The last lap was from Santander, Spain, and was more difficult than any other because they encountered cyclone headwinds that sometimes reduced their speed to between 25 and 30 miles an hour.

Single Measure Engages Senate

Non-Appropriation Bill Would Limit Per Capita Apportionment Of Scholarships At \$16

AUSTIN, July 10. (AP)—The non-appropriation bill submitted to the lawmakers by Governor Moody, a measure by Senator Walter Woodward of Coleman fixing the per capita apportionment of scholarships at \$16, engaged the senate today.

While the higher legislative branch was voting down an attempt of Senator Julian Greer of Athens to set the apportionment at \$18 and was considering working provisions of the bill, the house heard Representative John Wallace, chairman of the appropriations committee, detail phases of the house departmental bill calling for \$12,250,000 to care for state departments during the next two years.

The appointment measure was submitted, Governor Moody told the legislature, because of provisions in the appropriation law by which officers in 1925 which rendered it subject to a possible successful attack as to its constitutionality.

The senate refused to concur in amendments to the rural aid and a free conference committee will begin the task of adjusting the differences. The senate bill provides that state aid for the upkeep of financially weak schools shall be administered over a period of six and one-half months and the house will set the term at six months.

8,000,000 In New Currency Released

DALLAS, July 10. (AP)—Eight million dollars in the new currency released today by the treasury department has been placed in circulation by the Dallas Federal Reserve bank, officials said.

There was a great demand for the new money at banks here, officials estimating 90 per cent of their patrons requested that their checks be honored with the smaller bills. They noted their initial supply would soon be exhausted.

Entertains Women On Others' Money

Dallas Youth Is Held In Chicago For Number Of Worthless Check Charges And Is Caught In Trap

CHICAGO, July 10. (AP)—An extensive career entertaining women at the expense of bank accounts not his own was confessed today by Thomas Seymour Botts, 28, Houston, Texas, as the reason for his being in jail here.

Botts, who said he is a son of Thomas H. Botts, general counsel for the Southern Pacific railroad, is held on numerous worthless check charges. He was arrested in offices of the H. C. Stone company after a police trap was set for him.

His divorced wife, Botts said, started him on the downward path when she left him a year ago. She was the daughter of the president of the Cross Central Petroleum company of Texas, he said.

"After the divorce I just roamed around," Botts told police. "I met lots of girls and had to spend a lot of money. I had to cash checks to show them a good time. On the train coming to Chicago from New York I met a most fascinating girl. I was quite taken up with her, and I cashed more checks to show her a good time."

Botts said he was a graduate of the University of Texas and had attended the Allen Military Academy at Bryan, Texas.

Hanging Claim Of De Priest Denied

Interview With Pioneer Citizens Said To Refute Charges Made By Negro Congressman Recently

FLORENCE, Ala., July 10. (AP)—The Florence Times-News today published a series of interviews with pioneer residents of Lauderdale county which it contends refuted charges recently made in Cleveland, O., by Oscar De Priest, negro congressman from Chicago, that he witnessed the lynching of three negroes in Florence shortly before oppression by white persons forced the removal of his parents to Kansas.

J. J. Mitchell, former probate judge of Lauderdale county said three white robbers were lynched near Florence in 1872, six years before the date De Priest said his family removed to Kansas. C. H. Price, superintendent of the municipal sanitary department, said only one negro had been lynched in Lauderdale county. Price identified the victim as George Ware who killed a white youth for robbery. The date of the lynching was fixed by Price as the year after the De Priest family left Alabama.

Mrs. T. B. Ingram, daughter of a former owner of Congressman De Priest's mother while she was a slave, declared the De Priest family was well liked and denied they ever had been persecuted. She did not recall the lynching of any negroes while the congressman's family resided here.

SEEK COMMUTATION Would Change Sentence To Life Imprisonment

AUSTIN, July 10. (AP)—A report to the board of pardons on the application of Harry J. Leahy, slated to die in the electric chair Friday for commutation of the sentence to life imprisonment was in the hands of Governor Moody today. The nature of the report was not divulged.

Leahy was convicted of the murder of Dr. J. A. Ramsey of Mahan.

WASHINGTON, July 10. (AP)—Two boys were held by Washington police today because one of them wanted to gain entrance to Annapolis Naval academy but was found to be color blind.

Henry Sherwin Rupp, son of a Long Beach, Calif., business man, was named as a candidate for the academy after he passed examinations given by the U. S. Naval reserve, of which he was a member from California.

Given High Rating He was given a high rating on his mental examination but "flunked out" on his physical examination.

Two days ago. Color blindness was given as the cause.

Permission for re-examination was requested of the navy department and was granted. A youth representing himself as Rupp passed this test. Naval officers could not understand how a candidate adjudged color blind 48 hours earlier could pass the examination, so they started questioning.

The boy who was not color blind, they said, readily admitted he was Paul Schooler of Washington, and told police he had been retained to take the examination for fifteen dollars.

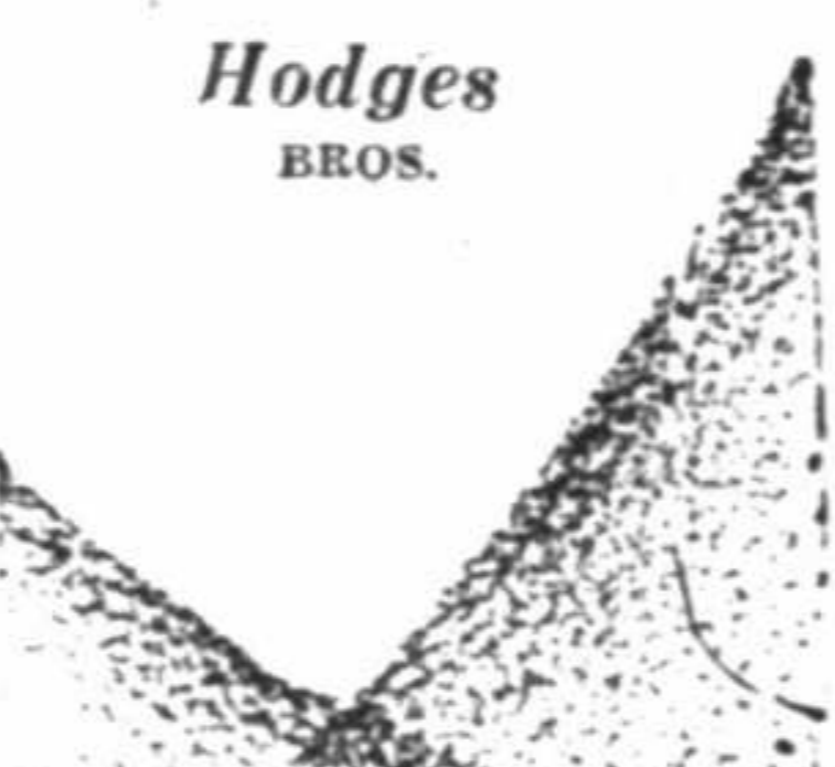

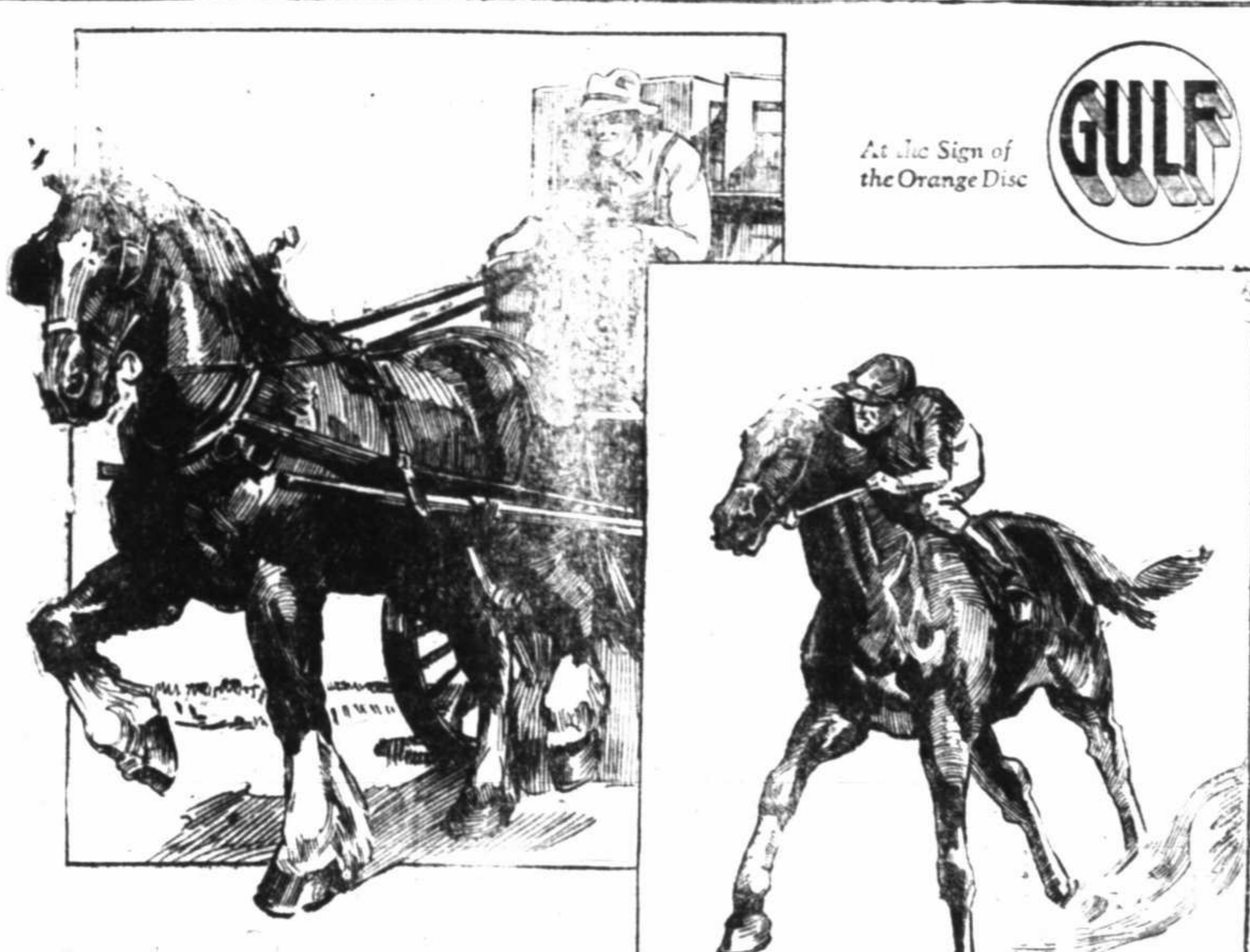

A FLOUR MILL-IF WE WANT IT

In Wednesday's Avalanche mention was made of Lubbock's need of industrial plants. Suggestion was made that the time has arrived for definite thinking and planning on the part of Lubbock's chamber of commerce, to secure additional factories here, and that the time is also propitious for other South Plains cities to do likewise.

Following these suggestions, this question is now raised: What is keeping Lubbock from having a flour mill?

And, at once an answer is hastened. Only the lack of a sincere desire, on the part of Lubbock, for a flour mill.

There can be no other thing that keeps this city from having a modern flour mill. We are in the wheat belt. Whether or not we are so situated does not matter, because there are many great mills situated hundreds of miles from where wheat is produced.

Lubbock has necessary transportation facilities. There is ample vacant land available on trackage. We have the power and labor. We have the money, too, and can employ the brains it takes to operate such an establishment.

There is sufficient territory reached by this city, as a distributing point, to consume all the possible output any large mill could make. Where else can the obstacle be, except in our own lethargy?

We might as well be frank. If we wanted a flour mill strong enough, we would have it. If we do want one, we can yet get it. The only thing in the way is to make up our minds to it.

This may be an abstract way to put it. It's the truth, nevertheless. Talk has been heard for many months to the effect that Lubbock needs such a mill.

When we needed a hotel, what was done? We went after it, and got it. The need is not so very vital, as that for a modern hotel, yet is a need. What are we going to do about it?

Will the Board of City Development, at its meeting Friday morning, consider this need? We hope they will. We hope they will not only talk flour mill, but that they will show the old-time Lubbock spirit, set definite aim and say: "We want a flour mill."

If this is done, then somebody will be put to work, immediately. The campaign will turn into a campaign. The campaign will result in a flour mill. Perhaps two, or more.

WHY THE ALLEY?

Who sold the American public on the idea of the alley? Some people who can think as they are thinking about the alley, they are bringing the alley under suspicion, and they are showing that, by and large, the alley has been more of a nuisance than a convenience.

For a long time the alley has been falling into disrepute. As an adjective, the word alley invariably brings reproach. The alley cat has no standing among cats. For sundry good reasons, even the mention of an alley has come to suggest disorder and unsightliness. The fact that many communities maintain orderly, cleanly alleys has not rescued the word from its unwholesome associations.

So people who can think are beginning to ask: "What is the sense of having every row of houses served by one big street and one little one?" And further thinking leads to the question: "Why should a row of houses have adorned and beautiful fronts and ugly unsightly backs?"

In Radburn, N. J., some thoughtful people have been trying to construct an ideal community, and they have found sensible answers to some of these questions. "Streets are for automobiles," they said, "and sidewalks for pedestrians, but why should the two be together?" They found no good reason but many reasons for separating the two as far as possible.

So in Radburn they moved the sidewalks to the rear of the houses, to the far side from the motor car street. Maybe this will result in the perking up of both sides of the houses so that there will be no front and back. At any rate it is sure to save the lives of a lot of children.

PHILOSPHY IN WEDLOCK

The age-old conflict between idealism and practicality is staged in a modern setting as a result of curious divorce proceedings instituted in a New York court.

Because he is solely interested in the ideal, as opposed to the material side of life, the husband is being sued for formal separation and \$40 a week alimony. The wife craves common sense.

But, before passing judgment, listen to the husband's side of the story.

"My life has been composed entirely of study. I have developed strong intellectual habits and interests. I concede that I am rather impractical, and yet one would not expect me to be otherwise. It is difficult for me to explain to the court just how I came to marry the plaintiff. I do not know what possessed me at the time."

And that frank statement in our opinion makes it extremely difficult to pass judgment upon the case. On the one side, we have a woman who rightly expects a certain amount of worldly interest from her spouse. On the other side, we have a man who has rather definitely, and not dishonorably, hitched his wagon to the stars.

Doubtless we should have done precisely what the Justice did—reserve decision.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

UNEASY LIES THE HEAD THAT WEARS THE PROHIBITION CZAR'S CROWN BY CHARLES P. STEWART

ASHINGTON, July 10.—Uneasy lies the head that wears the dry czar's crown.

What does it matter to Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Seymour Lowman, who has been wearing it for nearly a couple of years now (and that's a long time for a dry reign), whether he is on the point of being deprived of his crown or having his realm yanked out from under him?

One way will make him just as much an ex-czar as the other.

It is officially denied that Czar Lowman has been given a limited number of days or weeks to abdicate.

Generally official denials are at a heavy discount but this one has an air of verisimilitude—because President Hoover is known to believe that little can be accomplished by a mere changing of dry czars—that the present system of so-called prohibition is wrong fundamentally—that the country can be made drier without any specifically designated dry czarism.

One of the issues upon which Mr. Hoover may almost be said to have campaigned for president was his plan to re-organize and consolidate all the activities of the executive branch of the government.

This plan included the concentration of its prohibition activities in the attorney general's department.

It is a big undertaking and the president probably did not necessarily intend to begin with prohibition enforcement—which is included in it. Indications are that he has since decided it will be best to start with that start soon and get it out of the way as speedily as possible—in-as-much as it is becoming evident he will not get a minute's peace in the meantime otherwise.

Perhaps ex-Czar Lowman will then be permitted to remain as assistant secretary of the treasury, in charge of customs and the coast guard, but he will have nothing further to do with prohibition.

However, President Hoover's first step must be to ask congress to authorize the proposed reorganization.

Congress may balk. Dries as well as wets are divided on the subject. If anything, the wets are more favorable than the dries to the presidential program.

What will its effect be? The dries have their own sort of personnel already pretty well installed in the treasury department. Will the justice department be equally manageable? Will it improve on the treasury department's efficiency—or will it regard the dry law as just one law among many to be enforced? Will it shun the spectacular? If so will that mean that prohibition is accepted at last—or that it rapidly in the process of being forgotten? On the other hand, will the justice department simply intensify the treasury's ballyhoo—and who will benefit?

It is not easy to see how enforcement activities can very well be conducted exclusively by the attorney general anyway.

He can prosecute law violators—but can he catch them?—to prosecute.

The treasury staff of inland sleuths can be turned over to his jurisdiction, yes. But not the coast guard. Not the customs border patrol. These forces must stay under treasury supervision.

How about the labor department's anti-alien smuggling staff? There has been considerable recent talk of enlisting the marine corps to assist in the enforcement of the law.

The commerce department is suggested as the proper authority to superintend releases of industrial alcohol.

It is easy to propose consolidation; maybe not so easy to consolidate. A glance at prohibition's past may be enlightening.

In pre-Prohibition days, as everybody doubtless is aware, the treasury department was interested in intoxicants solely for purposes of taxation. From having fought moonshining on a small scale and a very little smuggling—it inherited the job of dry enforcement.

David F. Houston was President Wilson's secretary of the treasury then, but prohibition was no such nightmare to him as it became under Secretary Andrew W. Mellon, his successor.

Prohibition's best friends in Washington do not dispute that America has yet to find its first efficient dry law enforcement administration.

The president, Hoover wants to get to the bottom of the system itself, with a view to putting it on a working basis, is the generally accepted theory in the capital.

He will not do it without vigorous opposition in congress, however—and by no means all of it will come from wet sources.

Your Health

PERSPIRING ON HOT DAYS HELPS TO MAKE YOU FEEL COOL

When one becomes overheated for any reason whatever, moisture appears on the surface of the body and the evaporation of this moisture tends to lower the temperature of the surface.

For many years it has been thought that one of the chief purposes of perspiration was to rid the body of poisonous material. Among oriental people sweat baths are regularly employed as a means of keeping the body in good physical condition.

In order to determine exactly what the condition of perspiration may be investigators in the Presbyterian Hospital in Philadelphia made a collection of perspiration from people with various diseases and have analyzed it chemically.

When perspiration first appears, it is slightly more acid in its reaction than that which appears later. This is probably due to the attempts of the body to maintain its normal reaction under various circumstances. Thereafter the perspiration contains more alkaline material, as can be determined by measuring the reaction of perspiration protected from the air.

Because heat treatment is frequently used in such diseases as inflammations of the joints and in rheumatic disorders, special efforts were made to find out whether the perspiration contains any different substances under these conditions. It was found, however, that the perspiration does not change during attacks of arthritis or rheumatism.

In the case of Bright's disease or disturbance of the kidneys, it was found that the perspiration does contain more protein material in the form of nitrogenous products than under normal conditions. This, of course, explains the value of sweat baths in uremia or in cases which the kidneys are disabled by infection and inflammation.

Perspiration consists largely of fluid with some fat and fatty acids and some protein materials, as well as a small amount of mineral salts. The human body is a marvelous mechanism, tending largely to self-regulation, and the studies that have been made of perspiration indicate another method by which it maintains its physical equilibrium.

The figure is the same contained in the bill vetoed by Governor Moody Monday when the chief executive sent all appropriations back to the legislature for adjustment.

Funds for acquiring the property would be spent under direction of a commission of three appointed by the governor.

HAMILTON SHOT IN DUEL

ON July 11, 1804 Aaron Burr, vice president of the United States, and Alexander Hamilton, the famous statesman fought a duel in which Hamilton was mortally wounded.

Because Hamilton had prevented Burr from being made president, Burr challenged Hamilton. The latter feeling that by refusing to acknowledge the accepted code of which he strongly disapproved, he would lose his influence, accepted.

The duel took place at Weehawken, N. J., and Hamilton fell mortally wounded, at the first firing, having it is said discharged his own weapon in the air. He died the following day.

Having failed to satisfy his political ambition in the east, Burr got together soldiers and adventurers from the western states and sailed down the Ohio and the Mississippi rivers to carry out some schemes not fully understood. It is thought that his plan was to establish a personal government in the southwest, possibly including the Spanish possessions in Mexico. In due time he was taken and tried for treason, but was acquitted for lack of evidence. He died in disgrace.

TO "DEPISTOLIZE"

Police Ask That Public Be Disarmed in Mexico

MEXICO CITY, July 10.—Chieftain of Police Valente Quintana has asked President Portes Gil for authority to "depiistolize" Mexico City.

He would deprive the inhabitants of their right to carry pistols, knives or other weapons, a privilege the public in general has not failed to take advantage of.

First offenders would be relieved of their weapons, second offenders deprived of their weapons and fined and third offenders given a 30 days jail sentence.

NOMINATION ASKED

Resolution Wants Houston Man On Farm Board

MUNDAY, Tex., July 10.—A resolution urging President Hoover to name E. A. Calvin, Houston, on the federal farm board, was adopted here today by the Farmers' Co-operative and Educational Union of Texas in annual session. The resolution was telegraphed to the president.

Board Members To Meet With Hoover

WASHINGTON, July 10.—Three members of the federal farm board are expected to arrive in Washington by Friday, and President Hoover is planning to take them to his Virginia fishing preserve for the week-end.

They are Alexander H. Legge, chairman of the board; James C. Stone, vice chairman, and Carl Williams, of Oklahoma City, who will represent the cotton growers.

The problem of moving the wheat crop in the southwest was discussed with President Hoover today by Chairman O'Connor of the shipping board.

To facilitate exportation of grain through gulf ports 25 vessels of the shipping board are being held in reserve and two of these have already been allocated to Galveston, Texas.

Hernandez, West At San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO, July 10.—Raymond J. West and Tomas Hernandez, convicted last Wednesday of choking to death Harry Williams, newspaper reporter, and throwing his body into the Rio Grande, were held in the Bexar county jail today.

The men were spirited out of Laredo yesterday and brought here in an automobile by Laredo officers. West is under a life sentence, and Hernandez faces 20 years in the penitentiary.

Appeals to the criminal court of appeals are pending.

Sheriff Joe Condrum who brought them here said the Laredo jail was one too sanitary or safe, and he simply brought them here as a precautionary measure. He said he did not believe West or Hernandez, both of whom were former Laredo peace officers, would have tried to escape, but Laredo was in a state of excitement over the affair and the prisoners had many friends there.

FURLOUGHS GRANTED

Moody Allows Prisoners To See Destitute Families

AUSTIN, July 10.—Governor Moody today granted furloughs to three prisoners in the state penitentiary in order that they might visit their destitute families.

J. J. Goats, under 10 year sentence for felonious theft, was granted a sixty day furlough and Dennis Hutson, sentenced to three years for violation of the prohibition law, was allowed 40 days freedom.

A. C. Bowles, sentenced to four years for burglary and theft, was granted a ten day furlough to visit his wife who is at the point of death in Waco.

John Herron White of Borger, charged with forging the signature to a waiver citation in a divorce suit, was expressed today in passage by the house of a resolution offered by Rep. Ray Holder of Lancaster and Polk Monday of Harington. The vote was 70 to 5.

Action on the part of the house came after an explanation by Representative White of circumstances surrounding the charge. White declared the complaint was preferred by District Attorney John A. Holmes because the prosecutor was angered at White's refusal to sponsor a bill allowing the district attorney two special investigators.

Two Hutchinson county grand jurors returned no-bills after investigating the case. Representative White told the house.

Representative A. P. C. Petch of Fredericksburg opposed the resolution with the assertion the house should not take part in a local controversy.

Hundreds of acres of wheat and corn land and a few farm houses also were hit by the flood.

Pro Officers Are Taken From Jail

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 10 (AP)—W. W. Thomas, federal prohibition agent for Pottawatomie county, and his three unofficial aides, Jeff B. Harris, Tom Little and John D. Williams, charged with murder in connection with the deaths of two farmers in a raid last Thursday were removed from the county jail here today by Frank Stewart, Pottawatomie county sheriff.

Stewart announced he was returning the prisoners to Tecumseh to be held there pending a preliminary hearing Saturday.

The four men are charged with the death of James Harris, farmer of near Tecumseh and a world war veteran, who was killed when his farm was raided. Jeff Harris faces a second murder charge in connection with the slaying of Oscar Lowery, brother-in-law of James Harris, wounded fatally in the raid. Lowery, too, was a veteran of the world war.

DECLARED GUILTY

Pete Combine Sentenced To Fifteen Years In Pen

GALVESTON, July 10 (AP)—Pete Combine was found guilty by a jury here today of slaying Paul Kreider, a long-shoreman on September 5, last, and his punishment was fixed at 15 years in the penitentiary. The jury had been out since last night.

Bandit Meets His Death Wednesday

Attempt To Escape From Detachment Of Federal Troops Proves Fatal For Martin Guzman

MEXICO CITY, July 10 (AP)—Martin Guzman, who for years terrorized travelers on the road from Mexico City to Puebla as head of a band of highwaymen, has met death while trying to escape after falling into the hands of a detachment of federal troops, according to a war department announcement.

Guzman was captured alone, in a village not far from Puebla, and offered to take his captors to the place where his followers were hidden. Accordingly, he led them to a lonely spot in the mountains and into an ambush.

Taking advantage of the confusion into which the unexpected attack had thrown his captors, Guzman fled and joined his men. But the federalists rallied and after a fight lasting more than an hour succeeded in dispersing the bandits.

Among several bodies abandoned by the highwaymen was that of Guzman, their leader.

SAILS FOR EUROPE

Gonzales Will Be Special Envoy To Congress

MEXICO CITY, July 10 (AP)—A dispatch to Excelator from Vera Cruz says Constantino Gonzales, called for Europe as special envoy of the Nicaraguan Rebel Chief Augusto Sandino to the second world congress of the anti-imperialistic league, to be held in Frankfurt.

Gonzales carried credentials signed by Sandino, who now is in Mexico, and was empowered to express to the congress his chief's views on the presence of American marines in Nicaragua.

LOWERY IN CONTEST

Yoder Field Fliers To Aid Airport Dedication

SNYDER, July 10.—Pilot "Slim" Lowry of Yoder Field here will enter the contests at the Graham Airport dedication, Saturday and Sunday. Mr. Lowry who is establishing a flying school here will fly a three-seated Curtis-Robin monoplane to the opening of the new airport as well as a good-will expression from the local landing field and airport.

TAT Passengers Double In Month

PORT WORTH, July 10.—More than twice as many passengers flew over the line of the T. A. T. Flying Service Inc. during the past month as during the month of May. This fact is shown by a comparison of the operation reports of the two months.

During May, 225 passengers were carried; during June 562 used the passenger lines. More than 81,000 miles were flown over the four Texas passenger lines during June, three of which maintained an efficiency of 100 per cent.

The four lines operated are as follows: San Antonio to Brownsville, via Corpus Christi; Dallas to El Paso, via Fort Worth, Abilene, Sweetwater, Big Spring and Midland; Fort Worth to San Antonio, via Dallas, Waco and Austin; and Fort Worth to Houston via Waco.

The June total in mileage brings the total miles flown by the subsidiaries of the Southern Air Transport to a million and a half mark, all without injury to pilot, passengers or personnel and without the loss of a single piece of mail.

Air Traffic Fare Given Reduction

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 10.—Two drastic reductions in air traffic rates on two divisions of the Braniff-Universal Airlines were announced today when the fare between Oklahoma City and Tulsa was cut to \$9 and the fare between Oklahoma City and Wichita Falls was cut to \$10.

The previous rates were \$11 and \$12 respectively. This is the second such reduction on these two divisions within the last month, officials pointed out.

The cuts will not affect through fares on the system, however, according to Paul Braniff, executive vice-president, who also stated that such cuts were only possible through the tremendous increase in traffic volume which has taken place within the last three months. Company statistics show an increase of over 50 per cent monthly.
