The Woodman Picnic

It seems almost out of place for us to repeat the oft repeated sentence that the Woodman picnic at Brownfield last Friday was a huge success from every angle, but we cannot help from mentioning a few incidents that were especially worthy of publicity.

In the first place, the parade attracted a good deal of attention and favorable comment, especially the float, with the front end representing a lowly home with the young lady washing, supported by two ragged little boys; the inscription over them reading "Our father had no protection." The back end of the float represented a comfortable home with a beautiful young lady doing embroidery work, supported on each side by well dressed little brothers, and the inscription reading "Our father was protected by the Woodmen of the World." We believe this float had the effect of putting many unprotected heads of households to thinking.

Among the speeches in the morning was a short address on the object of Woodcraft by Percy Spencer, and an able effort in favor of Woman Suffrage by Word Price. Upon the conclusion of the address, dinner was announced, and as usual the people of old Terry had so much that it could not be placed upon the tables, but the people utilized the dance platform, seats etc., and such another dinner—well the people who came can tell you all about it.

After dinner we heard a masterful address by Don H. Biggers, who is a candidate for representative of the 122nd district, and a good Ball speech by Rev. Chase, of Lubbock. Then followed speeches by Attys. Lockhart of Tahoka; and Sow-

der of Lubbock, who are each candidates for the office of District Attorney, who presented their claims to the people.

Among the amusements were the usual ball game, bronk riding, doll rack and dancing platform, and all did well, with the exception of the doll rack. A little better than \$1500 was taken in by all the business houses and cold drink stands, and yet some people contend that a picnic is an expense to a community. The dance did not run but two nights as the dancers were too tired to dance the third.

All in all, this was one of the most successful picnics ever pulled off here.

The schoolastic population has increased about 25 per cent; financial conditions, while still far from ideal, are much improved; a good spirit pervades our people, and we approach the beginning of our term with bright hopes and expectations.

vantages as we have, we extend a cordial invitation to come to Brownfield, and remember you only have until August 1st to transfer.

To the patrons and citizens of Brownfield, you who are directly responsible for the success of the school, we have this to say: Let us commend all the good things, and forget all the mistakes and differences of the past. Let us unite and patiently work to make our school what it should be, and all we fondly hope it may be.

Six onions.
One fourth pound mustard.
One fourth cup salt.
Three fourth pound light brown sugar.
One tablespoon of celery seed.
One quart vinegar.
Cook till tender and seal hot.

Do the Planets Affect our Weather?

One of our correspondents wishes us to tell him through the News Letter whether the positions of the planets have any effect on the weather.

A few people strongly assert that they do, while many others, like our correspondent, have their doubts, but are willing to be "shown." Those, however, who have given the subject careful attention are positive that none of the planets, nor even the moon, ever has any appreciable effect on the weather.

As a matter of fact all weather changes depend ultimately upon temperature differences. The temperature, as we know, constitutes of itself a most important weather factor. Another and equally important weather factor is rainfall. But to obtain rain it is necessary first to evaporate water from the surface of the earth, and this, as every one knows, requires heat. Still another important weather factor is the direction and force of the wind, and this, too, requires heat, for the winds will not blow unless the temperature is different at one place from what it is at another any more than the air will draw up a chimney when there is no fire in it.

Since then the heating of different parts of the earth and its atmosphere to different temperatures is the real cause of the winds and of all weather changes it follows that the moon and the planets can affect the weather only so far as they supply heat.

Now, according to accurate measurements made with the most delicate instruments, the amount of heat sent to the earth by all the planets and also by the moon is insignificant in comparison to the amount that comes from the sun. Hence we could not expect either the planets or the moon appreciably to affect the weather. They do not supply enough heat, the one thing that causes all our weather changes.

To most people the above reasoning may seem quite sufficient and conclusive, but there is still another and an entirely different method of testing the whole question. We can observe the positions of the planets and the kind of weather during each position and see whether the same sort of weather always comes when the planets are in the same position. This kind of examination has often been made, both for the planets and for the moon, but not the slightest influence of either upon our weather has ever been found.

To sum up: We have every reason to believe that neither the planets nor the moon can have any appreciable effect on the weather, because they furnish so little heat upon which all weather changes ultimately depend, and this belief is fully supported by weather records.

The belief, still to be found in all countries, that the planets and the moon do affect the weather never had any scientific basis whatever; it is only a remnant of the many superstitions generated and fostered by that other and greater superstition, astrology.—Weekly News Letter

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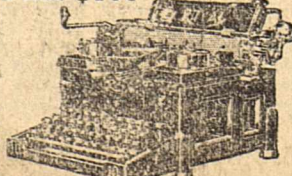
