New 'Rules Of The Road' To Be Observed In Texas

Texans will be observing some new "rules of the road" come Aug. 29 -- or facing the prospect of sizeable fines for non-compliance.

The 1971 legislature passed a number of new rules designed to put Texas in line with the Federal Uniform Vehicle Code, a step required for continued Federal Highway Construction Aid.

"Don't help a good boy go bad" was the oft-used slogan used to urge drivers to remove ignition keys when they leave their cars.

No longer a request but rather a rule, drivers can be fined up to \$200 for leaving the ignition keys in an unattended car.

Another action of the 1971 legislature, aimed at making driving safer, adds tire inspection to the present inspection requirements. Cars may not receive a safety inspection sticker if any tire has broken fabric or lacks at least one-sixteenth of an inch of tread at two distant points.

Yet another inspection requirement added to become effective Aug. 29 is one requiring the investigating policeman to remove the inspection sticker from any vehicle damaged in an accident to the degree that it would apparently need repair before passing state inspection. Owners would receive a dated receipt for the sticker and would have to get the vehicle re-inspected within 30 days.

Drivers who attempt to get away from a police car are committing a misdemeanor under the new legislation and may

be charged with a maximum penalty of six months in jail and a \$500 fine.

Also forbidden for the first time is overcrowding -- specifically having more than three people in the front seat if they block the driver's view or interfere with his control of the car.

Effective with the summer legislation is the one dollar increase in drivers' licenses, including operators, commercial, chauffeurs, occupation and learners. Licenses will be issued for four years at a time and the extra dollar will go to the Department of Public Safety's building fund.

Immunizations

Ready For School?

Do your students have their proper immunizations?

All students who are entering Olton schools for the first time must have immunizations for smallpox, diph-

theria, tetanus, polio and measles.

If there is a history of measles, that shot will not be required. Otherwise all children under 12 years old must

be immunized against the rubella measles.

Junior high and high school requires immunizations against diphtheria, polio, tetanus and smallpox.

Texas colleges require full immunization against polio if the student is under 19 years of age, and immunization against diphtheria, tetanus and smallpox within the past ten years.

Those students entering public kindergartens, which are associated with elementary schools, will be required to have the immunizations.

Parents are urged to have their children immunized before they start to school Aug. 23.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Wednesday in the first Baptist Church for James Edward Newton, 63, a resident of Olton about 15 years.

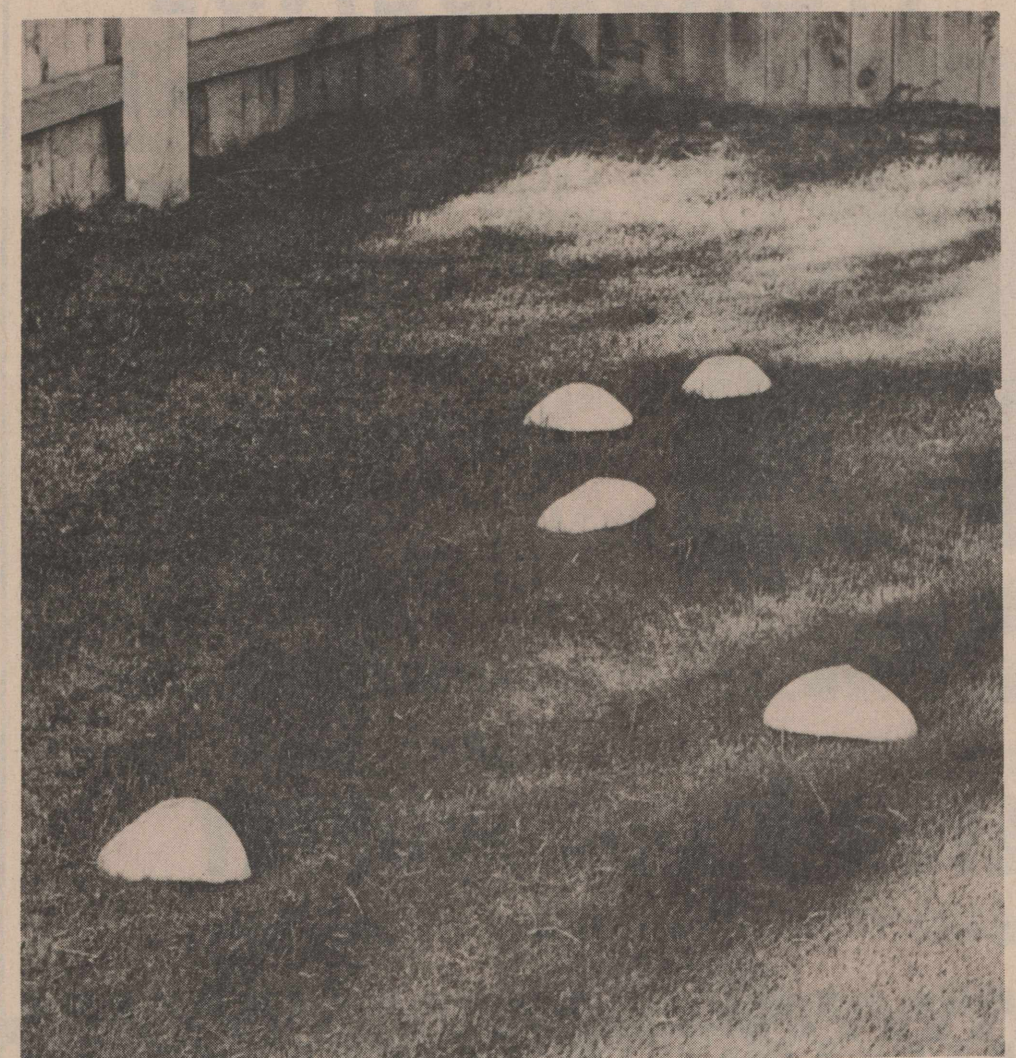
Officiating was the Rev. John E. Lewis. Interment was in Willow Cemetery at Haskell under the direction of Parsons Funeral Home.

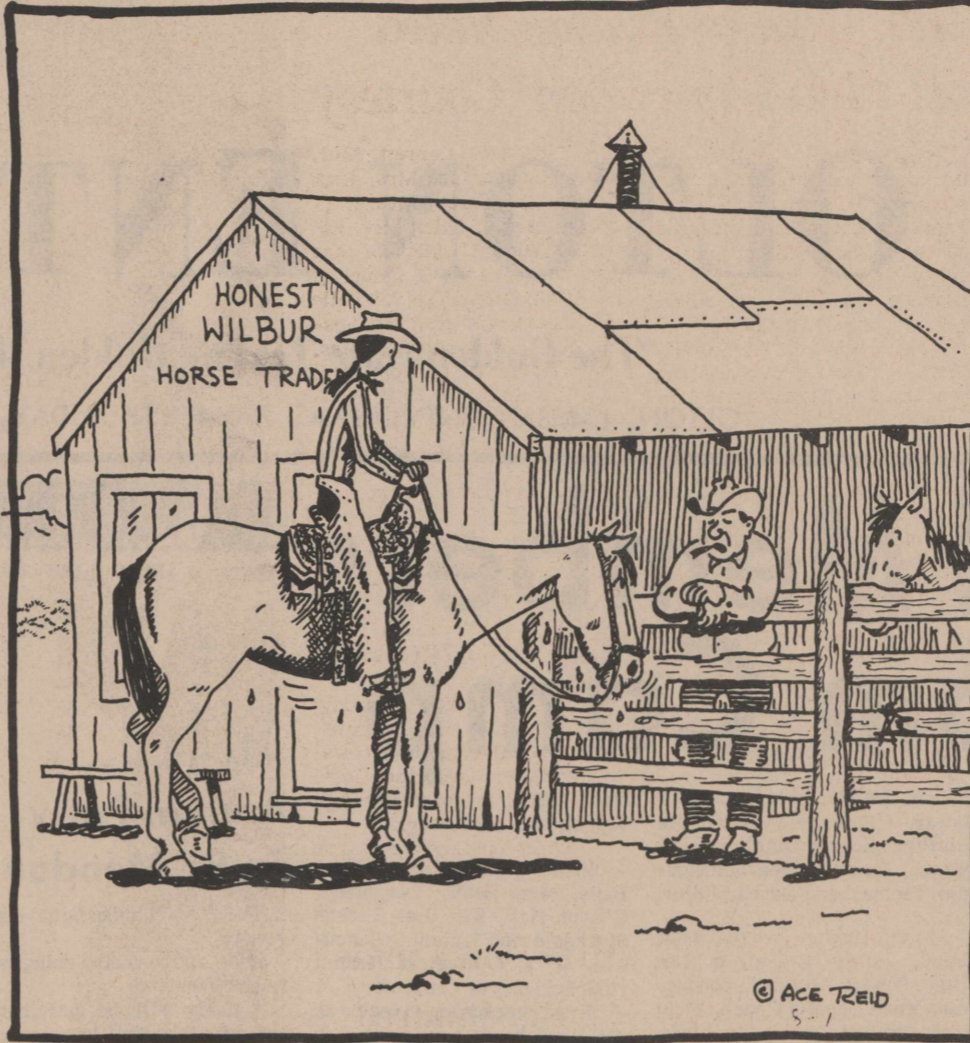

Farmers Offered Prote In Yields Computing

Cotton farmers who have been hard hit by drought or other natural disasters this year are being offered greater income protection by the manner in which their cotton yields will be computed for program payment purposes in 1972, Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin announced today.

The secretary also announced several additional changes in program provisions which will offer greater relief to drought-affected farmers. The changes are based on findings from a recent inspection tour of drought-stricken areas by Under Secretary J. Phil Campbell, during which he met with farmers, ranchers, local agricultural leaders and those administering farm programs to learn directly how various programs were functioning and how they could be improved. A follow-up team from the Department of Agriculture has also just completed an inspection tour. Today's action on cotton is expected to strengthen income in 1972 and subsequent years for cotton farmers in the drought areas of the Southwest. An adjustment in the farmer's actual 1971 cotton yield up to 90 percent of his 1971 payment level -- instead of the previous level of 80 percent -- will be permitted where this year's yield is reduced by adverse natural conditions.

Every effort is to insure a uniformity of all programs, and Count ASC Committees, the intent of the law, investigating any reporting discrepancies.

Generally, cotton payments for the 1972 program are the average of the 1970 program yield and the actual yields for 1970 and 1971. The Agricultural Act of 1970 provides for participating cotton farmers to receive a set-aside payment of at least 15 cents per pound. The payment is computed by multiplying the payment rate per pound times the payment yield established for the farm times the acres planted within the base acreage allotment. The secretary has authority to make adjustments in the actual yield in any year where the farmer's yield is reduced by drought, flood, storm or other natural disaster.

Based on today's announcement, farmers who suffered a severe yield reduction as a result of natural disaster in 1971 will receive a higher payment yield for 1972 than they would have under rules previously in effect. This is expected to be helpful not only to farmers in the Southwest but also to farmers who suffered severely from excessive rains early in the growing season elsewhere in the country.

Additional assistance of covered in today's announcement includes:

1. An extension through Dec. 31, 1971 of the emergency livestock feed program and haying-grazing of land diverted under the cropland adjustment and set-aside programs. They were originally scheduled to end Aug. 31, 1971.
2. A revision of procedures to allow farmers to use their own conveyance as an additional source of transportation, where other means have caused delays, in the delivery of feed grains into drought areas. Transportation assistance rates have been established for helping farmers meet this additional expense. Orders for feed grains now can be expedited rapidly by the county ASCS office contacting the Kansas City Commodity Office directly instead of routing requests through state ASCS offices. Also, the follow-up on all loading orders has been intensified on deliveries not made within one week from date of order.
3. Cost-sharing for emergency tillage practices that have been previously used only on cropland to prevent wind erosion is now available on pasture and rangeland. This will also improve water penetration and help prevent runoff.
4. Cost-sharing assistance, under the Rural Environmental Assistance Program, is provided for use in building livestock water ponds, in order to catch and store water when rains occur. Under the emergency conservation measures these ponds may also be built or rebuilt, in cases of severe drought, to intercept or hold existing water supplies.

Will It Happen To Us?

President Richard Nixon, speaking at a gathering of mid-western newspaper and broadcasting executives in Kansas City, Mo., recently referred to the decadence that destroys civilizations.

"I think of what happened to Greece and Rome," he said, "and you see what is left—only the pillars. What has happened, of course, is that great civilizations of the past, as they have become wealthy, as they have lost their will to live, to improve, they then have become subject to the decadence that eventually destroys the civilization. The United States is now reaching that period...."

"I will flatly predict that five years from now we will still be the richest nation in the world. If we want to be... and need to be, we will still be the strongest nation in the world. But the critical question is whether the United States will be a healthy nation... healthy in terms of its moral strength."

"Inexorable Process"

A year ago, Stewart Alsop commented, "A good many normally sensible people... are beginning to ask themselves whether the American system might not come apart one of these days, rather like Oliver Wendell Holmes' wonderful one-hoss shay. The one-hoss shay, it will be recalled, was built in such a logical way, it ran a hundred years to the day. But it went to pieces all at once—all at once, and nothing first, just as bubbles do when they burst..."

Both Nixon and Alsop temper their warnings with optimism, declaring their belief that the United States will weather the storm.

But Time magazine asks, "If there really is an inexorable process that dooms civilizations,

can Richard Nixon—or any President—halt it?"

Time's question—whether any President can halt an inexorable process that destroys civilizations—deserves a comment. An inexorable process, by definition, is irreversible.

But who said that the process was "inexorable"? President Nixon did not.

The history of nations tells us that change can and does occur when the people want it to. The President cannot bring this about, but the people can.

England, in the 18th century, was corrupt and immoral. So was France. But John and Charles Wesley, beginning in 1739 and continuing throughout their lives, turned the hearts of the English to God. There was a great revival and many lives were completely changed. The change was so remarkable and widespread that it affected the entire course of British history.

There was no such revival in France. Instead, there was a bloody revolution. In the name of "liberty, equality, brotherhood"—high-sounding words—many heads rolled in the dust.

Spiritual Values

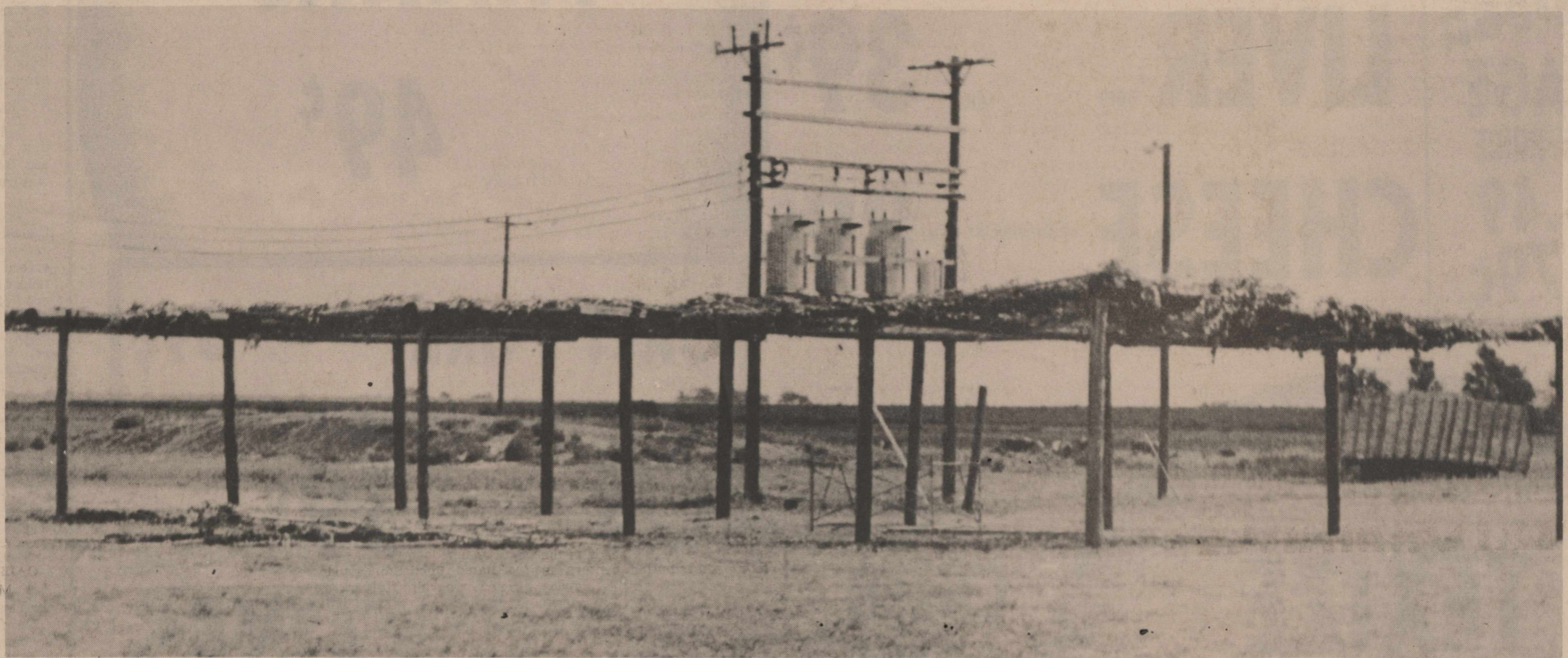
President Nixon has pointed out the primary importance of moral and spiritual values as determining the course that our nation will take.

Isaiah, a long time ago, speaking to his own people, put it like this:

"Put away the evil of your doings from before mine eyes.... Come now and let us reason together, saith the Lord.... If ye be willing and obedient, ye shall eat the good of the land. But if ye refuse and rebel, ye shall be devoured with the sword."

It is time for us again to emphasize the great spiritual truths which guided our forefathers.

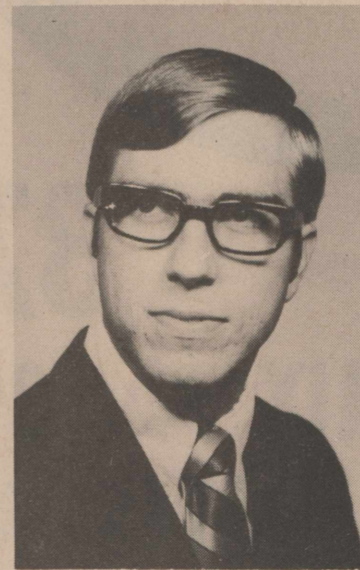

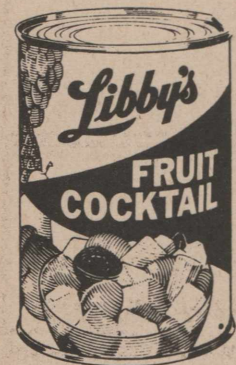
