Dedicated In Memory Of Mrs. Scott

(Editor's Note: It will be two years, come August 18, 1985, since the body of Mrs. Luella Mildred Sparks Scott was found in her home. This issue is in memory of her death. Maybe, just maybe, the person or persons responsible for this crime will caught one day. We pray to God for this to happen.)

The following is a reprint of the story which appeared in the Southwest Digest Thursday, August 25, 1983.

In less than fifteen years, tragedy has struck the Scott family three times. This time it was Mrs. Luella Mildred Sparks Scott, age 57, of 1801 East 20th Street. In 1968, her nine year-old daughter, Renee, was killed from a home accident when fallen glass struck her. Later, her son, George, Jr. was killed in an automobile accident in Houston in 1978, a few days before his 20th birthday.

The former wife of George Scott, II, Mrs. Scott's body was found in a bedroom of her residence about 10:30 p.m. Thursday (August 18th) by two friends and a co-worker.

This trio, according to the police report, met Lubbock police at the Scott residence. Police learned, after talking to the witnesses, that Mrs. Scott did not turn up at her work Wednesday at the Lubbock State School.

One of the witnesses told police that Mrs. Scott did not show up for work Wednesday and on Thursday she became worried about her. At that time, the witness said she called her house all during the day, but did not get an answer. She told police this is when she notified the other two witnesses and had them to meet her at the east Lubbock residence.

The witness went on to say when they arrived at the Scott residence, it appeared that all the lights were on in the house. They knocked on the door in an attempt to locate Mrs. Scott, but to no avail. They could not locate Mrs. Scott. They went to the back door in which is located in a fenced-in area, and knocked. The witness said, "There still was no answer."

At this time, all three opened the glass door which was unlocked. All said they entered the house and found Mrs. Scott lying in the southeast bedroom nude.

They summoned the other witness and she came in. All knew Mrs. Scott was dead. This is when they phoned the Lubbock police.

Justice of the Peace L.J. Blalock ruled the death a homicide, the city's 23rd of the year and the third in less than a week.

Although two witnesses told

police they had seen Mrs. Scott on Wednesday morning at about 10:00 a.m., police believe it is possible for her to have been killed as early as Tuesday evening upon her arrival from the Lubbock State School.

As of this time, police have no motive for the brutal slaying of the Lubbock woman. Her billfold and some keys still remain missing, however.

Hundreds of Lubbockites and out-of-town friends and associates attended funeral service Tuesday afternoon (August 23, 1983) at the Greater Saint Luke Baptist Church with the pastor, Rev. J.H. Ford, officiating. Interment was held in Peaceful Gardens Cemetery under the directions of Jamison & Son Funeral Home.

An autopsy revealed that Mrs. Scott had five stab wounds on her body, and had been beaten.

A native of Corsicana, Texas, she taught school in Frederick, Oklahoma in the public schools. In 1953, she moved to Lubbock where she taught school for several years.

Mrs. Scott was a member of the Greater Saint Luke Baptist Church, the Lubbock Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., the Lubbock Association for Retarded Children, the Lubbock Branch of the NAACP, the International Women's Club, and the Dorcas Missionary Society.

At one time, she served as board member of the Lubbock Opportunities Industrialization Center (LOIC) and other local efforts.

She is survived by her former husband, George Scott, II, of Lubbock; mother, Mrs. Geneva Jackson of Los Angeles, California; step-mother, Mrs. Adelle Sparks of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; sister, Mrs. Inez Alex of Los Angeles, California; step-son, Donald J. Scott of Monterey, California; two granddaughters, Tara of Lubbock and Jannet of Monterey, California; one uncle, Willie Houston of Wichita Falls, Texas, and many other relatives and friends.

Lubbock Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority held an Omega Memorial Monday evening in Mrs. Scott's honor.

The family suggests memorials to the Renee, George Scott III, and Luella Scott Memorial Fund for Retarded Children at First Federal Savings and Loan Bank.

The death of Mrs. Scott let us know as Black people in 1983, living in Lubbock, Texas, that as neighbors we are insensitive with what is going on around us. It

Black Self-Help & The Role Of The Black Press

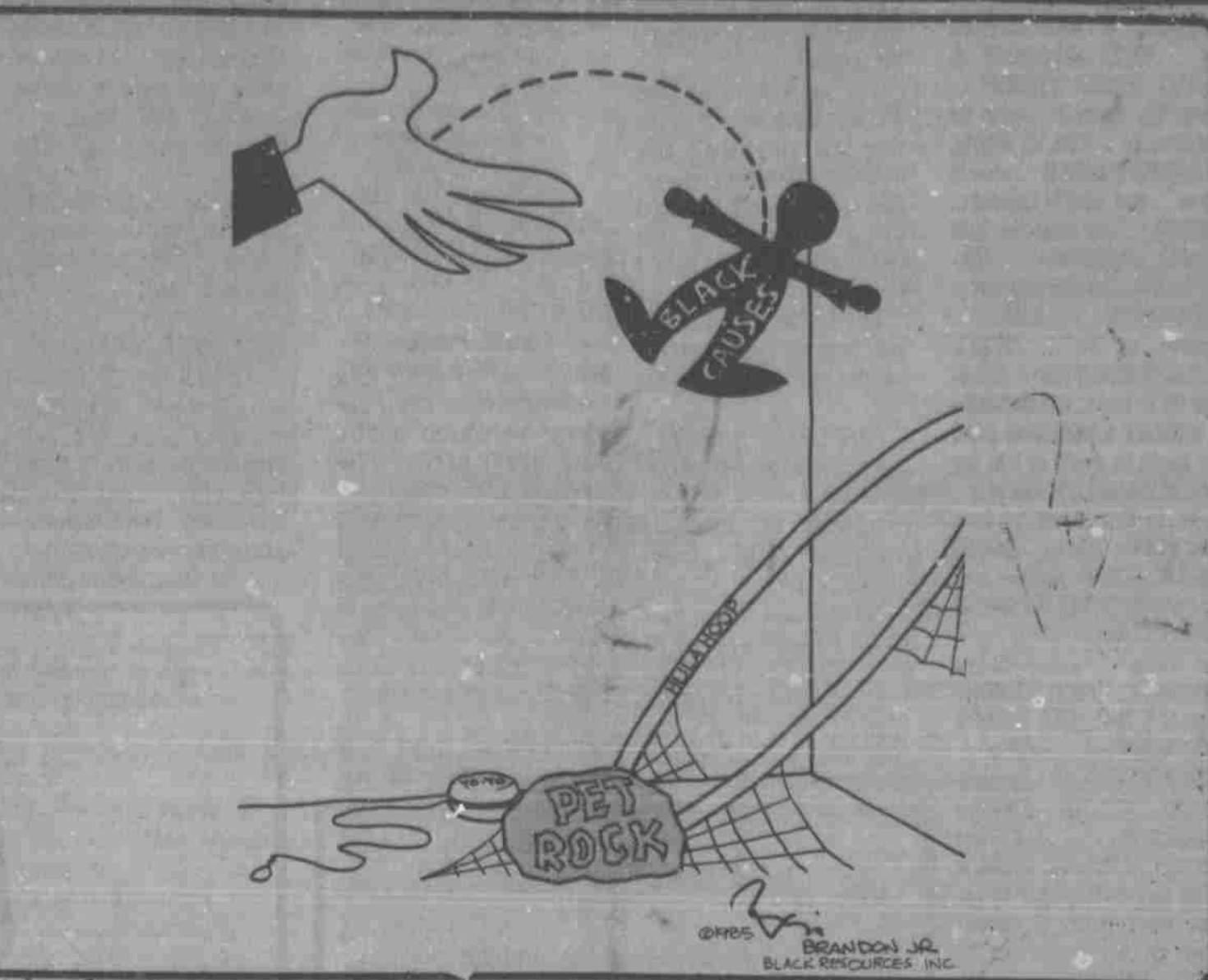

The Children on the Milk Cartons

Their faces are flashed on our television screens. They stare at us from the sides of milk cartons, from posters in grocery and police stations, even from the floor of our U. S. House of Representatives.

They are America's missing children, the focal point of growing national concern and debate. Because of the highly emotional nature of this issue, it is easy to lose track of the facts about these children. But



we must keep our sense of realism in order to understand the full complexity of this problem and take effective action.

First of all, we must keep in mind that missing children are a very diverse group. Out of the over one and one-half million children who are now said to be missing, the vast majority are runaways. Of the rest, some have been kidnapped by a non-custodial parent. Some are the victims of a relatively new phenomenon - so-called "throwaway" children, who have literally been abandoned by their parents. And, each year, several thousand children are missing because they have been abducted by a stranger - the situation dramatically portrayed in the television movie "Adam."

Helping to mend families that have been torn by any of these tragedies is a complicated task. The U. S. Justice Department has begun to take some first steps toward helping families and children to find each other again. But healing them will take far more in-depth assistance. Families which have undergone such traumas need counseling and other support services, according to recent Congressional testimony by Mrs. Marie Edstrom, whose son was abducted and murdered last year.

Preventing any of these tragedies from happening in the first place is an even greater challenge. It is not being helped by profit-making companies who are now trying to exploit parental fears by selling fingerprinting kits or handcuffs to keep children from wandering off in the supermarket.

We must find real remedies for each part of this problem. To help prevent abductions, for example, we need to train our children better on how to take care of themselves, and to put our communities on the lookout for all our children's safety.

Preventing runaways and "throwaways" is more complex. These problems can only be averted by long term efforts to give all of our families the means to survive and to hold and support their children. Once youths have left home for good, they need counseling and other services and supports that can help them become self-sufficient. An effective shelter program for runaways would help these youth more than fingerprints, according to Congressional testimony by Lieutenant Richard Schoenberger, a Michigan policeman who has worked with this problem for years.

Our nation has identified a serious problem: the large number of our children who are missing from their homes. Publicity is a valuable first step, but it is only a first step. We must take care that this public interest is sustained so that we can address the special and individual needs of children who have run away, been kidnapped by a parent, or abducted by strangers.

Read Your Lease Before You Sign It

The landlord/tenant relationship is one of the most important relationships in our society. For approximately seventy-two percent (72%) of America's population, renting housing is necessary.

Usually, the terms under which housing is rented will be governed by a written agreement, through some landlord's rent property on a "handshake deal."

The "handshake" rental, or oral lease, is usually a month-to-month rental agreement and both parties have basically the same rights and obligations as in any other rental agreement. If rent is, by agreement, paid on a weekly basis, the rental term is week-to-week. Proof of the terms of an oral agreement can be a problem in an oral rental agreement, therefore, it is very important that the tenant keep records.

The written rental agreement can range from a "memorandum" lease which simply outlines the security deposit, the monthly (or weekly) rental payment due, the date of the agreement (which is the date rent begins—whether or not the tenant has moved in), the rented premises, and a few restrictions such as "no pets." The law fills in many of the terms of the "memorandum" rental agreement.

Many rental agreements are typed or printed forms, which can be several pages long. The extra language in the long forms is usually written by and attorney for the benefit and protection of the landlord, and gives him rights in addition to those he would normally have under the law. The longer the lease agreement, the more important it is that you read it carefully before you sign it.

As long as the landlord and tenant relationship runs smoothly, the lease provisions do not become an issue. The ordinary events which cause conflict in the landlord-tenant relationship are non-payment of rent, "doubling up" (allowing extra people to live in the rented home), getting a pet, the need for repairs, and moving out of the unit.

The lease agreement will usually have a statement about each of these events, usually to the effect that they constitute a default by the

tenant and that the landlord may evict the tenant.

Timely payment of rent is the most important item in the lease. Rental payments are the reason the landlord owns the property. Non-payment or late payment of rent is the most common reason for evicting tenants. Before you sign a written lease, the most important thing to check is how much the rent and security deposit are. Be certain the agreed-on figures for the rent and security deposit are written in the blanks on the rental agreement.

When you are negotiating a lease, tell your prospective landlord exactly who will be living in the household and about any pets you have or plan to acquire. Many landlords allow pets, although some will collect an additional security deposit.

Before you sign a rental agreement it is a good idea to check the actual unit you are renting, rather than the "model" unit he ammay be showing. Are the walls and carpet clean enough? Do the heating, air conditioning and plumbing work? When you sign a long-term lease, it usually states in writing that you have inspected the unit and consider it habitable. You also waive some legal rights you would otherwise have under the warranty of habitability.

Another reason for inspecting the unit is to fill out an inventory sheet on the unit. Often, a landlord will provide a long sheet describing items in the unit that are already damaged, e.g. a cracked light fixture or a hole in the carpet. The sheet may also list furniture and other items included in the unit. The tenant should compare this list to the actual condition of the apartment and note any differences to avoid being charged for damages caused by previous tenants. The inventory sheets become part of the lease. If such a list is not provided, the tenant should make his own list of things wrong with the unit before moving in.

Many items are minor, such as nail holes in the wall and spots on the carpet. If there is a major problem with the unit you feel the landlord should repair, get the agreement to repair it in writing, either in the lease or as an addendum to the lease.

Certain lease provisions must be underlined or printed in bold print in your lease. The contractual lien, or "landlord's lien," is one of these terms. If there is a contractual lien in your lease, the landlord may seize some of your property if you are behind on the rent. The exempt items or property he may not seize are clothing, tools of your trade or profession, kitchen implements and food and medications. If your landlord seizes any of these items or seizes any property without your having agreed to it by signing a lease agreement that allows him to do it, he may be liable to you for actual damages, month's rent, plus \$100 and attorney's fees, less any amount due and owing the landlord.

Acceleration of rent is a fairly common term in a lease. If a tenant moves out before the initial lease term, usually 6 months, the landlord can try to make him pay rent for the entire lease term in a lump sum. Such a provision is enforceable if printed in bold print or underlined in the lease. Although the language is broad, there are limitations on the landlord's ability to collect accelerated rent. For instance, if the landlord terminates the lease agreement or brings an eviction action, he is not entitled to collect accelerated rent, even though his lease may say that he is.

Any requirement that moveout notice be written rather than oral must also be set forth in bold print or underlined in the lease agreement. The length of such notice, usually thirty (30) days must also be set forth in the same manner.

Your lease or rental agreement is one of the most important documents you will ever sign. It not only determines how much you pay for housing, but may also spell out rules which affect your family's lifestyle. There may be rules included in the lease or circulate after the lease which tell you where to park, how to dispose of trash and garbage, where your children may play, and how many guests you may have in your home. There may also be rules forbidding washing cars on the premises, performing auto repairs or maintenance, and keeping a car which does not run on the premises. These rules are binding on the tenant and may serve as grounds for eviction even if the tenant is paying the rent on time.

This article is intended as a general statement to assist the residential tenant in understanding the significance of the rental agreement; he is signing, and not as specific individual advice on a particular legal matter. If you have a dispute with your landlord while you are renting your home, consult and attorney to discuss your rights and remedies under Texas law.

An Interview With Bob Tieuel, Jr.

Veteran Newsmen and Retired
Methodist Minister

S. W. Digest -- Now that you have been retired for about a year as a C. M. E. pastor, what are your feelings or thoughts on the matter?

B. T. -- Yes, I do miss the pastorate very much after serving as one for more than forty years. I do believe God directed me as I have been very busy in assisting my wife in providing a more comfortable place to live during our golden years.

S. W. Digest -- We understand that you could have continued in the pastorate had you chosen to do so.

B. T. -- That is true. When I retired, I was physically worn and under a great deal of strain and stress. My doctor told me to slow down. For six years, while pastoring in Pecos, Texas, I drove from three to four hundred miles per week to serve the mission in Pecos.

S. W. Digest -- What do you believe to be your greatest contribution to the church of your choice during the past years?

B. T. -- Serving the mission churches and helping my fellow pastors and ministers to keep alive. It was often said that I had a peculiar ability to raise finance and bread for the hungry. And would you believe it I often drove three to five hundred miles to serve mission churches in Central and East Texas at least twice a month. I can't count now the number of new cars I wore out serving my church during those years.

S. W. Digest -- Why did you continue to serve in these ways out places and in semi-rural and small towns, when most preachers were perhaps looking for larger and more prosperous churches?

B. T. -- I believed from the beginning that God had called me to the mission fields in Oklahoma where I began in Tennessee, Delaware, Massachusetts, Kansas, New Mexico and West Texas. And even though I had married into a C. M. E. Bishop's family and could have perhaps got some larger churches, we stayed with the mission fields through it all. And what joys we found in spite of such suffering and sometimes heartaches. Black people can at times seem so hard and ungrateful.

S. W. Digest -- Bro. Bob, what are your plans for the immediate future and the rest of your remaining years?

B. T. -- I am glad that you asked that question. I have no plans personally but as ever where God leads, I will follow. I believe that one that is called for God will never stop lifting Him up until death brings true retirement. For many years, I have worked with the black press in church and state and want to continue to urge my people to support more than ever the black church and the black press. If we are to ever enter into the promise land, these two institutions will be in the forefront in our struggle. We have come a long way but there is a lot of road ahead. Maybe not in my lifetime, but one day as the late Martin Luther King would say: "We will be free at last."

S. W. Digest -- As you look back Rev. Tieuel, what do you see as the greatest need of the Black Church?

B. T. -- It would seem to me to be the great need for young, consecrated and dedicated young men and women to go into the ministry. This is not to say that they must be perfect but at least willing to be used by God for whatever cause God needs us. I have made many mistakes in my ministry but I never failed to ask God for forgiveness. God has not made any of us perfect but all of us ministers and lay people, can grow in grace and knowledge. When we cease to grow, we die.

We need to send more missionaries to Africa and other foreign fields to work with our people and the peoples of the earth. Black church schools and colleges need to study seriously the idea of merging their efforts as the struggle to keep alive and viable grows heavier each passing day.

S. W. Digest -- Finally, what do you see as the future of the Black Press and what are our greatest needs?

B. T. -- Like the black church, we must give more moral and financial support our black church press as well as our secular press like the S. W. Digest. Unfortunately, there are black folks who still believe that what is black has got to get back and what is white is right. A black pastor of a black church in Austin told me some 15 years ago that he did not read black papers. Need I say more. That spirit is still alive today. Like the man said: "Some of us need to have our head and heart examine. Maybe some of us are not black at all but bastard children. Yet God still loves us all. Thank you for your time, gentlemen. See u later

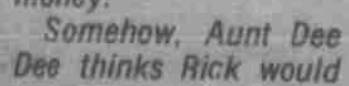

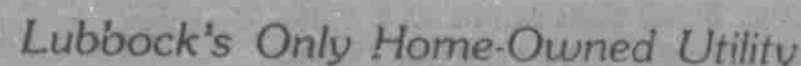

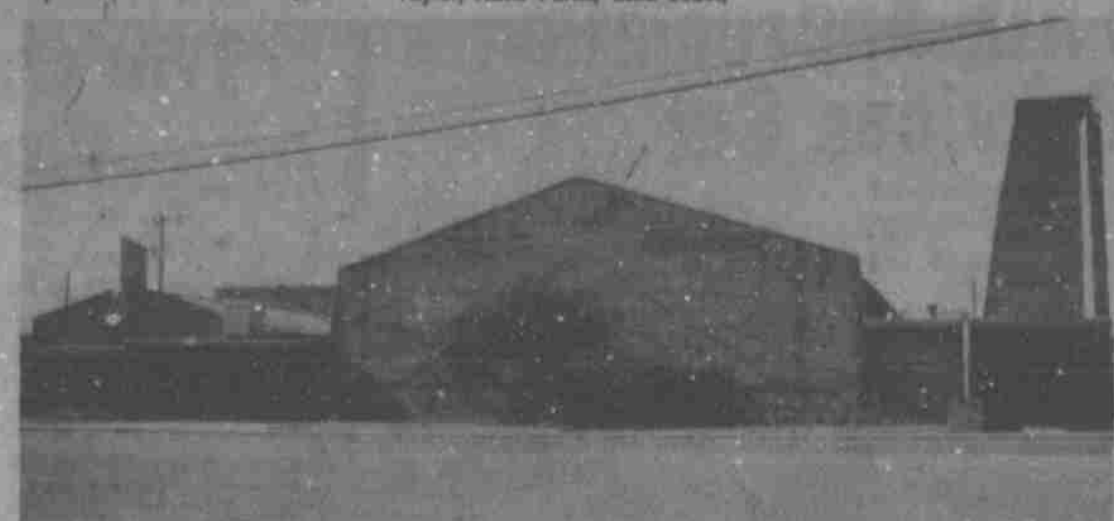

II. REPENTANCE AND FAITH ARE INSEPARABLE.

(1) Not only are they inseparable graces, but we must be careful and not rank them, or declare that one comes prior to the other. In the Bible when ever they are both spoken of at one time, the order is "repentance and faith". (2) The interdependence of repentance and faith can be readily seen when we remember that faith is faith in Christ for salvation from sin. (3) Saving faith is permeated with repentance and repentance is permeated with faith.

1. It is repentance toward God & faith toward Christ. (a)-I Acts 20:21
2. Repent and believe the gospel. (b)-I Mark 1:15. Remember that "faith" and "believing" are very similar.
3. Repent and turn to God. Acts 26:20. (In faith we turn to God).

III. REPENTANCE AND FAITH WROUGHT IN US BY GOD!

This does not mean that God does this apart from changing our mind, heart and will.

1. God gives repentance, Acts 11:18; II Tim. 2:25
2. God leads us to repentance. Rom. 2:4
3. God opens the heart. Acts 16:14
4. God quickens and makes alive. Eph. 2:1
5. Faith comes through the Word of God. Rom. 10:17

IV. THE RESULT OF REPENTANCE AND FAITH.

Notice what our Confession of Faith says: "... (d) thereby, being deeply convicted of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession and supplication for mercy..."

Repentance consists essentially in a change of heart, mind and will in respect to four things (1) change of mind in respect to God (2) in respect to ourselves (3) in respect to sin and (4) respecting righteousness.

1. These were convicted and requiring. (c)-I Acts 2:37,38. (Pricked, is the Greek word KATANUSSO, and it means to strike or prick violently, to stun).
2. This man was broken, humbled and enquiring. Acts 16:29-31
3. This man was repentant and desired God's mercy. (d)-2 Luke 18:13
4. A marvelous change is wrought. (d)-5 Isa. 55:6,7

V. REPENTANCE AND FAITH LEAD TO PUBLIC CONFESSION OF CHRIST.

1. Believing and confessing closely linked. Rom. 10:9-14
2. Those who truly believe will confess. Luke 12:8,9

In Heb. 12:1 it is revealed who is the author and finisher of our faith. Also see John 3:36; 5:24.
