

RAIL WORK INCREASED

EAST TEXAS WELLS CUT TO 150 BARRELS

General Wolters Announces This New Allowable to Become Effective Thursday at 7 o'clock.

NEW UNIT BASIS

Acresage Plan Will Be Tried for First Time Under Martial Law; Once Was Commission Method.

HOUSTON, Oct. 27. (AP)—Brigadier General Jacob F. Wolters announced today production in the East Texas oil field would be limited to 150 barrels daily per well, effective at 7 a. m. Thursday, October 28.

The general, who is in command of the field under martial law, made the announcement from his general headquarters here and simultaneously directed his staff in Kilgore, headquarters of the military district of East Texas, to issue the necessary general order for the change.

It will be the fourth reduction in allowable production since General Wolters took command. The first allowable was 225 barrels. It then was cut to 185 barrels, then to 165 barrels, where it stands currently. "I am authorized by the governor to say that this allowable (the 150-barrel figure effective Thursday) will remain in effect pending consideration and working out a plan whereby production will be held to a daily allowable of 400,000 barrels per day (for the entire field) and through the unit acreage plan," said the general.

The unit acreage plan of production had been employed in Texas previously, under jurisdiction of the state railroad commission, but has not been in effect since the East Texas field went under martial law. The plan General Wolters mentioned probably will not follow, in all respects, the old unit acreage schedule, but likely will be worked out with the advance concurrence of producers generally. Production in the East Texas field of last Sunday, the last figure available here to the general, was 428,310 barrels. The total number of wells in the field as of 7 a. m. yesterday was 2,167.

Mrs. Judd Will Return and Face Trial for Murder

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 27. (AP)—Whinnie Ruth Judd plans to start back to Phoenix, Ariz., tomorrow to stand trial for the murder of Miss Hedvig Samuelson and Mrs. Agnes Anne Le Roi, whose bodies she shipped to Los Angeles in trunks last week.

Attorneys for Mrs. Judd, who said she shot the women Oct. 17 in self defense, announced today no fight would be made against her extradition to Phoenix, the scene of the double slaying.

Sheriff James R. McFadden of Phoenix was en route to Sacramento where he expected to obtain extradition papers from Gov. James Rolph.

Attorneys for Mrs. Judd, who had an application for dismissal of the habeas corpus writ issued shortly after Mrs. Judd was arrested here last Friday would be made as soon as extradition papers were granted, so that she may be returned to Phoenix.

Wounded Dallas Citizen Is Dead

DALLAS, Oct. 27. (AP)—Charles L. Stephan, 39, wounded Oct. 6 by a man who attacked him as he left his office, died at a hospital last night.

William "Bill" Davis, charged with assault to murder, was rearrested after Stephan's death and lodged in the county jail. Arthur L. Wolf, 37, also wounded, recovered.

Testimony in Suit Will Start Today

First testimony in the suit of J. L. Gatewood and R. L. McMurtry versus S. A. McLaughlin was scheduled to be heard this afternoon in 31st district court. The jury was selected yesterday morning but arguments of attorneys on both sides and rulings of Judge W. R. Ewing have delayed testimony.

Mr. Gatewood is suing for commission and Mr. McMurtry for alleged damages when a land transaction was not completed. The suit will probably take the rest of this week.

Resignation of Clyde Garner as employment agent associated with the Welfare Board was announced today. Mr. Garner will take employment with the Cabot Co. It was decided at an executive committee meeting of the Board of City Development that Mr. Garner would not be replaced now. His work will be handled temporarily by Manager George Briggs and Mrs. W. H. Davis, manager of the Welfare Board office. Mr. Garner's salary has been paid by the Chamber of Commerce and not the Welfare Board. He was on duty about two months making employment agreements with large concerns and studying the welfare needs of jobless men. He will continue his duties the rest of this week, working largely with contractors on the Denver railroad project.

Dallas Railroad Man Seriously Wounded by Unknown Gunman

DALLAS, Oct. 27. (AP)—An unidentified gunman shot and critically wounded Frank Jennings, 45, operator of a commissary car at the Texas and Pacific railroad roundhouse, as he was coming to work today.

The shooting occurred at the entrance gate of the roundhouse. Jennings had stepped out of his automobile, opened the gate and was preparing to reenter his car, when wounded.

His assailant fled after firing two shots. Apparently robbery was not the motive for the attack, as money in Jennings' pocket was not touched.

Fourth Annual Poultry Show Will Be Held in Pampa December 3, 4, 5

Dates for the fourth annual poultry show here were set last night at a meeting of the agriculture committee of the Board of City Development and interested breeders. The event will be on Dec. 3, 4, and 5. Already too large to be held in connection with the Gray County Free fair, the poultry show attracts entries from all over this section. The quality is said to rank with any show on the Panhandle-Plains.

The building in which the show will be held has not been selected. Irvin Cole, local poultry man, will be general superintendent of the event.

Unclaimed Car Is In Officer's Care

LAVAL TURNS TOWARD HOME THIS MORNING

He de France Waits While Josee Dances With Mayor Walker; Girl Is Pleased by "Vanities."

HERE FIVE DAYS

No Protocol But Clearer Understanding Is Result of Visit; Discussions Are Called Frank Ones.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27. (AP)—A queen of the sea waited five and a half hours today while the daughter of the premier of France danced with a Yankee mayor at a millionaire's birthday party.

The Ile de France was to have sailed at five minutes past midnight with Premier Laval and his daughter, Josee, aboard. At that hour, however, the orchestra in the fashionable night club, the Central Park Casino, was playing "Capit on the Birthday Cake" and Madeleine Josee Laval was dancing with Mayor James J. Walker. Monsieur Laval was watching with an expressive smile and a group of socially important persons who were gathered to honor the natal day of Cornelius Vanderbilt Whitney beamed their approval.

The boat waited. Finally, at 1:15 a. m. when Mayor Walker's car rolled up with Josee, the premier close behind, the captain decided to postpone sailing until a more advantageous tide rolled out at 5:30 a. m.

Wishes Exchanged. The mayor went aboard to wish the premier bon voyage and to say, formally, "best wishes to your country for what she is doing to benefit humanity." M. Laval replied with an expression of admiration for America.

Mademoiselle Laval declared her last five hours in New York were the happiest she had ever known. The last act of "The Vanities" and the night club. The premier said goodbye. The mayor said goodbye. The five-day visit was ended. Better Understanding. The premier departed feeling that France and the United States—since his conversations with President Hoover—understand each other better and know what to expect. His last day was filled with receptions, sightseeing and was featured by a dinner of the French Chamber of Commerce at the Waldorf-Astoria.

"We drafted no protocol," the premier told the dinner guests in reference to his conferences with the president, "we were animated by the mutual desire to examine thoroughly in the course of a free and frank discussion, the various problems which the various crisis raises."

He spoke in French and his remarks were translated. Under Secretary of State William R. Castle Jr., delivered the official farewell on behalf of the government of the United States.

Officers of the Chicago surface lines voted to buy \$225,000 worth of the tax anticipation warrants. The money, expected by city officials to be available within a few days, will be split between the city treasury and the school board. At least \$562,000 will go into the delayed pay envelopes for teachers.

D'Andrea in Plea to Judge

Capone's Bodyguard Is to Be Sentenced Tomorrow for Gun Toting.

CHICAGO, Oct. 27. (AP)—Philip D'Andrea, pistol-carrying bodyguard for Al Capone, interrupted his contempt hearing today before Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson, and threw himself on the mercy of the court.

Judge Wilkerson adjourned the hearing, saying he would give his decision at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

In answer to the court's questions, D'Andrea said he had known Capone four or five years, "rather intimately" in recent months, and had stayed at the gangster's hotel a few times. But he insisted again and again that he did not know in what business Capone and his followers were engaged.

"I never even asked him," D'Andrea said. "It's too delicate a question."

Judge Wilkerson asked if D'Andrea had ever heard from other sources about Capone's business. He replied slowly, with a shrug of his shoulders, "Well, I've heard he was a bootlegger, a gambler, and this and that, but I don't know."

Amarillo Truck Drivers Go Back To Work at Compromise Wages

AMARILLO, Oct. 27. (AP)—Most of the 30 truckers who went on strike two weeks ago and demanded higher wages were back at work today and paying work on State Highway No. 5 north of the city was resumed. We could get no support from the city and had to give in, said C. E. Smith, president of the Amarillo Truck Owners' association.

The truckers' plea for higher wages had been met almost half way. The old price was 84 cents a load, and they returned to work for 91 cents. They first demanded \$1.40 a load but later agreed to work for \$1.35.

First Frost of Fall Season Is Likely Tonight in This Section

The tender is in the shock and, if there were pumpkins, the frost would probably be on them tonight.

At any rate, frigid north winds today gave an unmistakable hint of approaching winter, and the Associated Press reports that the weather men would not be surprised to see frost on the grass tomorrow morning. If so, it would be the first of the season.

HELENA, Mont., Oct. 27. (AP)—A forecast of "fair and cold" weather today pressed the stamp of winter on Wyoming and Montana. Snow and wind storms swept the region yesterday.

The mountains of Montana were covered with snow and roads leading through the southern and eastern entrances to Yellowstone park were clogged by a fall 18 inches deep.

Three inches of snow covered Anderson, Bozeman was beset by near freezing weather but had little snow. Western and southwestern Wyoming, where a blizzard disrupted traffic and communication lines yesterday, were colder today and some snow was falling.

JOBLESS MEN TO GET WORK ON NEW LINE

Clyde Garner, Employment Agent Here, Will Select Workers Most in Need Through Breaks Under Machinery.

CAMP NEAR CITY

Making Cuts and Fills Way With Heavy Machinery. 30-Cent Wage.

Another camp has been established on the new Fort Worth and Denver railway line from Children to Pampa and construction work is scheduled to start there tomorrow morning, according to John McKnight, contractor, who will be in charge of the work. The camp is about four miles southeast of Pampa and work will be from that point towards Pampa.

At least 25 local men will be employed and Clyde Garner, employment representative of the Board of City Development, has been instructed to secure men suitable to the work to be done.

Mr. Garner said that he would choose men who were most in need of employment and who would fill the jobs satisfactorily. Some of the men will have to be single, as they will have to live at the camp. Laborers will be paid 30 cents an hour for a 10-hour day.

Mr. McKnight brought a number of teams and key men to Pampa but will keep only six key men, he said yesterday.

The first half mile of new road will be built with freestone and will not use as many men as will be needed for the rest of the work. The ability to reach agreements with some landowners is holding up work in other sections of the country, but the obstacle is expected to be erected soon.

The Roberts Construction company is at work on 7 miles of fill and fill through the breaks southeast of the Magnolia carbon black plant. Their big machines are making the work look easy.

Their main camp is located east of the Saunders pool. They are working two ways from that location.

H. H. Durston of Fort Worth, executive general agent, has been here since Monday assisting in the purchase of right-of-way and making preparations for establishment of the new construction camp.

Sandino Plans to Start Offensive

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 27. (AP)—Officially denying reports he is sick, Augusto C. Sandino, Nicaraguan insurgent leader, today advised his representative here that he has completed the reorganization of his army and is ready to begin offensive.

He reported he has eight columns of men, well provisioned, and equipped to launch the campaign, which he indicated would be conducted over a widespread territory in northern Nicaragua.

Nation's Production of Oil Decreases

TULSA, Okla., Oct. 27. (AP)—The Oil and Gas Journal reports a decrease of 48,696 barrels in the daily average crude oil production of the United States last week, largely due to reductions in runs from Oklahoma and East Texas fields.

Total production for the week ended Oct. 24, was 3,380,174 barrels daily as compared with 3,428,870 barrels in the preceding week. Oklahoma production fell from 505,215 to 482,110 barrels daily, due principally to reduction in Oklahoma City flow from 165,715 to 143,235 barrels daily.

East Texas produced 400,288 barrels daily, as compared with 422,168 previously. A new state order for reduced production there was responsible for the drop. Kansas production was virtually stationary at 101,945. Previous production was 101,670 barrels daily. Total mid-continent production was 1,453,855 as compared with 1,500,565 barrels daily the preceding week.

Eastern production was steady at 116,000 barrels while California production was down 500 daily to 567,500 barrels. Rocky Mountain production increased from 22,750 to 24,683 barrels daily.

HARVESTERS ARE EAGER TO RIP INTO LUBBOCK WESTERNERS

DEMPSEY IS GIVEN OFFER BY JOHNSTON

Can Get 40 Per Cent of Receipts For Fighting Campolo or Carnera.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27. (AP)—If he's really serious about that come-back attempt, Jack Dempsey can have 40 per cent of the gate receipts for a match in Miami, Fla., next February against either Victorio Campolo or Primo Carnera.

James J. Johnston, Madison Square Garden promoter, said he had been informed the old Manassa mauler was prepared to come east to discuss the proposition if necessary. Dempsey, preparing for a come-back after an extensive barnstorming tour of the far west, now is on a hunting trip in Nevada.

Observers here considered it unlikely Dempsey would accept the terms Johnston has offered, pointing out that the one-time heavyweight champion almost invariably in the past demanded and was given a guarantee. He probably would want half a million for a match against Carnera or Campolo who clash here Nov. 27.

Nevertheless, the garden definitely is committed to a boxing show at Miami next winter. Johnston has been working for some time with a view toward getting Max Baer to defend his heavyweight title against Mickey Walker.

Iowa, Michigan Will Be Expected To Even Honors

CHICAGO, Oct. 27. (AP)—The Western conference will be looking to Michigan and Iowa Saturday to pull it up even with the rest of the country in intersectional football.

In nine intersectional contests this season Big Ten teams have lost five decisions, have won three and tied one. Iowa which has suffered two of the five defeats, appears about ready to win a game this week with George Washington University of Washington, D. C., as its opponent, while Michigan, which seems to have recovered from its disappointing start, will be a long favorite over Princeton's Tigers.

Iowa has been beaten by Pittsburgh and Texas A. and M. Ohio dropped a hair-raiser to Vanderbilt, Yale crushed Chicago, and Pennsylvania upset calculations by trouncing Wisconsin last week. Wisconsin previously had earned a 7-7 draw with Alabama Poly.

On the other side of the ledger, Minnesota defeated Oklahoma A. G. Gies, Northwestern walloped the University of California's Southern branch eleven, and Purdue outpointed Carnegie Tech last Saturday.

COMISKEY IS TO BE BURIED ON THURSDAY

Body of "Old Roman" Now Lies in State at Chicago Home.

CHICAGO, Oct. 27. (AP)—The body of Charles A. Comiskey, baseball's "Old Roman," came back to Chicago today to lie in state until funeral services Thursday morning.

The body of the owner of the Chicago White Sox, who died at his summer home at Eagle River, Wis., early yesterday, started last night on a 30-mile automobile journey to Rhineland, Wis., where it was transferred to a train scheduled to arrive this morning. The body was accompanied by the Old Roman's only son, J. Louis Comiskey, and Harry Grabner, secretary of the White Sox and Comiskey's closest confidant.

Comiskey's last illness came on him while he still was trying to build a club to replace his American league champions of 1919, which he wrecked after the scandal which followed the world series that year. He retired to virtual seclusion several years ago when his health began to fail.

It is expected that control of the White Sox, which belonged to Comiskey—franchise, players and park—will pass to his son, J. Louis Comiskey.

BIG THREATS BY OPPOSITION RILE LOCALS

Abilene Sportsman Impressed; Recalls Abilene's Brownwood Score, 34-6.

Having put an enthusiastic practice behind them yesterday, the Pampa Harvesters planned to increase the thoroughness of their blocking, punting, passing, and pass defense today. Their scrimmages today and tomorrow will be heavy and behind closed gates.

The boys are somewhat puzzled by the extreme confidence of Lubbock fans and players with whom they talked Saturday. They were so worked up by the palaver that they are impatient to crash into the cocky Westerners, who have ridden easy teams but have yet to tackle an opposing team like the Harvesters.

The Pampa huskies and Abilene, leaders of this district, figure Lubbock will learn the hard way when they try to crash the local forward wall.

While Lubbock is unimpressed by Pampa victories, other teams and writers are more apprehensive. Here is what Prexy Anderson, shrewd sports scribe of the Abilene Reporter, said about the Brownwood game here:

"Another team wandered far from home last week for a big beating and big money. The Brownwood high school team was lured to Pampa to take a fall of just 71 to 0. Gene Taylor advised before his departure for the Panhandle that the school's athletic treasury would be enriched several hundred dollars by the trip. The amount of the guarantee was not made known. The Pampa citizens are what we call football crazy. The Harvesters' game with Amarillo week before last brought in a cool \$8,600.

"The Oil Belt should try laughing off that Pampa score against Brownwood. The best Cisco and Abilene, leaders of this district, could do against the same team. The score was 32 to 0, and 34 to 6, respectively."

Three officials have been agreed upon by the two schools. Their duties will probably put DeFord as referee, Vaughn as head-linesman, and Bill Williams as umpire. DeFord is from Dallas, Vaughn is from Panhandle, and Williams is principal at Snyder. The field judge probably will be Devault of Wichita Falls.

The Harvesters should be in condition for the Lubbock game, although minor injuries must heal before that time. For instance, Joe Kahl has a sore toe. Reason: He struck it against a dresser while illustrating plays at home.

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CADETS WILL CARRY ON FOR DEAD YOUTH

No Tendency is Seen to Cancel Games Still on Army Schedule.

WEST POINT, N. Y., Oct. 27. (AP) Back to West Point today came Richard Brinsley Sheridan Jr., to find a last resting place with some of America's most distinguished soldiers.

The 21-year-old Army football star and honor student died in New Haven hospital late yesterday after a broken neck suffered late in the Yale game Saturday.

Funeral services will be held in the Catholic chapel tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock. Interment will follow in the West Point military cemetery where are buried General Winfield Scott, General George Custer, General Robert C. Anderson who was in command of Fort Sumter in '61, General George W. Goethals, builder of the Panama canal, and many another famous military figure of the past.

At the request of Sheridan's mother, services both at the chapel and cemetery will be private. The corps of cadets and officers of the post will attend.

In the general grief felt at the academy over Sheridan's death, there was no disposition to talk, or even think of what course the army would pursue in regard to the games remaining on its 1931 football schedule.

But there was a distinct feeling that the team would "carry on" and play out a schedule that calls for games against Colorado college, Louisiana State, Pittsburgh, Ursinus, Notre Dame, and Navy. It was pointed out that Army has contract obligations with these schools that hardly can be disregarded. In addition to the inconveniences done opponents, cancellation would involve about \$1,000,000 in receipts. Final decision as to what course will be pursued rests in the hands of Maj. Gen. William R. Smith, superintendent of the academy.

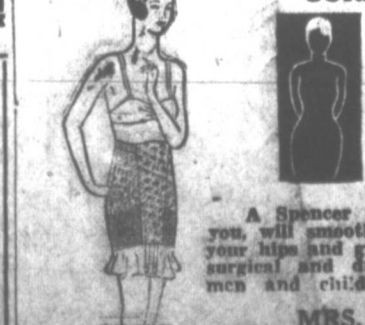
