Perryton Merchants Start Dollar Day Campaign

Overwhelming Vote Recorded For Deferred Tax Payment Bill

EXTENDS COUNTY AND STATE DELINQUENT TAX PENALTY OCT. 15

OVERWHELMING VOTE RECORDED IN HOUSE AND SENATE FAVORING BILL; NOW UP FOR GOV. STERLING'S APPROVAL

Final action on tax payment relief in Texas was left with Gov. Ross S. Sterling Wednesday according to press dispatches, after both houses passed a bill calling for a deferred payment plan in collecting 1930 taxes and extending the time limit to after October 15 instead of February 1, as under the present law. The new law applies only to 1930 taxes.

The vote on the bill was overwhelming, the house passing it by a vote of 136 to 6 and the senate voting 29 to 0 for the measure. Governor Sterling who has advocated a semi-annual tax payment plan, is expected to sign the bill today.

Under the provisions of the bill 1930 taxes if paid by October 15 will escape the delinquent tax penalty. Interest of 10 per cent per year will be charged from February 1. After October 15, a delinquent tax penalty of 5 per cent will be imposed on all unpaid taxes. Taxpayers will also have the privilege of making payments of half of their taxes at a time.

The bill refers only to state and county tax payments, and for 1930 taxes only. The city council has already passed a provision allowing a dividend payment plan on city taxes, half being due before February 1, the other half due on or before June 30, the deferred payment bearing six per cent interest.

THREE MORE IN MARSHAL RACE

LEONARD ROBERTSON, W. M. (SLIM) CLARK AND E. B. LOVING ENTER CONTEST

The Herald has been authorized to announce three more men as candidates for city marshal subject to the action of the voters in the city election to be held on Tuesday, April 7. These announcements swell the total to five candidates now in the marshal's race.

Leonard Robertson, an ex-service man and a member of the local American Legion Post, is one of the men announcing for the office. Mr. Robertson has called Perryton his home since 1915 and has lived here since January of that year except during the four years he was in the navy during the war, returning here in the latter part of 1919. During the past five years Mr. Robertson has been employed by J. L. Donley as a mechanic.

Another candidate in the race is W. M. (Slim) Clark. Mr. Clark came to Perryton in 1927 to accept a position with the Shearer Produce company, by whom he has been employed ever since. He is a man of good reputation and if elected to the office promises to do his duty and show no favoritism.

E. B. Loving is the third candidate to announce during the week. Mr. Loving has been a resident of Perryton for the past two years, coming here from Plainview, being employed as a mechanic. Mr. Loving has had considerable experience in law enforcing, having acted as marshal at Spearman for an eight months period and having been on the police force at Gainsville, Texas, for several years.

We hope that we have served faithfully and well and that our mistakes have not been above human averages, but regardless of the past, we pledge anew our best efforts to produce a newspaper worthy of the best town and country in Texas.

TEST 282 HEAD STOCK FOR T. B.

ONLY FIVE HEAD TUBERCULAR STOCK FOUND ON THIRTY-FOUR FARMS IN THIS SECTION

The reading of the tubercular test applied to 282 head cattle and dairy stock from thirty-four different herds in this community last weekend, disclosed only five diseased cows, a percentage of 1.77.

The testing was done by Dr. E. F. Lanham, Amarillo, and in the reading he was assisted by Dr. Carter, Dalhart, Federal Inspector. One of the tubercular cows was killed and examined for the benefit of the owner and others interested. The other four were branded with T on the jaw and will be shipped under quarantine as soon as authorization is received from the state sanitary commission and disposed of through proper channels.

According to County Agent G. R. Sheets, dairymen in this community who sponsor this testing, intend to have their herds tested annually and it is hoped that eventually every head of stock in the county will be included in the test.

GIRLS WIN 1ST FROM SPEARMAN

RANGERS TAKE SECOND AT SPEARMAN TOURNAMENT LAST FRIDAY AND SATURDAY

The Rangerettes won first place in the girls division at the Spearman basketball tournament last Friday and Saturday while the Rangers carried off second honors in the boys division, losing in the final bracket to Spearman by a 22 to 15 count.

The Rangerettes won over Farnsworth in the opening frame by a 47 to 11 score. In the semi-finals they played Dalhart winning by a 35 to 28 count, this game proving their hardest struggle of the tournament. Spearman won over Stratford, Gruver and Morse to go to the finals meeting the Rangerettes and losing by a 44 to 17 score, giving the Perryton girls first honors in the meet.

The Rangers were matched against Booker, winning by forfeit. They defeated the Amarillo Yarnigans by an 18 to 12 count, while the second team administered a 30 to 6 drubbing to the Morse quintet. In the semi-finals, the Rangers played their most brilliant game of the tournament, winning from Stratford by a 30 to 19 count. The Rangers met Spearman in the finals, losing by a 22 to 15 score after the third quarter closed with the two teams tied 15 each, the Rangers being unable to connect in the last period, giving them second place in the meet.

\$60 IS RAISED FOR RED CROSS

OCHILTREE COUNTY QUOTA FOR DROUGHT RELIEF STILL LACKING BY \$40

During the past week an additional \$20.00 has been raised on the Ochiltree county quota for the Red Cross drought area relief fund, swelling the total to \$60.50, still nearly forty dollars short of the \$100 quota asked for from this county.

While no personal solicitation was made, it was thought that this quota could be easily raised by voluntary contributions. The slow response would indicate that the people of this community do not realize the urgent conditions existing in the rural sections of the areas affected. Families in the drought areas of Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas are actually at the point of starvation, and with no relief in view except the Red Cross.

This is a worthy cause. These funds are for the relief of starving people right here in our own state and neighboring states, and the amount asked for is small. MEAT DISHES FOR FEBRUARY HOLIDAY EVENTS

With Valentine's Day, Lincoln's birthday and Washington's birthday, February is the best month in the whole year for parties. The recipes for meat dishes given below are especially well adapted to these occasions. They are suggested by the National Live Stock and Meat Board.

For the Valentine bridge luncheon, jellied veal is just the thing.

Jellied Veal
Melt one glass of currant jelly, add a bit of mint or a drop or two of mint flavoring. Soften one tablespoon of gelatin in one-half cup cold water and stir into the jelly. Line heart-shaped molds with this

jelly. Fill with well-seasoned minced veal after the jelly has set, then pour in the rest of the jelly to cover the meat. When firm turn out on lettuce leaves. Cranberry jelly flavored with orange juice may be used in place of the currant jelly.

Individual mock vension pies are reminiscent of those times when meat must be procured by the hunter and so these are appropriate for the Lincoln's Birthday luncheon.

Individual Mock Vension Pies

3 pounds round steak
1 Teaspoon salt
Pepper
3 tablespoons flour
2 cups carrots, sliced
3-4 cup turnips, sliced
1 cup potatoes, cubed
6 small onions

Cut the beef into one-inch cubes. Sprinkle with salt, pepper, and flour. Fry in a little fat until brown. Cover with boiling water and cook one hour. Add carrots, onions and turnips and cook fifteen minutes longer. Thicken gravy with a little flour smoothed in cold water. Add potatoes and pour into individual ramekins. Cover each with a crust of flaky pastry. Bake in a hot oven (450 degrees F.) for ten minutes, then reduce the heat to 325 degrees F., and cook for forty minutes longer.

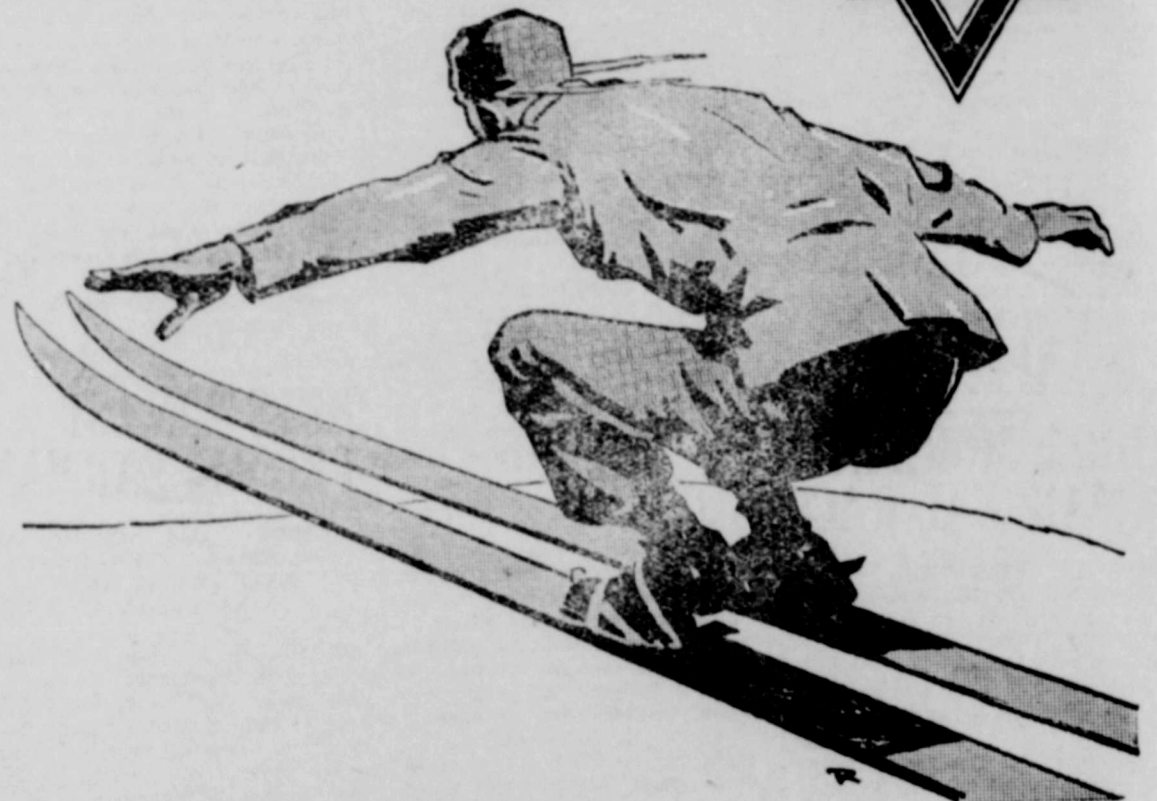

WAR

Every European intelligence who comes to America and I meet a great many of the every week brings a shadow over with him. Europe is living in a war cloud, its people shudder with dread that the crisis may at any time which will plunge in into a more terrible conflict than ever before.

It is very hard for us on this side of the ocean to understand that feeling. It is hard for us to understand why France, for example, maintains an army greater than that of any other two nations, equipped and ready for immediate war.

One of my European visitors was quite certain that the line-up in the next war would be Germany, Russia, and Japan combined against Great Britain, France and the United States. That doesn't sound like sense viewed from this side of the ocean, but many people believe that something like that is coming and coming soon.

RUSSIA

I dined the other night with a brilliant woman of European birth, who lives most of her time in America because she likes it better than Europe, but who frequently travels all over the world. She speaks six languages, but is going to add another to her list.

"I'm studying Russian," she told me. "I'm going to need it. So is everybody else who has interests outside of America—and perhaps in America. Who knows? Russia is a nation of 175,000 people, working together to a common end, which is to impose a new social philosophy on the whole world, by force if necessary. Don't tell me there is nothing to worry about. I think the time is closer than anyone imagines when Russia will become a menace to the peace not only of Europe but of America as well. And if not that, certainly America will be an important factor in international trade before long. People who can talk and read Russian will have a great advantage over those who cannot."

I have heard others, who have

the greatest Christian of us all". The venerable merchant who died the other day at the age of 83 did not quite succeed in his desire to die poor, but he gave away millions upon millions to help others. His philanthropies were not limited to any sect, religion or country, though his chief enthusiasm in his later years was in the restoration of Palestine as a Jewish nation.

Born in Germany, Nathan Straus was brought to America as a child by his father, who ran a store in Talbotton, Ga. The only Jews in the community, the family attended the Baptist church, and the elder Straus would amaze the circuit-riding ministers who made his home their headquarters, by his ability to read the Old Testament in the Original Hebrew. Ruined by the Civil War, the father took his family to New York and started anew as an importer of pottery. From the opening of china departments in other men's stores the sons became eventually the owners of two of New York's greatest department stores.

Nathan Straus was not the only immigrant boy, nor the only Jew, to win fame, respect and fortune in America. Similar careers have been so frequent in this country that we forget that they are almost impossible anywhere else in the world.

ARE YOU SURE THE ROAST WILL BE "JUST RIGHT"?

Is it just chance when the roast of beef or pork or lamb comes from the oven, crisply brown and done to a turn? Is the outside of the roast of beef that rich brown and does each slice toward the center become a little more delicately pink? The roast may be just right if a few simple rules which have been worked out scientifically are followed, according to the home economics department, National Live Stock and Meat Board. Considerable time has been devoted in the last few years to experimental meat cookery and the results which have been obtained are of inestimable value to the housewife.

In all roasting the temperature must be right, and the cooking must be carried on for the correct amount

of time. The oven control is a boon to housewives in turning out perfect roasts.

For all roasts the oven should be hot to start with, for beef and lamb

the temperature should be 525 degrees F., and for pork a temperature of 480 degrees F. is recommended.

The roast is put in the oven and browned or seared at these temperatures and then the heat is reduced to a moderate temperature—350 degrees F., and the cooking is then continued at that temperature until the roast is done.

How long should a roast be cooked? That depends on the kind of meat. Pork is always cooked well done. Beef may be roasted rare, medium, or well done according to personal preference. Some persons like lamb a little under done, but usually it is cooked to the well-done stage.

About thirty minutes per pound should be allowed for cooking a pork roast—this in addition to the searing period of fifteen minutes. Roast beef is seared from twenty to thirty minutes and then for a rare roast sixteen minutes per pound is allowed; for a medium well-done roast, twenty-two minutes per pound, and for a well-done roast, thirty minutes per pound. Lamb requires thirty minutes per pound to be well

done. According to the best authorities, a roast should be salted before it is put in the oven. A better flavor is imparted to the meat if the salt has a chance to penetrate to the interior of the roast.

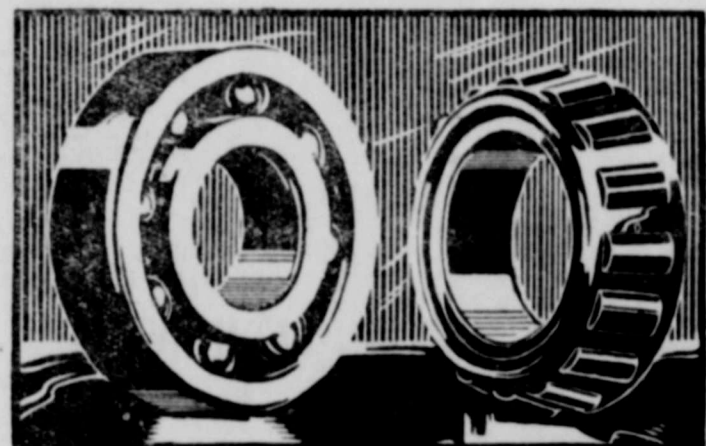
The way the roast is put in the oven has an important bearing on the final results. The roast should always be put in the oven with the fat side up. The fat melts and bastes the roast and so removes that bother. The leg of lamb is put in the pan skin side down and that thin papery covering known as the fell should not be removed as the roast holds its shape better and there is less shrinkage.

The roasting pan should not be covered at any time during the roasting period, nor should any water be added.

The observance of these rules will insure a roast that is tender, juicy, and evenly cooked throughout.

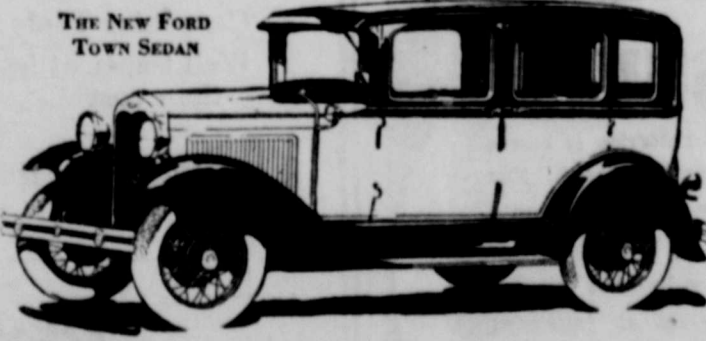

CUSTARD SOUFFLE

1-4 cup flour
1-4 cup sugar
1 cup scalded milk
4 eggs
1-2 teaspoon salt

Melt butter. Then add flour and gradually the hot milk. Bring this mixture to the boiling point and then pour in the egg yolks that have been well beaten and mixed with the sugar and salt. Cool the mixture. Then cut and fold in the whites of the eggs that have been beaten stiff and dry. Turn into a buttered pudding dish and bake from 30 to 35 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve at once with creamy or foamy sauce.

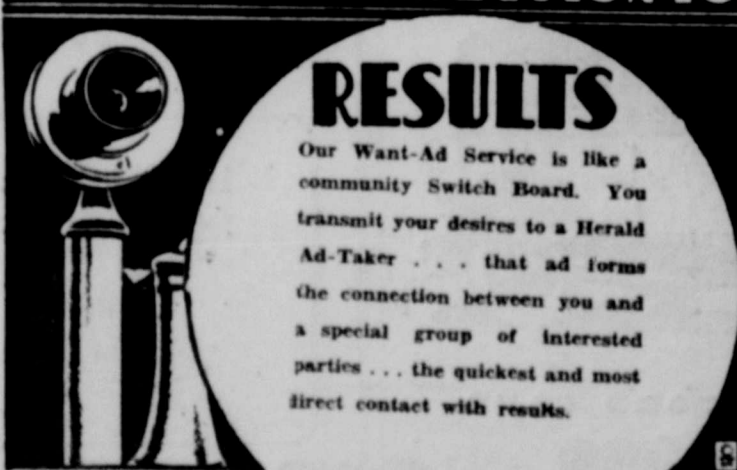

The new commissioner is described as a successful farmer from the rich cotton county of Ellis. Fred W. Davis, chief clerk, has for his outstanding accomplishment, the securing of a \$500,000 congressional appropriation to fight citrus diseases. J. M. Del Curto, chief entomologist, has developed a disinfectant which preserves germination qualities while protecting cotton from infection. W. A. Canon is a banker from one of the largest banks in the cotton county of Ellis. R. H. Fincher has had thirty-five years practical experience in gin work. R. V. Miller is a cotton seed expert. J. B. McClung, another executive of the department, is from Cass county in the extreme northeastern part of the state. L. L. Shackelford, another banker and from the Commissioner's home county of Ellis, will head the warehouse division. Other appointees mentioned are Judge R. M. West, Navasota, down in the southeast part of the state; W. E. Williams, another cotton expert; J. H. Burkett, pecan expert; and M. S. Frazee, chief of the weights and measures department, who according to the letter, has spent his life on a North Texas farm. SHORT COURSE AT GOODWELL

ANNUAL SHORT COURSE DATES AT PANHANDLE A. & M. COLLEGE ARE FEBRUARY 16 TO 19

The annual winter Short Course at Panhandle A. & M. College February 16-19 will enlist the services of ten other specialists prominent in agricultural and home economics circles of Oklahoma besides the regular faculty at Goodwell.

Dr. Henry G. Bennett, President of Oklahoma A. & M. College at Stillwater, will deliver the evening address at the College auditorium, February 17, at 8:00 p. m. Dr. Bennett, long recognized as a foremost educator in Oklahoma and now head of the great agricultural organization at Stillwater, will prove an attraction to the people of the Panhandle which they are not often privileged to enjoy.

Fred R. Merrifield, district agricultural agent for the northwest and a veteran of many Short Courses at P. A. M. C., will appear on the dairying and livestock program along with E. W. Prewitt, northwest district dairy specialist.

Peter Nelson, an authority on economic and farm management problems, from Stillwater, Oklahoma, will be an important addition to the 1931 Short Course faculty. He will take a major part on the section considering ways and means of confronting the present low price situation and also make the principal address at the general assembly at 11:00 a. m. Wednesday, February 18.

The poultry industry will be ably represented by H. G. Ware of Oklahoma A. & M. College, a man favorably known by poultry breeders and producers throughout the state.

Making the home production of vegetables and fruits a vital part of the farm program will be the aim of the Thursday morning section, February 19, in which D. C. Moor- ing, extension horticulturist from Stillwater, will take a leading part with Geo. R. Phillips, state forester of the Oklahoma State Department of Agriculture, Oklahoma City.

The Home Economics Department will present a complete program for women interested in home making concurrent with the agricultural Short Course. They have secured in addition to the regular faculty, Miss Eva A. Beatty, home demonstration agent of the Northwest District; Miss Madonna Fitzgerald, home management specialist from Oklahoma A. & M. College, Stillwater; and Miss E. Faith Strayer, child specialist.

Important features of the home making program will be the introduction of efficiency methods, the health and nutrition of children, their management and training. A day will also be devoted to clothing problems climaxed by a style show put on by the leading dry goods merchants of the Panhandle. The program is so arranged that the ladies will have an opportunity to attend both the poultry and horticultural sections of the agricultural division.

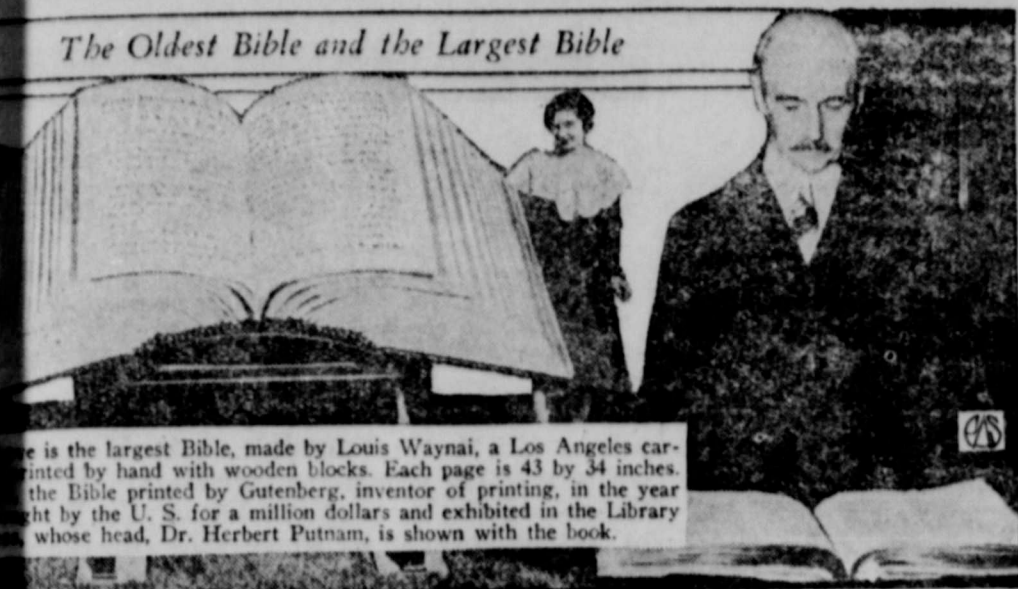

Knead, let rise in a warm place, roll out to one-fourth inch thick, cut into long strips, and twist these around the outside of a well-greased pan, cylindrical in form, joining the strips where necessary by moistening the edges. Let rise again; bake in a modern oven, and when nearly done brush over with sugar and water and sprinkle the top with fine-chopped almonds, mixed with dry sugar and cinnamon.

Hot Water Sponge Cake

Beat three egg yolks light and add one cup of sugar and continue beating until well mixed. Now add one cup of flour that has been sifted with one teaspoon of baking powder and a quarter teaspoon salt. Add two tablespoons of very hot water, then the whites of three eggs beaten stiff and a tablespoon of lemon juice. Bake in patty tins.

Japanese Lemon Pie

Just why Japanese, we don't know. But that is the name of it, and it is the delicious specialty of a friend. Boil together the juice of a small lemon, grated rind, four tablespoons of water and four of sugar. Cool and add the yolks of three eggs, well beaten. Cook in double boiler until creamy, stirring constantly. Beat the egg yolks, whites three of them, and beat in three tablespoons of sugar. Fold the hot lemon cream into the sweetened whites. Have ready a baked crust. Pour in the filling and brown in the oven. This makes a nine-inch pie.

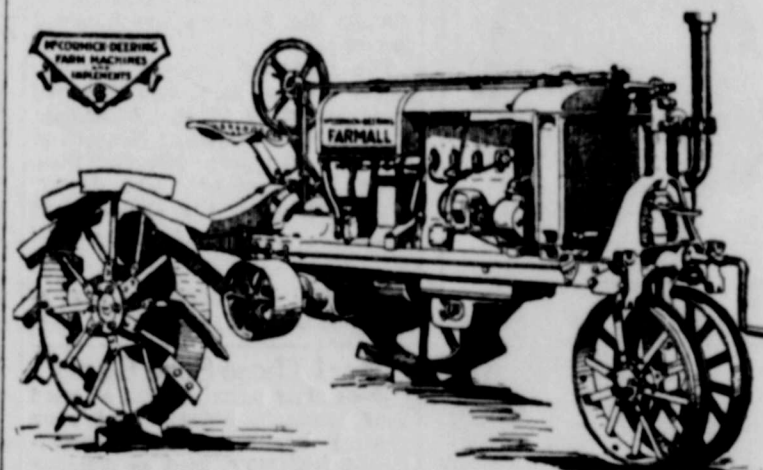

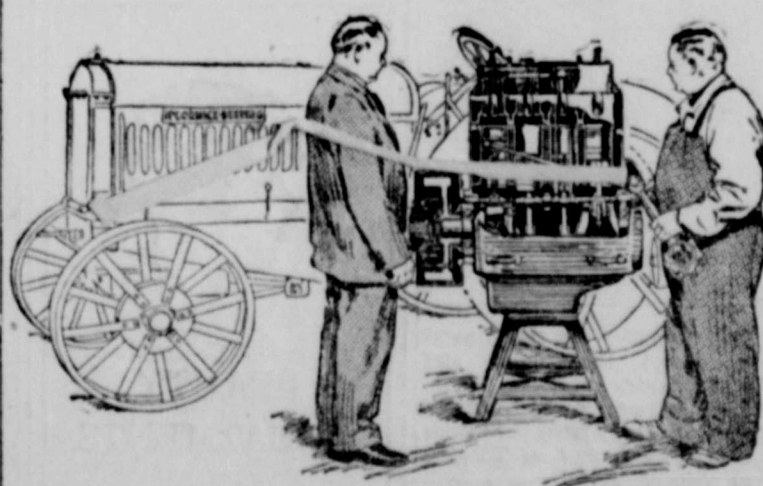

HOW TO PRODUCE GOOD HATCHING EGGS

D. H. Reid, Texas A. and M. Poultry Department

Good hatching eggs come from healthy, well fed hens. Cull out all sick or diseased birds from the flock, as these birds are often the source of the eggs that do not hatch. It is reported that New York people like pale yolks, but good hatching eggs have bright yellow yolks. Be sure that your breeding hens have a chance to eat green feed and see that they do eat it, even if you have to cut it and carry it to the pen.

Chopped-up green feed is a valuable addition to the laying ration of any flock of hens. If it is absolutely impossible to get green feed, it is wise to add one per cent tested Cod Liver Oil, but the green feed should be tried first.

Eggs with poor shells do not hatch readily, so it is well to see that your breeding hens have considerable mineral matter, especially calcium, in their ration. A shortage of calcium will give you poor shells and so poor hatching eggs.

Feed your hens a good ration—be sure that they have plenty of green feed. Use Cod Liver Oil if it is impossible to get green feed and add plenty of calcium to the ration and you will have good hatching eggs.
