SOLDIER BONUS BILL TO PASS AT THIS SESSION

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Decision to pass the soldier compensation bill at this session of congress was reached today by the Senate Republicans in a party conference. The vote was 35 to 9 on a motion offered by Senator Lenroot of Wisconsin. The conference also decreed that Senate should proceed to consider the administration tariff bill on next Thursday, without further delay.

RUSS DELEGATES RECEIVED IN U.S.

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Boris Bakhmstaff, the last accredited ambassador from Russia to the United States, is recognized as a representative of the Russian government in this country, and as such he enjoys the diplomatic immunity which the attaches to all envoys of foreign governments accredited to the United States, Secretary Hughes declared in a letter to the Senate today.

DENOUNCES THE USE OF "SCOPOLAMIN"

AUSTIN, April 18.—Dr. H. C. Morrow, an Austin physician has denounced the use of scopolamin on crime suspects to get information as "a cruel and unusual punishment." "Laws legalizing the use of this drug on men without their consent would be unconstitutional," he declared, "because the constitution guarantees an individual rights of self protection and from the infliction of cruel and unusual punishment. Present laws prevent the administering of any drug without the consent of the person.

"Talk of a person under the influence of scopolamin would be useless as evidence because while under the influence of the drug such talk would be like the delirium of fever—disjointed and fantastic."

STORM INJURED ARE RECOVERING

Four of the storm victims remain in the Halley & Love sanitarium here, but all reported to be getting along as well as could be expected, and will recover.

The four are Mrs. Frank Kvaapil and two children, and Mrs. Paul Sturm. Emma Kvaapil, age fifteen, is the more seriously injured of the five who are yet in the sanitarium. She suffered the amputation of a lower limb a few days ago, and for several days was unconscious and at the point of death. Blood poison developed and the limb had to be removed to save her life. Mrs. Sturm suffered the loss of an arm.

SECRET TREATY STIRS MEETING

GENOA, Italy, April 18.—The consternation caused by the German-Russian coup, including the treaty between Russia and Germany as signed at Rappallo, showed no signs of abating as the conference delegates continued their deliberations today. On the contrary as the different national groups examined the text of the new agreement, and deliberated on the possible effect upon the importance of signing this separate pact, and what bearing the turn of affairs would have on the general political situation in Europe.

GENOA, April 18.—Organizers of the Genoa conference today were attempting to grope their way out of the debris of confusion caused by the explosion of the German and Russian "bombshell" in the secret signing of the formal peace treaty between the two nations at Rapallo last Sunday.

PARIS, April 18.—Premier Poincare assembled his cabinet today to consider the attitude the French would take in the case of Russia and Germany proposing to maintain separate arrangements regarding Russian restoration.

DEATH TOLL 28 FROM STORM IN MID-WEST

MAN FOUND DEAD IN BASEMENT

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 18.—Lee Fox, administrator and active manager of a local transfer company, was found dead in the basement of the company's building here early today. A brick covered with blood on which was impressed what was thought to be human hair, was found near the body by the police. There was a deep gash across the man's forehead and another on the chin. It was at first thought that the man had met death by accident in falling, but the finding of the brick convinced the authorities that the man had been murdered.

NEGRO BANDITS HOLD UP BANK

KANSAS CITY, April 18.—Two armed negroes today forced the messenger of the Southeast State Bank to leave a crowded street car and enter an automobile and accompany them several blocks, while they robbed him of four thousand dollars in cash and seven thousand dollars in checks. The negroes then fled and made their escape.

REQUISITION RIBBON ALL OUT AT STATE CAPITOL

AUSTIN, April 18.—Requisitions from governors of other states for persons arrested and held in Texas have been granted so profusely by Governor Neff in the last few weeks that Executive Clerk Eugene Sanders of the Secretary of State's department has run out of the red ribbon which is attached to each paper. This ribbon is necessary to make the document official.

Requisitions poured into the governor's office last week. Two days in succession five were received. The cause of this sudden influx, it is just a "hitting streak," according to Secretary Walthall, a baseball fan.

CHICAGO, April 18.—Revised figures on casualties, injured and property damage done by the storm which swept the Central states yesterday and last night, indicated that at noon today the loss of life was not as great as was first expected. The latest figures showed that twenty-eight were dead; eleven in Illinois, fifteen in Indiana and two in Missouri.

CHICAGO, April 18.—The death toll from the storm which swept through the Middlewestern States has reached almost fifty and may pass that number when all losses have been accounted for. Sweeping Northeastward thru the Middle West, the storm originating in the Rocky Mountain region, passed over Ohio today, leaving both death and property destruction in its wake.

So far twenty-one deaths have been reported from points in Indiana and twenty-two in Illinois. Property damage will run into the millions of dollars.

PRODUCE FIRM CLOSES DOORS

DENISON, Tex., April 18.—The White Produce Company, one of the largest produce firms in the Southwest, with headquarters here and branch houses in several Texas cities, went into the hands of a receiver today, according to announcement made by the heads of the firm.

STORM RELIEF FUND GROWS

Voluntary contributions for the relief of storm sufferers continue to come in, and the committee is distributing the money where it is most needed.

R. W. Bruce, chairman of the relief committee, accompanied by Mrs. Bruce, visited the Crews country Monday, where the condition of three families who lost heavily in the storm was investigated. Mr. Bruce issued checks to each of the three families, and they had already received help in the way of clothing and bedding.

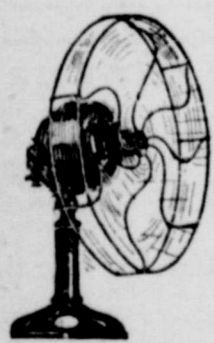

PLAN HOME ECONOMICS COTTAGE AT BEAUMONT

AUSTIN, April 18.—Plans for a home economics cottage for the South Park High School at Beaumont are in the hands of Miss Lillian Harris, director of the department of home economics of the State Board for Vocational Training. The cottage, which will be completed next year, will be one of the best of its kind in the state, according to Miss Harris.
The plans call for a 2-story brick structure of colonial design trimmed in white. It will contain a bed room and bath, a large reception room, to be used also as a living room and class room and for social functions, a dining room, a breakfast room, a foods laboratory, unit kitchens, a complete laundry and ample storage room. One of the features of the cottage is an immense fireplace in the living room.
Miss Harris announced that the Home Economics cottage of the Brownwood high school would be completed May 20, of this year.
It is being built entirely by the boys of the day carpentry trade class of the school. While the Brownwood cottage will not be as elaborate as the Beaumont cottage, according to Miss Harris, it will be up-to-date in every respect and fully equipped for the use of the girls taking the home economics course of the school.

400,000 BOY SCOUTS IN U. S.

SAN ANTONIO, April 18.—There are 400,000 Boy Scouts in America, according to James N. West, national scout executive, who visited San Antonio recently. This is more than the total number of scouts in other countries, he said. There was over 100 per cent increase in the membership last year, he said.

Electric Steel Smelting.

It is claimed that an electric induction furnace which has been under trial for some time in Sheffield, England, solves the problem of making very large steel ingots demanded by modern machinery, because it is as easy to make a two-ton ingot in this furnace as one of 60 pounds in a crucible. But it is admitted that at present high-grade steels can be made by the electric furnace on a commercially successful scale only in places where power can be obtained at an extremely low cost. Laboratory experiments have indicated that a high-class steel can be made by the electric process from inferior material, but for commercial purposes this is not yet possible.

British Columbia's Timber.

Directly and indirectly the timber industries of British Columbia represent nearly half the trade and commerce of the province. In 1920 they produced nearly \$63,000,000 worth of commercial material and it is estimated that the 1921 output will run well over the \$100,000,000 mark. The output in 1920 was approximately 2,000,000,000 feet of wood products, and over 20,000 men were employed to produce this quantity.

Those Subnormal Children.

In an address to the physicians of Peoria Dr. Borden Veeder of Washington university, St. Louis, said: "The fallacy of setting arbitrary standards for the weight and height of children without reference to their parentage is a practice which should be abolished. In judging whether a child is above or below normal the stature and weight of the parents should be considered."

New United States Hospitals.

Before the year ended the United States public health service had added three more hospitals to the fourteen it had opened since January 1 last. It is also preparing nine other hospitals, four of which will probably be opened by May 1 and the others a little later. All of these hospitals have either been leased from private owners or taken over from the army or the navy, the new construction authorized by congress at the extra session not yet being well under way.

Hospitals planned to be opened for 1922 include the tuberculosis hospital at beautiful Dawson Springs, Ky.; Excelsior Springs, Mo., and Rutland, Mass., with a total of 920 beds; the general hospital at Fort Walla Walla, Wash., and at Norfolk, Va., with a total of 1,240 beds, and the neuropsychiatric hospital in the Bronx, New York city, with 1,000 beds.

GOAT MILK SANITARIUM TO BE ESTABLISHED

EL PASO, April 18—El Paso is soon to have the first "goat milk diet sanatorium" in the United States, according to the announcement of Dr. G. W. Chapman, medical missionary and world traveler whose experiences include being captured by African cannibals. Dr. Chapman came to El Paso recently from Quincy, Illinois.

Negotiations for the purchase of a hospital site are in progress, the doctor said. It will be built to accommodate 25 patients, and additions will be made as the need arises. Dr. Chapman explained some of his theories about the curing of ailments.

"I propose," he said, "to cure every form of sickness that can be cured without the use of a knife. This will be done chiefly by a diet of goat's milk, fresh vegetables and fruit, proper exercises and daily lectures on spiritual and mental health."

Patients, he said, will be ordered not to smoke, drink or chew. "If they do any of those things," he said, "I may not be able to cure them." A regular program of physical exercise will be carried out each day. There will also be a daily lecture on the care of the body and the easement of the mind.

A graduate of the Northwestern University Medical College in 1885, the doctor has traveled in many parts of the world.

WANT MARKET WIRE FOR TEXAS FARMERS

AUSTIN, April 18.—The Texas delegation at Washington, including both representatives and senators, are making an effort to obtain for Texas an extension of the federal leased wire service to carry into the state the daily market reports of the federal government, according to letters

received by T. R. Bolin, state marketing agent. The Texans are proposing an amendment to the Agricultural bill, which has passed the House and is now in the hands of the Senate appropriations committee, to provide for the expense of the proposed leased wire service extension. The delegation visited Secretary of Agriculture Wallace last week, and reported to Mr. Bolin that the secretary approved the plan.

The federal leased wire service carries the daily reports on perishable products from the large markets and also covers the movement of perishable products from shipping points.

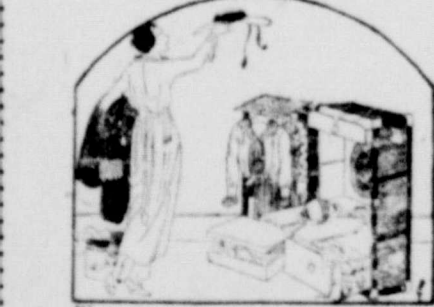
