Rockefeller Tosses His Hat Into Ring For 1964

Says Vital Issues Loom

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller formally announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for president today and said he would enter the New Hampshire and other presidential preference primaries between now and the Republican National convention next July.

"I have reached this decision because I believe that vital principles are at stake in the next presidential election," Rockefeller said in a statement to a gathering of newsmen at the state capital.

"These principles and the policies to best support them must be brought before the American people and the delegates to the Republican National Convention for their thoughtful consideration."

Rockefeller, who did not mention Goldwater by name, has been challenging the Arizona senator to join him in a series of debates to determine what positions the Republican party should take on major issues.

Goldwater has refused on grounds of party unity.

The governor arranged to leave for New Hampshire immediately after his announcement.

Rockefeller, who has sought in recent months to associate Goldwater with extremism, said he was certain Republican convention delegates would write a platform and select a candidate consistent with the basic principles of the Republican party and the realities of the world in which we live.

He began reading his prepared statement without any preliminary comment. He concluded the reading with a "Thank you" and swept out of the room, before newsmen could buttonhole him for questioning.

The announcement was televised live on a national network (NBC's "Today" show).

The New Hampshire primary March 10 will be the first in the nation.

Rockefeller manifested interest in winning the presidential nomination in 1959 but abandoned that effort before reaching a formal announcement.

11 Rescued From Mine

BROISTEDT, Germany (AP)—Eleven men were rescued today from a flooded iron mine two weeks after they were entombed and given up for dead.

A huge drilling rig broke through early today to the gallery 183 feet below the surface where they had taken refuge when disaster struck Oct. 24.

The shaft was quickly reinforced by steel tubing, and one by one the bearded, haggard men were brought to the surface in a bomb-shaped rescue capsule.

They were located Sunday and since then had been supplied with food through a shaft less than two inches in diameter.

Heinz Kull, 51, was the first miner to reach the surface. As he was taken from the rescue capsule, a hush fell over crowds, kept at a distance of about 20 yards from the shaft.

In the crowd were members of the men's families who kept the long watch since the electrifying news came five days ago that these 11 men were alive. Many wept.

Millions watched the last act of the mine drama on West German television.

All the miners were placed on a stretcher and carried to a nearby mobile clinic. There teams of Red Cross physicians examined them. The survivors were offered their first real coffee in two weeks and sandwiches.

After happy reunions with their families, the men were taken by ambulances to hospitals for further examination.

The men were brought up in order determined beforehand, apparently based on their age and physical condition.

The oldest miner, Fritz Baer, 53, was the second to be brought up in the rescue capsule.

One of the 11 is not a miner. Adolf Herbst, the only bachelor, is an electrician who was installing equipment in the mine when it flooded.

When the last man was up, a siren blew to signal the end of the operation.

The breakthrough to the 11 occurred a few minutes after 4 a.m. (midnight EST).

There were 129 men working in the mine last month when a reservoir dam broke and flooded the works.

In the first 24 hours, 86 men managed to save themselves or were rescued. A week later three others were saved by drilling a shaft to an air pocket where they had crawled to escape the flood water.

Today's rescue brings the total saved to 100. The remaining 29 are given up as dead.

The operations here were similar to the rescue of miners Henry Throno and David Bellin, who were trapped for 14 days in a coal mine near Hazleton, Pa. after a cave-in last August.

Barry Not Changing His Timetable

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Barry Goldwater is not expected to shift his timetable for declaration on a bid for the White House because of New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's declaration that he is a candidate.

The Arizona conservative was not immediately reachable for comment on the Rockefeller announcement.

The senator and his wife are vacationing at an undisclosed hideaway. Goldwater expects to continue his rest until Nov. 12, when he's due to address a Better Business Bureau meeting in Chicago.

And Goldwater's office could not say whether any reaction to the Rockefeller declaration could be expected from the vacationing senator.

But Denison Kitchel, managing director of Goldwater's campaign for reelection to the Senate next year, has said Goldwater will not change his plans because of the Rockefeller announcement.

The Goldwater timetable calls for a declaration, one way or the other, sometime in January.

Clouds Due Over State

Hot weather lingered Thursday in South Texas, which recorded the highest temperatures in the country the day before.

Skies were clear everywhere in the state in early morning. The men were expected to form over western areas of the state and start spreading toward the east by evening.

Patches of fog hugged much of the coast and extended south Texas before dawn. It was foggy at Beaumont, Houston, Galveston, Palsacio, Corpus Christi, Alice and McAllen.

The Weather Bureau predicted widely scattered showers in Northwest Texas late Thursday night and over western sections of the state Friday.

Forecasts called for cooler air to spread over Northwest Texas and into North Central and Southwest Texas by Friday.

Five Texas cities posted the nation's top temperatures Wednesday. The mercury hit 94 degrees at Alice, Brownsville and Corpus Christi, and 93 at Laredo and McAllen. Highs elsewhere in the state ranged down to 75 at Dalhart and El Paso.

More Soviet Roadblocks Are Expected

WASHINGTON (AP)—Despite their bitter protests, the Western Allies expect Russia to throw more roadblocks across the highway into Berlin.

This was reported Wednesday by authoritative sources after the Allies accused Moscow in a diplomatic note of arbitrary and unjustified action in delaying an American Army convoy for 42 hours. The convoy was finally waved through Tuesday night.

Neither the protest nor the fact that the Americans eventually were allowed to proceed means that this gloomy chapter of U.S.-Soviet relations can be closed, authoritative sources warned. They said that top officials of the administration agree the West must expect similar or other harassments in and around Berlin.

This is the result of the first, hasty assessment of this latest Soviet attempt to make the United States, Britain and France accept Russia's rules on the autobahn, the highway connecting Berlin with the West. A more scientific evaluation will follow.

The aim will be to find the answer to this question: Why did the Soviets do what they did, first in October and now, less than a month later, again?

The 12-vehicle convoy with 24 drivers and co-drivers, carrying 20 "passengers" or "troops," was held up at the Marienborn checkpoint on the western end of the autobahn. The Soviets first requested that the passengers dismount, then said they would be satisfied if the tailgates of some of the vehicles would be lowered. Both requests were refused.

The basis for this refusal is Western insistence that the Soviet Bliss pioneers get together today.

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. (AP)—More than 100 pioneers of rocketry and missiles get together today for a two-day meeting of the Fort Bliss Oldtimers.

The group is the nucleus of 240 rocket men who helped develop several of the United States' earliest rocket weapons and space vehicles.

38 Guerrillas Die In Clash

SAIGON (AP)—South Vietnamese troops today reported their first victory against Communist forces since the overthrow of President Ngo Dinh Diem.

The official news agency Viet Nam Press reported 38 guerrillas were killed in a battle Wednesday east of the provincial capital of Phu Yen.

Three government soldiers were wounded and a quantity of weapons was seized from the Reds, the announcement said. It added that the operation was continuing.

Meanwhile, the military junta reported that 33 persons were killed and 223 injured in the weekend coup. More than half the casualties were civilians.

The death toll included Diem, his younger brother Ngo Dinh Nhu and several top loyalist officers.

Khrushchev's first remark simply does not correspond with the truth, American officials said. Procedures were established years ago and were spelled out in writing to the Russians Oct. 29, the officials said.

Concerning the Soviet leader's second remark, the comment in Washington is that the convoy commander insisted on the "established procedure" right from the outset.

Rain, Cool Spell Possible For Game

AUSTIN (AP)—Rain and cooler weather were held possible for the Texas-Baylor football game here Saturday.

The Weather Bureau is not yet ready to make a definite game forecast.

"There is some outlook for rain and cooler weather on Saturday but it all this is developing and it is too early to say that is the forecast for game time," said the Weather Bureau.

Policies Of Agency Hit

WASHINGTON (AP) — The American Farm Bureau Federation said today it may become necessary for interested groups to reconsider lending policies of the government's Farmers Home Administration. Those policies have been coming under increasing criticism by private lenders.

The big farm organization said it is being charged frequently that the government agency is making loans to farm borrowers who could obtain credit relief from private sources.

The FHA was established expressly to assist operators of family type farms who are unable to obtain credit from banks and other private lending institutions and agencies. Much of its credit activity relates to loans to farmers who have suffered from drought, flood and other natural disasters and who need credit to continue operations.

The government agency has loans of more than \$1.7 billion outstanding.

Dry Areas Get Rains

CHICAGO (AP) — Much needed rains fell in Eastern sections of the nation today, alleviating drought conditions in many areas.
Rain during the night and early morning broke out from the Carolinas northward and also through the lower Great Lakes and eastern Ohio Valley regions.
Amounts were fairly heavy in

many areas — with nearly 1 1/2 inches in a six-hour period in Dover, Del. More than one inch of rain splashed on New York City Wednesday and Wednesday night, the first real relief from the long drought that has lowered the city's water supplies.

Nearly two inches of rain was reported in Raleigh, N.C., and about 1 1/2 inches in Richmond, Va.

Heavy fog shrouded broad areas from the middle Mississippi Valley through the western Ohio Valley region and from Tennessee southward to the Gulf. Visibility was reported at zero in many areas, halting and delaying air travel in some cities.

In the West, rain fell in scattered sections from the North to the Rockies into the Great Basin region. Snow was reported at higher elevations.
Dry and clear weather was reported in most other sections of the nation.

Two More Whoopers Arrive On Coast

WASHINGTON (AP) — Arrival of two more adult whooping cranes has brought the total number of the rare species to 33 at their wintering grounds on the Texas coast.

This total, which includes seven young cranes, is one more than the largest number counted at the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge last winter.
Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall said at least two adult birds are unaccounted for and there is a remote possibility that six more adults will return.

Statisticians estimate that the crane contains 6,586 quintillion tons of matter.

Sen. Dirksen In Mishap

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Republican leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois suffered minor injuries today in an automobile collision. Mrs. Dirksen's right foot was broken in the crash.
The accident occurred on Virginia 7 while Dirksen was en route to the Capitol from his home near Herndon, Va., in his official chauffeur-driven limousine.

Dirksen's glasses were broken and he received a slight gash on the palm of his right hand when, he said, another automobile turned in front of the car in which he and Mrs. Dirksen were riding. Mrs. Dirksen was taken to a clinic.

Dirksen told of the accident at a Senate-House Republican leadership news conference where he appeared with a pair of old spectacles to read a statement lashing out at the Kennedy administration's foreign policy.

"Don't magnify it," he admonished reporters. "You'll have me a candidate for a headstone."

At the time he talked to reporters, Dirksen thought Mrs. Dirksen's foot was only sprained. Later, his office telephoned the Senate press gallery that the foot was broken.

Disagreement In Hospital Settled

CAIRO, Ga. (AP) — Officials of Cairo's only hospital have accepted the resignation of the hospital administrator, W. H. Strickland, and reinstated nine registered nurses who quit in a dispute.
The action Wednesday night brought an end to the disagreement which had left the 31-bed hospital with one part-time nurse since last Friday.

Wesley Edwin McMillan pleaded guilty in county court this morning to a charge of DWI. He was assessed a fine of \$100 plus court costs of \$26.55 and three days in jail. The charge was filed by the Snyder Police Department.

Involved were a 1962 Chevrolet driven by Louetta Bird Herling of Herculite, and a 1962 Ford driven by Patricia Ann Kruse of Snyder. Damage to the Herling car was estimated at \$100 and to the Kruse car at \$10. There were no injuries.

Terrorists Burn Plant

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) — Terrorists killed two soldiers and burned down a Goodyear tire plant in two attacks Wednesday in Venezuela, informed sources reported today.
An army jeep was ambushed in the mountains south of Coro, in western Venezuela where pro-Castro guerrilla hands are active. Informants said two soldiers in the jeep were killed and three other soldiers were wounded in the fighting that followed. One guerrilla was believed wounded.

The strike against the Goodyear plant came at Barcelona, on the eastern coast. Four men armed with machine guns and pistols overpowered a bookkeeper and burned down the plant with gasoline, the reports said.

Cries Over Injuries Subside This Week

There was less of the crying over injuries and more of the let's-get-on-with-the-game attitude this week as Southwest Conference football teams entered off their drills for Saturday's contests.

Texas and Baylor, both undefeated in conference play and both gunning for the title and the Cotton Bowl host spot, met at Austin in what probably is the nation's feature grid attraction. The Longhorns, who have won their last three games by a total of 13 points, also will be trying to hold their No. 1 national ranking as the Bears try to crash into the top 10.

Rice plays Arkansas in a do-or-die battle at Houston. Texas

tech takes on Kansas State of Big Eight in an intersectionally tussle at Lubbock. Texas A&M gets in-out-of Southern Methodist at College Station, and Texas Christian plays Louisiana State at Baton Rouge.

TCU Coach Abe Martin was pleased Wednesday with the passing of Sophomore Kent Nix and the receiving of ends Darrell Mott and Bobby Sanders as his Frogs prepared for LSU. At Baton Rouge, LSU was still stinging from the pasting at the hands of Mississippi last week and ran through an hour and a half of stiff contact work. They planned to taper off Thursday.

Baylor gave defense against Texas plays a long review,

working three top units alternately against Texas offensive plays. Then the Bears turned to their own attack, first working on running and then polishing their vaunted aerial game against Texas defenses.

The Texas Longhorns concentrated on pass defense in preparing for Baylor and Don Trull. Looking like anything but No. 1 against SMU passes, the "Horns worked long and hard against Trull combinations and then turned to offensive plays and signal drills.

SMU worked on the blocking sled getting ready for Texas A&M and also gave attention to their signal drills. Several Mustangs were on the injured list, but Coach Hayden Fry expected them to all be ready for the Aggies. Coach Hank Foldsberg told a College Station press conference he was "impressed with their attention between offense and defense, stressing work against the Mustang stunting tactics.

Coach Jesse Neely prepared to meet Arkansas by promoting quarterback Walter McReynolds and fullback Russell Wyatt to the first unit. The Rice team, with probably the most injuries in the conference, hoped to be near top shape by game time Saturday.

Frank Broyles sent his November wonders, the Arkansas Razorbacks, through signal drills, stressing player assignments and pass defense. Arkansas usually works in pads on Wednesday, but Broyles put them through their paces this week in sweat clothes to "avoid any new injuries.

Headliners Battle For Loop Titles

San Antonio Highlands battles San Antonio Lee and Hallsville meets White Oak this week in the headline games of Texas schoolboy football as district championships fall right and left.

These two games match undefeated, united teams in the fight for spots in the state playoffs.

In the case of Highlands-Loop, the district race will be decided only if Highlands wins.

White Oak and Hallsville both are gunning for the championship of Dist. 19 in Class A. The winner will be a favorite to take the state crown.

All told there are 22 district championships on the line, plus a couple of zone titles.

Class AAAA features the Highlands-Lee melee but the all-around championship is in the balance at Denison, where Garland seeks to sew up the Dist. 7 title.

Houston Lamar can win a Dist. 9 zone championship if it beats Houston Belaire. Kingsville can sack up a zone championship in Dist. 14 if it defeats McAllen.

There are no district championships at stake in Class AAAA unless there should be upsets, but Class AA, which already has two district representatives to the state playoffs—Sinton and Hondo, will have 11 titles in the balance.

Albany, the favorite in Class A, can win its district crown this week. All the Lions have to do is beat Baird.

Five district championships already have been determined in Class A—Clifton, Midlothian, Frisco, Rains and Sorrenza. Nine go on the line this week.

Classes AA and A have only two weeks to go before all district representatives must be determined for the state playoff schedule.

Classes AAAA and AAA have three weeks left on the regular schedule.

Thirty-three teams remain undefeated and united. That total is expected to drop under 30 this week's district championship games.

There also are 10 teams unbeaten but tied. Some have as many as two ties including Pasadena, ranked ninth in Class AAAA, and Pharr-San Juan AAAA, 1962 runner-up in Class AAAA. Sinton also is one of the teams with a tie on its record.

Dumas, the defending champion in Class AAA, paces the unbeaten, united teams with a 19-game winning streak. But Dumas has yet to win its district title since Phillips, in the same district, also sports a perfect record.

Mustangs Lead Loop's Scoring

The Snyder Tigers, who share the lead in District 3-AAA with Sweetwater, are ahead of the other district teams in points scored for the season, but are down the line in points scored in conference competition.

Snyder, who has the best overall won-loss record at 5-2, has thus far tallied 136, which is six points more than the Sweetwater Mustangs have scored.

The Tigers have given up 102 points to the opposition, a 20 percent lead in this category behind Brownfield, who has yielded only 84.

In District play the Mustangs are way out in front in the scoring column, having run up 44 points in two games. Brownfield is second with 48 points, while Snyder is third with 36.

Think Krush Hoping For Pressure On Grain Deal

By OVID A. MARTIN, Associated Press Farm Writer
 WASHINGTON (AP)—There is speculation in farm circles that the Soviet Union may be counting on American grain growers and exporters to put pressure on the Kennedy administration to eliminate a barrier holding up a big sale of wheat to the Soviet bloc. Blocking the sales and causing Soviet Premier Khrushchev to threaten to break off wheat negotiations is a stipulation in the agreement that the grain be moved on American-owned ships to the extent they are available. The freight rates on the American vessels are reported to be 30 per cent higher than those of foreign ships. The American ships have higher labor and other costs. The Soviets have made clear that they want the grain moved the cheapest way possible. Farm leaders said it is possible that Khrushchev may be hoping that the U.S. wheat producers—motivated by fear of losing wheat sales that could boost their income and greatly reduce a surplus that is burdening their markets.—will put pressure on the administration to drop the requirement that American ships be used. So far, these leaders said, there has been no indication that growers will take such action. There have been reports the President imposed the requirements to avoid possible trouble with the American maritime unions. Also, at the time Kennedy made his decision, it was reported in government circles that the President wanted American ships to move the grain to prevent possible diversion to Cuba and to Communist areas in the Far East. Sen. Smith May Enter Primaries

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Margaret Chase Smith is seriously considering entering some presidential primaries to offer Republicans a "third choice" in the selection of their 1964 nominee.

The White House, Maine Republican, who has served in the Senate since 1949 after nine years in the House, is expected to announce in a speech before the Women's National Press Club here Dec. 5 whether she will become an active candidate.

Although politicians generally doubt that the electorate yet is conditioned to the idea of a woman as president, Mrs. Smith's friends think that if she made a good showing in some of the primaries she would be in a strong position as a potential vice presidential nominee.

Labor Bill Is Delayed

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate action on the Mexican farm labor bill has been delayed until it finishes work on foreign aid legislation.

Sen. Allen Ellender, D-La., said he first planned to bring up the farm labor bill Wednesday but postponed his move at the request of Democratic leader Mike Mansfield of Montana.

Ellender plans to ask the Senate to accept the House version of the original Senate bill.

The House amended the measure to provide a simple one-year extension of the present program and eliminated an amendment that would require American migratory workers be given the same conditions of employment, including workmen's compensation, housing and transportation, as the imported Mexicans.

Carr Says Appeal Will Be In Time

LUFKIN (AP)—Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr says Texas will appeal a federal court redistricting order well within the time limit set by the U. S. Supreme Court.

The ruling by three federal judges at Houston held Texas laws governing the state's congressional districts are unconstitutional.

Carr said Wednesday that notice of appeal will be filed by Nov. 15 and all papers in the appeal will be filed by Dec. 15.

Fortune Teller's System Revealed

DALLAS (AP)—Police arrested a self-styled Gypsy for telling fortunes, a practice outlawed by city ordinance.

Her son, 5, accompanied her to headquarters Wednesday.

"Can your mommy tell fortunes?" detective George Johnson asked the youngster.

"Yeah," he replied nonchalantly.

"How much does she charge?"

"Fifty cents — and she swipes your billfold."

A district court jury found Willis Newton, 74, guilty Oct. 19 of kidnaping Lou Brent of Tulsa, Okla.

Sheriff's deputies found Brent shackled with chains in the trunk of Newton's car in July, 1962, when it was stopped near Inola, Okla.

Newton testified that Brent took jewelry from his ranch and intended only to scare Brent into telling where the jewelry was.

The Uvalde man was released on bond after his lawyer gave notice of appeal.

Newton's nephew, Noel Oglesby of Corpus Christi, also is charged in the kidnaping.

In 1924 Newton was convicted of taking part in the \$2 million robbery of a train at Roundout, Ill.
