"State of emergency" expires for reducing Texas traffic. Gov. Preston Smith warned that some 700 safety-related persons who answered to attend a public conference to discuss the problem and how to solve it.

Result is a new statewide emergency plan. It got underway immediately and is focusing efforts on the holiday period.

Thanksgiving, Christmas, New Year's. These are the times when accident frequency is usually high.

Smith reminded the conference of community leaders that Texas is a day die in automobile accidents. Figures provided by the Texas Safety Association reveal that last month the loss - dollarwise - amounted to \$77 million. Crash - Texas urban areas account \$80 million of this figure.

Speed limits, abolishing the old merit-rating insurance plan which called for higher premiums on high-risk drivers and a 1965 law which judges to prohibit misdemeanor sentences including driving offenses were blamed for climbing death rate.

Whatever the cause, 3,841 last year, 217,000 were killed and \$875 million in economic losses chalked up. Department of Public Safety statistics indicate 3,700 will die this year unless holiday safety campaigns are a remarkable success.

The grim reality, said Smith, is that one out of every four motor vehicles registered in Texas was involved in an accident in 1968. The certainty of Texas losing their lives the highways of our state and every day is more tragic. It constitutes a crisis that, in my view, is a state of emergency.

ALLOWABLE ROCKETED - state oil production allowances to near record 62.7 percent of potential for December under a Railroad Commission order.

December figure is highest under present formulas except for last June's 63.5 percent. It will authorize a maximum 3,770,319 - barrel daily production. This is 472,061 more than November which was limited to 3,300,258 barrels.

Estimated daily production during December is expected to average out at 3,194,479. One of 14 major crude oil producers asked for an allowance increase. Eight asked reduction.

THE INVESTMENTS - moving more heavily into equity instead of debt investments, the Texas State Board of Education has decided to put 70 percent of its income into equity investments. It may increase that to 70 percent if it can get more in the stock market by November and December.

and took this action after advice from the Chase National Bank, the board's financial advisors, suggested heavy investments in common stock. Voters of Texas have approved the constitutional limit that the fund's money must be 10 percent into municipal government bonds.

Education buys from \$10 million to \$5 million worth of bonds. It put the \$4.1 million out from cash bonuses on gas and oil leases on Nov. 4 into U.S. treasury bills. It was timed so as to fill in gaps in the year ahead and average buying to about \$10 million.

COURTS SPEAK - state Supreme Court in a majority decision held that 22-year-old Army Sgt. Albert Wharton III is sole owner of 144 million oil-ranching estate of Electra Waggoner (for the Town of Electra was sold).

Court set arguments for November 17 in a case which will determine if private clubs can hire agents to lobby for "locker system" law. Four months ago the Court of Civil Appeals set aside the State Liquor Board's such a prohibition.

168,000 Veterans Widows Are Due Bigger Checks

Bigger checks for approximately 168,000 widows are due in January, Donald E. Johnson, Administrator of Veterans Affairs, announced today.

Signed by the President on October 27, 1969, a new law (PL 91-96) authorizes increases for most widows of servicemen and veterans who are eligible for dependency and indemnity compensation.

These payments, Johnson explained, are authorized for widows of servicemen and veterans who died after January 1, 1957, of service-connected causes.

The new legislation does not affect payments to survivors receiving compensation under laws that preceded the program.

New dependency and indemnity compensation rates provide \$167 monthly for the widow of the lowest ranking enlisted men compared to a minimum of \$135 at present. Similar increases are provided for eligible widows of other enlisted men and officers.

Effective December 1, the increase will show up first in checks received in January. This increase is automatic and no application is needed.

Widows with minor children will get an extra \$20 per month per child under the legislation. With few exceptions, they get nothing extra now. Forms for making application for children's allowances will be mailed to all widows automatically, Johnson said.

Recipients who are patients in nursing homes, or who are helpless or blind to the point that they need regular aid and attendance of another person, may receive an extra \$50 per month under the law.

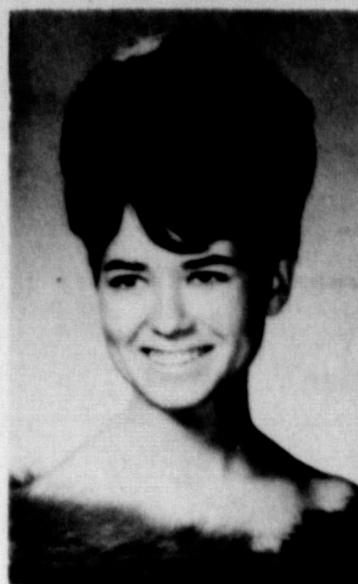


LOOKIN' BACK

PUBLIC NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 145
 AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING
 THE BURNING OF TRASH OR
 WASTE WITHIN A DESIGNAT-
 ED BUSINESS DISTRICT OF THE
 CITY OF MCLEAN, TEXAS;
 PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR
 VIOLATION; AND DECLARING
 AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY
 COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF
 MCLEAN, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. It shall hereaf-
 ter be unlawful for any person
 to burn any trash, waste or rub-
 bish within Blocks 24, 25, 36
 and 37 of the Original Town of
 McLean, Texas, hereinafter
 designated "business district,"
 or to start or to maintain fires
 of any character within such
 business district as herein de-
 fined or as may hereafter be en-
 larged or changed by any ordi-
 nances which may hereinafter
 be enacted. It is not intended
 hereby to prohibit the burning
 of trash or rubbish or waste in
 any stove or furnace within any
 building provided with proper
 flues or chimneys; but all fires
 are prohibited within said busi-
 ness district, save and except
 in stoves or furnaces within
 buildings.

SECTION 2. ANY person vi-
 olating any of the provisions of
 this ordinance shall, upon con-
 viction, be punished by a fine
 of not less than \$1.00 nor more
 than \$50.00.

SECTION 3. The fact that
 open fires are dangerous to sur-
 rounding buildings and there are
 no regulations in the City of Mc-
 Lean prohibiting or regulating
 such fires, creates and is hereby
 declared to be an emergency
 necessitating the suspension of
 the rule requiring ordinances to
 be read at two meetings before

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the election will be held in and throughout the City of McLean, Texas on the 29th day of December, 1969, on the question of the adoption of a One Percent (1%) Local Sales and Use Tax within said City in keeping with the following ordinances adopted by the City Council of said City as follows, to-wit:

ORDINANCE NO. 146 AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF MCLEAN, TEXAS, ON THE QUESTION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PER CENT (1%) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE CITY; THE DAY OF THE ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACE; APPOINTMENT OF OFFICIALS HEREOF; PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS SHALL BE QUALIFIED TO VOTE; PRESCRIBING FORM OF BALLOT; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF ELECTION; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO SAID ELECTION.

WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorized the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas with such city, town or village, Now, Therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MCLEAN, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of McLean, Texas, on the 29th day of December, 1969, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City of McLean, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

SECTION 2. That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said City of McLean, and the polling place and presiding officer for said election shall be, to-wit:

City Commission Room City Hall, City of McLean
E. L. Cubine, Presiding Judge
S. A. Cousins, Alternate Judge

The presiding judge at such election shall appoint three (3) clerks.

SECTION 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of McLean, Texas, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2. Subsection G, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

() FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

() AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

SECTION 5. That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

An integrated circuit containing 20 or more tiny transistors and scores of other electronic components takes less space than one conventional transistor.

And because the mini-circuit performs better, is more reliable and costs less than conventional electronic parts, more sophisticated telephone systems can be designed.

"The tiny size of these miniature solid state circuits gives telephone designers greater freedom in determining the size, weight and shape of new telephones," said George Newbury, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. "For example, the new circuit is used in the Trimline phone and the 'electronic' telephone proposed for the 1970's."

The said designing the outside of a telephone to fit bulky internal parts is no longer necessary. Thus greater emphasis can be placed on the appearance, convenience, comfort and proper use of telephones -- and telephone systems -- in the future.
