DEFENSE NEARS END OF CASE OF VINCE BOSS

CUERO, TEXAS, June 25.—Counsel for Vince Boss, Houston youth, charged with killing R. W. Albert, were expected to conclude defense testimony today after presenting witnesses who said the youth and other relatives had been of unsound mind.

Sam Mormino, Waco, great-uncle of the youth, said he believed Boss was temporarily insane when Albert was beaten and slashed to death while making collections on his cheese route between Houston and Hempstead, March 21.

Mormino said a second cousin of the defendant was adjudged insane last year and a great aunt was mentally unbalanced.

The state's rebuttal witnesses are expected to be mental experts called to testify to the youth's sanity, established in a recent hearing at Houston.

Lower Prices For Pork Seen

AMES, Ia. — The agricultural Middle West is becoming increasingly interested in the prospects for export disposal of American farm commodities due to increased output after three years of unfavorable crop conditions.

Dr. T. W. Schultz, head of the Agricultural Economics department at Iowa State College has noted this increasing concern over the export situation in a recent survey, he reported.

Production of pigs, Schultz said by way of example, increased 31 per cent in the last half of 1935 over the last half of 1934, and probably will increase by another 25 per cent in the first half of 1936 as compared to the corresponding period of the last year.

Demand to Lag
"As every farmer is well aware, those larger supplies mean lower prices unless demand increases proportionately," Dr. Schultz said.

"Domestic demand—the most important consideration—is expected to increase the rest of this year, but not enough to offset the increase in production of hogs," Schultz said, however, that an increase by 25 to 30 per cent in foreign demand will be necessary to hold hog prices as high during the next 12 months as prices have been during the past 12 month period.

Doubts Heavy Exports
"Business conditions," Schultz said, "have improved in recent months in most foreign countries which purchase American farm products. Despite this improvement, there is little hope for expansion of foreign buying to an extent to absorb the added production that is accumulating."

"Trade barriers," he explained, "are about as high as they were a year ago—which is to say they are extremely high and in the case of land and pork, Iowa's chief products, almost prohibitive of expanded trade."

RESTRICT OLYMPIC VILLAGE

BERLIN.—Only one woman will be allowed to reside in Olympic Village near Berlin, which is ready for the Olympic Games. She is Mrs. Fuestner, wife of Capt. Alexander Fuestner of the war ministry, who has moved in as the first occupant of the village.

They are part of the war stocks—25 river tugs, bought by the French government from the United States in 1916 with the intention of using them for the Paris-Rouen service. They were handsome boats when they sailed up the Marne, Missouri leading the way, and turned into the canal of the Little Darne in 1916, and the French government had paid 20,000 francs each for them. They were tied up to the bank—temporarily. Coal was left in their bunkers so that they would be ready to move out in a few days and start their new service. They haven't moved since.

After awhile the department of inland navigation took their engines out and, presumably, put them to work elsewhere. Later junkmen came around and moved about fittingly, were left inhabitants of the nearby settlements had gotten the coal long before that. Thereafter the boats were forgotten. Some of them gradually settled down into the ooze on the bottom of the canal. Others are still afloat.

Once or twice half-hearted efforts were made to sell them. The offering price was moved as low as 50 francs and there were no takers. None, that is, except one American. Maybe he was sentimental or maybe he was tired of paying rent. He turned the boat into a house boat and renamed it Noah's Ark. He lives in it now. It used to be moored in the Bois du Boulogne, and when he wanted a certificate of domicile, a document necessary in France, he got it from the forestry guard of the Bois du Boulogne. Now he has moored his boat in the Marne.

Some 25 or 30 out-of-town marksmen are expected from Dallas, Fort Worth, Abilene, Graham and other towns.

A program of 150 targets has been arranged with many merchandise prizes.

One of the new features which will be of interest to old shooters are the new angles at which the skeet targets will be thrown. The Oil Belt club is one of the first in the state to change their traps to throw this angle which is said to be harder than the old style. Old-time skeet shooters may find it as

difficult to run a high score as those who have never shot very much.

In order to interest new shooters a special event of 50 targets has been arranged for beginners only.

The clubhouse and grounds will be open to the public. Plenty of room for parking. The clubhouse is on a hill overlooking the grounds making it one of the coolest spots in Eastland county, officials declared.

All shooters and their friend and anyone interested in watching some of the best shots in West Texas break targets are invited to drive out and enjoy themselves, an announcement from the club stated.

Cisco Official and Carbon Man Inspect 800 Acres Pop Corn
CISCO, June 25.—J. E. Spencer, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, has returned from a business trip to Austin, Dallas and Fort Worth.

On Sunday Spencer was the guest of G. C. Atkins of the Carbon Peanut company which has 800 acres of pop corn in the winter garden district. This corn is coming into maturity and should make 15 or 20 cars of shelled corn 60,000 pounds to the car, which is wholesaling at 10 cents a pound, Spencer said.

About \$1,000 was taken from the bank. As the robbers fled in a gray Ford sedan they scattered roofing tacks to prevent pursuit.

American Fleet Goes Down At Its Inland Scapa Flow Near Paris

PARIS.—At Bohnell-sur-Marne, not far from Paris, an American fleet of 25 vessels is gradually sinking in America's inland Scapa Flow. Stragglers along the canal of the Little Darne, which leads from the Marne, come with surprise upon this graveyard of ships, some still afloat, some half-submerged, some showing only their smokestacks, on whose bows are the words, so strange to French eyes, Arkansas, Missouri, Ohio, Kentucky, Worcester, Georgia, and finally—not so strange—St. Louis.

Stockmen To Fight Imports At Meeting

FT. WORTH, June 25.—Worried over several situations which threaten to depress the Texas livestock market, chief industry of the state, H. F. McGill of Allee, president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association today issued a letter urging full attendance at the quarterly executive committee meeting at Marfa July 10.

In his letter he called attention to an invasion by foreign markets, notably that of the Argentine.

"The heavy importations of cattle and canned meats are seriously depressing our market," he said. "The proposed Argentine treaty was not acted upon by the last congress, but proponents will still continue to push it."

Under present regulations importation of cattle from any country in which hoof and mouth disease is prevalent (in any section of the country) is forbidden.

The new treaty, if and when approved, would allow importations from that section of the Argentine which is not infected, which in the present case is Patagonia.

The Texas and Southwestern association is opposed to the measure. Aside from the harm it would bring to domestic markets, the association feels there would be little to prevent shipment of cattle out of the Argentine by way of Patagonia.

ROBINSON IS CHAIRMAN OF CONVENTION

CONVENTION HALL, PHILADELPHIA, June 25.—Sen. Joseph Robinson assumed the helm of the national Democratic convention today, steering it toward settlement of its two controversial issues—the 1936 platform and abolition of the two-thirds rule of choosing the nominees.

Robinson was acclaimed chairman after delayed submission of the credentials committee report.

Just before he took his post the rules committee voted 36 to 13 to recommend to the convention substitution of majority rule for the ancient two-thirds requirement.

From closed platform drafters issued the word agreement had come to put new teeth in the proposed monopoly plank and compromise was near on the ticklish subject of a constitutional amendment for labor, wages and hours.

The labor question was thrust into prominence by Gov. Herbert Lehman of New York. Today Lehman was formally petitioned by representatives of the National Youth Democrats to reconsider his decision against running for reelection.

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Search Abandoned For Convicts In Mexia Territory

MEXIA, Texas, June 25.—State and local officers abandoned today the search for Forrest Gibson and Luke Trammel, fugitive convict killers, convinced they would have to await further movement of the pair.

A horse stolen Tuesday from a farmer was found tied to the barn of a farmer at Round Prairie, Robertson county, yesterday, but the farmer told possemen he had not seen the two convicts.

Prison bloodhounds were too exhausted for further use at present. The pursuers said it was useless to continue the chase in the area so well known to Gibson, who was reared there.

GOP Confidence Is Aroused Today

WASHINGTON, June 25.—Inspired by the confidence of National Committee Chairman John Hamilton, Republicans today mapped plans for a vigorous campaign in every section of the country.

Republican hopes also were lifted by promise of Representative William Lemke, union candidate, to conduct an active campaign. Lemke, after appealing to labor for support, left on a western speaking tour.

Hamilton believes the union party will swing many doubtful middle-western states to Gov. Alf Landon, "for every vote the third party takes from us, it will take from six to nine from the Democrats," he said.

Sanderford Files Expense Account

AUSTIN, June 25.—Sen. Roy Sanderford, candidate for governor, today filed his first campaign expense account.

It showed expenses to date of \$4,692, the biggest item of which was \$1,077 for sound-truck equipment.

Sanderford is the only constitutional officer who had filed a statement at noon.

Time for filing the first statement began today and ends July 1.

Penalty for failure is said to keep the nominee's name off the general election ballot.

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We Can't Ignore Issue of Soil Conservation

We have become so used to having our government approach things sidewise, with a crab-like, scuttling movement, that the pious words about soil conservation in the party platforms look like a cloak for crop control.

The parties pledge themselves to take eroded land out of production and restore it. Remembering what the U. S. Supreme Court said about the original AAA crop control scheme, the ordinary citizen assumes that this talk of conservation is just another plan to do what the court said the AAA could not do.

Probably it is, to a certain extent. But anyone who doubts that the problem of soil conservation is very real and pressing has only to look at a survey recently completed by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service to learn that he is in error.

This survey reveals, for instance, that no fewer than 785,000,000 acres of once-fertile farm land in the United States have been from 25 to 100 per cent destroyed by erosion. This is an area four times the size of Texas, 23 times the size of New York state; it represents one of the most terrific losses of natural resources that any nation ever suffered.

During the last century, the survey reports, the country has suffered a direct monetary loss by erosion of at least \$10,000,000,000—which will be doubled or tripled within 50 years unless something drastic is done.

Sixty-five per cent of the tillable land in the great Piedmont section, reaching from New Jersey to Alabama, has been stripped of its topsoil by wind and rain.

Five hundred thousand acres that were under cultivation in five coastal counties in Alabama a few years ago now are abandoned and worthless. Erosion is costing Oklahoma \$50,000,000 a year.

Sheet erosion is menacing 12,000,000 acres of Illinois' incredibly rich, black corn land. In the country as a whole, more than 50,000,000 acres have been so gullied and eroded that they will never again be good for anything.

It would be possible to go citing facts like these for half an hour. Enough has been said, however, to indicate that when the Republicans and the Democrats talk about soil conservation measures, they are not just talking about a new way to reduce agricultural production.

If we were living in the piping times of complete prosperity, with no farm surpluses, unemployment, or unbalanced budget to worry us, this thing that is happening to our soil would strike us as the most serious problem of the century.

In our present condition, it is only one of many problems; but it is hardly an exaggeration to say that in the long run it will probably prove the most important of all.

Whichever party is put in power next November, the campaign to save the greatest of our resources—the land—must be prosecuted with all the determination that would be given to a campaign to repel an invading enemy.

Q. Was Elkin, Texas, named for the Illinois city of the same name? E. J. Smithville.

A. No, for Robert M. Elkin, who surveyed the Southern Pacific railroad through the town.

Q. Just how old is the town of Yaleta, said to be the oldest town in Texas? D. A. Courtney.

A. Marcos de Niza discovered an Indian settlement there in 1537 and Coronado took possession of the settlement, which was then on an island, in 1540. Later, the river shifted and Yaleta was thrown into Texas territory. The present town site is traced to 1682.

Q. Did the protestant churches in Texas ever have a "Vigilance" committee? A. R. T. Galveston.

A. On May 8, 1837, a group of ministers of several protestant denominations met at Houston and organized "The Ecclesiastical Committee of Vigilance for Texas." It grew out of the fact that imposters were coming into Texas, representing themselves as ministers and soliciting funds for various purposes. The organization was given wide publicity but did not last long.

Q. What was the first text book used in Texas and for what purpose was it used? L. E. Donna.

A. It was a book of questions to be used by missionaries in teaching the Indians, was compiled and translated by a missionary at the Espada mission and was printed in Mexico in 1760. The questions were intended to improve the religious and moral habits of the Indians.

The bite itself is not poisonous, but it conveys a parasite which causes the trouble.

Universal Hunting Regulations Urged By a Federation

PALESTINE—Universal hunting and fishing license and regulatory powers for the Texas legislature toward game control are the chief advocates of the new Texas Wild Life Federation, T. W. Sharpe, of Austin, declared.

Sharpe appeared before members of the Anderson county chapter of the federation and outlined the salient points of the program.

Predicting passage of a bill next session that will the Texas legislature power to regulate game-taking as to size, species, bag limit and territory, Sharpe said that out of 650,000 hunters and fishermen in Texas only about 65,000 pay license fees.

"In other words," the secretary said, "the man who pays a hunting license is not only paying his own way but is also paying for some others."

As an example of the damage from lack of state territorial regulation, he cited an incident in West Texas when a drouth almost exterminated prairie chickens. Still, he said, hunters could legally kill a game because there was no law to protect it.

Sharpe said there was a strong possibility that when Texas is organized solidly for game conservation, which is now the aim of the federation, the federal government will sponsor wild life sanctuaries, breeding grounds and national game preserves in the state.

He mentioned that the federal government had purchased 450,000 acres for this purpose in Houston county, but added that the state is not yet ready to do its part toward conservation.

Before the Palestine sportsmen, Sharpe showed several movie reels, showing the restoration of game in Pennsylvania.

The federation, secretary said, the federal government is working and-in-hand with the Texas Wild Life Federation.

Spark Plug One Of Important Parts Of An Automobile

The spark plug may seem to be an insignificant bit of equipment, but it plays a mighty important part in making the car run smoothly and economically. As C. J. Moore of Moore Auto Mart, Hudson and Terraplane dealer here, says: "Spark plugs can make an old plug out of your car, or keep it as fit as a race horse."

"If the spark plugs are kept clean, with the points properly adjusted, a sweet-running motor will result, providing the rest of the car is in shape mechanically," said Moore, "but if they are neglected, then excessive gas consumption and even a 'bucking' motor may be looked for."

Poor acceleration, misfiring, spark knock or pre-ignition, hard starting and engine overheating are a few of the conditions that may be attributed to neglect in the care of the plugs.

"Spark plugs should be cleaned periodically, for any plug will become at least partially fouled with engine service. Fouling consists in coating the firing tip of the porcelain with the high tension ignition current to pass along the porcelain to the shell than it is to spark across the gap between the electrodes. It may be caused by excessive oil in the combustion chamber or by continuous operation at low speeds or long periods of idling the engine."

Moore emphasized the importance of using as far as possible the same kind of plug as that used in the original equipment, pointing out that car manufacturers spend considerable time and money to determine the proper plug. However, he said, "no one plug suits all operating conditions of given engine, and changes in driving conditions may occasionally demand a different kind of plug. The plug specified for a given engine will not cause pre-ignition under normal operating conditions, but if the carburetor mixture is lean or the ignition timing late, pre-ignition may occur. This may also happen if a tight leak has developed either between the control electrode and the porcelain or between the porcelain and the shell. What might appear to be only a very small leak will increase the temperature of the firing tip of the porcelain to a point where pre-ignition will result. In order to meet these conditions, however, spark plug manufacturers have provided plugs which, under given conditions, will operate with the lower end of the porcelain at different temperatures. Therefore, if continued difficulty is experienced, it is wise to consult an authorized service station to see if a change may be advisable."

Moore stressed the importance of spark plug maintenance from a standpoint of safety. "With safety being stressed more than ever," he said, "it is important that every motorist keep his car in the best of driving condition, and a car that is slow to accelerate, due to fouled plugs, cannot be termed a 'safe' car."

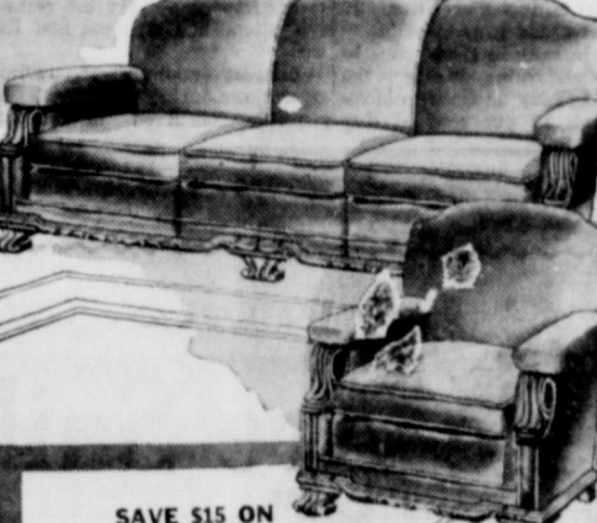

Robot Charts a Hot Air Belt High in Ozone

SYDNEY, Australia. — Radio experiments just completed by Drs. D. F. Martyn and O. O. Pulley of Sydney University have demonstrated the possibility of exploring the entire stratosphere for a distance of 150 miles above the earth without the necessity of further dangerous ascensions.

Except for the possibility of ascertaining whether the stratosphere constitutes a medium for speedy aerial travel, the two Sydney scientists are convinced that all necessary information about the earth's upper atmosphere can now be obtained from the earth itself.

Under the system invented and thoroughly demonstrated by Dr. Martyn, the upper air can now be probed by radio signals.

His new method gives accurate data on the amount of electrification, the amount of ozone, and the temperature throughout the whole thickness of the upper air from 22 up to 150 miles.

The new type apparatus which Dr. Martyn has perfected consists of a robot that sends out signals, catches the echoes, varies the wave lengths and pilots all the information obtained on a tiny chart.

One of the first discoveries made by Dr. Martyn with his new invention was that there is still another cold layer of air far above the stratosphere cold layer recently reached by Russian and American balloons. Between the two cold layers there lies sandwiched a warm layer, and it is in this latter that Dr. Martyn thinks that stratosphere flying might become a possibility.

According to the radio records made by Dr. Martyn, temperatures again dip in the second stratosphere above the warm ozone layer, reaching a minimum at 50 miles above the earth's surface.

From these upward the temperatures increase till they end in a torrid zone at 150 miles of altitude.

On this latter heated zone, Dr. Martyn's radio reports contradict the belief of Professor Appleton, who was convinced this zone was hot only in summer. Martyn's experiments show that the seasonal drop in only from 1,300 to 1,000.

Huge Gun, Long Silenced, Displays Might in Tests



With earth-rocking repercussion, this huge 14-inch railroad rifle is shown as it sent a projectile screaming through space toward targets 26 miles distant, in tests along the California coast. sonal drop in only from 1,300 to 1,000.

As a consequence, Dr. Martyn declares, that the earth is perpetually girdled by a fiery ring of inconceivably rarefied air, in which, necessarily, no human activity could ever be hoped for.

Measurements of the upper ozone show fluctuations exactly corresponding to barometric measures on the ground, but antedating them. As a consequence weather forecasts, Dr. Martyn declares, can be made from these radio probes of the air.

Australian authorities are so impressed with Dr. Martyn's findings, that modern ozone measures are now being installed at the Commonwealth Weather Bureau, the Solar Observatory at Canberra and at the installation of the Council for Scientific and Industrial Research.

New All-Time Oil Production Record Was Established in the United States During the Month of May This Year

By ELMER H. JOHNSON, Industrial Geographer Bureau of Business Research University of Texas.

A new all-time record in oil production in the United States was attained during the week ending May 16, 1936, with an average of a little more than 3,000,000 barrels a day. The previous highest stage had been attained during the week ending Aug. 23, 1929, with an average of 2,975,435 barrels a day.

The proportions contributed by the oil producing states and by major fields, however, was very different for the week of May 16, 1936, from what such proportions had been in the peak production of 1929. Comparisons of these changes during this period show that two states—Texas and Louisiana—have gained considerable. The large gain in Texas has been due, of course, to East Texas which was not producing oil in 1929. Two other sections of Texas also show gains—the Gulf Coast and East Central Texas—but the sum of the gains of these two districts is more than offset by the decreases in West Texas, North Central Texas and the Texas Panhandle. There has also been a slight gain in Southwest Texas.

The gain of the whole of Texas amounts to nearly 31 per cent over that for the week ending Aug. 23, 1929. In Louisiana both North and Coastal Louisiana show significant gains. Largest decrease in oil production by states during this period occurred in California—a decrease of 34.5 per cent. And in Oklahoma in spite of the enormous increase in the Oklahoma City field, the state total had declined by nearly 23 per cent. The States of Kansas and Michigan and the Rocky Mountain field show increases but substantial decreases have occurred in Arkansas and the Eastern fields.

Comparisons of these data, together with other available information, show unmistakably certain well-defined tendencies and changes in oil production. The section of greatest current production and of largest increases since 1929 is the Gulf Coastal Plain in Texas and Louisiana. This section includes the producing territory lying along the Gulf—the Gulf Coast, of Texas, and Louisiana—and the interior Coastal Plain fields—Southwest Texas, East Central Texas, East Texas, and North Louisiana.

Certain major fields elsewhere show significant increases in the comparisons under consideration—such as Oklahoma City; Kettleman Hills, Calif.; Hobbs, N. M.—but oil output as a whole outside the Gulf Coastal Plains, coast zones and interior, shows decreases.

To what extent these changes are indicative of a long-time trend which may increase the relative importance of Texas and Louisiana in oil production it is impossible to say. New discoveries no doubt will be made outside Texas and Louisiana; but it appears now that the great happy hunting grounds for new reserves in the United States will be largely confined to these two states.

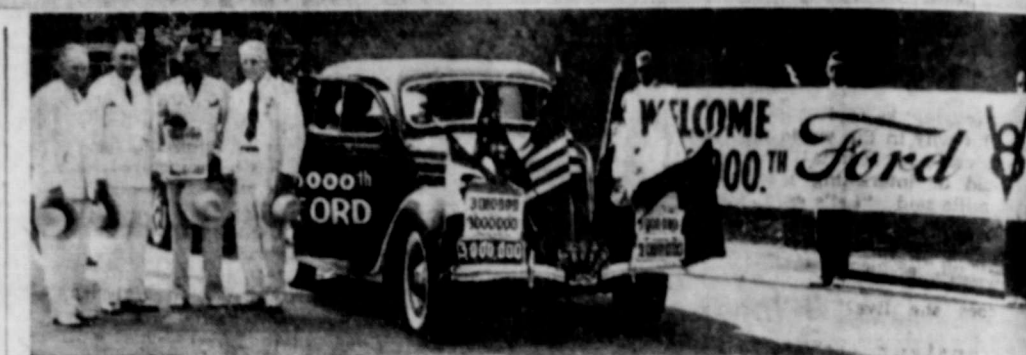
One by one the older oil producing states have been left behind. Pennsylvania was for years the leading oil producing state; but its largest annual production, 1891, was only 31,424,000 barrels. During the later 1890's Ohio held leading rank. Alternately Oklahoma and California have been the leading producers. Texas' annual production since 1931 has eclipsed that of any state at any time in the past.

Texas is not only the leading producer of all time, in 1935 producing nearly 24 per cent of the world output of oil, but it apparently is to be the last stand of big

oil production in the nation. It is inevitable though, like other states in the past, that Texas oil production will at some time in the future be subject to a decline.

Oil production is rather highly localized. Three states—Texas, Oklahoma, and California account for the major output of the United States. During the entire history of oil production of the United States 50 major pools have accounted for nearly 60 per cent of the nation's total output. All but four of these dominant pools occur in either Texas, Oklahoma or California.

Oil refining is likewise rather highly centralized but the geographical distribution of the oil refining districts shows many contrasts with that of oil production.

The location of the oil refining industry is oriented by access to the markets for major oil products as well as by the presence of crude oil. Largest refining district in America is the Texas Gulf Coast which currently has been taking about 22 per cent of the total crude runs to stills in the United States. Refineries in all of Texas have been taking more than 26 per cent of crude runs to stills.

Second in rank in crude runs to stills is California; during the week ending May 23 California refineries took 18 per cent of the

total. Third in rank in refinery operations is the East Coast district—refining crude oil brought in mainly by coastwise transportation, and clearly a district whose location of refineries is market oriented. Fourth in rank are the refineries of Indiana and Illinois—largely using crude oil brought in by extensive pipe line systems, and oriented by the demand of the great Mid-Western market. Of lesser importance are the refining operations in Oklahoma and Kansas.

Largest expansion in refining operations during the past few years has occurred in the Gulf Coast. A substantial portion of new crude production from Mid-Continent fields has been moved south by pipe lines to the Gulf, supplementing the increased production of the Gulf Coast. The definite movement of increased refinery operations of the Gulf Coast has been augmented by the factor of accessibility to the great market of northeastern United States, made possible by the low-cost tanker transportation of coastwise commerce.

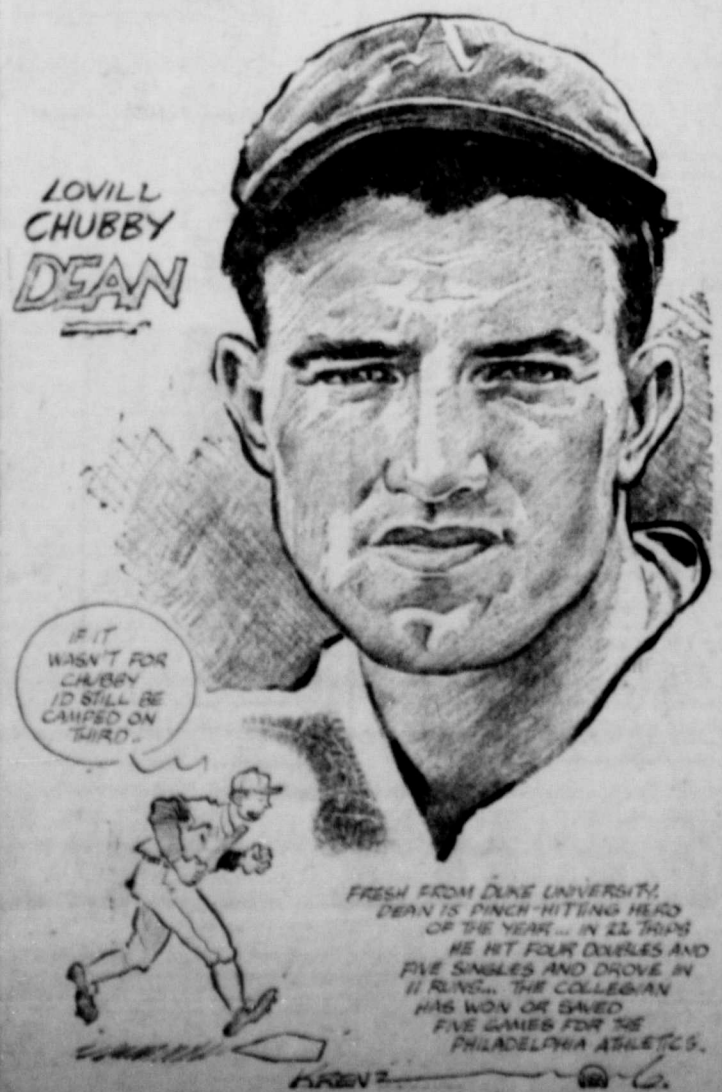
