E. B. McGowan, Hancock Farmer, Dies Wednesday

E. B. McGowan, well known farmer living at Arvana, was laid to rest in the Lamesa Cemetery April 23, the funeral services at the Baptist church in charge of his pastor, Rev. E. F. Cole, with Rev. W. W. Riley, pastor of the Methodist church at Trent, assisting. The Baptist male quartet sang two songs requested by the family, and among those sung by the choir, "The land where we never grow old" was especially requested, being Mr. McGowan's favorite song. Mrs. Ray Hollingshead was at the piano.

The pastor's sermon, based on Martha's words to Mary, "The Master is come and calleth for thee" was comforting and encouraging to the great crowd of relatives and friends gathered to pay their last respects to Mr. McGowan.

Collapsing suddenly Sunday afternoon with a heart attack at his home where his children were gathered for a family reunion, Mr. McGowan improved Monday so much that the other relatives who had been hurriedly summoned, were able to return home. Later they were notified of renewed heart attacks which caused his death early Wednesday morning.

Coming here from Trent seven years ago, Mr. McGowan was considered one of the best farmers and stockmen in this part of the country. He was highly regarded as a man and neighbor by a large number of friends here and in other sections of Texas.

Fifty two years old at the time of his death, more than half of his life was spent as an active member of the Baptist church, and his membership was in the First Baptist church at Lamesa where he and his family were regular attendants.

Many cars attended the funeral services from Taylor and Nolan counties where the family formerly lived.

Floral pieces for the funeral were prepared by Mr. McGowan's oldest son, Rochelle McGowan, a florist living in Ft. Worth. LAMESA WINS TOPS HONORS IN REGIONAL TRACK MEET

Lamesa took first honors in the regional interscholastic track and field meet held in Canyon last week-end with a total of 18 points. Hughes set a new record when he threw the discus 134 feet, 9 inches and placed third in the shot put. Eugent Boswell won second in the 440 yard dash; Kirk McKinnon placed second in the 220 yard dash and third in the 100 yard dash; and the Lamesa relay team composed of McKinnon, Buchanan, Medlin and Boswell won second place in the relay. These winners will compete in the state meet of the Interscholastic League in Austin this week.

SCHOOL NOTES

Mr. G. D. Holbrook, deputy state superintendent of public instruction, paid the Lamesa schools an official visit last Tuesday. He visited the classes in subjects in which new or additional credits are being sought, a few grades and rooms in the elementary school and observed all he could inspect during the day. Credits are being sought in diversified occupations, 2nd year band and orchestra music, a second unit in secretarial training, an additional half unit in typewriting and a unit in general science or a total of six and one half units. Mr. Holbrook's official report will first be made to his superiors in the State Department of Education in Austin and then to local school officials.

Several elementary and high school pupils will participate in the District singing-song as a part of the Centennial features for school Friday afternoon. Dawson county's quota for the Centennial gathering of 50,000 Texas school children on June 13th is 100. State Supt. L. A. Woods and the State Supervisor of Music will attend the district meetings and it is from this meeting that State Supt. Woods will visit Lamesa on Friday night as announced elsewhere in this paper.

Dawson county will have six or more contestants at the State Meet of the Interscholastic League this week. McKinnon, Boswell, Hughes, Buchanan and Huddleston or Cecil Hally Medlin of the Lamesa high school and Ocon of the Wilson school are the contestants who have qualified.

Several other pupils will attend the state B meet at Denton.

Country Schools Featured At Luncheon Club

The feature of the Luncheon club meeting this week was country schools. Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum, county School Superintendent, gave a careful explanation of the Dawson County rural school system, explaining the work accomplished this year and the work that they hope to do in the future. Miss Bulsterbaum stated that the expenditure through the rural school amounts to \$90,000 annually, \$69,000 of which goes for the payment of teacher's salaries and the remainder for the maintenance of schools. She stated that there are 23 rural schools in Dawson county with a total enrollment of 2,186 students and 93 teachers. Two of these schools have units and affiliation and one other is a standardized school.

Mrs. L. W. West presented her primary choral club which entertained the club with a number of Texas Centennial songs.

G. D. Holbrook, deputy state superintendent, was a visitor of the club and complimented the schools of Dawson county and the city schools very highly. L. A. Duff and Mr. Peterson, members of the county school board, were also welcome visitors of the club.

Member Dawson County Parole Board Named

Governor James V. Allred last week announced the appointment of the following as members of the Dawson County volunteer parole board, bringing the total number of such boards to 154, covering 156 counties: E. R. Yates, Lamesa, Chairman; M. G. Martin, Lamesa; Dee Hull, Lamesa; W. E. Witte, Lamesa; and R. H. Kirk, Lamesa.

The county parole board plan, inaugurated by Governor Allred, is one of volunteer service, through which members of the boards give counsel and assistance to men and women released from the state penitentiary by executive clemency. The plan has been received with great enthusiasm by those familiar with rehabilitation work among prisoners and has proven successful in the time it has been in force, especially in the larger cities.

The members of the boards, as a general rule, are selected by nomination by the various service and civic clubs of each community, which nominations are submitted to Governor Allred for appointment.

Murder Trial Of Mont Bridges Draws Large Crowds Here

Trial of Mont Bridges, accused of killing Jay Donaldson and Miss Bertha Gordon of Post, July 1, 1934, was opened in 106th district court here Tuesday morning.

Seventy-five special veniremen were excused until Tuesday morning when Judge Gordon B. McGuire ruled on testimony growing out of the state's contest of a defense motion for continuance. The jury was chosen by Tuesday evening and testimony began Wednesday morning. 13 witnesses had been on the stand up until 11 o'clock Wednesday morning, and it is likely that testimony will last until Thursday morning.

Carl Rountree, J. E. Garland and J. H. Atwood were appointed attorneys for Bridges and Truitt Smith, district attorney of Tahoka; Louis B. Reed, Dawson county attorney, and J. E. Vickers of Lubbock are prosecutors.

Court here is in its third week. Only four bills of indictment were returned by a grand jury, three for burglary, one for driving when intoxicated.

County Sing-Song Festival Enjoyed By Large Throng

The Centennial sing-song sponsored by the rural and city schools in which event about 1500 children participated, was one of the most gigantic undertakings ever staged in the history of the schools of this county, and one of the largest crowds in years assembled in Lamesa to witness the ceremonies.

A parade of children from the city park through town was one of the main features of the program. In addition to the Lamesa Elementary and High schools, twenty three rural schools were represented with their respective banners, constituting one of the longest and most impressive processions ever witnessed by the on-lookers.

The children filed on the court house lawn in three divisions: primary, intermediate and high school. After a brief welcome by Mr. A. G. Bearden, secretary of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce, responded to by Mr. X. R. Banks, president of the Dawson county Teachers' Association, the children sang Texas songs en masse and by groups under the direction of Mrs. Alice Odum Lindsey.

A primary chorus, directed by Mrs. Matt McCall, added interest and variety to the program.

During a brief intermission, Mr. G. D. Holbrook, deputy state superintendent of this district, addressed the group.

Before the close of the program and amid such cheering, the winners in the rural school exhibit held in connection with the sing-song and participated in by fourteen schools were announced. Among the one to three teacher schools, Ballard won first place, Lou second and Plainview third. Schools having four or more teachers competed in a separate class, Woody winning first place in this division, McCarty second and Sparenberg third. Banners awarded by the Lamesa C. of C. were awarded to the winning schools.

Miss Anne Martin, county superintendent of Howard county and Mrs. Pauline Cantrell Brigham, a former county superintendent of Howard county, judged the exhibits.

Teachers and pupils of Dawson county deserve much credit for the fine interest they have shown in the music program sponsored by the State Department of Education for the past two years. With the coming of the curriculum revision movement the value of music in the schools was recognized, and music is to be henceforth a part of every school curriculum.

A district song meet is to be held in Lubbock at the Matador stadium, Texas Technological college next Friday afternoon May 1, at 3 o'clock. Plans are being formulated to transport a large group of children from Dawson county to the district meet.

Auto Mechanics proves to be the most popular class offered, it was revealed. Approximately forty men are enrolled in this subject. The course is being taught by Mr. Meddlebrook, camp mechanic.

A class was recently organized in cooking that will provide opportunity for enrollees to learn how to manage camp mess, and gain some experience and practice in the trade. In the future, only men who have completed the course will be eligible for promotion to jobs as cooks at the local camp. It was announced by Lt. Ira L. Cain, jr., Commanding officer. The cooking class is being directed by Gordon Boutlier, Company Mess Sergeant.

Recently the camp was able to obtain wood-working tools and equipment for the use of enrollees in carpentry and cabinet-making classes. This type of activity is especially adapted to the camp educational program, and many men are interested in the opportunity to make many useful and beautiful articles.

Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, Journalism and Vocational Work are all included in the CCC camp school and practically every man in camp, whether he quit school in the elementary grades, or was able to go to college, has been able to find a course to fit his interests and needs.

FARM NOTES

By Joe C. Williams, County Agent

Change in Farm Program

Some changes have been sent out by the Washington office in regard to the program as set out in the beginning.

Terraces—The total amount of money that can be collected for complying with the program on the leased land is the rentals for taking acres out of production, plus one dollar per acre or more depending on the practice used in soil building crops.

For an example: Thirty acres were taken out of production at 100 pounds per acre, at five cents per pound would amount to \$150.00. The land must be planted to some soil building crop such as soy beans, velvet beans, cow peas, or sudan grass, millet, sweet sorghum for which a payment of \$1.00 per acre will be made.

If the legumes such as soy beans, cow peas and those are turned under green a total payment of \$1.50 per acre will be made. The most that could be collected on the farm under the new program would be \$195.00 even if the entire farm was terraced this year. In other words \$1.50 per acre on the thirty acres plus the \$150.00 for leaving out of production is all that the farm could possibly get in payments.

We were told in a meeting at Colorado, Texas, the last Saturday in March that one would terrace the farm under the above example, terrace every acre except the rented acres and get one dollar per acre. That has been changed lately and \$1.50 per acre on the leased land plus the rental payment is all that could possibly be collected on the farm mentioned above.

Payment for Establishing Permanent Pasture

In case the above mentioned farm wanted to put the thirty acres leased land to permanent pasture he may do so and will be paid \$2.00 per acre provided he seeds the thirty acres to pasture grasses.

This payment will be in addition to the rental of \$150.00 on the basis men-

tioned above, then the total under the conditions that he could draw would be \$210 regardless of whether he terraced the place or not.

Special Pool Tag Checks Here

One thousand sixty-one checks here for cotton pooled in the special pool representing twenty-five thousand, eight hundred and sixty-four dollars. However we, as yet, do not have all the checks that are due from the pool, and have no information as to the National pool. This shipment of checks were dated January 9th and re-dated April 22nd, which shows that the checks were written on or about the time the check writing machine was stopped after the court ruling was given. All persons who are entitled to these checks should call for them at their earliest convenience, as we are anxious to clear out all the old work of the 1935 program to make way for the New Farm Program.

Sign Up On New Farm Program Will Be Ready Monday

All those who are interested in the signing up with the new farm program are urged to come in and sign up beginning Monday, May 3rd, which will continue through the 15th of May. We hope to have sufficient office help to work out the sign up as rapidly as possible. But Mondays and Saturdays are the busiest days in the office. All sign up work will be carried on in the office as in that way we will be able to check up our old records against the information that is given on the sign up here in the office. The check up is required of this office by the Washington office as they have in the office of the State Board and the Washington office copies of every application for bale tags in 1934 and 1935, and we are required to give the 1935 contract number as well as the application number on bale tags.

According to the present information that we have available this work must be completed not later than May 15.

There will be a meeting of all the members of the community committees only one day this week and announcements of the meeting will be mailed out to all community chairmen giving date of meeting.
