Finance Drive to Be
Planned by New
Officers

DIRECTORATE MUCH LARGER

Activity Has Actually
Saved Lives in
City

T. D. Hobart, pioneer Pampa resi-
dent, yesterday afternoon was elected
to head the Pampa Welfare association
during its second year.

Other officers chosen are Mrs. C. T.
Hunkapillar, vice-president; Carson
Loftus, secretary; and J. O. Gillham,
re-elected as treasurer.

The executives were chosen follow-
ing the report of nominating com-
mittee, composed of the Rev. Tom W.
Brabham, chairman; Lynn Boyd, M.
K. Brown, Carson Loftus, and Joe
Smith.

Before the election, President James
Todd, Jr., of the organization sketched
its development and declared that the
future of the work is such as to merit
the interest and hearty support of the
entire community. Mrs. M. P. Downs,
community nurse who is employed by
the Welfare association and the school
board jointly, gave reports on a num-
ber of cases to illustrate the type of
work being done. Her descriptions in-
cluded charity, nursing, and in some
cases, actually preventing destitute
persons from dying of malnutrition.

tives from the most active organizations.

Panhandle May Block Paving or Change Route

PANHANDLE, Dec. 7. (P)—A dispute
over the routing of a state and federal
highway has blocked work on the
road. Carson county last night re-
jected \$440,320 in state and federal ap-
propriations and the rejection was en-
dorsed by the Panhandle Highway as-
sociation which includes 26 counties,
because the route did not include the
town of Panhandle. The route, as laid
out by engineers, misses Panhandle by
a quarter of a mile.

Old School Bonds of This District Finally Refunded

Honeymoon Trip Ends in Tragedy Near Granbury

FORT WORTH, Dec. 7. (P)—Mrs.
Tom B. Owens, Jr., bride of a few
weeks, was shot to death in an
automobile on the Granbury high-
way several miles west of here at
11 a. m. today. Her husband, Tom
B. Owens, Jr., son of a prominent
cotton broker of New York with
offices here, is dying in a hospital
with bullet wounds in his body.

Mr. and Mrs. Owens had just re-
turned from their honeymoon and
were in the city together this
morning a few hours before the
shooting.

Mrs. Owens is the daughter of
D. S. Landis, head of the local
weather bureau.

Finley said they found Mrs. Owens
seated in the car dead with a bullet
wound in her head and Owens near
the car seriously wounded. Constable
Finley said he found a pistol under
Owens.

The couple had gone to the woods
Friday morning for an outing following
a quarrel which relatives say they
had Thursday night. In the back of
the car were found red berries, autumn
leaves and pecans.

According to Landis, his daughter
and her husband had a quarrel last
night but he did not consider the dis-
agreement of a serious nature. Mrs.
Owens sent a wrist watch valued at
\$3,000 and some keys to her mother
last night, John Landis, a brother said.
They were sent by a younger brother,
who told his mother that Ruth said
"tell mother I still love her."

The body of Mrs. Owens was identi-
fied in a local undertaking establish-
ment by her brother. He was at a
loss to explain the tragedy.
Justice of the Peace H. B. Balch, who
is conducting the inquest said he would
not return a verdict until he had in-
vestigated further. The couple were
married by Balch.

Louis W. Myers Dies Suddenly

Death came suddenly this morning
to Louis William Myers, 43 years old.
He had been in ill health for some
time at his home here. Death was
caused by leakage of the heart.
Mr. Myers was well known here. He
was connected with his brother, H. G.
Myers, with the Vaporizer Separator
company. He was born in Kingston,
N. Y.

Besides his wife and one daughter,
Ethel, he is survived by his mother,
Mrs. M. B. Myers of Ocean Side, Calif.,
one sister, Mrs. C. W. Van Nastrand of
Oklahoma City, and two brothers, H.
G. of Pampa and R. J. of Ocean Side,
Calif.

The body is at the Malone Funeral
home awaiting word from his sister in
Oklahoma City about funeral arrange-
ments there.

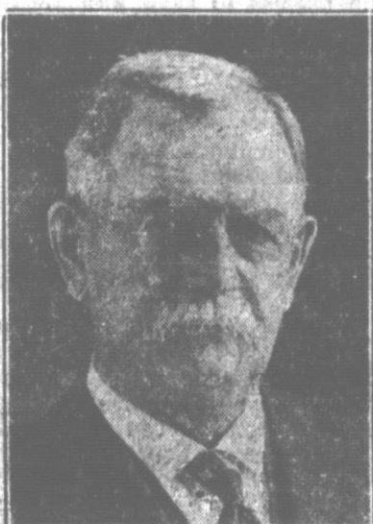
NEW CHURCH EMPLOYE

Forty-Year Paper Is Converted to 30- Year Serials

Pampa's old school bonds, printed in
\$100 denominations and scattered
throughout the United States, have
been bought up by the Brown-Crum-
mer company and converted into 30-
year serial bonds. The interest rate
of 5 1-2 per cent remains unchanged.

The bonded debt of the Independent
school district, which absorbed the
liabilities of the old district No. 6,
may now be retired at shorter inter-
vals, resulting in saving of interest.
Some of the bonds converted were of
the \$14,500 issue of 1909, for the old
red school building. They were of the
40-year variety.

The bonded indebtedness of the dis-
trict is now \$395,000, including the old
debts, the bond issue for the Baker
school and Central annex, and the
new East and West ward buildings
and gymnasium-auditorium. The new
construction is based on a valuation
that ranks seventh per capita in the
state, and no increase in tax levies
has been necessary.

The bonds refunded total \$163,000.
Application of \$43,000 accumulated in
the sinking fund of the district was
announced last night by Joe Smith,
business manager.

Forty and Eight "Wrecking Crew" to Leave Today

Seventeen members of locale voiture
953 of the 40 and 8 will leave this af-
ternoon and early tomorrow morning
for Wichita Falls as the official wreck-
ing crew at a big "wreck" to be held
there tomorrow night. The crew will
be in charge of Conductor C. G. Otter-
bach.

The Pampa crew is recognized as
the official state wrecking crew be-
cause of its work at the national con-
vention in San Antonio this year. The
team is well trained and has some of
the best equipment in the state.

Christmas Decorating Is Begun Today

Pampa put on her first public Christ-
mas decorations this morning when
W. F. Wilson and Lewis Levine began
the decoration of the White Deer Land
company's building, the first to sign
for Christmas decorations. The two
men have signed up the majority of
the business houses and will start work
in earnest tomorrow.

A car load of Washington fir trees
were received yesterday after being
on the way nineteen days. Colored
lights and other decorations also arriv-
ed yesterday. Among the trees was a
20-foot Christmas tree, a present of
the two men to the Lions club for the
community Christmas tree to be held
in the gymnasium.

Christmas trees and lights will be
placed at each light standard along
the streets. Colored lights will be
strung across the streets and store
fronts decorated.

Members of local Boy Scout troops
will sell Christmas trees to secure
Christmas spending money. Trees
ranging from four to eight feet high
will sell from 75 cents to \$2.

GRADING WILL BEGIN SOON IN TWO PROJECTS

Borger Road to Get
Two Miles of
Paving

LEFORS HIGHWAY ALSO INCLUDED

Total Cost of Work
Is \$138,508—Foty
Is Second

With a bid of \$138,508.13, the Stuckey
Construction company of Pampa and
Wichita Falls yesterday was awarded
the contract for additional paving and
grading in precinct No. 2. J. P. Foty
of Wichita Falls was second low at
\$2,000 below the bid accepted. Three
paving contractors and two grading
contractors submitted bids.

According to specifications, the
Stuckey Construction company will
grade and build drainage structure for
five miles southeast of Pampa on the
LeFors road and will pave with con-
crete three miles on the same road.
They also will pave with concrete two
miles of the Borger road, west from
Pampa.

The J. P. Foty bid for the entire
project was \$140,329.75. Carl Pleasant
of Amarillo bid only on the paving.
His bid was \$128,833.50. For grade
and drainage structure work alone W.
M. Miller of Amarillo was low, with a
bid of \$12,931.34. E. T. Prater of
Memphis entered a bid of \$16,778.

No definite date was set for opera-
tions to begin, but it is expected that
grading and drainage structure work
will be done this winter with the pav-
ing to begin next spring.

Grade and drainage structures have
been completed on five miles of oil
field road south from Pampa to con-
nect with the Clarendon highway.
Grade work is practically complete on
the Borger road. With the exception
of one large bridge and one small
bridge, that work is completed on the
same stretch. A contract has been let
to grade and pave three miles on the
Miami road.

Dealers in Man-Flesh

Is the day here when sportsmen will deal not in horse-flesh, but in man-flesh? It would seem so.

Walter P. Chrysler bought managerial rights to Knute Hansen, prizefighter, and is entering him in competition much after the manner of the Kentucky derby. If Hansen wins, he will be valuable property; if he loses, he will be as so much slow horseflesh.

And one of the "Biddies of Philadelphia," Tony, has bought all promotion rights to Rene de Vos, Belgian middleweight, paying the foreigner \$20,000. When wealth starts to buying up high class beef and brains and pitting human beings against each other, the bookmakers will follow in the derby spirit and a new day for boxing will have dawned. The promoters will take some handsome profits if they can arouse the competition necessary to interest the masses.

Good human flesh is being valued as it has not since the days of slavery. Owning the talents of husky humans threatens to become a social distinction in sporting circles.

Function of Government

Gone, apparently, is the day when the cry of Socialism was enough to stamp a project as undesirable. Indeed, the thorough going Socialist could hardly desire a stronger trend toward many of the principles he has been advocating.

Government ownership and operation are not so much in demand, but everyone wishes the government to help him run his business and guarantee him a profit. Farm relief, as is now being urged, goes beyond the bounds of oldtime legislation, and would put the government into the business of maintaining trade and supply balances. What additional steps the government might take are problematical, of course, but the tendency is very much toward socialistic ideals.

Yet we have seen one radical idea after another put into law, and it is the spirit of America that we do not fear changes. The United States department of commerce is very definitely going into the business of promoting trade. This an important work in the new warfare—the war of commerce. Other governments promote their own industries—why not ours? We quote from a report by the department of commerce:

"The importance of our export trade to the economic well being of this country is evidenced by the fact that from one-seventh to one-eighth of our total farm production is marketed abroad, representing the output of a million and a quarter persons. Of the output of our factories, 8 or 9 per cent is exported, representing the production of not far from a million industrial workers. While the bureau devotes much attention and with gratifying success to promoting the sale of food-stuffs, raw cotton, and other farm products, shipments of these articles are influenced to a considerable extent by world

crop conditions. It is in the case of manufactured products—that class of goods whose successful marketing depends upon accurate knowledge of competitive conditions—that American achievements in foreign markets are most outstanding. In the face of the most vigorous competition, our exports of finished manufactures have steadily advanced until last year they reached the huge total of \$2,061,000,000, an increase of 4 per cent over the previous year and fully 70 per cent over 1921-22."

American business has reached the point where the difference between a brisk market and a depression are based upon export conditions. To compete successfully with other nations, the cooperation made possible by direct participation of agencies of our government seems not only necessary, but desirable.

What Price Paving?

Says the Panhandle Herald

Detailed plans and specifications for improving highway No. 33 from the end of the Zempeter job to the Carson-Gray line provides paving shall be laid on the road-bed now being travelled—that is, the road surveyed by the highway department. The road has not been re-routed through Panhandle. O. M. Simpson, resident engineer, says the highway department would find it necessary to make new plans and specifications if the route is to be changed. Such a procedure would entail much trouble and red tape down at Austin.

Two months ago when the highway department announced to county officials that the road would be paved next spring, word was brought back to Panhandle that Chief Engineer Gibb Gilchrist would come up here himself, "and see about re-routing that road," quoting Mr. Gilchrist's own statement, as reported to The Herald Sept. 21. The promise was interpreted to mean that Gilchrist would give the re-routing plan favorable consideration and would listen with an open mind to pleas of local citizens. Mr. Gilchrist himself brought up the subject. Local citizens planned to give the state engineer a friendly and courteous reception, bearing in mind that he had aided the county in every road project it has wanted. Although Mr. Gilchrist did not name the exact time he was coming, it was believed that he would come up, before the bids were advertised.

Here are the facts: Panhandle citizens would have been busy working for the re-routing of the highway if word had not been brought back that Mr. Gilchrist himself was "coming up here to see about it." He has not come—the highway has not been re-routed, and will not be re-routed if the present specifications are carried out. Citizens must in-

stantly act if the road is to be re-routed. Or is it too late to act? Were the citizens calmed and quieted with a false promise until the route specifications had already been drawn up and then informed by way of the plans and specifications in Mr. Simpson's office here that it is too late to do anything? Whose fault is it that the road has not been re-routed? Who takes the blame? Not the people.

What price paving if the road is not re-routed? What does Panhandle gain or lose? Probably Mr. Gilchrist and the other officials who are paid to attend to paving matters can answer.

Ever since it became known that the highway was surveyed to run south of the tracks, this community has periodically protested against the route. Many have believed that Panhandle would lose more than it would gain. The time has come now when some fruitful action must be taken, if any is to be taken. If the citizens had known Mr. Gilchrist was not going to see about the re-routing, they could have appealed to the highway commissioners—Judge Ely of Abilene in particular.

And that is the only course left open to them now. It will be useless to rave and storm at the engineering department. It is obvious that Mr. Gilchrist has either ignored or forgotten the will of Panhandle citizens. A violent protest is not advised. A committee of half-dozen citizens should be chosen to place all the facts before Judge Ely.

Among other things, such a committee should bear in mind that the engineering department's reason for surveying the road south of the tracks is a weak one. The engineers' reasons were the five railway tracks which the highway would cross here. Anyone familiar with Highway No. 33 knows that the same engineers caused the highway to make a complete "S", crossing the railroad tracks twice, near the Mary Mere Farm between here and Amarillo. Anyone knows that all but one town between Amarillo and the Oklahoma line is on the south side of the railroad track. Baseball Deals So Far Are Mainly Minor Ones, but Transactions Loom That Will Change Lineups in Majors

Baseball Battle to Be Transferred to Next Meeting

TORONTO, Ont., Dec. 7. (AP)—The baseball battlefield on the draft question is to move from Toronto to West Baden, Ind., on the last day of the annual convention of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues. Indications were that the question of promoting players by selection from the minors to the major leagues would be brought up for discussion again at the Indiana resort about January 15.

It is understood that the representatives of the Class AA League at the West Baden meeting will propose a sweeping change by which they will agree to the unrestricted draft if the majors in turn will agree to discontinue the practice of owning minor league clubs which are used as farms and make major league clubs with minor league ownership in whole or in part independent of the hardship of the restrictions of the draft as operative now in all class AA leagues.

Big Universities Demand Showdown On Grid Methods

CHICAGO, Dec. 7. (AP)—With such highly combustible subjects as propeleting and eligibility providing material for fireworks, Big Ten athletic directors, coaches and faculty advisers assembled for their annual sports convocation in Chicago today.

While there had been no specific information of a blow-off, rumors were thick that at least two universities, Chicago and Illinois, were ready to demand a showdown on the conference policy of obtaining athletes and on enforcement of the eligibility rules.

Littlefield Will Coach an All-Star Team for Game

DALLAS, Dec. 7. (AP)—Coach Clyde Littlefield of Texas university and Coach Matty Bell of Texas Christian university have been appointed to select and drill an all-star team of Southwest conference football players to play an all-star eleven from the Big Six conference in a benefit game here New Year's day.

The two teams will be comprised entirely of players who are graduating this season. Co-coaches Littlefield and Bell have wired invitations to 25 Southwest conference stars.

Ernie Bear, coach of Nebraska university, which won the Big Six title this year, will select the outfit to represent that circuit.

Mr. Lenglen Is Puzzle to Scribes

LAKE TAHOE, Calif., Dec. 7. (AP)—Efforts of reporters to solve the mystery arising out of the visit here of Mr. Suzanne Lenglen, French tennis star, went for naught today after they had interviewed every accessible member of the group of persons quartered at the Lake Tahoe lodge of Mrs. Anita Baldwin, hostess of the French woman.

Mr. Lenglen and a woman said to be her mother, accompanied by Thaddeus A. Winter, divorced husband of Mrs. Baldwin's daughter, Dextra, detained at Truckee, Calif., early yesterday morning and were whisked away by automobile to the seclusion of Mrs. Baldwin's lodge. The trio arrived from Europe a week ago.

A man, who said his name was Nicely, but who refused to further identify himself, told the correspondents he was spokesman for Mrs. Baldwin. He denied that any marriage was contemplated among the guests, particularly the report that Mr. Lenglen would become the bride of either Winter or Baldwin M. Baldwin, son of the hostess.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7. (AP)—More or less quiescent during the playing season, the baseball market where "Ivory" is bought and sold with reckless abandon, is booming along at its peak right now.

A more or less complete count shows that no fewer than 62 players have changed hands in the past three days. Most of these deals, of course, were completed at Toronto where the annual meeting of the National Association of Professional Baseball clubs is in session.

So far few outstanding major league players have been affected by the transactions. But there are rumors of trades to come that will effect a wholesale shifting in the major league lineups next season.

Detroit completed the most sensational deal, buying First Baseman Dale Alexander and Pitcher Johnny Priddy from Toronto for about \$100,000 in cash and three players. Toronto gets First Baseman Sweeney and two Pitchers.

The Boston Red Sox wanted Catcher Alex Gaston and Outfielder Russell Scaflitt from St. Paul and swung the deal by giving the Saints Bryan Harrison, tall right-hander, Third Baseman Bill Rogell, and an unnamed catcher.

Four former major league stars took on managerial worries. Alan Rothorn, a good pitcher in his day, will handle Louisville's team in the American Association. Gabby Street, Walter Johnson's old catcher, was hired by the St. Louis Cardinals to handle one of their "farms." Jack Bentley signed to manage York of the New York-Pennsylvania league and Heinie Groh, who didn't have much luck at Charlotte in the South Atlantic circuit last season, will take another managerial whirl at Hartford of the Eastern league. The Browns sold Pitcher Walter Beck and First Baseman Guy Sturdy the former to Buffalo and the latter to Birmingham. The Phils sent Pitchers Walsh and Miller to Los Angeles, and Outfielder Art Jahn to Portland. The San Francisco Missions took Eddie Mulligan, infielder, off Pittsburgh's hands.

Cleveland parted with cash and two players for Jim Zinn, Kansas City pitcher. Ray Blades got word that the Cardinals were sending him to Rochester in part payment for Charley Belber's star shortstop.

The Boston Braves sold Howard Freigau, infielder, to Toledo, while the Red Sox were disposing of Pitcher Carl Holling to Los Angeles.

Right now most of the interest seems to revolve about Buddy Myer, Red Sox third baseman; Ossie Bluege, who guards the hot corner at Washington, and Pete Donohue and Adolf Luque of Cincinnati's mound staff. Rumors had Myer going to the New York Yankees; Donohue or Luque or both to the New York Giants, while it was understood that Bluege was on the market for the highest bidder.

Temple Football Fans May Repeal Law of Averages

TEMPLE, Dec. 7. (AP)—Temple is exulting a high school football team that "couldn't win for losing," which lost most of its important games, but which always gave the home-town rooters a tremendous thrill.

In the 11 games which Temple played, the Temple captain tried to call the toss of the coin everytime—and failed 11 times. In every game that the team lost it gained more yards than its opponents. It won the only game in which it was clearly outplayed, on the basis of yards gained.

In its final game, the game which it most wanted to win, it out-gained Waco in almost every department except scoring. For a few seconds the Temple defense wavered and Waco won, in spite of the fact that Temple had thrown the Waco team for almost as many yards loss as gain. The yards that Waco did gain were the ones right next to Temple's goal posts. Temple rooters are in favor of repealing the law of averages.

Stock Market on Way Down—Bears Frolic at Last

NEW YORK, Dec. 7. (P)—Speculators throughout the country scrambled to get out of stocks today on the New York stock exchange, following yesterday's drastic shake-out, and prices of leading issues dropped \$3 to \$15 a share at the opening of the market.

Several blocks of 5,000 to 30,000 shares changed hands in the early trading as "bears," feeling their first flush of victory since last June, hammered unmercifully at the recent pool favorites.

Adams Express, which established a new high record at \$429 a share only a few days ago, toppled \$15 a share on the first sale to \$385. Radio Corporation common, which broke \$15 a share yesterday, tumbled \$14 a share more on the first sale to \$381, which contrasts with the recent high of \$420. Fox Film A, dropped \$7 a share and International Nickel, Radio-Kellogg-Albee, Canadian Pacific, Sears Roebuck and Andes Copper fell back \$4 to \$5 a share on opening transactions.

One block of 30,000 shares of Sinclair Oil changed hands at \$37.50, an overnight drop of \$2.75.

Police Chief in Chicago Shot as He Sits in Home

CHICAGO, Dec. 7. (P)—LeRoy Gilbert South Chicago Heights police chief who was proud of his reputation as "a tough cop," won't bother the "boys in the booze racket" any more. Some men with sawed-off shotguns got him last night. Shot him dead, through the back.

He was seated at home with his family. His back to the front window and the light from a floor lamp beside his chair set him apart from the others in the room. The shade had been drawn only half way.

The killers got out of their motor-car, a sedan, and crept to the window. Their tracks in the snow on the ground were found later. The shortened gun muzzles were rested on the window sill.

Twice the guns sent charges of shot tearing through the window, into the back of Chief Gilbert's head. A third volley went wide, and the third finger of Mrs. Gilbert's right hand was torn away.

Thirteen-year-old Ruth, one of five children, came running in from another room and dropped, screaming, beside the chair in which her father's body had slumped.

Glenn Gilbert, the chief's brother, ran from the house and sent a wild volley at him as they drove away. He was able, however, to gain a good description of the machine, the description of which provided one of the principal clues on which highway police are at work.

The slain chief has cooperated with the federal dry agents, and on some occasions has led raids himself, turning his prisoners over for government prosecution. Recently he discussed with the sheriff a program for a campaign against vice which had sprung up.

Fayette County Puts Justices on Salary Basis

LA GRANGE, Dec. 7. (P)—Fayette county is believed to be the first county in the state to readjust its method of compensating justices of the peace, following a decision of the court of criminal appeals which invalidated the Texas fee system.

International Sunday School Lesson, for December 9, 1924.

General Topic: Paul Goes To Rome. Scripture Lesson: Acts 28:11-24, 30, 31. 11. And after three months we set sail in a ship of Alexandria which had wintered in the island, whose sign was The Twin Brothers.

12. And touching at Syracuse, we tarried there three days. 13. And from thence we made a circuit, and arrived at Rhegium; and after one day a south wind sprang up, and on the second day we came to Puteoli;

20. For this cause therefore did I entreat you to see and to speak with me; for because of the hope of Israel I am bound with this chain.

21. And they said unto him, We neither received letters from Judaea concerning thee, nor did any of the brethren come hither and report of thee any harm of thee.

22. But we desire to hear of thee what thou thinkest: for as concerning this sect, it is known against thee. And when they had appointed him a day, they came to him into his lodging: in great number; to whom he expounded the matter, testifying the kingdom of God, and persuading them concerning Jesus, both from the law of Moses and from the prophets, from morning till evening.

24. And some believed the things which were spoken, and some disbelieved. 25. And he abode two whole years in his own hired dwelling, and received all that went in unto him. 31. Preaching the kingdom of God, and teaching the things concerning the Lord Jesus Christ with all boldness, none forbidding him.

INTRODUCTION "Paul was no Galilean peasant but a citizen of the Roman Empire. His outlook was imperial. No other disciple or apostle at the time of his call had such a wide field opened before him. He set out to be a world conqueror. He

took the world for his parish from the very beginning. He was a little man with a great soul, like John Wesley. He never was satisfied with the territories traversed or the work already done. He always planned wider itineraries and greater things. He was the incarnation of enterprise. He had a boundless ambition. His plans always outran his possibilities. He dreamed of a kingdom, world-wide and eternal. No other apostle had such an imperial programme. No other apostle did so much to realize such a programme. It was his imperialism which made Paul the greatest missionary the Christian church has produced."

Rome was the world, in Paul's day. No other city before or since has gathered up to itself so many reigns of power and influence reaching out over the world. Therefore Paul's thoughts, during all the early years of his missionary work, turned ever more eagerly to Rome. He labored in Damascus, Jerusalem, Antioch, Ephesus and Corinth, all great cities, but he never looked forward to a greater, to the greatest.

When at Corinth he was at his nearest point to Rome, and wrote to the Christians of Rome the epistle which most Christians regard as the supreme writing from his pen. In it he shows how eagerly he had captured every bit of news which reached him from the Roman church, how he rejoiced in every evidence of the faith of the Roman Christians, how he longed to see them, and how he prayed for them constantly, asking that it might be God's will that he should go to them.

He tells them that he had often laid plans to go to Rome, but the way had been closed by God's providence which Paul was always so quick to recognize.

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Screen Life in Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD, Calif.—This talkie town is so full of sound-specialists, radio engineers, acoustical experts and scientific what-not that it would surprise no one to find love scenes being worked out with logarithms and comedy falls plotted by trigonometry.

So it is only natural that one of the by-products of Clarence Brown's latest directorial effort should be a dental movie camera designed to put the fitting of false teeth on a scientifically accurate basis.

It seems one of his actors had to have some dental work done in the middle of the picture and Brown, to make sure the man's face would look the same in scenes to be made several weeks later, took close-ups of his teeth in action. The dentist became interested and collaborated with Brown in devising a special camera for movies of the mouth. These show not only the structure of the teeth, but the relative motions of the jaws.

Sex and Sound-Waves
And now it leaks out that the microphones used in recording love scenes for talking pictures are, like the heroes and heroines of such scenes, masculine and feminine. A masculine microphone, the talkie technicians at M-G-M explain, is one particularly suited to the recording of men's voices. Feminine microphones work best with women's voices. Each new "mike" brought to the stage is tested with various voices and then marked "M" or "F" to designate its use. After that any prop boy can hang the right microphone over the hero's head.

Fly-Paper Films
Incidentally, speaking of sound-stages, manufacturers of fly-paper will be glad to hear that their product is an important aid in the production of talking pictures. Where sound-proof camera tanks with glass fronts are used, a fly crawling around on the glass can spoil a whole scene by registering on the film as a monster larger than any of the actors. And if noiseless cameras instead of camera-tanks are used, the buzz of some vagrant fly close to the microphone may drown out the players' voices. So sheets of sticky fly-paper are spread or hung here and there, and every day dozens perish trying to buzz their way into the movies.

He had appealed to Rome, and thither Festus the governor sent him. We pass over the events of the voyage, the account of which in Acts is one of the most thrilling adventure stories in literature. Its key-thought might be embodied in the angel's assurance, "Fear not, Paul," (Acts 27:24). "It was a safe journey, as all the goings to and fro of the saints are, in the sense that our apostle and his companions finally landed safe on Italian soil.

The Appian Way
They would traverse, on the land journey northward, via Capua, the famous Appian Way, portions of which are still in use. It is the fashion for Christians visiting Italy piously to trace Paul's footsteps along this road and to the places mentioned here in this last chapter of Acts. How it must have heartened our apostle to have brethren of the Roman church come all that long way to bid him welcome. (ver. 15). Luke voices Paul's appreciation in the short, memorable, splendid sentence, "he thanked God and took courage."

Paul at Rome
Rome was the center of the civilized world, the melting pot of nations and religions, where the gospel would find its largest opportunity. Paul was on the whole a favored prisoner. Yet, following a common practice, he was kept handcuffed to a soldier (Phil. 1:13, Col. 4:18); and this guard was changed at frequent intervals. Much is said about Mark Hopkins at one end of a log and a boy at the other end—put Paul at one end of a chain and a Roman soldier at the other end—who will happen during the long hours of this intimacy? Assuredly, some at least of these soldiers will be won to Christ.

Not only had the calamities of the Jew of Judaea been widely disseminated, but in general days and times stories about the Christ were in circulation. The Roman author Tacitus, writing at this time, speaks of the gospel as "a detestable superstition, guilty of atrocious and shameful crimes." But has any great, good movement ever escaped this fate?

The most important item of these closing verses is that throughout the two years he was not denied freedom of teaching. He could not go out to the people, but they came to him. "How all the schemes of the enemies of Paul and Christ had turned out the furtherance of the gospel (Phil. 1:12). They had brought Paul to Rome at the ex-

CHICAGO, Dec. 7. (AP)—It's all over but the squealing for the champion hogs, sheep and cattle of the International Livestock Exposition.

Only the breeding classes will emerge with their lives, with one exception: Dick, the grand champion steer owned by 12-year-old Clarence Goecke of State Center, Iowa, will be taken to New York alive by the J. C. Penny company which bought it at the record-breaking figure of \$8,050. Mr. Penny wants to exhibit it as an example of 4-H club achievement.

So much interest was attracted yesterday by the sale of Goecke's prize steer that the sale of the other prize winners was forced into the background. Iowa State college was able to get only \$32 a hundred for its grand champion barrow, a Duroc, and Dr. J. A. Swailum of Storm Lake, Iowa, drew \$15.50 a hundred for his reserve champion, a Chester White. Both figures were under the record. 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Hoover's Absence Factor in Delay of Farm Relief

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7. (AP)—Farm relief legislation, long in a state of uncertainty, finds itself muddled now by the absence of the president-elect, Herbert Hoover.

One bill, thought to have administration approval, has been introduced by Chairman McNary of the senate agriculture committee, but even before it is out of the committee room, doubt has cast a shadow of its path. Republican leaders do not seem to know what Mr. Hoover's ideas on this bill are.

Nevertheless, leaders in congress opposed to an extra session next spring are believed to be thinking of asking Mr. Hoover to pass on the McNary bill. They feel that with his approval the measure might be passed at the Seventieth congress and a special session for tariff revision delayed until autumn. If it is decided to ask Mr. Hoover the question, then will come the worry over ways and means of doing it.

Investigators Find That Vestris Crew Was Incompetent

NEW YORK, Dec. 7. (AP)—Reports of the British and American nautical advisors at a federal commissioners' investigation of the sinking of the British liner Vestris agree that the officers of the vessel were incompetent.

Although they differ in tone, that of Captain E. A. Jessop, U. S. N. retired, being uncompromising and severe while that of Captain Henry McConkey of the Cunard line being more restrained, both declare the S O S should have been sent out six hours earlier and that the officers did not take proper steps to see to the safety of the passengers.

HOOVER NOT TO GO ASHORE AT BOLIVIA

U. S. S. MARYLAND En Route to Antofagasta, Dec. 7. (AP)—President-elect Hoover, en route to Chile on his good-will tour, will confer on Saturday with Alberto Palacios, Bolivian foreign minister, about the Maryland which will anchor for that purpose, off Antofagasta, Chile, about 10 a. m.

The Bolivian foreign minister, other members of the cabinet and Davis Kaufman, United States minister at La Paz, will board the Maryland.

Mr. Hoover will not go ashore. The Bolivian party, expected to number about 50, will come out to the Maryland in launches, and will have lunch as guests of the president-elect. The meeting will last about four hours and the Maryland will then continue on to Valparaiso.

The two men were honored for their parts in bringing in two gushers just two miles from the city limits of Wink, insuring an intensive drilling campaign at the city's gates.

Hobson drilled in the Prairie No. 2, which is flowing 35,000 barrels of pipe line oil a day. Cranfield brought in the Prairie No. 3 which has increased its flow to approximately 30,000 barrels a day.

RANCHMAN GETS THREE YEARS FOR SLAYING

LAMESA, Dec. 7. (AP)—Will Luman, Garza county cattleman, was found guilty of the slaying of Marvin Breeding, 23, by a jury here late yesterday and his punishment fixed at three years in prison.

Breeding was shot to death in a theatre at Post in 1927 a moment after he had been called from his seat by Luman. The defendant, declared he shot in self-defense after Breeding had made a motion as though to draw a pistol. Luman said he had gone to the theatre to ask Breeding to apologize for an alleged insult to Mrs. Luman.

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King George Is Helped by Sleep

LONDON, Dec. 7. (AP)—King George's powers of resistance today were serving him well in his battle with the severe and persistent illness which attacked him more than a fortnight ago. His illness, however, was still causing anxiety to his subjects and to countless well-wishers throughout the world.

Several recent medical bulletins and particularly the one issued shortly before noon today indicated how well his powers of resistance were serving the monarch. Today's bulletin reported that he was maintaining his general strength, to the bolstering up of which some restful sleep that he had during the night doubtless contributed.

The bulletin, signed by Sir Stanley Hewett and Lord Dawson of Penn. said:

"The king had some restful sleep and his general strength is maintained. Further investigation of the right side of the chest will be undertaken during the day."
