## Group unhappy with proposal

# Redistricting plan tentatively approved

Commissioners met Tuesday morning and tentatively approved Proposal B to redistrict Mitchell County precincts.

Oscar Ortiz and Esther Goss, of the redistricting committee, expressed objections to the proposal at the public meeting.

Ortiz noted that "the proposal by the Austin firm is unacceptable."

The firm of Bickerstaff, Heath & Smiley of Austin, which was hired to propose a county redistricting plan have submitted two proposals.

The first, Proposal A, was a preliminary proposal made by the company.

After collecting more data and using comments from a public meeting, J. Greg Hudson of the

firm, went back to the computer and came up with Proposal B, which has been in the hands of commissioners and committee members for the past three weeks.

Under Proposal B, Precinct 2 would have a minority level of 45 percent, 40 percent of the precinct would be Hispanic.

Hudson explained that his firm considers four main priorities that the Justice Department uses as guidelines in proposing a redistricting plan.

These four include: that roughly equal populations are represented in each precinct, the impact on minorities, road mileage in each of the precincts, and an attempt is made to keep voters from being

confused about precinct lines. Ortiz noted that he wants a district with a hispanic population close to 65 percent.

"Proposal B is hardly any different than the current plan," Ortiz said. "Proposal A just divided the county into 4 sections and Proposal B is about the same thing, it hasn't accomplished anything."

Ortiz requested an extension from the Court in order for the Committee to review a plan that Southwest Voters Registration and Education Project, which is working with the committee, is expected to present to the committee next week.

Commissioner Bill Preston noted that this was the third request

for an extension.

"My suggestion is that if there is a plan and it is complete, that we post a meeting for Friday," Preston said. "If not I propose we tentatively adopt the proposal before us."

Ortiz said that it would be next week before they could get a proposal to the commissioners.

"You can approve Proposal B if you want," Ortiz said. "It still has to be approved by the Justice Department and will be met with objections."

Commissioners noted that after approving a proposal, a lot of work remains.

The tentative approval of Proposal B enables the Courts

lawyers to begin writing the legal descriptions of the county precinct, a process expected to take between two to three weeks, which must be included with the proposal to the Justice Department.

"I realize what you've got to work with and what needs to be done," Ortiz said. "I understand the time factor, but my concern is more than that, we will be living with an approved plan until the next census."

Ortiz and Goss noted that representatives of Southwest Voters Registration and Education Project are presently in Houston attending a state-wide conference.

## Budget workshops begin

Commissioners met Monday in a called meeting to begin a series of budget workshops.

Budget requests are itemized lists which include any maintenance contracts, equipment, office furniture, office supplies, vehicles and salaries requested by a department head to maintain the operation of county functions for the 1992 fiscal year.

Margret Trulock met before commissioners to explain how County funds are being used at the Wallace Center.

"The Wallace Center is not just a senior citizen center," Mrs. Trulock explained. "It is a community education building."

Mrs. Trulock said GED, English as a Second Language, and adult vocational programs in such areas as welding, mechanics, computers and typing.

The Wallace Center also offers blood pressure testing, social security visits, a summer program for children, as well as gymnastics, fabric, defensive driving, weight-

## Cotton referendum set July 17-26

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) will conduct a cotton referendum July 17-26, in cooperation with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). Cotton producers and importers will vote on amendments to the Cotton Research Promotion Order.

The USDA amendments call for importer representation on the Cotton Board; assessing imported

cotton and cotton products, as is done with domestic cotton; increasing from \$200,000 to \$300,000 the amount the Cotton Board can reimburse the Secretary of Agriculture for expenses incurred in conducting a referendum; reimbursing government agencies which assist in collecting fees on imported cotton cotton products; and, terminating the right of producers to demand a refund of

assessments. "Voters may hand-deliver ballots to our polling places, said ASCS official Don E. Stewart, "or mail them, postmarked by midnight July 26." Eligible producers not receiving ballots should contact their local ASCS office. Eligible importers who have not received ballots may obtain them from USDA, ASCS, Attention: Cotton, See COTTON, page 2

## Sales tax rebate up for county

State Comptroller John Sharp sent sales tax rebate checks out Friday that totaled \$98 million to 1065 Texas cities and counties.

The July checks include taxes collected on May sales and reported in June by businesses filing monthly sales tax returns with the state and represent a rebate increase of 12 percent to Texas cities and 21 percent to counties.

Mitchell County received a check in the amount of 26,507.05, up from last years 25,659.37 for the same reporting period last year to post a gain of 3.3 percent.

For the year to date, Mitchell County has received checks totaling 209,758.89, a decrease of .31 percent from last years payments to date of 210,412.99

Colorado City received a payment this month of 24,941.02, a .04 percent increase over last year's 24,931.53.

On year to date, Colorado City checks are down 1.78 percent to 198,957.33 for the year as compared to 202,566.12 in 1990.

Loraine received a check for 725.27 this month. It did not receive a check for the same period last year.

Loraine's year to date total is up 99.94 percent to 6,892.25 from 1990's 3,447.23 for the same period.

Westbrook received a monthly check of 840.76, a 15.51 percent increase over last years monthly check of 727.84.

For the year to date, Westbrook checks are 11.14 percent behind last years. Checks have been issued for 3,909.31 this year and totaled 4,399.64 at the same time last year.

In the surrounding area, Howard, Nolan, and Scurry all posted increases in rebate checks.

Howard County posted a 168.37 percent increase, receiving 223,079.03 this year compared to 83,122.16 last year.

The year to date total is running 110.18 percent over last year with checks to date totaling 1,761,626.20 over last years 838,149.68.

Big Spring posted a gain of 172.57 percent over last year with a check of 216,860.31, up from the prior year check of 79,560.43.

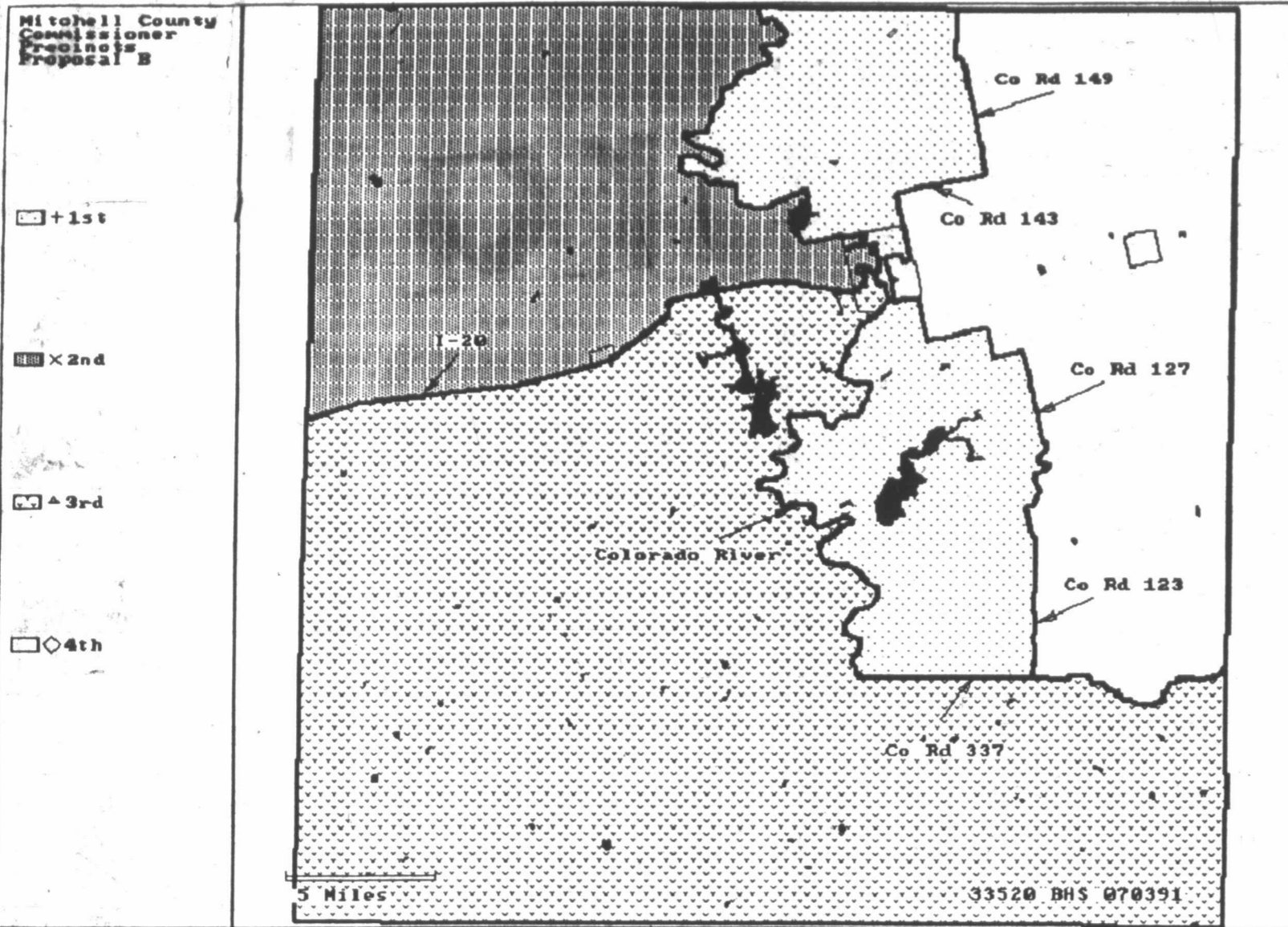
The year to date total is at 1,719,237.92, up 113.52 percent over last years 805,185.26.

Nolan County gains were listed as 131.27 percent for the same period and 103.82 percent for the year.

This month, Nolan County received a check for 110,528.46 compared to last years 47,791.79 which brought year to date totals to 849,410.63 for 1991 compared to 416,751.40 for 1990.

Sweetwater posted a 136.05 percent gain, jumping from last years 46,262.56 to this years 109,203.50. Year to date figures are ahead by 108.34 percent to 833,455.64 from the prior years

get a Hispanic elected," Ortiz noted. "It is still like an at-large election." Ortiz predicted that the plan will not pass Justice Department approval because of the minority concentrations in the proposal. The commissioners noted that they did not, by tentatively approving the proposal, stop future proposals from being considered. "We will submit a plan to the commissioners and to the Justice Department, who has to approve any plan," Ortiz said.

After the meeting with commissioners, Ortiz said that "we had to fight for representation on the City Council and the School Board and are facing the same kind of logic we faced with the school board and city council. Ortiz noted that it "probably means another legal battle." County Judge Ray Mayo and Commissioners Ed Roach, Carl Guelker, Buddy Hertenberger, and Bill Preston were all in attendance at the meeting.

**Sadowski announces bid for congressional seat**

Republican Beverly Jean Sadowski of Eastland announced Saturday that she will be a candidate for the 17th District congressional seat held by Democratic Representative Charles Stenholm. At an Abilene news conference Sadowski noted that a U. S. Representative should be a representative of the people and added that she believes the present congressman does not represent the citizens of the 17th District. Sadowski cited Stenholm's vote on the constitutional amendment dealing with the U. S. flag and said she has become increasingly concerned over some political issues and was motivated to step

out and try to do something. She is an ordained minister and currently director of Texas Home Missions for the Apostolic Church of Jesus Christ. The candidate and her husband, Dr. D. P. Sadowski, operate two full-time offices and work out of two hospitals. They are certified with the State Board of Examiners in the fitting and dispensing of hearing aids. Sadowski is a graduate of Breckenridge High School, and attended Texas Bible College in Houston and Tarrant County Junior College in Fort Worth. The election will be held in 1992.

**Junnell recognized for work on Bill 112**

Austin--The Texas Council of Community Mental Health and Mental Retardation Centers recognized Representative Robert Junnell (D-San Angelo) Thursday for his work in helping pass Senate Bill 112. Senator Mike Moncrief (D-Fort Worth), the author of the bill, and Representative Bruce Gibson (D-Cleburne), a cosponsor, were also honored for their work on the bill. Governor Ann Richards was on hand for a mock signing of the bill. She praised the lawmakers along with the MHMR Board of Trustees

for their work in providing valuable MHMR services to all parts of the state. Senate Bill 112 establishes guidelines for local community centers which operate MHMR services. It will strengthen the relationship between community centers and the TDMHMR. The bill defines the areas of accountability and serves as an ethics plan for mental health and mental retardation services. "I have always been very interested in the TDMHMR. With both the San Angelo State School and the Concho Valley Center for Human Advancement in my district, mental health and mental

retardation issues have been in the forefront of my legislative agenda. I was glad to help in sponsoring the legislation" Junnell said, "and I am honored by my selection for such an award."

Marshall's for the July the 4th parade were L. B. Elliott and Floyd Shepherd, who represented WWI veterans in the parade. The two men are the last remaining World War I veterans of Colorado City.

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## CHIEF LONE WOLF

So, as we were saying last week, Jim (Lane) Cook, top cowhand at the Long F Ranch, got the herd to Colorado City, Ranch owner Captain O.J. Wiren (a multi-millionaire in today's money) told Lane to celebrate by having the biggest blow out Colorado City had ever had.

The blast was to be held at Jake's Restaurant, "the largest and finest in Colorado City at that time," (1884). Captain Wiren wasn't content to just fete his own cowhands.

"Boys, I want to treat every cowboy that comes into this restaurant tonight; so you cowboys call them up as they come in and tell them toe at all night, that I am paying for everything that a cowboy orders, eats or drinks all night."

Then Wiren added for everyone to hear, "This damned town belongs tonight to Texas cowboys and Jim Lane is their captain."

Lane says quite simply, "We took over Jake's Restaurant." Jake Maurer had to put on extra help to accommodate the overflow of customers. The restaurant stayed open all night.

"I fed every human being that came into that restaurant from sundown until sunup next morning," Lane wrote in his book, "Lane of the Llano."

Needless to say the thirsty cowboys were not sipping ale. Lane says Wiren was a great drinker and at one point during the evening he called out to everyone in the house that the drinks were on him. He then pulled handful after handful of drink checks out of his pocket.

The watchful bartender inspected each one of the tokens, then informed Wiren, "O.J., there is not one of these drink on this saloon."

Lane says his boss probably had picked up the checks all the way from San Francisco to New York. The party continued late into the night and early morning hours, but Wiren checked out at midnight.

"He could not keep up with us boys," Lane boasted.

The real fun started with one hundred cowboys, all on horseback, lined up in front of Jake's Restaurant. Again the words of Jim Lane;

"I had seen the sheriff and city marshal and asked their permission to serenade the city on horseback. I had sent two cowboys through town, to yell out that more than a hundred wild Texas cowboys were in town drunk and a fight between them was expected any moment and everyone in town had better hide out.

"The St. James Hotel in Colorado City was full of Easter dudes. They almost got to fighting among themselves for the best hiding places. Many of the town people took to the country.

"The night was dark and the fire flashing from more than a hundred six-shooters mixed with the sounds of shots and their echo from the bluff across the river, the clatter of our horses feet on the ground and the wild cowboys yells.

"More than one hundred cowboys were running through the town at full speed on horseback."

And Lane says the cowboys were putting on a show, pretending to be wounded or dying. Loose horses with empty saddles were racing about in the darkness which helped to convince onlookers that the cowboys were in fact killing each other.

"After about an hour, the fight was over; A loud call, 'Go for a doctor, quick.' Mingled with the pitiful groans of the wounded and dying cowboys was the loud cry, 'Nurses, Nurse.'

"Every cellar or other place of safety was packed jamfull of refugees," Lane said.

And the next day, "not a soul showed up on the streets until the sun was an hour high.

"Calls were sent out by wire for doctors and nurses, rangers and soldiers. Special trains were rushed in to take care of the situation. When the sun peeped up, there was not a cowboy in town. All had departed for their cattle ranches, to sober up.

"The Texas Rangers came in about noon and got most all people out of hiding, brushed the cobwebs off them, made a thorough investigation over the town."

## DPS reports only seven July Fourth fatalities

AUSTIN -- Fewer persons were killed in traffic accidents in Texas during the July 4th holiday period than at any time since at least 1970, according to preliminary figures released by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"While we regret that we had seven fatalities in Texas during the 30-hour July 4th holiday period, we were pleased to see that we fell short of our estimate that 12 persons would die on Texas' streets and highways during the holiday," said DPS Assistant Director Lt. Col. James Wilson.

The previous lowest July 4th traffic death count was in 1973, when 9 persons died during the 30-hour holiday period. Four others later died of injuries, pushing the final total to 13 deaths that year.

"Of the seven deaths reported this July 4th," Wilson said, "three were in motorcycle accidents, two in auto-pedestrian accidents and two in vehicle accidents. In both the

vehicle accidents, the victim had not been wearing a safety belt. The count might have been even lower if they had been buckled up."

All available Highway Patrol Troopers were on the roadways during the holiday period, which Wilson said may have discouraged drunken driving and speeding, the two leading causes of traffic deaths.

"Texas motorists also deserve our thanks for helping make it a safer July 4th," Wilson said.

The United States Achievement Academy has announced that Alyssa D. Finley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Landus Finley, has been named a United States National winner in band.

This award is a prestigious honor very few students can ever hope to attain. In fact, the Academy recognizes less than 10 percent of all American high school students.

Finley, who attends Colorado City Middle School was nominated for this National Award by Noel Guerra, band director at the school.

The criteria for selection are a student's academic performance, interest and aptitude, leadership qualities, responsibility, enthusiasm, motivation to learn and improve, citizenship, attitude and cooperative spirit, dependability, and recommendation from a teacher or director.

## Insurance reform bill leads to changes

The insurance reform bill that takes effect September 1 gives new rights to Texas consumers who file insurance claims.

Legislators completed work on the bill in late May, and Governor Ann Richards signed it into law in June.

While most of the 528-page measure deals with regulatory matters, several provisions affect consumers directly and immediately.

**Prompt Payment of Claims**  
An insurance company must acknowledge your claim and start investigating it within 15 days after receiving written notice.

Once you have submitted all requested documentation to prove your loss, the company has another 15 business days to accept or reject the claim.

There are some exceptions to these deadlines, however.

If a company has reason to suspect arson, it has 30 days after receiving the required paperwork to either accept or reject a claim.

A company that cannot meet these deadlines must send you a notice saying why it needs more time. Then it has 45 days to either approve the claim or turn it down.

If a company rejects your claim, it must explain why. If the company agrees to pay the claim, it must send your check or draft within five business days.

If you sue a company for taking longer than 60 days to pay a claim

and win your case, the court can impose an 18 percent penalty plus attorney fees.

In a lawsuit arising from an insurance claim, the insurance company now has the burden of proving it was not obligated to pay the claim.

**Automobile Repairs**  
The new law generally prohibits insurance companies from telling you where to have your car repaired or requiring the garage to use parts of a particular brand, type, age or condition.

The State Board of Insurance received authority to issue rules limiting this right, but any limitation must be accepted in writing by the consumer at the time a policy is purchased.

**Non-Renewal of Policies**  
The right of insurance companies to non-renew fire, homeowners and farm and ranch policies was limited by the reform bill.

Claims resulting from storms and other natural causes may not be used as grounds for non-renewal.

A policy may be non-renewed because of claims only if a policyholder has filed three or more

claims unrelated to natural causes during a three-year period.

Insurance companies, however, received the right to add premium surcharges if a policy-holder filed two or more non-weather claims during the previous policy years.

The State Board of Insurance was directed to decide how large these surcharges may be, up to 10 percent of the preceding year's premium.

Toll-Free Lines

The reform bill directs insurance companies that collect at least \$2 million per year in premiums to install toll-free consumer information and complaint lines. The companies must print their toll-free numbers on their policies.

The SBI is required to expand the information provided through its own toll-free line (1-800-252-3439) to include a company's rating by at least one "nationally recognized rating organization."

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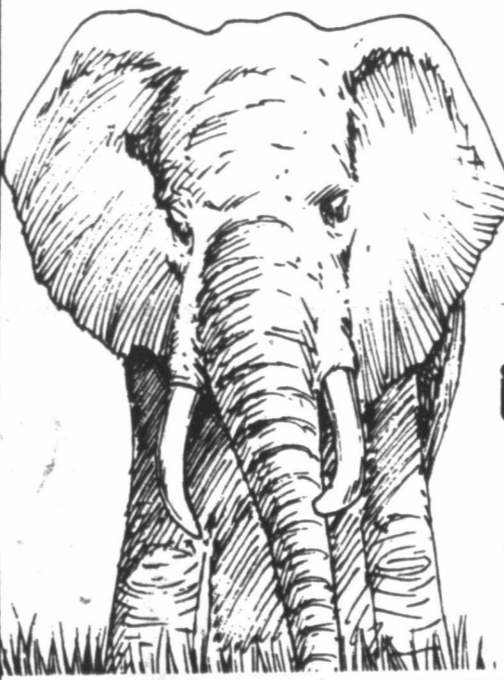
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## School finance bill dependent on election

One of two amendments that voters will be considering on August 10, 1991, could spell doom for the recently passed school finance bill if the amendment fails to pass. The amendment relates to the authority of county education districts to grant homestead exemptions and to tax personal

property. Rep. Robert Junell wants to be sure that the voters in his district are fully informed about the proposed amendments. He is especially concerned that voters understand the full implication of the amendment related to county education districts. "The constitutionality of the school

finance bill may be dependent on the outcome of this election," said Junell.

Under the Texas constitution, the boards of county education districts would have the authority to tax personal property and to grant, or not grant, homestead exemptions without conducting an election. The

constitutional question arises due to the make-up of these boards. Board members are appointed, not elected. Each school district is represented equally, regardless of the size of the district. This violates the concept known as "one man, one vote." The purpose of the amendment is to limit the power of the board and to give it to the voters through elections. If the amendment fails, the county education districts established in the school finance bill may violate the Federal Voting Rights Act, and therefore be unconstitutional.

The other amendment, if passed, will authorize an additional \$300 million from the sale of state backed general obligation bonds to be used for student loans in Texas.

In addition to the two proposed amendments, voters will be deciding on three ballot propositions regarding homestead exemptions and taxation of personal property in their county education district.

Junell says that the Texas Conservative Coalition, of which he is a member, has just completed an in-depth analysis of the proposed constitutional amendments. "The coalition's report on the amendments will be very helpful to the voters in my district," said Junell. For a copy of the Texas Conservative Coalition's analysis call Rep. ## Lawn clipping program earns USDA service award

COLLEGE STATION -- A project that can preserve 25 percent of Texas landfill space by recycling instead of bagging lawn clippings has earned a two-member Texas A&M University System team a USDA superior service award.

Dr. Bill Knoop, a Dallas-based turf grass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and Robert A. Whitney, former county Extension Service agent in Fort Worth now serving at Comanche in Central Texas, received the award June 12 in Washington, D.C.

Agriculture Secretary Edward Madigan recognized Knoop and Whitney for the development and implementation of the "Don't Bag It" program.

The Texans were cited in the environmental and natural resource protection category, said Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, Extension Service director in Texas.

Knoop devised the program that was piloted in 1989 by the Tarrant County office of the Extension Service and the city of Fort Worth, using volunteer demonstrators directed by Whitney.

During summers, as much as 50 percent of all solid waste in landfills comes from yards, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Landfills, however, are running out of space, and recycling is an increasingly important alternative.

Grass clippings can be easily recycled with no storage or

processing. Research also has shown there is no need to bag grass clippings if good turf management practices are followed.

Carpenter said the "Don't Bag It" program includes recommendations for mowing, fertilizing and watering lawns.

A year after the program began, a survey of the first 200 participants in "Don't Bag It" showed 98 percent of the respondents would not bag their grass clippings again. They also said their lawns had improved, and that they mow their grass in 38 percent less time.

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# County Agriculture Notes

Many pecan trees are dripping with "honeydew" -- the sticky, sugary substance secreted by yellow aphids as they feed on pecan leaves. These aphids are both a nuisance (because of the mess the honeydew makes) and a drain on the tree's energy supply. Aphids cause injury in two primary ways. First the plant juices that they suck from the tree are a direct drain on energy reserves and can affect filling of this year's nuts plus bud formation for next year's crop. Second, black sooty mold grows rampantly on the honeydew and the black mold creates a sunscreen that cuts down on the amount of light reaching the leaf. Leaves need all the sunlight they can get to drive photosynthesis, the mechanism by which green plants generate energy.

Pecan aphids are getting harder to kill with insecticides and this is forcing producers to become more judicious in their use of pesticides. Nature is armed with sufficient beneficial predator insects (such as lady bugs and lacewing flies) to do a reasonable job of keeping aphids in check, but indiscriminate use of insecticides kills predators and aphids alike. Unfortunately, aphids bounce back more quickly than the predators. As a result, we are seeing many trees that receive regular insecticide sprays that have much worse aphid problems than trees that are seldom, if ever sprayed.

This isn't said to suggest that we forget about using insecticides on pecan trees. That would be nice, but unfortunately, there are other serious pecan pests such as the pecan weevil and the hickory shuckworm that can destroy your crop if you don't spray. The problem with aphids underscores the importance of spraying only if and when there is a target pest that must be controlled. Random spraying "just to be on the safe side" can do more harm than good.

Late August - mid September is when the pecan weevil, our most damaging pecan pest, must be controlled. Generally, we spray with sevin insecticide in the last few days of August and follow this with a second spray about two weeks into September. Unfortunately Sevin kills beneficial insects better than it kills aphids and this often enhances a September buildup of yellow pecan aphids.

Synthetic pyrethrins such as Cymbush, Pydrin, asana or Ammo are the best choices at present to give reasonable control of pecan weevils without as badly upsetting the balance between beneficial insects and aphids. Commercial producers should consider using one of these chemicals if they are preparing to apply a late pecan weevil spray or if they need to apply a later spray to control aphids. These synthetic pyrethrins are cheaper by-the-acre but generally too expensive by-the-jug to be practical for the homeowner with 2 or 3 trees around the yard. Zolone or Diazinon are still the most effective and practical insecticides to use where aphid control is needed on a smaller number of trees.

An aphid-weevil spray test was applied in a local pecan orchard on August 29 and aphid counts made September 8 basically support what I have said here. Counts (number of live aphids per compound pecan leaf) were: untreated 25.8, Sevin 23.5, Cymbush 6.6, Lorsban + Cymbush 3.3, Lorsban + Asana 0.4 and Zolone 0.2. Zolone did the best job on aphids in this case, but it is not particularly good at killing pecan weevils. The combination of Lorsban (1 pt/ac) plus Asana (2.0 oz/ac) is a better bet for combined aphid and weevil kill. The Lorsban-Asana or Lorsban-Pydrin mix has also been much more consistent in other tests against aphids whereas Zolone has given very erratic aphid kill from one test to the next.

Although other studies and scientists may not agree, researchers in Europe found that the ingredient, a natural plant colloid, actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious *British Journal of Nutrition*. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the development of the product called Food Source One, a project of National Dietary Research, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the formula which has since been improved with other natural colloids has been a windfall for some overweight people. A Daytona Beach, Florida woman fighting a weight battle for 12 years used the product on the recommendation of her physician and lost 30 pounds. She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear." In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 3 weeks on the product and was never hungry.
