## Lions Club Carnival Slated To Open In City Thursday



Expected to get into full swing Thursday, June 14, is the carnival which is being brought to this city under the direction of the Lions Club. The carnival will be held on the South side of the square and will be open from 7 p. m. until midnight over the three day period ending Saturday, June 16.

The carnival will include a variety of entertaining activities, as well as rides, and cold drink and candy booths.

Booths will be set up for bingo, ball games, arrow games, penny pitch, horse racing, cigarette pitch, and negro dip. Other activities will include a guess your weight booth, money board game, Hitler pitch, and pitch at the bucket.

The Lions Club Carnival is held annually in this city. For the past five years the club has been sponsoring this event to secure funds to carry out charity work throughout the year.

All the committees to supervise the various carnival events this year have been appointed, prizes for winners of the games have been received and everything is now in readiness for the event.

Club carnival officials are hoping to have large crowds out each night for the carnival, and invite all to take part in the fun.

## Dawson County Still Some Distance From Bond Goal

With a membership goal of 300, there are still more than one hundred vacancies in the One Grand Club, established here to stimulate bond sales during the Seventh War Loan Drive which ends June 30.

Anyone purchasing \$100 worth of bonds or more is eligible to the club, and certificates will be sent to each member of the organization which confirms their membership.

Dawson County still has some distance to go before completing the \$750,000 over-all quota. The county has passed the half way mark on their Seventh War Loan assessment, and has approximately three more weeks to go over the top in bond sales.

## Sgt. Clift and T-Sgt. Carr Served With Medics In Germany

**SIXTH ARMY GROUP, Germany** — Medics of the 11th Medical Battalion, veterans of combat in Italy, France and Germany, treated their 46,000th patient when they supported the 36th "Texas" Division and its allied armor and artillery in breaching the Siegfried Line facing General Jacob L. Devers' 6th Army Group.

Medics from Lamesa, included in the group were Sgt. Grover C. Clift Jr., of Route C and T-Sgt. Ernest R. Carr, Star Route 4.

The 11th braved intense enemy fire to transport casualties from the Siegfried battlefield to the battalion's clearing station. Here medical officers administered aid to wounds and prepared patients for evacuation to hospitals a few miles behind where detailed surgical care would be given. Men who received minor wounds were treated and held for subsequent return to duty.

## Demonstration On Insect Control Is Given By Agent

T. A. Barfield, county agent, gave a demonstration on insect control for members of the summer home-making class last week.

A number of the girls included in the class report that they were having trouble with bugs in their gardens. The agent recommended that they use a dust on their plants containing not less than .75 of 1 per cent of rotenone. This can be used successfully in eradicating both chewing and sucking insects.

Barfield advised the girls that if they found it impossible to obtain rotenone, they should use a dust composed of one part cryolite to

three parts dusting talc or pyrophillic volcanic ash to destroy chewing insects. For sucking insects, he advised the use of a spray or a dust containing 5 per cent nicotine sulphate.

Approximately 15 saw the demonstration which was given at the local high school.

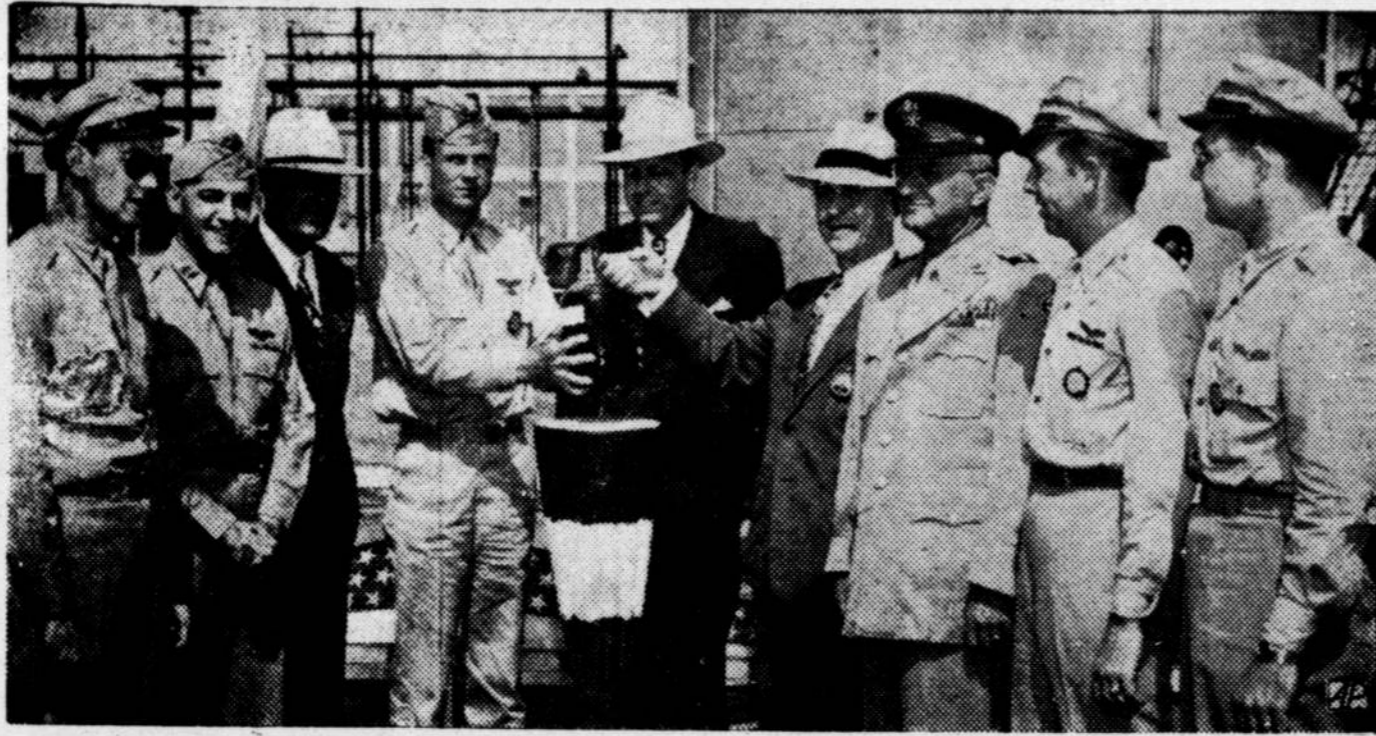

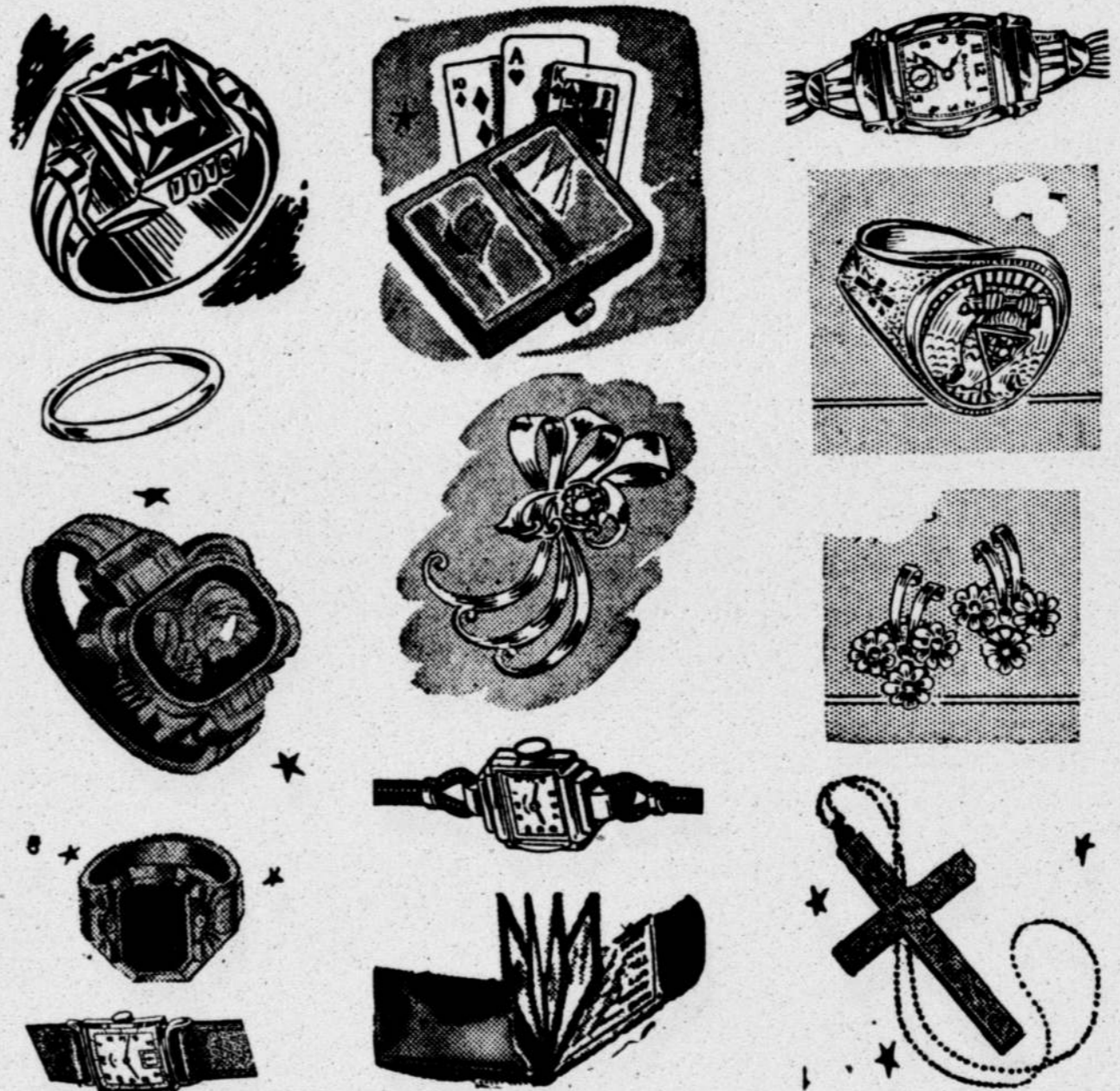

It's a farm near Denton, Texas. That's really his home although he's listed in the tournament results as being from Toledo, Ohio. He's an executive in an umbrella company there.

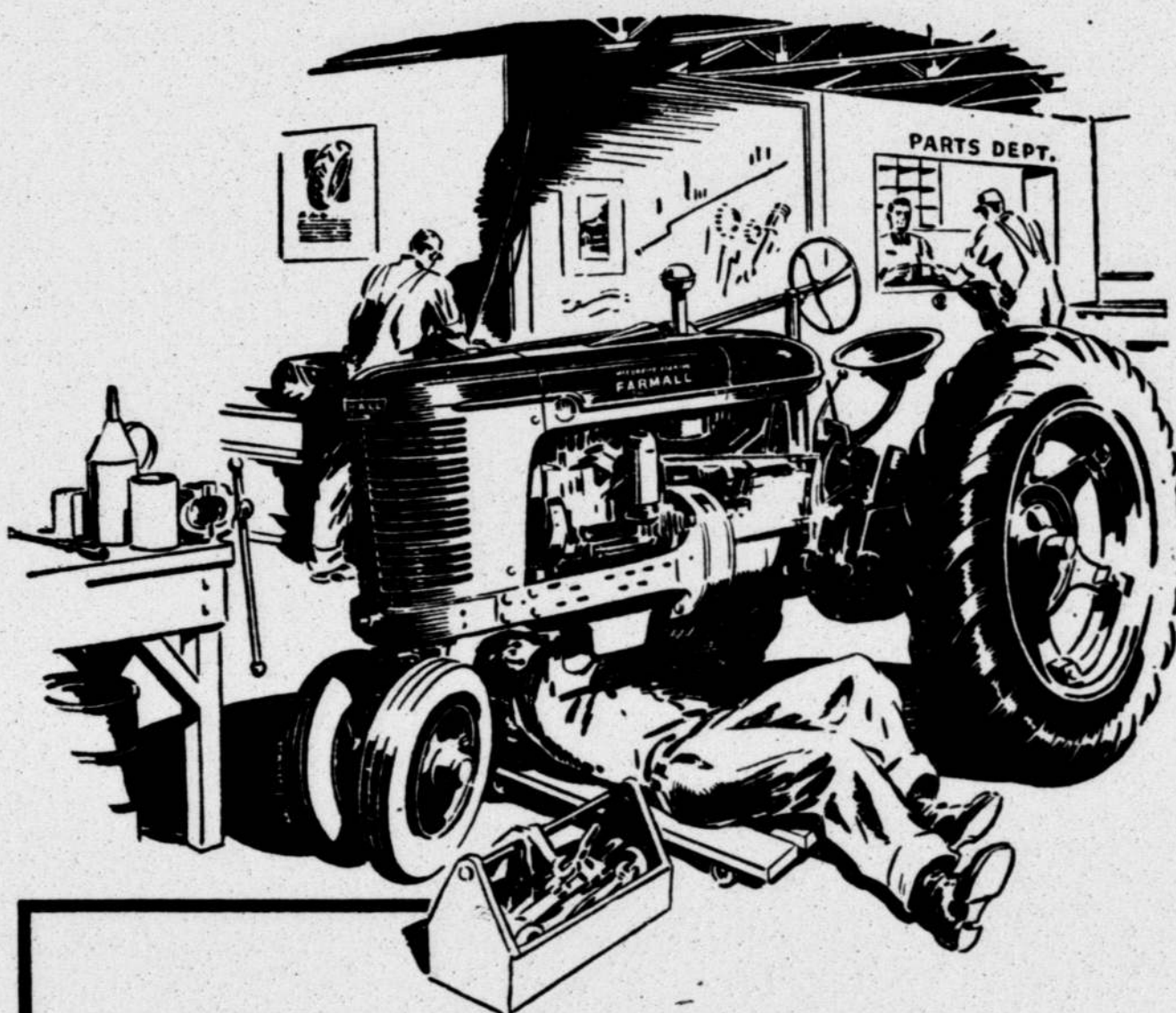
When the golfing season is over,

SIXTH ARMY GROUP, Germany—First 36th "Texas" Division troops on German soil were doughboys of the 141st Infantry Regiment, who in 10 days, battered the Wehrmacht from strong positions along the Modor River through the Siegfried Line.

Among the group was Pfc. Elmer J. Faith of 610 Fifth Street, Lamesa.

Engaged in bitter house-to-house fighting in the torn city of Hagenau, the U. S. Seventh Army infantrymen broke out from a small bridgehead across the Modor, clashed with German rearguards and finally knocked out 35 pillboxes and forts in cutting through the Siegfried Line.

These doughboys were the first Americans to assault now-crumbled Fortress Europe with the Salerno landings and have been active in many of the major battles since that time.

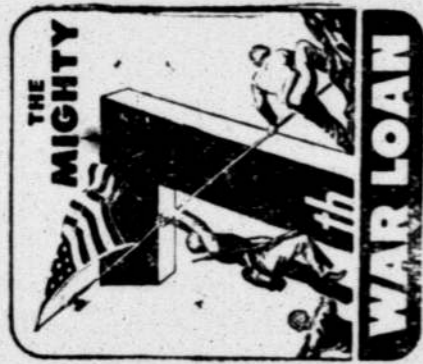

BUY MORE WAR BONDS :-

**Automobile Use Tax Stamps On Sale Here Now**

W. A. Thomas, Collector of Internal Revenue, announced today that the new \$5.00 Automobile Use Tax Stamps have been placed on sale in all post offices and major offices of the collector of internal revenue. The law requires the owner of every motor vehicle which is used upon the highways to buy this stamp and to display it on the vehicle beginning July 1, 1945.

The law provides both cash and jail penalties for failure to pay this tax. To protect themselves against unnecessary penalties, Collector Thomas advised owners of motor vehicles not to be misled by false rumors alleging that this tax has been repealed.

The stamps will be sold over the counter at all post offices and major offices of internal revenue collectors. In addition, collectors of internal revenue will fill mail orders when accompanied by cash, money orders or certified checks. Personal checks cannot be accepted for the purchase of revenue stamps.

The law requires that the stamp be prominently displayed on the motor vehicle on and after July 1, 1945. Where possible, the stamp should be placed on the windshield as recommended by the proper officials of each state.

Motorists will find that the stamps usually will stick better if they dampen the windshield instead of the stamp. They should avoid repeated dampening of the stamp. Motorists who desire to do so may reinforce the stamp with adhesive tape or similar aids.

To protect themselves against loss or theft, Collector Thomas advised motorists to keep a separate record of the serial number which appears on each stamp. Motorists are asked to write on the back of the stamp the make, model, serial number and state license number of the vehicle.

Although the War Department advises that the mailing period for Christmas parcels to Army personnel will be the same as last year—September 15 to October 15—there is no restricted mailing period for the personnel of the Navy, Marine, and Coast Guard. All Christmas parcels should, however, be mailed not later than October 15 to afford some degree of probability of delivery prior to Christmas day.

ago and haven't got my family allowance yet? What can I do?

A. Write your husband and ask him to apply for a family allowance for you. If he does not make the application, you may do so yourself. Secure a form from the nearest Army Installation or write for one to the War Department, Office of Dependency Benefits, Newark, New Jersey. The form, when completed, should be sent to the office in Newark, together with a certified copy of your marriage record.

Q. Can court action be instituted which will change the beneficiary of a soldier's National Service Life Insurance?

A. No. Court action cannot affect the designated beneficiary of National Service Life Insurance as shown on the original or amended application of the insured service man and approved by the Veterans Administration.

Q. I am a discharged soldier. I lost some of the decorations I got while in the service. Is there any way I can get duplicates?

A. You may apply for duplicate decorations by writing to the Decorations and Awards Sub-Branch, Adjutant General's Office, 72-74 Wall Street, New York City.

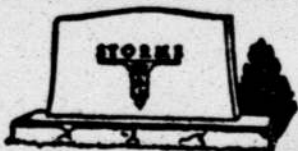

## Not All 'B' Book Holders Will Get Additional Gas

"Sunday driving isn't back yet, and probably won't be for some time to come," District OPA Rationing Executive William G. Williams declared today in explaining eligibility requirements for increased gasoline rations.

Not every "B" coupon holder will be eligible for increased gasoline rations now that ceilings have been raised to 650 miles per month throughout the country, Williams said.

Only those "B" ration holders whose essential occupational driving needs exceed the present "B" ceiling of 475 miles a month will be eligible for an increase. The amount of the increase for eligible B-card holders will vary with their actual occupational driving needs, but in no case may their total rations exceed the new ceiling, he said.

Most "B" ration holders—such as home-to-work drivers who are getting what they need under the 475 ceiling—should not apply for any increase since their applications will have to be rejected and will only add to the work of the local War Price and Rationing Boards.

Williams also announced that motorists are no longer required to use the "A," "C" and "T" windshield markers.

"Although V-E Day has made possible a 10 per cent increase in the amount of gasoline in filling stations, the supply is still a long way from meeting public demand. Ration Boards will have to continue to say "no" to many car owners who do not need additional gasoline for essential driving."
