Violations Of Traffic Laws Subside A Bit

Patrolmen To Continue Checking For Licenses

Traffic violations in Post and surrounding areas have dropped off noticeably since state highway patrolmen and county law enforcement officers started a campaign of vigilance, ticket giving and routine checking about 10 days ago.

Although only a few tickets were given last week for minor traffic offenses, Sheriff Nathan Mears and Deputy Sheriff Fay Claborn will continue to cooperate with the highway patrolmen. The county officers are on the alert particularly for local traffic violations in an effort to prevent accidents.

Highway patrolmen are each assigned to check 10 drivers licenses a day, record their numbers and send them to the State Highway Department as evidence of their alertness. Last week, almost everyone stopped in this county produced a license, Sheriff Claborn quoted a patrolman as saying.

Storm Damage Comparatively Slight In Post

Garza County folk were more frightened than harmed during the severe wind and electrical storm Tuesday night. Although Lubbock and much of the South Plains area suffered damages to property and disruption of communications, the effects were comparatively slight in Post.

Electricity service here was either "on the blink" or off entirely for several hours because of difficulties in Lubbock. No repairs were necessary by local Southwestern Public Service crewmen as a result of the storm, Ted Hibbs said.

The fire alarm sounded at the height of the storm, causing added excitement for persons already frightened by the electrical display. Firemen found no fire, only a family afraid that the blinking lights would result in a conflagration.

Corroated iron roofing was blown off some of the O. L. Wilkinson Lumber Company sheds, but were easily replaced yesterday. Several other small damages to outhouses, fences, shutters, etc., were reported.

Some trees about town took the worst beating.

Mrs. J. H. Ramsey Is Symbolic Of Sweet And Lovable Mothers

Mother to many people symbolizes the Westward Ho movement which settled this part of the United States a few generations ago.

She is the young, refined, courageous woman who, as a girl bride, traveled across these canyons, through these mesquites with small babies, in a covered wagon. She is a woman with stamina who grew up with her boy husband and children, battling elements of weather, wild life and no conveniences, yet retaining her beauty, culture, sense of humor and ambition.

Now, several generations later she is the Grand Dame of a large, respectable family. Her children and grandchildren are making a progressive, prosperous empire out of this one-time frontier. The county has a generous share of Mothers like this.

The Dispatch staff picked a Mother at random as a symbol of the Mothers who made Post what it is today. It was Mrs. J. H. Ramsey, who is pictured here with her four daughters and one of eight grandchildren.

Born in Arkansas in July, 1868, daughter of a doctor in the Confederate Cavalry, she grew up in Texas as Corra Mangum; having migrated by ox wagon with her family to Hood County when she was six months old, and to Eastland County by the time she was 8 years of age.

Educated at Sam Houston State Normal at Huntsville, she taught school in Eastland County where people today still remember the beautiful black-haired, grey-eyed Corra Mangum as "the belle of Eastland County" who married an equally handsome, fine young man named John H. Ramsey, in 1890.

At home on their farm in Comanche County, the Ramseys absorbed the buffalo hunters' stories of adventure in West Texas, finally started out with their six-month old baby, Winnie, and two older children, Bess and Loss, in a covered wagon.

Traveling through snow and freezing weather, they made it eventually to Throckmorton, where Mr. Ramsey took a job as foreman on the Jom Ranch. All

ranch Mothers of Mrs. Ramsey's age, know of the hardships, the privations, the many long miles that one had to walk or ride horseback in quest of a doctor, of the lack of schools and the loneliness.

Mrs. Ramsey, like many another Mother, taught her own children, including singing and physical education in the curriculum. Without knowing how to swim herself, she made water wings for each of her children and directed them from the banks of the swimming hole until each child had learned to swim.

The Ramseys kept migrating westward, until they reached Garza County in 1917. Every place they lived, they started a flower garden and hunted up a Christian Church with which to work. They made lasting friends, made their own entertainment and made the dolls and doll clothes and other toys that their children enjoyed. There was always laughter and singing in their household.

The years in Garza County have brought, along with much happiness, the usual run of grief—Mr. Ramsey's death in 1930, the death of Bess' husband, Dr. E. L. Thompson.

FIFTH YEAR OF PROGRAM BEGINS—

Nine Boys To Receive Foundation Hogs

The Sears Roebuck Educational Foundation, which is sponsoring a 4-H Club Hog Program in this area for the fifth consecutive year, will distribute eight registered Poland China gilts and one registered boar to nine Garza County boys who have won an essay contest on "The Value of Producing Hogs As A Source of Cash Income On The Farm." The following boys will receive the hogs May 24:

Carter Gene White of Garnolia who will receive a boar and Donald Ray Ford of Barnum Springs, Billy Cooper, Jimmy Puckett and Bennie Wilks of the Star Route, Wrenford Craig of Garnolia, H. C. Gribble of Garnolia, Jack Carpenter of Garnolia and J. E. Thomas of Close City, who will receive gilts.

County Agent Directs

The nine winners were picked from 12 Garza County contestants on the basis of 40 per cent on essays entered and 60 per cent on their facilities and abilities to complete the demonstration, Garza County Agricultural Agent D. F. Eaton said.

The boys will care for, feed and breed the hogs under the direction and supervision of the county agent. Carter Gene White will be required to breed his boar, free of charge, to the gilts for their first litters.

The boys with the gilts will be required to return either \$15 dollars or the choicest gilt with certificate of registration from the first litter for distribution to nine other boys next year.

The boys receiving the hogs

each year will begin a two-year program in which they are eligible for prizes. From the first litter, each boy will feed out three market hogs for competition with each other in the fall show of 1948.

The eight gilts received this month will be shown at the 4-H Club Show this fall in competition for prizes. The gilt winning first place in the fall show and the boar will go to the district show in Lubbock to compete with Sears Roebuck Foundation boars and county winning gilts from 11 other counties.

Each first litter will be weighed on the 56th day of age, and a prize will be awarded for the heaviest litter.

All prizes will be in the form of purchase orders for materials to further the boys' swine projects.

Stampede Gets Three Sponsor Contest Prizes

The Post Stampede and Rodeo Association has received the three prizes for the Cowgirl Sponsor Contest which is to be a feature of "The Fastest Show in the West" June 11-14 inclusive, in the new rodeo plant, one mile north of Post.

The first prize is a hand-tooled saddle, with "Post Stampede, 1947" tooled on either side. The second prize is a pair of hand-made boots, and the third prize is a pair of silver spurs. The items were made by Leddy's of Fort Worth.

The prizes will be exhibited in the window of the Post Chamber of Commerce office from next week until after the rodeo, Sherrill Boyd, chamber of commerce secretary, said yesterday.

TEXAS BUTANE DEALERS ASSOCIATION TO BEGIN NIGHT SAFETY SCHOOLS

Oscar Garner, local butane and propane dealer, announced this week that the Texas Butane Dealers Association has begun fulfilling plans for a safety training school for dealers throughout the state and that the association is one of the finest in the nation to promote such a program for safety and safe practices in the industry.

The program is designed to train butane company employees in better and safer installation and servicing of appliances using gas for fuel.

The University of Texas in Austin has accepted a \$2000 grant from the association with which to operate safety training schools. The courses will cover approximately 10 hours, and employees completing the training school satisfactorily will be awarded a certificate of proficiency.

FIRE OF UNDETERMINED ORIGIN DESTROYS GIN

The building and all the machinery, everything but the scales, belonging to the Sweetwater Cotton Oil Company Gin in south Post were destroyed by fire of undetermined origin last Saturday morning, beginning at 5:30 o'clock.

Although the conflagration was brought under control shortly after the prompt arrival of the fire department, the debris smoldered for several days.

The Post Volunteer Fire Department answered another call Sunday afternoon to the home of O. G. Hamilton where strong winds popping electric current wires together in the back yard were causing sparks to fly. The damaged wires were repaired by electricity repairmen.

LOWEST APRIL COTTON BALANCE SINCE 1930 SEEN ON U. S. BOOKS

The United States cotton balance sheet shows an April 1 balance of 7,062,000 running bales on hand, the lowest April 1 balance since the 1929-30 season, according to The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Balance on hand at the same time during the 1945-46 season totaled 12,197,000 running bales. The August 1 carryover stands at 7,522,000 running bales this season compared to the 11,164,000 carryover at the same time last year.

According to Dr. A. B. Cox, professor of cotton marketing in the College of Business Administration, "the 1946-47 cotton year has been a hectic one to date and promises to continue so until the end. Notwithstanding the wide fluctuations in prices, the fundamental behavior of the market as a whole has been normal for the type of strongly inverted market (a market in which current prices are higher than for delivery in distant months)."

"The peaks of both cotton prices and rate of consumption for the crop year 1946-47 have probably passed," Dr. Cox continued. "The peak of cotton prices resulting from the short crop came the latter half of October. The peak of mill consumption due to the very strong demand for cotton goods came in January. Speculation carried prices higher than

Half of Child Accidents Take Place At Home

Each year, almost 20,000 boys and girls under 20 years of age die in the United States as a re-sult of accidents.

This sad fact was brought to light by Mrs. Eloise T. Johnson, family life education specialist of the Texas A and M College Exten-sion Service, and passed on to the people of Garza County by Miss Jewell Hipp, county home demon-stration agent, in an effort to make parents realize that some-thing must be done about it.

One half of these 20,000 fatal accidents take place in the home, and most of them could be avoid-ed.

Here are the principal causes of child accidents in the home: Burns, most of which are kitchen accidents; falls, due mostly to in-fants left unattended; poisoning, from eating household poisons or overdoses of medicines; wounds, often from knives, scissors and other dangerous articles left with-in reach of children; internal in-juries, caused to great extent from swallowing "toy parts" or lollipop sticks; injuries from fore-ign bodies, such as pins that the child swallows or sticks into eyes or ears; electric shock, from play-ing around electric outlets and fixtures; suffocation, particularly among infants that have be-come entangled in loose bed cloth-es; drowning, in the "old swim-ming hole" and even in the bath-tub; and gunshot wounds, due to firearms left within reach of the child.

Miss Hipp offers the following points as good methods of pre-venting these accidents: Protect the child by making his environ-ment free of accident hazards. And, of course, he must be re-strained in many cases; there are certain dangerous activities in which he simply should not en-gage. Also, provide the child with a chance to develop himself, to learn things by doing. And condi-tion him by training; teach him

"Hollywood products have such hard sledding in Eastern Europe that Eric Johnston has gone over there to see about it. The boy-meets-girl film, it seems, has no friends at all behind the Iron Curtain, except, of course, among the movie audiences. The only party it glorifies is the petting party, and the only state it advocates is the state of matrimony. How can you keep your populace in the Lenin line when you feed their minds with capitalistic-individual propaganda like that? American pictures are plain lies, anyway. They show the inhabitants of this crumbling country driving luxurious Fords and Crosleys, skylarking in sumptuous swimming pools and having good times all over the place, when, as every true Communist knows, half of the people here are living in roadside ditches and the other half are machine-gunning them."—From the New York Times magazine section.

The State Department's Office of International Information and Cultural Affairs, with which I served some time in the Balkans, was set up to combat propaganda like the above.

isolationists in a starving and angry world.

On the other hand, it is only fair to say that we run some risk in leaving our present position. If we leave, we must go either East or West. Which direction is the best to take no one knows. One road can lead to War, while the other can lead to Peace; one road can hasten the Great Depression, while the other can postpone it; one road may lead to stagnation, while the other to a religious awakening. But I repeat that today no one can see where either East or West will lead us.

Policing The Seas

As isolationists—we could enjoy a few more years of good business whatever we do. Embarking, however, on some big world pro-

gram would postpone depression, unemployment and communistic uprisings. It is even possible that the thought of world power with its promises of "prizes for all" could electrify America and bring about a temporary boom exceeding anything this country has ever witnessed.

"Policing the Seas" need not be an expensive affair, nor require many men if we will stick to the English method. We already have navy and airforce sufficient to police every port of the world. If we will be content to police the ports, we will merely use the policy which the British followed for 100 years most successfully. With modern bombs this should be easier and less expensive than was the British experience.

What About U. N.?

The United States should make clear from the first that we are only "pinch hitting" for the United Nations. We would agree to drop out of the picture as soon as the U. N. is organized to do the work. We could even ask the U. N. to make a contribution to our U. S. expenses. Russia might "jump the gun" and sweep down and take the Dardanelles; but Russia could not hold the Straits.

Instead of this new U. S. policy "killing the U. N." as some forecast, it might speed up the U. N. and make it function. Mr. Truman's policy may be the making of the United Nations. Again I say that only the future can tell; but we cannot continue with mere talk, as at present, even though

both the American and Russian ideologies are in the test tube and laboratory stages.

It will take much self-control for us to be content to "rule the groups within our own country waves." Both foreign nations and groups within our own country will constantly urge us to send an army into certain countries. This could be our downfall. We should be content to let nations indulge in some civil wars and learn for themselves the evils of bad government.

Telling nations Communism is a bad doctrine and will end in disaster will do little good. Most people appear to need to try things for themselves and learn the truth by bitter experience. I hate to see Russia take over any

more nations. So long, however, we protect the ports, their ships and broadcasting stations and prevent the killing or deportation of liberals; it may be better to end to let civil war rage now, sides, Russia will someday lapse through internal revolution or economic errors.

In view of the above, I am utterly convinced that the investment policy today is as follows: Have about 50 per cent one's assets in good common stocks which would fit in case our nation were the right road. (Avoid companies with all assets in big cities, have about 50 per cent in government bonds as a hedge case our nation should take wrong road.

year, my department was closed and I left several thousand dollars worth of perishable chemicals, paper, film and other photographic materials to rot in a locked stockroom. There was no point, according to my boss, in shipping it to another outpost because all outposts were loaded down with these priority materials, and we were not allowed to sell or trade them to the Greeks and there was no provision for shipping them back home.

My photographic operation could have been carried on just as well with a tenth or less of the perishable materials that were assigned to me. I can apply this same comparison to many other phases of our work.

I'm for slashing the budget, and I believe the Senate could do wonders along this line by just cutting out the gold-bricks among the government employees and eliminating the throwing of funds to the winds.

If they accomplish nothing else in the eyes of the people we purport to impress abroad, economically-operated OIC outposts would eliminate the flaunting of our extravagance and waste in the face of a broke and hungry Old World.

A citizen in Bennet Springs, Mo., wrote a letter to a Government official in Washington requesting forms for bidding on the sale of "Government surplus funds."

Judge Bowen Is Named Advisor To Foundation

County Judge J. Lee Bowen has accepted appointment as a member of the Advisory Council of the Southwestern Medical Foundation, which is being organized in the Southwest to advise and aid the Foundation in better serving the five states of the area.

Judge Bowen said that a strong beginning has been made in medical education and scientific research in Dallas through efforts of the Foundation.

The founding of a Class A medical college three years ago has aroused the enthusiasm and gained the generous support of the citizens of the area. Over \$3,500,000 was given for the construction of permanent buildings and for the operation of the college.

Karl Hohlitzelle, through the Hohlitzelle Foundation, in memory of his wife, has given 62 acres of ground adjoining 43 acres owned by the City-County Hospital System in Dallas. On this acreage will be constructed the new City-County Memorial Hospital and the Southwestern Medical College.

President Truman recently authorized the purchase of 24 acres of this property on which to construct a 500 bed veterans hospital. The planning of these projects is now in the hand of architects and the buildings will be constructed as quickly as material is available.

In addition to Judge Bowen's membership in the Advisory Council will be a medical advisory member from Garza County who is yet to be appointed. The local members will not be involved in any fund-raising activities, the Foundation announced. Their principal activity will be the receiving and disseminating information about the Foundation.

FLOYD COUNTY PLANS PIONEER REUNION AND COLT SHOW AND RODEO

A colt and horse show, in which four classes each of quarter horse and Palomino colts will be judged and placed, has been announced by the Floydada Rodeo Club for May 27, in Floydada, beginning at 10 a. m.

The show will precede a full-blown rodeo with performances the afternoons of May 28 and 29 and an evening performance May 29.

The colt show and rodeo will be coincident with the annual pioneers reunion, celebrating the 57th anniversary of the organization of Floyd County.

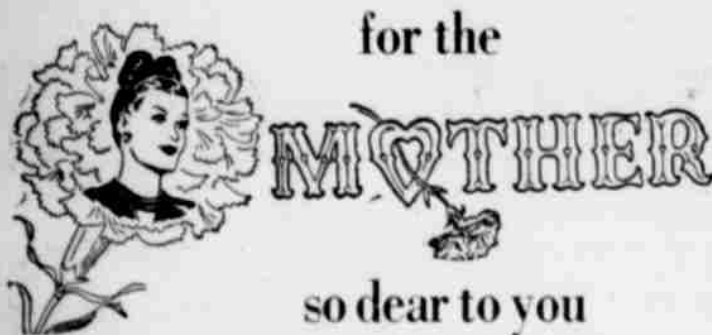

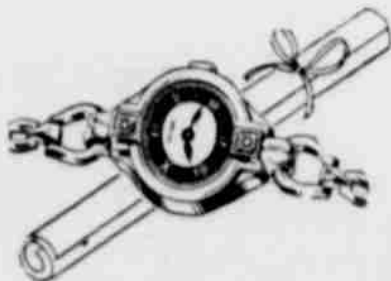

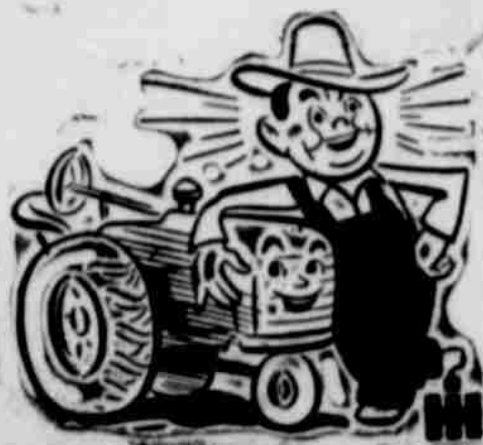

STITCH PATCH POCKETS WITH DIAGONAL DESIGN

Miss Jewell Hipp, Garza County home demonstration agent, has pulled out of her storehouse of useful information something that can be done about patch pocket corners, which are weak spots in clothing.

She says the patch pocket corners needed addition stitched-in strength and suggests that the stitching on the pocket be ended with a diagonal design at the corner.

Recently, clothing and textile specialists conducted tests searching for methods of prolonging the usefulness of women's clothes. Seven different endings to pocket stitching were designed and compared in laboratory tests, and the diagonal design proved to be the strongest, because the strain on the cloth was distributed more evenly when the pocket was pulled.

Miss Hipp points out that a pocket's endurance does not depend on corner stitching, entirely. She says that the strength of the fabric, of tread, and length of stitches share the responsibility, but a good ending stitch that gives strength to pockets is an important help.

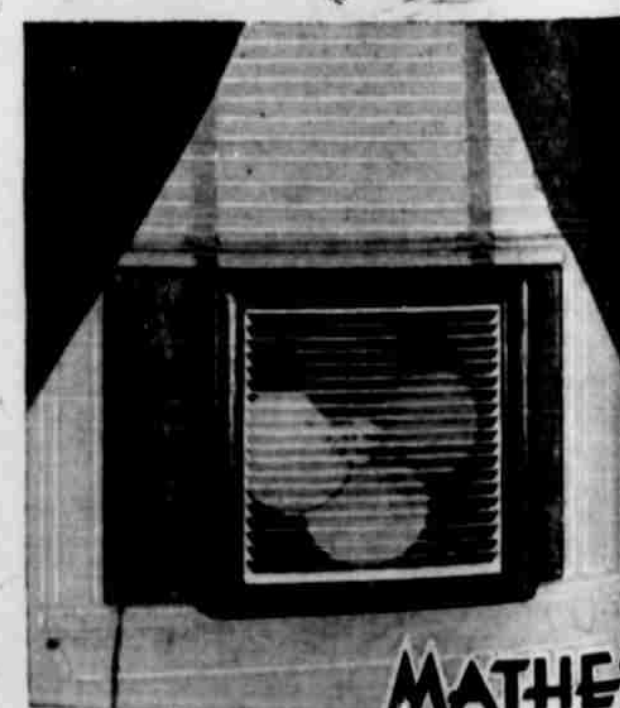

Food Freezing Is Subject At Post HD Meet

Members of the recently organized Post Home Demonstration Club learned how to prepare fruits and vegetables for frozen food lockers at a meeting last Friday in the American Legion Hall.

Miss Jewell Hipp, Garza County home demonstration agent, told the group to select young, tender beans to prepare for freezing. Scald them in boiling water for two minutes, after they have been washed and trapped.

Then, the agent explained, pack dry, without salt or water, in a container for freezing, after the vegetables have been cooled thoroughly in ice water and drained. Hard water and ordinary salt, the agent said, when used for brine has a tendency to cause frozen vegetables to be tough.

The newest information on freezing foods from Texas A and M College was presented by Miss Hipp in the demonstration.

WTCC and Santa Fe Open Campaign To Push Industrial Development

With determination to assure West Texas a place in the industrial sun, 125 representatives of West Texas towns in 56 counties served by the Santa Fe Railroad met with railroad officials in Sweetwater last Friday to work out a West Texas industrial advertising campaign.

Sponsored jointly by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the Santa Fe Railroad, the meeting purposed to challenge the towns in this area "to build with what we've got and not look to greener pastures."

D. A. Bandeen, general manager of the WTCC, told the group that the 20 South Plains Counties in the last 50 years have had a 4,000 per cent increase in population and that if that rate continues, there would be 80,000,000 people in the area.

He cited the following comparison between the 56 West Texas counties and the states of New Mexico, Colorado and Arizona:

Potential Is Incomparable

These 56 counties have an area of 65,000 square miles and 962,000 population. They produce 630,000 bales of cotton yearly, 15,000,000 bushels of sorghum grain, 23,000,000 bushels of wheat, have a cattle population of 1,300,000, produce yearly 22,000,000 pounds of wool, 2,000,000 pounds of mohair, 110,000,000 gallons of milk and 109,000,000 barrels of oil. They contain 3,000,000 acres of tillable land now unfarmed.

The sorghum grain production is six times that of New Mexico, Arizona and Colorado combined; the cotton production four times as great; cattle outnumber those of New Mexico by 40 per cent and of Arizona by 50 per cent and exceed Colorado's total.

These West Texas counties produce three times more oil than the three states combined, and in things produced, in opportunities for development, all three of those states cannot compare with West Texas.

A seven-man committee was named by E. L. Buelow, chairman of the WTCC industrialization committee, to work with Santa Fe officials on a program of advertising and industrial development. A. B. Davis of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce was one of the seven committeemen named.

By way of offering the "know how" of the nation's great railroads in industrialization, Arthur A. Dailey of Chicago, general advertising manager of the Santa Fe Lines, assured the meeting that he would bring members of his staff to West Texas for a detailed survey.

New Era Begins

H. C. Custard of Cleburne, WTCC president, said that the Santa Fe's willingness and advertising facilities, coupled with organization meeting was devoted to a demonstration of testing and cleaning pressure cookers. The agent tested 13 cookers belonging to the members.

At the next meeting, May 15 at 2:30 p. m. in the Legion Hall, a demonstration on renovating hats will be given. Each member is asked to bring a hat to be remodeled. Mrs. Bingham and Mrs. Cato will be hostesses. Anyone interested in joining the club is invited to attend the meetings. Lt. Col. James Minor Is Head Of Five National Guard Units

The Texas National Guard has announced that Lt. Col. James L. Minor, Post business man, is commanding officer of the Second Battalion, 142nd Infantry of the 36th Division which has the following five companies:

The three Amarillo companies already have received federal recognition since their reorganization under Minor's command and the other two companies soon will be ready for such recognition, the Post officer said this week.

Colonel Minor, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Marshall Mason, was mobilized as a private with the famed 36th Division on Nov.

25, 1940, at Camp Bowie. He trained there and at Camp Bland, Fla., and Camp Edwards, Mass., then went to Africa with the division's advance detachment, sailing from New York in March, 1943.

Wounded Three Times

He fought with the 36th Division in Africa, Italy, France, Germany and was fighting in Austria when V-E Day arrived. He was wounded in action three times, at Cassino, Italy; Rohrwiler, France, and the Siegfried Line, near Otterbach, Germany.

At the age of 25, Minor was the youngest lieutenant colonel commanding a battalion in combat in the entire U. S. Army. Overseas, he commanded the First Battalion, 142nd Infantry. The battalion, which received the Presidential Citation, was one of the most decorated in the U. S. Army.

Given Hero's Welcome

Minor was one of the most decorated Texans in the war, having received the following honors: Distinguished Service Cross, Silver Star with cluster; Legion of Merit; Bronze Star; French Croix de Guerre with gold star; Purple Heart with two clusters; French Croix de Guerre with Palm Leaf; Presidential Citation ribbon; defense ribbon; European Theatre of Operations ribbon with five battle stars; occupation ribbon; victory medal and combat infantry badge.

He flew home from Europe in June, 1945, with General Alexander Patch and party in three C-54 planes. The party was honored with a Heroes' Welcome in San Antonio.

A son of Mr. and Mrs. John Minor of Tahoka, Colonel Minor is a partner in and manager of Mason and Company store here. He was released from service November 11, 1945.

A graduate of Howard Payne College in Brownwood with B.A. degree in 1940, he was attending Law School at the University of Texas at the time of mobilization.

Screwball Calf Ropers Equally Good Showmen

Two of West Texas' top-ranking calf ropers will be matched for the first time in a fast moving show Sunday afternoon, May 18, in the new rodeo arena built recently on Highway 84, north of the Post city limits. They are Lanham Riley who grew up around Colorado City and Snyder and Sonny Edwards of Big Spring, both of whom have been spectacular rodeo contestants here in past years.

Although they have been entered together in many rodeo contests throughout this area, the May 18 event will be the first time they have been pitted against each other in a matched contest.

Local fans who have followed the progress of the two boys anticipate a hotly contested show but will not predict the outcome. Everyone agrees they are as evenly matched as any two ropers in the business and "if both are hitting," the match will be as exciting as the popular exhibitions between Troy Fort and Toots Mansfield.

And, like Fort and Mansfield, both Edwards and Riley are screwball ropers. "Anything can happen" in the way of entertainment.

The afternoon's program, which will begin at 2 o'clock, will include a jackpot roping contest open to all comers who have the \$5 entry fee. Twenty or 25 West Texas ropers are expected to enter.

All calves used will be from the Whiteface herd belonging to Embury Williams, manager of Post's annual Stampede and Rodeo, date for which is set for June 11-14 inclusive.

All sucking calves, they have never been roped and they promise plenty of mutiny for Riley and Edwards and the jackpot ropers. Riley sent word that he is dreading them worse than he did those Dublin Brahmas at Madison Square Garden, where he won third place last year.

MARCH SHIPMENTS OF TEXAS LIVESTOCK ARE UP OVER 70 PER CENT

March shipments of livestock in Texas soared 70 per cent above February shipments to halt abruptly the decline which began in December, according to The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Carloads shipped numbered 10,022 in March, an impressive gain over the 5,509 carloads going out in February. More significant is the 37 per cent hike in shipments over the March, 1946, level when loadings totaled 7,319 cars.

Cattle shipments more than doubled during the month to account for a major portion of the increase. Shipments of calves rose 17 per cent and of sheep 22 per cent, with the only loss being shipments of hogs, down 12 per cent. Cattle shipments totaled 7,914 in March, calves shipped numbered 624 carloads, hogs 766 carloads and sheep 718 carloads.

Compared to March, 1946, shipments, cattle registered the only per cent increase, 57 per cent.

Interstate shipments (plus Fort Worth) conformed almost exactly to the overall picture. Interstate shipments (minus Fort Worth) saw a February-to-March hike of 74 per cent.
