end to the two-week hunger strike by physicians seeking higher pay, a strike which almost paralyzed hospital services across Israel.

Dr. Ram Yishai, chairman of the Israel Medical Association, said, "the hunger strike is over and we have called on all doctors to resume eating so that they can go back to functioning normally."

Yishai told Israel Radio the strike was halted because the government agreed to neutral binding arbitration of salary demands not yet settled in negotiations.

The fast began two weeks ago and spread day by day to include more than 3,000 of the 4,500 public health doctors employed in hospitals. Many became so weak they were unable to perform regular duties.

But even with the fast ending, the doctors are continuing job actions which have reduced hospital medical crews to 30 percent of normal in some facilities.

Yishai said the medical association's executive committee would meet later today to consider calling a halt to all strike actions.

The developments followed an all-night negotiating session in which the government and the doctors agreed on the terms of reference of the arbitration of their demands. Both sides agreed on the points to be arbitrated by a representative of each side and a neutral mediator.

Several of the public hospitals which had been forced to shut down all but essential services due

to the fast announced they had resumed admitting some patients.

When Dr. Ivor Sober, who initiated the water-only strike, said he would stop his fast, his colleagues at Beersheba's Soroka Hospital greeted his words with applause.

Dr. Ram Yishai, head of the doctors' union, said he hoped the hospitals could resume normal operations by Tuesday morning. But doctors interviewed on Armed Forces Radio said it would be a long time before the public health system could catch up with its massive backlog of work.

Starting in March, the government-paid doctors who administer most of the health care in Israel, worked at only 30 percent capacity. At one point most of them abandoned the hospitals en masse for three days.

During the hunger strike, dozens of physicians in the state-subsidized medical system have collapsed and become patients, and most hospitals were turning away all but the most extreme emergency cases — referring other patients to Arab-run hospitals in the occupied territories.

At Tel Aviv's Ichilov Hospital, the only major facility in the city, half the staff physicians were hospitalized Sunday.

The government has offered raises of nearly 100 percent, raising the pay for starting residents from \$326 to \$624 per month — but those figures include payment for time the doctors consider overtime. The doctors' main argument now is over the length of the work week and the computation of overtime.

world in brief

British vacationers in bus crash

AVALLON, France (AP) — Five British vacationers were killed and 22 were injured when a bus crashed and was struck from behind after the driver fell asleep at the wheel, police said.

Four of the five tourists killed Sunday were members of the same family, according to police. Three of the injured were in serious condition.

A busload of about 40 school children and a car struck the tourists' bus from behind after it veered off the road, then bolted across the highway, but the occupants of those vehicles apparently escaped serious injury.

Police said the bus was carrying the tourists back from Spain to an airport north of Paris when the driver dozed off as they passed the town of Nitry, about 140 miles southeast of the capital.

Teen-ager electrocuted at party

GORING, England (AP) — An 18-year-old girl was electrocuted when she stepped on a fluorescent light while dancing barefoot at an outdoor

disco party, police report.

Some 200 people attending a barbecue and disco Saturday night at a private home on the Thames River watched in horror as Louise McCracken stepped on the light and died. The accident occurred at a private home on the Thames River, about 45 miles west of London.

Delegates condemn U.S.

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — Delegates at an international peace assembly concluded the conference by condemning the United States as chief culprit in the nuclear arms race.

The "World Assembly for Peace and Life Against Nuclear War," which ended Sunday, was attended by over 3,000 people from 135 countries. It was sponsored by the communist-dominated World Peace Council and financed by the Czechoslovak government.

The Czechoslovak state-run CTK news agency quoted U.S. delegate Bruce Kimmel as saying the scheduled deployment of American missiles in Europe "would touch off another round of the arms race and heighten tension in the world."

Panthers pass past Blitz

"It just seemed like everything fell into place," was the way Michigan Panthers rookie quarterback Bobby Hebert summed up his record-breaking performance.

Five of his passes fell neatly into the arms of receivers Anthony Carter, Derek Holloway and Ken Lacy as Hebert set a United States Football League record for touchdown passes in one game and increased his league lead in that department to 26.

Hebert defied the heat in Soldier Field — where the temperatures reached 99 degrees in the stands and zoomed to an estimated 134 degrees on the artificial turf — and blistered the Chicago Blitz secondary with 12 completions in 21 attempts for 247 yards.

His performance before 25,041 fans — 7,100 above the Blitz's average home attendance — led the Panthers to a 34-19 triumph Sunday over their Central Division rivals and pulled them into a tie with Chicago for the division lead.

Each team is 11-6 with one week to go in the regular season. But Michigan would win the division in case of a tie because they won both head-

James scored the winning touchdown on an 18-yard run with 6:28 to play before 9,792 at RFK Stadium. There were 12,160 no shows.

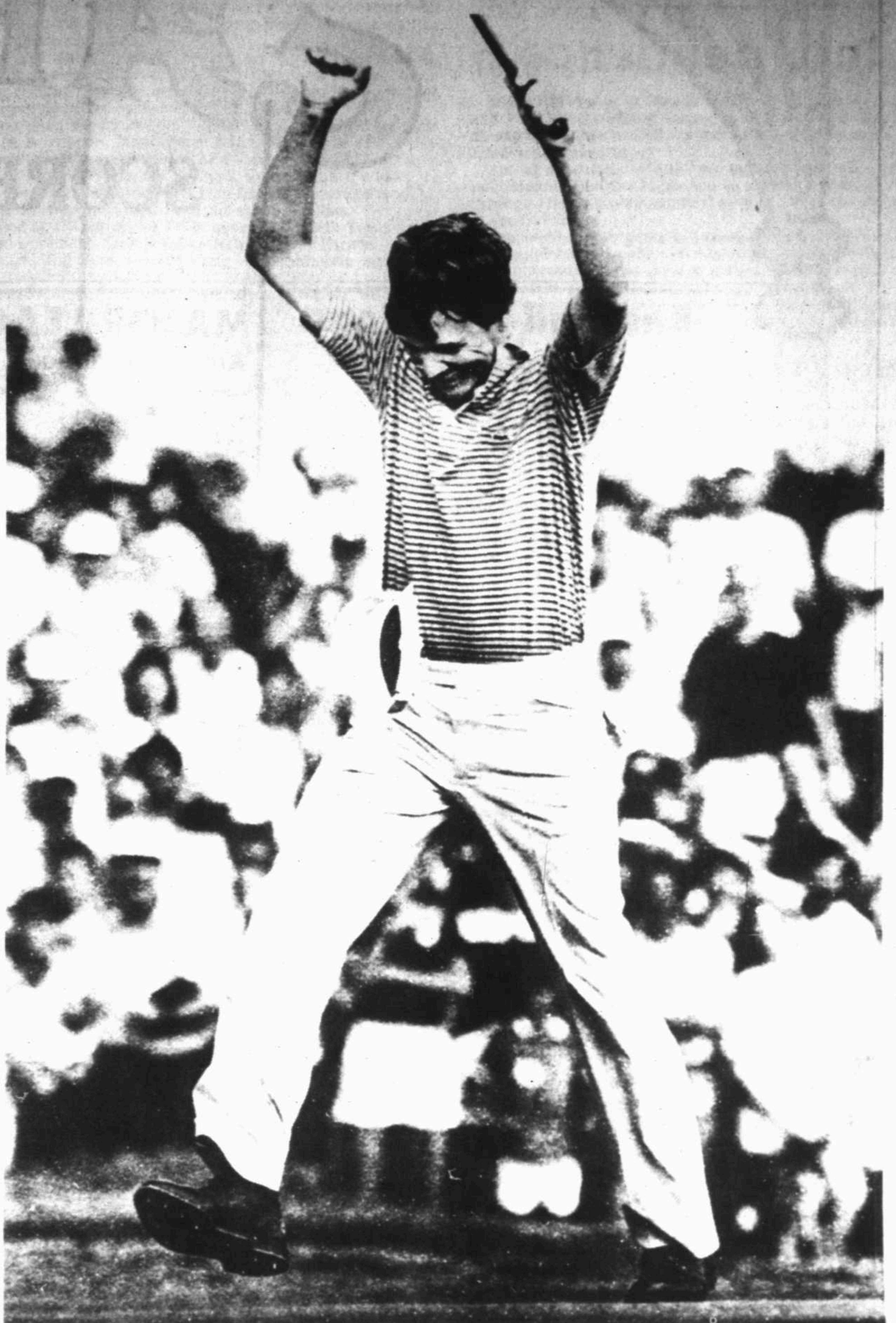

Mize sinks 20-foot birdie to win Memphis Classic

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — Larry Mize ignored the PGA Tour axiom that a young golfer first must suffer the heartbreak of letting one get away before he actually nails victory No. 1.

Given his first opportunity for a Tour triumph — and tied with former Masters champion Fuzzy Zoeller and Chip Beck, a fifth-year tourist — Mize dropped a 20-foot birdie putt on the final hole Sunday and won the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic by one stroke.

"It happened to be the right week," said Mize, 24, a Tour sophomore who was born in Augusta, Ga., — home of the Masters tournament — and whose middle name is Hogan, one of the most honored in the game.

With the victory, he said, "I kind of crossed the line. It's another step forward. It will give me a better mental game, more confidence."

It gave him some other things, too. For one thing, there was the winner's check of \$72,000, more than he'd won previously in his brief career.

"I can use it," he said. "For one thing, we (wife Bonnie) can start

looking for a place to live. We only got married last year and, basically, we've lived on the road. When we weren't on the road, we lived with my parents (in Columbus, Ga.)," he said.

THE TRIUMPH also provided him a place in the World Series of Golf this fall, placed him in next year's Masters, Tournament of Champions and other invitational events, and fulfilled his goals for the season.

"I'd had goal of making the top 60 money winners. Winning was kind of a secondary goal, something I wanted to do if I had a chance," he said.

With \$110,077 for the season, his money-winning aspirations are secured.

Mize won it with a closing round of 70 and a 274 total, 14-under-par on the Colonial Country Club course which twice was swept by play-disrupting thunderstorms during final round play.

Beck and Zoeller, with Mize in the final threesome, and Sammy Rachels tied for second at 275. Rachels had a closing 68. Beck, still

seeking his first victory and now a two-time runnerup this season, shot 71.

"I can live with it. I'll be back," he said.

Zoeller also has two second place finishes to go with his victory in the Heritage Classic. He had a chance to force a playoff but missed an 8-10 foot birdie putt on the final hole.

"Just one of those things," he shrugged after finishing with a round of par 72. "It just wasn't meant to be."

"The putt had two chances: make it or miss it. I missed it. But, how can I complain about second?"

He, along with Beck and Rachels, each collected \$29,867, giving Zoeller a total of \$229,021 and the best money-winning season of his nine-year career.

Hal Sutton was just short in his bid to overtake the absent Lanny Wadkins for the No. 1 money-winning spot. Sutton won \$1,680 on a tie for 38th and now has \$275,108. Wadkins continued to lead at \$275,657.

U.S. Open champion Larry Nelson had a closing 72 and tied for 16th at 281.

Pretenders to Wimbledon throne gone

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — The pretenders to the throne are out of the way, and now pride takes over the grass courts at the Wimbledon Tennis Championships.

"Guys like (John) McEnroe and (Jimmy) Connors have something about them," says New Zealand's Chris Lewis. "Maybe it is pride."

"They feel they cannot lose in any tournament, big or small. That is why they always win."

Connors, the defending champion at the All-England Lawn Tennis and Croquet Club, is the top seed in the men's draw. McEnroe is seeded No. 2.

Entering the second week of play, only 16 men and 16 women are left in the singles. The tournament started with draws of 128 each.

While Connors and McEnroe are expected to meet in the men's final next Sunday, Martina Navratilova is heavily favored to capture the women's singles for the second

straight year and the fourth time in her career on Saturday.

All 32 players remaining in the singles were scheduled to play today.

The men's draw sent Connors against 12th-seeded Kevin Curren of South Africa. No. 16 Tim Mayotte against "lucky loser" John McCurdy of Australia. Nigeria's Nduka Odizor against Lewis. No. 13 Brian Gottfried against Mel Purcell. Roscoe Tanner against Robert Van't Hof. Pat Cash of Australia against No. 3 Ivan Lendl of Czechoslovakia. Mike Leach against Sandy Mayer and No. 14 Bill Scanlon against McEnroe.

IN THE women's singles, it was Navratilova against No. 16 Claudia Kohde of West Germany. South Africa's Jennifer Mundel against No. 8 Hana Mandlikova of Czechoslovakia. Virginia Wade of Britain against West Germany's Eva Pfaff. Romania's Virginia Ruzici against Yvonne Vermaak of South Africa. Lisa Bonder against No. 11 Barbara Pot-

ter, Canada's Carling Bassett against No. 3 Andrea Jaeger. No. 7 Wendy Turnbull of Australia against No. 10 Billie Jean King. And No. 15 Kathy Rinaldi against Kathy Jordan.

"I would give all the titles I have won for a Wimbledon and a U.S. Open title," said Lendl, who in 1982 dominated men's tennis, winning a single-season record \$2 million. "The first thing on my mind is to win a Grand Slam title. It would be a good change for me."

Ranked third in the world on the Atari-ATP computer — and once ranked No. 1 — Lendl lost in his only trip to the final of a Grand Slam event, being beaten by Connors in the U.S. Open last year.

Lendl is in McEnroe's half of the draw, and to win here would have to get by the 1981 Wimbledon champion just to reach the final. There, if form holds up, he would have to face Connors again.

But form hasn't always held up in this 97th Wimbledon. The biggest blow came in the women's singles

when Jordan upset second-seeded Chris Evert Lloyd, a three-time Wimbledon champion.

IT WAS the first time in her career that Lloyd had failed to reach the semi-finals of a Grand Slam event — a career that has seen Lloyd play in 35 Grand Slam tournaments: Wimbledon and the French, U.S. and Australian Opens.

Also gone from the women's field are fifth-seeded Pam Shriver. No. 9 Sylvia Hanika of West Germany. No. 13 Jo Durie of Britain and No. 14 Andrea Temesvari of Hungary.

Upsets have taken even a deeper bite from the men's draw, with No. 4 Guillermo Vilas of Argentina. No. 5 Mats Wilander of Sweden. No. 7 Jose Luis Clerc of Argentina. No. 8 Vitas Gerulaitis. No. 9 Steve Denton. No. 11 Johan Kriek and No. 15 Hank Pfister already on the sidelines.

"In tennis you have one chance, and if you blow it, you blow it," said Bassett, at 15 the youngest player in the singles this year.

Eagle-eyed governor spots pot plants

LOVINGSTON, Va. (AP) — More than 100 marijuana plants growing in backwoods Virginia were discovered by the most unlikely of officials — Gov. Charles S. Robb.

A chance glance led to the arrest of a 37-year-old Charlottesville man who later was charged with manufacturing marijuana, said Nelson County Sheriff William M. Harris.

The sharp-eyed governor was flying by helicopter over the George Washington National Forest in central Virginia on his way to a meeting June 16 when he spotted the pot patch, Harris said. Searchers then found 104, 4-foot-high marijuana plants which by fall would have been worth up to \$600,000 in street sales, he said.

The governor's office confirmed that Robb had spotted the illicit weeds, but an aide said Friday that Robb would not comment because of fears he might prejudice the pending court case.

Sam Handy, 37, was charged with manufacture of marijuana, Harris said.

NEW YORK (AP) — Paul McCartney says he still hasn't got over the death of former songwriting partner John Lennon, and wishes people had understood what he meant when cameras caught his reaction after the December 1980 shooting.

The 41-year-old ex-Beatle said he didn't mean to sound cynical or unfeeling when, after hearing the news of Lennon's death, he chewed gum and muttered to a reporter, "It's a drag, isn't it?"

"There are some people that're just gifted in being able to say all the right things at all the right times," McCartney said in an interview published Sunday in Parade magazine. "I'm no good on that kind of stuff. People expect, because you're a star, that you not have normal reactions, that you know 'the game.' But if I'd had that down that day, I wouldn't like me."

Asked if he had gotten over the loss of his friend and one-time partner, McCartney said, "No. I can't believe it, still. It's a weird one. Still feel as though he's here, you know. But he sort of is, in a way."

MAYPORT, Fla. (AP) — His sea legs perhaps a little less steady than a veteran sailor's, Gov. Bob Graham clambered aboard the USS Florida to become the first governor to ride a Trident nuclear submarine.

Several of the sub's crew of 157 were on hand Sunday to help the governor, wearing an orange life-jacket over his navy blazer, as he climbed from a Navy tug to the deck of the sleek black sub, commissioned June 18.

After making his way to the top of the conning tower, however, Graham appeared to have the confidence of an old salt. He wore a USS Florida baseball cap and waved to reporters and photographers on the tug as the sub cruised out of the Mayport Naval Station into the Atlantic.

But Graham said he didn't expect he would be allowed to pilot the 560-foot submarine during his overnight cruise.

"I don't think they're going to entrust this \$1.4 billion machine into the hands of an amateur — at least I hope not," Graham said.

Shoppers less worried by inflation, survey finds

Today's supermarket shoppers are less worried about inflation than they used to be, but they still say it is harder to make ends meet and they are not letting up on the fight against rising prices.

Those are among the findings of the latest in a series of studies conducted for the Food Marketing Institute, a trade organization, by Louis Harris and Associates Inc.

The studies, which were started in 1974, are designed to measure consumers' attitudes toward the economy in general and the food industry in particular. They also look at the ways people use to save money.

The latest poll, based on telephone interviews with a national sample of 1,001 men and women in January, showed that the public believes unemployment is a much more serious problem today than inflation.

Seventy-three percent of those questioned — almost three people in four — said unemployment was more serious and only 16 percent said inflation was more serious. (The rest of the people said they did not know.) Last year, in a similar survey, 63 percent said unemployment was more serious, while about 25 percent were more worried about inflation.

The Consumer Price Index, the

most commonly used government measure of inflation, showed that prices during the first five months of 1983 rose at an annual rate of only 3 percent — less than last year's 3.9 percent and well below the double-digit boosts of a few years ago.

A substantial minority of the public does not seem to believe that the rate of inflation is declining, but the number of doubters is shrinking. Twenty-eight percent of the people surveyed in the 1983 Harris poll said prices today were rising faster than they were a year ago. In 1982, 45 percent said prices were rising faster than they were a year earlier.

A majority of those questioned — 55 percent — said it is harder to make ends meet now than it was a year ago. Six percent said it was easier and 39 percent said there was no change. In 1982, 60 percent of those questioned said it was harder to make ends meet, 6 percent said it was easier and 34 percent said there was no change.

Consumers generally do not expect their personal financial situation to improve. Almost half — 48 percent — said they thought things would remain about the same; 26 percent looked for an improvement; 23 percent predicted things would get worse; and the rest were not sure.

The people questioned by the

Harris researchers indicated that consumers are continuing to economize in most areas. About seven out of 10 said they stocked up when they found a bargain, used coupons more than they used to, chose store and lower-price brands more often and bought products on special even if they hadn't particularly planned to purchase those items at the time. There was little change from previous years in the number of people making use of the price-saving strategies.

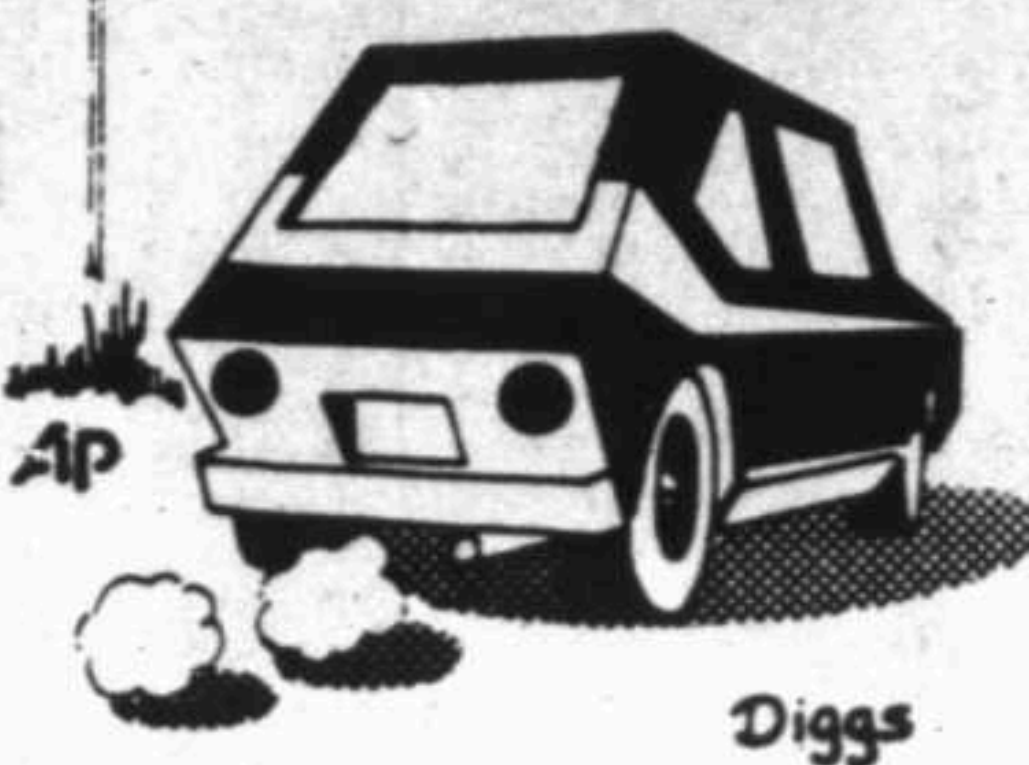
More than half of those surveyed — 52 percent — said they looked in the newspaper for ads for grocery specials almost all the time. An additional 15 percent said they checked the paper fairly often.

The study also looked at shoppers' attitudes toward the products they buy in supermarkets. Among the findings: Sixty-four percent are very concerned and 28 percent are somewhat concerned about the nutritional content of what they eat. The specific concerns most often mentioned were chemical additives, vitamin and mineral content, no preservatives, and sugar and salt content.

Ninety-seven percent of those questioned said they checked the packaging of the food they chose very or somewhat closely to make sure it was in good condition; 91 percent said they checked the date on dated foods.

Back pain may be due to injury, tumor



Dear Dr. Solomon: I have been having a problem with my lower back and my husband insists that I see a doctor. What I would like to know is what a doctor can do when almost everyone I know has some trouble with the back. I have been using a firm mattress and I don't lift anything heavy anymore, and I don't see what else a doctor can tell me about taking care of myself. — Mrs. I.H., Princeton, N.J.

Dear Mrs. H.: I agree with you that low back pain is a very common ailment, but I agree with your husband that you should see a physician. There are a number of causes of back pain and it is important that the specific cause be determined so that appropriate treatment can be prescribed. For example, back pain may be due to an injury to the spine or a tumor or infection, as well as to degeneration of a disc.

I believe you would agree that treatment would not be the same for each of these conditions. Some back pain may respond to applications of heat or the use of painkillers or other medication that relaxes the muscles and relieves inflammation. In other cases, physical therapy and exercise

may be prescribed. But the first step is to determine the cause of the pain.

Dear Dr. Solomon: I run about three miles a day, four times a week, throughout the year. The cold weather actually hurts me when I run, but I can go in 95 degree weather without too much trouble. Yet all I hear is that running in hot weather can be dangerous. What is the danger, and what can be done about it? — Claude, St. Paul, Minn.

Dear Claude: The danger of heat stroke should not be underestimated by anyone who runs long distances in hot weather. Heat stroke can damage the heart, brain, liver and kidneys, and may even result in death. It is most likely to occur on days when the temperature and the humidity are both high, and when there is very little wind, but it may be a factor even when the temperature is in the seventies.

Being in good physical condition is the best way to avoid heat stroke. During the course of a

race, runners should drink fluids, if possible, and pour water over themselves. If heat stroke does occur, says Dr. John F. Rockett of the Baptist Memorial Hospitals in Memphis, the person should be placed in an ice bath or cooled with wet towels that have been dipped in ice water. Salt tablets are of no value in the treatment of heat stroke.

Certain conditions may predispose a person to the development of heat stroke. They include dehydration, obesity, infections and diabetes. Various drugs may also increase the risk.

Belushi's alleged killer fights extradition

TORONTO (AP) — Cathy Evelyn Smith begins a court battle today against extradition to California, where the singer is charged with murder in comedian John Belushi's drug overdose death.

Canadian prosecutors, relying on testimony in written affidavits provided by U.S. authorities, are trying to persuade a York County Court judge to send Ms. Smith to Los Angeles to stand trial.

Her attorney, Brian Greenspan, said he would challenge the prosecution's plan to base its case on the affidavits from California rather than courtroom testimony which would be subject to cross-examination.

If Greenspan's preliminary motion is successful, the extradition hearing would have to be rescheduled to a time when the witnesses could appear in person.

The 35-year-old former backup singer for Gordon Lightfoot and other performers was indicted by a Los Angeles grand jury in March, a year after Belushi was found dead in a Holly-

wood hotel bungalow.

Authorities said Belushi, 33, died from an overdose of cocaine and heroin. Investigators questioned Ms. Smith, believed to have been the last person to see Belushi alive, but allowed her to return to her hometown here.

The case was reopened after Ms. Smith, 35, was quoted in the National Enquirer tabloid as saying she administered a "speed-ball" mixture of heroin and cocaine to Belushi the night he died.

The grand jury indicted her on one charge of second-degree murder and 13 counts of supplying and administering dangerous drugs to Belushi, one of the stars of NBC-TV's Saturday Night Live and such movies as "Animal House" and "The Blues Brothers."

Ms. Smith surrendered to authorities here and has been free on \$75,000 bail.

Even if you haven't been in his gag gift shop, you may have noticed him at a local cafeteria.

He's the guy with the plastic chattering teeth on his tray.

"That's one of my favorite tricks," Chas. W. Dodson Jr. said, placing a folded brown paper sack to represent a tray. A set of yellow paper plates, wrapped in plastic with the price tag showing, was used as a plate.

"We're going to presume this is one of the trays," he said, chuckling as he placed the teeth clacking on the sack, re-enacting a scene he has produced many times.

Moving slowly up the glass counter filled with colorful gag gifts, Dodson played the practiced part perfectly. Eyes darting at imaginary customers, he slid down the counter for his closing line:

"MA'AM, IF YOU don't mind, would you please hurry up? If you don't, my teeth are going to eat my food."

Slapping his knee, he gave a conspiratorial chuckle, "If you ever go back in, they'll know you."

They know him so well, in fact, when a salt and pepper shaker were discovered glued to one table, the manager made an inventory of the dining rooms to find out where Dodson and his wife were seated. It was in another room; therefore, the couple was vindicated — that time.

Stepping over Roamer, the black and white dog ("my executive secretary") sleeping peacefully among the feet of customers, Dodson proudly said, "Roamer got in the paper before I did."

Seems that a couple of years ago, a

stray wandered up to the Dodsons' house-shop on north Midland Drive. When Dodson called the Animal Control Shelter to come pick it up, they asked for a description.

"I said, 'Well, ma'am,' I said, 'the easiest way I can describe the dog is to say he looks like Mayor (Ernest) Angelo.'"

The animal control official laughed and said a truck would be out soon.

According to Dodson, the van arrived about the same time as a photographer from The Midland Reporter-Telegram.

"I thought, 'Oh, my Lord. He has come to take a picture of the dog that looks like Mayor Angelo.'"

BUT IT WASN'T the stray dog that caught the photographer's attention. It was Roamer, who darted out and decided to relieve himself on the tires of the Animal Control truck.

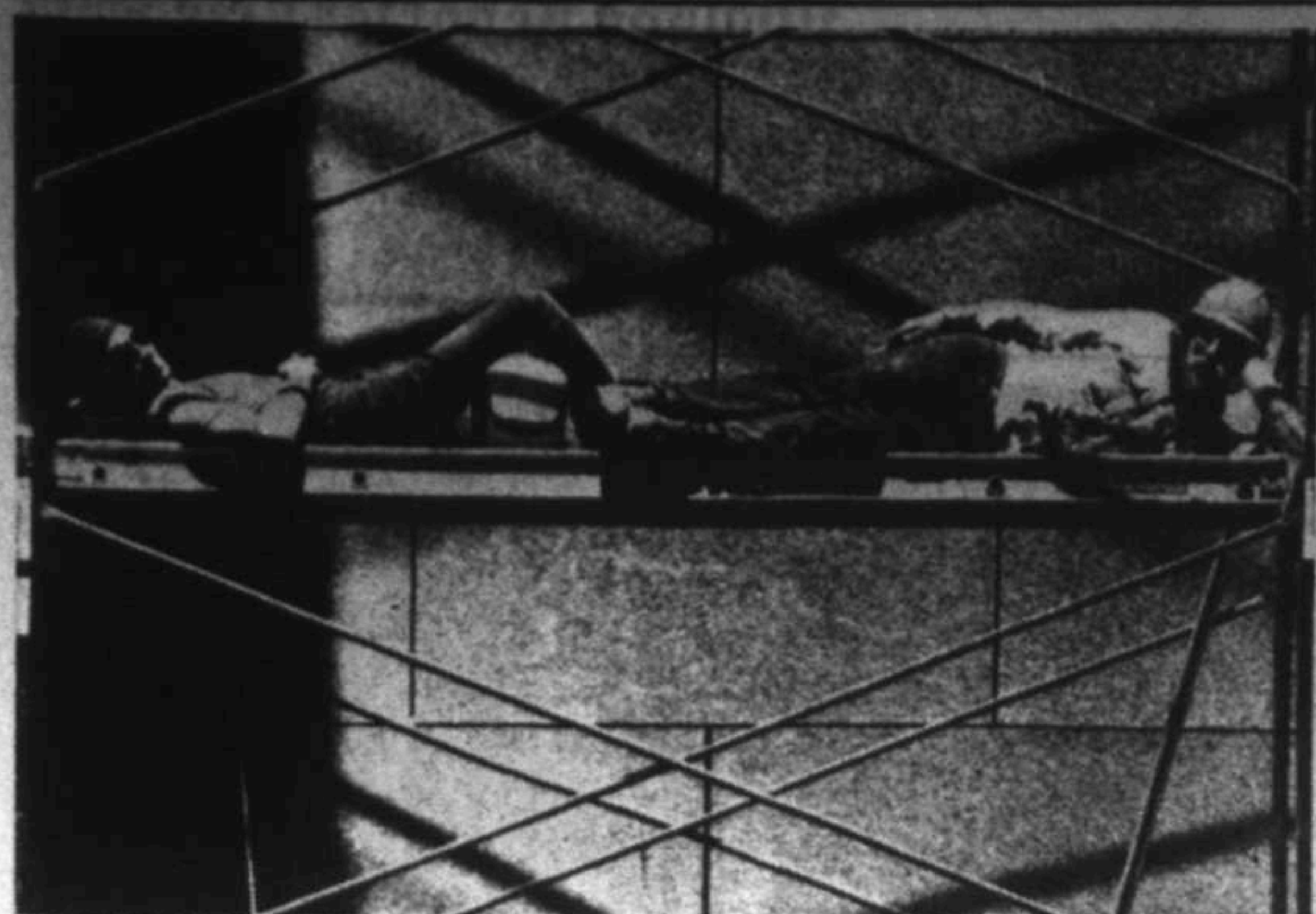
The picture ran.

He opened the gag gift shop "since this was my hobby and the love of my life: magic and trying to pull jokes and laughs and entertain people."

Research shows Texans now accept abortion

DALLAS (AP) — Texas has joined the nation in accepting legalized abortion, according to a research firm which has compiled abortion statistics for the seven years following the U.S. Supreme Court's landmark 1973 decision.

The Alan Guttmacher Institute, a private New York research organization, says that in 1973, when a Texas case became the vehicle for the Supreme Court decision legalizing abortion, Texas was well below the national average in the number of abortions performed.

Statistics showed that in 1973, the national average was 16.3 out of every 1,000 women of child-bearing age having abortions. In Texas, only 6.4 out of 1,000 women had abortions.

In 1980, according to the latest institute statistics, 30.7 Texas women out of 1,000 obtained abortions — slightly above the national average, which was 29.3.

The institute is still compiling the 1981 and 1982 statistics, which come from clinics, hospitals and doctors.

"The anti-abortion movement has peaked," said Dr. Curtis Boyd, who founded the Fairmount Center abortion clinic in 1973. "The right to abortion has been slowly and ardently gained. It's not going to be given up."

But abortion opponents in Texas say they will not give up, either.

"We are dismayed, but we are not throwing in the towel," said Sheila Higgins, the president of the Dallas

The institute statistics show that Texas also had a 50 percent rise in the number of abortion clinics since 1973.

Texas had 83 sources of abortions in 1973, the institute said. In 1980, there were 126.

The institute says there are 18 Texas cities which have no regular sources of abortions: Abilene, Amarillo, Beaumont, Brownsville, Bryan, Galveston, Killeen, Laredo, Longview, Lubbock, McAllen, Midland, Odessa, San Angelo, Sherman, Tyler, Victoria and Waco.

Lubbock and Wichita Falls have clinics which provide abortions when doctors fly in from other cities to perform them, and the Midland-Odessa area has two doctors who perform abortions, though there is no clinic, the institute said.

Emerson Bell, director of the Fairmount Center, said doctors in some areas are afraid to start abortion services because of local attitudes.

"They want someone to test the waters without risking their own medical practice," he said. "Once a clinic gets established, it stays."

He said he tried several years ago to open a clinic in a Central Texas town he would not name.

"First, I couldn't find a real estate agent who would help me. Then I couldn't find a property owner who would lease us space," he said.

He said a family planning counselor who helped him received death threats.

White pledges to meet with group

Governor committed to solving Valley's ills

McALLEN (AP) — Gov. Mark White has promised to meet with members of an interfaith organization within five months to update them on his efforts to improve the quality of life in the Rio Grande Valley.

White made that pledge Sunday before nearly 6,000 delegates of the Valley Interfaith organization.

The delegates packed two rooms of the McAllen Civic Center to hear White's plans to aid the Valley in the areas of jobs, education, health, the environment and community development.

White told the crowd he is committed to solving the Valley's special educational problems, but refused to be pinned down on a specific date for a special legislative session.

He told the crowd he hoped to call the Legislature into special session by Sept. 1 to address teacher pay raises, state financing of public schools and other educational issues.

He said, however, he would not order the Legislature into session until he receives a report from a committee he appointed to study education in Texas.

HE PROMISED delegates, however, that the committee would meet in the Valley to hear local concerns.

"Valley schools are among the poorest and fastest growing in the state of Texas," delegate Amalia

Letra told White.

Brownsville schools, she said, must build one portable classroom each week to keep pace with the student population growth.

The Valley's bilingual and bicultural nature intensifies the area's educational problems because local districts do not have the financial resources to educate illegal aliens and to provide bilingual education, Mrs. Letra said.

She called on White to work toward securing federal impact aid for schools with high enrollments of undocumented aliens and to provide additional money for bilingual education.

Valley Interfaith called for a "total overhaul" of the state's educational financing to provide additional funding to poor areas.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, who attended the convention with White, told the delegates he is "deeply committed to educational reform" and promised to work for them during the special session.

WHITE RESPONDED by saying "Education is number 1."

"We must save ourselves untold miseries by investing our funds and resources in educational quality," he said.

White said the Legislature had set the stage for creation of a regional hospital to provide care for the poor during its last regular session.

The Legislature, he said, changed the name of the Harlingen State Chest Hospital to South Texas Hospital and expanded the state's authority over the hospital.

White said he hoped to secure additional federal funding for the hospital "to fulfill dreams that we have here for a regional hospital."

Delegate Paula Gomez of Brownsville told White that money spent to plant flowers along Texas highways "could be used to save lives."

"No question about that," White said.

White told the crowd he has asked the Texas Department of Highways and Transportation to give priority to road projects in the Valley to create new jobs.

HE SAID HE also is working to improve economic conditions in the Valley by working to bring tourists to the area.

White said he secured a commitment by American Airlines and Southwest Airlines to provide special tourist packages to bring "new tourist dollars" to South Texas.

White said he could not be specific about a job training program for the Valley until after October 1 when federal funding for such programs is made available.

White told delegates he was disappointed the Legislature failed to pass a measure providing Worker Compensation benefits to farm-

workers during the last special session. He promised to raise the issue during the next special session, but said first priority would be given to educational funding.

He promised to give benefits for farmworkers top priority during the next regular legislative session if it is not addressed during the next special session.

On the environment, White promised to go directly to EPA head William Ruckelshaus to address the matter of toxic waste burning in the Gulf of Mexico.

HE SAID HE would "see to it" there is no more burning of polychlorinated biphenyls, known as PCBs, in the gulf.

"I deplore the lack of seriousness" with which the EPA has handled the Vulcanus, an incineration ship that burns toxic chemicals at sea.

It's a "foolish way" to dispose of waste, he said.

Delegates told White the state should consider filing suit against the EPA to stop the burnings.

White's visit fulfilled a campaign promise he made to members of Valley Interfaith, the temporary name for an organization of Valley Catholic and Protestant churches that have united to deal with pressures and concerns of families and neighborhoods.

Texan to buy 'the ould sod'

DALLAS (AP) — When James Delaney joined the Ancient Order of Hibernians four years ago, he began to develop a sense of his heritage and a sensitivity for his ancestral homeland he never had before.

Now, the San Antonio real estate developer has agreed to pay \$60,000 for a 30-acre piece of "the ould sod," a historic Irish battlefield where he wants to build a symbol of peace and unity for the divided nation.

"I'd like to erect a monument or museum on the property someday as a symbol of peaceful reconciliation between the two cultures of Ireland," the millionaire said in a telephone interview.

"I've been notified that my offer has been accepted, but the title hasn't passed to me yet," he said Sunday. "There's a cumbersome legal process that has to be completed, since the land is being sold to a foreign owner."

The plot cost \$60,000 — slightly more than 40,000 pounds, Delaney said.

Delaney is one of six North American directors for the Hibernian order, the oldest and largest Irish Catholic organization in the United States. Membership in that group is what sparked his concern for Ireland.

"My interest and active participation in things like this really began about two years ago, and stem from my membership in the AOH," he said. "We're very cognizant of the situation in Ireland and concerned about doing what we can."

Ireland is split between the Catholic-dominated Irish Republican and mostly Protestant Northern Ireland. Violence still flares between the two factions.

It was at the Battle of the Boyne in 1690 that the Protestant King William of Orange defeated Roman Catholic King James of Scotland. Protestants in Northern Ireland still commemorate the result as a symbolic victory.

Delaney, a devout and practicing Catholic, hopes his ownership of hallowed Protestant ground might help reconcile the two factions.

"I'm fully aware of the history of the site, and dedicated to peaceful reconciliation of the 32-county Ireland," he said.

"I'm also heading up an organization called the Irish-American Unity Conference that will bring together about 400 heads of Irish organizations throughout the country" for a July 16 meeting in Chicago, he said.

Texas has most regional magazines

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas, which supports 43 regional magazines, may have the healthiest magazine publishing climate in the country, according to one publishing consultant attending a publishers' convention here.

"With approximately 14 million residents, Texas has more regional magazines than even the greater New York area (which covers parts of three states) with a population of 12 to 14 million and only five to 10 regional magazines," said Austin publishing consultant Bob Nylen.

In Houston alone, at least eight publications

Local medical personnel know him well.

Pulling a fake swollen finger out of a package, Dodson said he once went in to get a shot and was talking to the nurse who was staring at the grotesque joint.

"I said, 'Ma'am, I came in to get my booster cold shot.' She looked at me and said, 'You're going to get your shot, but you're going to lose that finger.'"

"I said, 'No ma'am, I won't lose it. I'll just put it in my pocket.' He pulled off the finger and placed it in his pocket. Then I said, 'May I have my booster cold shot, please?'"

"She said, 'Sure, where do you want it?'" he laughed as he imitated her looking at his backside pointedly.

"I said, 'No, here,'" he said, raising his sleeve.

But, according to Dodson, one nurse told him, "As many times as you've come in, you've always made everyone else feel good — even though you've been sick."

AND AT LEAST one doctor always seems to move them into the examining room as soon as they walk in the office, regardless of the number of patients waiting before them.

"Either he likes us or, two, he wanted to hurry up and get us out before we pulled something," Dodson said.

"Don't look at me," Gwen said over her shoulder. "This is his crazy store. I just work here."

"Have you met my half-sister?" he abruptly asked, pulling out a paper sack with inflatable legs sticking out of it. Uncontrollable laughter surfaced from the bottom of the sack.

"She's always good to take to parties 'cause she's such a kick," he said, chuckling along with the laugh box.

"See what I mean about crazy," Gwen said under her breath, quickly glancing up from the register. "It's a different world every day."

"This laugh stuff — I grew up with it," Dodson said. "In fact, when the first original old Schaeffer Hotel was built here I remember my daddy doing a magic show. That was when

the whole town would come out because there was nothing else to do.

"I assisted him back in those early days — must've been in the years of 1928 and 1929. The only thing was my love was more of the Cadillac version. He liked small parlor-type tricks but I had the fortune to see Willard the Wizard."

Apparently Willard had a traveling tent show and could do up to six full evenings of magic without duplicating a trick.

THOUGHTS OF BEING a traveling magician were strong, Dodson said. "The only thing is if you want to be a professional magician, you have to travel. And that's one thing I don't like is the gypsy life of travel."

A guy from Chicago heard about Dodson's magical tricks and offered him a job, he said. Three hundred dollars to perform five days a week for six weeks.

"In 1968, that was big money — no Saturdays or Sundays and all expenses paid," Dodson mused. "But I told him, 'Well, the reason I turned you down was, you know and I know, you rascal, there'd be some of those nights I'd never get to crawl into bed because we'd be traveling. And the next day, we'd be going back within 50 miles of where we were the night before.'"

"He told me I knew show business." "I never did like going to work," Dodson said. "The best way is to put a business and a home together — except it makes it a 25-hour day. But they are pleasurable hours. There's nothing more enjoyable than making people laugh. Our business is for jobs and laughs."

The daily ritual of laughter follows another routine at the Dodsons'. Every morning, Dodson said he reads a passage written by Charles Kingsley: "Thank God every morning when you get up that you have something to do that must be done whether you like it or not. Being forced to work and do your best will breed in you temperance, self control, diligence, strength of will, content and a hundred other virtues which the idle will never know."

They may, however, have heard some of his jokes.
