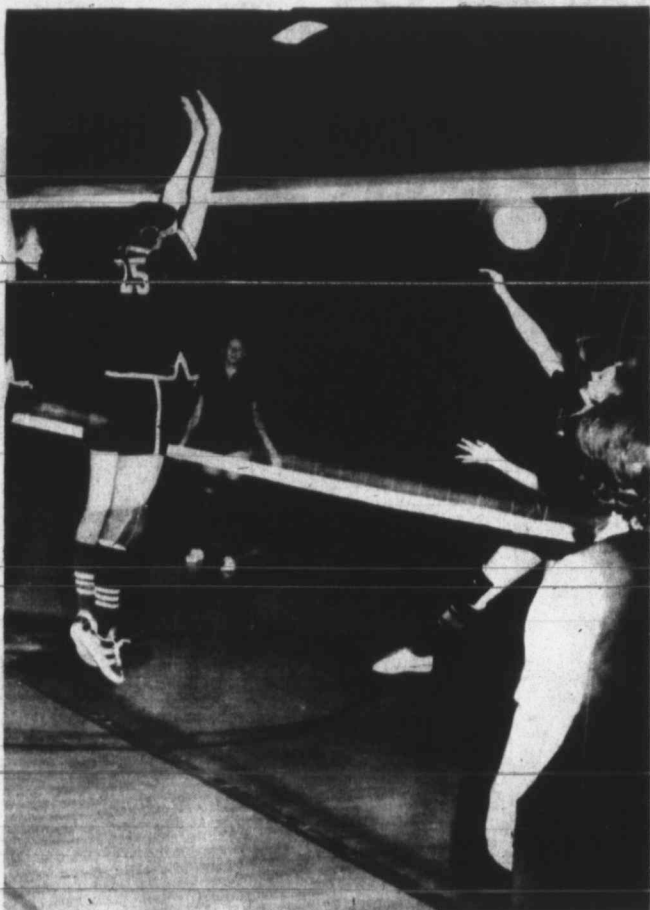
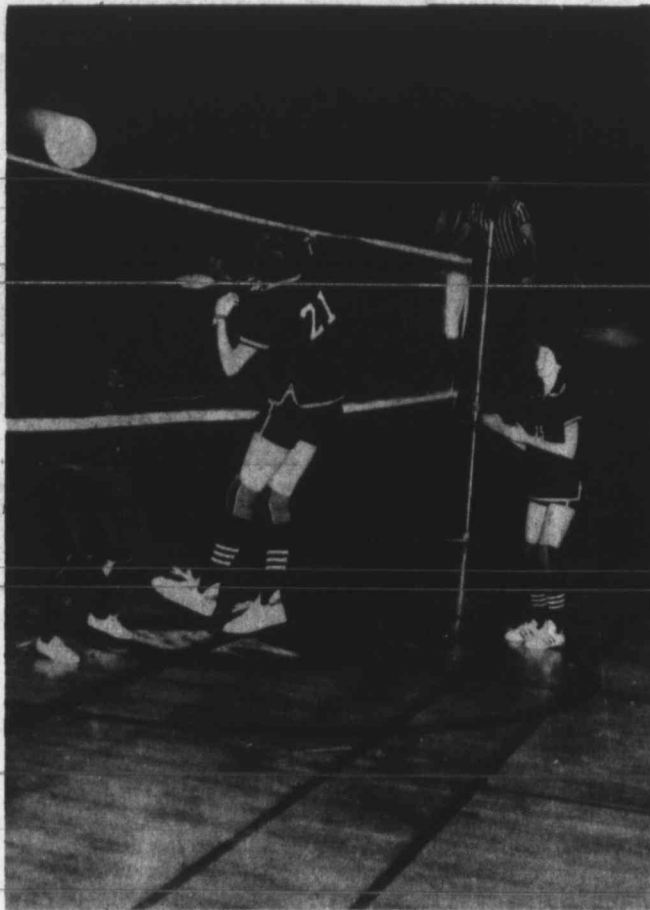




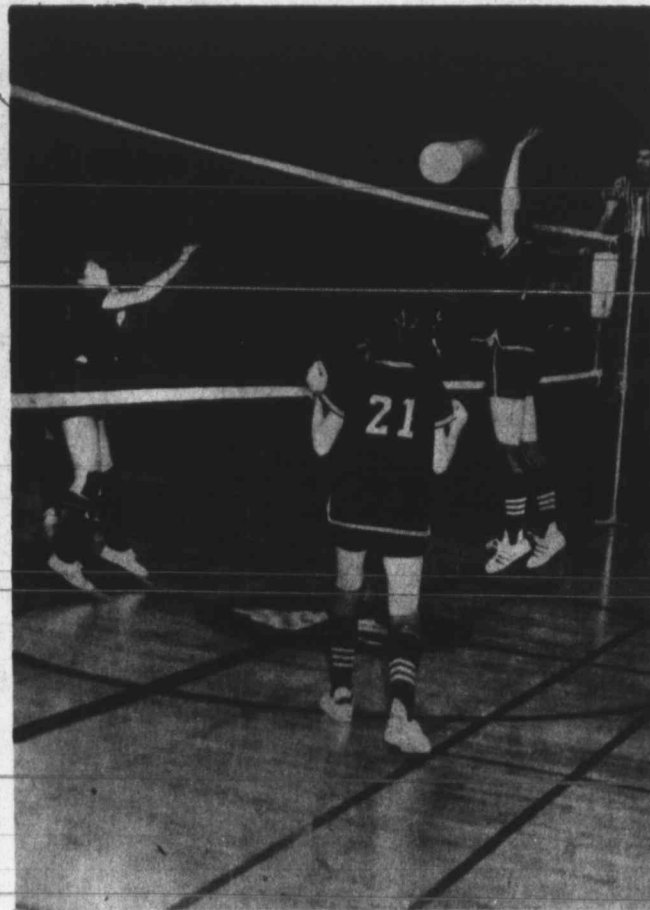

Fate Of Democratic Party Of Concern

The uncertain future of the Democratic party is of grave concern to U.S. Rep. Omar Burleson who visited Colorado City last week and spoke to a crowd of 92 persons at a Chamber of Commerce dinner at Civic House.

Following the luncheon he was interviewed by the Record and declared that the McGovern faction enforced the "most undemocratic processes we've ever had--yet they called it liberalizing the process."

Special Speaker

James Cameron, head football coach at Angelo State University will be guest speaker Sunday morning for services at First Baptist Church of Colorado City.

Cameron, a graduate of East Texas State University, was named head football coach at Angelo State following successful seasons as coach at Howard Payne College.

This year, ASU finished the year with an 8-3 record, the best record in the history of ASU. Also, the team participated in their first bowl games in a four year institute.

He commended Bob Strauss of Dallas, the new national Democratic chairman, and lauded him for his efforts to wrest control of the party from the McGovern people.

One of his biggest steps in that direction was to take over the party from Jean Westwood, Burleson declared.

When asked about a possible candidate who could be a winner and a popular candidate for the Democratic party in 1976, Burleson could name only one man, Henry Jackson of Washington, a contender in 1972.

Jackson's stand on national defense has strong appeal to Burleson although the Texas representative said Jackson is somewhat too liberal on domestic affairs.

Burleson told the crowd at Civic House he believes in strong national defense -- "we cannot be isolationists," he said when asked about the possible closing of 65 major bases and 200-300 minor bases the U.S. has throughout the world.

Not only are these bases, some of which can and will be closed, important to fulfill our treaty commitments, Burleson pointed out, but they are also

important to help secure our needs for various minerals. He noted that there are 15 See FATE Page 8

Local Monies To Be Sought

The Mitchell County Community Action Program has been officially notified that funds for its operation will be discontinued effective April 30.

President Nixon has announced his intention to eliminate the

Office of Economic Opportunity from the budget for the next fiscal year. OEO is the parent organization of CAP.

Local programs in which CAP has been active include the well-baby clinic, family planning

clinic, free store, activity classes that include sewing, cooking and quilting, driver education, referrals, general service, and economic development projects.

The number of participants

during the four years of CAP's existence here totals 2,745 persons.

The amount of federal funds that have been received through Mitchell County CAP during the four years of the program amounts to \$76,000. In addition contributions in labor and material items, put into the program by local agencies and individuals has amounted to \$44,460.01, far above the \$15,200 that the government required.

City Is Not Satisfied With Delinquent Taxes

Mitchell County commissioners and the Colorado Independent School District has approved a new contract with an Austin law firm to collect delinquent taxes but the city council balked at renewing the contract Monday night, saying they have been dissatisfied with service from the firm.

The contracts for all three taxing agencies have been in effect for two years with McCreary & Huey of Austin.

School officials are well satisfied as the agency has helped the school district collect a total of delinquent taxes, plus penalty and interest totaling \$62,843.53 during the two year period.

Three Found Guilty

Sentences Of 13, 13, & 17 Years

Three Dallas teenagers were found guilty by a 6-man, 6-woman jury in 32nd District Court here late Wednesday night of the Oct. 28 robbery of a Colorado City man.

The jury sentenced Charles Edward Manoy, 17, to 17 years in prison and the other two defendants, Gary Jerome Mallard, 18, and Jesse Renee Sledge Jr., 19, were each given 13 years

for their alleged part in the crime.

A fourth youth charged in the robbery, Charles Lovell Jackson, 16, will be tried separately.

The trial was in connection with the abduction and robbery Oct. 28 of Stan Shawn, son of Colorado City banker and Mrs. Wayne Shawn.

Shawn, 21, a college student who was home for the weekend, was abducted from a parking lot while he was running an errand for his mother.

He was graduated from H-SU with a bachelor of music degree in May 1972.

He has previously served in the music and youth programs at Belmont Baptist Church in Abilene and First Baptist Church in Clyde.

During his three years of service in Clyde, the enrollment in the music program rose from 56 to more than 200. Of this total 101 were young people.

He was ordained into the ministry while at Clyde and served as the associational music director while there.

able support for our efforts -- otherwise our accomplishments thus far would have been impossible to document and prove. The fact being people here did care and were willing to help; we did create and accomplish true community action."

Mrs. Shamburger pointed out that the local CAP is the only agency in Mitchell County that deals on a one-to-one family basis including follow-up work in the areas of contact and referral services for low income families in the areas of health care, youth work, job referrals, and general home and family counselling, providing alternatives for situations and conditions affecting low-income persons.

"The basic prevailing theory of our work is helping persons to help themselves and we believe we have done just this.

"We will make an effort to acquire local funding in the light of revenue sharing monies available to continue our operations. The past four years have been worthwhile and without regrets. The efforts made were good and positive.

"If you agree, say so on paper and get it to the CAP office," Mrs. Shamburger urged of everyone in the community.

Present board members of the local CAP organization are Dorsey Johnson, president; Bill Carter, vice president; Ann Nobles, secretary-treasurer, and Junior Carter, Drew Ballard, Eula Lenora, Virginia DeLoera, Tony Castillo, Kenneth Rogers, Bob Rely, Marion Bassham, James Torres and Davis Edens.

The Mitchell County CAP has shown its capability for progress and has continued to try and meet some of the needs of low-income families. This has been done primarily through local initiative efforts, not federal money," Mrs. Shamburger pointed out.

Permanent activities of CAP have included a free store, well-baby clinic, two family planning clinics, prenatal clinic, Wallace Community Center, Brownie Troop, Rabbits, Summer recreation program including a summer lunch program, quilting circle, worm farm and 10 on-the-job training slots in

agency has helped the city collect only some \$19,000 during that same period and most of that was the "cream of the crop," the easy cases, City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr. told the council Monday night.

The council asked Sadler to have a representative of the firm to come back and talk with the council regarding the contract in order to clear up any misunderstandings.

Members of the council were critical of the service they have received as the firm has not yet prosecuted any of the cases it has filed in court.

Mayor C. C. (Mike) Burt pointed out that the delinquent tax rolls amounted to about \$78,000 when the firm was given the contract and the amount of delinquent taxes now amounts to about \$80,000.

Councilmen have indicated they hoped some of the back tax cases could be prosecuted in order for the city and other taxing bodies to gain possession of buildings that are hazards and need to be torn down.

For the school's part, the amount of back taxes when the tax attorneys took over the contract was \$72,011.29 and that amount is now down to \$63,139.53 despite the addition of delinquent taxes in the last two years.

Mitchell County has received more than \$49,858.70 from the county as the result of action by the tax attorneys.

Other projects conducted at special times have included sewing classes, for adults and teenagers, citizenship classes, tutoring classes, teenage club, cooking class, fund raising projects, ABE babysitting service, Sands Community Center and a teenage employment service during the summer.

"It is the feeling of the CAP staff that so much more could be done, so many more needs met, if only our funding level was more adequate, thus making possible more economic development, self-help projects, two more aides to serve Westbrook and Loraine, and a worker that specialized in group organizations to staff the Neighborhood Center," Mrs. Shamburger said.

"Also there is a terrific need for day care in our county, and this too, could be done," she noted.

basic minerals and the U.S. is deficient in nine of those 15. So the U.S. must depend on foreign sources of minerals in which the U.S. is inadequately endowed.

During his speech, he stressed that the U.S. must face up to its financial responsibilities and bring an end to deficit spending before 1978 -- without a 15% tax increase, an increase which would add to the growing burden already on the back of taxpayers.

He pointed out that the impending of funds by the President, authorized by Congress is not new but Nixon has done this more than any previous president.

When questioned about the postal service, Burleson noted that postal service is costing more now than ever before and another increase probably will be coming soon and the service continues to deteriorate.

He said he has pursued this problem only to be told the Post Office is trying many things in the "trial and error" process. "There's just been too much error in the process," Burleson said as he noted that Post Office probably will have to be taken over again by Congress.

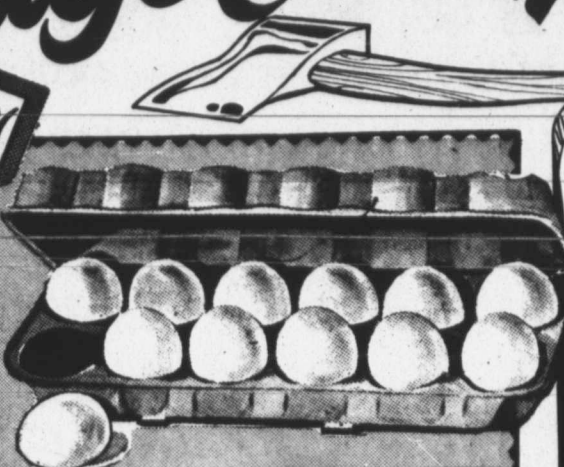

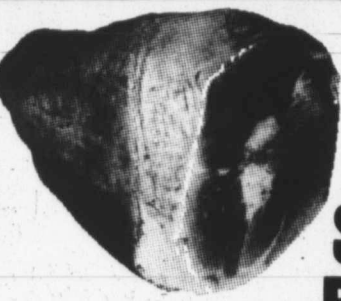
