Cycle Grand Prix Slated In Anton This Sunday

Anton Young Farmers are sponsoring a motorcycle grand prix race near Anton Sunday, Nov. 24.

A Lubbock cycle club, The West Texas Boondockers, are co-sponsoring the racing event made popular in Europe and gaining popularity here.

This style grand prix is held in small towns, basically, and is run over city streets, dirt roads, and more rugged terrain.

The Anton race will be run on a section of land three miles south of Anton on Farm Road 168; The objective of the event is to complete as many laps as possible in two hours.

Classes will include a mini bike—12 years and under, maximum 16-inch wheels, six trophies and 30 minutes

racing time. Powder puff—up to 200 cc open, three trophies per class, one hour of racing. Men's—125 cc, 126 cc, 250 cc, 251 cc, open, three trophies per class and first overall, two hours of racing.

The course will run through three caliche pits, down the farm road on pavement, and through an area of grass and trees. Machines do not have to be "street legal." For additional information, cyclist may contact Bill Fry at 747-1691.

About 300 cycles and riders are expected for the event.

Spectator admission is 50 cents. Sponsors will provide restrooms, concession stand and free overnight camping.

Fifteen freshmen boys at Littlefield Junior High School got into a home making class this quarter for a lark and found that they like cooking so well they hate to see the cooking class end.

"Bradley Allen and I talked about how funny it would be to get into a home economics cooking class," said Ronnie Milligan. "After we got in we found out we like to cook," he added with a note of surprise.

"I thought I'd be getting in a class with a lot of girls in it," Micky Austin said, and there was a burst of laughter from his 14 male classmates.

"I thought learning to cook would make me a good husband," Lewis Willey said.

"I took the class so I could eat before lunch," was Duff Reel's reason for signing up for the class.

Home projects were required. The boys were expected to cook at home, too, and do the dishes and clean up their messes. "They realized the time and effort it takes to make a meal," Mrs. Harbin said. "I think they all appreciate their mothers a little more."

"The class isn't composed of a bunch of sissies," said Runt Burch, one of the teachers who has sampled his share of the culinary projects. "They are all on the football team. Two of the boys, David Jones and Kevin Wallace, are FFA officers."

This is Littlefield's first junior high school cooking class with boys in it. This

is the first time this school has had a group of boys take home economics since the late 1940's when boys could play five years of high school football if they carried enough credits their extra year of schooling. A group of "senior" seniors took home economics to keep them eligible to play football.

Word of mouth, and perhaps a few morsels, must be good advertising. At least two classes of boys have signed up for cooking the third quarter of this school year.

According to the participants, cooking is the most fun course, the best way to get a good breakfast, even when it's Mexican food, and sometimes they like what they cook so well and eat so much they don't need any lunch and get to pocket their lunch money.

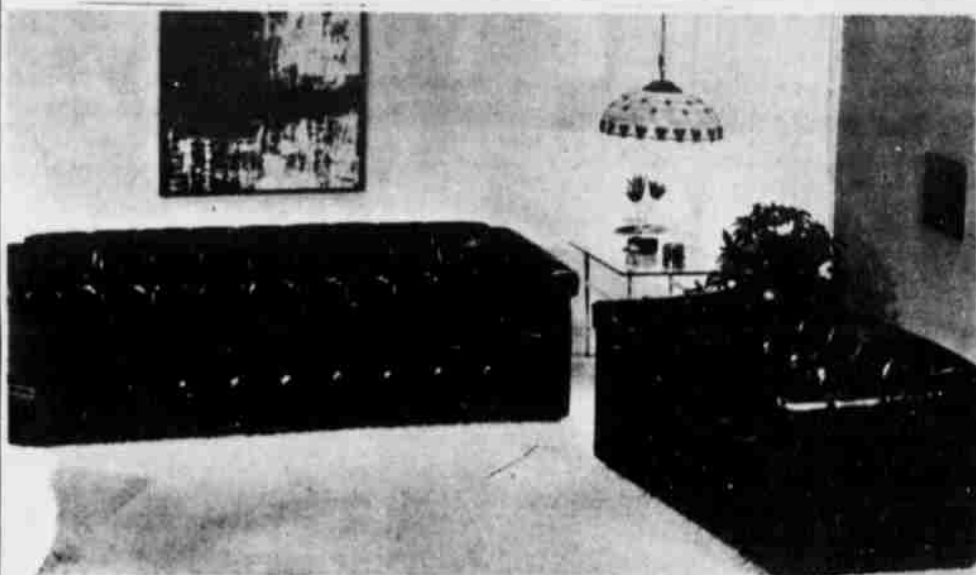
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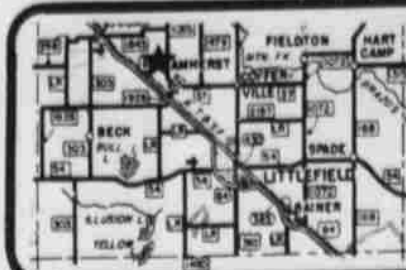

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EDITORIAL

High Cost Of Eating

THE HIGH COST of food—particularly products high in saturated fats and cholesterol—may be a blessing in disguise.

That's the view of Dr. Barney Klein Jr. of the Lamb County Division of the American Heart Association. Dr. Klein said that increased living costs are affecting each and every one of us, but we can turn these high prices to our advantage.

"IRONICALLY, the foods most people like are the ones they should eat less of," the physician said.

He cited those favorite high saturated fats, high cholesterol foods such as beef, butter, eggs and whole milk, all those prices have risen over the past few months. Dr. Klein pointed out that animal fat consumed in moderation won't hurt you and the body needs some cholesterol. "But, too much of these substances line the arteries, raise the serum cholesterol level in the blood and can lead to atherosclerosis," he said.

"These conditions help set the stage for heart attack and stroke."

DR. KLEIN SAID that for years, physicians and nutritionists have been cautioning against these foods. "Today's high prices might do," he noted, "what doctors' advice couldn't." "But that doesn't mean you can't enjoy eating," Dr. Klein added. He cited as "Hearth Healthy" substitutes lean meats, fish and poultry, vegetables, fresh fruits, whole grain and enriched breads and cereal.

HE POINTED to another heart helping result of inflation. "As gasoline prices go up and Americans are forced to conserve fuel due to the energy crisis, a long neglected mode of transportation might be discovered—walking."

"Economy-minded Americans who walk instead of ride," he says, "do more than save money. They also lose weight and build body tone—both of which are important to good health."

Look At Yourself

TAKE A LOOK at yourself every now and then if you have any warts or moles. We get so used to them, we sometimes forget that we have such things.

Some people call moles, "beauty spots"; others think that warts are caused by frogs—whatever you think, the American Cancer Society thinks that you should be alert for any changes in these body marks. I agree.

WE ARE TALKING about obvious changes—if for example the wart or mole gets bigger, blacker, or scaly. It may not mean anything at all, but only a physician can tell. So it's important to see one right away.

Sometimes, such a change is a Warning Signal of cancer. By keeping

alert and seeing a physician, you'll have the chance to be treated when the chances of cure are best—early in the course of the disease. That's the happy lesson 1,500,000 Americans cured of cancer have learned.

CANCER IS NOT a disease that goes away or gets better with the passage of time—it demands action and that's what you must take when you notice an obvious change in a wart or mole.

Will it automatically mean cancer?

No indeed!

But you must find out, because it's what you don't know about cancer that can hurt you.

Government Biased

IF ANYONE THINKS Uncle Sam's hundreds of thousands of bureaucrats can ever be instilled with the habit of penny-pinching, they are sadly mistaken.

After all, a bureaucrat's importance is measured by the size of his budget.

WHAT HAPPENS when this kind of philosophy governs spending decisions is reported by the editor of the Northwest-Signal, a newspaper in Napoleon, Ohio.

As he puts it, the philosophy of the U.S. government seems to be, "Never spend a dime when a dollar will get the job done."

He received a special order, 12x16-inch manilla envelope, mailed at government expense, from the Equal Opportunity Commission office in Washington, D. C. In the envelope was a

one-page, 8 1/2x11-inch news release that could easily have been folded into a regular business-size envelope.

Upon checking with an envelope supply house, the editor found that 100,000 of the special envelopes would cost only \$603 unprinted.

OBVIOUSLY, the bureaucrats in the office of the Equal Opportunity Commission did not care even a smidge about saving \$5,832 in taxpayers' money.

As the editor concludes, why should they: "It's only money isn't it, and there's plenty more where that came from."

2 large Golden Delicious or Winesap apples, cored and sliced.

Add red cabbage, vinegar, salt and allspice; toss together.

Slash frankfurters halfway through and arrange with apple slices on top of cabbage mixture. Heat to boiling.

COTTON HARVEST IS gaining momentum over the area as warmer temperatures accompanied by drying winds have aided the maturing of cotton. Most all cotton gins have hit the century mark as far as bales of 1974 cotton ginned.

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported 1,755 samples of cotton had been classed through Friday, Nov. 15, 1974. On this same date last season the total was 328,000.

I would like to call to your attention at this time the difference of almost 328,000 less bales ginned this year over last year. This factor is probably one of the most contributing factors as to why the price of cotton has not gone up this year.

Since almost everything is getting to be a science, even the producing and

marketing of cotton, I feel marketing of cotton will be similar to that of last year. And as we cotton harvested, the price will the supply will become more abundant.

The predominant grades classed were 51 and 52. Grade assigned to 26 percent while 51 was assigned to 30 percent. 52 percent of the samples were red grade because of bark content.

Predominant staples were 34. Staples 32 and 33 amounted to 20 percent each, while staple counted for eleven percent samples classed this past week.

Micronaire readings in the range of 3.5 to 4.9 accounted for 84 percent of the samples. This is a range of 3.5 to 4.9 accounted for 84 percent of the previous year.

Prices quoted by the Lubbock Exchange for the most popular qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 micron range were: Grade 51, Staple 34-35.20; and staple 34-35.20 per pound. For Grade 42, staple 33-32.85, and staple 34-32.85 per pound.

Day explained that while the Christmas postage specials cost 10 cents a piece, Christmas Seals have no fixed price.

Recipients of Seals are invited to make voluntary donations, and to use the Seals on letters, cards, and packages to help the Lung Association in its battle to prevent and control emphysema, chronic asthma, TB, cigarette smoking, and air pollution.

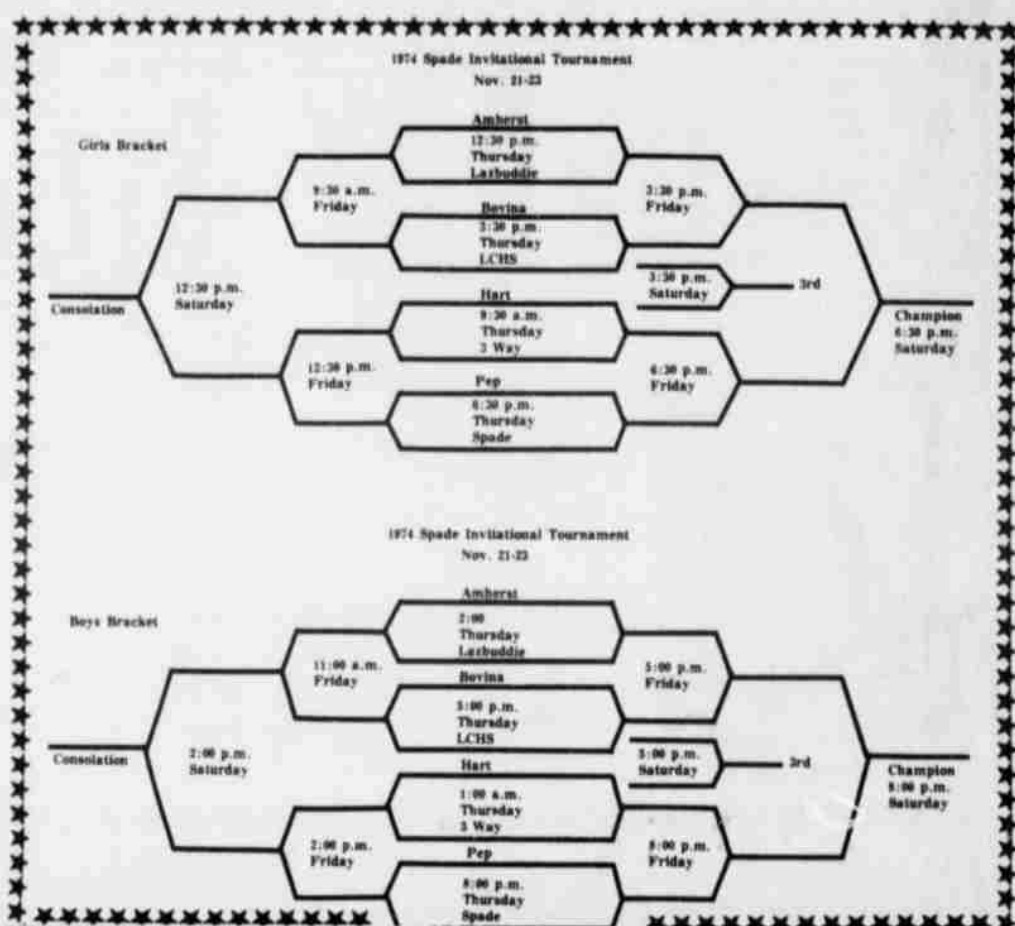
